# President Opens Mombasa Show

CROWDS GIVE PRESIDENT TUMULTUOUS WELCOME

HUGE CROWDS greeted His Excellency, President Daniel Arap Moi, when he arrived in Mombasa mid-week at the start of a 1,000-kilometre tour of Coast Province.

During his visit the President has attended the ceremonies marking the 20th anniversary of the opening of the East African Oil Refineries complex at Changamwe, Mombasa.

The President and his official party were yesterday scheduled to pay a flying visit to the Lamu archipelago on the Kenya north coast.

President Moi's tour of the coast reaches its high point today when he officially opens the four-day Mombasa National Show.

Addressing the people of Taita/Taveta on his way to Mombasa by road from State House Nairobi the President advised wananchi should use their "common sense" when electing their leaders.

He said voters should not elect mere talkers:

"Those who have vowed to represent wananchi in parliament must be men or women of integrity, and not those who simply say that when elected they will do this and that.

"If they were able, why didn't they? Why only when they come to parliament?", he asked.

**Patriotic**

Subsequently the President advised the electorate to choose those who were ready to work with him.

"Mere words will not provide wananchi with food, but we need patriotic Kenyans who are not tribalists."

President Moi emphasised that Kenya should remain united regardless of tribal differences.

"We are all Kenyans, one nation," he said.

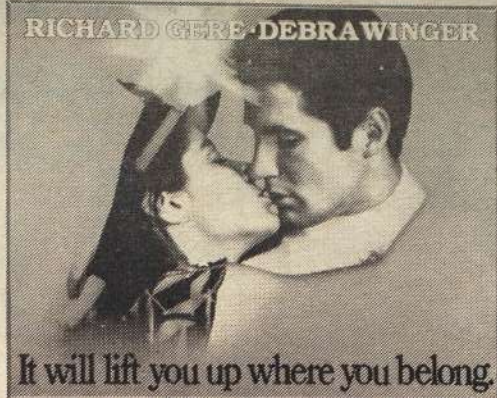

 Many were members of the former well-known Swinging Stars from the Star of the Sea Secondary School who, for many years, delighted audiences with their spectacular musicals - Joseph's Technicolour Dreamcoat; Mikado; Smike; Fiddler on the Roof; Sound of Music, as well as appearing on TV.  
 Fr. Corcoran describes the two choirs as representing a 'wonderfully blended cross-section of Mombasa's cosmopolitan population's and reflects 'how the sweet charms of music can break down social, religious and racial barriers.'

# World Bank Comes Through With Multi-Million Loan For Mining

THE WORLD Bank will lend some 63 million shillings to Tanzania for conducting engineering studies on coal mining after the loan, loan, whose processing began last February, was approved by the bank's board of directors in Washington.

The studies are expected to be undertaken in two phases at the Songwe-Kiwira coalfield in Mbeya region and if successful it is expected to come up with an easy and cheaper made between deep digging and surface digging of coal.

meanwhile the coal project at the Kiwira coalfield which was originally expected to start production in 1986 will now start production at the end of next year annual output of 150,000 TONNES.

The Kiwira coal mine is expected to cater for industrial projects like the Mbeya Cement Factory and The Mufindi Pulp and Paper Factory in Iringa Region. Other industries expected to benefit from the project are the tea and Tobacco curing plants in the country.

Preparations for the project include the designing of the actual coal mine site, construction of an access road and a bridge Kiwira river to link the mine with the Tukuyu-Kyela highway.

## COAL AGREEMENT

The agreement to start coal exploitation at Kiwira was signed last year between the state mining corporation (STAMICO) and the chinese national compete plant export corporation. The agreement was to the tune of 750 million Tanzanian Shillings.

The Kiwira reserves are estimated to contain about 50

million tonnes of coal and when functioning at optimum levels, the reserves are expected to save the country some 300 million shillings in foreign currency worth of imported oil each year.

At present, Tanzania has nine coalfields which include the Songwe-Kiwira, Galula (mbeya region), Katwaka-Mchuchuma (Iringa Region), Njuga, Ngaka, Muhukuru, Mbamba-Bay and Lumecha (Ruvuma Region) and Ufipa (Rukwa Region).

In Dar Es Salaam a new and plush 150 bed hotel was recently opened by the Minister for Natural and Tourism, George Kahama who, when opening the hotel urged the tourist sector in the country to work out attractive prices if it wanted to remain in the Price-sensitive industry.

The Minister's call came as no surprise since the new hotel which had unofficially begun operating a week back, was selling a half-litre bottle of beer at 44/- and a bottle of soft drink at 11/- which were both

about 100 per cent higher than normal prices.

Kahama said that while the country's hotel capacity could handle 500,000 visitors during the year and about 340,000 during the normal high tourist season, the country had in recent year only received an average 80,000 tourists annually.

One main reason for this, said the Minister, was that the country's tourist environment was not competitive enough due to high pricing, poor marketing and poor qualities of products and services.

## GENERAL FOODS

Kahama also directly questioned the hotel authorities if they really thought that the price of 44/- for a half a litre beer bottle was reasonable and competitive when neighbouring countries were charging almost a quarter of this price for the same bottle.

The opening of the new hotel

will raise the country's Hotel capacity of international standard beds to 500,000 in a year and 340,000 during the normal tourist high season. There are 5500 beds of international standard in the country now.

The 156 million shillings hotel is co-jointly owned by the Tanzania Tourist Corporation who have 40 per cent shares the Industrial Management services 40 per cent and the General Foods Company 20 per cent.

An attractive feature in the new hotel is a swimming pool on the Mezzanine floor.

Meanwhile the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Salim Ahmed Salim has urged Government departments and parastatal organisations to comply with President Nyerere's proposal that experts in the country's foreign mission should represent them on matters of international nature so as to cut on costs.

Salim said that a special form has been printed in which one of the questions to be answered by an applicant demands an explanation as to whether what is to be done abroad could not be for the applicant by the nearest Tanzanian Foreign Office.

# A Welcome Guest From Japan

A WELCOME visitor to Nairobi last week was Hiroshi Niida who is the Manager for Kenya Airways in Tokyo and the Director of the Kenya Tourist Office in Japan.

Hiroshi Niida has been associated with Kenya from 1969 from the time he started working for East African Airways as its Manager for Japan and Lorea.

With the collapse of East African Airways in February 1977, Mr. Niida was promptly asked by the newly-formed Kenya Airways to look after the Kenya Airways operation which emerged from cessation of a trilateral airline.

Ever since 1977 the work of the Kenya Airways Office in Yurakucho Building, Chiyodaku, Tokyo, is intimately entwined with the task of promoting tourist traffic to Kenya and quite naturally this office as is also the national centre in Japan and Korea for the Kenya Tourist Office.

Hiroshi Niida was in Nairobi to be present at a photographic exhibition held at an international hotel and to have meetings with officials from the Ministry of Tourism and with some Managers from Kenya Airways.

