GOOD NEWS FOR 'SURFERS ON THE INTERNET'

IN THE fast paced world of the information super highway, the East African Coast has not been left behind.

Today, *Coastweek*, can be read on the Internet.

Coastweek has launched an interactive electronic version of the newspaper.

The paper has text, full colour graphics and editor's electronic mail box that permits the reader to communicate to the editor directly from the computer screen.

The Internet, which was developed in the United States in the early 1970's is the world's largest network of computers.

It is estimated that this network has about 40 million computers, with databases covering many different topics.

Originally the Internet was used by academics to exchange research material.

Most of this information was in a text format and required long cumbersome command to access.

This was the humble beginning of electronic mail (E-mail).

In the early 1990's, the Internet developed the ability to display pictures and sound on the portion

The difference between the two is that the WWW has forty million channels, known as "websites", which allow the surfer to control the programming.

The Internet with its unique features has become a very attractive medium for the exchange

telephone line and an Internet Service Provider.

The Modem is simply a device that allows your computer to interpret telephone signals creating the vital link to the Internet.

An Internet Service Provider, like *Africa Online*, allows the individual user access to international websites via a local call.

On the Internet one can discover websites dedicated to shopping, games, sports (Transworld.com), news (CNN.com), financial news (see Dow Jones and Heng Seng), chat sessions, commodity markets (Chicago Board of Trade), shipping (see Maersk.com), banking, research (NASA), education (Cambridge University), radio stations, horticulture (Holland Flower Market) and many more.

This project between *Africa Online* and *Coastweek* has provided the paper with an

international platform, joining newspapers like the *Wall Street Journal*, the *New York Times*, the *Daily Telegraph* and *CNN Interactive*.

When asked why he made the decision to go Internet, Mr. Shiraz D. Alibhai the Managing Director of *Coastweek* answered:

"The 21st Century has befallen us and we feel it is now time to take this opportunity to expose our cultures to the global community".

Coastweek can now publish using this inexpensive media and reach a wider readership quickly.

"This media certainly enhances our ability to distribute the paper to our international readers".

Don't Miss 'WEMA Centre' Play 'CHOKORA' At Loreto Convent

CHOKORA IS a term that has been coined to describe the art of scrambling through the rubbish bins for food.

It has consequently also become the name for street boys and girls.

The children of the Wema centre have put together the play CHOKORA that demonstrates the reasons that caused them to leave the home and go to the streets and their experience in the streets.

The play was first staged in Mombasa at the Loreto Convent school Mombasa two years ago and was a tremendous success.

It attracted a variety of audience from army officers, churches and religious organisations, business people, to students, and they all had a great un-forgotten time.

The Wema Centre children will

be staging another public performance at Loreto Convent school on the October 18th and 19th 1996 at 6.00pm with an extra show on Saturday afternoon at 3.00 pm.

In many ways, Chokora is for the Wema Children a therapeutic experience and for the audience emotionally packed, riveting, cracking revelations of the horrors of the street life.

Most of us see street children on the street and they are nothing but an irritation or even little criminals to be pushed aside.

I hope that after watching Chokora these children will become more like those in our own

homes, children who, given a chance are capable of loving and being loved, and of getting good grades in school and living a normal life. The most important thing to remember while watching this play, is that the actresses are not quite literate.

The play is therefore not based on script but on true life stories.

The abandonment by their fathers, the utter desparation experienced by their mothers, begging until they are breathless, and until they slowly adopt to street life.

They find themselves attracted to drugs, sniffing glue and pick-pocketing.

They become easy prey to sugar daddies who take advantage of their poverty offering them a few shillings and a ride in their big cars in exchange for some sex.

They have to pay dues to street gang leaders or else!

It's no wonder they find Mama Wema's approaches amusing.

They cannot believe that she actually thinks she can help them.

However, they soon realise that she is dead serious and she does not intend to give up trying.

The long and difficult process of change begins.

The play is very effectively punctuated with a song welcoming the new life.

*A rainbow shines in the sky.
A vision blinding the eye.*

They sing that they have a hope, that one day their dream will come true.

CHOKORA is an absolute must for anyone who wants a better country, and a better future or anyone who wishes to know more about street children.

'WEMA CENTRE' BASED IN LIKONI

Knowledge will bring understanding and change.

The Wema Centre is in Likoni Mombasa, and is currently housing fifty-seven children, of nine months to sixteen years of age.

