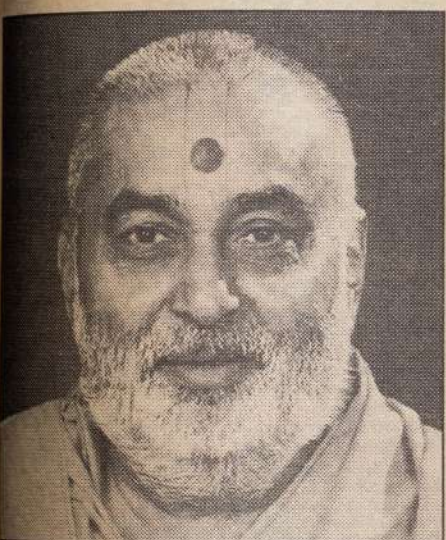

To get there you go past the railway station, turn left; after Shoppers' Mart you turn right, carry on along this road till the second road leading off to your left.

The showroom is the basement - but it was surprisingly cool, and we learn this was so because of the almost invisible ventilation outlets.

Although full of furniture it is not cramped, for the area is 5,000 square feet.

## You Can't Go Wrong By Visiting And Purchasing Items From Super-Value 'Furniturama' Along Baringo Road ...

Much of the furniture is imported from Italy.

This is unique and delightful. Although large and spacious there are no scratches on the pieces because they travel as 'Knock Down Kits' and are assembled here.

A typical Italian bedroom suite

would consist of double bed, (side tables extending from headboard), wardrobe, dressing table and small corner cupboard.

Naturally the wardrobe and dressing tables have mirrors, but the theme is often carried through to the headboard.

Also sold in suites are real leather sofa+plus+two+chairs with buttoned backs.

We found these ideal for Mombasa because the leather cannot possibly absorb the dust flying round.

There are other more reasonably

priced sofa sets in upholstery from delicate pink to dark shades.

Also the wood in some of these



is carved.

There is variety indeed to choose from but if you want a new three-piece suite (sofa-set) to match

existing decor, all you have to do is go and select from the rolls of furnishing material.

Customers for the complete roomfuls are usually soon-to-be-marrieds, individuals who are building a new house, or those carrying out major renovations and colour-scheme changes.

We then moved to the 'dining area' of the showroom.

Here you can choose dining tables oval-shaped, octagonal, or round with revolving centre.

Chairs were assorted but our favourites were those with high ornate wooden backs with central fabric panel.

The most eye-catching coffee tables are undoubtedly the metal and thick glass topped combination.

The glass is slightly tinted and has imprints of Arab coffee pot.

Metal appears to be quite a theme and you can buy individual beds (many single, few double) in brass, black or white.

While still on beds, you should note that 'Furniturama', is an appointed dealer for Slumberland Mattresses.

These include the latest 'posture springing' type.

'Furniturama', has a lot of individual pieces too.

For example, you might like to own a single rocking chair (now

coming back in fashion following a complete turn-around from grandmother's time).

Both imported bentwood or locally manufactured ones are available.

Patios are not forgotten by 'Furniturama', and there are Rattan chairs and tables for that area.

For little girls and boys there are study desks, in pink and blue respectively.

Very practical was a dark-surfaced dressing table which is completely resistant to cosmetics, spirits in perfumes or any sprays.

This had a matching chair (as opposed to stool) with an X-shaped back-cum-rear legs.

The wall-units may be tiny to support TV and Video only right up to the 6 ft. wide ones with sliding glass doors, up above for ornaments.

Recently added to 'Furniturama',s household furniture are imported desks and swivel chairs.

This latter chair can be tilted if you wish, or the mechanism can be locked to stabilize if you don't want to tilt!

They are raised and lowered by 'gas-lift' which we learnt was rather on a shock-absorber principle.

Again, some of these office chairs are in genuine leather, others in fabric but all have several feet with casters.

It goes without saying that desks these days include computer and other purpose-constructed ones.

So, for complete furnishing or odd quality pieces, you can't go wrong by visiting and purchasing from 'Furniturama', Baringo Road.