Prior to departing for Tokyo via London last Sunday night he appeared to be satisfied with his discussions which centred on bringing more tourists from Japan on holidays to Kenya.

Unlike most other overseas tourists, the Japanese are mainly interested in our game parks and reserves and in the people of Kenya.

Already tour packages to Kenya are being offered to the Japanese by airlines like British Airways, Air India and even Japan Air Lines.

It is Mr. Niida's role to try and ensure that some of the sectors on the Tokyo-Nairobi route are siphoned, wherever possible, to Kenya Airways.

This used to be possible when the airline had its services to Karachi which have since been discontinued but there is still a flow of Japanese from Bombay who connect on the Kenya Airways flights to Nairobi.

## SAHAR AIRPORT

Unfortunately the Sahar Airport in Bombay is frowned upon and the Japanese, who are rather fastidious, prefer coming to Kenya from Seychelles or even from a European point like London or Rome or Italy.

They still continue having enormous disposable incomes and there is a positive interest in seeing the wildlife of Kenya.

Mr. Niida is pleased that his 14 years association with East Africa have made him a sort of unofficial spokesman for Africa and he has made over 50 trips to this part of the

An explosion from a World War Two bomb buried underground, perhaps caused by the simmering heat, rocked the city of Berlin, causing extensive damage to buildings.

# New Life For Tanker The 'Spirit Of Mahe'

TAKING ON A NEW lease of life is the small tanker *Spirit Of Mahe* which left her parking lot at 'T' anchorage, where she has been up for sale for almost a year, to move to Divecon yard. I understand she is to be operated by Comarco and should certainly prove her worth again as a tanker either within port limits or in the short sea coastal trades. At least the numbers at Port Reitz are reduced by one.

A familiar looking vessel was berthed alongside Shimanzi Oil Jerry on Tuesday taking bunkers. She was the 8,560 gross ton Liberian flag *Global Med 21* years old and very much looking her age.

Kilindini will remember her well as the Bank Line *Springbank* which called here regularly in the 'sixties and 'seventies when she operated on the Bank Line regular services from the Far East and the Indian Sub Continent until sold in 1978.

Built in 1962 she is a product of Harland and Wolff Shipyard, Belfast and has the prominent looking H. and W. stern. The vessel arrived Mombasa 'out of the blue' - no mention being made on the K.P.A. list of port arrivals.

### Danish Trader

A smart looking Danish short sea trader is the 500 ton *Satellit* built in 1976 which completed discharge early this week at No. 8 berth of a con-

ignment of 700 tons steel plates loaded from Goole on the East Coast of England. On completion she proceeded to Mtongwe to await her next employment.

The 23 year old Panamanian flag *Fair Island* which has been in port almost 3 weeks was due to sail yesterday with 7,000 tons bagged Soda Ash for the Far East. She had earlier imported 10,000 tons bagged Rice. This vessel, much in need of a coat of paint, is I believe destined shortly for the scrapyard.

The 17,600 gross ton bulk carrier *Asia Hunter* arrived last weekend for a one day stay to discharge about 50 motor vehicles ex Japan mainly consigned to Kenya and Uganda; most of these will be second-hand reconditioned vehicles in which there is now a good market in this part of the world.

Occupying No. 11 berth since August 22 has been the Greek bulk carrier *Anthos* built in 1979 of 17,000 tons discharging 10,000 tons bagged Fertiliser from the N.W. Continent.

I understand this shipment is being imported by the Kenya Tea Development Authority for use on the tea estates.

A further bulk wheat discharger, this time from Canada, was due on Wednesday of this week, she is the *Silvia Star* due to discharge 9,200 tons. More rice is also being imported by the 12,000 d.w. ton Panamanian bulk carrier *Taian* from the U.S. Gulf with 6,000 tons in bags.

The expected shipment of drummed bitumen has slipped back somewhat with the Greek vessel *Giorgos N* now being due mid week with her 5,400 tons cargo scheduled for discharge at No. 1 berth.

The 38 year old ex T.2 tanker *Cove Tide* continues to occupy No. 9 berth and will do so well into next week as she discharges her 24,000 ton cargo of American wheat in bulk.

At No. 7 berth discharging 3,200 tons Far East cargo is the NYK charter *Silver Ilex* of 18,400 tons deadweight on her first visit to Mombasa.

These leading Japanese owners who have operated a monthly liner service to and from the Far East for so many years are operating now exclusively on chartered tonnage on their East African trade as the conventional owned liner vessel disappears from the traditional trades.

The Yugoslav flag is at No. 4 berth all this week flying from the 16 yr. old 8,000 gross ton *Split* - a regular caller at Mombasa for many years - which is also registered at the Yugoslav port of Split.

She is discharging some 7,000 tons Fertiliser loaded at Venice and Rijeka.

The JSP (Yugoslav) Line with their familiar blue hulls are members of the Europe Conference group of shipping companies and operate a regular liner service between East Africa and Adriatic ports.

The six vessels of the United States Navy made an imposing sight as they entered port on Monday/Tuesday of this week. The largest unit, on M.I. Buoy, is the 41,000 ton aircraft carrier *USS Tarawa*, which is followed in the *USS Frederick* thereafter the *USS Cape Cod*, both the latter double banked at M.8.

### Naval Visitor

The *USS Duluth* is at M.4, and at M.2, the destroyer *Thomas C. Hart*, which arrived on Tuesday, together with our regular U.S. Naval visitor, the all white command ship *La Salle* berthed at Mbaraki.

These vessels are of such varied shapes and sizes that I hesitate to give them a designation. The fleet is on a 5/10 day visit.

In addition to the Royal Navy and Royal New Zealand Navy vessels due on September 7, the French Navy have their *Rhin* due on September 12 for a goodwill visit so this month Mombasa will feel a strong multi national Naval presence.

## Baked Rice With Corn Curry

### BAKED RICE WITH CORN CURRY

Preparation time 20 minutes. Cooking time 1 hour. Serves 8-10

For the rice: 1 1/2 teacups uncooked rice, 1 chopped onion, 2 sticks cinnamon, 2 cloves, 2 tablespoons ghee or butter, and salt to taste.

To cook the rice: Boil the rice with a tablespoon of oil in the water. Each grain should be separate.

Heat the ghee in a vessel and fry the onions for a little while, add the cinnamon and cloves and fry again for a few minutes then add the rice and

salt. Cover and keep warm.

For the curry paste: 3 tablespoons of grated fresh coconut; 1 onion, 6 red chillies, 3 tablespoons coriander seeds, 1 1/2 teaspoons cumin seeds, 4 teaspoons khus or poppy seeds, 2 STICKS CINNAMON, 3 cloves, 4 pepper corns, 5 cloves garlic, and 3 teaspoons oil.

