Tell Kenyans Truth About Media Focus

APPEAL TO AMBASSADORS AND ENVOYS

AN APPEAL to Kenya's Ambassadors and High Commissioners abroad, described as the 'main players in the tourism industry' to provide a feedback on how Kenya is portrayed in the media where they work, was made by the National and Coast Chairman of the Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers' and Caterers', Joshua Mwendwa.

About 80 of them attending their 11th Biennial Meeting on the South Coast were invited to a cocktail party hosted by the tourism trade at Leopard beach hotel where they had the opportunity of meeting those involved in the development of tourism at the Coast.

For some time the industry has felt that adverse reports in the foreign press, such as the 'Ebola Scare' which resulted in many holiday bookings being cancelled from Italy and Germany, might have been averted had Government been made aware of such reports immediately.

It could have quickly assured tourists that there had been no recorded case of Ebola here.

Addressing them the KAHC chairman also spoke of the 'urgent need to have an effective marketing

organisation - one that will react immediately if there is need, which will ensure adequate representation in the market place and which will work with you, and through you, on a continuous basis.

It would also lobby for many more international conference and meetings to be held in Kenya.

There was also need for more advertising to promote Kenya's tourist attractions and a great need to organise image improving activities that will attract world attention, as well as to work with our neighbours in the

ONE DAY we were called to morning coffee by our neighbour who had just come from England. The sleek object she brought to the table was a beautiful kettle which would grace the occasion. How we wished to own such a piece. and **Iftekhhar** says they will gladly accept same, adding: "Look at this specially prepared gift package containing blender, hand-held beater and (meat) mincer". Other items we were shown include those for chips addicts. You only need to go as far as your own kitchen if you buy from **Orchard Plaza** a small, compact, safe deep fryer by either *Phillips* or *Moulinex*. Super 'La Terrazza Restaurant' Offers Delicious Italian Cuisine

WHILE BARBECUES usually take place in the evening, **La Terrazza Restaurant** (near *Oceanic Hotel*) from which is a panoramic view of the Indian Ocean and ships entering *Kilindini Harbour*, finds that its lunchtime BBQ is amazingly successful. It is quick, succulent and tasty especially geared to meet the needs of those working on Mombasa Island for, according to an old proverb 'as a man eats so he works!'. It is also attracting many tourists while taking a break in a day's *City Tour* who find that apart from its breathtaking view it is a very cool place to be. An excellent repast is offered - chargrilled meats and seafood ranging from a seafood platter to game meat (which can include Thomson's Gazelle); Chicken *Tika*; fish and lamb kebabs. There are also choice dishes for vegetarians as well as a comprehensive Salad Table with a variety of condiments. All meat is first marinated to make it totally tender and afterwards is not over grilled to render it flavourless. The *Chicken Tika* (a favourite at the Coast) receives special attention. It is first marinated for at least six hours. The lunchtime BBQ takes place daily, with the exception of Saturdays, from 12.30 to 2.00 p.m. and the restaurant has its own well stocked Cocktail Bar. Meanwhile, just introduced on Sunday evenings is a 'Giant Pizza Special' with a 30 per cent more topping being added for

the same price. It is great value for money! The restaurant has its own Italian style wooden oven which is lit early morning so it can reach the required temperature before cooking commences. The result is that the pastry is crisp and not soggy. **La Terrazza** pizzas are very Italian - the country in which they originated to become internationally popular. There is a choice of seven different fillings. They include three specially created for vegetarians, the most recent being *Boscicola*. It has *Eldoret* mushrooms, mozzarella cheese, garlic, scented with oregano and topped with freshly sliced tomatoes. The *Giant Pizza Special* is available between 7.30 p.m. to 11 p.m. on Sunday evenings and a take-away service is also offered. It is becoming increasingly popular with those who like visiting Mombasa's sea front to enjoy the cool sea breeze.

a balloon when punctured. Among the coffee served is *Espresso* and *Cappuccino*. A new and very versatile band - the 'Sharper Sound' now entertains there on Saturday evenings. **PIERO LUNGHI** **La Terrazza** has a first class Italian Executive Chef, **Piero Lungchi**, with over twenty years experience in the hotel and catering industry which has included top hotels in Milan, Florida and the Caribbean. **La Terrazza Restaurant** will be closed for Saturday lunches from August 19 until further notice.



