Kenyan Scholars Impress At Cape Town University

In keeping with its mission to bolster research into African oral traditions, the Department of Southern African Languages and Literatures at the University of Cape Town (UCT), South Africa, is hosting two Kenyan scholars who have registered for their doctoral degrees.

Jack Ogembo from Maseno University College started on his PhD earlier this year, while Zachary Waita from Egerton University is rounding off his research.

According to Professor Sizwe Satyo, who heads the UCT department, the duo is making a major contribution to the department's research into oral traditions.

Ogembo's thesis, to be titled *Art in Ethno-Medicine*, will investigate how traditional healers (or, his preferred appellation, "medicine men") make use of art - whether it be painting, crafting sculpture or storytelling traditions - in the practice of traditional medicine.

His research focus is on medicine men who practice among the Luo community in the South Nyanza district of Kenya.

Even more specifically, Ogembo will concentrate on how these medicine men treat a mental disease caused by a spirit known as *juugi*.

Ironically, all the

medicine men who treat this ailment initially suffered from the disease and, upon healing, acquired the skills to heal others, says Ogembo.

"Art and medicine have always been bedfellows," he adds, pointing out that in ancient Greece artists always doubled up as doctors.

"And I have found in Kenya that most good traditional medicine men also turn out to be very good artists."

Waita, in turn, has been focusing his attention on the effect social and political changes in Kenya have had on the country's oral traditions.

INDIAN NAVAL SHIPS LEAVING A MUCH APPRECIATED MEMENTO

LEAVING A much appreciated memento of their visit to Mombasa were officers and men of the Indian naval ships INS DELHI and INS RANVIJAY who painted part of APDK's Polio Clinic at Port Reitz as well donating food and medicine.

This was arranged in conjunction with the Mombasa Branch of the Hindu Council of Kenya and the High Commission for India, writes NETA PEAL.

Chairman of the former is Dr. Kanti Chudasama who, together with the Executive Council, hosted an Indian Cultural Night and Dinner for the High Commissioner for India, His Excellency, Shri Yogesh Tiwari, Rear Admiral V.S. Bedi and senior naval officers at the Arya Samaj, Mombasa, while some officers later played a friendly match with members of the Mombasa Golf Club.

The Hindu Council of Kenya is an umbrella organisation of all Hindu communities promoting religion, social, cultural and welfare activities for Hindus residing in Kenya.

It also assists indigenous Kenyans with food, clothing, medicine etc.

Last month it held Medical Camps at Waa on the south coast and at Shimo-ta-Tewa Prison where blankets and medicine were also donated.

SEARCHING FOR 'LOST FILES' ON YOUR COMPUTER

This week we talk about searching lost files or files you can't remember where you put them.

When you open your Windows explorer and go to "my documents" you will see the various folders and sub folders you have created as per my last article.

On opening any one of them you shall see the various files that you have saved for that particular folder.

If you were to click on "C:" drive in this example, it would then show you all the folders and individual files in the "C:" drive. It would not show your sub-folders.

To get to a sub-folder you would have to click on the folder you want open, then click on the open button.

First of all be sure it will show the correct types of file.

For example, the computer will only show Word for Windows

document files that is .doc or Excel files as .xls.

This can be very helpful, but if you are looking for a particular file type that you have saved.

Going through folders can be time consuming!

Sometimes you file a picture or letter and forget what folder you stuck it in.

Windows can save the day for you!

Click on Windows "Start" button,

Select "Find" Then "Files and Folders" and "Find. All Files" dialog window will pop up!

Often if you click on the down area next to "Files of type," it will give you the option of finding "All Documents or Files".

To jump to the any drive quickly, just click on the down arrow next to "Look in:"

First be sure you are looking in the correct drive.

You can change it by using the down arrow next to "Look in:"

Your search will take a few seconds longer, but be sure to keep the "Include subfolders" checked.

There are a couple of ways to search for something.

If you have forgotten the exact name of the file, you can still find it, by using a wild card.

Let's say you know it was a BMP file (picture file).

You can have your computer search for all BMP files, by entering "*"bmp" (starts with a star and dot without the quotation marks) into the "Named:" area.

After you click on the "Find Files" now button, it will produce a list of all BMP files on the "C:" drive.

What if you don't know what kind of file and the name of it? You still have options, so don't

BRAKES: In Transmitting And Multiplying Force Through Hydraulics, The Basic Idea Is Very Simple

The next item in the car we will cover is the braking system.

