DELIGHTFUL CHILDREN' BALLET 'COPELIA' FOR THE MOMBASA LITTLE THEATRE CLUB

BALLET RETURNS once again to grace the well-worn boards at the Little Theatre Club.

This time Jean Koch has chosen the delightful ballet, *Coppelia* - which was originally choreographed by Arthur Saint-Leon in 1870.

This was not only his greatest ballet but also his last, for he died, prematurely, a few months after it's first performance.

The music was composed by Leo Delibes, whose wonderful gift of melody is shown at its best in *Coppelia*.

Obviously Jean has had to arrange her own version of the ballet in order to accommodate a vast cast of 130 students with ages ranging from four to 16 years.

The story is of a young village girl named *Swanhilda*.

This role is a favourite with many ballerinas who can combine light comedy with a brilliant and sparkling technique.

Dancing the role of *Swanhilda* is *Nicky Cleave*, one of Jean's most loyal, hard working and talented students.

Also living in this village is a mysterious old man named *De Coppelius*.

Dancing this role is equally loyal and talented *Priyal Patel*.

In the past Priyal has danced the role of the Pied Piper in *'The Pied Piper of Hamelin'*, the wicked fairy in *'Sleeping Beauty'* and more recently the evil magician Jaffar in *'Aladdin and his Magic Lamp'*.

Employment? Meet Their Needs And Your Hired!

"TO BE, or not to be, that is the question".

William Shakespeare wrote those words 400 years ago, when he had his character Hamlet wondering about his very existence.

You may also remember that Walt Disney cartoons had a character called **Popeye**, who, when confronted with any question about his ability to be a good sailor, would say "I am what I am!"

The Key words were about being.

Being alive, being his own person, being of a certain type, being a prince, a sailor, a man, a husband, and so on.

We used to think that whoever we were was enough.

If a person was of good moral character, of an honest nature, came from a respectable family, had a 'good upbringing' - why, it was just assumed that person was also good for a job.

We assumed capability to do something, from operating a train to working efficiently in a bank to teaching, cooking, accounting, selling, and managing a workforce.

Indeed, in our father's and grandfather's day it was considered disrespectful to ask detailed questions about capabilities, skills, background knowledge of the job.

Why, in some cultures even today it is just not done for students to query the teacher; to ask is considered as questioning the teacher's ability; to ask is to bring into question.

But those traditions are passing, just as we don't ask what people are any more: we ask what they can do.

Old job-interview questions such as "Why do you think you are right for this job?" might still be around, but nowadays I want to know how you will behave on the job; I want to know what capabilities-on-demand you have available.

You are much more likely to encounter a job interviewer who will ask:

"What would you do if the mechanic working on a customer's (car) brakes told you this car needed expensive new parts, and you already knew two other customers had already complained about over-billing on brake jobs?"

"How would you handle a situation where your boss asked you to organise a meeting between him, the sales staff, and the

company's accountant?"

"Give me an example of some action you once took to resolve a problem with a difficult colleague?"

"What would you do if you gave a customer a discount price because he agreed to buy one hundred items, but then said he could take only twenty items - and expected the same low price?"

I've interviewed countless people for jobs and one question has always proved a "killer" for most of them.

The conversation would go like this: (Q) "Okay, Elizabeth (or Edward), you've applied for the post of accounts supervisor. Tell me, in general, what can you do?"

(A) "Well, I have been an accounts supervisor for the past four years, first with Company A, then with B."

(Q) "Yes, but please tell me, what can you do? What capabilities do you bring to this job?"

(A) "I am conscientious, I have a diploma, and in my last job I was in a similar position."

(Q) (with frustration) "Okay - but what do you know how to do?" (Thinking, this is a waste of time!)

So what to do?

How do you present yourself well, now you have been warned?

Well, you might be fortunate enough to be interviewed by someone who will ask what you can do.

In that case, just give a straight answer.

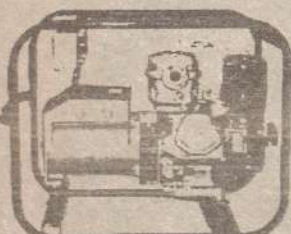

It was a field day at the home of Mama Mose Shumaa, the chairperson of the group, and almost K.Shs. 20,000/- was raised.

