

'FRIENDS OF TSAVO' WALK TO AID LIMO WILDLIFE SANCTUARY

WALKING AGAIN for charity are the 'FRIENDS OF TSAVO' this time to continue with their support of the Limo Community Wildlife Sanctuary by providing it with two entrance gates.

This project has also received support from the African Conservation Centre through its CORE programme funded by USAID.

It helps local communities to benefit from wildlife thus encouraging them to take care of their resources for their sustainable use.

LIMO has also received support from PACT, the E.A. Wildlife Society and the Kenya Wildlife Services which encourages those in the Mwakitau area of Tsavo West region to convert their land into a wildlife sanctuary instead of farming because of increasing

The 'FRIENDS OFTSAVO' have been actively involved in this LUMO project and have already donated uniforms and ten pairs of boots for its Rangers who have been trained by KWS.

This 'CHARITY' Walk takes place on Sunday, October 28, from the Patel Samaj on Haile Selassie Road at 8.30 a.m.

It will cover 10 kms there and back.

Mombasa residents and those in the tourism industry have been invited to participate and in this way help reduce the perennial conflict that exists between humans and wildlife in such areas.

The gate entrance fee for the fair will be Ksh 100 for adults and Ksh 50 for children. All activities are reasonably priced.





Here is a text that you can find in the book "Old Fourlegs - The story of the Coelacanth" by J.L.B. Smith.

In his book *Old Fourlegs - The story of the Coelacanth*, published 1956 by Longmans, Green & Co London, J.L.B. Smith

"Before we left for Mozambique "Before we left for Mozambique (where a Mozambique native had told about the coelacanth? fish he got at Bazaruto! I received a letter, dated the 3rd August 1953, from G.F. Cartwright of Sallsbury (now Harare), Rhodesia (Zimbabwe).

"He wrote to say that he had been goggle-fishing at Malindi in October and November 1952, and that he had seen us at work there at the close of our stay

"Later when out over deep water on a reef one day, equipped and armed with spear-

gun, he suddenly saw not far below him a large fish whose appearance gave him a shock

"It had a huge mouth and a baleful and ancient appear-

To quote further: "It was a large fish, heavily built, and from 100 to 150-lbs in weight.

"It was totally unlike any fish I ad seen or ever saw after-

"It looked wholly evil and a thousand years old.

"It had a large eye and the most outstanding feature was the armour-plate effect of its heavy scales, scales so heavy that it was set quite apart from all other

After returning to Rhodesia, in some periodical Cartwright saw a photograph of the second coelacanth (caught one month later), he became convinced that he did see this fish off Malindi.

Shortly afterwards he visited he Centenary Exhibition in

Bulawayo, and to his satisfaction found a full size model of a Coelacanth (from the East London Museum, South Africa) on view there.

Now, Cartwright was even more convinced that he really saw a coelacanth!

J.L.B. Smith: "What did I think?

"Well, it was clear that if the Comores was the home of the coelacanth, Malindi was much nearer and much more easily accessible in every way than East London, which one coelacanth at least had actually reached

"Bazaruto fell in between these places, and Cartwright's ex-perience at least lent colour to the Bazaruto idea.

"Furthermore, from my wide knowledge of the fishes of the western Indian Ocean I could think of no species that fitted Cartwright's description as well as a coelacanth. Not one."

Maybe it was really a pelacanth ?

. The final category applies to those vehicles which have factory fitted or retrofitted tinted glass

This glass has been designed to serve a purpose on the vehicles and if fitted from the factory must be legal in most countries.

Also some of the glass may not just be tinted but could be photosensitive and hence change colour with the level of sun.

The law as written has no specific guidelines on what is and is not tinted.

It is left to the boys in blue to make their own interpretation. Herein lies the Kenyan problem

Before the top cop made an announcement, he should have looked at how the edict was going to be enforced

Do we have the exact definition of what tinted means ?

Do we have a cut off point which is allowable and where the tint is not allowable ?

What recourse do owners ave where the original factory fitting was tinted or who had photosensitive glass ?

In other countries, where there is a restriction on tinting of glass, very carefully defined guidelines are available prior to the enforcement of the restriction.

