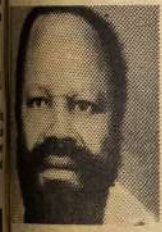

Peaceful Nyayo Elections

IN ONE of Kenya's most peaceful national assembly elections, seven parliamentary seats changed hands at the Coast while 11 former M.P.s vigilantly retained their seats in Monday's polls, writes Gray Phombeah.

Thousands of voters swarmed the polling stations in the province, but local officials termed the Monday's turnout as "poor".

In one of the toughest election races in the political history of Mombasa Central constituency, Sharif Nassir narrowly beat Mohamed Jahazi to retain his seat for another term.

He polled 11,824 votes against Jahazi's 11,317. A third candidate, Mr. Ongongo M. Ochola collected 326 votes.

In the 1979 elections, Sharif Nassir scooped 16,547 votes while Mohamed Jahazi polled 11,167 votes.

It was 'sweet revenge' for

Abdallah Mwaruwa who ousted the same man who beat him in 1974 to recapture the Mombasa North seat.

He polled 10,490 votes against his rival and former M.P. Said Hemed's 10,427 - in one of the closest election races in the province.

In Mombasa South Abdallah Ndovu Mwidau won comfortably to retain his seat by polling 6,906 votes against a former M.P. of the area, Mr. K.S. Mwavumo who collected 3,767 votes.

In Mombasa West, which was not contested by its former M.P. Mr. Kioko, a newcomer in Mombasa politics Mr. J.K. Kiliko emerged the winner after polling 4,493 votes and overshadowed a former M.P. of the area Mr. Ferdinand Mwaro who came second with 4,175 votes.

ROBERT MATANO

Minister Robert Matano retained his Kwale North seat when he polled 5,049 against Bidu's 3,343 and Mwatsahu's 4,009.

The stunning results came from Kwale East where an assistant minister Mr. Kassim Mwamzandi lost his seat to his arch rival Ali Masoud Mwakileo, by 6,467 votes to Mwakileo's 12,442.

In Kwale Central, the late Juma Boy's son, Boy Juma Boy stepped into his father's shoes in style with 9,516 votes. Mbwana Warrakah and Gideon Kioko polled 4,294 and 608 respectively. In the 1979 elections, the late Juma Boy polled 11,081 votes for the same constituency.

In Kilifi North, Katana Ngala

received 3,094 votes.

Chibule wa Tsuma romped back to retain his Kilifi South seat with 14,139 votes against Baya's 3,159, his closest rival.

In Malindi South, Francis 'Bob' Tuva retained his seat with 5,090 votes. His closest rival Mr. A. Badawi polled 4,349 votes.

In Malindi North, J.K. Nzayi,

Msanifu Kombo, a former mayor of Mombasa, made a political comeback when he won the Totonoka ward, polling 1,635 votes.

Former deputy mayor Ahmed Mwidani was the only civic candidate returned unopposed in Mombasa.

'Best Bavarian Soup

POTATO SOUP

Many regional recipes exist for this main course soup in Germany. The following preparation is served with Frankfurter sausages (or Fleischwurst) and fresh rolls. A piece of smoked lean bacon (durchwachsener Speck) boiled with the soup produces a particularly rich taste.

**RECIPE OF
THE WEEK**

750 g (1 3/4 lb) potatoes, 1 1/2 l (3 pt) water, 2 carrots, 2 tomatoes, 1 leek, 2 pieces of celery, finely chopped 100 g (4 oz) smoked bacon, 1 large onion, 1 dessertspoon chopped parsley, 1 dessertspoon chopped chives, 4 tablespoons soured cream and salt, pepper.

Wash the peeled potatoes, carrots, leek, celery and tomatoes; cut into small pieces. Put with the water into a large saucepan.

Cover, bring to the boil and simmer for 45 minutes or until potatoes start to fall apart. Whisk until a smooth, thick texture is achieved. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Add the cream. Cut the smoked bacon into small cubes and heat until crisp in a frying pan.