This is the most important safety critical item in the car. Whether it functions or not could make the difference between life and death.

Most of us take it for granted especially since they are very reliable components.

It is important that we all understand how the brakes work and what to do to keep them working.

There are two common braking systems used in vehicles.

The configuration depends on how the drive train is set up and the requirements for the distribution of braking.

The two types of brakes are the disc brakes and drum brakes.

There are also technological additions to the braking systems that will make them perform better.

Over the next few weeks we will cover all these systems and how they are used.

Let us however start with the basics of how a brake works.

It is common knowledge that pushing down on the brake pedal slows a car to a stop.

But, how does this happen?

How is the force from your leg transmitted to the wheels of the car?

How is the force multiplied so that it is big enough to stop something as small as a bicycle and as large as an articulated lorry?

In all the current common brake systems, when you depress your brake pedal, the force from your foot is transmitted to the brakes through fluid in the so

called brake pipes.

To get the actual brakes to work requires a much greater force than you could possibly apply directly from the muscles in the leg.

In the process of transmitting the force, the brake system in the car must also multiply the force exerted by the foot.

It does this in two ways.

When one depresses the pedal on the vehicle, it acts as a lever and gives what is called a

(and weight) on each side of the knife.

If we put a weight on one end of the ruler it will depress.

If we put an equal weight on the other side at the SAME DISTANCE, the ruler will balance again.

If, however, one takes two weights one being double the other, one must change the way the ruler is set.

The side of the ruler where the heavier weight is must be closer to the knife than the end where the lighter weight is.

The difference in lengths of the ruler from the knife edge is what is called a multiplier.

If the ruler was split such that the left end is 20 centimetres and the right end is 10 centimetres from the knife edge, then a weight on the left end of one kilogramme would multiply to two kilos on the right side.

This is called leverage and it results in the first multiplication of the force applied by the leg to the brake pedal.

Changing the relative lengths results in different forces being applied.

In transmitting and multiplying force through hydraulics, the basic idea is very simple.

When force is applied at one point it is transmitted to another point using a fluid that cannot be compressed. Water falls into this category but for efficiency and convenience the most common fluid used in brake systems is almost always an oil of some sort.

In transmitting the force, it is possible to make arrangements to also multiply the force.

Imagine you have two identical bicycle pumps (read cylinders) filled with oil and then connected to one another with an oil filled pipe. If one were to apply a downward force to one of the pump handles (read piston), then the force is transmitted to the second bicycle pump through the oil in the pipe. Since oil is incompressible almost all of the applied force appears at the second pump.

If one were to put equal weights on top of each pump handle, then the weights would be at exactly the same level.

The great thing about hydraulic systems is that the pipe connecting two cylinders in the system can be any length and shape, allowing it to snake through all sorts of things separating the two pistons.

The pipe can also fork, so that one cylinder can drive two or more so called slave cylinders if desired.

Force multiplication is also fairly easy.

In the mechanical leverage described above, one trades force for distance.

In a hydraulic system, all one has to do is to change the size of one piston and cylinder relative to the other.

To determine the multiplication factor, start by considering the size of the pistons in a two piston system.

Let us assume that the one piston 5 cm in diameter whilst the other piston in the system 15 cm in diameter.

Calculation of the area of the

mechanical multiplication of the force otherwise known as leverage.

After this there is a combination of components that multiplies the hydraulic (or fluid) force.

This hydraulic force is then transmitted to the tires through friction at the wheel.

This friction generates heat which has to be disposed of quickly to avoid the brakes from overheating at the tyre.

The pedal is designed in such a way that it can multiply the force from your leg several times before the force is applied to the brake fluid.

How this works can be visualised by taking a ruler and trying to balance it on a knife edge.

One achieves balance when the ruler has two equal lengths

two pistons shows that the area of the larger piston is nine times that of the smaller piston.

This means that any force applied to the smaller piston will come out nine times greater on the larger piston.

So, if you apply a 10 kilogramme downward force to the smaller piston, a 90 kilogramme upward force will appear on the right.

The only catch is that you will

have to depress the smaller piston nine centimetres in order to raise the right piston one centimetre.

We will continue with how basic braking system work next week.

As Kachumbari says, brakes appear to be complicated but they require a simple understanding of systems commonly used in nature.