Other items in the auction were casuarina trees, firewood, pencils and national honey - all part of a true Harambee.

In this rural area between the sea and the Arabuko Sokoke Forest, famous for butterflies and birds, on the Mombasa-Malindi Road there is an urban area springing up.

Indeed, a typewriter has been donated, and Mrs. Bati, the secretary of the group (who is a full-time teacher at the local primary school) is busy there in the evenings.

Thanks should go too to Gestetner Limited who printed and donated a whole ream of paper through Bl. Alphonse, another resident of the area.

Mombasa Secretarial Academy and the well-known philanthropist, Kamal Sabharwal of Coastweek fame each gave 500/-.

When we had not got enough money, the young men, say equivalent of a Moran age group, took round a 'kikapu' (a hat would have done in town), calling *Sindikiza* or "One for the Road", and all the loose change was put in.

These boys and other men should be thanked for their work, the boys for acting as hosts (well, some are Utalii-trained), and the group of men having prepared an attractive makuti-covered dais, bedecking the whole place with flags.

While the local women cooked a scrumptious lunch of rice and Halal-slaughtered mbuzi, some of Malindi's *Mzee Buki* group who always entertain Pollman's tourists, kept us all busy watching, and then to a crescendo they and

We ended up doing the konger.

In fact it is from their garden that most of the produce came.

They want for nothing; they use goats' milk and their limes and pill pill make most delicious chutney.

Being set back to fourth row from the seafont the water is not too saline, and Bl. Munga says she only needs to add pill, not salt, to her delicious cooking.

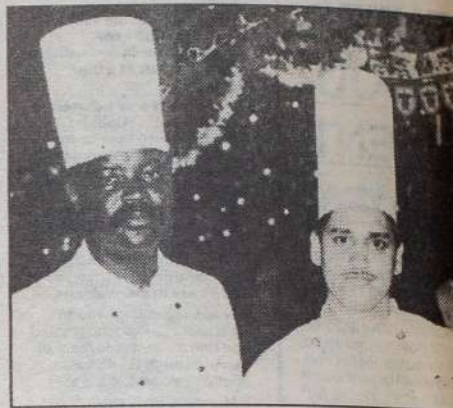

Beach Clean-Up Drew 774 Volunteers Cleaning 28.5 Kms. Of Beach And Filling 632 Garbage Bags With More Than Four Tonnes Of Rubbish

ON BEHALF of the 'Kenya Beach Clean-Up 1995', I am pleased to confirm that we have now informed the Centre for Marine Conservation of Washington D.C. and the public that the 'International Beach Clean-Up' exercise was successfully carried out at four locations in Kenya under the slogan "Taking Care of Kenya".

This year's clean-up also coincided with World Tourism Week and the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association helped a lot with the publicity and the organisation of the event.

The clean-up in MOMBASA involved 548 participants who cleaned 9.8 kilometres of beach, filling more than 257 garbage bags weighing 1,625.4 kgs of rubbish.

The most peculiar items collected in Mombasa included, toilet seats, cups, flip flops, syringes and broken bottle pieces.

The coordinators in Mombasa were Hugh Walters of M.C.T.A., Chris Soper of Sollatek, Mr Jessop of Jumba Ruins, Victor Shitaka of Nyal Beach Hotel, Ms. Julie Okello of KATO, Mrs. Marylin Barnes of Mombasa Yacht Club, Danny Haller of Danhall Limited and Michael O. Katoka of K.W.S. and Hussein Naria of Oshwal Academy.

In WATAMU 100 individuals participated in this clean-up which covered approximately 13 Kms.

During this exercise 180 bags of debris weighing 1,800 kg was recorded.

The most peculiar items collected

in this area were syringes, turtle egg and toilet seat.

The coordinators in Watamu were Mrs. Hellen Curtis of Aquaventures and Neel Inamdar of Turtle Bay Beach Club.