In the evenings, with the exception of Sunday, the restaurant offers an 82-item a la carte menu of international cuisine with particular emphasis on Italian fare and seafood. Its home-made pasta has to be tasted to be believed. It is ambrosial! Diners are given a welcome drink and some tasty *Antipasto* (bitings) with a different variety each day, while served on the table is hot 'Focaccia' - puffy Italian bread which deflates like

'KWALE DISTRICT EYE CENTRE' AIMS AT EDUCATING PUBLIC ON NEW TREATMENT

KWALE DISTRICT Eye Centre continues to bring affordable Eye Care to the people of Kwale District, through the assistance, co-operation and understanding of those involved in community development and well being.

To further this, Kwale District recently invited the District Social Development Officers and the Port Reitz Clinical Field Officers to visit the Eye Centre and understand better the need to educate and treat persons with eye difficulties.

In her address of welcome, Dr. Helen Roberts, Othomologist, outlined the work of the Centre and how it had been built and developed thanks to the support and interest by the District Administration and people of Kwale.

Mr. Philip Ouma, Community Rehabilitation Field Worker, with the Eye Centre, explained his role of educating and encouraging the need for eye care and how screening to detect eye problems is undertaken.

Cataract is by far the most common cause of visual disability in the area.

A further 30 per cent of patients only require a pair of spectacles to reduce or alleviate their visual disability.

"We are not dealing with a disease that is difficult to treat" stressed Philip Ouma, "rather one that needs understanding and the correct treatment and care".

Mr. George Ndirangu, District Social Development Officer, who has continually worked to further the efforts of the Eye Centre, welcomed this opportunity to exchange ideas.

His group of divisional and locational Development Officers have long expressed the need for the help and care of the sight impaired persons of the area.

Their appreciation of the efforts and work of the Eye Centre were most evident.

The Port Reitz Polio Clinic, with Administrator, Ms. Beata Mkok, are being care and help to all physically impaired persons.

Mr. John Mwakuwanda coordinates the field and rehabilitation work on behalf of Port Reitz.

He has been advocating the need for a Community Based rehabilitation Programme in Kwale District.

He praised the Kwale District Eye Centre for their initiative in the development of such a programme.

The Kwale Family Life Training Centre was represented by Mrs. Mwanalima Mwangare, who also welcomed the efforts of the Eye Centre.

She said the Family Life Training mobil workers would support and

assist the work of improving eye care in the District.

Mr. Bakari Mwadama, Vice-Chairman of the Kwale District Eye Centre Communittee, lead a very fruitful discussion and exchange of ideas with all present.

The continual need to develop efforts to promote and improved eye care in the area was the opinion of all.

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Mombasa Mayor Mwidani Believes Council Is Improving And Extending Its Efficient Services

HIGHLIGHTS of a speech by Mombasa Mayor Coun. A.S. Mwidani during the Council's Annual General Meeting.

THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL of Mombasa being a service oriented organisation, has continued to render improved and efficient services to the people.

This was as a result of the Council

acquiring increased necessary tools, equipment and machinery.

The tools acquired, most of them went to the **Cleansing Section** where I am glad to say there has been a great improvement in refuse collection, although more effort is required.

In the year under review the Council also managed to increase the fleet of supervision cars.

One for the **Security Section** which was bought at a cost of Kshs. 800,000/-.

The Council is also in the process of purchasing an administration vehicle for the fire brigade section at a cost of Kshs. 1.4 million.

In an effort to offer improved services to the people of **Kisauini** and **Likoni**, and having in mind that Mombasa shall soon be a city, the Council will be called upon to consider putting up Fire-Sub-Stations in these two suburbs.