TWENTY THREE YEARS AGO

COASTWEEK, September 14-20, 1979:

A PICTURE of a wide-eyed, regal-looking lion from the Amboseli Game Reserve graced the front page of *Coastweek*.

The five-year-old large, wild cat was spotted by Mombasa camera buff Mustafa Nasser during a visit to the teeming wildlife park.

The National Geographic Society magazine had a full-time correspondent in the Reserve studying the lion's behavior patterns and were expected to feature it in future issues.

THE MUNICIPAL Fire Brigade reported that at least ten people had died and property worth KSh. 2,777, 697. 15 had been destroyed in fires since January.

The latest figures indicated that there was an average of 23 fire cases a month in Mombasa alone.

Insurance companies declined to give figures but admitted that pay-offs made to fire victims ran into millions of shillings.

TANZANIANS were looking into the possibility of constructing a plant at Songo Songo in Kilwa district to exploit the newly discovered gas for the manufacture of Ammonia and Urea.

If the project succeeded, the manufacture of Urea from the 30 billion cubic litres of natural gas pool at Songo Songo gas would provide a rich nitrogenous fertilizer for Tanzania's agriculture.

THE MOMBASA branch of the Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA) was making plans to build a new K.Shs. 7,000,000 hostel in the Kizingo area.

The hostel was to have 144 beds and was to cater to all people irrespective of religious following.

POLICE in Tanga were investigating the theft of 68 bags of coffee worth 100,000/- while in transit at the port for export to Europe.

THE UNITED Nations Information Center was to stage an exhibition featuring the different activities and programmes of the world organization.

The two-day show organized with the co-operation of the Aga Khan Education Department, was to be held at the Aga Khan High School with an aim to 'acquaint the public with the work of the United Nations and motivate them towards greater support of the United Nations programmes.

Because everyone complains of the heat and

how it affects the dogs, we have decided to hold the show in the late afternoon and carry on until the evening.

However, no one need worry that they will have to carry torches to parade their dogs, floodlights will be on site as will "Mr. Music Man" himself, Tony Rousteau will be providing the sound system and the music for the events.

We also have rather

grand sponsors for the show. Pedigree, the well-known animal food manufacturers and Leskut the veterinary and agricultural pharmaceutical company are co-sponsors of the event.

There are excellent prizes and beautiful rosettes to be won by the dogs taking part.

We have stuck to our usual classes, which seem to be the most popular.

Class 1) Best Puppy (Puppies must be over three months and under one year)

Class 2) Best Veteran (eight years plus)

Class 3) Waggiest Tail, Class 4) Shaggiest Dog, Class 5) Fancy Dress (for dogs and their human companions),

Class 6) Best Handler (this is an obedience class),

Class 7) Best KSPCA Stray (this is for dogs which have been rehomed from KSPCA)

Class 8) The dog the judge would most like to take home.

FUN CLASSES

All of these are fun classes and any dog can enter. All dogs must be fully vaccinated and vaccination records should be brought to the show for inspection.

Everyone should have a lead for each dog.

Water for the dogs will be provided but people should carry their own dog's water bowl.

There is a bar, scrumptious food, face painting, bouncy castle, coconut shy, lucky dip, a raffle with fabulous prizes and so much more.

Whilst we should all have a fun day at the show, the more serious aspect of our work and the reason for the fundraising should not be forgotten.

From January 2002 until the end of July 2002, the KSPCA has carried out over 200 investigations of alleged mistreatment of animals.

Prosecuted several offenders.

Admitted over 500 animals to our facility, treated 496 animals, neutered 120 animals, returned 39 animals to their owners and found homes for over 200 animals.

We have euthanised 170 animals (we only euthanise, sick, injured, diseased or vicious animals).

We checked 52 slaughterhouses to ensure the humane slaughter of food chain animals and covered over 27,000 kilometres in conjunction with our work.

After all that, we still have over 80 dogs and 40 cats looking for homes at present.

All animals are fully vaccinated and neutered.

Our Field Officers visit local schools to give talks on animal welfare and hand out education packs to teachers.

Schools are invited to visit our facility to let them see at first hand how animals should be cared for and what our work entails.

We have our own treatment facility on site that is for the treatment of animals at our premises.

We do not treat animals belonging to other people who can afford to take their pets to the vet.

Our work is never ending and we can never afford to become complacent with our work.

Our kennels, which were built approximately 18 years ago drastically, require to be completely renovated and the antiquated drainage system renewed.