To prepare the paste: Cook

the onion on and open flame than remove the skin. Heat a teaspoon of oil in a pan and cook the coconut for a minute and remove.

Again heat 2 teaspoons of oil and heat the remaining ingredients, hot garlic. Grind it all into paste.

For the curry: 4 fresh corn cobs, 3 tomatoes, 2 tablespoon fresh cream, 1 teaspoon sugar, and salt to taste.

To prepare the curry: Cut all the corn from the cobs and boil in a pressure cooker, a teacup to be chopped. Prepare the juice of the tomatoes in a liquidiser and strain.

Mix everything in a pan and add 1 1/2 teacups of water.

Cook for a few minutes and remove. Grease a baking tin and spread the curry that comes with rice. Cover with aluminium foil.

Bake in a hot oven at 400° for about 20 minutes. Serve hot with parathas and green salad.

### GARLIC CORN

Combine 1/4 teacup butter with 1 tablespoon spring onion and 2 crushed garlic cloves. Spread 1 tablespoon garlic butter on each of 4 ears of the corn. Wrap in foil.

Bake in preheated oven for 30 to 35 minutes. Or cook over hot coals turning occasionally for 20 minutes.

# BIG PLANS TO DEVELOP SOUTH COAST ISLAND SANCTUARY

PLANS to introduce a tented camp, build an airstrip and start a living school on beautiful Funzi Island, off Kenya's south coast, have been disclosed by Kanwarlal Sabharwal who, over the years, has proved to be considerably 'development orientated'.

Kanwarlal, popularly known as 'Kamal' is a prominent businessman and social worker of the coast. He is also a qualified pilot.

It was he who developed from virgin bush the tarmacked airstrip at Ukunda which later was to become the busiest airstrip in the whole of E.Africa.

Tourists staying in this fast developing South Coast area around it a great boon to fly from there direct to game parks, while others flew in for a beach holiday after enjoying a safari.

It was Kamal, who, with only one aircraft started Leisure Airways in 1969. In fact, he has been connected with tourism for many years, and for some considerable time was running road and air safaris.

He is also the publisher of COASTWEEK.

Kamal believes that Funzi Island is an ideal venue for a living school being far away from busy Moi International Airport. It would be established by Lotus Air Limited, with prospective pilots being able to stay on the island during the training period.

## Funzi Island

An application is being submitted to the Civil Aviation Board for permission to go ahead with this new venture.

The airstrip on Funzi Island will also enable tour operators to fly holidaymakers there, otherwise the island is difficult to reach.

The access road to Shirazi, where boats are hired to sail to Funzi Island, is very bad, becoming virtually impassable when it rains.

Funzi, said Kamal, is a very beautiful island encircled by a white sand beach, and with considerable marine life. It is just the place for those who want peace and tranquility, also plenty of fresh unpolluted air.

The tented camp will also, it is felt, attract many sport fishermen to the area. The development would be Palmtree Tours & Safaris Ltd. which has had considerable previous experience in this kind of work.

The idea for this development sprang from a meeting Kamal was attending on Funzi Island which was addressed by the District Commissioner, Kwale. Here islanders had complained that they were being left behind in the development process.

The DC is chairman of Kwale's Development Committee (which embraces Funzi Island) and he was accompanied by many of its members, including Kamal.

The island lacks drinking water which has to be brought from the mainland. Since that meeting work on a borehole has commenced. It has no proper dispensary and sick people have to travel a long distance to the nearest hospital at Msambweni.

The Development Committee promised to expedite plans for a dispensary there.

The appeal by the people of this island for 'some development' also acted as a challenge to Kamal to see what he could do to help.

Kamal was born at Mazeras, and it was his father (then a contractor) who organised the clearing of 10,000 acres of bush at Gazi, Ramisi, in 1937 so that sugar could be grown there.

The Sabharwal family have a farm at Waa where they grow fruit and vegetables, also keep cows, sheep and goats. It has two wells, a cattle dip and they also brought electricity to the area.

They are now undertaking a feasibility study to determine

the possibility of establishing a factory somewhere along the coast for the canning of mango, lime, orange and pineapple juice.

Should it materialise it will be the first at the coast where an increasing quantity of fruit is being grown, much rotting away because of poor marketing facilities.

## Film Industry

Kamal also revealed that to mark Kenya's 20th year of independence in December he will be embarking on the establishment of a film industry at Waa which, he thinks, if all goes well, could become a 'mini' Hollywood.

The first film will have as its main theme the conservation of wildlife. It will also depict how Kenya's multi-racial society lives together in amity, the beauty of the country as well as its many and varied tourist attractions. It will be produced in

three languages - Kiswahili, English and Hindi.

Throughout the years, the Sabharwal family has given a helping hand in the community. This has included assisting needy students with school fees, providing an extension to the maternity wing at Msambweni Hospital, also a new wing at the Salvation Army School, and many children in this area saw a TV programme for the first time in their lives. This week, another TV set was given to the Harambee Secondary School at Mazeras.

Kamal is presently organising a charity show to take place at the NAAZ CINEMA to raise funds to assist the Salvation Army School for the Blind, Likoni.

This year, the Minister for Higher Education, appointed Kanwarlal Sabharwal a member of the Board of Governors' of Waa and Matuga Girls' Secondary Schools.

## 'German Holidays Fall Off'

FRANKFURT (DaD) - West Germans are in the process of forfeiting their reputation as the world's foremost foreign travellers.

They have spent more on holidays abroad than any other nation every year since 1973, but this year bookings are so slumped that the alarm has been sounded by the travel trade in Frankfurt am Main, as by experts in most holiday countries.

"The gold rush days are over," says Der Spiegel, the Hamburg news weekly.

Only 25 million West Germans (out of a total of 60m) plan to holiday abroad this year. In 1982 the figure was 27.1 m.

The reasons are self-evident: recession and unemployment, less money in Germans' pockets, drastic price increases and poor service in many holiday countries that have placed a damper on the boom.

Overseas destinations such as Kenya, Sri Lanka and Thailand are particularly hard-hit, as are South America and the Caribbean.

**CHARTER FLIGHTS** - Charter flights to Bulgaria and Rumania, Tunisia and Greece are not booked.

Austria, Italy and Spain which have always been popular with German holidaymakers, complaining that tourism is down.

that there has generally been a dramatic increase in positive attitudes towards development change in this Province in the recent years.

Appeals to grow and diversify food crop production have, for instance, more than borne fruit and the results have been impressive. Taboo, even among the womenfolk, is fast giving way to modernity, as many discard tradition to join in the

task of nation building.

In fact the number of women groups engaged in contemporary economic activities in the Province has been rising every year since the declaration of the 'Decade of Women' in 1975.

Adult literacy campaign is, too gaining momentum. More people are seeking new opportunities in the modern sector to better their standards of living and certainly the level of trainee intake into Village Polytechnics has more than doubled since last year.