Among other projects which the Council has undertaken in the year under review is the repairing of **Changamwe** houses at a cost of Kshs. 2.5 million.

The **Mwidani Nursery School** Social Hall had electricity installation at a cost of Kshs. 1.2 million.

I wish also to mention and recognise the Council's efforts in completing the construction of **Kwa Holoa Primary School** in Changamwe at a cost of Kshs. 2.3 million.

Longo Primary School in Likoni is also a project worth mentioning.

This project was completed at a cost of Kshs. 2.5 million.

The Cadastral Survey in **Mikindani, Miritini and Chaani** at a cost of about Kshs. four million is half-way complete.

It is hoped that the remaining work shall be completed in the current financial year to enable the people be issued with Title Deeds.

NATIONAL SOCIAL SECURITY FUND WILL HELP ON ACCOMODATION

Installation of street lights in **Mikindani** has been given priority at a cost of Kshs. 5 million.

Other areas where street lights were given priority are: **Nyali, Digo Road and Moi Avenue**.

The road from **Likoni** to **Shika-Adabu** was also given priority in putting up street lights at a cost of Kshs. 2 million.

The Council, being so much concerned with the plight of its residents, has entered into a joint venture of a housing project with the **Coast Development Authority (CDA)**.

Houses shall be built at **Tudor, Mzi-lima and Shika-Adabu** through funding by the **National Social Security Fund**.

The plans for this project are at an advanced stage.

The Council is also undertaking the renovation of the **Khaderboy Clinic** and I am glad to announce that the Tender has already been awarded.

Shikaadabu Clinic will soon be opened to the public as the work of installing electricity is at an advanced stage.

Total cost being Kshs. three million.

Repairing of **Mikindani Road** and **Chaani Road** have had tenders received for the 1995-96 and is awaiting Ministerial approval for the utilisation of **Services Charge Funds**.

Khadija Estate roads in **Kisauini** are also earmarked for the 1995-96 budget and tenders have been received.

We shall also repair **Chief Ali Bin Neaman road** at a cost of Kshs. 4.9 million.

The Tender for this road has already been awarded.

The road leading to **Mewa Clinic** in **Majengo** will also be done in this Financial year.

The total cost for the above road works is expected to be Kshs. 65 million.

Other projects to be taken care of will include: repair of four (4)

public conveniences at a cost of Kshs. 2.7 million, **Jomvu Kuu Clinic** at a cost of Kshs. 238,000/-, **Miritini Health Centre** at a cost of Kshs. 153,000/- and **Vyemani Primary School** at a cost of Shs. 3,000/-.

I appeal to all the leaders to come out and support the Council in providing for our children's future, by assisting in the improvement of the standard of education in Mombasa.

The **Aga Khan Foundation** has also come forward to assist improve education standard in the Municipality and has started a special project in which a director has already been appointed.

Eight project supervisors under the same **Aga Khan Foundation Fund** will soon be employed by the Council.

My Council has plans to 'go computer' and all matters pertaining to supplies and stores will be computerised.

It is hoped that if the plan succeeds, all Council departments shall be computerised.

Some officers have undergone the necessary training and it is hoped that many more will be trained.

Computerisation enhances efficiency without comprising on staff establishment; that is, no redundancy.

We have resolved to buy two tractor trailers to strengthen the **Cleansing Section**.

I am therefore appealing to the Council to consider buying more tractor trailers instead of tippers as the tractor trailers can easily pass through narrow streets like those in the Old Town.

We should also make a provision for additional ambulances and a hearse.

This year the Council has managed to pay the workers arrears to the tune of 42 million shillings.

On Wednesday, the Council paid arrears to the tune of Kshs. 21 million.

The first instalment having been paid in the month of April.

I am glad to note that the Municipal Council of Mombasa is the only local authority that has so far managed to pay a reasonable amount of these arrears to its workers.

I wish, therefore, to appeal for increased productivity amongst the Council employees.

Our markets have continued to render good services to the residents of this town and all efforts are being made to make these Council institutions more viable.