Then add the finely chopped onion and fry until golden. Pour the mixture over the soup.

HUNTER'S CUTLETS

4 veal cutlets (1 1/2 cm thick), salt, pepper, 50 g fat, 120 g (4 1/2 oz) sliced mushrooms, 1 very finely chopped onion, 2 tablespoons plain flour, 2 Tablespoons very finely chopped herbs (parsley, chives), 20 g (3/4 oz) butter, 1/2 spoon cornflour.

Mix the herbs and melt the butter. Wash the cutlets, sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cut the mushrooms into each cutlet fill with the onion mixture and together.

Turn each cutlet in the flour and fry in the fat until brown on both sides. Add mushrooms and 4-6 spoons of hot water.

Cover the pan with a lid and leave simmering over low heat for 15-20 minutes. It needs thickening with 1 teaspoon flour mixed in a tablespoon cold water.

They saw woodcarvers at work, the aquarium and snake park, their host being Tony Pape, managing director of Kenya Marinas.

On the terrace overlooking Mtwapa Creek they enjoyed a superb lunch with Jacky Wainwiller, proprietor of Le Pichet and his attractive wife, Monique, going round to chat to them all to ensure that these special guests were enjoying their meal.

There was an impromptu musical concert provided by a tourist who had just returned from a Kenya Marinas dhow safari.

He had made a collection from dhow passengers that day after explaining that Nyumba ya Wazee was a home lovingly established by the Little Sisters of the Poor for destitute elderly folk, which they run on charity.

A moist-eyed Mother Superior thanked all those who had made the day's outing such an enjoyable and memorable event. She said it had given great happiness to everyone.

Le Pichet, which was destroyed by fire last year, remains a gourmet's paradise at the coast. A great boon for tourists and residents on the north coast is that transport can be provided to and from the restaurant, the return fare being only Shs. 20/-

'Octopussy' — James Bond At His Very Best

A NEW 007 adventure is set to hit the big screen in Mombasa today at Kenya Cinema in a premier show in aid of the Ziwani School for the Deaf. And once again James Bond fans - particularly Roger Moore - are assured of lots of fun, writes Gray Phombeah.

of an Indian prince involved in a smuggling ring with such strange bedfellows as a Russian general determined to start a nuclear war all in his own, while Matt Adams is the ring-leader Octopussy, who becomes the latest Bond main surrounded by her loyal but lethal female companions.

the property of the woman getting married but a woman is entitled to keep as her own earnings she earns and the husband has no right over it.

Furthermore, it is the duty of the husband to provide maintenance for her while she is compelled to provide money to him.

There are a number of verses of the Holy Qur'an clearly specifying that the woman getting married belongs to the woman getting married and to nobody else. It is her husband or parents who that man is responsible for the wife's maintenance.

The question of dowry demanding money in the name of "Dowry" to offset the expense of her upbringing - as if she were a commodity being sold and then recovered - does not exist in the Islamic Society.

In another seat which was not contested by its immediate former M.P., a newcomer, Mr. N.N. Lukindo, emerged winner of the Taveta constituency with 3,136 votes. Mr. O. Mnene, a former M.P. of the area, polled 2,446 votes.

In Tana River District, former M.P.s Israel Ddaiddo and Omar Soba retained their seats in Tana South and North, respectively.

DATELINE: DAR ES SALAAM

At Last A New Book Explains The Recent 'War In Uganda'

THE Italian Government has advanced a credit of 228 million shillings to Tanzania to finance the Mtera Hydro-Electric Power Project which is expected to begin early next year. This project, which is estimated to cost some 2616 million shillings is co-financed by Norway, Sweden, France, Kuwait, the Federal Republic of Germany, the World Bank the Tanzania Government.

The Tanzania Government will bear 1044 million shillings of the project cost while the other co-financers will put in the remaining 1572 million shillings.

