Construction with work starting immediately on Phase III of its Development Programme to provide extra facilities and a more satisfactory infrastructure.

With the ICU will come an increasing demand on the already congested Operating Theatre, so a new one is being built.

The existing one will then be remodelled for use again.

The addition of an ICU also means the need for more nursing staff, with as many as possible being housed within the hospital.

Consequently, eight rooms originally built for nurses, and presently occupied by the General Manager, Abbas Nasser, Accounts Department and Stores are being restored and returned to them.

'Positive Ideas' Make Envoy Aurelia Brazeal A 'Star Attraction' At Mombasa Tour Meet

'KENYA'S TOURISM INDUSTRY faces challenges. With 'information', 'investment' and 'innovation' she can rise to meet them and prosper'.

Such rousing remarks came from the US Ambassador, Aurelia E. Brazeal, when invited to address a General Meeting of the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association on the Tamarind Restaurant's rooftop during a brief day's visit to the coast.

The Ambassador, undoubtedly, was the star attraction for it was a record attendance for such a meeting.

Over two hundred were there, mainly members of MCTA; Kenya Association of Hoteliers' and Caterers, Kenya Association of Tour Operators and Kenya Association of Travel Agents.

Also present were the Director of Tourism, Mr. M'Mbuli; Provincial Police Officer, F. Gichuki; District Commissioner, Ali Korane and Senior Warden, Kenya Wildlife Service, Ali Kaka.

Said the Ambassador 'as I see it all three subjects are needed for Kenya to meet the magic million visitor mark.

Even if Kenya wishes simply to maintain her status as a premier African destination, these fundamentals, I believe, are essential.

She explained 'you can stand by and let others determine the way Kenya is viewed in your leading tourist markets or you can help to shape that view.

Kenya's tourism industry needs to be pro-active, not reactive'.

She felt the only way to deal with a false report, such as the Ebola story that ran in the European press in May, or a true report about a robbery such as at the Indian High Commissioner's residence, is to face it head on - immediately.

If it is false, the truth must be disseminated widely and rapidly - Within 24 hours if possible.

If it is true, it must be put in context. In no case should rumours be allowed to build their own reality.

Referring to the importance of spokesmen, the Ambassador said 'for governments, credible representatives who are authorised to speak authoritatively on the entire range of issues are indispensable.

For the tourism industry, a spokesman is particularly important and Minister Ngala is the logical choice.

By definition, tourists are from elsewhere. They lack a sophisticated understanding of the local situation.

Residents can put the report or incident in perspective.

Tourists can't. If you don't fill them in, someone else will.

But, declare the Ambassador reacting to a bad press is not sufficient.

A plan is needed to build a positive image for Kenya over the long term.

Its combination of beaches, mountains, wildlife and culture is unmatched anywhere in the world.

In the new competitive environment, however, Kenya cannot afford to rest on her laurels.

The tourism sector must constantly reinforce and renew this country's image as a desirable location.

Kenya's efforts, along with other leading tourist organisations, such as KATO, KAHK, KATA to create and register a Kenya Tourism Federation is certainly a step in the right direction.

I understand, as well, that the long-awaited Kenya Tourism Board is now with the Cabinet for approval.

The sooner the Board and the Federation can begin their work -

the better.' On the topic of 'Investment' she said 'Kenya's infrastructure is unparalleled in the East African region.

The situation, however, is changing rapidly. Furthermore, this country's hotels, restaurants and resorts are competing not just with nearby neighbours, but with Zimbabwe, Botswana and South Africa - even Europe and the United States.

Travellers are looking for value.' The Ambassador continued 'as a group you can do little about exchange rates.

You will also be heard pressed to build roads, pipe the water or generate the electricity that the coast so badly needs.

What you can do is use your newly honed information skills to make the case to your government.

As the source of sixty percent of the country's tourism revenue, in an industry which since the late 1980's has been Kenya's largest single source of foreign exchange, your voice should not be ignored.

Money spent on infrastructure will not just benefit the tourism industry, it will help the whole economy grow.

Take the Port of Mombasa, for example. I heard on the radio that President Moi agreed in Singapore for Singaporeans to help operate the port.

American investors will welcome this news. Steps underway to clean up the port, to simplify clearing procedures, to enhance services and to boost security should encourage additional cruise ships to base their operations here.

