PRAISE FOR FAST WORK BY POLICE

COAST POLICE have been warmly commended for their expert recovery of a stolen vehicle and the arrest of a prime suspect near Voi last weekend.

The vehicle, a Datsun pick-up, was stolen close to Mtwapa village around 3.00 a.m. Saturday morning. The owner promptly contacted both Mombasa and Kijipwe Police Stations who set in process a police search extending over the province.

Shortly after 10.00 a.m. the owner was notified by Central Police Station that Voi Police had recovered the vehicle and had placed the suspect driver under arrest.

Apart from losing about 300 shillings worth of petrol the theft cost us nothing, and the vehicles has been returned in good running order", the owner told Coastweek.

West German Aid For Kenya

THE FEDERAL Republic of Germany has announced that Kenya will receive additional commodity aid in 1983 worth more than KShs. 100 Million.

The amount will be made available in form of a soft loan at very favourable conditions (50 years repayment period, 10 years grace period, 0.75 per cent interest) and will be used to purchase essential goods in the Federal Republic of Germany.

A Spokesman for the Embassy of the Federal Republic of Germany in Nairobi told COASTWEEK:

"It is hoped that the additional aid, which the Government of the Federal Republic of Germany made available inspite of present budget restrictions in Germany will help Kenya to achieve her development aims.

"It is understood as a further proof of the close cooperation and partnership between the two Governments and the friendship existing between the two people".

Time Now For 'Clean Sweep'

MOMBASA COUNCIL SEEKS LOCAL ADVICE

DUE TO a great shortage of the right type of refuse drums, rubbish in many areas of the Mombasa Municipality is piling up on the ground making collection more difficult with dustmen having to spend extra time wielding spades to clear it all.

A new Shs. 840,000/- dustcart was added to the Council's fleet this year. However, while there is now an adequate number of such vehicles in operation, the work of collection has been

made considerably more arduous by refuse becoming mountainous heaps on the ground.

Flies and mosquitos loved these additional breeding areas,

while the ground often crawls with maggots.

Bitumen drums which are strong and hold six cubic ft. of refuse are ideal, but in very short supply.

The acting Town Clerk, Mr. A H Nasser, as appealed for suggestions on alternative containers, or help in locating more such bitumen-style drums.

He has also appealed to restaurant owners with large quantities of rubbish each day to try and find some receptacle to put it in, and so help with its collection.

For smaller quantities of rubbish, the Council has dustbins available at Shs. 200/- each. These will hold about 1 1/2 cubic ft. of refuse.

Good news for motorists is that Moi Avenue, right to the railway bridge, is going to be re-surfaced. Work, which will be carried out by contract labour, is due to commence in October when, hopefully, the rains may have stopped.

It is costing £90,000, the funds for which were raised from the Local Government Loans Authority.

MTONGWE FERRY

Meanwhile, the Mombasa Municipal Council is still awaiting the 'go ahead' from the Ministry of Local Government to repair the Mtongwe Ferry at a cost of £65,000.

It was closed in June when the guide rails, through wear and tear, had become dangerous and urgently needed replacing.

A sum of £30,000 has been set aside by the Council for this work, leaving a balance of £35,000 still to be found.

The closure of the ferry is causing considerable inconvenience to those living at Mtongwe

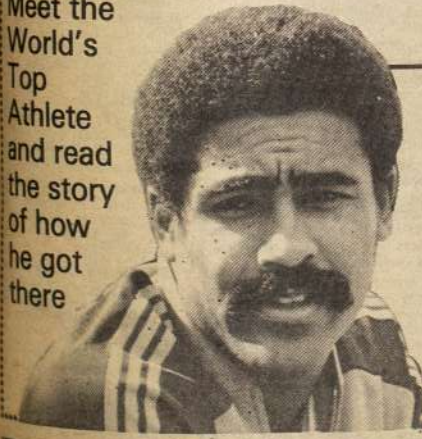

They are at the Digo Road end of Haile Selassie Road (formerly Station Road) and are almost opposite Blue Room. Their telephone numbers are 23086 and 316228.

Dayalal Ramji save you quite a lot because, say you want a fridge, cooker, fan, air-conditioner, T.V. or deep freezer for only a limited time you can hire it from them on a short let. Long term is, of course, also available.

Another money saver is that they buy and sell second hand; further if you really want to replace any existing equipment but feel now is too premature to invest in something, then handy to your whim - visit Dayalal Ramji and take along your old object as part-exchange. Coastweek has visited lots of electrical shops recently but here is a surprise in store; this one deals in equipment working on gas and kerosene as well.

Yes, kerosene, the old-fashioned method of keeping cool. Old kerosene refrigerators are repaired and there are a couple for sale. No wonder customers come from as far away as Garissa, Wajir, Garsen and all the outposts en route. Even during our visit there was a customer from the other direction - Kericho - getting a wick and glass for his refrigerator.

Many people proudly announce they have a cooker which can run on either gas or electricity, but Dayalal Ramji can do you one better by providing you with a gas-and-electric cooker - one

that can cook on both these fuels simultaneously.

Most of the new cookers and fridges in stock are Italian. The fans are largely from China. They advise that if you already have a fan but know it to be broken, then take it to them now in preparation for the warmer weather. They annually get last minute rushes on fan repairs.

During the visit to the workshop Coastweek saw some rather dilapidated looking fridges which bore rejection labels from

other places who repair, but they had actually been fixed and were seen to be working! So "Any old iron!"

SENSIBLE ADVICE ON DOG CARE:

Diseases Of The Urinary System

THE URINARY system has two parts. First the kidneys which form the urine and second the outflow tract. Consisting of the Ureters leading from the kidneys to the bladder, the bladder which serves as a reservoir and the urethra, through which the bladder is emptied. This, in a healthy dog, is a controlled function.

CAUSES: Infectious diseases as Leptospirosis, accidents with bleeding in kidneys or bladder, too much spiced food, insufficient nutrition with too high share of proteins will all damage kidneys and outflow tract.

The task of the kidneys is to filter the blood for noxious substances and retain the concentration of certain elements in the blood. Naturally their structure is very complex but unfortunately it follows that they are very fragile too.

'POISONS'
If for instance the elimination of the poisonous substances is delayed or even prevented, it would soon prove fatal.

SYMPTOMS: Conspicuous thirst, incontinence, large quantities of urine flowing without check, frequent discharges of small amounts and straining without success; if urinating seems to hurt

your dog or there is a change of colour, maybe opaque or even blood; a painful stiff gait with an arched back; a dull coat, emaciation and an unpleasant smell from the mouth are all signs which should send you and your dog to the Vet at once because untreated it would either lead to Chronic disease which is incurable or to death.

'FEVER'
An acute inflammation of the kidneys (Nephritis) would effect fever and depression. Your dog would feel pain when touched in the flanks and be unsteady on his hindlegs. Do not try to treat him with your own drugs as some are virtually poisonous by inhibiting the excretion and he would be worse off than before.