When ready the power station at Mtera is expected to produce 80 megawatts of electricity which together with the 200 megawatts supply from the other power station at Kidatu is expected to meet the country's electricity needs upto 1992.

Meanwhile four years after Tanzania ousted the savage regime of Idi Amin from Uganda, a new book titled 'war in Uganda' which is now on sale here, retouches on how Idi Amin was dethroned off his eight years of tyrannical rule in Uganda.

KAMPALA

The 244 page book does not carry an exhaustive account of the war mainly because the authors Tony Avirang (former BBC correspondent in Tanzania and his wife Martha Honey only witnessed part of the fighting under the auspices of the brigade that conquered Kampala city.

The book is however well researched and by interviewing

insight into exile politics featuring divergent parties, movements and intellectual groups.

The dangers posed by whipping up religious emotions are also assessed. The assessments reflect on how Amin created enmity between the previously harmonious muslims and christians

ARUSHA

The book also mentions how he got some Arab countries to side with his regime by making them believe that they were helping fellow muslims against hostile christians.

This is one book that Idi Amin who is now living in exile in Saudi Arabia will wish not to read.

Away from tyranny, politics and bloodshed, there was good news this week for Dar Es Salaam and Arusha residences. The Tanzania Tourist Corporation (TTC) has announced plans to set up two chinese restaurants in the country, at the new *Salari Hotel* in Arusha and the new *Africa hotel* in Dar-Es-Salaam.

The restaurants are to be established in collaboration with the People's Republic of China and a chinese delegation was recently in the country to discuss and finalise plans.

JOHANNES VON VACANO - AN INTIMATE VIEW ...

MR. JOHANNES von Vacano was appointed Ambassador of the Federal Republic of Germany to Kenya in September 1982.

He is the eighth German Head of Mission to Kenya. Diplomatic relations between the two countries were first established in 1963.

Born in 1926 in Cologne in a big family with eleven sisters and brothers, Mr. von Vacano entered the German Foreign Service in 1952.

He says, his experience during World War II when he served as a soldier and was held in captivity made him interested in diplomacy.

"Wars have to be avoided and as a diplomat one may contribute towards peaceful solutions", he says.

With an educational background of law studies and practical experience in a major German company the young von Vacano started his diplomatic career 1953 in Bagdad, Iraq.

This assignment contributed towards devising various infra-structural development plans there.

Three years later, he was sent to Moscow when the Federal Republic of Germany opened an Embassy there and supervised the repatriation of ten thousand of Germans from the Soviet Union.

NATO COLLEGE

After a posting to Madrid and studies at the Nato Defence College in Rome, von Vacano was appointed Deputy Chief of Protocol at the Foreign Office in Bonn.

He held this post for two years before he became the Federal Republic of Germany's deputy ambassador in Buenos Aires Argentina in 1973.

He was appointed the German ambassador to La Paz, Bolivia in 1979.

While none of his diplomatic assignments had been easy, the one in Bolivia was probably the most turbulent where he saw 14 presidents come and go during his three and half year term of office in one of the world's poorest countries.

Kenya was Mr. von Vacano's choice against alternative posts in Europe and after nine months in the country, he says his high expectations have been surpassed.

He emphasises the close and fruitful cooperation between Kenya and Germany.

The Ambassador believes that

'partnership is the essence and base of German/Kenyan co-operation' and adds, 'I appreciate that our understanding partnership is mutual.'

Besides being an ambassador Mr von Vacano is the permanent representative of the Federal Republic of Germany to UNEP and Habitat in Nairobi.

Mr. von Vacano is married with two children, 16-year-old son Paolo and 12-year-old daughter Stephanie, who are both attending the German School in Nairobi.

His wife, Francesca is Italian born. They first met in Moscow and got married 24 years ago.

Mr von Vacano is a man of understatement rather than exuberant expressions but while his remarks are short and precise they are nevertheless cordial.

Colleagues and friends also treasure his quiet and thoughtful ways.