Being a cruise ship destination and local points will help Kenya. Those same steps would also strengthen Mombasa's position as a gateway for business in East and Central Africa.

The Kenya Port Authority's efforts to privatise some of its functions are to be applauded, and we expect more.'

The Ambassador went on 'Kenya

is fortunate to have a well educated work force.'

She said 'I arrived at Moi International Airport this morning (November 6) at the same time as the Caledonian Tri-Star chartered by Somak touched down with 300 plus British tourists.

What a welcome they had. Maasai dancers and Likoni Pipers, courteous Immigration Officials, knowledgeable guides, safe drivers.

I bet they go back and spread the word.

It's the employee at the counter, the driver or the hotel receptionist - it is their skills and their responsiveness that matters.'

With respect to the Coast specifically, the beaches and the Swahili culture are justifiably famous.

How can these attractions be made more accessible to foreigners and to fellow Kenyans.

From what I understand, the draft Master Tourism Plan prepared by the Kenyan Government addresses many of these questions.

I trust all members of MCTA will contribute to the ongoing planning process'.

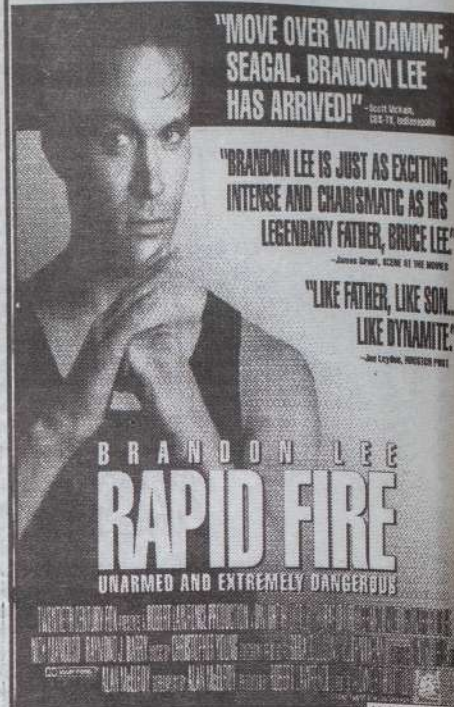

Mombasa Hospital Helped By Premchandbhai Foundation'

The Laboratory was until the middle of this year.

The Accounts Department moves to the lower floor, making it more accessible for payments.

Being introduced is the computerisation of patients' accounts, pay-roll and pharmacy which will later be extended to cover Laboratory and Out-Patients as well.

Phase III also includes twelve rooms for on-call staff, and a new maternity, Rafiki Centre, incinerator, laundry, workshops and stores.

Being officially recognised as a "charity" the Hospital is spared from paying tax on any financial surplus it makes and can re-invest such surplus into improvements.

Over the past six years 55 Million Shillings have been so invested in the Mamujee Wing of 30 private and maternity wards, laboratory and out-patients block and consulting rooms for nine Doctors.

Financial help through the years has come from the Hospital's League of Friends which is also providing one Million Shillings for Phase III in the form of special equipment for children in ICU.

Phase III is also being supported by a generous gift of Shs.

3,500,000/= from the Premchandbhai Foundation.

The Hospital has come a long way in the last ten years and its Board of Directors, under the Chairmanship of Dick Roberts are to be congratulated on a fine achievement.

The staff, under the firm leadership of Abbas Nasser (a former Town Clerk of Mombasa) has developed a sense of purpose and a pride in performance which is leading to improved standards of care.

There is great regret at the news that Dick Roberts, whose determination and vision have made such an impact in the last ten years, is retiring from the Board and is moving to North America to live close to his two daughters and their families.

The Board has appointed Mr. Chris Groom, a member of the Board for many years, to replace him.

It has elected Mr. Roberts as an Honorary Life Member of the Mombasa Hospital Association in recognition of his outstanding services to the Hospital.

And has also appointed Mr. Nasser to be Administrative Director.

The Mombasa Hospital goes back in history to 1891 when it was established as the English Hospital by the Imperial British East African Company and run by the Holy Ghost Fathers of the Roman Catholic Church in 1895, the Government then taking over the Hospital from the Company.

For several years it was run by three Roman Catholic Sisters who handed over to Lay Sisters from the United Kingdom.