Chronic inflammation of the kidneys is often not conspicuously painful. But you would notice the dog urinates greater quantities and as a result drinks more.

With the greater discharge of urine, more minerals are washed out of the body, subsequently there will be more thirst which results in a further dilution of the mineral concentration in the body.

BARRACUDA WITH SOUR CREAM SAUCE

Serves 6

1 Barracuda about 2 1/2-3 1/2 lb/ 1.25-1.5 kg, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 8 ozs./ 225 g. fat bacon, 4 oz/100g cooking fat, 2 tablespoons plain flour, scant 1/2 pint/1.5 dl cold water, 4(5-oz/141-g cartons soured cream, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1 teaspoon castor sugar, salt and pepper, 1 tablespoon coarsely chopped, and lemon balm (optional).

Cut the Barracuda, leaving the fish whole. Wash inside and out and remove all membranes and traces of blood.

Remove the scales with the back of a knife or a special scaling knife and then rinse under cold water and dry with kitchen paper.

Mix together the salt and pepper and rub the inside of Barracuda with this seasoning. Cut the bacon into thin strips and, using a larding needle, thread the strips through the flesh of the Barracuda at right angles to the backbone.

Melt the cooking fat in a roasting tin. Put the fish into the hot fat, spine-side uppermost, place the tin in the centre of a moderately hot oven (400°F, 200°C, Gas Mark 6) and cook

for about 40 minutes.

Baste the Barracuda during cooking. The fish is cooked when the fins on the back come away easily.

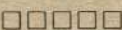
Lift the Barracuda carefully from the tin, place on a heated serving dish, spine-side uppermost, and keep hot. Add the

flour to the residue in the roasting tin and mix over low heat to a smooth paste.

Add the cold water and mix until well blended. Add the sour cream, lemon juice, grated lemon rind and sugar. Heat, stirring constantly, until the sauce has thickened.

Adjust the seasoning with salt and pepper to taste. Add the lemon balm and serve the sauce separately in a sauce-

boat.

Serve the fish with potatoes boiled in their skins and a fresh green salad.

CHOCOLATE HONEY CAKE

Makes about 36 2-inch (5-cm) squares.

8 oz/225g honey, 8 oz/225g castor sugar, 2 oz/50g butter, 6 tablespoons beer, 1 egg, 3 teaspoons allspice, 12 oz/350 g plain flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 tablespoon rum, and 4 oz/100g ground almonds.

For the icing: 2 oz/50g plain chocolate, 1 1/2 tablespoons cocoa, 4 oz/100 g icing sugar, about 2 tablespoons hot water, 1 oz/25 g butter, 4 tablespoons apricot jam, 1-2 oz/25 g blanched, and almonds, halved.

Combine the honey, sugar, butter and beer in a large saucepan. Heat gently, stirring until the mixture is blended, then remove from the heat and set aside to cool.

Add the egg and beat into the honey mixture with the allspice. Sift in the flour and baking powder, a little at a

time, mixing thoroughly after each addition.

Stir in the rum and almonds. Spread the mixture in a lightly greased Swiss roll tin, about 15 1/2 by 10 1/2 inches (40 by 27 cm), and smooth the surface with a spatula.

Bake in the centre of a moderately hot oven (375°F, 190°C, Gas Mark 5) for 25-30 minutes, or until firm. Turn out and ice while the cake is still warm.

To make the icing, melt the chocolate in a double saucepan or in a small bowl over a saucepan of simmering water, then remove from the heat.

Gradually stir in the hot water until the icing is thick enough to coat the back of a spoon. Stir in the butter and gently.

First spread the warm cake with the apricot jam and then cover with the chocolate icing. Leave to set for 5 minutes, then cut the cake into squares, while still slightly warm. Place half an almond in the centre of each square. Serve immediately or allow the cake to cool completely and store in an airtight container until required.

Ole ! Sammy Wafula Returns 'Home' In Sunny Spain

SAMMY K Wafula, a former Tourist Officer, Coast who has been living in Madrid, Spain, for the past six years was back in Kenya again for a short holiday at his favourite hotel - Mombasa Beach.

Mr. Wafula, who was accompanied by his wife and four Children, is in charge of the Africa Region of the World Tourism Organisation, its headquarters being in Madrid.

He is ther on secondment from the Kenya Government.

Mr. Wafula was also a director of the Kenya Tourist Office, Paris, for three years.

Interviewed at Mombasa Beach Hotel he described Spain as being a great potential tourist market for Kenya. Explained Mr. Wafula 'the upper classes, with wealth accumulated during forty years of political stability in Spain, are providing a considerable market for long-haul holiday destinations.'

He said that Kenya hoteliers

and tour operators were now stepping in to maximise their share of the market, and mentioned that the next International Tourism Fair takes place in Madrid during February 1984. He hoped to see much greater participation, and suggested that those attending should hold Kenya Information Evenings with travel agents and tour operators there.

Mr. Wafula explained that the Kenya Tourist Office in Paris was in charge of the Spanish market and had participated in a number of tourist fairs in Madrid together with Kenya based tour operators and hoteliers which had included the Sarova, Alliance, Block and A T & H groups.

He mentioned that Iberia, the Spanish airline, has direct flights to Nairobi twice a week suggested that hoteliers and tour operators might get together with Iberia and Spanish based tour operators so as to promote more tourism here.

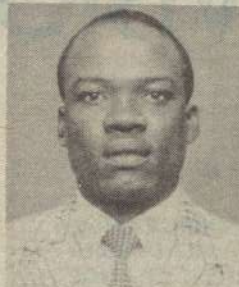

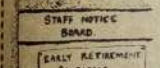

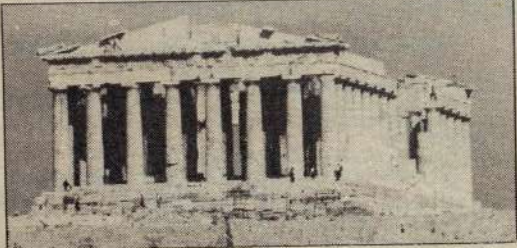

who have to travel an extra 4 kms to reach the Likoni Ferry for the journey to Mombasa Island.

The repair of pot-holes in the roads continues, and it is with deep regret that a proposed £2 million World Bank project for the repair and re-surfacing of roads in the Mombasa Municipality did not materialise.

One of the biggest problems in Mombasa is the deteriorating state of the roads. Many were built about thirty years ago when the maximum weight of lorries was around five tons. Today, many are about 45 tons, while traffic density is much greater. Consequently, the roads are cracking up.

Also confirmed is work going ahead on the construction of unadopted roads at a cost of £140,000. Two are near the Sacred Heart School, Ganjoni, and the Coast General Hospital, while others are near the Tudor area.

Work, which started six months ago, is continuing on the Maungujal/Mwakirunge Road at a cost of £100,000. It is 18 kms long and will be an all-weather road.