THOMAS MANN

Appreciating German classical authors like Thomas Mann and Hermann Hesse for inspiration and delight, Mr von Vacano willingly admits that, for relaxation, he also reads an occasional paperback. He also likes to play golf.

He prefers spending his leisure with his family at home but says the duties revolving around his assignment keep not only him, but also his wife Francesca, "every busy".

Mrs. von Vacano is known as an amicable and thoughtful host of many receptions at the Ambassador's residence.

'Kenya Needs Charter Flights'

TO HELP generate more holiday bookings to Kenya, Austrian Air Transport, and two tour operators, MERIDIAN and TOUROPA AUSTRIA sponsored a week's visit here of four journalists from newspapers and state radio station 'ORF' in Austria.

Leading the group was Dr. Franz Kotruba, manager of Austrian Air Transport which will be resuming once weekly flights to Mombasa from Oct. 14, and from the beginning of November will be flying here twice a week.

It is the only charter carrier to be equipped with twelve first class seats.

It has been found that charters and the good reliable service they offer are attracting many of the upper middle-class who book a package holiday and then spend the money saved on the more expensive safaris here.

Vera Zedka, chief editor of three touristic newspapers, who was also writing for KURIER - one of the largest newspapers in Austria, pointed out that the airfare on a scheduled flight Vienna/Nbi/Msa was about K.Shs. 30,000/-, whereas the lowest priced package holiday by charter to Mombasa was around K.Shs. 8,600/-.

Said Vera 'with an international recession many are now asking themselves why not fly to Kenya on a package tour and use the money so saved in seeing as much of the country

as they can.'

She said 'personally, I feel that more charter flights should be allowed into Kenya, as scheduled air fares here are really too high.'

BUSINESS TRIPS

This was Vera's 19th visit to Kenya which has embraced both business trips and holidays. She was here in June and together with Dr. Franz Kotruba met the Minister for Tourism, Mr. E. Mwangale, later attending a meeting of the Civil Aviation Board which approved the application for a second charter flight to Mombasa of Austrian Air Transport.

She also feels that Kenya could be doing more to attract tourists here.

She said that Kenya is a wonderful country with a wonderful infra-structure, and such friendly people. Said Vera 'there is little doubt that Kenya could be attracting many more tourists and fill all hotel beds, if the market was more thoroughly studied.' She considers that the price of safaris offered by tour operators are 'too high', and that hotels should not be offering Kenya residents special rates which are lower than those given to tour operators who bring so many tourists here from overseas.

For Burkhart List from the Austrian state radio station

'ORF' it was his first visit to Kenya. Having travelled in West and Southern Africa, he said 'Kenya is the best country for me'.

He explained 'you feel very free here and the food is so nice for vegetarians like me'. Commenting on scheduled air fares to Kenya, he felt these were 'too high', but thought that hotel prices are 'reasonable'.

Burkhart found Kenya a very interesting country with so many different attractions. Adding 'the weather is good, while the people are very pretty and friendly'.

It was Christa Oberfichtner's first visit to Africa. She is with the Oberoesterreichische Rundschau, a weekly newspaper in Upper Austria. She said 'we hear many bad things about Africa and I was, therefore, surprised to find the Kenyan people so self-assured and friendly.'

FANTASTIC BEACHES

Helena Wallner is writing two pages about her Kenya visit for the newspaper Kleine Zeitung. She was also very surprised by the friendliness of the people here. Helena described Kenya's beaches as 'fantastic'.

Good News For New York Freight

THE good news from New York has been the announcement of the formation of a new shipping line to operate between East Africa and the United States. The new shipping line, Normount Africa Line (NORAL), will operate a direct service between the East African ports of Dar-Es-Salaam, Mombasa and Assab, and the US ports of New York, New Orleans and Houston.

The new combination of break-bulk and container service will initially operate on a monthly basis with three vessels which will be named at a later date.

Noral's agents in Mombasa have been named as Comarat Kenya Ltd housed at the Cannon Towers Building along Moi Avenue.