So, please come along and have a fabulous, fun day with your dogs, or even without your dogs but remember to dig deep into your pockets for our very worthy cause.

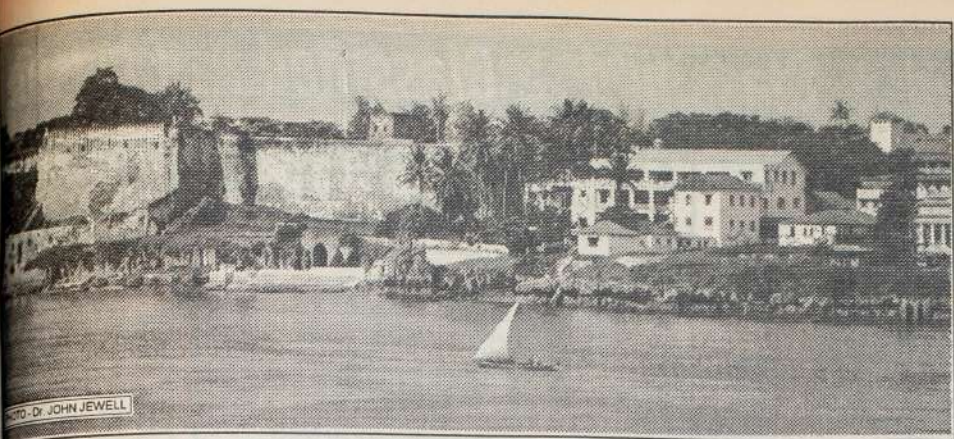

Vergangenheit

UND EINE Million Christen aus aller Welt kommen jährlich nach Mombasa, um die sagenumwundenen Wildparks zu besuchen und an den kilometerlangen sandgestäubten Stränden Badeferien zu verbringen.

Während einer stürmischen Vergangenheit wechselten sich die Besitzer mehrmals untereinander ab (Portugiesen, Araber, Sultane, Briten) und erlebten wilde Zeiten, Mord, Belagerung, Hungersnot, Seuchen, Intrigen und blutige Kämpfe.

Es ist ein feines Beispiel des Baustils während der Kolonialzeit in Ostafrika.

Es steht heute unter Denkmalschutz und dient in erster Linie als Gemäldegalerie und für andere Ausstellungen sowie für Seminare.

2001 wurde das Fort Jesus von der portugiesischen *Calouste Gulbenkian Stiftung* für rund Kshs 4,2 Millionen restauriert.

Gleichzeitig wurde rund um das Fort und das Gerichtsgebäude die Gartenanlage neu gestaltet und die beiden historischen Bauten erstahlen nachts im Scheinwerferlicht.

Eine Zeit lang diente das Fort auch als Gefängnis, bevor es 1960 zu einem Nationalmuseum erklärt und der Öffentlichkeit zugänglich gemacht wurde.

Heute wird es von mindestens 150.000 Besuchern jährlich besichtigt, die außer der massiven Festung auch die gut erhaltenen Kunst- und Gebrauchsgegenstände aus verschiedenen mittelalterlichen Siedlungen an der Küste sowie von dem Wrack einer portugiesischen Fregatte bewundern können.

Die 42 Tonnen Fregatte *"Santo Antonio de Tanna"* wurde 1680 in Goa erbaut und ist 1697 während der großen Belagerung direkt vor dem Fort Jesus gesunken.

Neben dem Eingang zum Fort Jesus sind Kanonen von der britischen H.M.S. *"Pegasus"* und von der deutschen *"Königsberg"* aufgestellt.

Während dem Ersten Weltkrieg wurde die *"Pegasus"*, als sie 1914 zur Reparatur im Hafen von Sansibar lag, von der *"Königsberg"* beschossen und versenkt.

Die *"Königsberg"* wurde von englischen Kriegsschiffen im Rufijidelta während zehn Monaten blockiert, bis die Besatzung schließlich den Kreuzer sprengte.

Die Kanonen von der *"Pegasus"* und der *"Königsberg"* wurden geborgen und die Geschütze auf Räder montiert und später zur Verteidigung an Land erfolgreich eingesetzt.

1990 wurde per Zufall ein neuer Fund im Fort entdeckt, als einem Museumsangestellten direkt neben dem Fußweg ein Stück Metall und eine weißliche Scheibe aufgefallen waren.