There is a great shortage of housing at Mombasa particularly for the lower income groups. The council, being acutely aware of this, has recommended many housing projects to the Ministry of Local Government. It is only limited financial resources which prevents them from going ahead.

There are plans for many public rental flats, tenant purchase maisonettes and 'low cost' bungalows at Kisauni.

Meanwhile, tenders were invited recently for the completion of 42 tenant purchase 3-bedroom units at Changamwe. The contract will be awarded soon, and completion is expected by the second part of 1984.



THE reality of the matter ended on Tuesday September 6 while the local representatives on the World Conference on Religion and Peace, a multi-religious body working for peace in the world, were left with the onerous task of getting ready for the first world Conference (to be known as WCRP IV) to be held in Nairobi, the selected emerging city from Asia, Latin America or Africa, scheduled for August 1985;

This gives the Board of Directors of WCIP-International barely a year for the event which will bring together over 400 delegates from the 11 major religions of the world to come and resolve and debate on the central theme of Religions For Human Dignity And World Peace.

It is from simple structures and from small organizations that the world is being made to realise the havoc ahead of the nuclear threat to world peace and the still explosive problems of poverty, of unemployment, of refugees.

This is coupled with stock-piling of arms at a current expenditure of US \$ 800 billion, (an average of over \$ 2 billion a day) which is being spent by the super powers on getting ready for a war which needs to be nipped in the bud before the cruel hand of any President or any leader in the world sets ablaze all civilization.

'PEACE ISSUES'

The World Conference On Religion and Peace is a non-government world organization which is composed of representatives from Buddhism, Christianity, Confucianism, Hinduism, Jainism, Judaism, Islam, Shintoism, Sikhism, Zoroastrianism, Traditional Ethnic Religions and emerged after the first World Conference or Assembly held at Kyoto in Japan in 1970.

It is the result of a movement that started in the early 1960's to bring religious leaders from various parts of the world to-

gether to discuss issues of peace.

It also looks for concrete solutions to the arms race, the economic rich and poor or North and South gap, energy depletion, food shortages, human rights violations and the nuclear threat.

Their goal is the promotion of inter-religious dialogue in the area of international relations and not of promoting inter-religious identity.

Previous World conferences have been held at Kyoto in Japan in 1970; at Luvain in Belgium in 1974 and in 1979 A.T. Princeton in New Jersey, U.S.A. The first All Africa Assembly of WCRP was held from 30 August to 3 September 1983 and was immediately followed by a Board of Directors Meeting of WCRP which took up the preparatory work of setting up the International Committee for WCRP IV.

Now they have also looked into the Agenda of the World Assembly, the Substantive Programme of plenary meetings, the major and the position paper speakers, preparatory documents, auxiliary events, participants and their representation continent-wise and by religious denominations, languages and administration, finances, Press and other media relations and the future of WCRP.

Elected to serve on the World Conference of Religion and Peace Africa Chapter were Bishop Henry Okullu (Kenya) as President for the African continent, who will be having Professor Musa Abdul (Nigeria), Dr. Yusuf A. Eraj (Kenya), Mrs. Joyce Kaddu (Uganda) and Professor Englebert Mveng (Cameroon)

as Vice Presidents.

The Secretary General is Mr. Wilfred Maciel (Kenya) with Mr. Baddru Katteregga (Uganda) as the Assistant General Secretary. Treasurer: Mr. Tarlok Singh Nandhra (Kenya) and seven Directors appointed from Kenya.

NAIROBI NOTES from R. USHMAN

Ghana, Egypt, Angola, Malawi and Tanzania.

The first country in Africa which already has a working WCRP regional or country group is Kenya which initiated WCRP-Kenya in 1982, and it is anticipated that other country groups will be established in Nigeria, Ghana, Tanzania, Uganda, Malawi, perhaps Angola, Burundi and Zaire during 1985 and 1986.

As a supra-national organization, the World Conference on Religion and Peace is in a position to enlist support and do the necessary leaving work in alerting Presidents, Prime Ministers and leaders of governments to the treats which are faced in the world today.

'NEW DELHI'

The President General of WCRP is Archbishop Angelo Fernandes of New Delhi, India, who has repeatedly stressed that we cannot think of world peace if the lives of individuals are themselves in pieces.

The founder secretary-general is Dr. Homer A. Jack from

New York and current Associates Secretary Generals are Dr. Norbert Klaes from West Germany, and Dr. John Taylor from England.

The latter will be the Secretary-General of WCRP IV and has already got himself immersed and involved in the programming and the target deadline dates for this world conference.

In these few notes which have been done early morning on Tuesday from the Bracken-hurst Conference Centre at Limuru in Nairobi I visualise and foresee the pragmatism and the sincerity of the philosophies of Mahatma Gandhi (non violence for liberation and peace) and the teachings of all the major religions of the world being made the base for establishing the new world order

for economic development, for spiritual integration and the well being and the salvation of a world.

I foresee a leaven emerging so that the world leaders will be made to think before acting, and who will be made to realise the stupidity and the callousness of nuclear stock-piling and the basic sins which have made our present generations bring conflict and a drive for violence in their concepts of wanting to settle the issue of world peace in hatred, annihilation and bloodshed.

'CHALLENGE'

I visualise a leaven which will spread and will work everywhere to restore peace where there is hatred, pardon where there is injury, faith where is doubt.

hope where there is despair, light where there is darkness and joy where there is sadness.

The impossibility of creating and making peace is a challenge to WCRP and all the leaders of the world but nothing can crush the buoyancy of prayer, sacrifice and the nobility of love.

The hope for the future lies in small units working together and praying for peace and for the security which is threatening and enslaving mankind and destroying the essentials of love, justice, unity and a new culture which can only bring about peace, love and unity among mankind in the world today.

Minister Confirms Some 'Teething Trouble' With Local Assembly

THE MINISTRY of Industries has clarified that the 'Valmet' brand of tractors being assembled in the country by the Tanzania Tractor Manufacturing Company (TRAMA, which is jointly owned by the State Motor Corporation (SMC) and Valmet of Finland) are ideal for Tanzania.

The country's Minister for Industries Mr. Mramba said that the tractors had shown "Good performance, except for some minor mechanical defects which could be rectified without much trouble."

Recently farmers in the country have been complaining on the fragility of the tractors' wheel rims and some also complained that the hydraulic systems of the tractors were not functioning well.

Mr Mramba said that wheel defects had now been rectified and said that TRAMA was attending to other complaints in relation to defects.

However he stressed that the defects were very minor and did not warrant any reservations on the quality of these tractors.

The Minister also said that the joint project on tractors was through an agreement reached by the Government and Finland and also involved Finnish technological and financial assistance to Tanzania.

Mr Mramba finally explained that Valmet tractors were being used extensively in Brazil and other Latin American countries and also in the Nordic countries.