The Panama-registered vessel *Georgos N*, left Mombasa at the weekend after discharging 500 tons of Bitumen in drums for Kenol and loaded 3,740 tons of maize for Lome, Togo.

At the same time a Danish vessel *m. v. Iben* left with 450 tons of cement for Nifhuth near Aden.

Another consignment of 400 tons of cement left for Kismayu, Somalia aboard the German vessel *m. v. Groverort*.

COPPER CARGO

M. v. Kotia Kaya is reported to be still in Dar loading copper for China and may not be coming to Mombasa as scheduled earlier on. Another vessel, *m. v. Ohio*, which was scheduled to arrive in Mombasa last week to discharge flour is also reported to be still anchored outside

the port of Aden.

The 9251-ton vessel *Pritzwalk* was scheduled to sail on Wednesday after loading 1800 tons of coffee and tea for UK. She is flying the East German flag.

Two Italian Vessels, *m. v. Torre Del Greco* and *Apulia*, left early this week with general cargo for Italy and Mediterranean ports.

M. v. First Jay, belonging to the NYKE lines, finally made it to Mombasa on Tuesday after a week's delay. She is now discharging 116 cars from Japan.

Another consignment of 60 cars arrived on Sunday aboard *m. v. Gela Delmar*.

State of Rajasthan of the Shipping Corporation of India was expected to dock in Mombasa on Wednesday to discharge general cargo from Calcutta and load 600 tons of wattle extract before sailing to Dar-es-Salaam.

An oil tanker, *m. v. Yukikace*, is expected to steam through the Likoni channel today for discharge at the Shimanzi oil terminal.

Mombasa Beach Hosting Courses On Management

THE popularity and demand for courses run by the nearly ten year old Kenya Institute of Management continues to grow.

Taking place at Mombasa Beach Hotel have been two 5-day courses on 'The Effective Manager' and 'Secretarial Management for Personal Secretaries.'

Aiming to become more 'effective managers' were 18 participants from many leading industries and companies at Mombasa as well as two from the Aga Khan Nursery and Primary schools.

Among the companies represented were Associated Vehicle Assemblers; Kenya Power and Lighting; Mitchell Cotts; MPS; Bamburi Portland Cement; Securicor and Kenya Airways.

COMMUNICATION

Opening each course was Eric Cohen, KIM's Training Executive who has been in this country for forty years. They were held in the hotel's 'annexe' where there is the utmost peace, as well as a panoramic view of the sea.

Among the subjects discussed were Effective Commun-

ication; Delegation and Control; How to Tackle Disputes and Grievances; Staff Assessment and Performance Appraisal; Problem Solving and Decision Making. It also gave these 'middle management' participants the opportunity of exchanging views on specific problems with which they have been confronted.

National Chairman of KIM is Dr. Robert Ouko, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and vice-chairman, Godfrey Tetu, managing director of Kenya Breweries.

KIM's first national chairman was the late Tom Mboya, and in his memory a lecture is delivered annually by a leading personality agreed by the council. They have been taking place over the past 12 years, and speakers have emphasised the important role efficient, competent and experienced management must play in this country.

For these Mombasa courses, KIM was using for the first time locally based lecturers, instead of importing them from Nairobi. Similar courses are now being held in Western Kenya where KIM has a branch. In fact, it now has two branches - one in Mombasa and the other in Western Kenya, its HQ being in Nairobi.

In an interview, Mr. Cohen revealed that KIM also holds two examinations - one for a Certificate in Business Administration, and the other - a more senior one - for a Diploma in Management. These take place twice a year.

ADVANCEMENT

He disclosed that annually about 1,200 people benefit from a range of different courses offered by KIM, and that it is mostly members who take advantage of this opportunity for advancement.

Mr. Cohen explained that the Institute has 212 companies as 'collective' members. In addition, there are between 1,100 to 1,200 'individual members, these ranging from 'Fellows' to 'Student Members'.