The centre offers rehabilitation programme for street girls, which includes, education both at the centre and in the normal school system, vocational training such as tailoring, tie and dye and knitting, as well Christian counselling and sporting activities.

Although efforts are being made to make the Centre self sustaining, it will take a while before all the plans are in place.

For the time being therefore, the Centre has to depend on fund raising and donations from well wishers, and all donations are greatly appreciated and acknowledged.

He went on 'before liberalisation everyone looked upon government to set the standards for most professions.

But with reforms, the responsibility now falls upon the various professions and institutions concerned with service to wanainchi.

'As far as health care is concerned' he said, 'you do have an extreme from government to peddlers of drugs, unacceptable health clinics which spring up without anybody's license and so on, and set up their own standards.

From these two extremes' said the minister 'we want to take a standard bearer - an organisation which will give a direction to all of us and which government can adjust in relation to sharing the responsibility of providing health care in the country.

The Aga Khan Health Services because it likes it or not, finds itself at the head of standard setting.

So we would expect that this organisation from the service it gives to wanainchi has to take the responsibility for the setting of proper standards in health care services and the provision of proper education and even venturing into family health care'.

Multi-Million Doctors' Plaza

The Minister continued 'as I have already said, this is a major responsibility, but they are not on their own - for we expect collaboration between them and health care providers'.

Adding 'this is a tricky area because standards are supposed to be set by majority performance, but in such adverse situations as in Kenya you do have major variations and government will count on responsible organisations, like the ones I have just enumerated to do this.

We are busy empowering the people themselves to take greater responsibility for their health.

While we do this we count on partners like the Aga Khan Health

Services, church organisations and some of the major private institutions which are providing health care to our people.

The Minister continued 'now in a situation like this standards are likely to be compromised, so we will continue taking care of the policy, the direction and the infrastructure.

We shall continue consulting and sharing with other providers in the sector in order to make sure that all who are participating are finding their rightful position in the role they are supposed to play within that sector.'

Referring to the good relationship between his ministry and the Aga Khan Health Services the minister

declared 'let this collaboration continue, particularly in the liberalised situation such as we are in'.

Adding 'our main aim is good health care for our people, however' he noted 'a major impediment is education and also resources, otherwise we are on the right track'.

I congratulating the Aga Khan Hospitals in Nairobi and Mombasa for setting up Doctors' Plaza, the Minister revealed 'even the government has plans to set up such Plaza within its limited mandate and resources'.

He explained 'government hospitals which can raise money will be allowed to establish Plaza.

Maybe not so prestigious, but at least offices, or clinics, around government hospitals so that those doctors who are hard working and honest enough to do government work, can be provided with a place close to the hospital and to share within the hospital complex an Amenity Ward where they can admit private patients.

Added the Minister 'they will pay for the services rendered to their patients'.

He went on 'we are going to try this at Kenyatta Hospital, and I am sure that when we do the renovation of the Coast General Hospital very soon it will include not only good Amenity Wards, but also offices for doctors whom, as I said, quality to share in such programmes.

Not only doctors who are honest and hardworking, but also those who mind about the quality of health care and about their profession.

Those are the doctors who can take the lead in showing others that it is possible to have a partnership between private and public practice.'

Continuing he said 'we are moving in the direction where there will be two pharmacies in government hospitals - the usual one where government provides drugs at a very highly subsidised rate for a small fee paid to government, which is called cost sharing, and another pharmacy within the same complex or nearby where drugs can be bought.

EXHORBITANT DRUG PRICES

Prices will be fixed at cost with perhaps a small percentage added for management costs, or providing services.

Said the minister 'the price of drugs is still exorbitant, but I know that if you move quickly in setting up such pharmacies somewhere close to hospitals run by responsible people as Aga Khan Health Services have done, government and others who are major players in this sector they are the ones who are going to set the standards.

Soon when there are enough drugs, we are going to allow the public to buy them from these pharmacies, even if those purchasing them have not been patients in the hospital to which such pharmacies are attached, so long as the prescription has been given by a proper doctor'.

In a vote of thanks to the Minister, Abdull Samji, Chairman of the Board of Governors said 'while the Aga Khan services network do realise that the government in Kenya, as in any developing country, cannot possibly provide all the health care to all wanainchi.

Due to constraints in finance, manpower and technical resources

we are happy to supplement government's effort in preventive and curative medical.