To facilitate and speed up exploitation of the available potentials, the Government has been quick to provide a number of infrastructural frameworks in the Province.

The communication network, for instance, is being intensified. The Lamu - Hola - Garissa tarmac road now underway and STD telephone facilities recently installed in Malindi, are perhaps the latest and most remarkable developments in this direction.

In a bid to stabilize the farmers' incomes a move is in hand to rehabilitate the cashcrop economy.

For that reason agro-industries have already been established to process cashewnuts and coconuts (copra), for a start, and feasibility studies in respect of the pineapple have just been completed.

With respect to livestock development, a ranching programme in the rangelands has long been operational. At the same time a huge dip construction project has been going on for years in this Province under the E.E.C. funding although it has now been going on for years in this Province under the E.E.C. funding although it has now been just phases out.

The question of landlessness is systematically being tackled through a system of settlement programmes while irrigation schemes are being launched, partly, to bring more land under production and partly as a means to rehabilitate the arid and semi-arid parts of the Province.

This year's Theme, 'Conserve More in the Third Decade', has been tailored to invoke our highest instincts and sense of

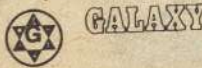

Despite the current lull in economic activity the demand for trade stands this

I take this opportunity to thank all those that have donated towards the success of this project.

In conclusion I wish to thank my Branch, the Show Committee, and my staff for having made this year's Show success.

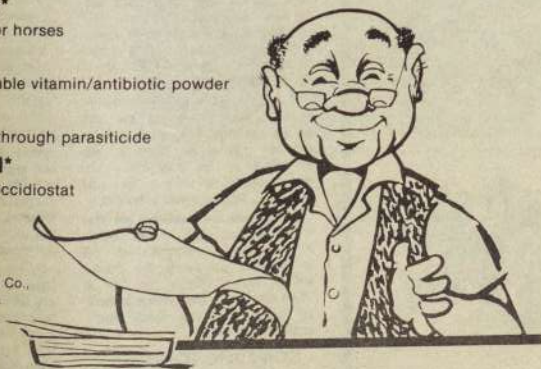

For those who have headaches and other minor casualties, please do not hesitate to contact St. John Ambulance, who will be scattered all around the ground, and for serious sickness we shall be having two Doctors from Mombasa Municipal Council and from Coast General to take care of you.

### CONTROL TOWER

The Doctors are stationed, under the Control Tower, in Arena, and if need to, the patient can be ferried to Hospital by an Ambulance which is available at the Showground.

Fire hazard is taken care by many Fire Extinguishers and Mombasa Municipal Council, Fire Extinguisher, engine is also available full time at the Showground, so, show-goers have not worry on that issue.

## Coast Could Be Self-Reliant In Food

THE COAST Province could be self-sufficient in food, and the Ministry of Agriculture's stand at the Mombasa ASK Show is loaded with ideas to help farmers become successful and earn more money.

Research has proved, contrary to previous beliefs, that practically everything can be grown at the coast.

There is tremendous scope for farmers, yet of the 15% arable land in the Coast Province, only about 10% is being intensively utilised.

However, it is appreciated that many farmers lack sufficient 'know how' in getting the most from the land.

To help in this direction, Government has introduced a 'Training and Visit Extension Programme' which is being funded by the World Bank.

Under this programme extension staff are given a fortnight's basic training on new recommendations and techniques and then visit farms to pass on this knowledge to wananchi.

If they can spare the time, farmers can, if they wish, attend a week's specific course at the Farmers' Training Centre. This is heavily subsidised by government, and only a nominal charge of Shs. 15/- per week is made to the farmer.

There is also an urgent need for a better marketing system in the Coast Province which, in turn, would act as an incentive to farmers to grow more.

It is felt that in keeping with the Mombasa Show's theme to 'Conserve More in the Third Decade' there should be more dialogue to determine how marketing facilities can be

improved at the coast, particularly in respect of fruit and vegetables.

The Ministry's stand is laying particular emphasis on the conservation of soil, water and wildlife, also on passing on the results of research to benefit the farmer.

It will be showing how farmers can control pests both on the farm and in the store, as well as a cassava that can tolerate mosaic disease.

### 'COMPOSITE'

Many other crops can be seen at its demonstration plot. They include a Coast Composite Maize which was developed at Kitale and perfected at Masabaha Research Station, Malindi, and is specifically suited to humid conditions at the Coast.

The ex-Mtwapa variety of Sorghum, developed at Katumani Research Station, Malindi, is doing very well at the coast and is in big demand. Endless is being laid on growing sorghum as it escapes drought more than maize.

A variety of different crops to those seen last year are now being grown on the Demonstration Plot. They include a much smaller cucumber which is particularly popular among the Asian community. It is easier than the usual cucumber to grow, and there is also an export market for them in the UK.

Brinjels which are normally and a good cash crop do well at the coast and are again easy to grow. Already export markets have been found in Europe.

has been East Coast Fever but this is now controlled by dipping.

The role of the Ministry of Livestock Development in food production for our present and coming generations is displayed in a nutshell at the Ministry stand in Mombasa Show Ground.

Livestock breeding with emphasis on utilization of Artificial Insemination comes first and will be practically open to cows on heat free of charge.

This will be followed closely by intensive feeding of a dairy animal to attain high milk production using clean milk production methods. Ways and means of storing milk in form of milk products for the third decade will be in demonstration.

Proper ways of getting the best beef ever in the range areas will be explained in the Range Ecology and Range Management Sections.

Treatment of hides and skins by use of rural tannery, Meat Inspectorate and cattle disease treatment will be in full display.

Livestock units section will display the activities in our Research station like Mariakani, Buchuma, Matuga and Mtswapa.

Silage making using a motorized chaff cutter and bee-keeping will be explained by our staff.

A milk bar will remain open at the Ministry stand.

COAST Provincial Director of Livestock Development Dr J.H. Onyango, writes:

# Several Farmers In Kilifi Area Are Earning Upto Shs. 4,000 Per Month Per Animal ...

Taita, Kilifi and Kwale.

Improvement of poultry, meat and eggs production is being promoted through projects like IADP and the NDDP.

The number of exotic layers including the young stock is approximately 147,176 while the broiler population is estimated to be 83,060.

The Ministry intends to more than double the population figures when marketing of eggs and poultry meat is taken by the Livestock Marketing division, a division within the Ministry of Livestock Development.

More than 21 million eggs were produced by the above commercial layers and fetched the farmers 17.8 million Kenya Shillings. 150,430.8 kgs. of poultry meat was produced and earned K.Shs. 3.8 million.

Culled commercial layers produced a total of 577,691 kgs. of meat valued at K.Shs. 14.4 million.

Keeping of rabbits in the Province has been going on from time immemorial. The population of the small non-ruminants is estimated to be about 8,000.