Meanwhile the Minister for Water and Energy Alnoor Kassum has said that distribution of electricity in the country was determined by industrial development in both urban and rural areas.

He assured that distribution was not determined by 'favouritism' as alleged by some Members of Parliament in the country.

PAPER FACTORY

He clarified that the power supply to Mbeya through Iringa was not based on "Favouritism" but because of the multi-million shillings paper factory that is under construction at Mufindi in Iringa region.

Likewise he said that there are several industries under construction in Mbeya and all these need electricity.

He said rural electrification was covered in the national energy programmes like biogas, windmills, and solar power, since these are not as cheap as they are thought to be.

He noted that the components that made them were expensive and therefore it was best for Tanzania to leave the affluent countries to experiment on them.

If they are found to be economical and feasible in the country then implementation could be done.

Kassum also said that it would be very expensive to extend power through a submarine cable from mainland Tanzania to Pemba Island, or from Zanzibar to Pemba, because the sea bed surrounding Pemba

was too deep. He said that Pemba will continue to get its power through diesel-run generators.

Kassum added that the World Bank was pleased with the country's energy policy and with the effectiveness of the Tanzania Electric Supply Company (TANESCO) and this was why the Bank had extended energy credits to the country.

ANGOLAN OIL

The Minister finally thanked Libya and Angola for their current fuel supplies which had helped in keeping the country going during the present difficult time.

In another development, the government has formed a probe team to investigate allegations regarding the operations of the Capital Development Authority (CDA).

MAN'S BEST FRIEND IS CAUSING QUITE A PROBLEM AT HOME

"Man's best friends" occupies a special place in the hearts of West Germans.

They are clad in jewelled collars, country-style costume or mink, and in the event of death, they finish up in mahogany coffins, with delicate inlay work, and are interred with all due ceremony in their special cemetery.

For dogs are a "life companion" in this country where every second household a pet barks or purrs, whistle or swim. Some three million dogs and just as many cats, inhabit the living rooms of Germans while some 50 million tropical fish swim around a million household aquariums.

Their owners spend over one billion dollars a year on their pets, and doing a roaring business are dog trimmer establishments, massage salons for canines, veterinary clinics and temporary holiday homes for pets.

Human relationships, even marriages, are built and centred around dogs and cases have been known where families have broken up following the death of a pet.

In Summer mornings and evenings lonely old women and men can be seen in Hamburg, Munich or West Berlin walking their dogs which include such breeds as bassetts and beagles.



thoroughbred terriers and dachshunds. But what pet canines leave behind on pavements and in parks is now causing grave concern to city administration and animal protection societies. In Munich some 30,000 dogs relieve their bowels of six tons of waste every day. In Berlin, with 90,000 dogs, about 12 tons. And pedestrians are up in arms complaining that they can hardly walk a step in parks without treading on the dirt of "man's best friend".

'POLICE TICKET'

As a result a large-scale campaign is gaining momentum in several cities in Germany aimed at stopping dogs doing their "business" in the wrong places. Not lacking in humour, one poster shows a stern-looking policeman with a fine ticket in hand, gazing at a helpless dog that has just fouled a public footpath.

ONE OF THE OLDEST customs in the relationship with the human family (which is present with us today also) is that man has acknowledged the right of women to a Dowry (Mahar) on the occasion of marriage.

Should we ask ourselves as to what is the origin of this custom? Why and how did it come into existence? What impression and how does the Dowry take? Should this system be abolished? Let us turn to the Islamic Way and Systems of Rights.

When, on the occasion of marriage, present a gift to women. Whether of the parents have any share or right in that gift. She makes the selection of her husband of her own free will: as long as she is in the house of her father or with her husband, no one has the right to exploit her for his own benefit.

Not only this Dowry remains the property of the woman getting married, but a woman is entitled to keep as her own, anything she and the husband has no right over it. Furthermore, it is the duty of the husband to provide maintenance for her, while she is not compelled to provide money for him.

There are a number of verses of the Holy Qur'an clearly specifying that the Dowry belongs to the woman getting married, and to her alone (be it her husband or parents) and that man is responsible for his wife's maintenance.

The question of parents demanding money in the name of a Dowry to offset the expenses of her upbringing - as if she was a commodity being sold, and value recovered - does not arise in Islamic society.

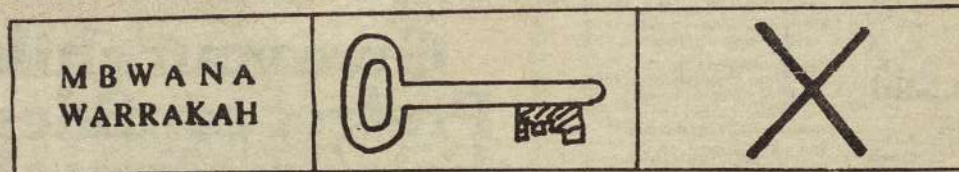

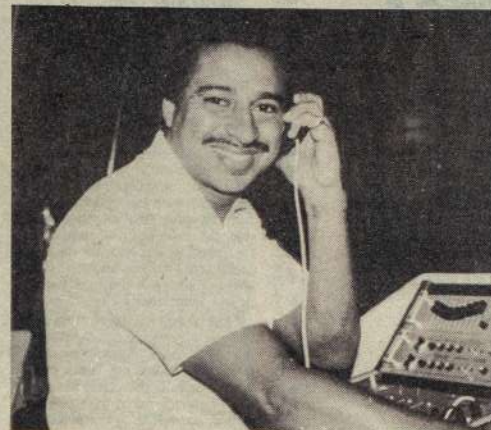
Club Jade is open from 9 p.m. each day of the week.



Aus der Geschäftswelt von Mombasa ist das **CAPRI RESTAURANT** kaum mehr wegzudenken. Direkt im Stadtzentrum im 9-stöckigen Ambal-Haus gelegen, ist es der ideale Treffpunkt der Geschäftsleute. Vor allem mittags herrscht reger Betrieb in diesem eleganten, klimatisierten Feinschmeckerlokal, das für seine vorzügliche Küche und den freundlichen, gepflegten Service weitherum bekannt ist.

1978 wurde das bereits in bescheidenem Rahmen bestehende Restaurant von zwei deutschen Partnern übernommen, umgebaut und neu gestaltet, mit rotem Spannteppich versehen und geschmackvoll eingerichtet.

Die Gesamtleitung des Betriebes untersteht dem gestandenen Hotelfachmann Heinz Riegger. Er stammt aus dem Schwarzwald (deshalb gibt es im Capri auch die beste Original-Schwarzwälder-Kirschtorte) und hat während 30 Jahren in der Gastronomie weltweit wertvolle Erfahrungen gesammelt. Er wurde damals Koch aus Berufung, aber auch ein wenig aus Berechnung, denn in den kargen Nachkriegsjahren in Deutschland kam es ihm nicht ungelegen, in einer Kochlehrstelle immer genug zu essen zu haben...

