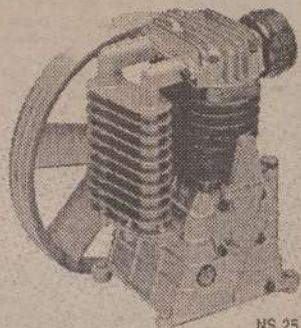

After 'Negative Publicity' Italian Tour Operators In Malindi Are Assured Of Improved Security Set Up

DESPITE negative publicity, and competition from new destinations, Kenya remained one of the most popular destinations for holiday makers from Italy.

This was stated by Mr. Pasquale Tinto the Managing Director of *Edicola Viaggi* on the occasion of a dinner for visiting Italian journalists to Malindi.

These journalists had been brought in to the country by Kenya Airways, and accompanied by Mr. John Mugo the national carrier's representative in Italy and Greece.

In attendance were Major (Rtd) Aussie Walker, Vice Chairman of KATO together with Colonel (Rtd) Nguru, Chief Executive of KATO.

These two officials had made a special visit to Malindi to assess the extent of the impact on the economy on the town created by some of the recent negative press reports.

Addressing the operators Major Walker stated:

"The impression has been created in the Italian market in recent months that Kenya is unsafe as a tourist destination and officialdom and Kenyan tour operators generally are unsympathetic to the concerns of Italian tourists in Kenya.

"This is far from the truth".

He went on:

"KATO and indeed other players in the tourist industry have made every effort to reassure tour operators and individual tourists in Italy that Kenya is safe and still a worthwhile destination.

"What appears to be the problem is the means of passing on these assurances and accordingly KATO is seeking looking hard to establish reliable channels of communication and to ensure that the Italian market is fully briefed on the positive aspects of Kenya as a tourist destination".

The Vice Chairman noted that there have been incidents of insecurity involving tourists.

However, available evidence indicates that the incidents are of a social nature as opposed to a general breakdown of law and order.

KATO is working with the Police and the Government to identify areas where incidents of insecurity may occur and take corrective measures.

We have confidence in the measures put in place and others planned for the future which will ensure greater security for visiting tourists.

The KATO executive put out a call to business counter parts in Italy to contact KATO whenever they have anxiety about security and promised that KATO would do all possible to allay their fears.

'Flavour Of The Month'

He said he welcomed counterparts from tourist organisations in Italy to come and observe the situation on the ground and offered to assisting arranging meetings with national authorities dealing with security.

The tourist industry hopes that as a result of this familiarisation tour, some of the negative publicity about Kenya recently seen in the Italian media would be countered.

This would enable the country to regain some of its popularity

as a 'flavour of the month' for Italian visitors.

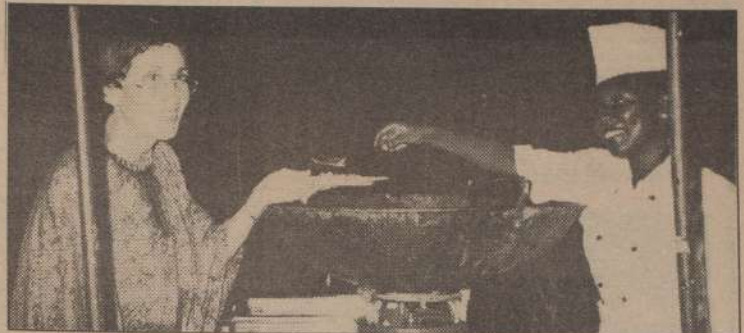

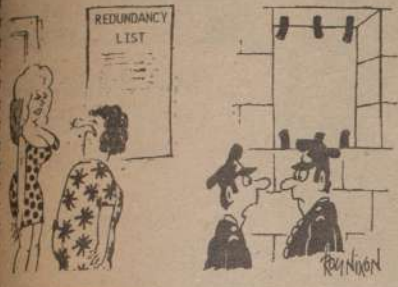

Blaming Is Destructive: Speaking Up Is Essential

"I THOUGHT you knew the meeting was cancelled - Mrs. Okello is out of town."