In areas of high population and limited land availability, rabbits can reduce the shortage of animals proteins because of their convenient size and their high reproduction rate.

The Animal Production Division which is the extension arm of the Ministry if concentrating on the women groups and other farmers in general.

The message being passed to the farmers is to take rabbit keeping as any other enterprise i.e. give it recognition as an income earner rather than treating it as a children's pet.

In one year a doe will produce a minimum of 24-28 kids which

is enough to provide 9-12 kgs. of meat per month which means a monthly saving of about K.Shs. 200/-.

The recommended imported breeds include Californian White and the New Zealand breed whose adults weight is 4.5 - 5.5 kgs.

What essentially remains is for the Ministry to come up with a donor who can provide the facilities to deliver the goods to the market which is hardly exploited. Rabbits multiplication centres have been established by the Ministry all over the Province.

Bee-Keeping is another promising enterprise in the Province. It has a low capital investment requirement and needs minimal maintenance and labour. We have two unoperational bee-keeping societies in existence.

The market for honey is unexploited and it is the hope of the Ministry that the enterprise will pick up when the Bee-Keeping workshop at Mariakani starts producing beehives which is a limiting factor presently.

Setting up of refineries in the areas where these co-operative societies are sited is also envisaged by the Ministry.

We hope to replace the estimated 15,000 log hives by the modern Kenya Top Bar Hive (KTBH) when we start production of the latter at Mariakani. We have to date 1115 KTB hives whose supply has been procured all the way from Thika which is our nearest bee keeping workshop.

Beef production is mainly in the range areas where we have pastoralists keeping the zebu animals and the ranches stocking graded beef animals. Beef production in the agricultural zones which become available as a by-product from dairying and beef production from the pastoralists both contribute more than 50 per cent of the total beef produced in the Province.

The estimated beef output during the year ending December 31, 1982, earned the farmers a total of K.Shs. 81,027,505.00. To see to increased beef output in the range areas, the Ministry is trying to introduce bull schemes to upgrade the local zebu while the Range Management Division is working hand in hand with ranches to streamline beef production.

Watering system in the ranches or these range areas is of utmost importance, especially when we consider controlling of movement of the animals within the ranch or that of pastoralists.

Watering points can be used as a tool of controlling grazing management in areas like Tana-River, Lamu and Taveta where overgrazing is common. Bush control is another recurring problem which should be given

attention while firebreak construction is an 'insurance policy' against total destruction by fire.

The population of sheep and goats in the Province was estimated to be 1,159,171 of which 287,573 were sheep while 870,608 were goats. A total of 990 milk goats was estimated in the Province. 89,747 shoats were slaughtered during the year ending December 31, 1982 while 29,374 shoats were exported from the Province to other Districts during the same year.

The Ministry policy towards improvement of local shoats is by introducing galla bucks and dorper rams. These two breeds have a fast growth rate and more meat than the local shoats.

Establishment of multiplication centres and breeding centres like Buchuma and Matuga is being implemented.

Farm demonstrations aimed at teaching the small scale farmers on proper husbandry aspects are in progress and are to be seen in all the districts.

### ANIMAL DISEASES

On the side of diseases the Ministry of Livestock Development is appealing to all farmers to follow the methods of animal husbandry practices in the province which are being offered to them by animal husbandry officers.

All farmers should take keen interest in farm management in order to eliminate management problems.

Most of the problems called diseases in the farms are not diseases but mismanagement.

The department of veterinary services is capable of controlling all livestock diseases in the province. The major problem

"CONSERVE more for third Decade" is the theme for this year's Mombasa ASK National Show. The Ministry of Livestock Development is conserving more for the third decade by preserving semen from the recommended grade bulls to ensure continuity of a high quality dairy herd for future generations.

This in Coast Province is being advocated by Artificial Insemination (A.I.) which is motorised and is covering a total of 650 km. daily in Taita-Taveta District, Mombasa District, Kilifi and Kwale District. The dynamic efforts of AI are reflected by the steady increase of dairy animals in the Province. Animal husbandry practices especially in the small scale farms is improving while fodder hectareage has increased tremendously.

Animal Production Division is going full swing to see to the boosting of clean milk production and to the feeding of the dairy animal in a zero grazing unit.

Some farmers in Kilifi and Taita Taveta Districts have been able to get an average monthly income of up to K.Shs. 4,000/- per profit per animal during the first three lactations.

The unit of land in the high populated areas of the Province is becoming smaller and smaller and intensification of livestock rearing by introducing zero grazing units has become necessary.

The vehicle carrying and implementing the zero grazing units is the National Dairy (NDDP), and the integrated Agricultural Development Programme (IADP). Both projects are educating the small scale farmers on construction of the unit, establishment of fodder, clean milk production and calf rearing.

### BEE-KEEPING

The non-ruminants include pig, poultry, rabbits and bee-keeping. The Ministry's policy is to see that more is produced to feed the present and the coming decades.

On the side of pigs, the Ministry is trying to raise the population figure which presently stands at 1,000 by establishing and supporting fully the local market especially in the areas of production like