At KIKAMBALA 72 volunteers

participated including tourists, who cleaned about three kilometres of beach, filling 84 bags of rubbish weighing 182.6 kg.

national Coastal Clean-Up' is to remove debris from shorelines, waterways and beaches, collect valuable information on the amount and type of debris.

We also educate the public on the issue of Marine debris and use the information collected from the clean-up to effect policy changes and other measures needed to reduce marine debris and enhance marine conservation.

Data on the types of rubbish collected is compiled by Baobab Trust and forwarded to Kenya Wildlife Services and the Centre for Marine Conservation (CMC).

The CMC will include this information in its global database and will compile an international report based on the data from all countries involved in the clean-up.

This report is then used to lobby policy makers, industrial organisations and other entities in efforts to improve the condition of marine environments.

In 1993, 200 volunteers collected almost three metric tonnes (3,000 kgs) of rubbish from the Watamu

and Mombasa Beaches in just a single day.

The 1994 beach clean-up was attended by 375 volunteers who collected 4,200 kgs of man-made refuse from the beaches.

This year the beach clean-up was also a great success, 774

- Report such bursts or leaks to Telephone 471019 quickly (The Water Office in Kisauni) giving the plot number or a description of where you saw the burst/leaks.

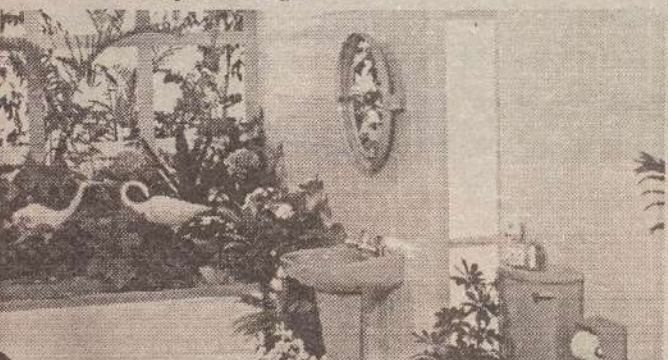

investment Diani Homes regularly has a full page of advertisement in *Bellevue* - the largest magazine in Europe devoted to property and land all over the world.

Diani Homes had a feature article in it last year and just two weeks ago a representative from *Bellevue* visited them to obtain news of their on-going projects.

Diani Homes also advertise in *DM* - the biggest financial magazine in Germany to attract investment in their villas.

Joe and Volker have been seriously concerned about the adverse publicity Kenya has been receiving overseas including an incorrect report about 'Ebola' when 'No Case' had been reported here.

It resulted in many cancellations of holiday bookings from Germany and even more so from Italy.

Some hotel employees were made redundant while others have been adversely affected by a big decline in trade including farmers, fishermen and curio dealers.

Both Joe and Volker felt something must be done towards improving Kenya's image abroad.

Volker who has connections with three of the largest magazines in Germany - *Stern*, *Der Spiegel* and *Focus* suggested to the owner of this group of magazines that a journalist be sent out to report on the more positive aspects of the country and its well established tourism industry.

The school which has 500 students was built on an harambee basis by the parents themselves who are generally very poor.

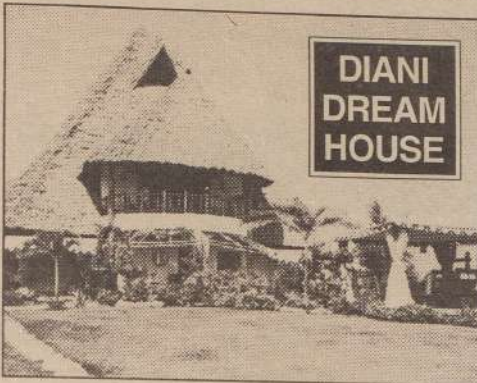
They did not have the money to replace the roof.

Also participating was a visiting Bishop from Maseno West - the R.L. Rev Joseph O. Wasonga, together with a curate from the Mombasa Memorial Cathedral, the Rev. James Asewa.

The hotel was also strongly represented by not only Mr. Wendy

Vickers-James, but also Sansone Banin, Managing Director of Hotelspan (owners of DRGH); Sigi Jogschat, the hotel's General Manager and his wife Kathy, also Mr. S.S. Mubiru, Financial Controller and his wife Rosebud, choir leader.