In 1912 a Nursing Home with three rooms was added.

In 1921 its name was changed to European Hospital in 1962 to 'Katherine Bibby Hospital' following a substantial gift from Mrs. Bibby.

After Kenya became independent it became The Mombasa Hospital.

Phase III also includes twelve rooms for on-call staff, and a new maternity, Rafiki Centre, incinerator, laundry, workshops and stores.

Being officially recognised as a "charity" the Hospital is spared from paying tax on any financial surplus it makes and can re-invest such surplus into improvements.

Over the past six years 55 Million Shillings have been so invested in the Mamujee Wing of 30 private and maternity wards, laboratory and out-patients block and consulting rooms for nine Doctors.

Financial help through the years has come from the Hospital's League of Friends which is also providing one Million Shillings for Phase III in the form of special equipment for children in ICU.

Phase III is also being supported by a generous gift of Shs.

3,500,000/= from the Premchandbhai Foundation.

The Hospital has come a long way in the last ten years and its Board of Directors, under the Chairmanship of Dick Roberts are to be congratulated on a fine achievement.

The staff, under the firm leadership of Abbas Nasser (a former Town Clerk of Mombasa) has developed a sense of purpose and a pride in performance which is leading to improved standards of care.

There is great regret at the news that Dick Roberts, whose determination and vision have made such an impact in the last ten years, is retiring from the Board and is moving to North America to live close to his two daughters and their families.

The Board has appointed Mr. Chris Groom, a member of the Board for many years, to replace him.

It has elected Mr. Roberts as an Honorary Life Member of the Mombasa Hospital Association in recognition of his outstanding services to the Hospital.

And has also appointed Mr. Nasser to be Administrative Director.

Excellent Potential In Mombasa For 'British Executive Service Overseas' Assignments

THE UNIQUE activities of British Executive Service Overseas (BESO) have been explained to leading Coast businessmen this week by BESO Eastern Africa Regional Director Kenneth J. Fergusson.

During a seminar hosted at the British Council Mr Fergusson said that BESO's primary aim was to transfer skills to developing countries by providing experienced advisors with professional, technical and specialist skills on two week to six month assignments.

Through specialist assignments BESO believes it helps such countries by promoting self-sufficiency, employment, prosperity and social welfare and also by enhancing efficiency and increasing earning power.

"At present we have placed some 700 professional people on assignment around the world, including 15 advisors working with projects in Kenya."

"We have more than 3,200 experts on our Register ranging from Abrasives through to Woodpulp - in fact almost every profession."

Both the public and private sector make use of BESO services which are free to clients who pay only for the costs of the BESO advisor's accommodation, subsistence and transport.

No salary is payable to BESO advisors and external sterling costs, including air fares are normally met by BESO.

The majority of BESO's work continues to be performed in the private sector, principally providing assistance to small and medium enterprises which cannot afford the services of commercial consultants.

"These men and women share their experience and knowledge of successful careers with minimum formality and maximum commitment."

Good examples of well-motivated and effective BESO personnel range from commercial people serving as 'Expats' abroad to retired

professionals. BESO people act as advisors or trainers to suitably qualified staff; they do not fill management roles.

"An average assignment costs BESO approximately £3,000 sterling, but the value of the assistance is typically worth ten times that when you consider that certain of these BESO advisors would probably be receiving something in the region of £400 sterling a day for their professional services," added Mr Fergusson.

During his Mombasa visit Mr Fergusson, who works from the BESO Head Quarter Offices in London, was accompanied by BESO Kenya Resident Representative Roger Hartley, based in Nairobi, and escorted by BESO Coast Regional Representative Robert Brenneisen.

Following on from the Mombasa seminar Mr Fergusson met with K-MAP Coast representative Chris Soper and discussed the prospects of future co-operation in assistance for small-scale indigenous businessmen at the Coast.

"There are several possibilities, particularly with regard to training seminars which might make use of BESO personnel," he concluded.