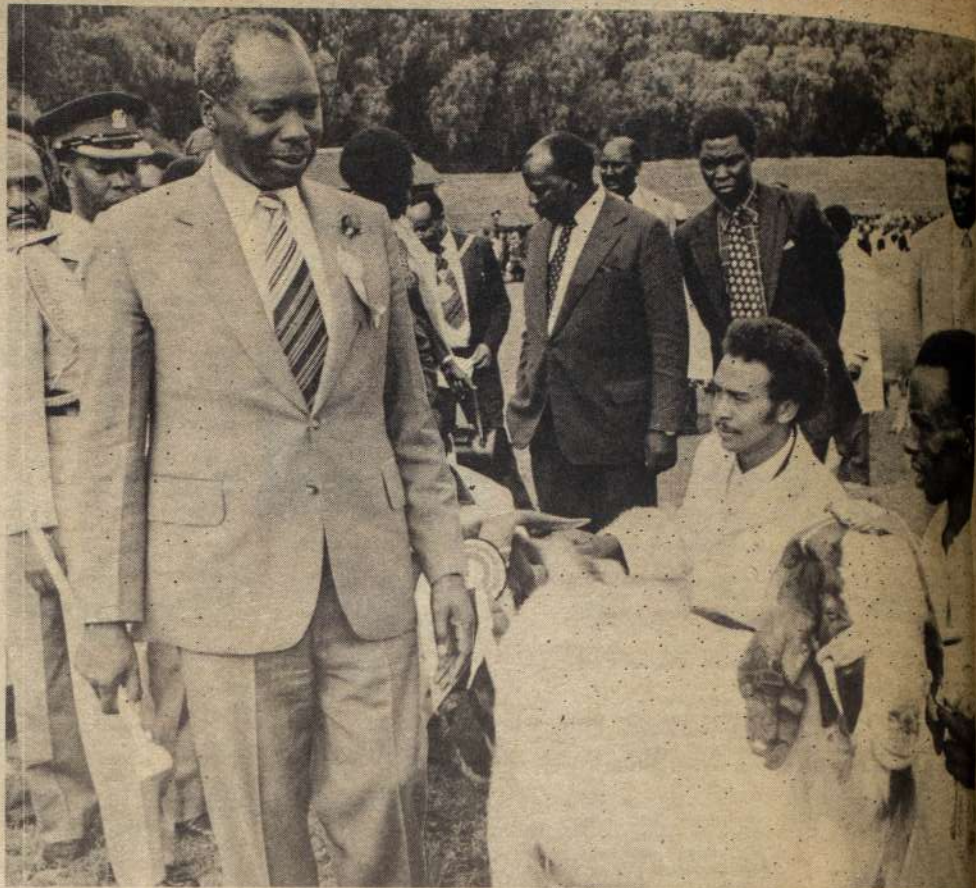

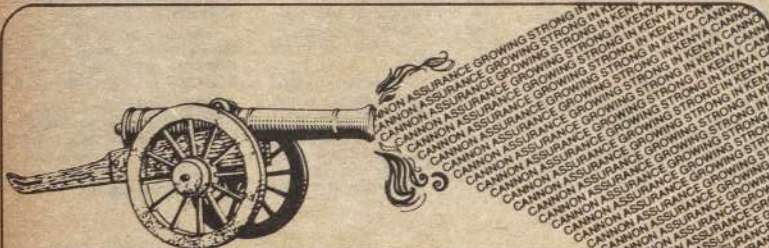

# Planning Community Feeling Effects Of World Recession

The farming community is experiencing the effect of the world wide recession. However, agricultural sector continues to play a leading role in sustaining the country's economy, so any conservation done towards agricultural resources and its efficient utilization has a very far reaching effect on the overall development of the country. In the Coast Province farmers are putting up a lot of effort towards higher productivity.

For the last two years, 1981/82 and 1982/83 the rainfall has been above average particularly along the ten mile strip of the Coast. Other areas experienced moderately average rainfall. Farmers took advantage of the rains by planting large acreages. Their hopes were dashed because all the late planted crops were water logged in most places. Rice however, did well under these conditions.

After the 1982 Mombasa Show the Ministry of Agriculture continued to campaign for "Grow more Food for Self-sufficiency." Although production per unit area planted under maize went up - about 1,534 ha. was planted in 1982 compared to 85,000 ha. in 1981 and another 110 ha. was planted in the long rains of 1983.

creased from 3,970 ha. in 1981 to 3,944 ha. in 1982 with a further area of 1,203 ha. during the long rains of 1983. Most of the beans produced were sold to the National Cereals and Produce Board and they fetched more than two million shillings.

A large area of the Coast Province is occupied by Industrial crops viz. coconuts, cashewnuts, sisal, sugar cane, simsim, bixa, cotton and coffee. The area under coconut went up from 34,248 ha in 1982 to 34,448 ha. in 1983. Cashewnut area also increased from 29,663 ha. in 1982 to 29,857 ha. in 1983. Sugar cane occupied about 7,280 ha. in 1983 which was also the same area. Other crops area remained constant, i.e. Coffee 587 ha., Simsim 3,900 ha., Bixa at 4,489 ha. and cotton at 7,680 ha. The overall performance of these crops has been poor due to heavy rains which caused the abortion of the flowers and also water-logged other crops like sugar cane, simsim and cotton.

The major horticultural crops include the vegetables, pineapples, mangoes and citrus. Of all the marketed crops, these are the most sensitive to market forces and variability due to their perishable nature. The hectareage of the major Horticultural crops in 1982 were as follows: Mangoes 8,000 ha, which yielded 31,782 tons; Citrus 5,233 ha, with a total production of 39,842 tons; Pineapples 905 ha, producing 58,417 tons and vegetables 227 ha, and yielded 12,270 tons. The marketing of fruits in the Coast Province face a very difficult time due to lack of proper organisation so during the peak periods there is a glut and farmers are forced to sell at throw away price. This creates a disincentive to the expansion

of the Horticultural Industry in the Province. There has been a moderate increase in the loans disbursed during the period 1982/83 as shown below:-

**FARM LOANS**  
Loan commitments in 1982 amounted to K.Shs. 107,000,000.00 compared to K.Shs. 114,000,000.00 in 1983 which is about 6.5 per cent increase. This has been possible due to increasing of A.F.C. offices and also establishment of area office which is handling problems locally.

Other projects in the Coast included I.A.D.P. II which went through its fourth and final year in the Province. In the course of this project, a total of 445,700 coconut seedlings were raised and distributed to the farmers.

Soil conservation campaign went on very successfully and 88.1 Km. of cut-off drains were dug, with 21.3 Km. of Fanya Juu terraces prepared, and 60.8 Km. of Bench terraces were prepared. The trees planted in the Province were 209,564 and we also controlled 75 gully areas, 6 water dams were repaired and 14 nursery sites were prepared.

In conclusion, the Province is set and geared to improve and conserve agricultural resources for the next decade. Consequently the Government has started a Project called T and V (Training and visit) which will be a major strategy to training the farmers how to conserve for the future. ## IRRIGATION

Rice production went up from 800 ha. in 1981 to 3,216 ha. in 1982 with a further 2,190 ha. during this year's long rains. Due to favourable weather conditions rice produced about 825 tons of paddy. Farmers made use of the valley bottoms very efficiently. A campaign the Government provided out 400 bags of rice seed from Mwea region Scheme to the farmers. The area under millet and sorghum went up from 620 ha. in 1981 to 1,411 ha. during the long rains of 1983. Cassava occupied an area of 6,720 ha. Legumes were affected by the heavy rains and the area de-