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# 'Food For Hungry' Campaign Plans To Extend Operations To Mombasa Area

'FOOD FOR THE Hungry' which has been operating in Kenya since 1976 plans to extend its Loan Programme 'Faulu' to Mombasa probably by next year.

This was revealed by 'FHI' Country Director for Kenya, Mr. Carol Winnings, during an interview at Jadini Beach Hotel where a FHI International Management Conference was taking place between September 5 - 20.

During the first week it brought together Country Directors from eighteen countries of the world - from Asia, Latin America and Africa - to discuss policy matters, also development and relief activities.

They were joined for the second week by personnel from FHI's Support Entity offices in Japan, Korea, USA, UK, Canada and Switzerland.

Discussions ranged from budgetary matters to how partner entities should go about trying to raise funds for FHI's field work.

There were some sixty participants including the FHI, President, Tetsunao Yamamori.

The 'Food for the Hungry' Loan programme 'Faulu' is to help poor people who have already started a small scale business at grass roots level - like selling eggs to improve their turnover which, in turn, will enable their families to enjoy a better standard of living and send their children to school.

It also eases the street children problem.

It was a very intensive two week conference and to give them a break Alliance Hotels staged a special dinner for them in its Jambo Village with Kenyan food and entertainment.

The village, set in a forest with banda style dining areas, has a very African ambience.

Colourfully attired Maasai lined the pathway presenting each with a chilled madafu to drink as they arrived.

The conference group was not only welcomed by the General Manager, Jadini Beach Hotel, Marc Lawson, who wished their deliberations every success, but traditionally in song and dance by the Maasai which included some Njinsky-style jumping.

When invited to join them none of the conference participants were brave enough to do so!

There was more exotic African entertainment by the Rumba dancers and musicians, with some guests joining them for the last dance.

For the rest of the evening music was provided by the excellent Elders Sound Band.

The Kenya Branch of FHI was initially involved in relief work for

locally from USAID, ODA (Britain), Canadian agencies and other such benefactors as SIDA (Sweden) and UNICEF's World Food Programme.

He explained 'in a way we sell a project to a donor to obtain funds. We then match this money from our partner entities'.

Asked why they had chosen

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to the coast we stay here because it is friendly, the atmosphere is warm and the staff are wonderful.

many of the participants had been on pre-conference safaris, adding 'while our partner entities are also here to see how their money is being wisely spent'.

Said the FHI President, Mr. Tetsunao Yamamori, 'I have joined FHI in 1981 and we then used to have these annual leadership conferences with just a handful of Senior Management Staff'.

Their numbers have grown tremendously commensurate with our work'.

FHI now has a full time staff of 1500 or more.

He considered Jadini an ideal venue for serious discussion, as well as for a little rest and recreation.

Adding 'these people do not have that kind of time with the work they do in third world developing countries'.

He went on 'we have always been very fortunate in that a lot of people around the world have been supporting us'.

However, there are still so many hungry people in the world that more support is always welcome'.

Adding 'until human nature and greed changes there will be a need to continue to help them until Christ returns'.

refugees fleeing from Idi Amin's Uganda, then the 1982-4 drought. Now that the relief situation is over its main emphasis is on development.

It is working mostly in Marsabit, Moyale District, on water, agriculture and health development projects.

As well, it is operating a loan programme in the Mathare slums of Nairobi to help poor people to become successful in their small scale business ventures.

Said Mr. Winnings 'as far as Kenya is concerned 20 per cent of our budget comes from donor entities, while 80 per cent is raised



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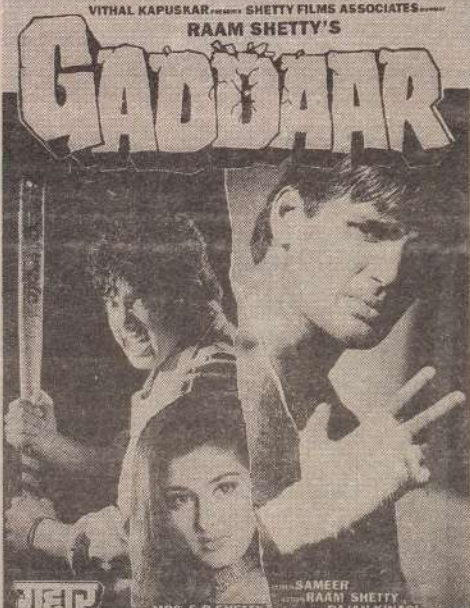

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## 'Touristic Union International Is Now In Support'

THE THREE major tourism associations at the Coast have welcomed the latest decision by Touristik Union International - the largest tourism organisation in Europe - to give its full support to the intended Beach Management Programme.