"Of course my employees and my managers know what's going on in the company. I tell Edward and Elizabeth what to do."

"I'm sorry, you are leaving, Mahmud; you've done a fine job for us."

Let's look at the last statement first, and ask "Mahmud" what he thought of it.

"I was astounded! The only reason I looked for another job was because the boss never talked to me about my contributions."

"I thought he was fed-up with me so I resigned before he could fire me."

And now let's go back and ask the boss about Mahmud's reply.

"Nonsense! He should have known. If there's a problem I don't waste any time telling him to look after it, and I don't bother him if all is well."

"If he wants me to praise him three times a day, he can forget it. I'm too busy. Anyway, actions speak louder than words."

Oh, dear.

"I thought you knew..." "He should have known..." "But I told her..." (Yes, you told her when she was on the telephone and you were going out and there was a lot of noise in the room!)

It is your responsibility as a communicator to:

• Speak (or write) before there's a crisis;

Example A:

"William, I think we'd better sit down together and go over the week's finances."

"I think I'm seeing a big mistake... let's say, eleven o'clock?"

Example B:

"Alice, you have been very quiet since the Hotel Mombasa letter came yesterday."

"What's up, if anything?"

• Communicate so clearly that your message won't be misunderstood;

Example A:

"I'm going to my Rotary meeting and will be out until two this afternoon. I want you to do two things:

One, send the messenger to get my plane tickets before I return;

Two, send the messenger to get my shipment of our boxes of Model C units for Type A labels before they go on the lorry."

Example B:

"Look, Steve, here's the situation. Yesterday was the sixth day in two months when you did not return from lunch until four o'clock, and then you smelled of beer."

"You have been warned about unsatisfactory performance three times; you were given a last warning ten days ago."

"You are fired, effective the 14th at 4.00 pm."

• Double-Check on under-

standing by asking people to repeat back in their own words what they understood you to have said.

Example A:

"Yes, that will be three coffees with milk, one black; two sandwiches, one hamburger; and no mustard on the burger. Correct?"

Example B:

"Okay, I think I've got it, I put the power 'On', turn the red knob to 'High', wait about 10 seconds until the meter reads in the green zone, then I can begin the cooking process. That right?"

• Send A Note or a letter after a meeting, to summarize any key points or actions to be taken.

Example A:

To: Mr. M. Kanzu

Reference: Our meeting this morning, November 3.

To summarize

our agreements, Mike;

• I will write to Mrs. Kofia about her bill.

• You will visit the Hotel Mombasa client on Tuesday.

• After some disagreement and argument, we finally agreed to fire Steven for poor performance, on the 14th. You will write the letter for me to give him, and I will meet him at two o'clock tomorrow.

Thanks - Anand.

You may be thinking that all of this is a lot of trouble, or it's

unnecessary, or it's so obvious we shouldn't have to read about it in Coastweek.

Whatever your response, I hear so many managers, and grumbling employees blame poor communication for mistakes, and so few of them remarking that their organization's people are great at keeping in touch, at making sure, at maintaining an open forum and no secrets.

The responsibility for good, positive, clear communication belongs to each and every one of us, no exceptions.

I met a man last week who is dissatisfied with a computer programme his company has bought, but he says he:

"Just kept quiet... has now written a report critical of the system... will submit it soon."

Of course it's too late now.

Nobody wants an obsolete document when he had many opportunities to get his opinions on the table.

The time has passed and it's just too late to cover his backside now.

Blaming is destructive; speaking up is essential.

Losing time, or orders, or your job, or customers, are only a few of the consequences of vague, ill-timed, sloppy communication.

Others include:

• Reliance on rumours instead of facts.

• Office politics lead to fears and alienation.

• Poor team work.

