# 'Million Shillings Misappropriated'

## THE AUDITOR GENERAL EXPOSES COAST THEFTS SCANDAL

FIVE GOVERNMENT ministries of the Coast are at the centre of a public funds scandal involving over one million shillings which have been allegedly misappropriated through losses of cash, irregular contracts, and dubious purchase rates, writes Gray Phombeah.

Ministries spotlighted in the scandal are the former ministries of Livestock and Agriculture (which have now been merged into one), the Ministry of Culture and Social Services, the Ministry of Tourism and the Ministry of Finance.

Details of the allegations appear in the 1981-1982 Public Accounts report issued by the government controller and auditor-general, Mr. D.G. Nyoro, in Nairobi.

The ministry of Agriculture in Kilifi is reported to have purchased sand, ballast, paint, roof sheets, concrete blocks, roofing boards and dump proof coat paper from two non-government contractors at a cost of K.Shs. 379,445.50 without obtaining ministerial or Central Tender Board authority.

**'OVER-PAYMENTS'**  
The purchases and some of the materials are alleged to have been bought at higher than the approved contract prices resulting in a total overpayment of K.Shs. 85,565. —

It is further alleged that the Civil office paid K.Shs. 33,840

for the supply of 1,200 metres of damp proof coat paper, but received only 84 metres costing K.Shs. 3,384, leading to an irregular overpayment of K.Shs. 30,456.

In Kwale, the District Agricultural office is reported to have purchased building

for the delivery of building sand although records show that the sand was transported in government vehicles.

The Ministry of Culture and Social Services in Kwale is also accused of a number of irregularities in the procurement of building materials and

sold to two separate individuals for K.Shs. 80,100 and 218,430 respectively, while 4,730 pieces of spark plugs were sold to a private firm for K.Shs. 118,000.

It is further alleged that 26,180 kilogrammes of second-hand clothes were also sold to four firms for K.Shs. 520,000 while one Mercedes Benz 328 lorry was sold to an individual for K.Shs. 40,000 despite the fact the highest bidder had offered K.Shs. 65,000 through public auction.

## 'Ministry Officials Involved In Irregular Contracts, Dubious Purchase Of Stores'

materials worth K.Shs. 248,731 from non-government contractors for various projects in Shimba Hills and Voi without authority from the Ministerial or Central Board.

The audit inspection reveal that only materials worth K.Shs. 131,585 were received and the whereabouts of the remaining materials worth K.Shs. 117,146 could not be traced.

It is further stated that the Kwale office paid K.Shs. 20,250

stores. In one incident, the Kwale office is reported to have paid K.Shs. 136,238.55 for the supply of building materials for the Family Life Training Centre in Kwale, but only materials worth K.Shs. 69,087.65 were delivered.

A local contractor was further paid K.Shs. 7,200 to construct a septic tank at the centre, but the tank was later found to be incomplete.

In another incident, the Kwale office paid K.Shs. 32,681.50 for an order of 553 bags of cement, but only 195 bags of cement worth K.Shs. 17,434.50 were received.

At the same time the Kwale office ordered 40,042 building concrete blocks at a cost of K.Shs. 33,560.30 and allegedly split payment to the supplier into various payment vouchers costing less than K.Shs. 4,000 to avoid calling for tenders or quotations.

**'IRREGULAR SALES'**  
In Mombasa, the Customs office is alleged to have been involved in irregular sales by private treaty of seized and abandoned goods.

One unpacked Mercedes Benz 200D was withdrawn from public auction and sold for K.Shs. 250,000 by private treaty.

In another case, 81 bags of second-hand clothes and another lot of 809 bags were

## Students Repair Utange Roads

FED UP with their bad road which becomes impassible when it rains heavily, villagers in Utange and students from its primary school have embarked on the ambitious harambee repair project, writes Neta Peal.

Every Friday some 500 students and about 50 villagers armed with stones, or carrying them in wheelbarrows, hand-carts and kikapus have been working on this six km. stretch of undulating road interspersed with corrugations and potholes.

So far, about 1 km. has been completed. Three weeks ago they appealed to the Mombasa Municipal Council for help in provision of materials (stones,

equipment (rollers) and transport but so far there has been no response.

They can supply the manpower, but are already finding difficulty in obtaining the quantity of stone they need. They point out that rollers to crush the stone, and transport would enable them to speed up the repair work.