Dr. Frank Yeiser, 48, died from a heart attack in Norfolk, Virginia, on April 23, 1995.

He would have been one of the 86-strong 'Operation Smile' team coming to Africa in October comprising doctors, dentists, speech therapists etc.

Some will be performing over 300 operations in Nairobi, Nakuru and Kisumu on children mainly

with faces disfigured by cleft palates or tumours.

They will be given the chance to smile as other children do and have a much brighter future to look forward to.

The team takes the more serious cases back to America for reconstructive surgery during which time they live in the homes of doctors nurses or medical staff.

Free of charge reconstructive surgery is given to children in dire need with facial and functional deformities and with no access to such care.

This medical mission also offers educational programmes for volunteer organisers and medical professionals to improve health care undertakings etc.

'Operation Smile' also offers its services in America.

As part of the team Dr. Yeiser, Jr., has operated on hundreds of youngsters in Kenya.

Having earlier suffered from heart condition he had been warned against coming to Africa.

This he ignored and with 'Operation Smile' has visited Colombia, Somalia and Kenya.

His sister, Vivian, mentioned that in the early days the team had done their travelling the hard way.

In 1987 they flew to Kenya in the belly of a cargo plane - the journey taking two days!

If it had not been for Dr. Yeiser's untimely death he would have been on his eighth visit to Kenya with 'Operation Smile' this October.

In the USA he was Chief of Trauma at the Norfolk Sentara Hospital.

He also established the Paramedic Rescue Service in Norfolk remaining its Medical Director.

In an interview at *Diani Reef Grand Hotel*, his sister Vivian said 'people from all over the world used to visit Virginia to see the service he had set up'.

To his memorial service at Norfolk came over 2,000 colleagues and friends and a separate service had to be quickly organised to accommodate them all.

Eighty-seven vehicles were in the funeral motorcade.

Said Vivian 'he was not only a very dedicated doctor, but a very talented carpenter producing among other things boats and furniture.

Added Wendy 'Vivian and her husband have been staying with me in London for a month.

Our first idea after Frank's death was to plant a tree in his memory at *Diani Reef Grand Hotel*.

However, in keeping with our grand way of doing things, we thought why not a memorial service

as well!

It took place on Saturday, Aug 26, being brilliantly organised by Rosebud Mubiru and Mr. Banin.

Vivian was also overwhelmed by it all for much the time was moist eyed.

The twenty-five strong choir of the Mombasa Memorial Cathedral - the ladies fashionably attired in 'Afro' style magenta tie 'n' dresses - sung and danced away through to the hotel Conference Room where a moving Thanksgiving Memorial Service was held. Many tributes being made to Frank Yeiser, Jr., including a eulogy especially written by Wendy Vickers-James entitled 'Frank'.

Addressing the gathering Vivian said 'he did a very important job without asking for anything in return.

'When you look at the faces of the children that his team have operated on, leaves one in no doubt about the magnitude of the work they do out.

He loved Africa, saying 'I've given me much more than I have given her'.

Vivian thanked all those present for helping celebrate Frank here in Kenya.

Said the Bishop of Maseno the Rt. Rev Joseph O. Wasonga 'this is not a mourning ceremony but to celebrate the life he lived in the glory of God.

Frank's faith in people to realize their inherent beauty made dear to God's heart.

Adding 'he accomplished in his short life what some people do not achieve in one hundred years.'

A video film has been made of Vivian's visit, including a memorial service, by C. Passerini, an interior architect. The IG group of companies is largely responsible for the unique features at *Diani Reef Grand Hotel*.

It also recorded Vivian's visit to the hotel and received traditional African welcome.

Declared Vivian 'I have been overwhelmed by it all.

It shows a lot of loving care - that is the way my brother did it.