• Decreasing quality.

• Losing key employees.

• Annoyance, anger, irritation, bad relations, and all the other problems that make for bad days at work.

What to do? Here are some tips.

• If in doubt, wait twelve hours and then say or write it, maybe check with a colleague to see if the words are clear enough.

• Ask before you tell.

• In a crisis, make sure only one person speaks for the company, to employees, or news reporters, or lawyers. You can't afford mixed messages - it ruins your credibility.

• Think carefully about the choice of speaking or writing.

When you speak, you can check to see if the other party is understanding you; once you post the letter, it's gone, you can't chase after it and say:

"Wait! I really wanted to say..."

• Listen to yourself - don't be a rumour-monger, a whiner, complainer or blamer.

Don't let things fester, or lie awake wondering what the letter really was about. Ask!

• Listen! Don't interrupt; be positive; encourage; teach; don't jump to conclusions; keep your objectivity; don't assume the worst.

• Give instructions in (ridiculously) simple, clear terms!

We learn how to communicate when, as tiny babies, we cry for food.

As adults, let's not take effective communication for granted? Please?

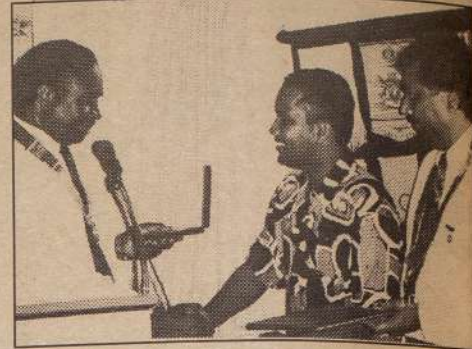
The smallest cat award was clinched by tiny Scoobie belonging to Alwiya Issa while Mike Beckett's Ginger was pushed to the second position.

Tjaereborg Plan To Increase Kenya Contracts From Seven To Ten Beach Holiday Hotels

TOUR OPERATORS, generally, invest heavily in promoting holiday destinations they sell (on which Kenya heavily relies) and doing just that is Tjaereborg - the second largest tour operator in the LTU group of Germany whose bookings for Kenya over the last ten months have been in the 'minus' compared to last year.

Kenya is consequently no longer Tjaereborg's most popular long-haul destination, as she was around 1990-91, having been overtaken by the Dominican Republic and Sri Lanka, among others.

Said Felix Schmidt, Tjaereborg's Sales Manager for the Southern part of Germany,

generally speaking it is not the best year for tourism in Germany with people having less spending power.

Many long-haul destinations are suffering, while there has been a big increase in bookings for Spain and Turkey, compared to last year.

Meanwhile, some destinations are benefiting by the falling dollar rate with holidays becoming cheaper there by around 10 per cent.

They include Cuba, Jamaica, Costa Rica, Venezuela, Mexico and North America which are attracting many more tourists.

Said Mr. Schmidt we find that the most successful way of boosting bookings is by inviting travel agents to see for themselves what a destination has to offer.

He had brought with him sixteen, none of whom had been to Kenya before, so that they can personally sample what they sell.

All were from different travel agencies selling Tjaereborg holidays.

They were here for one week visiting the seven Tjaereborg contracted hotels at the coast for the winter season (which will increase to ten next summer) and experiencing the excitement of a safari.

It is an indication of what overseas

tour operators, in conjunction with their Kenya counterparts and hoteliers, are doing to increase the number of tourists coming here and thus help maintain tourism as Kenya's Number One earner of foreign exchange.