Whilst we continue to expand and improve our services, we are also cognizant of the fact that a lot still remains to be done'.

He not only thanked the Minister for officially opening the Doctor's Plaza, but all those concerned for their support'.

The Master of Ceremonies was Dr. Joseph Okanga, a member of the board of director of the Aga Khan Health Services, Kenya.

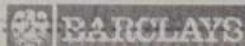

WORLD TOURISM FESTIVAL

Thousands Look On And Cheer As Town Hosts A 'Street Parade'

Emotional Farewell For World Famous 'Gurkha' Regiment ...

THE LAST public performance of the Scottish Pipes and Drums Band of the world famous Royal Gurkha Regiments on the Kenya Coast was staged to an emotional audience last week at the 50-year old Nyali Beach Hotel, Mombasa.

The third RGR battalion, to which the Band belongs has been disbanded and its members are being amalgamated with the first and the second battalions bringing to an end of the 24-men band.

The band leader Major Gerard Hughes told hundreds of Mombasa residents and hotel guests that the band that first came to Kenya late 1994 and stationed in Nyanyuki together with the British Army will no longer stage public performance again.

Major Hughes is being posted to the British High Commission in Kathmandu, Nepal as the Military Attach, seven members of the band join the first battalion of the RGR in the United Kingdom, 16 to the second battalion, while one will be pensioned.

The band that gave an electrifying performance at the Nyali Beach Hotel's Parrot's Beach Restaurant will before leaving the country stage last shows for ABN, AMRO Bank in Nairobi, the Asian Foundation, an Orphanage in Nairobi, the Kahawa barracks and several Nairobi Hotels before leaving for the UK.

A pact was then declared, Nepal was never seized or colonised and it granted permission to its citizens to serve in the British Army.

The name Gurkha was given to the soldiers recruited from

'OPERATION BEACH CLEAN-UP' 1996

Ten Tonnes Of Garbage - Including Plastic Containers, Cigarette Butts, Glass Bottles, Hypodermic Syringes, Rubber Flip-flops And 'Unidentified Underwear' - All Collected In 2,000 Bags Between Watamu And Shimoni

MANY BEACH Boys and hotel staff were among the 1884 participants in this year's *International Coastal Clean-Up* with 2,000 bags (10 tonnes) of garbage being collected between Watamu and Shimoni.

It was gigantic effort compared to last year when 774 volunteers collected 4.2 tonnes from Malindi to Diani.

In 1995, volunteers from over seventy countries were involved in this annual event bringing this clean-up exercise to one of the largest 'voluntary' efforts on environmental issues.

Others involved in the Coast Clean-Up were the *Kenya Wildlife Service*, schools, *Wildlife Clubs of Kenya*, tourists and other environmentalists.

The aim is to create awareness about the states of the oceans and beaches.

It is co-ordinated by the *Centre for Marine Conservation, Washington D. C. USA*, and operates under a network of country-based co-ordinators who, in Kenya, is *Dr. Rene Haller*, Managing Director, Baobab Farm.

Twenty co-ordinators were responsible for specific areas along the Kenya coast, chairman of the Co-ordinating Committee being *David Olendo*, who is the Environmental Education Officer, Baobab Trust.

The inorganic garbage collected was recorded by each team and compiled by Baobab Trust for use by the Centre for Marine Conservation.

It is an international study to find solutions to ending the serious marine debris problems facing all coastlines and waterways worldwide.

Along the debris collected were lots of plastic containers, cigarette butts, flip-flops, syringes, glass bottles (some broken and dangerous for those walking on the beach) also some underwear which could not be identified as 'His' or 'Hers'. While a dead juvenile turtle was found on Nyali Beach.