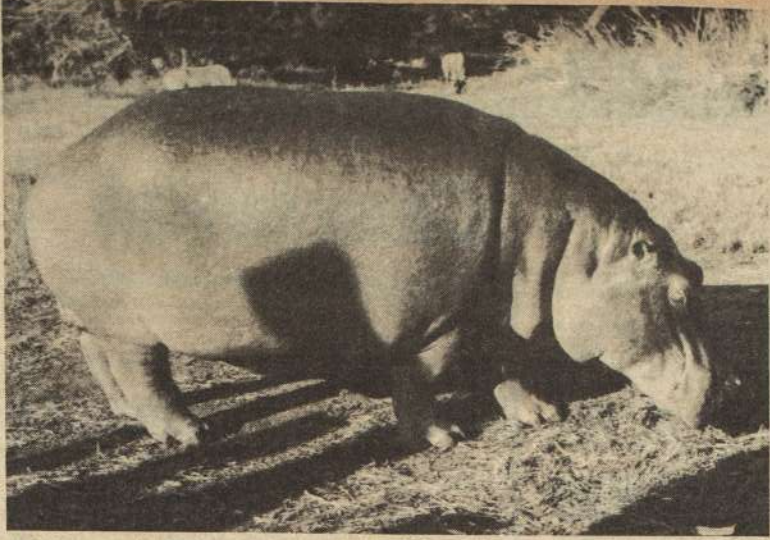

In den Waldlichtungen halten sich wilde Tiere auf und wandern frei herum in diesem Mini-Park, der zu Fuß von den Strandhotels an der Nordküste zu erreichen ist.

Da es in dieser Wüste nicht an Wasser fehlte, wurden Versuche mit Fischen durchgeführt mit dem erfreulichen Ergebnis, daß eine kommerzielle Fischfarm entstand, die den lokalen Markt mit Tilapia beliefert.

Mit der Aufforstung des verlassen Steinbruchs wurde 1971 begonnen. Für jeden einzelnen Baum mußte ein Loch in den Korallenstein gehauen werden, bevor er von Hand gepflanzt werden konnte. Auch andere Pflanzen wurden gesetzt, um das Ökosystem auszubalancieren und das notwendige Unterholz als Lebensraum für die wilden Tiere zu schaffen.

Der schwarze Tausendfüßler mit den roten Schuhen spielt eine äußerst wichtige Rolle bei der Produktion von Humus, der die Basis für das gesunde Wachstum von Büschen, Sträuchern und Grasflächen bildet.

12 Jahre und 60.000 Bäume später ist durch die aufopfernde Arbeit einiger weniger Leute in dieser trostlosen, öden Landschaft ein sich selbst erhaltendes Waldsystem entstanden, das sich jedes Jahr um 4 Hektar ausbreitet.

An den reich mit Schilf und Seerosen bewachsenen Teichen haben sich viele Wasservögel angesiedelt. Man sieht ägyptische Gänse, Reiher, Ibisse und Wildenten, ja sogar Pfauen und Perlhühner. Man hat in dieser Gegend bereits über 120 verschiedene, in Ostafrika heimische Vogelarten gezählt.

Der Naturpark von Bamburi, von schattigen Wanderwegen durchzogen und in nächster Nähe der großen Touristenhotels, ist unbedingt einen Besuch wert. Während die konstante Seebree melodisch durch die Casuarinabäume rauscht, trifft man am Weg Oryx, Elenantilopen, Warzenschweine, Waldschweine, Affen, Krokodile und andere Reptilien. Aber der unbestrittene Star ist "Sally das Nilpferd", das seit langem auch als Talisman von Bamburi gilt.

Sally, das 8 Jahre alte Flußpferd, ist 1 1/2 Tonnen schwer und trinkt noch immer aus der Flasche. Jeden Abend kommt es aus der Tiefe

Die Zementfabrik in Bamburi, 10 Kilometer nördlich von Mombasa gelegen, hat an der Küste Millionen Tonnen fossiler Korallen abgebaut, die in der Form von Kalkstein für die Herstellung von Zement verwendet werden.