The road from Nyali Bridge to the Bamburi Cement turn-off is excellent. The Old Malindi Road then continues to where the former 'Singing Ferry' used to be. When it rains heavily it becomes impassible to traffic even defeating large buses

# STUDENTS HELP REPAIR ROADS

which ceased operating over it during May.

Most of the teachers and students come from the town, and when there is no transport had to walk through deep ponds in the pouring rain to reach the school.

Around 6,000 people, mainly Giriama, live at Utange, which is a lush farming area with a great potential for development, but putting a brake on this is the bad road and unresolved squatter problem.

Farmers complain about the very poor marketing facilities due to it. When the buses stopped running in May they had to carry as much as they could on their heads to the main Malindi Road to catch a bus/matatu into town.

It meant a journey on foot which took between 30 minutes to 2 hours depending on where they lived.

They claim that the Mombasa Municipal Council had promised to do something about the road, but nothing had materialised. So, in July, the Elders, villagers and school decided to do something themselves.

Now parents are saying they are prepared to take over the work which their children are doing.

Said Omari Ali Mohamed, chairman of the school committee 'we decided to wait no longer'.

Together they are making use of all available material and have even dug stones out of a well for this purpose.

Utange people say they are 'cut off' and feel they are forgotten, as other areas forge ahead. They not only need a better road, but also electricity, telephone, post office, another school and social hall.

They claim that much of what is being produced by

farmers is often wasted because of inadequate transport facilities because of the bad road. They say that more buses are needed as often they cannot carry all those wanting to travel to the town. As well, they are often breaking down.

Development in the area has come virtually to a standstill.

There is a big squatter problem which remains unresolved. Some 2,000 people are affected. They claim that their grandparents and great grandparents lived there. Most are elderly folk who do not wish to move from an area where they have their roots.

They have formed their own Co-op and have collected sufficient money to buy the land, but government assistance in doing this is needed. The land in question covers roughly 450 acres, and there are about four owners involved.

They assert that private surveyors had been sent to re-demarcate the plots, during which time some of their homes were damaged.

## NURSERY SCHOOL

They point out that if they can buy the land and be given Title Deeds, then they would be able to borrow money to develop their farms. At the moment no one is interested in developing their homes or farms fearing that these may be taken from them.

Should the land become theirs, then they plan to build a nursery school.

School leavers are also posing a big problem in the area. Most cannot find jobs, while a few are engaged in collecting *madatus* to sell. There is no Village Polytechnic where they can train for a career.

To make life seem a little brighter many have taken to smoking bhang.

Utange Primary School may have to stop the usual intake

of Standard 1 pupils next year because of the lack of space. The school has ten classrooms covering Standard 1 - 14 which operate in two streams thus giving education to the greatest number of children possible.

There are only two primary schools serving the Shimo-la-Tewa and Utange areas, and it is reported that many children are not going to school because of the lack of places.

Villagers have started their own harambee nursery school but feel there should be another primary school in the area. It is also felt that their dispensary should be extended to offer a 24 hours service.

When an emergency occurs, like a serious accident or a woman suffering from complications in childbirth, the only telephone is at the dispensary, which is often not working. They then have to travel 6 kms to use the telephone at the Shanzu Teachers' College.

When the road becomes impassable because of rain and there is no transport, the dispensary staff are unable to report for duty. In addition, medicines are in short supply and sometimes there are none at all.

Farmers grow maize, cassava, coconuts, potatoes, cashewnuts, guavas and citrus. Of their own volition they are experimentally growing rice, which is doing very well.

Farmers say Utange is a very fertile area and they could be producing much more, if only someone would give them a helping hand to help themselves.

On approaching the Mombasa Municipal Council it appears that the bad road is 'unadopted' and, consequently, not the responsibility of the council. However, there are plans to up-grade it to tarmac level when funds become available.

It is because of the shortage of money that Council is unable to assist with the purchase of stones for this harambee effort.

However, it will continue to assist in keeping the road passable by putting a grader over it.

## Kenya Costs More ... But Offers Far Better Value Than Sri Lanka!

IN KENYA for three weeks to 'take a deeper look what is available for holidaymaker here' is Laurence Spicer, a producer with London Broadcasting Corporation, writes *Neta Peal*.

He is gathering material for a programme entitled 'Holiday and Leisure' which will be heard during October.

Laurence is no stranger to E. Africa for he was born in Uganda and lived for many years in Kenya and Tanzania before leaving for the UK.

Interviewed at Nyalí Beach Hotel where he was staying for four days, he explained that last year he had done a 'straight' report on what a tourist can do in Kenya.