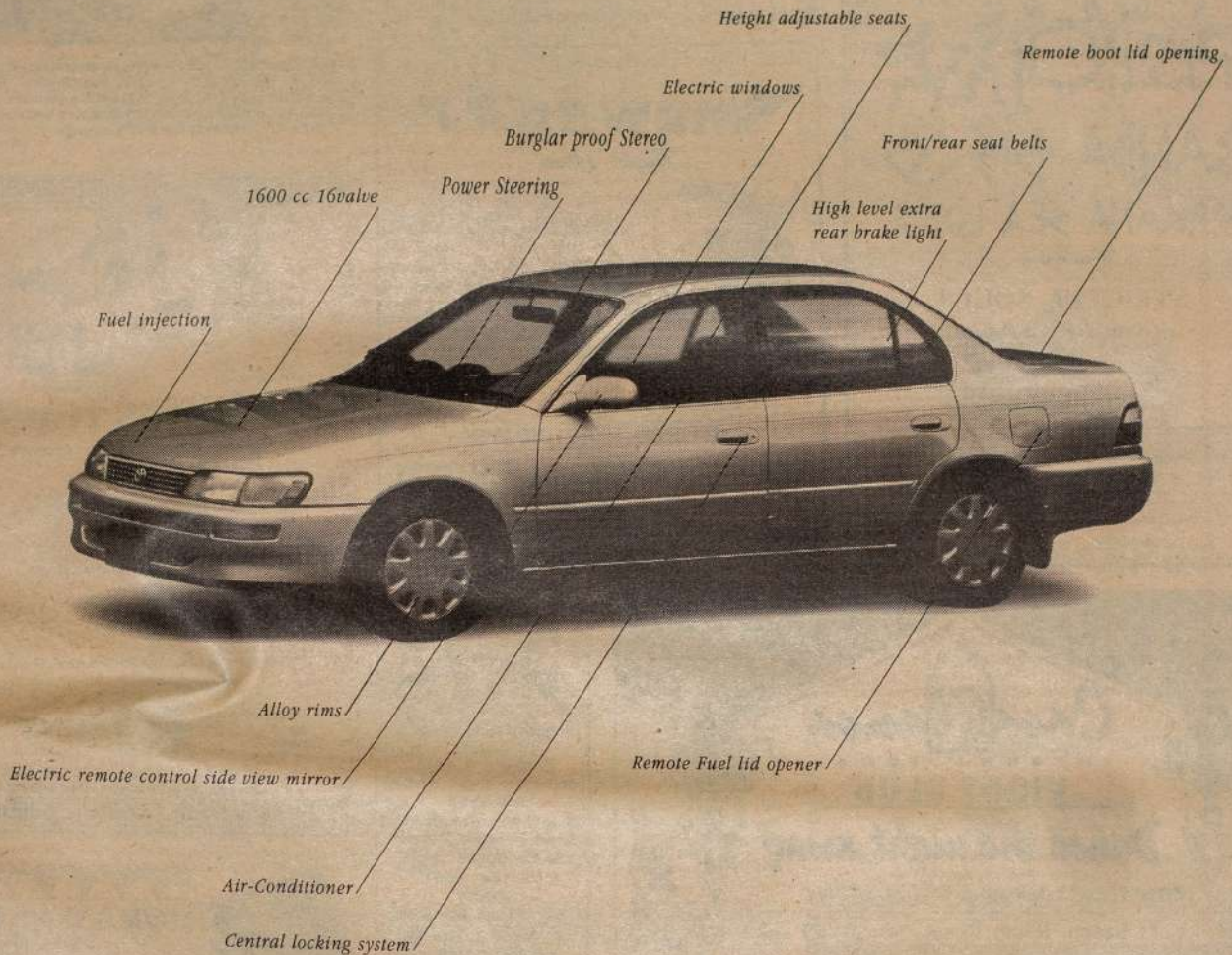

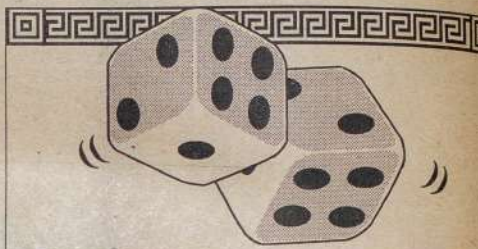

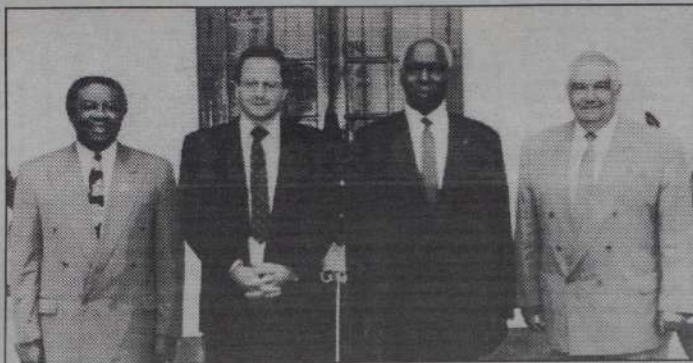

Dieses Symbol der Freundschaft wird nur an wenige besonders geschätzte Gönner verliehen und ist mit einem Schild mit einer persönlichen Widmung versehen.