Im Laufe der Jahre wurde der Steinbruch immer größer. Er erstreckte sich schließlich über ein Gebiet von einigen Hektaren und reichte bis hinunter zum leicht salzhaltigen Grundwasser. Dies war eine sich ständig weiter ausbreitende Wüste - ein Alptraum für jeden Naturfreund und Umweltschützer!

Heute, nach 12 Jahren, sprießt neues Leben aus dieser Wüste, die sich in eine blühende, erholsame Landschaft verwandelt hat. Tausende kleiner Kreaturen kriechen am Boden herum, kauen, fressen und verdauen den dichten Nadelteppich und produzieren fruchtbarer Humus. Es sind die etwa 10 cm langen Tausendfüßler, im Volksmund "Jongolulu" genannt. Die Nadeln stammen von den hohen Casuarinabäumen, die im Küstenklima und am Brackwasser bestens gedeihen.

Diese etwas ungewöhnliche Symbiose zweier Organismen, die sich wunderbar ergänzen, wurde vom Schweizer Agronom Rene Haller von der Bamburi Zementfabrik in Gang gesetzt und aufgebaut.

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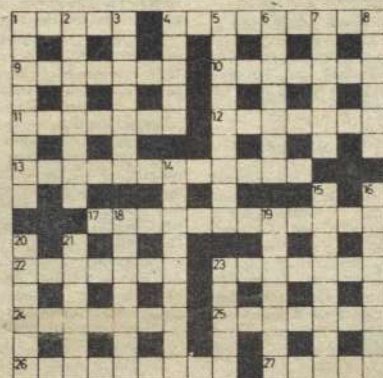

The will to win

By SKIP ROZIN

THE Decathlon is the supreme challenge in athletics—not one event but 10 separate tests of skill. Commitment to any one event detracts from the rest: concentrate on running and you pay the price in throwing. For competitors, says Britain's Gold-winning decathlete Daley Thompson, it is like wrestling with a strong, agile, cunning beast. But the beast can be tamed. . . . Here Thompson reveals the agony of losing—and the joy of winning, when the best becomes beautiful.

DALEY THOMPSON'S will to win is ferocious—and unpredictable.

At the 1980 Moscow Olympics he went into the last Decathlon event—the 1500 metres—with an unbeatable points lead from the other nine events.

He could easily have broken the world record with a strong finish.

But he didn't even try. He says: "I'd decided to take the 1500 fast enough to win, but slow enough to take in as much of the event as I could."

"I wanted to enjoy it, to have it for myself."

"I saw my aunt in the crowd, I saw my friends. I even waved to them."

Thompson finished tenth in the 1500. It made no difference to his gold medal: he had scored 8,495 points, 164 points ahead of Yuri Kutsenki of the Soviet Union.

But there was criticism back in Britain of the way he treated that final event. If he were within reach of the world, people said, he should have gone for it.

Daley did not care. "It wasn't my last Olympics," he says. "If it had been, I'd have run faster."

It's not bravado. Daley's brother Frank can testify to his determination to be second best to anyone.

"I can remember going with our mother to his boarding school to watch Daley compete. Even then—maybe he was 12—he was so super-

..And the hell of losing

They had a little track, 20 yards around on the grass, and Daley wouldn't just win—he would want to win by 50 yards.

"Daley would want to win and win and win."

It was Frank who played with him on the crowded streets of Notting Hill Gate, London, where they lived.

Frank was a keen athlete too. "I'm a competitor, but I don't want to win at all costs, which is where Daley is different from me."

"It's life and death to him. And that's no new attitude. It began long ago. He was a horse competitor as soon as he could walk."

Daley's first coach, Bob Mortimer, was struck just as strongly with that gritty Thompson determination when he and the teenage athlete first met in August 1974.

The encounter was crucial. Daley had no notion then of wanting a decathlete. He wanted to be a sprint star.