This time, he said 'I am looking much more closely at the way tourism has grown, or failed to grow, and the reasons behind it.'

He is also taking a look at the development of the more specialised sides of tourism - i.e. zoology, archaeology, fishing, botany, windsurfing, ornithology etc.

Said Laurence 'I feel strongly that there is an enormous market in Kenya for such specialised groups, and already certain people in the UK are promoting these.'

Here he added that 'Abercrombie and Kent had put a lot of work into organising this kind of thing.'

He pointed out that those interested in such specialisation

are 'big spenders' and feels Kenya could do much more in attracting such groups here.

On this visit, Laurence has noticed a growing desire among tourists returning to Kenya to see different places and more of the country.

Here he mentioned that United Touring Company (Coast) had recently introduced 'Adventure Safaris' taking tourists in four wheel drive landrovers into the historic and interesting hinterland at the price which most can afford.

Said Laurence, 'I feel more drive is needed by tour operators to encourage tourists to try something different, while keeping prices reasonable.'

It would thus offer much more flexibility to those holidaying here.

He spoke of the enormous

potential which exists in Kenya, while pointing out the good value for money that holidaymakers receive here. He described hotel prices as 'reasonable', but said it was the air fare factor which is obviously bumping up the cost of a holiday to Kenya.

Asked Laurence 'how on earth can airlines justify a return economy airfare from Britain of around £800, while noting that you can fly to the far side of USA much cheaper!'

Continuing he said 'Kenya offers far better value than Sri Lanka'. However, a week's holiday in Sri Lanka followed by a week in Hong Kong cost less than two weeks in Kenya.'

He felt this a pity as Kenya has so much to offer, and her standards remain 'high'.

Only by allowing charters to operate from the UK could one significantly reduce the cost of a package holiday to Kenya.

He mentioned that by not allowing British Airtours to re-commence operations here had meant Kenya not appearing in brochures of two major tour operators - Speedbird and Enterprise (both subsidiaries of British Airways - the largest airline in the world) which go all over the world.

He also spoke of the absence quite often of Kenya Gold in Duty Free shops at airports here. Said Laurence 'many holidaymakers returning home would like to take their friends a bottle of this excellent coffee liqueur, rather than imported whisky. Kenya-made Papaya Wine should also be there.'

He also feels that there should be some control over prices charged in Duty Free shops in Kenya, as sometimes items made here are more expensive than in London.

In reply to a question, Laurence said that apart from specialised groups catering for a more up-market clientele he personally considers that Kenya is a 'mass tourism' destination. Its infrastructure of good tourist hotels and lodges were all geared towards this market.

He said 'I believe that if Kenya turns away from mass tourism, a real problem will arise as to what to do with this infrastructure which gives such good value to those who come here to enjoy the beaches and game parks but who cannot afford to pay more.'

He went on 'I think Kenya has done very well by, and for, most tourists. It costs the British tourists a lot to travel here and what they spend in Kenya on buying curios, and on food and drink gives a tremendous boost to trade generally, which includes the African farmer and businessman, not to mention the job opportunities it creates.'

Among the participants are Tom Mwanuzi, general manager of Tanzania Railways who is also President of the Union of African Railways; Mousiliou Oketokou, head of transport division African Development Bank; Zaklu Gtunubu, Head of Transport Division, ECOWAS, Lagos; and Huzekiel Isaac, Head of Transport and Communications Division, OAU, Addis Ababa.

There are six representatives from the World Bank.

Experiences are being exchanged on adjusting railways to changing economic and traffic conditions, as well as their operational needs.

### ROUND TABLE TALKS

These 'round table' discussions are being followed by a two day seminar on 'African Railways'. The twenty participants are mainly 'operational' people as opposed to policy-makers.

They will be discussing various operational aspects of railways, which include economic aspects of income, financial aspects and issues of procurement.

A reception was hosted by the World Bank on Tuesday to welcome all participants before discussions opened on Wednesday.

### Tanzanian Premier Warms To Hard-Working Peasant Farmers

THE Tanzania Government has commended some regions in the country for their exemplary performance in the agricultural field and has called upon the rest of the regions to emulate their example. The country's Prime Minister, Edward Sokoine said this week that the seriousness in executing the laid down agricultural programmes was bearing fruits in a number of regions and he particularly commended Iringa Mbeya, Ruvuma and Rukwa regions for their increased output.