RATE FUND INCREASES

Renovations have been carried out the **Mackinnon Market** has been renovated at a cost of Shs. 2.5 million.

The year under review had quite a number of roads being rehabilitated through a contract given to Messrs. S.S. Mehta and Sons Limited at a cost of 44.5 million.

In the 1994-95 financial year, the council collected Kshs. 265,000,000/= in the **General Rate Fund**.

There was an increase of Kshs. 51,000,000/= compared to the previous year which Kshs. 214,000,000/= was collected.

Also in the **Service Charge** account the Council collected shs. 73 million.

Here there was an increase of Kshs. 10 million compared to the shs. 62 million which was collected during the previous financial year.

The Council has taken stiff measures to control expenditure

and the Town Treasurer is called upon to comply with the Statutory Financial Regulations.

Service Charge money should not be used without prior approval by the Minister and also all internal and external auditors' reports should be brought before the relevant committee for deliberation.

HAWKERS' 'BAD IMAGE'

Illegal hawking has continued to cause problems within the major roads of the town, but all efforts are being made by the Council to curb this menace.

I wish to assure legal hawkers in our markets that we shall continue protecting them.

I wish to recognise the cooperation that we have continued to receive from the Provincial Administration and the Police whenever we were carrying out

our normal operations.

The **Inspectorate Section** has continued to do a good job and I appeal to them to continue to do the same way in order to get rid of illegal hawkers who have often given the town a bad image.

I wish to congratulate the Town Clerk, **Mr. Muthoni Angaine**, who took over two years ago from **Mr. David Randu** who preceded on leave pending retirement.

Mr. Angaine is a seasoned, well-trained and experienced administrator, with 20 years in public service and a **Master's Degree in Management and Administration**.

Finally, and of paramount importance, I must appeal to all workers, regardless of their positions, to be loyal and respectful to the **KANU Government** which was democratically mandated by the Kenyan people to govern.

This loyalty, therefore, is a must

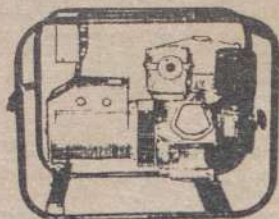

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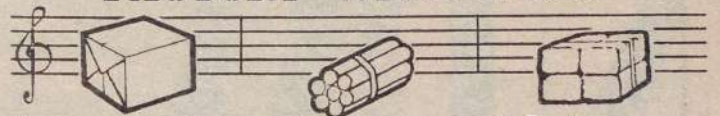

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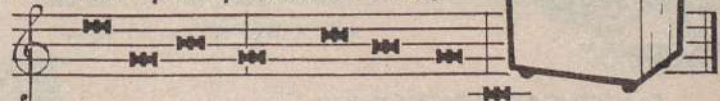
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Envoys Urged To Promote Tour Industry

promotion of regional tourism. He also sought the help of Ambassadors/High Commissioners by suggesting how major suppliers might increase the number of tourists they send here, as well as to what Kenya should focus on in promotional campaigns.

He also sought their help in improving Kenya's image abroad, as well as advising of areas about to become tourist supply sources of the future so that Kenya can establish good footholds there.

Referring to the fact that tourism can provide the most effective way of promoting overall economic growth and development, the KAHC chairman said it is no accident that when tourism booms, other sectors likewise boom, as is happening in the Asia Pacific region.

He declared we can do similarly in Kenya.

However, to promote tourism effectively and successfully, we need to address matters of concern to tourists.

These include security (and the need to have a specialised tourist police unit) and of giving good value for money.

But he warned without the provision of a high standard of goods and services we cannot deliver value for money and so cannot be competitive.

In many instances said the KAHC chairman 'the tourism industry has been let down by a poor infrastructure insufficient water and power.

Improvements are urgently required.'

He went on 'Tourism is an industry with a great potential, but it has been going through a period of serious strain since 1991.

While many of the factors which led to a decline in tourism here have now subsided, a few remain.