Im höchstgelegenen Kurort im Schwarzwald, in Höchenschwand mit Sanatorium, Restaurants, Cafe, Metzgerei und Bäckerei, lernte er die Gastronomie von A-Z kennen, welche Kenntnisse ihm in seiner weiteren Laufbahn immer zu gute kamen.

GROENLAND

Nach seinen ersten Lehr- und Wanderjahren in Europa (Deutschland, Schweiz, Schweden) begab er sich zur See. Er ließ sich als Koch auf einem Vermessungsschiff anheuern, das während drei Monaten die meteorologischen Verhältnisse im Nördlichen Eismeer vor Island und Grönland erforschen sollte.

Infolge starker Schneefälle blieb das Schiff im Eis stecken und kehrte erst nach vier Monaten zurück. Obwohl man genügend Lebensmittel an Bord hatte, war es eine willkommene Abwechslung, frisches Fleisch auf dem Tisch zu haben, nachdem der Kapitän einen Eisbären erlegt hatte. Riegger kreierte eine interessante Fleischspeise, die jedoch leicht nach Fisch schmeckte.

Um mehr von der Welt zu sehen, arbeitete Heinz Riegger später für die Holland-Amerika-Linie auf dem Luxusdampfer "Rotterdam", auf dem die Millionäre auf ihren Weltreisen nach Strich und Faden kulinarisch verwöhnt werden. Obwohl diese Route eisfrei war, konnte Heinz Riegger auch diese Reise nicht voll genießen, weil er seekrank wurde.

HEILSARMEE

Er versuchte es daraufhin auf dem Rheindampfer "Mainz", der 1000 Tagespassagiere durch die romantische Weingegend zwischen Köln und Mainz spazierenfuhr. Bei einem Zusammenstoß mit einem Schlepper in der Rhein-Main-Mündung wurde die "Mainz" so stark in die Flanke gerammt, daß sie nach 10 Minuten auf den Grund sank. Alle Mann konnten sicher ans Ufer gebracht werden, jedoch ohne ihr Hab und Gut. Aus diesem Grunde mußte sich auch Heinz Riegger, in der Kochuniform gerettet, von der Heilsarmee neu einkleiden lassen. Daraufhin kehrte er der Seefahrt den Rücken.

Nach einer Saisonstelle im Tunisia Palace in Tunis, Verträgen mit Hilton in Istanbul und Kairo, wo er sich mit den Geheimnissen der orientalischen Küche vertraut machen konnte, war er zwei Jahre in Bangkok, Singapur und Djakarta und lernte auch die Vielfalt der chinesischen und indonesischen Gerichte kennen. In seiner Freizeit immer sehr aktiv, beteiligte sich Heinz Riegger an der Bangkok-Singapur Rallye. Nach einer Reifenpanne

Aufschwung des Tourismus in Kenia. Während er als Executive Chef im Oceanic Hotel - damals das beste Haus am Platze - arbeitete, betreute er kulinarisch das religiöse Oberhaupt der Ismaeliten, Prinz Karim Aga Khan, bei seinen Besuchen in Mombasa und begleitete ihn sogar mehrmals auf seinen Reisen nach Kisumu und Kampala.

In Uganda organisierte Heinz Riegger im Auftrag von Präsident Obote Partys für über 1000 Gäste, an denen auch Idi Amin und die Prinzessin von Toro teilnahmen. Im Oceanic in Mombasa "bekochte" Riegger unter anderem den ersten Präsidenten der Republik Jomo Kenyatta sowie auch Haile

miten in der Nacht überschlug sich sein Wagen in einer Kurve in einer abgelegenen Gegend an der Grenze nach Laos und fiel eine steile Böschung hinunter. Der Abhang war dicht mit Bambus bewachsen, so daß das Auto nach etwa 100 m zwischen zwei Stämmen sanft hängenblieb.

Als die Rallye-Sieger gefeiert wurden, fehlte noch immer jede Spur von Riegger und seiner Crew. Gerade als man nach drei Tagen mit Hilfe amerikanischer Helikopter eine Suchaktion in dem Shiftgebiet starten wollte, kehrten die Vermissten heil zurück. Der VW-Käfer hatte sich trotz allem bewährt, denn er fuhr ohne weitere Reparatur heim nach Bangkok, nachdem er von Grenztruppen mit einer Seilwinde mühsam hochgezogen worden war.

Als nächster Erdteil war nun Afrika zu entdecken. Heinz Riegger kam 1964 nach Mombasa und erlebte die Anfänge und den

Sesslie, den Negus Negusti von Abessinien, auf Staatsbesuch in Kenia.

Im Nyali Beach-Hotel wurde Heinz Riegger vom Catering Manager zum Food & Beverage Manager befördert und war anschließend Manager im Reef Hotel, bevor er aufgrund seiner umfangreichen Berufskennntnisse ans Utalii College, die Hotelfachschule in Nairobi, als Fachlehrer für die Küche gerufen wurde.

GROßWILDJAEGER

Zur Entfaltung seiner dynamischen Persönlichkeit erwarb Heinz Riegger 1978 das **CAPRI RESTAURANT** und den Cave Nachtclub, um einem eigenen Betrieb vorzustehen und ihn nach seinen Prinzipien zu leiten. Im Laufe der Jahre hatte er sich als passionierter Großwildjäger eine ansehnliche Sammlung von Jagdtrophäen zugelegt, die nun in der **HUNTERS BAR** voll zur Geltung kommen und ihr



die richtige afrikanische Atmosphäre verleihen. An dieser wohl längsten Bartheke Mombasas treffen sich ortsbässige Deutsche regelmäßig zu einem gemütlichen Plausch und verzehren nostalgisch die währschaftlichen deutschen Spezialgerichte, die dort gekonnt zubereitet werden.

Um seinem Drang nach immer weiteren Taten zu genügen, erwarb Heinz Riegger nach zwei Jahren auch das Kaffee in den Arkaden, das sich ebenfalls bestens entfaltet hat und erstklassige Patisserie offeriert. Von Zeit zu Zeit werden die Köche und Patissiers zu Trainingskursen ins Utalii College geschickt. Soeben ist auch ein deutscher Bäcker und Konditor eingetroffen, der seine Künste zeigen wird und garantieren soll, daß die Qualität der leckeren Backwaren gehalten oder noch verbessert wird.

Nach alter Tradition fängt der Bäcker jeden Tag um 5 Uhr früh an, so daß das frische Brot und das Gebäck bereits am gleichen Morgen um 9 Uhr im Kaffeehaus in den Arkaden erhältlich ist.

Nach drei Jahren wurde das Arcade Delikatessengeschäft neben dem Kaffee eröffnet, wo man feinste deutsche Wurst, täglich frisches Weiß- und Braunbrot, Kuchen, Rollmops und viele andere leckere Lebensmittel kaufen kann.