Strecker betont, daß die Spendengelder zu 100 Prozent den Bedürftigen zugute kommen und keine Mark für unnötige Verwaltung verschwendet wird. Alle Ausgaben werden von den zuständigen Behörden oder vom Deutschen Konsulat quittiert.

Das Flugticket und den Aufenthalt bezahlt Strecker aus eigener Tasche, damit jeder gesammelte Pfennig für die Hilfsprojekte zur Verfügung steht.

'BOMBOLULU' IST EINEN BESUCH WERT !

DIE BOMBOLULU-Werkstätten für Behinderte wurden 1969 gegründet und werden derzeit von der "Vereinigung der Körperbehinderten von Kenia" (Association for the Physically Disabled of Kenya - APDK) geleitet.

Geschäftsführer ist ein deutscher Experte, der von der "Christoffel Blindenmission" in Deutschland entsandt ist.

Das Projekt ist die größte Rehabilitationseinrichtung in Kenia und beschäftigt über 260 körperbehinderte, blinde und taubstumme Frauen und Männer in der Herstellung von afrikanischem Kunsthandwerk.

In einem geräumigen Verkaufsraum können Besucher eine große Auswahl an Schmuck, handgedruckter Kleidung, Schnitzereien, Specksteinfiguren und Lederwaren zu Fabrikpreisen einkaufen.

Über 1000 verschiedene Schmuckdesigns werden von geschickten Arbeitern aus Messing, Kupfer, Holz, antiken Münzen, geschnitztem Bein, Bananenfasern, Samen und Halbedelsteinen kunstvoll gefertigt.

Vergoldete und versilberte

Schmuckstücke sind besonders beliebt. Rund 60 Prozent der Produktion wird in 20 Länder exportiert.

Mit finanzieller Hilfe von "Brot für die Welt" wurde 1987 eine Schneiderwerkstätte erbaut, in der Kleidungsstücke aus handgedruckten kenianischen Baumwollstoffen hergestellt werden.

In verschiedenen Touristenhotels entlang der kenianischen Küste werden regelmäßig "Bombolulu" Modeschauen vorgeführt.

In einer angegliederten Ausbildungswerkstätte, die von der "Christoffel Blindenmission" finanziert wird, werden jährlich zwölf Behinderte zu Schneidern ausgebildet und erhalten anschließend eine Nähmaschine und Startkapital, um sich selbstständig zu machen.

Um das Projekt für Besucher noch interessanter zu gestalten, wurde 1994 ein Kulturzentrum eröffnet, das aus sechs traditionellen afrikanischen Dorfgemeinschaften verschiedener kenianischer

Stämme besteht.

Angehörige der jeweiligen Stämme führen traditionelles Kunsthandwerk, Hausarbeiten und landwirtschaftliche Aktivitäten vor.

Neben einer grasbedeckten Arena befindet sich das "Ziga Restaurant", das europäische und afrikanische Gerichte sehr preisgünstig anbietet. Während dem Essen unterhalten traditionelle Musikanten die Gäste.

"Bombolulu" ist das erfolgreichste Rehabilitationsprojekt in Kenia, das Schwerbehinderten Ausbildung und Arbeitsplätze

bietet. Für viele Behinderte ist das Projekt die einzige Alternative zum Betteln in den Straßen von Mombasa.

Die Arbeiter erhalten monatliche Löhne, die dem Lohnniveau im privaten Sektor gleichgestellt sind.

Zusätzlich stellt das Projekt kostenlose Wohnräume, medizinische Versorgung und Zuschüsse für Schulgelder für

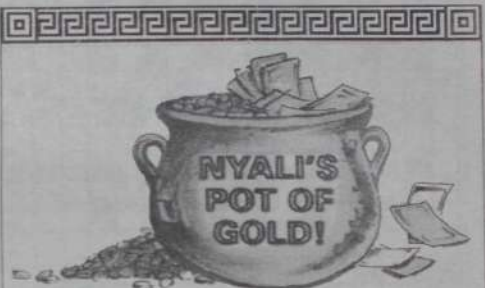

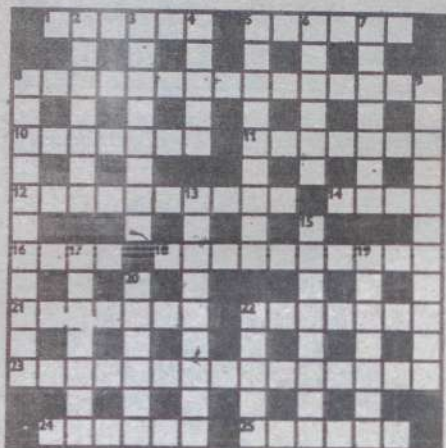

The sponsors are each buying a Topper in exchange for the sail carrying their company logo and the boat being named either after the Company, their major product or some other favoured name.