All had been shocked on learning earlier that TUI, Germany, had notified Kenya's Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife that it was against the proposed KWS Entry Fee, for up until that time they had been under the impression that this tour operator was fully backing the idea.

Consequently, Mr. E. Wulkop's latest action in asking the Permanent Secretary to accept a slight review of our former statement' has been greeted with great joy by the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association, Kenya Association of Hotel-keepers' and Caterers' and the Kenya Association of Tour Operators.

In a faxed message to the Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Tourism dated August 30, and copied to Najib Balala, MCTA chairman, Mr. Wulkop of TUI, Germany, states:

## Importance Of 'Adding Value' In The Service Sector

FOR A manufacturer, 'adding value' to a product usually means taking raw materials and applying tools, techniques, design, and making, a bicycle, a TV set, a shoe, a chair, a bus, a dress, or a house.

For example, we take a piece of wood, use our knowledge of design, wood grain and strength, and a saw, chisel and drill, plus glue, and we make a table.

"We have added value to the raw materials.

In recent years, the concepts of Total Quality, and Continuous Improvement, have emphasised the adding-of-value aspect of manufacturing.

Factories now refine the processes of production to add value at every step; if any step does not add value, it's out.

That's not too hard to see, is it? To make something of excellent

quality, you add value at every stage, from raw material to finished product.

But what about the Service Sector? How can we take the same approach when we are working with less tangible outcomes?

It's awfully easy to fall into a trap here, and get the service mixed up with the product itself.

For example, the server in a restaurant brings the meal you ordered from the kitchen.

The meal is not the service, it is a thing, the product of the chef and the kitchen staff, who have taken the raw food bought, we hope, with special care.

No chef can make a great dinner out of bad food.

No, the service provided is the way in which the patrons are served in a pleasant manner, quickly - yet slowly - enough, the dinner plates are cleaned away with ease, and the order is taken by a server who knows the menu, how each dish is prepared.

There's more to good service than that, but in general we say we got good service when people were helpful, timely, and we got what we wanted with-out problems.

What value can we add, then, as service providers?

Same service for less money? Is that it? No.

Price is often the deciding factor when buying simple products, as in the purchase of a mango in the market, but in a small community of suppliers, problems can arise around competing on price alone.

Loss leaders can cause price wars, as for example in petrol prices.

It's not so different in the service area: As one business owner asked me last week:

"When our competitors sell a safari tour for 17,000/- we can't charge much more for the same safari and stay in business very long.

"It's a very competitive field! We have overhead, you know. If we were to sell for that price, our profits would be so low it would hardly be

worth while.

"What am I supposed to do? Lose customers, or cut service?"

The answer lies in the idea of 'adding value' to the service.

This owner's business has proved that it is reliable, the vans are quite new, clean, comfortable, and the drivers know their stuff in the parks.

Further, the drivers are careful on Kenya's dangerous roads, and

know how to treat the passengers well - helping to get settled in the lodges, explaining the wildlife, and letting the

customers know what's going on in general.

To this owner I said:

"Price is not, repeat not, the only deciding factor.

"I can prove it to you; after all, I have myself been back here several times, and have been quoted cheaper prices elsewhere in town.

"I like the service.

After all, I am not going to take chances with friends who pay lots of money in air fare to visit Kenya (and me) and put them on a safari that cost 100 per cent less, only to risk them returning in disappointment, am I?"

The owner agreed, but I could still see the doubt that ... maybe customers would be lost on price alone.