Sokoine added that the answer to the question of food shortage in the country was to have a more scientific approach to agricultural production and he called upon leaders to be in the forefront in helping peasants to attain the targets set for them. He also called upon the leaders to minimise rhetoric during the coming season and to assist peasants by working with them on the land.

Away from the political scene the Tanzania hotel keepers association has made a pledge that it will set foreign exchange earning targets for privately run tourist businesses in the country. The association has also

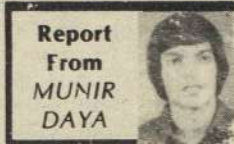
The association has some 60 members mainly hoteliers all over the country.

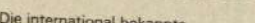

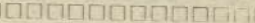

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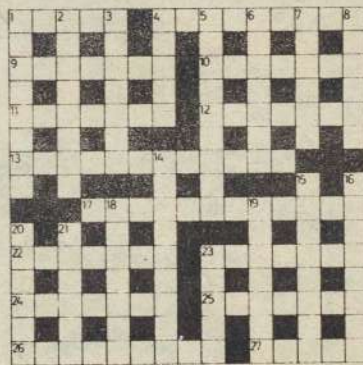

# CATERING TO THE DISCERNING PUBLIC

AN ESTABLISHED catering organisation is branching out with two more enterprises.

First we have: **KADIRI CORNER CAFE.**

This is run by young Zahoor Kadiri who has been working since his school days at Visa Oshwal for his father in Salim Cold House.

He has taken over the old Singer Sewing Machine premises, Kwa Shiba Road, and transformed the place entirely. When visited the cafe was quite full, bustling with youngsters mainly, his neighbours, old school pals and others drawn there.

Some were buying from the well stocked counter section, where they are sweets, cigarettes, patent medicines selling loose. Pan mixtures and mouth fresheners. Others were seated at the tables drinking Vimto or Madala, and eating chicken, sausages or chips, and it is these tables which deserve special mention.

Made by Ranjodh Singh the table legs are of light wood, very exclusive design and the tops easily washable formica. The chairs are singles or bench-

size, again light wood legs with comfortable rexine cushioning.

The formica theme continues to the shelving behind the counter. Zahoor is ambitious and intends expanding and there is ample room on the mezzanine floor and outside to form a corner pavement cafe.

And now down Moi Avenue, on your left as you go towards the docks keep your eyes open for:

## Jubilee Cafe

This is bang opposite Jubilee Building.

It opened only Monday this week but already has an established look. Monday lunchtime drew quite a few customers, whilst we were sampling the Jubilee Cafe speciality - it is called *Kulji Malai* and is prepared like no one can do - with a home-made touch.

It is made from the cream of milk and almonds and has

a consistency of heavy ice-cream.

Opening special offers are on fresh juices, milk shakes, *laluda* fruit jellies and even tea and coffee.

The manager, Abdallah Dawre, has been catering on a small-scale basis for some time now but is very happy to be branching out into this full-scale cafe.

It is placed strategically for there are no other places nearby offering such a variety of low-priced "bitings" so he is likely to do well.

Outside parking empties at lunch-time and is literally vacant by evening. Jubilee Cafe intend to reply to your hooting horn calling for their services, and his menu too is most ambitious.

It includes full-scale meals or, if you like, curries, chicken *tika* and *miskaki*. Samosas were also sampled and are absolutely delicious. There is chicken and chips, sausages (beef) too, or you can simply walk in and buy from the large selection of Manji biscuits or chocolates, or pick a pan.

Hours of opening are 8.00 a.m. till 11.00 p.m. The place is cool because of a high ceiling, fans and nature's through-draft. Walls are adorned by black and white wildlife pictures and the corner piece is a stuffed python climbing a tree trunk in pursuit of an ostrich egg (not on the menu!).

Why not give the family a treat on a Sunday - *Biryani* is awaiting you. So it is *Bon Appetite* to you and *Bon Chance* to Abdallah.

### 'MOST POPULAR'

Through TUI, they are now sending about 2,000 clients here a year, which they hope to increase.

As far as TUI is concerned, Kenya remains the most popular venue for long haul holidays, and during 1981 and 1982 it was annually sending around

27,000 tourists here.

However, for a number of reasons this number has dropped to about 23,000 this year.

While there have been adverse reports about Kenya in some sections of the German press, it was difficult to say if there had been any repercussion. As far as they were concerned there had been no cancelled bookings.

On Saturday, we were treated to a sumptuous tea and on Sunday, Pip gave us our money back on his bet winnings by treating us to a free curry lunch.


