# MOMBASA MAYORAL POLLS

## SUMBA, KOMBO AND MWIDANI SEEK TOP COUNCIL POSTING

MOMBASA Urban Elders meet today at the Town Hall in their first council business after the General Elections to elect the Mayor, his deputy and the new chairmen for various council committees.

Today's vote caps the mayoral campaign that began after the September general elections and which has centred around the immediate former Mayor Councillor Rajab Sumba, a former Mayor Msanifu Kombo, and the immediate former Deputy Mayor, Councillor Ahmed Mwidani.

A notice issued this week by the acting town clerk Mr. A.H.M. Nasser states that the council meeting will begin at 2.30 p.m. this afternoon with the election of the mayor

The election of the deputy mayor who will hold office until the next Council's annual

meeting will follow immediately after the mayor's election.

The councillors will then go on to appoint eleven members to each standing committee for Education, Social Services and Housing, Establishment, Public Health and Town Planning and Works.

This will be followed by the appointment of chairmen and deputy chairmen of the standing committees and the members of the Tenders sub-committee.

The battle lines for the mayoral post were drawn immediately after the civic elections in Mombasa and the campaign has been characterised by behind-the-scene manoeuvres by Mr. Sumba, Msanifu Kombo and Ahmed Mwidani in a bid to win the councillors' support.

During the 1979 mayoral elections Mr. Rajab Sumba was elected the mayor by an overwhelming majority of 26 votes

to 3. He retained his post in July 1981 by 19 votes to 11.

Mr. Ahmed Mwidani who was returned unopposed in the September civic elections, was re-elected as deputy mayor when he polled 21 votes against 9.

Councillors Ramadhan Kajembe of Mikindani, Margaret Olang of Ganjoni and the newly elected councillor of Likoni Mr. Laban Mukonjero are reported to be vying for the post of the deputy mayor in today's council elections.

# Madiwani Wawatumikie Wananchi Matatizo Yao

NINAPOANDIKA makala haya ni wazi kuwa Madiwani ambao watawatumikia wananchi katika Serkali za wilaya katika sehemu zao watakuwa wameshaanza kazi na kuona miji yetu inapiga hatua za kurishisha katika mambo muhimu yanayotuhusu yakiwa ya hali ya afya na elimu.

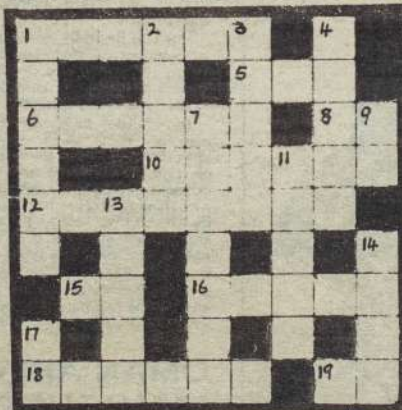

CHOSEN 'Bride of the Year' by The Sunday Mail in Zimbabwe was attractive Arleyne da Silveria (20) who, accompanied by her husband Agnel (24) has been thoroughly enjoying her prize of a week's fabulous holiday on Kenya's coconut coast.

They have been staying at Malindi's Blue Marlin Hotel, particularly enjoying the sea and seafood which included giant sized lobsters and prawns.

Their holiday was co-sponsored by Air Zimbabwe, Jet Tours and Jambo Hotels.

The Blue Marlin was the first modern hotel to be built in Malindi - a swinging seaside resort loaded with history and interesting things to do. Vasco da Gama, the famous explorer, visited it in 1498 and found it to be a very friendly town. It has remained so throughout the years with many tourists returning for holidays there year after year.

Arleyne was The Sunday Times Bride of the Week and Bride of the Month, and when chosen Bride of the Year was over the moon with excitement. She is a Data Entry Processor,

while Agnel is a printer/photolithographer. Both were born in Zimbabwe.

This was Arleyne's first visit to Kenya, while Agnel was in Mombasa for one day in 1972.

A dinner was hosted in their honour by Jambo Hotels in the Blue Marlin's grill room, one of the most popular in Malindi, where they were warmly welcomed by Keith Green, general manager of Jambo Hotels. They were also introduced to Papaya Wine which is made in Kenya. They found it 'excellent'.

## U.K. JUDGE FOR COAST DOG SHOW

THE JUDGE at the dog show to be held on Sunday 25 October at de Souza's plot, Port Reitz, is Yorkshireman Ken Bullock, on his first judging assign to Africa.

He has judged dog shows since 1954, in north America, continental Europe, India and Hong Kong as well as in England, where he has judged one of the groups at Crufts.

Sunday's show is Coast Kennel Association's ninth open dog show, and judging will start at 11 am. There will be eleven classes, with dogs being divided into sporting and non-sporting categories.