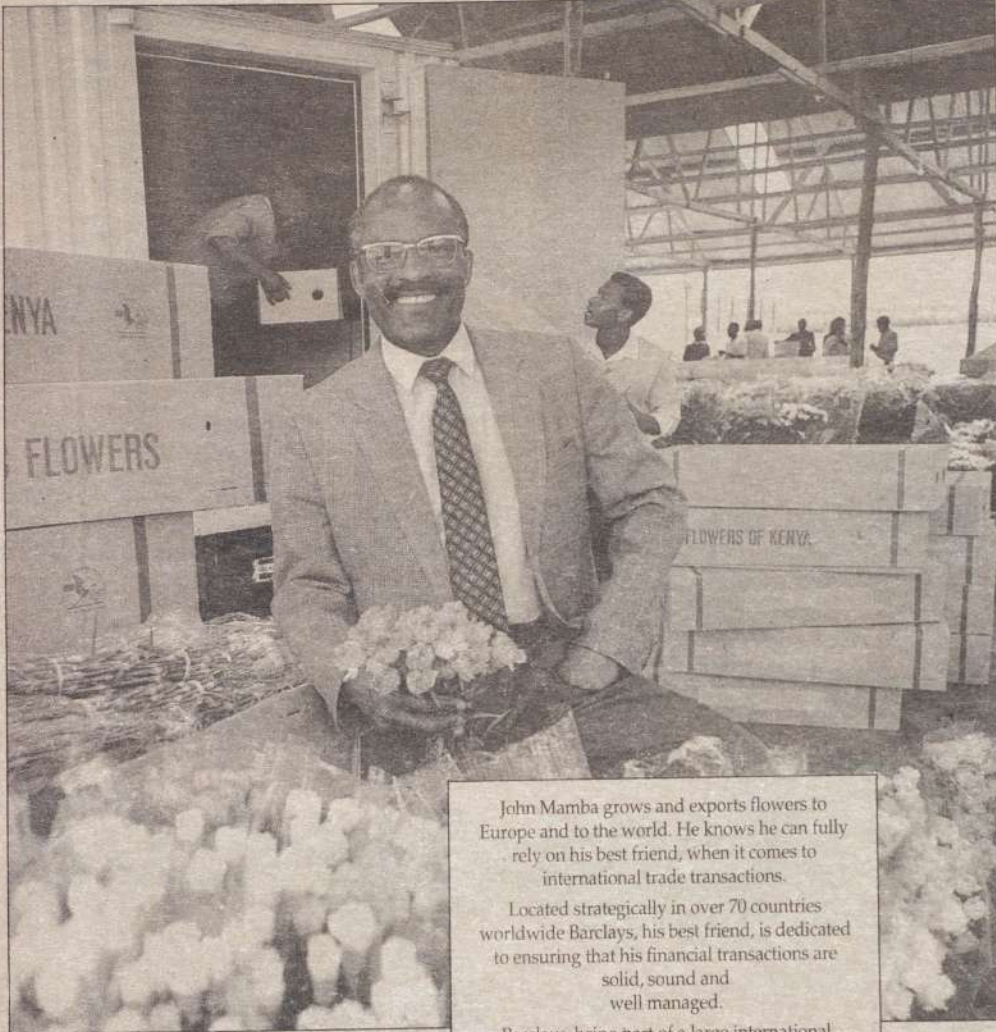
She revealed that Frank before his death, had accepted a position at Dartmouth School in Hanover, New Hampshire, USA, where he would have become part of the faculty there but continued to specialise in Trauma.

Vivian mentioned that Dr. Yeiser, Jr., had first come to Kenya in 1987 bringing with him two teenage daughters.

The eldest is now a specialist in Trauma following in her father's footsteps.

He is survived by Mrs. Patricia, two daughters - Lisa and two sons - Forest and Forest.

Ernst Günter Strecker bringt Bücher, Geld und Grüße aus Mainz!

ALS ERNST GÜNTER Strecker 1991 zum ersten Mal seinen Jahresurlaub in Kenia verbrachte, war er von dem Land sehr beeindruckt.

Noch mehr aber beschäftigten ihn die Gedanken an die vielen notleidenden Menschen, denen er nicht begegnete und er suchte nach Mitteln und Wegen, um ihnen zu helfen.

Als städtischer Verwaltungsangestellter in Mainz verfügt Strecker über keine Reichtümer. Er beschloß deshalb, seine Pläne Freunden und Bekannten vorzulegen.