These he cited as being:-
• The generation of massive negative publicity attributed to Kenya or the region around us;

• Concern about security arising from incidents involving tourists;

• The appreciation of the Kenya shilling.

This following a rapid depreciation had hurt the industry.

This was because as the shilling appreciated the costs of essential

services did not fall or reduced marginally.

As a result, visits to Kenya became expensive compared to competing destinations.

Another factor was 'competition from other destinations'.

Declared the KAHC chairman 'we need to take measures to reverse the trend. It is necessary for us to avoid creating conditions that generate negative publicity'.

He went on 'to succeed in our task of attracting more investors we need:-
• To make it easy and convenient for tourists to come to Kenya. He

told the Ambassadors/High Commissioners present 'you can assist by issuing visas quickly also by giving travel information promptly.

• We need knowledgeable and pleasant personnel in your missions abroad;

• We also need convenient, quick and friendly services at our airports and other points of entry and exit.

We in the industry must provide the very best goods and services to our tourists.'

Speaking on behalf of the Ambassadors, Kenya's Permanent representative to the United Nations based in New York, Ambassador Francis Muthaura, told Kenyans to be proud of the product they have and assured the tourist trade of their support.

DIE ARCHITEKTUR in der Altstadt vor den 1930er Jahren wird am besten als eine Mischung verschiedener traditioneller Baustile beschrieben.

Diese setzen sich zusammen aus Sualheil-Elementen, seit langem an der Küste, vor allem, in Lamu verwendet, starkem portugiesischem Einfluß aus der portugiesischen Kolonie des neunzehnten Jahrhunderts (hauptsächlich via Sansibar) und aus dem Kokorwa-Stil, den die Briten ab 1890 einführen.

Zwar gibt es in Mombasa kein einziges traditionelles Steinhaus im Lamusti aus dem 18. Jahrhundert, doch findet man gewisse Merkmale dieser Tradition überall in der Altstadt.

Rechtwinkliche, auf denen die Maki oder Wellblech gedeckten Küche eingerichtet wurde, lange schmale Zimmer, alles mit dem nächsten verbunden; viereckige Balkenbänke, nie länger als ein Meter, da sie die schwere Last einer dicken Korallen- und Gipschicht zu tragen waren; kunstvoll geschnitzte Türen, flankiert von massiven Säulen, genannt Baraza.

Sualheilstil sind auch die ebenerdigen Häuser, aus Lehm, Mangrovenholz und Korallensteinen (gewöhnlich mit Eisen verbunden), mit Maki Wellblech überdacht.

Und noch immer vorherrschend in der Altstadt wie auch in den Dörfern, und man sieht gelegentlich in den Straßen, eingeklemmt zwischen modernen, mehrstöckigen Gebäuden, als hätten sie sich vor ihren erwachsenen Nachbarn schämt ducken.

Ab dem 19. Jahrhundert sind indische Geschäfts- und die großen 2- und 3-stöckigen Häuser entlang den Hauptstraßen der Altstadt in Kuu und Mbarak Hinawy zu sehen.

Diese Gebäude sind klassisch, die Fassaden nur durch Fensterreihen mindestens ein imposantes Element.

Die nächste Bauphase setzte in den 1890er Jahren ein mit der römischen Verwaltung und ihrem römischen Bausystem. Wohnhäusern, Läden und Geschäften.

Man verwendete gute Ziegelsteine und Balkone, ausgediente Eisenbahnschienen als Decken- und Stützpfiler.

Die Tradition in der Kolonialzeit war es, Häuser mit langen, offenen Veranden und Balkonen zu bauen.

Der Name Jaffer Dewji bezeichnet den Parfümladen von Yusuf A. Jaffer & Co., der sich rühmt, die besten alkoholfreien Parfüme in Mombasa anzubieten.

Das Geschäft wurde 1850 vom Großvater der derzeitigen Inhaber gegründet.

Im weißen Haus links von Jaffer Dewji befand sich früher die Societa Coloniale Italiana, deren Manager 1905 als italienischer Konsul amtierte.