Ein Expertenteam konnte an dieser Stelle ein vollständiges menschliches Skelett ausgraben und an der Fundstelle kann man heute eine Nachbildung dieses Skeletts besichtigen.

Direkt neben dem Fort Jesus befindet sich das *Alte Gerichtsgebäude*, das 1902 vom britischen Gouverneur *Sir Charles Elliot* offiziell eröffnet wurde.

Fußreibe, wahrscheinlich der Waschplatz der Frauen.

Der Hauptwaschplatz mit zwei Zisternen und vier Fußreibeinen befindet sich am anderen Ende.

Die Leute wuschen sich vor dem Beten und benutzten die Reibsteine, um die Füße zu trocknen und die Hornhaut abzuschaben.

Es gab mehrere Arten von Korallensteinen mit unterschiedlichem Rauheitsgrad.

Weiter nördlich, auf dem Südufer des Kilifi Creek liegen die *Ruinen von Mnarani*, bestehend aus einer großen Freitagsmoschee, einer kleineren Moschee und einer Gruppe von Gräbern aus dem 15. Jahrhundert, von denen das Säulengrab besonders auffällt.

Die Gebetsnischen der Moscheen und die Gräber sind reich verziert und mit arabischen Inschriften versehen.

Die Ruinen von Mnarani liegen an einem wunderschönen Platz, hoch über dem Kilifi Creek und bieten einen herrlichen Ausblick auf das smaragdgrüne Wasser und die Brücke.

Rund 15 km vor Malindi liegt *Gedi*, eine arabische Stadt aus dem 15. Jahrhundert, die sich über 45 Acres erstreckt.

Heute sieht man unter den Ruinen Moscheen, Paläste, Zisternen, Tore, vierzehn einstöckige Häuser und ein datiertes Grab.

Innerhalb der Palastmauern erkennt man den Gerichtssaal mit einer langen Bank am Ostende, wo die Richter saßen, vor der Mittagssonne gut geschützt.

Unter den ausgegrabenen Gegenständen waren chinesisches Porzellan, indisches Glas und islamische Töpferwaren.

Indischer Karneol, Augenbrauenstifte und Bidets weisen auf eine wohlhabende Bevölkerung hin.

Ein Rätsel bleibt die plötzliche Räumung der Siedlung im 17. Jahrhundert.

Mörtelarbeiten wurden halb vollendet abgebrochen und es sind keine Skelette gefunden worden.

In der großen Anlage führen Wanderwege durch den Küstenuwald und aus den Ruinen wachsen riesige Feigenbäume, deren Luftwurzeln wie dicke Finger in die Mauern greifen.

Alle diese historischen Stätten sind gut ausgeschildert und am Eingangstor stehen jeweils kleine Handbücher zur Verfügung sowie Reiseführer, die Besucher auf einen Rundgang begleiten und ihnen alles Wissenswerte zeigen und erklären.

ALTSTADT

In der Altstadt von Mombasa hat man Gelegenheit, der lebendigen Kultur auf Schritt und Tritt zu begegnen.

Besonders interessant sind die geschnitzten Türen, die nicht nur als wertvoller Besitz, sondern als Statussymbol galten.

Nördlich von Mombasa liegt die ehemalige Siedlung *Jumba la Mtwana*, die einen Einblick in das Leben der Küstenbewohner im 16. Jahrhundert gewährt, als die Suahelivivilisation von Handel und Landwirtschaft lebte.

Im fruchtbaren Hinterland wurden Nahrungsmittel für die ständig zunehmende Bevölkerung an der Küste sowie auch für den Export angebaut.

Exportiert wurden vorwiegend Agrarerzeugnisse und Rohmaterialien wie Gold, Elfenbein, Mangrovenstangen, Amбра, Schildpatt und getrockneter Fisch.

Importiert wurden unter anderem Glasperlen, Tonwaren und Porzellan.

Die Jumba Ruinen bestehen aus Wohnhäusern (Haus der vielen Türen, Haus der Küche, Haus der Zylinder - so benannt nach ihren besonderen Merkmalen), Zisternen, Moscheen und Gräbern.

Das Gelände mit riesigen mehreren hundert Jahre alten Baobabbäumen und anderen einheimischen Sträuchern zieht sich bis hinunter zum Strand, wo sich ein Picknickplatz befindet.