"If I were you", I said, "I would not excuse the extra few bob you charge. Explain it to the customers as 'Value-Added Service' that is the root of your success.

"Tell them that you take the less tangible aspects of safari travel - the spirit in which we serve - as having real value to the customer.

It's just that you are a class act, not just profit takers."

The owner nodded and looked thoughtful.

"You know, I had never thought of honesty, conscience, and goodwill as having financial worth. We should sell it, not be apologetic about it."

Why do some customers pay high prices for the same product or

service available for less money nearby?

We tend to do that, you know, because we have been taught that "You get what you pay for."

In other words, pay more, get more.

That was true in the past, when so many goods were of good quality because they were hand crafted, when we looked for the 'made by hand' label.

But these days it's not quite so true, is it? A hand-made car would cost a rajah's fortune!

Today we can make good things in factories, using modern production technology.

The quality that comes in service remains an individual, personal matter.

You know what infuriates customers most in North America, according to a survey done about four years ago?

Being ignored!

They don't mind waiting quite so much if someone will at least tell them "I'll wait about fifteen minutes, folks, sorry for the delay."

Value added in service should never come only at a price, but people are willing to pay more if they are looked after, believe me.

Serve well, be proud, and keep the prices reasonable. It can be done!

## 'Royal Life Saving' At The Nyali Swimming Sessions

THE COMMONWEALTH Development Liaison office of the Royal Life Saving Society (RLSS) will be holding an intensive life-saving course between September 30 and October 8 at the Nyali Beach Hotel, Mombasa.

# Ambassador Roberto Dileo's Fortright Comments On Italian Market Welcomed At Coast Tour Meeting

but also the German market by about 20 per cent.

Holiday bookings to Kenya from Italy started declining drastically following the outbreak of Ebola in Zaire and growing insecurity in Kenya.

Six major hotels closed at Malindi and Watamu at Easter, with a few re-opening briefly during August, and then closing again.

## 'AIR EUROPE'

During the last winter season eight Air Europe charters were flying here from Italy, now there is only one a week.

All major Italian tour operators marketing Kenya have suffered a

drastic reduction in bookings and none are too optimistic about the coming Winter Season.

It is generally anticipated that this will be another bad season and the hope is that there will be no more attacks on tourists so that the market has a chance of picking up again.

It was a very useful discussion with the Italian Ambassador with the MCTA chairman advising him of the joint action taken by the three tourist associations at the Coast as a means of getting security tightened.

The others are Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers and Caterers', and Kenya Association of Tour Operators.

Security was one of the main issues raised by them when visiting President Moi at the Coast recently.

The tourism industry has also

offered to help the police whenever it can, which has included assistance in putting up two badly needed police posts - one at the Likoni Ferry and another at Twi.

At the time of the last General Election joint action between these

tourist associations and the police resulted in tourists being given a police escort from the airport to their hotels.

The MCTA chairman also mentioned how the industry has been pressing for a Police Tourist Unit for some time.

This is about to be established.

It also feels that Kenya needs to improve her image abroad and the Ambassador suggested that one good way of doing so would be by TV programmes which reach out to a much greater number of people than through press articles.

The Ambassador also felt there is need for any negative publicity to be continued immediately and that a positive image of Kenya should be portrayed in western countries.

He suggested that perhaps emphasis could be laid on the fact that you do not suffer jet-lag in flying to Kenya, and that the country is unique in that she can offer not only a beach holiday but game parks as well.

Popular months for vacations here, he said, are December, January and February which coincide with the European winter.

The Ambassador was at the coast for the commissioning of the Kshs. 2.3 billion National Digital Switching Network project at

Mombasa's Telephone House.

It was financed by the Italian Government.

Referring to an article in the East African Standard the MCTA Chairman said he had noted the Envoy's forthright comments at that function to the effect that:

*'Tourists from Europe and other overseas countries might avoid Kenya if such issues as insecurity, harassment and bad roads are not looked into.'*

## IMPROVEMENT

Adding 'tourists will go elsewhere if the police do not provide adequate security'.

This is exactly the danger the tourism industry has envisaged.