Nach vier Jahren ist der Cave Nachtclub vollständig renoviert und zum **TIFFANY'S INTERNATIONAL NIGHTCLUB** umgebaut worden.

Dieses Jahr feiert das **CAPRI RESTAURANT** seinen 5. Geburtstag und der Besitzer und Manger kann auf eine stolze Kette von fünf erstklassigen gastronomischen Betrieben - alle unter einem Dach - zurückblicken.

Heinz Riegger ist übrigens seit nahezu 20 Jahren glücklich verheiratet und hat seine besten selbst kreierte Gerichte nach seiner Frau benannt: "Prawns Cornelia" und Meeresfrüchte-Teller "Daisy".

Obwohl es für Heinz Riegger auch nicht immer leicht war, seine Betriebe trotz der immer wieder auftretenden Knappheiten erfolgreich weiterzuführen, ist er noch voller Energie und Tatendrang und man muß damit rechnen, daß ihm auch im 6. Jahr wieder etwas Neues einfällt.

Schwarzkopf in Afrika

Manfred Kohl hatte gleich sein Herz in Kenia verloren, als er im letzten Jahr mit 220 Friseurern aus Oesterreich im Jadini Beach Hotel in Diani weilte. Deshalb ist er mit seiner Frau und seinen drei Kindern zurückgekommen und verbrachte soeben einen privaten Urlaub am Dianstrand. Manfred Kohl ist Verkaufsmanager von Schwarzkopf, Oesterreich, (einer der größten Hersteller von Haarpflegemitteln der Welt) und reiste letztes Jahr mit insgesamt 220 Friseurern in zwei separaten Gruppen nach Kenia zu einem Friseur-Seminar, kombiniert mit Incentive Urlaub im Jadini Beach Hotel und in der African Sea Lodge.

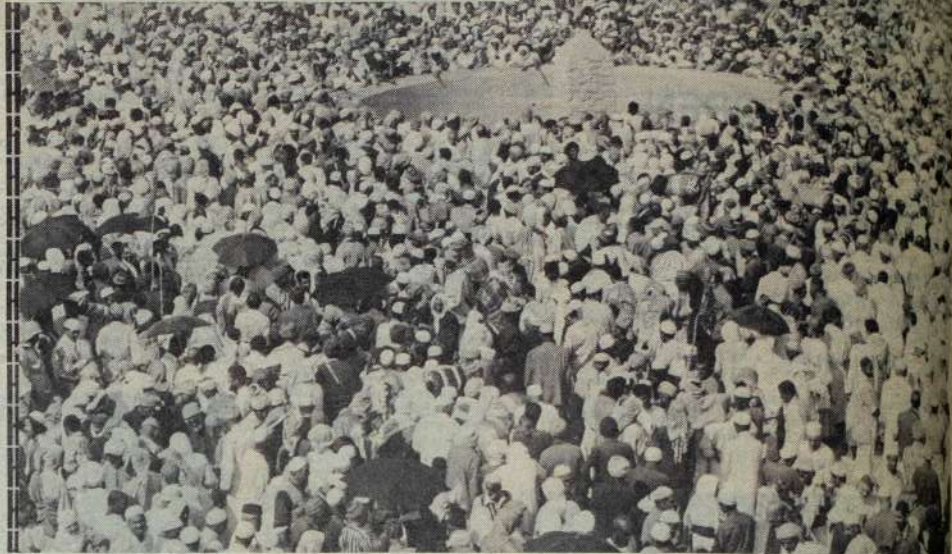

The Meaning Of The Pilgrimage

THE LOUD cry: Allahu Akbar, Allah Akbar, Allahu Akbar" - God is Great and followed by "Allahu Mallabeik, Allahu Mallabeik, Allahu Mallabeik" - meaning here we are to answer the command of Allah are constantly heard during the performances of Pilgrimage rites at Mecca - Haj.

Haj or Pilgrimage to Mecca is the fifth pillar of Islam. It is obligatory only once in one's life for those who can afford to undertake the journey, while the way to Mecca is unquestionably secure.

Its rites implant into a pilgrim a sense of perseverance, endurance, tolerance and sacrifice. There is indeed an element of taking a calculated risk as the pilgrim has to leave his relatives behind while taking this an arduous journey to Mecca and also his business.

During this time Muslims are called upon to widen their mental horizons and expand their spiritual vision to the extent as deliberately exert a good public relation with Muslim fellows: whose divergent cultural norms might cause incompatibility in their communication and mutual understanding.

Certainly the pilgrim has always increased the sense of

brotherly solidarity among the Muslims as it has also cemented the major characteristic of a good Muslim: that of being easily approachable and of good character so others could easily feel safe with him.

rewards for those who sincerely and submissively undertake the rites properly.

The Muslim who performs the pilgrimage feels strongly that he is very close to his Creator and therefore his thoughts are

obeyed the order of Allah to slaughter his own beloved son and the son accepted to have his head chopped so that his father could fulfil his Creator's command.

Ismail was so obedient to his father that he willingly accepted death in obedience of his father's commands so that the order of Allah will be reverently obeyed.

But God Almighty would never desert His loyal messenger and appreciated the loyalty and obedience of Prophet Abraham and the son - Ismail. A substitute was presented to Abraham. It was a lamb to be sacrificed in the place of Ismail. The true and sincere intention prevailed: that of genuine sacrifice.

'Cultural Act'

Ever since, the offering of sacrifice has persisted and become an important component of the pilgrimage rites as well as a significant cultural act by Muslims when celebrating their Idd-el-Hajj, all over the world.

On the domestic scene, Muslim wives have a great lesson to learn from the episodes of Ismail's two wives. On visiting the Ismail House (Babu el-Ismail) the Muslim women pilgrims are required to remember the two significant episodes.

The Prophet Abraham visited his beloved son's home to find the son had gone out in search of a livelihood. He met Ismail's nagging, complaining and howling wife at the door step and asked his daughter in law about conditions at home. Ismail's wife expressed indignation and complained that there was never enough at home and that it was always lonely and hot. Actually the house had for the simple family.

On bidding farewell to his daughter in law, the Prophet Abraham requested her to deliver a message to his son that he should change the present worn out doorstep, keeping it any longer would render him unhappy.

The message reached Ismail and was properly understood. Immediately he divorced his wife, informed her that the doorstep symbolised her and

During the pilgrimage period, thousands of Muslims from every corner of the world converge into Mecca to perform their arduous but most satisfying duty.

Mecca contains within it an ancient house known as Kaaba which was built by Prophet Abraham with his son Ismail (God blessing be upon them) for worship of Allah.

'PURE THOUGHTS'

When the Muslims undertake the pilgrimage, they are required to suppress their worse passions, completely refrain from abusive language and bloodshed and be pure in thoughts and words and deeds.

The Almighty Allah promises

deeply concentrated on Allah.

Mecca provides that environment which offers a pilgrim an atmosphere laden with piety and godliness.