As an example, each police traffic post is trained on the



objective of the law and what does and does not comply with

Measurement devices are provided which will quickly and efficiently and undeniably demonstrate to the drier of the vehicle whether they comply or

Guidelines on what complies is also given so that the public knows and does not fit what is non-compliant.

There is no single line statement like what the top cop has done.

There must be items that can comply rather than a blanket ban.

It is all too easy to do and shows a degree of intolerance rather than the will to be fair.

We must stop harassing wananchi until what is illegal that is tinted is defined.

Do we mean the aluminised films which are only one way vision which may stop an observant boy in blue from observing potential crime or unlawful acts being carried out in cars and buses?

Do we mean the film that is so dark that for all intents and purposes one cannot see into the car ?

In countries where such bans have been effectively applied each cop who is monitoring such issues has a meter that measures how much light is admitted into the vehicle by the

If there is sufficient light being let into the car then it means that the boys in blue can also see into the car and they have no quarrels.

However, if the meter says there is too little light then the defaulter is given a set number

of days in which to repair the harm and report back to the cops. If they don't then the car is impounded and rehabilitated by

the cops and then returned to the owner after he has paid for the cost of the work, plus a fine plus a handling fee. As Kachumbari says, the best way is to be exact in what one

LAMU FISHING

This is backed from the trip up to Kiwaiyu by Albatross, fishing up via the North Kenya Banks en route to collect a charter at this far northern area.

MOUNTAINS OF MANTIS PRAWNS DISTRACT THE SAILFISH

MANTIS PRAWNS have been the thorn in the side of the angler all week, distracting the sailfish and yellowfin tuna to the point that were almost uncatchable

Sailfish were tailing the waves in such numbers that experienced charter captains James Adcock and Howard Lawrence Brown both likened it to the huge sailfish runs in Malindi waters.

During those Malindi runs the fishing boats come in festooned with red sailfish flags like pennants at a fairground, but the outriggers on Mtwapa boats have been bare poles.

The difference is that the Malindi fish are there to swallow baitfish, especially the Malindi herring, and so they can be easily attracted to baits and lures.

But here they are following the mantis prawns and other tiny prey of which there are so many millions that even if one does have an imitation the chances of distracting a fish from the real thing are very small.

The same has been true of the yellowfin tuna, although so of these have been caught

On Tuesday Edward Chester a fly-fishing instructor from Britain, went out with James Adcock in the Sesse canoe, Samvuke, and as soon as they got onto the swell of the sea they came across diving terns and shoals of tuna swirling and jumping.

Very soon one of the thirty pound rods was bowed down and the reel was screeching its sweet, discordant song, and for the next quarter hour and more Edward had some energetic pumping and winding to do

He brought the fish up from the

blue depths to where it was seen in the clear water, hashing golden, and then it was in the boat, a round-bodied, slim-wristed, blade-tailed yellowflin tuna, all the irridescent colours silvery and shining.

This was Edward's first tuna ever, a fish of thirteen kilos and as the shoals were still churning the water white it seemed to be just the beginning of a fish-laden

But the other fish just did not home in on the hook, although the tuna were spread over a huge area of the sea.

Packs of dozens of salifish were cutting the surface with their scythe-blade tails and the front part of their sails raised, and their bills were waggling side to side as they fed on the finger-sized bait.

Some were jumping clear of the ocean, long slender bodies gleaming in the sun, falling on their sides with a splash of spray flashing

Edward and James saw one iump six times in succession

But none of them came to the baits and lures trailing in the wake of the boat, not even any takers, none of them lost, just

Edward caught a small trevally on the way into Mtwapa creek and that was it for the day, but in spite of the long spell without fish he enjoyed it greatly and declared himself thoroughly hooked on small-boat fishing, with the experience of being right down on the water amongst the fish.

Another Sesse cance, Tengesi, had a good start to the day on Wednesday, catching

but then the fish got mesmerised by the mantis prawns and would not come near the boat.

These prawns are not like the ones we dine on but are blunt-headed and flattened laterally, as if you had got an eating prawn and cut it blunt then squashed it flat from the top, and they have fragile arms tucked in under them that look very like the arms and hands of a praying mantis.