The MCTA chairman told the Ambassador that the association is constantly seeking improvements to the roads, as well as calling for the expedition of the Second Mzima Pipeline as until then there will never be an adequate supply of mains water at the coast.

TOURISM to Kenya from Italy has plummeted so badly that it has been described as a 'disaster' with some hotels closing at Malindi/Watamu and a big reduction in the number of charter flights coming here.

When tourism is Kenya's No. One earner of foreign exchange and in view of the seriousness of the situation, the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association took the opportunity, during the Italian Ambassador's visit to the Coast, to invite him to lunch and for a chat.

The Ambassador, Roberto Dileo, was accompanied by his wife, Susanna, and the delightful reception venue was at the Reef side's new Seagull Restaurant on the beach front.

After welcoming them the MCTA chairman, Najib Balala, introduced the Executive Committee - Mrs. Lorna Hayes, Anil Kumar, Patrick Mutua, Zulwarani and Neta Peal (PRO).

Also Dr. Fabrizio Molinaro, the Francorosso Representative in Kenya.

Declared the MCTA chairman tourism is generally suffering here. Not only is the Italian market down by between 60 - 70 per cent

# African Liner Agencies To Handle 'Global Container'

THE EXECUTIVE Director of the Global Container Lines Mr. Ali Paksima has confirmed the appointment of a new agent, African Liner Agencies in Mombasa to handle their vessels and to adequately tap the trade opportunities in the East African region.

African Liner Agencies Limited is located at Maritime House, 1000 Moi Avenue and is headed by the former Dubai based Executive Captain Brendan Healy as General Manager.

African Liner Agencies will take over the Global Container Lines vessels from Spanlight Shipping Company from October 1, 1995.

Working in Mombasa when he was the Managing Director of the Kenya Ports Authority, Mr. Simeon M. Mwalimu, the Executive Director of African Liner Agencies, explained that Global Container Lines, which has been having over 20 years of experience in Mombasa, will now be providing services with additional capacity of larger capacities of 900 TEU.

These vessels will have 200 TEU of container moves and carry several hundred vehicles and about five thousand tonnes of general cargo in and out of Mombasa.

He added that these plans are aimed at boosting the regional trade through its roll on/roll off multi-deck and bulk carrier vessels for routes within the Indian Ocean, South Africa, India, East Africa, Persian Gulf, Far East, and the Gulf and East Coast and Canadian ports in the St. Lawrence and Great Lakes region. Captain Healy said the company has had a good service in the port

Mkalla expressed KPA's determination to put the port of Mombasa in high performance rating with ports of the developed world.

He thanked the Global container Lines for choosing the port as its operational base in the region and said this underpinned the reality of Mombasa's improving efficiency in cargo handling in the recent past.

He noted that, in view of the rapid growth of container traffic, the port is set to reconstruct the present conventional berth number 14 into a full container berth bringing the total number of container berths to four.

He added that all the container berths will have more ship-to-shore handling equipment as well as the container yard back-up system that is fully serviced.

## EAST AFRICA

Accompanied by Captain Healy, whom he came to introduce to the KPA Chief Executive, MP. Paksima said the Global Container Lines:

"Has been serving East Africa with special emphasis on the utilization of the port of Mombasa for Kenya as well as Uganda, Rwanda, Burundi and other inland destinations in neighbouring countries for over 10 years now".

Mr. Mikalla noted that the KPA has been pursuing growth of transit cargo by establishing inland container depot facilities in Nairobi, Kisumu and Eldoret.

Captain Healy said the company has had a good service in the port

and hoped to continue mutual cooperation and relationships with the KPA for the achievement of what he described as "growth of business from Kenya and the transit traffic from neighbouring countries".

The Global Container Lines vessels which will be calling in Mombasa are the multipurpose ro-ro M.V. *Vinnitsa* and M.V. *Knud Jespersen* and the pure ro-ro vessels M.V. *Agostinho Neto* and M.V. *Ivan Skuridan*.

Mr. Mikalla was accompanied by the KPA Marketing and Public Relations Manager Mr. Alex Kabuga and the Chief Operations Officer, Mr. Lucas Obondo.