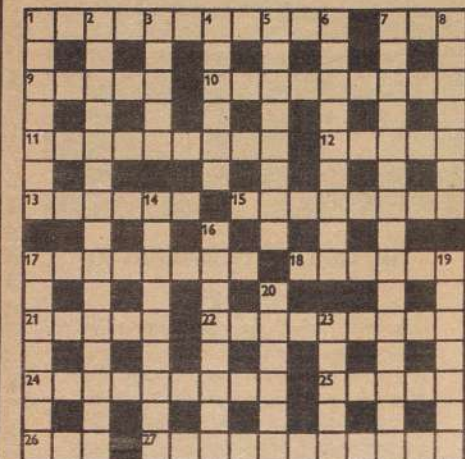

WHILST IN Kisumu recently, Kachumbari had the occasion to spend an evening in Kondele, which, it turns out, is the entertainment centre of Kisumu.

Here you will find all the popular music joints, bars, vice dens and all the off duty mamabams.

You will also find this lakeside town's favourite nyama choma joints (only my friends from the Lake region tend to prefer samaki choma)!

Kondele comes to life in the early evening as people pass through on their way home.

A lot of people will stop there to do their daily shopping for the evening meal.

An equally large number will also eat in the area before they get home.

Kondele acts as a supply and leisure base for a large proportion of the Kisumu population.

It means that there has to be a well developed mass transit system to get the masses from

their homes to places of work.

A large number of the lakeside town dwellers own a velocipede of some vintage and they most certainly are not the latest in the market.

Raleigh bikes must have put themselves out of business if the age of some of the ones you see in Kisumu is anything to go by.

Apart from bicycles, matatus and minibuses also ferry people to and from the outer parts of the town to the industrial and business areas.

However, the most popular and most amazing "mass transit" system is the taxi service.

Kachumbari stayed till late in Kondele and then had to find some public transport home.

He was eventually bundled into a 1963 Peugeot 203.

The driver's assistant got out and pushed the strategically parked taxi down the hill in order to get it started.

Once they had one captive passenger, they kept the taxi

engine running.

Kachumbari asked them to go but they said that they had to get other passengers before they would move at all.

This irked Kachumbari and he insisted that they should go.

He was told that the taxi would only move if he agreed to pay the equivalent of four fares.

This was too much, so he got out

COASTDRIVE with Patrick Obath

and went to the next taxi.

This was a Renault Roho that still had a bit of heart and life in it. He went through exactly the same sequence of events.

Once aboard, the driver's assistant got out to push the car

downhill for it to start and then wait for more passengers.

Eventually Kachumbari decided that he would not try and buck the system.

By this time word had also got round the taxis parked at the launch pad and no-one would talk to him.

He went back to the first taxi and told him he would pay the equivalent of five full fares to get the taxi to take him where he wanted to go.

What is remarkable about the taxis in this lakeside town is the age of the taxis.

It appears that people retire their cars to Kisumu so that they can finish their last days in the leisurely activity of being run as taxi.

The town to Kondele route is the most popular though other areas are also now getting the taxi service.

Most of the cars Kachumbari saw were in such a dilapidated condition that snobs from outside Kisumu would think twice before they got on board.

Most of them had tyres that were so bald that they would have put the lollipop cop Kojak to shame.

Most had only a single light at the front to illuminate the areas they were devoid of street lights - which was most of the way as the council in Kisumu suffers from the same illness as our own in Mombasa.

As a result of this, the number of collisions that took place at night was significant.

There was more fun however.

In the event of accidents, Kachumbari was told that no-one waited to find out who they had hit or what had stopped them.

Drivers and their assistants would simply jump out of the vehicle and take to their heels.

They would disappear a safe distance into the dark and then turn back to try and work out who it was they had had an altercation with.

This type of peculiar (to outsiders) behaviour was due to the fact that some gangs in the town had made it a habit to block the taxi routes and demand whatever cash the taxis were carrying.

As the vehicles had precious little light and there were no working street lights, no one would see the trip if they were already caught in it.

The cops rarely patrolled the area and if they did, the gangs would simply melt into the darkness on the approach of a car that had two headlights (or more than one light on any part of the car).

No foot patrol would ever consider leaving the comfort of the centre of town to go and ask for trouble in the taxi routes.

The name of the game is simple.