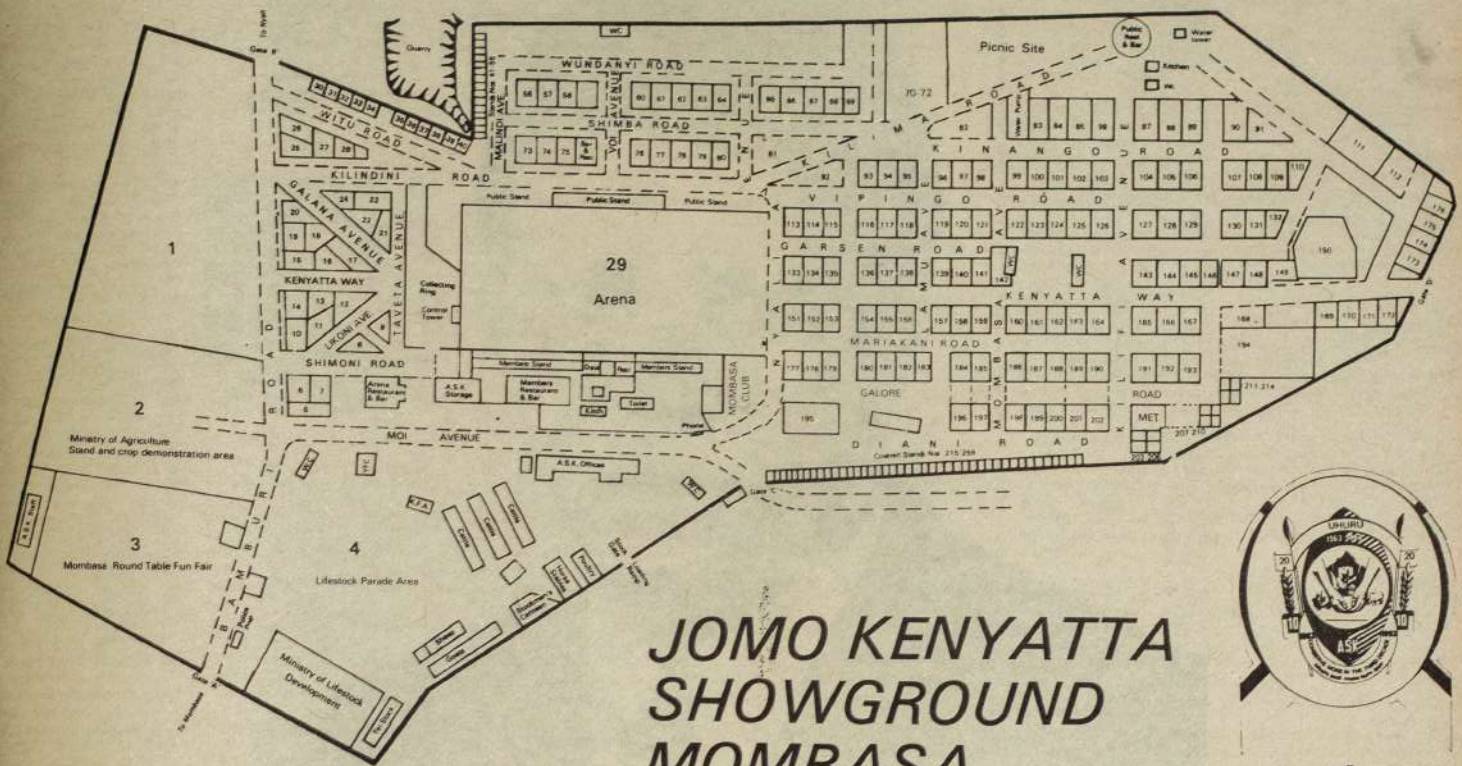

### Boran, Freisian, Ayshires And Guernseys ...

MOMBASA national show as many of you will know, is opening its doors to the public on 1st September, 1983. Among the major exhibits will be the livestock.

Your coming will give you a chance of seeing all the types and breeds of livestock being raised in Coast Province. They come from Taita/Taveta, Kwale, Kilifi and Mombasa districts. Ranchers, small scale farmers practicing Zero grazing, large scale farms and women groups will all be participating during this rare occasion in the year. It is a time when all the different levels of management be they intensive or extensive are shown in a nutshell. Missing an opportunity to come to see for yourself is regretful especially for those who would be on-coming livestock farmers.

#### SHEEP AND GOATS

Among the breeds of cattle in the show will be the Borans, Sahiwals, Friesians, Ayrshires, Guernseys; while the Campers and Black Head Persians will stand in the Sheep section. Gallo and Angora Goats are among the goat breeds that will be exhibited. Poultry will also play an important role in that National Poultry Development Programme impact will be shown by the entries received

from Kwale, Mombasa and Kilifi which are of very high quality.

Entries received are very encouraging. Already this year, we have beaten the 250 entry mark for cattle with 254 cattle, 176 heads of birds and rabbits and 12 pigs. This represents an increase of (percent) as compared to last years entries.

Camels will also be demonstrated as part of livestock to visit this stand. Stewards will be at hand to answer any questions related to livestock production in Coast Province.

Banders to enable those people that are unable to get into the main arena to view the coast animals and have their questions answered by my team of experts. For the first time camels will be paraded together with the rest of livestock.

Dezenium" (nach der Unabhängigkeit im Jahre 1963) darstellen. Die Veranstalter haben die Teilnehmer dazu aufgefordert, dem Publikum vorzuführen, wie Kenias Landwirtschaft und Industrie in den achtziger Jahren dynamisch erweitert und entwickelt werden sollen.

Die Tore der Ausstellung sind von 8 Uhr morgens bis 10 Uhr nachts geöffnet und es werden über 200.000 Besucher erwartet, hauptsächlich einheimische Farmer und Geschäftsleute aus Nairobi und aus anderen Landesteilen, aber auch ein paar unternehmungslustige Touristen, die sich diese einmalige Gelegenheit nicht entgehen lassen, sich unters Volk zu mischen und aus erster Hand mehr über das Leben in Kenia zu erfahren.

Der Weg zur Ausstellung ist in der ganzen Stadt gut markiert, so daß jeder interessierte Besucher ihn leicht finden kann. Von Mombasa herkommend, biegt man nach der neuen Nyalalibrücke rechts ab und folgt der neuen, breiten Straße, wo sich auf beiden Seiten und auch auf der Fahrbahn Tag und Nacht immer ein paar Ziegen aufhalten, wahrscheinlich um den Automobilisten deutlich zu zeigen, daß es hier entlang geht zur Landwirtschaftsausstellung.

Kenia ist, wie die meisten Entwicklungsänder, ein Agrarland. Der Export von Kaffee und Tee (an dritter Stelle steht immer noch der Tourismus), gefolgt von anderen Farmprodukten,

bringt dem Land die bedeutendsten Deviseneinnahmen, die so dringend benötigt werden. Die Regierung empfiehlt nachdrücklich den intensiveren Anbau von Getreide und anderen landwirtschaftlichen Erzeugnissen, um möglichst bald das Ziel der Selbstversorgung mit Nahrungsmitteln zu erreichen. Bei den hohen Geburtenraten ist dies allerdings eine doppelt schwierige Aufgabe.

Mitte August wurden 5000 Tonnen Weizen - in zwei Ladungen auf der TAGAMA verschifft - von der Bundesrepublik Deutschland an Kenia übergeben, so daß Kenia nun insgesamt 25.000 Tonnen Getreide aus Deutschland erhalten hat.

Auf einer Höhe von 2000 bis 3000 Meter über Meer werden Weizen, Pyrethrum, Kartoffeln, Gemüse und Tee angepflanzt; zwischen 1500 und 2000 m.ü.M. gedeihen Kaffee und Mais; im Küstenstreifen auf Meereshöhe bis 1500 m wachsen Kokosnüsse, Kapok, Sisal, Zuckerrohr, Reis, Baumwolle, Ananas, Bananen, Mangos und Zitrusfrüchte.