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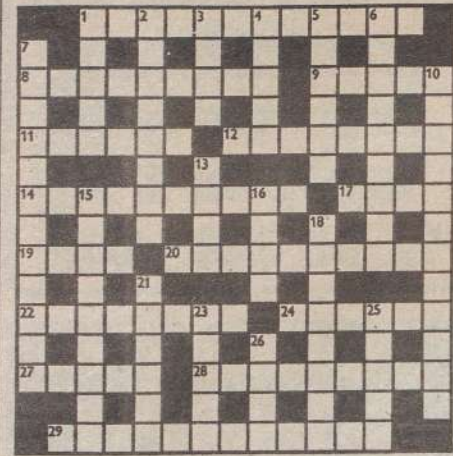

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# Lots Of International Interest In Sixth Maralal Camel Derby

AS THE sixth Maralal International Camel Derby (MIRD) gears up there is news of escalated interest with numbers of riders already making reservations for their camels from the Secretariat, scheduled for October 28 - 29.

The first international entrant this year is Andrew Chilton, a University Lecturer, who hails from California in the USA.

The reigning champion Muleo Langala of Farm Africa will be defending his title and course record of July 3, 1957 against his arch rivals the brothers Iddi and Daniel Lewarini from the Yare Safaris Club.

It has been reliably learned that Muleo has also been down in Tanzania training with Tanzania camels.

So far there is no news of Gahir Ibrahim who was the camel derby's champion for three years before his fiasco last year when his mount balked on him to bring his long running streak of luck to an ignominious end.

But according to information at hand he is busy training up a new animal where he intends to challenge his stable mate Muleo Langala in a bid to recover his title as African champion over the 42.195 kms distance.

The organisers are waiting for details of the first South African entrant.

Mr. Karel Du Plessis who has indicated his intent to compete in the amateur section with a high profile team of riders.

Mr. Du Plessis is actually an organiser of camel races in South Africa, and represents South African interests in Federation of International Camel Race Association (FICRA)

In this team will be a junior entrant, his son of 14 years of age, who intends to challenge Lenna Kaara, 13 years of age,

and Lawrence Galgesa, 13 years of age.

These youngsters will provide some interesting action with their participation where their performance may steal some of the highlight from the big name amateurs.

So far the amateur champion is Egot Ngitens from Farm Africa, and he has indicated that he intends to contest his title once more.

Considerable disappointment has been voiced at the news that the proposed inaugural Great Kenyan Camel Endurance Race (GKCEER) has been put off once more according to the organisers.

This race starting at Isiolo which was to last 15 days and over 630 kms, had to be cancelled owing to the delay in confirming support by the international sponsor.

The organisers were unwilling to commit to a successful event if insufficient lead time was given to make the complicated preparations.

According to Maj. Walker the chairman of that event he is confident that this matter will be resolved early enough to create a unique and exciting second major race attraction in October 1996 and Isiolo.

Hence the cancelling of the proposed Isiolo race this year.

With the burgeoning interest in this year's event at Maralal already there have been bookings for accommodation in the lodges, bandas, and campsites.

Yare Safaris Lodge, who are the official campsite operators are offering extensive secure campsite arrangements to cope with the large volume of visitors which are expected.

Camels will need to be booked in advance by would-be participants, and already the pre-bookings are building up.

These arrangements can be done through Yare Safaris in their Nairobi offices on first floor, Union Towers, Moi Avenue.

## Potholes Are Hard Work On An Average Day In Old Mombasa - Unless Repaired They Soon Wreak Havoc With Our Tyres

KACHUMBARI was literally in high spirits when I met up with him on member's day last week.

He had packed up shop in the afternoon and then sat down with a few friends to talk the week to a close.

When I joined them at the Kadogo club, I found them about to close their mandibles on some nyama choma.

At this point Kachumbari was talking about the annual facelift that our town had undergone in the line with the visit of very important people for the show.

He told all of us gathered that it was now the time to change tyres on the cars as we would be sure that they would have a proper new lease of life.