On Wednesday there were sailfish littering the ocean too, more than fifty seen by those on Tengesi, but not biting

One boat solved the tuna riddle on Saturday, boat secretive that Horse. not

revealing its methods, of course but catching eleven yellowfir tuna, none of them very big.

The Dark Horse angler also had a long period of heavy rod work to do as something big gulped a tuna in one go and was at the end of the line, pulling away into the hidden depths for an hour and a half before it broke off and swam away

Steve Riddles and Neil Reed were fishing on Howard Lawrence-Brown's boat, Kipapa, on the same day and they started with a catch of a good crockodile gar of three kilos

Then the boat stirred the sall water for the next nearly eight hours with no more fish although

some sailfish finning and jumping

At the eleventh hour Steve heard his reel whirring and when he had the fish behind the transom another line that had been left trailing a Rapala began slipping off into the water and Neil leapt to the call.

Steve's fish was gaffed in, a kingfish of eight kilos, and Neil's was a kingfish too, that came to the boat easily but then made some heavy rushes, running off the fifty pound line so strongly that Howard said later he thought it was going to pull the rodster overboard.

No such luck, but this angle

How does this grab you as a start to a fishing adventure 7

This was how my fishing adventure started !

I had been invited down to fish in Southern Tanzania on an exploratory trip out of Kiswere

In fact we went further south to Lindi, which is about 30 miles north of the Mozambique border.

On day 1 out of Dar-es-Salaam we fished down to Mafia Island via Latham as I had 12 year old Lorian with me and he needed to be kept occupied

He caught a 15 kg kingfish and I got stuck into a 97.6 kg wahoo, which kept me quiet and occupied for 20 mins and nearly broke my back until I got into

We also had the first big yellowfin tuna of the trip

This one weighed in at over 40kg

That kept the young man quiet and occupied for a full 20 minutes! A truly excellent first yellowfin tuna for a 12 year old.

The next day between Mafia and Kilwa we did some serious reef-bashing which kept us all occupied for most of the day.

We had a mixed bag of 29 fish eight Karambesi (Giant trevally, Caranx ignobilis), seven rainbow runner, eight yellowfin tuna, two kingfish and four wahoo.

Two of the Karambesi that we ast we estimated to be in excess of 40 kg each.

They both managed to outwit us and get back into neir holes. These were seriously large Karambesi and we would have liked to spend another day on the reef. but we had to move on.

After Kilwa we had a long dash to Lindi which took 36 hours against the current.

Our return trip through these waters to Kiswere proved there are plenty of fish there, as we hit over 400 kgs of yellowfin in less than four hours.

Fishing along the continental shelf off Kiswere and Kilwa we had substantial fishing.

In addition to the 400 kg caught off Kiswere we had strikes from Broadbill, Black Marlin, Yellowfin Tuna and Sharks. This is an area to be South Coast Fishing

THE BEST DAY, and all days were excellent, was out of Kilwa.

Every fish landed was over 50 kg and there were 11 of them. The biggest being a 104kg (229

lb) Yellowfin Tuna

A HUGE FISH, which only took 20 minutes to get

Unfortunately we had to leave Kilwa sooner than we wanted as I had to get back to Dar-es-Salaam. From Mafia back to Dar we caught 24 yellowfin tuna all over 15 kg and one over 35 kg.

Living on board a fishing boat for any length time can become very tedious and claustrophi but we overcame all that - in style!

Each afternoon we would find a safe haven make our way to totally deserted beaches, who out support vehicles had set up our fly-cam some of the most spectacular spots.

After a sizzling hot shower and a short siests would have a walk along the beach or a cinland and come back to camp in the early even for ice-cold drinks at sunset.

Each evening after a superb dinner we woul sit around a huge campfire - made from all s and shapes of driftwood - on the beach.

It wasn't long though before we all made our to bed and all is silent except for the sound of sea and the sounds of the African night.

We would wake early with the smell of fre brewed coffee and the smell of freshly be bread.

Six-thirty again and off for another day's fis in the most exciting waters that I have fished very long time.