## ZUCHTBULLEN

find this First Aid training very useful for we have at this hotel 250 employees, as well as 350 guests when it is full. We feel it essential that some of our staff are proficient in giving First Aid.

He announced that refresher classes for those who had attended the first course would commence next month.

Turning to the selection of the Best Employees for the Moths of June and July, Mr. Kinaiyia said this had been a difficult task and was based

recommendations from guests and senior management.

He pointed out that the success of the hotel depends on all who work in it, and the incentive scheme was to reward those who had made an extra special effort to ensure the highest standards are maintained.

She also pointed out that it is a requirement by government for all hotels and factories to have some First Aid personnel,

as well as equipment, on the premises.

A Special Bonus was also presented to Francis Kimemia, gardener, for completing a nursery project earlier than planned.

## Nairobi Show Entry Boost

THE 1983 Nairobi International Show will now be staged on Tuesday, 4 October to Sunday, 9 October instead of from September to 2 October previously scheduled.

## 'Contraception'

"OUR DOG's just had pups and we can't keep them. Do you want one?"

How often have you heard this question? Already our cat and dog population is climbing. The problem of unplanned and unwanted kittens and puppies is increasing.

This year perhaps a quarter of a million cats and dogs will be homeless. What can be done?

Contraception by surgery, i.e. neutering, is the most sensible and safest way to avoid unwanted pups and kittens, as well as the distress to animal and to the owner when parting with the cuddly, loveable "accidents".

It also avoids the side-effects that may occasionally occur with contraception by artificial hormone treatments, or the problems caused for owners when their pet is "on heat".

The surgical contraceptive techniques are called spaying and castration. Spaying is the removal of a female's ovaries, or ovaries and uterus. Castration is the removal of a male's testicles.

### OPERATION

Carried out by a veterinary surgeon, spaying and castration are operations which are quick and humane, and very few animals show signs of discomfort after the operations.

The veterinary surgeon will advise on the best time for neutering males or females.

Generally the operations are best performed when the dog or cat has virtually completed growing, i.e. when it is older than 6 months but less than a year. Some owners are reluctant to have their pets spayed or castrated.

One reason for this is the belief that the operation will make a cat or dog fat or lazy; in fact, it is generally too much food and lack of exercise which cause obesity.

Animals may become more gentle after neutering but they will not lose their spirit or intelligence.

Amongst the benefits of owning a spayed or castrated pet are:

- Both males and females centre more of their attention on members of the family and do not wander away during heat periods.

- False pregnancies, ovarian tumours and womb infections are eliminated.

- Neutered males do not acquire the ripped ears, torn coat and aggressive habits that come from competing for the attention of a female.

- There is no disruption in training or performance of female dogs used in the field, as guard dogs or as Guide Dogs for the Blind.

- Neutering male cats usually prevents their indiscriminate wetting inside the home.

And of course, neutering helps control the pet population. Far too many unwanted pets are abandoned each year to die of starvation, disease or exposure and tens of thousands of pets are destroyed because there are no homes for them.

To promote spaying and castration of companion animals, some animal welfare associations insist that all pets obtained through a shelter be neutered as a condition of adoption. Increasing numbers of pure-breeders also recommend the neutering of any animal purchased for companionship, rather than show purposes.

In the U.S.A. some cities are proposing higher licence fees for animals which have not been neutered.

If you own a dog or cat not used in an established breeding programme, ask your veterinary surgeon now about neutering your pet.

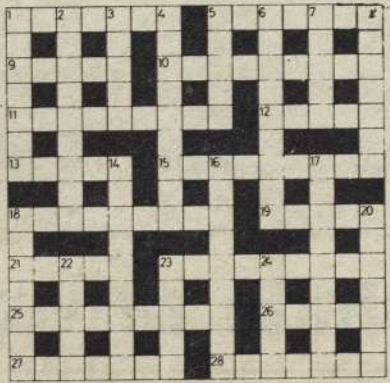

# 'Murder And Mayhem On The Coast'

THE MANIPULATORS by R.W. Jones (BOOKWISE LTD. 1983. Price Shs. 40.00).

THIS WELL WRITTEN story deals with the activities of a police inspector stationed in Mombasa who is determined to solve a murder case against various odds.

Inspector McEwan, born of a Kelenjin father and a Scottish mother and having attended school and police training in England not only has to worry about the murder case, but also about his relationship with Selima his grandmother, the direction his grandfather Coral the dancer is taking, and an additional smuggling of Ivory case which he learns about from a tip off.

Thus as the story unfolds, we visualize McEwan employing all his mental resources to counter the unwillingness of the O.C.P.D. to give him an express greenlight to investigate the murder of Mrs. Barnes, and at the same time under-

going emotional turmoil over his love for Coral and his commitment to Selima and hordes of relations.

The Manipulators is a good story: well presented in structure, use of language; employing colourfully painted images of the coast and the plains of Athi; as well as using jokes and anecdotes which Jones carefully weaves into the plot of the novel to achieve maximum humour.

But the biggest artistic accomplishment in the novel is the author's ability to construct solid characters by giving them a unique manner of speech; fitting actions and convincing gestures, which all go towards ensuring a consistency in characterization that many an artist have failed to maintain.

Of note are McEwan himself,

Gitau, the Coast pathologist Crampton and the museum curator, who strike the reader as concrete and 'living' characters because of the way their backgrounds are used to show their behaviour and general outlook towards life.

McEwan's ability to remove himself from a case, as it were, stand out above it and coldly assess the material in hand before deciding upon his next step makes the reader see a rational super cop who does not act upon intuition and expediency, but uses reason and aspired to uphold the cardinal law of "innocent until proven guilty" all the time.

But Jones ensures that this policeman is not the movie-screen valiant hero, by Putting McEwan down to earth, in a couple of brawls, scraps, and even narrow escapes.

The character of the museum curator as a man who lives on praise and glorification is well built in two visits from the Inspector, while the cynical

## RECORDS SET AT KECOSO GAMES

A TOTAL twenty-three new records were established during the Kecoso Games Athletics Championships held at the Mombasa Municipal Stadium last weekend.

Kenya Posts and Telecommunications dethroned Kenya Cargo taking an overall title with 515 points beating their rivals by 15 points, writes **Abdulrahman Sheriff**.

However, Kenya Cargo Handling were satisfied with the performance of their "super-woman" Rose Tata who was voted the best woman athlete after shattering three former marks in the 400-metres, 400-metres hurdles and 1,500-metres events.

Nevertheless, Kenya Cargo clinched the Basketball title after defeating Posts and Telecommunications 85-68 in their last match played on a league basis.

Though Abbas claimed he was still recovering from a knee injury, he might be fit during the East and Central Africa Challenge Cup competition to be held in Kenya in November.