Das ganze Jahr über sammelte er fleißig Geld und kam seither jedes Jahr nach Kenia, um jedesmal mindestens DM 20.000 an verschiedene Hilfsorganisationen zu verteilen, unter anderem an das SOS-Kinderdorf in Mombasa, die Port Reitz Poliklinik, an die St. Margret Presbyterian Church für ein Kinderheim, an die "Town Hall" (Rathaus) für ältere bedürftige Menschen und Waisenkinder, an die St. Johns Ambulance sowie an die Bombo-Juluwerkstätten, wo Behinderte Modeschmuck, Lederwaren und Kleidungsstücke herstellen.

In den knapp fünf Jahren ist es Strecker gelungen, den stattlichen Betrag von DM 97.000.- zusammenzutrommeln.

Seine Ansprechpartner sind überwiegend Politiker und Amtsträger, darunter prominente Namen wie Ministerpräsident Kurt Beck, Landtagspräsident Grimm, die Fraktionschefs Mertes, Böhr und Dieckvoß, Richard Patzke, Jens Beutel, Hans-Otto Wilhelm, Oberbürgermeister Hermann-Harmut Weyel, Regina Gerster, Elisabeth Kilali, Helga Hammer und Ulla Brede-Hoffmann.

Landeschef Johannes Gerster, Peter Krawietz (CDU), Gerhard Walter-Bornmann (SPD) und nicht zuletzt **Karl Delorme** (früherer Bürgermeister, Sozialdezernent und Bundestagsabgeordneter SPD), der sich jedes Jahr mit mindestens DM 5000.- beteiligt.

Jeder Pfennig geht direkt an die Betroffenen; sätliche Spenden-

nommen und einen Tag später in der Tagesschau ausgestrahlt.

nommen vom Bürgermeister von Mombasa, Ahmed Mwidani, in seinem Büro im Rathaus empfangen, dem er Kshs 120.000.- überbrachte wie auch ein signiertes Buch über Mainz und Rheinland-Pfalz.

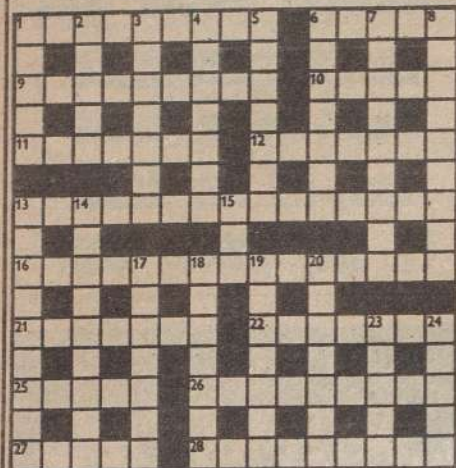

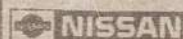

The Dilemma Facing Any Bowler Today Is Whether To Get Wickets Or Save Runs ...

TO CONTINUE with my view on one-day cricket at the Coast, the issue of bowling becomes more complex as to what will be the primary function of a bowler in one-day cricket.

The dilemma facing any bowler today is whether to get wickets or save runs.

The basic rule of one day cricket for any bowler is to bowl a consistent line and length to keep the batsman on a leash.

A good pace bowler's intimidation on the batsman can have its disadvantage that he might let of a powerful pace attack but if

the ball finds the edge of the bat or a snick it concedes a boundary because there are no close catchers, and another point is the stringent application of the 'wide' rule.

This calls for discipline for the bowler and thus blunts the edge of the bowler.

The other factors for a pace bowler is varied wickets and weather conditions.

Therefore considering all these above conditions, it looks like pace bowling though much preferred in one-day cricket has its disadvantages also.

On the other hand 'spin bowling can well contain a batsman by bowling a good length, but it often looks risky when the turn on the wicket is not good or the batsman can read the bowler.

Therefore the fear for most Captains is that a spinner either makes or breaks the game due to the fact that he may be hit for 30 runs in any over or take three wickets.

Though I feel the utmost need today is a good leg - spinner which we lack so much.