Am Südende der Moschee am Strand führt ein schmales Tor zu einer Zisterne mit drei runden

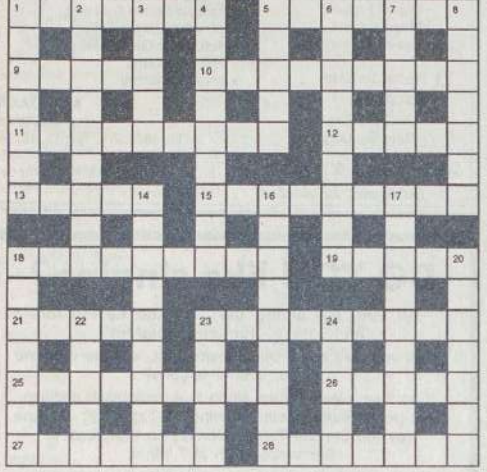

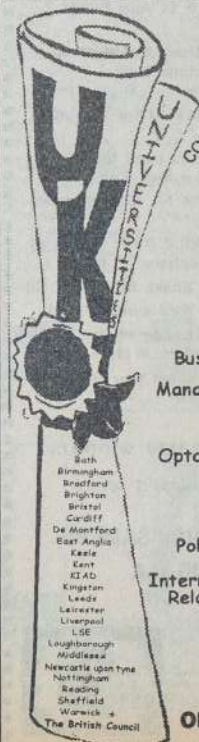

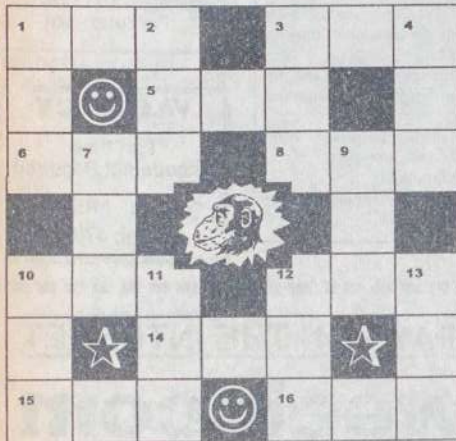

MOTERING MAYHEM AT TEITA SISAL ESTATE

playing against each other.

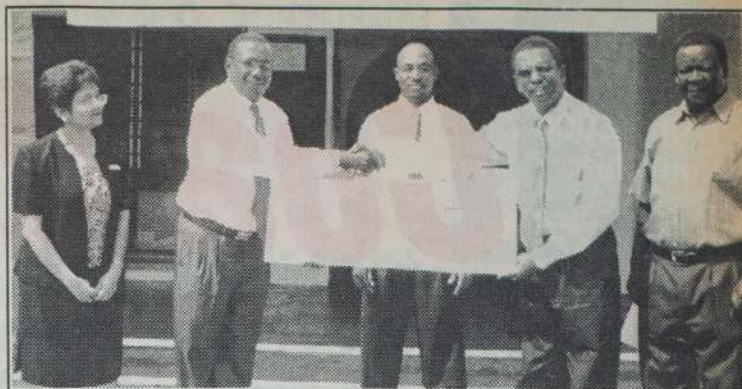
The KGS beat MGC with just half a point, with their scores being 15 1/2 and 15.

IN THE following slam contract, even Five Clubs would have been set on an opening Spade lead (King of Spades; Spade to East's Ace; a third Spade from East prompting a Trump trick for West) but South made the contract of Six Clubs when West led a Trump.

Declarer won the Trump lead and counted 11 Top tricks.

He drew all the Trumps discarding Spades from Dummy, cashed the Ace-King of Diamonds, discarding a Spade, cashed the Ace-King of Hearts, finessed the Knave, and when he held the trick, claimed his contract for the loss of one Spade.

The Declarer completely neglected to try for a three-three Diamond split.

After drawing Trumps and crossing to the Ace-King of Diamonds, he should ruff a Diamond.

As it happens, they do not split and he has to rely on the Heart finesse.

But if the Diamonds had split evenly then there was no need to risk the finesse because Dummy's established Diamonds would take care of all Declarer's losers.

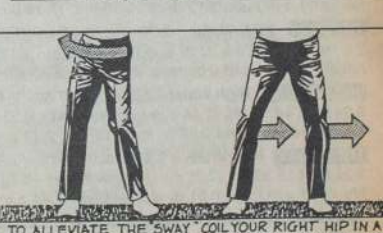