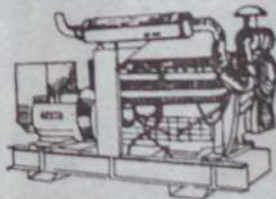

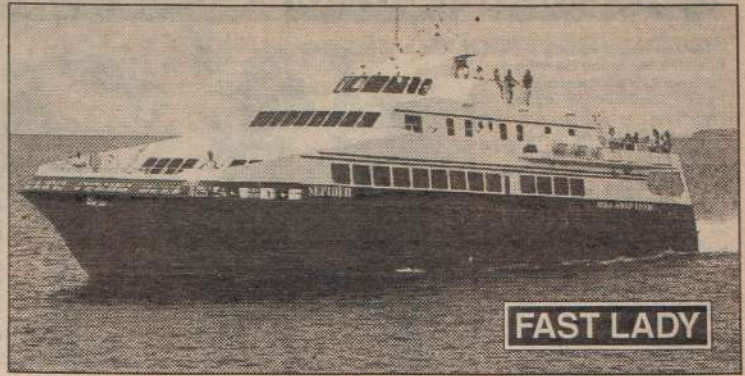

He continued 'as we say goodbye, I would like to believe that her long service to, and association with, MCTA will be a source of inspiration to many budding Lornas to serve the association with equal zeal, commitment and dedication in the years to come.

Mrs. Hayes is now retiring after decades of quality service to the tourism fraternity.

Indeed, Mrs. Hayes is a person of unique character.

One that does not give up irrespective of the difficulties met on the way.

A person who starts a project and sees it through to finality'.

Declared the Minister 'that is the service we in the tourism industry are going to miss.

However, I believe Mrs. Hayes will make herself available for consultation if and when the need arises'.

Lorna, in saying 'thank you' told those in the tourist trade 'working with you has been some of the most interesting, happy and rewarding years of my life'.

She then took the opportunity of making a few pertinent remarks.

Lorna pointed out that with no planning or control on development at the coast our two most essential services - water and electricity, have been overtaken.

This she considered 'may be our downfall if, with the officially stated 70-75 percent tourism in our hands, it is not given far more priority for rapid improvements in those two essential services.

We cannot wait two years for regular electricity supplies with numerous power cuts bringing, through rationing, business to a standstill.

I cannot help ask why, in view of the Coast's important contribution to Kenya's kitty, it is not given the highest of priorities?

How can we help the Government if it does not help us to do so?

As far as water is concerned, Lorna said 'there is the Mzima Springs pipeline built in 1956 to take a second larger pipe which is still not in operation 29 years later'.

She asked 'what has the Coast done to such a low priority in such highly essential commodities'.

She went on 'we could press for far more if only we could get water and electricity supplies increased to meet the demand, or should there be a stop put to any more development until those services are adequately provided?'

In conclusion, Lorna told her colleagues 'I am not leaving Mombasa. I have had to put the brakes on slightly but I am going to continue to work, for there is still much to be done'.

There was a big round of applause when she declared 'I am not 80 years old. I am 80 years young!'

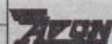

When it came to the time for the light snack to be served, she dropped her table and gracefully accepted the food offered by the flight attendant.

She forked her way through most of the vegetables and fruit and was only left with the ubiquitous kway kway bun.

She decided to attack it with her main implement, the fork.

The bun bit back by flying off the tray and landing three rows up under one of the chairs.

The lady did not make any attempt to alert the flight attendants or the fellow who ended up with a kway bun under his chair.

She simply put all the implements away, arranged the used plates on the tray and beckoned to the flight attendant to remove the tray.

She went back to her *Vogue* and occasionally cast a glance at the miscreant bun that stayed put, taunting her inexperience in the use of the plastic cutlery that had been provided with the meal.

She sat through the rest of the flight totally ignoring the bun that had been propelled into the forward parts of the aircraft.

When the plane landed, she got off and went her way.

The ground crew were left to

marvel at how the bun got under the seat in question.

On his way back to Mombasa, Kachumbari was still faithful to the main airline and booked all his flights through them.

a simple infringement of the carrier's rules.

The aircraft was still attending to its cruising altitude.

The flight attendants were working against the slope of the aisle in the aircraft.

When they were in the middle of serving the passengers, the plane levelled off.

A few minutes later, the captain announced that he would begin his descent... and he started right on cue.

Some minutes later, the flight attendants began to collect the used material.

They were working their way against the slope again as the aircraft's nose was pointing downwards and they were trying to get to the tail of the plane with their trolleys.

In fact, they only managed to get back to their seats quite a while after the plane's wheels had been put out in preparation for landing!