The one-bouncer per over restriction reduces the value of intimidation and enhances the skill of the pace bowler which can easily be played by a good batsman.

INTIMIDATION

Because such intimidation will become redundant and selectors and captains should encourage more spinners to prove their worth in one-day cricket.

Sunday is a day when one relaxes in the bathroom, takes a good shower and a nice close shave.

Cutchhi Leva has a nice close shave when they were beaten

by Burhani Sports Club by three runs.

Any experienced cricketer and spectator will tell you how exciting that can be at the end.

I have seen once a spectator light up a cigarette with a matchstick and throw away the



cigarette instead of the match stick.

And there was definitely heart-stopping suspense during the match.

Burhani Sports Club took to batting first after the flip of the coin went to their favour.

Hatim Asgar Ali and Juzer Gulam put up a fine opening score of 47 runs when Hatim was caught by Rajesh Shukla off Mavji Patel's bowling.

In came Juzer Hussein who handed out an expensive punishment of 56 runs.

Muffaddal Seifuddin not to be outdone gave very quick 45 runs at the end to bring the Burhani score to 232 runs with 40 extras.

Cutchhi Leva's Sanjay Patel was at his devastating best with 47 runs and Rajesh Shukla's ingenious improvisations who put up a nice half a century.

Pradeep Patel and Kishore Patel hung around a bit at 229 runs when Jayanti Patel needing only three runs to win gave Yusuf Hussein a good catch ending an memorable climax.

Mavji Patel of Cutchhi Leva took three wickets while Muffaddal Seifuddin took four wickets for 43 runs.

The man-of-the-match went to Yusuf Hussein.

At Mombasa Sports Club where the match between Union Sports Club and Mombasa Sports Club started off on an exciting pace with Mombasa Sports Club losing four wickets for 21 runs with Abbas Nazerall taking three wickets wonderfully.

Raju Chhaniyara and Raj Maru put up a dignifying score at 54

Kachumbari's Friend Was Asked To Pay Kshs. 4 million Before He Could Renew The Licences On His Hire Cars

KACHUMBARI RECENTLY visited some friends of his in one of the 'south-south' countries.

This friend was involved in the car hire business and had just gone through a very rough time after the law enforcement agencies had become a little bit more efficient.

The cops in this particular country installed a computerised system to enable those issued with summons for traffic offences to pay at whatever police station was nearest to them.

The system was named the Traffic Computerised On-Line Payment System or ... yes you guessed right Cops.

All tickets issued, whether simple parking fines or major traffic obstruction charges were entered into the system.

For those honest citizens, it gave them the freedom of getting to their destination without having to think of making a journey back to the court nearest to where they committed the offence for them to pay the fine.

Cops was good for the cops as they could very easily check whether a particular offender had a previous conviction when they were hauled up into court for any other non traffic offence and aided the cops in recovering quite a large number of fines that had been outstanding for some time.

Since the cops went 'on-line' their revenue earned from fines had increased such that the pay back on the system was within five years.

It also boosted productivity among the traffic cops making them an efficient force.

Some two years ago, their equivalent of the vehicle licensing department (VLD) also went on line with their own Computerised Information System.

This also allowed people to renew their road licences from anywhere in the country.

It also allowed the VLD to track those who had not renewed their licences and set up effective road blocks where they knew exactly which cars to stop and check.

This also increased their revenue collection and the system is paying back at the rate that was expected.

The bonus came early this year when the cops and VLD decided to combine their data bases so that they could catch those who avoided paying fines when they came to renew their road licences.

A lot of people were caught by surprise when they turned up to

renew their road licences and were asked to pay a hefty traffic bill before they could renew their road licences.

By this time people were aware that they would be hauled fairly quickly if they failed to renew their road licences.

They had to pay.

The two systems had one major drawback in their setup. Most of the summons entered into Cops by the cops was based on the vehicle registration number rather than the name of the driver.

A lot of the offences were of the nature that did not require the driver to be present for the cops to issue the summons. Parking fines, illegal parking that amounted to obstruction, leaving a car unattended when not properly parked, double parking and so forth are typical of this kind of offence.

The law was set up in such a way that the cops were not required to wait until the car owner returned to give the driver the summons in person since these were considered minor offences.