The great teaching that a Muslim derives from the rites of pilgrimage is genuine sense of sacrifice of one's greatest and most treasured possessions for the One he loves. The pilgrimage reflects the pure essence of sacrifice.

The entire history of pilgrimage reminds the Muslims of the Prophet Abraham's son's and his wife's sense of great sacrifice as Hajar, the wife, agreed to be left alone in a wilderness by the Prophet Abraham while the father

that because of her nagging nature and frowning face she has rendered his life unhappy.

The next year the Prophet Abraham returned to his son's home to find there was another wife with a cheerful and charming fact, enthusiastic, ever content and happy. The home conditions materially had not changed at all but the house looked immaculately clean and bright.

The Prophet Abraham asked about the home conditions and the wife expressed gratitude to God Almighty for the bounty in the house. She had nothing but praise to offer for her husband's optimistic and co-operation with their neighbours.

On bidding the farewell to the second wife the Prophet Abraham requested the wife to pass on his message to his son - to inform the husband that the present door step he had installed was made of good wood and properly engraved in the earth.

The message reached Ismail and was properly understood. He interpreted that the doorstep is a symbol of his wife that she was good, from a good home and of good characteristics and character.

It was this wife who brought blessings to Prophet Ismail and become the great mother of the Arabs.

'Deeper Meaning'

The sacrifice as emanated from the pilgrimage rituals as deeper meaning to all the Muslims who meditate and go further into their philosophical teachings. And this sacrifice could be translated into many forms and all of which could be as appropriate and useful to mankind.

Would it not, for example, be appropriate for rich Muslims in Kenya to donate to 'Harambee' education projects, health institutions and social organizations?

If Muslims generously contribute towards promoting educational institutions in the country or any other noble venture will definitely be simulating the spirit of the Prophet Abraham and his own small sense of sacrifice.

GALGALO OPENS NEW COAST 'TYRE PLACE'

VEHICLE Agencies, transport and tourist companies were well represented at the formal opening of Car & General's new tyre centre, performed by Mr. LUKA D. GALGALO the Coast Provincial Commissioner last Friday.

Mr. Galgalo was welcomed by Mr. Jim Davies Car & General's Managing Director, and was shown around "the Tyre Place". Car & General have operated retreading factories in Nairobi and Mombasa for many years, but the company had decided to open this new service at the main showrooms and workshops in Haile Selassie Road.

This would offer customers greater comfort in the air conditioned premises while tyres were changed, and wheels balanced.

The new equipment was demonstrated, including air power tools to remove wheel nuts, electronic wheel balancing machines whose digital readout indicated position and size of the weights required to achieve static and dynamic balancing.

"The Tyre Place" includes a CRYPTON Diagnostic Centre which will carry out a rapid analysis of the cars electrical system including battery voltage, the distributor voltage drop, a check on spark plugs, including wiring and insulation.

The display included a selection of retread patterns available in both the conventional retread method and the Bandag cold process.

Mr. Galgalo planted a young rubber tree near the entrance to the new facility, a symbol of Car and General's experiment with developing locally grown rubber to offset the 2,000,000 pounds that Car and General import each year for retreading tyres and manufacturing gum-boats.

'SAVING EXCHANGE'

Although it will need seven years to bring the trees to production, the Company feel the exercise is worthwhile to reduce the amount of foreign exchange required, with the possibility of making Kenya self sufficient in rubber in less than 20 years.

Mr. Davies listed the wide range of services offered by the Company; apart from their retreading operations, Car & General dealt in cookers and refrigerators, tools, and workshop equipment, motorcycles and out board engines, while some 50% of the items sold are made in Kenya.

After unveiling a plaque in "the Tyre Place" Mr. Galgalo congratulated Car & General on their new installation, offering a faster service and greater comfort to their customers.

Mr. Jim Davies then presented the Provincial Commissioner with a cheque for Shs. 5,000/- to charity and led the guests to the refreshments set out in the show rooms.

One of the products on show at the Mombasa ASK Show that generated considerable interest among the general public was UltraSeal a process that promises to reduce the cost of motoring and do away with time wasting and tempering punctures.

A puncture has been an irritant to all vehicle operators ever since the pneumatic tyre took over from solid wheels and Murphy's first Law for Engineers will make sure a wheel goes flat when you are (a) in a hurry, (b) it's raining and after dark, (c) you have your best clothes on.

Roads are littered with objects likely to cause punctures; nails from broken-up packing cases in port or industrial area, or for those who do a lot of their driving off tarmac, the long thorns that cover so much of Kenya. Thorns operated on a delay system so that a car may

pick up several in each wheel that will not penetrate the tube until the car gets back onto tarmac and hammers the thorns deeper with each revolution.

Similar products have been available on the market for many years, with varying success. Among the complaints listed are tyre valves becoming clogged with sealant, the tendency for the compound to settle while the car is stationary causing serious balancing problems and the corrosive effects to wheels and tyres.

UltraSeal claims to be able to do away with punctures and blowouts, which certainly

appeals to all vehicle operators and drivers.

UltraSeal was developed over a number of years by an international company based in the United States of America, their objectives being a tyre sealing process that would counteract the natural porosity of tyres and tubes that permit a gradual reduction in pressure, followed by a variety of problems.

By the manufacturer's estimation, 80% of all tyres in use are under-inflated. It is an exceptionally careful driver who has the tyre pressures checked regularly, a large proportion of drivers still use the "walk-round-and-kick" system.

A tyre that is underinflated offers greater rolling resistance which overheats the tyre, increasing the rate of wear and at the same time, stepping up the vehicle's fuel consumption.

A carefully metered quantity of UltraSeal can be pumped into a tyre or tube without removal from the vehicle, and the compound soon spreads itself into a uniformly distributed layer around the inside of the tyre.

When a sharp object is forced through the tread, capillary action draws the compound into the hole producing a flexible seal that is impervious to water or mud. Some pressure drop is

experienced but the vehicle can be driven in safety.

The UltraSeal stand at the Mombasa Show included an inflated wheel that was pierced constantly by a hand spike, with no sign of deflation.

The manufacturers self-imposed specifications demand that the compound is: harmless to rubber, non corrosive to wheels or steel belted tyres, does not separate in use, has a minimum shelflife of 5 years, and is effective in a temperature range from -40°C. to +150°C.

The cost of treating a tyre is estimated at 5% of a new tyre and tube; treatment should allow a 25% increase in the life of the tyre.

UltraSeal has been tested by the research institute of an international oil company, the Automobile Association of Great Britain and several tyre manufacturers.

With the high cost of all aspects of transport today, there must be several organisations in this country in a position to test UltraSeal on a proportion of their vehicle fleet.

Anyone who operates vehicles on bush tracks and keeps one person employed full time on puncture repairs alone would be glad to hear of a positive improvement.

Motor sport must offer an equally valid test situation for UltraSeal; many a rally result is decided by the number of punctures suffered by the top contending cars.