Mortimer, who quickly became a trusted friend, had a different plan. "From the day I first saw Daley, I thought of the decathlon," he says. "He had such potential. He was tall, and he was big, almost podgy."

"If you're podgy and fast and big, then you can do things like the shot and javelin. It was a perfect combination."

And I hated to see a boy that young lock himself into

one or two events. There's plenty of time for that later.

"He wasn't very enthusiastic at first and we had a lot of arguments. Part of the trouble was that he wasn't very good at some of the events. His discus wasn't very good and he found the pole vault very difficult."

"He showed a lot of courage. In the first meeting he ever did in the pole vault, he crashed on his back and hurt his bottom."

"But he came back for more. He didn't need any motivating."

Soon after that Daley began to train with Bruce Longden, then Britain's southern decathlon coach, near Crawley.

According to Longden's thinking, there is a perfect combination of talents that contributes to making a great decathlete.

"You can produce a good thrower, relative to his size and weight," he says. "You cannot produce a good sprinter. One must have speed. Daley has speed and he had

jumping ability. Those are the keys."

Only once has Daley Thompson lost when he was expected to win.

In 1978 he had electrified the athletics world by scoring 8,467 points to win at the Commonwealth Games, and he arrived at the European Championships in Prague as the athlete everyone would watch.

He was only 19, and up against Russia's Alexander

Grebenyuk and West Germany's Guido Kratschmer. But he knew he was the best, and he expected to win.

Instead he came second.

The failure—in coming second against the best in the world while still a month short of your 20th birthday—is a failure—was agonising.

"I don't know if I can tell you what it was like," says Thompson. "I felt so bad. I couldn't shake that feeling of failure."

"I walked around the house for days, not answering the phone, not wanting to talk to anyone."

"It was like I'd died but nobody's buried me. It was the worst thing that had ever happened to me."

I know it shouldn't be that bad, but it was. Nothing is worse. Nothing."

He hid the truth of his pain even from his closest friends.

WHY I MUST DO MY OWN THING . . .

DALEY'S resolute attitude that he must decide for himself what he should do, has caused trouble with the authorities.

He had his Sports Aid Foundation grant withheld for refusing to compete in the European Cup at Birmingham.

Had the British Board known Thompson better, it might have approached the situation differently. One of the few ways of guaranteeing Daley Thompson will not show up somewhere is to demand his presence.

"I have to be in control of everything, and not to be told to be here or to be there," he says.

Embarrassing as it was for the British athletics establishment, the episode was more costly for Thompson. He was refused money from the Foundation from October 1980 to

1981 and, because of that incident, he has not applied for a grant since.

It damaged his image too: he was presented to the public as money-grabbing and unpatriotic.

In response to the last charge Thompson says: "Patriotism has nothing to do with it. The issues are competition and a man's pride."

Since Thompson is both a highly visible celebrity and black, he has been approached repeatedly by civil rights groups who hope to enlist his support. In most cases their requests were turned down.

Off the record he would say: "They only want me because I'm famous and you can't get famous by attending all that kind of rubbish. I'm no good to anybody if I don't win."

They knew he was upset, saw him remain at home for a few weeks then return to train with renewed and ferocious commitment.

"It wasn't that I let other people down," says Daley. "I didn't give a damn about anybody else. Man, it was me. I let myself down."

But he took that defeat and treated it as if it were another part of the decathlon, one more event to be mastered, a lesson to be learned along with the others.

I know that it will never happen again," he says with quiet confidence.

Never, for Daley is going to be a long time. He wants to be around, competing and winning, for as long as his brawny legs will carry him—and then some.

"People ask me what happens when it's all over."

"I want to have a family. I want to be a good father. I'll miss the excitement of a big competition."

"But I'll go on competing. They have seniors' events, you know, and old men's scoring tables. I'm going to get into some of that." Slowly he started to smile.

"I can see me years from now, competing in a wheelchair, being pushed."

"I'll never stop. It's me. More than anything, it's me, all over."
