



We are busy empowering the people themselves to take greater responsibility for their health.







Ten Tonnes Of Garbage - Including Plastic Containers, Cigarette Butts, Glass Bottles, Hypodermic Syringes, Rubber Flip-flops And 'Unidentified Underwear' - All Collected In 2,000 Bags Between Watamu And Shimoni

MANY BEACH Boys and hotel staff were among the 1884 participants in this year's International Coastal Clean-Up with 2,000 bags (10 tonnes) of garbage being collected between Watamu and Shimoni.

It was gigantic effort compared to last year when 774 volunteers collected 4.2 tonnes from Malindi to Diani.