As Kachumbari says, we could always twist the 'just in time' message. Just in time to remove the luggage?

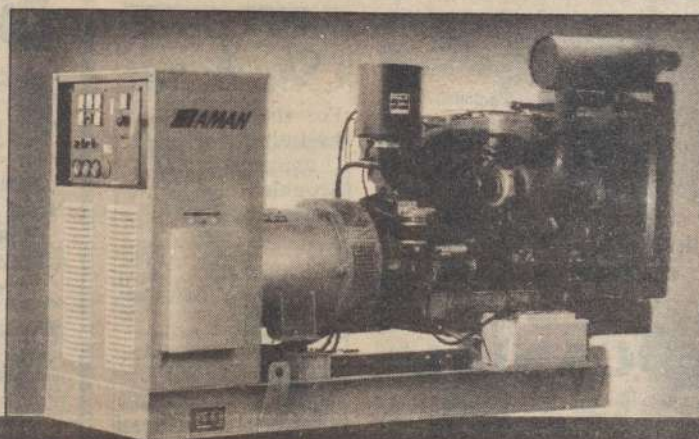

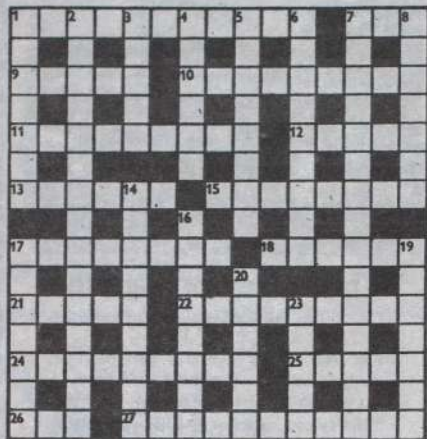

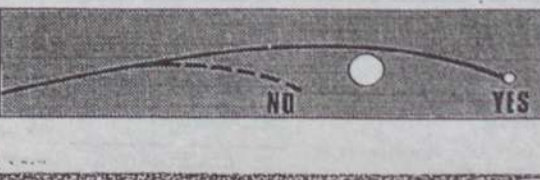

COAST BRIDGE with C.P. SHAH

A KNOCKOUT SQUEEZE is a 'squeeze' in three Suits, one of which is the Trump Suit.

Declarer 'ruffs' the fourth Suit in the long Trump hand, forcing the threatened Defender to choose between establishing Declarer's side Suit or allowing him to score an extra Trump trick.

EXAMPLE:-

South is the Declarer in Four Spades after East opened the bidding and West showed club length.

West leads a Trump won by the Spade Eight in Dummy.

A Heart is led for a 'finesse' of the Heart Queen and Declarer continues with three

A Spade 'discard' allows Declarer to score an eventual Diamond 'ruff' in Dummy, a heart discard allows Declarer to establish and cash a long heart in Dummy, while a

Diamond discard enables Declarer to score a Diamond 'ruff' in Dummy or establish and then cash a long Diamond in his hand, depending on the Defence.

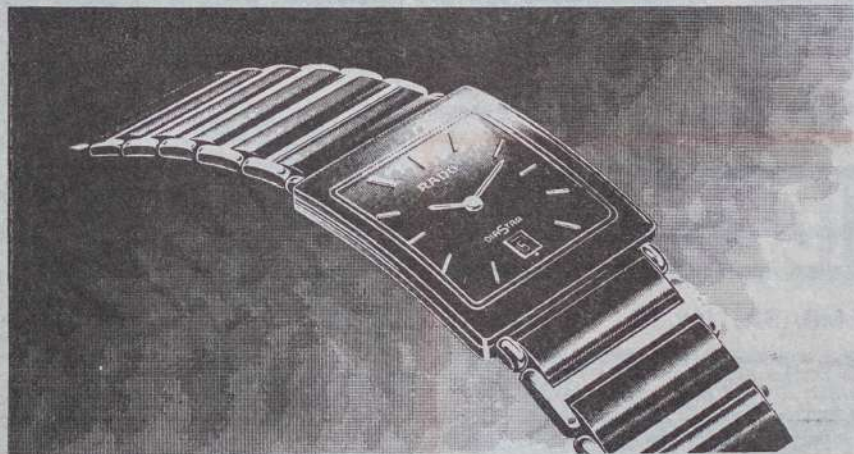