For major offences they also included the driver's name.

Thus the most traceable feature in the system was the car rather than the driver.

A few months prior to Kachumbari's visit, car hire companies started to renew their

licences for vehicles in their fleets.

They were shocked when they were presented with massive bills for unpaid traffic fines related to offences committed by their vehicles.

These offences went back quite a few years and were in the Cops computers which had only recently been linked to the VLD's system.

Kachumbari's friends was told to pay the equivalent Kshs. 4 million before he could renew the licences on his cars.

This was the equivalent of the turnover for a few months without deducting his costs.

He was in the midst of trying to work out how he could finance the fines and still keep his business running.

The car hire companies had an even bigger problem since they would have had to trace back the particulars of the people who hired vehicles going back quite a few years.

This meant going through a large number of old files to establish who had hired the vehicles at the given time and then try and trace whether they were still in the address that was given at the time of hire.

Worst still, they would have to pay off most of the fines incurred on their behalf by overseas visitors whom they hired cars to.

The cops stand was very simple. If they could keep their house order, then the car hire companies would have to do the same.

Matters were compounded if the car hire firms because the cars they sold off could very easily be traced back to them so they would also have to trace back data cars they had sold off in the ensuing period.

In short they were in the mud. The cops and the VLD were laughing all the way to the bank.

As Kachumbari says:

"If our telecommunication bosses were a bit more far sighted they would make the cost networking in Kenya more real and make their money in volume."

In doing so they would end organisations that would be kept "on line" to realise a quick turnover that they should be doing.

Recently, I was reading a tract from 'Faith, Prayer And Tract League' in which the writer gave some 'negative points' on 'How To Raise Irresponsible Children':

□ Begin from infancy to give the child everything he wants. (This way he will grow up to believe that the world owes him a living.)

□ Never give him any spiritual training, wait until he is 21.

□ Avoid the use of the word "wrong".

□ Pick up anything he leaves lying around - books, shoes, clothing.

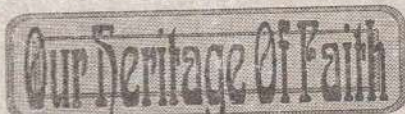
□ Do everything for him so he will be experienced in throwing the responsibility to others.

□ Let him/her read any printed matter he/she finds.

□ Quarrel frequently in the presence of the children. Then, they want to be too shocked when the home is broken up.

□ Give the child all the spending money he/she wants.

□ Never let the children/youths earn their own. (Why should they have things as tough as you had them?)



□ Satisfy the child's every craving for food, drink, and comfort. See that every desire is gratified. (Denial may lead to harmful frustrations.)

□ Take his/her part against the neighbours, teachers, and preachers. (Of course, they are all prejudiced against your child.)

□ When he/she gets into real trouble, apologise for yourself by saying: "I never could do anything with him/her."

□ Prepare for a life of grief - you will have it!

After reading these various points carefully that would all contribute in raising spoiled kids, I could not help but remember the words of the Builder of homes:

"Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it." (Proverbs 22:6).

Jack Palmer in the popular 'Grace and Truth' Magazine (September 1995) sums up well:

"Building good relationships requires lots of time and energy. Two things we often seem to be lacking. As parents, it is too easy to be 'too busy' or 'too tired' when it comes to our children. Relationship is the foundation of everything else in the family.

"If we fail to build strong, enduring relationships, we are asking for failure."

Jack adds that children often rebel

because of inconsistency in our lifestyles, making our children compete against each other for our love, attention, time, and approval.

Pursuing unattainable expectations, offering unreasonable comparisons, abuse, rejection, unfulfilled promises, lack of praise, and public humiliation.

How true!

I have often wondered, when shall we ever appreciate the truth that each of us is unique, fearfully and wonderfully made and that to expect all of us to make "As" in our finals may not work.

It has been wisely said that to expect "A" work from a "C" student is simply unreasonable.

Not all children are musically, athletically, or artistically inclined and they should not be forced to be.

Children I believe should be encouraged to do their best, but be realistic in what we expect of them.

Far too much pressure in this area can certainly produce crooks.