The Town fathers had ordered all the potholes filled so that the sleek 'mercs' and other cars could have a gentle ride and not rattle their distinguished occupants and escorts.

However, as is usual, the efforts started a bit late and only covered what were considered the official routes.

The mwananchi's shortcuts and our usual thoroughfares were not touched and the potholes continue to get deeper and deeper.

What was heartening to see was that the road repair men were still at it last week.

It at least showed that there was a will to continue providing a much needed service albeit in bits and pieces.

The Makupa causeway was the target of their latest efforts.

Anyhow back to tyres. Kachumbari's reason for telling us all to fit new tyres now was due to his understanding of what happened to tyres when subjected to hazards that they were not designed for.

Potholes, nails, bumps and similar items give the tyres hell.

At least nails and similar sharp objects manifest themselves quite quickly and the driver has no option but to stop and change the tyre and get the punctured one repaired as soon as he can.

Potholes have a more menacing effect.

Every time we go over a pothole at any reasonable speed, the tyre walls get a hard hit.

The more jagged the edge of the pothole, the worse the effect.

Tyres have two sets of cord that form the outer and inner wall. These are the strength components of the tyre.

The rubber is "pasted" over the cord.

Over time, the cord that is in the tyre gets cut and should both the inner and outer cord get cut then the tube will start by extruding itself through this weak spot in the tyre wall.

The next bump could be fateful.

It could be the one that causes a blow out.

A blow out at any speed will catch the driver unawares and if the circumstances are right, will lead to a nasty accident either self or involving other vehicles or vegetation.

Let the Town fathers consider this.

Let us say for arguments sake that the vehicle population in Mombasa is 250,000.

Each travels an average of 40 kilometres a day on our badly potholed roads.

Say as well that the average number of potholes on the road is

a very conservative 50 in each kilometre.

Say also that the number of "hits" per tyre is evenly distributed.

Each tyre will see slightly over twelve potholes per kilometre or 480 in a day.

This rate of beating is quite severe and it mainly attacks one part of the tyre.

The potholes have quite a lot of hard work to do on an average day in Mombasa.

Unless repaired, they wreak havoc with tyres.

It is up to us drivers to ensure that our tyres are in good shape (over and above the Town father's responsibility to ensure that they have a decent surface to drive on!).

We should ensure that all the tyres fitted on the car are of the same type ... crossplys or radials and not mix them up.

They have different characteristics and handle differently.

Every time we fill up with petrol we must check

the tyre pressure to ensure they are as recommended by the vehicle manufacturers.

Every month, we should check the tyres in detail.

We should check whether the tread is still within the legal requirement.

We should check the sidewalls for any tell tale bulges which will be an indication that the side wall cordage has been breached.

We should look for nails, stones and other sharp objects in the tread.

They can embed themselves and eventually lead to punctures.

## TRANSPARENT MANAGEMENT

Every time we are about to drive, we should in fact go round the car and have a quick check not only the tyres but also whether the car has been dented by some external agency or been broken into and so forth.

In fact, a leading tyre manufacturer in the country offers fleet owners tyre management concepts that will make the cost of owning tyres transparent.

It can be used as a gauge as to when it is safe and economical to

replace tyres and tubes.

The principle is to break up the running costs of the vehicles into discrete components and then analyse the components in their own right.

This gives a better insight into where other savings can be made.

The tyre is the one component on the car that people tend to underrate yet a small thing wrong with it could lead to a fatal accident.

We all pay attention to what goes on under the bonnet but not enough to the other safety critical items.

As Kachumbari says, how many of us regularly check the pressure in our spare tyres?

Next, lead a Club right back. Whether West takes his Ace or not, you will reach Dummy with the Queen and take the winning Heart Finesse.

This gives you nine Tricks: Three Spades, Four Hearts, and Two Clubs.

If you mistakenly win the first Trick with the ten of Clubs, you can be set with good defence.

West can prevent you from getting to Dummy by 'duck-

Further evidence of West's fourth-best lead is that if West has led top of his Club, East's normal play from A J 9 X would be the Jack (not nine) at Trick one. (The Full Hand is shown above.)