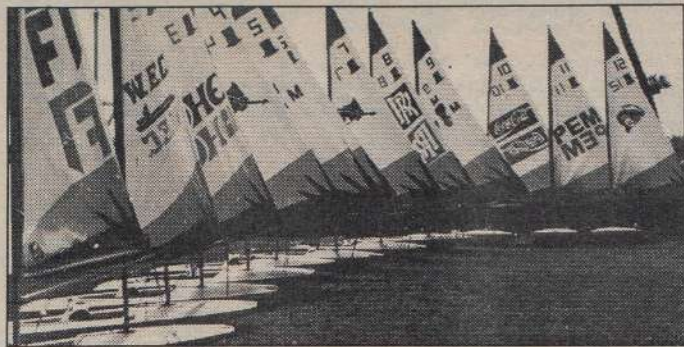

As this happened, Kachumbari turned the steering wheel as well and she rammed into the side of a well buttressed 'matatu'.

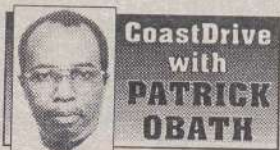
The driver, 'manamba' and passengers got out and an interesting split of sides emerged.

What intrigued me after some time was that the driver of the car in front appeared to be very erratic in the way he drove.

One minute he would be tearing away at speed and the next he would be slowing right down and proceeding at snails pace on the left hand of the dual carriageway.

I looked closer to try and work out what he was doing and every time he was speeding, he had one hand on the seat next to him and every time he slowed down he had both hands on the steering wheel but his eyes kept darting to the front passenger seat.

The gentlemen was not involved in anything lewd.

He was simply reading his newspaper whilst driving.

He would turn the pages over as he drove and then slow down to quickly dread the captions and headlines on his favourite pages.

A lot of driver do this.

Some even go to the extent of playing safe by holding the

newspaper on the steering wheel and reading it in slow traffic.

This risk can back fire if conditions suddenly change on the road in front and around.

One has to continuously scan the driving radius, which varies with the speed and traffic density.

This allows one to make a rational and informed decisions on what ones next course of action on the road should be.

But when one lets distractions come in then the amount of scanning and thinking about driving is reduced as ones grey matter responds to too many stimuli at the same time.

Things such as loud music, animated conversations or arguments, changing light conditions, loose objects in the car and so forth are distractions and one should avoid allowing them into the car.

As Kachumbari says, preparation and concentration are part of the recipe of defensive driving.

Partners Can Take Their Courage in Both Hands

COURAGE IS one of the most important qualities of a successful Bridge player.

To have courage is essential in those situations where one has to make a bid or play which is out of the ordinary.

The following hand will show you courage in action.

He assumed his partner would bid 'Four Spades' if he held Spade Ace, so it was highly probable that card was missing.

Hence, North must be expecting to lose one trick in Spades so presumably thinks he can make the rest.

As South had a Spade void, Club king and six Hearts, all of which could not be relied upon, he decided to take the plunge.

A brave decision and it was well rewarded when West took Spade Ace at Trick One. South had a simple task now.

He 'ruffed', drew Trumps and could deal with all his Club losers, but one and pitching two on Spade King and Spade Queen.

If West leads a trump, South needs to be careful. First he wins and cashed Club Ace. Then he 'ruffs' three Spades in hand and three Clubs in Dummy. A fourth Spade 'ruff' enables him to draw the last Trump, cash Club King and take Diamond Ace and King for the last two tricks.

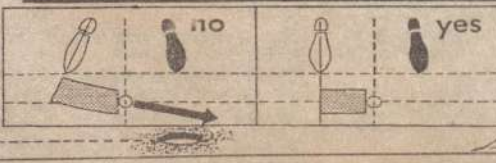