If ever you are in Kisumu and end up in the outer (or inner parts of town), make sure that that is where you want to spend the night or else you may end up in the most unexpected places.

As Kachumbari says, our lakeside town has become the graveyard for vehicles greater than twenty years old!

"He cares for you affectionately and cares about you watchfully". (1 Peter 5:7).

WHEN SOMEONE says, "Don't worry, be happy! Does it happen so ?

Worrying is such a natural thing to do, an involuntary reaction to life and it's threats and problems.

Worry is real. Dr. Charles Mayo tells us that:

"Worry and anxiety not only affect the heartbeat and blood circulation, but make man a candidate for the 219 diseases and 642 complications known to medicine.

He never knew a man to die from over-work, but thousands who died from worry and anxiety."

It has been said that worry is pagan and worldly, how true for Robert D. Foster says:

"A worrier is a pessimist! He sees calamity in every business opportunity; he pays heavy interest on trouble before it comes due; he is impatient about circumstances and economic conditions that are beyond

his power to control."

The Random House Dictionary defines worry as:

"To torment oneself with disturbing thoughts."

Harold S. Martin says: "Worry never makes things better. It usually makes them worse, worry harms the one who does the worrying."

We truly need to make a strong choice to follow God's word and believe in God's promise, rather than our own inclinations:-

"Casting the whole of your care - all your anxieties, all your worries, all your concerns, once and for all - on Him; for He cares, for you affectionately and cares about you watchfully". (1 Peter 5:7).

Psychologist Bill Backus says in his book, telling yourself the truth:

"Persistent, painful feelings are contrary to God's will. God does not want His children to suffer depression, worry and intractable anger."

To combat worry, anxiety, anger and other destructive emotions, Backus says we must start paying

attention to our self-talk.

He prescribes an effective formula:-

□ Locate the misbelief in your thinking and self-talk.

□ Argue against the misbelief.

□ Replace the misbelief with truth.

I have found that some things are out of our control and such must be committed to the care of one who is always in control.

God says to those that would choose to hear Him:

"Therefore I tell you, stop being perpetually nervous (anxious and worried) about your life, what you shall eat or what you shall drink, and about your body, what you shall put on. Is not life greater (in quality) than food, and the body (far above and more excellent) than clothing?" (Matthew 6:25).

George R. Foster gives the remedy for worry:

The Recipe:- *Rejoice always. Be gentle to everyone. Worry about nothing. Pray about everything. Always give thanks.*

The Result:- *God's peace that passes understanding shall guard your heart and mind in Christ Jesus.*

The Reference:- *Philippines 4:4-7.*

During World War II it is said German planes bombed London night after night.

One aged Christian woman seemed to stand up pretty well under the strain, and someone asked her how she managed to keep so calm day after day in spite of the awful danger they faced constantly.

"Every night I pray, and I tend to worry about what Hitler is going to do during the night - but then I remember how the Pastor says that God is always watching - and so I go to sleep."

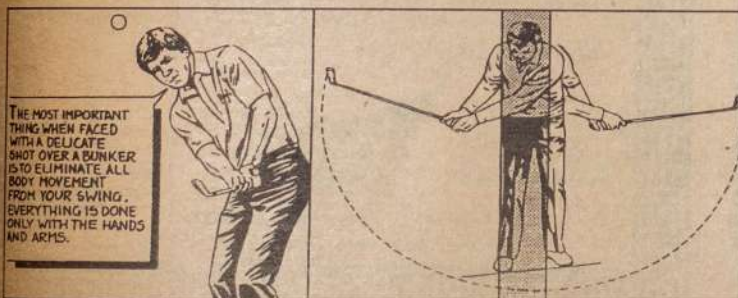
The Spades don't break. West has to discard a second Club on third Spade.

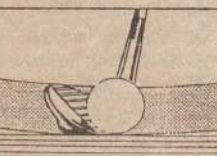