Geneva in 1948 in response to the wishes of maritime nations to consolidate the diverse forms of international co-operation which had grown up over the years in the world of shipping. The IMCO convention required acceptance of twenty-one states, including seven with at least one million gross tons of shipping each. This requirement was met on 17th March 1958 and the first session of the IMCO Assembly met in London in January 1959.

IMCO Secretariat is located in London at the headquarters of the organization. The name IMCO changed to IMO — International Maritime Organization — on 22nd May 1982.

In honouring this event, the Kenya Posts and Telecommunications Corporation is issuing a set of four special stamps featuring ships in Kilindini harbour, life saving devices, Mombasa container terminal and a marine park. The stamps are in the denominations of /70, shs. 2/50, shs. 3/50 and shs. 10/-. All the stamps will be of a regular horizontal format.

SECOND DAY

The 110 metres hurdles provided Daley with the ultimate test for his groin trouble. But despite the muscle stress, Thompson played it carefully to clock a creditable 14.37 sec.

The discus brought the same muscles as the shot into play, but with a best throw of 44.46 metres Thompson again made few mistakes.

The pole vault is an act of great agility and Thompson had the best vault of the day with 5.20 metres.

The javelin is an action replay of the shot and discus. The same, overtired muscles had to be used, but Thompson still managed a best throw of 65.24 metres.

Then came the final act. The 1,500 metres slog rounds off two gruelling days.

It is the event all decathletes hate most of all as they summon up one, last effort.

Thompson did his job perfectly, finishing with a time of 4 min. 29.72 sec. The gold was his.

FIRST DAY

Thompson was forced to put all his card on the table in the opening event the 100 metres.

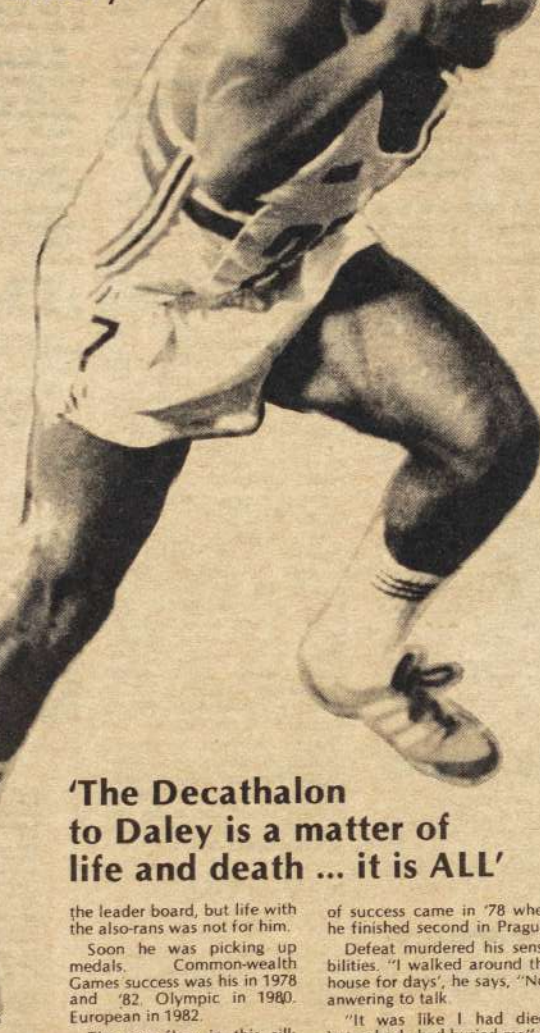
Any troubles would have been immediately exposed with the muscles in legs, arms, back and abdomen all coming into play.

He won in 10.60 second—fastest of all the decathletes.

Then came the long jump and Thompson powered to a leap of 7.88 metres and topped the lot again.

The shot putt—the most technical of all the decathlon disciplines—calls for great skill and strength.

the leader board, but life with the also-rans was not for him.

Soon he was picking up medals. Common-wealth Games success was his in 1978 and '82 Olympic in 1980. European in 1982.

The one flaw in this silk

of success came in '78 when he finished second in Prague.

Defeat murdered his sensibilities. "I walked around the house for days", he says, "Not answering to talk."

"It was like I had died, but nobody had buried me".

His elder brother, Frank, adds a fitting footnote to that: "The Decathlon to Daley is a matter of lie and death. It is all."

All? Not quite. Daley, whose loves have included Sue Barker and Sharron Davies, has another important consideration.

His steady girlfriend is 22-year-old Ticia Quinlan, and friend says: "Daley is very serious about Ticia. I expect them to marry after he has won next year's Olympics."

Note the certainty of that statement — "after he has won."

DALEY THOMPSON is the world's greatest athlete.

Many men can run faster, jump higher, leap longer and throw further.

But none can do ALL of them as well as the 25-year-old likely lad from Crawley, Sussex.

In the Decathlon—10 separate events of physical skill and endurance—he is World champion, Olympic champion, European and Common-wealth champion.

Britain's chief coach, Frank Dick, says with honest Scottish conviction: "He's a Superman."

Frank says he'll never see another athlete in his lifetime like Daley Thompson, and adds:

Supreme

"It will be many, many years after I have left this planet before anyone can even approach Thompson for pure athletic ability.

"His performance in the world championships in Helsinki demanded a supreme effort in every way—emotionally, intellectually, physically and psychologically."

Over two days, with the eyes of the world upon him, Daley produced all the ruthless qualities of Old Nick.

But that in itself was not unusual. The most complete athlete in history has been giving himself hell for years now. In an age when most men are searching for the soft options, Thompson's training schedule reads like the labours of Hercules. A 50 hour week is one of the hard facts of his life.

Suzanne Dando, the pretty athlete turned film star, learned this when she telephoned him last Boxing Day. She asked what kind of Christmas he had.

"Not bad," said Daley. "I trained in the morning and again in the afternoon!"

Suzanne did not find that peculiar, for to know Daley

is to understand him.

"He's an exceptional human being", she says. "You would have to travel a long way in this world to meet anyone quite like him.

"Nothing and nobody gets in his way when it comes to work and training".

Not many people know the real Daley Thompson. But within a small circle of friends he is popular and much admired.

He could, if he wanted, be a millionaire. He already has lucrative contracts with Faberge and Lucozade.

Yet he still resists many chances to bring in some more of the daily bread.

One friend says: "Deep down he may be motivated by money, but if he is he hides it well. He is the only person I know who does not allow cash to conflict with his job.

"In the next few years or so it would not surprise me if he makes two or three million pounds. But he will do it his way."

Daley has always been a bit special at doing it his way. As a child he was so hyperactive he forgot to sleep.

As a result his Dundonian mother, Lydia Thompson, sent him to a Sussex boarding school that catered for exuberant youngsters.

By 17, he had qualified for his first Olympics. On that occasion, he finished 18th on