The show is expected to draw a lot of spectators wanting to take a look at the wide variety of pedigree dogs at the Coast. It is planned to hold four classes before the lunch break, the remainder being held in the afternoon.

Lunch, drinks, and a light tea will be available for spectators as well as for exhibitors. Organisers of the dog show hope for a large turn-out to view the 55 entries.

"We think we have planned a super show" say show manager Anne de Souza "there's lots for people to see and there is a really fine range of dogs entered. Come and enjoy yourselves!"

**THE CITY of beer drinkers and sausage eaters - that's West Berlin.**

The agony of choice is presented by more than 5000 drinking and eating places vying for custom - all open round the clock. Berlin is perhaps the only German city that stays up the whole night - and never goes to sleep.

There are plain and fancy pubs at every corner, international hotels, bars and restaurants, and a string of discos where Berliners dance their lives away every night.

It was in this unique city, absurdly located inside the German Democratic Republic and divided by 29 miles of a 15-foot wall, where 14 journalists from Africa and Asia spent three months training at the International Institute for Journalism.

It was summer in Berlin. With temperatures soaring into nineties, clothes had a separate existence for Berliners who soaked the sun in public parks and posh saunas in mass nudity.

Every life revolved around Kurfurstendamm, known as Ku'damm for short. West Berlin's famous boulevard which provide a kilometre or so of a shopping and amusement paradise for Berliners and foreigners alike.

It represented business and laziness; high society on shopping spree and playboys in sports cars, hawkers and conjurers, and also tramps and drug-addicts. The Ku'damm freedom had room for every class.

During the day the city throbs with life in cafes along Ku'damm, offering a choice from a cheap snack at a sausage counter to feast in high class restaurants that will empty your wallet.

Here workmen eat their sandwiches during lunch break with a beer to wash down the dust from their throats, senior citizens enjoy coffee and housewives relax with a sausage and salad.

# 'City Of Beer Drinkers And Foreigners ...'

Berlin nights are famous because there is no closing time and every taste is catered for.

From Folk or Jazz Clubs to the disco world of flashing lights, with others like Boule Bantu, Jolli Bar and Talk of the Town specialising in Black music.

There is a fascinating mixture of Berlin with museums and theatres. There are 20 theatres and two musical halls, both internationally famous for a wide range of cultural attractions and entertainment.

With the largest Turkish population in West Germany, Berlin has sometimes been called the "third largest city of Turkey". Indeed one in ten of Berlin's inhabitants is a foreigner.

Today, the city's population numbers about three million, and well over one quarter are over 60 years old.

West Berlin is still one of Germany's biggest industrial cities with a large consumer market.

A two-week tour took the group round West Germany, from Cologne to Bonn, Hildesheim, Hannover, Hamburg and finally the northern German city of Kiel.

### Tractor Factory

The tour included visits to Deutsche Welle radio and television station in Cologne, meeting officials of the Ministry of Co-operation in Bonn,

a tractor factory in Hannover, makers of radios and television sets in Hildesheim, and an institute of forestry in Hamburg and a mass circulation newspaper in Kiel, including countryside tours and excursion - and of course, a glimpse of the Baltic Sea and North Sea.

### 'Ich Liebe Berlin'

At the end of the course, a participant from Africa wrote in the visitors book during the farewell dinner at the Berlin Press Club "Ich Liebe Berlin", (translation - 'I love Berlin' summed up the feeling of the entire group who had completed the 45th course of the International Institute for Journalism.

### Time For Intellectuals To Help Establish Socialist Democracy

THE TANZANIAN Prime Minister, Edward Sokoine this week called upon intellectuals in the country to be in the forefront in building a socialist and self-reliant society. He posed the challenge at the university of Dar-es-salaam when delivering a lecture on the role of intellectuals in socialist transformation.

Sokoine said that just like pre-independence intellectuals whose anti-colonialism and anti-imperialism had enabled many african countries to attain independence so was the case now when socialist construction in Tanzania heavily depended on the country's present intellectuals.

The Prime Minister also reminded his audience the massive economic problems

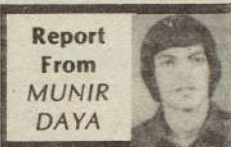
of the international bank of reconstruction and development (a world bank subsidiary) are on a familiarisation tour of the country during which they are to hold talks with the president and other government officials.

**IN REACTING** to world indignation about the South Korean airliner, the Soviets have made great play on the fact that their frontiers are sacrosanct.

In 1939 at the beginning of the Second World War, the Soviet Union and Nazi Germany joined Poland up between them. The world is familiar with the photos of the Soviet and Nazi commanders when they met across the prostrate body of their victims.

National frontiers are indeed sacred. It is true that national defence is one of the most important functions of government.

But shooting down the civilian South Korean airliner was not an act of defence. It was an act of senseless cruelty.

The memory of those who died continues to unsettle the world, and it is right that it should do so.

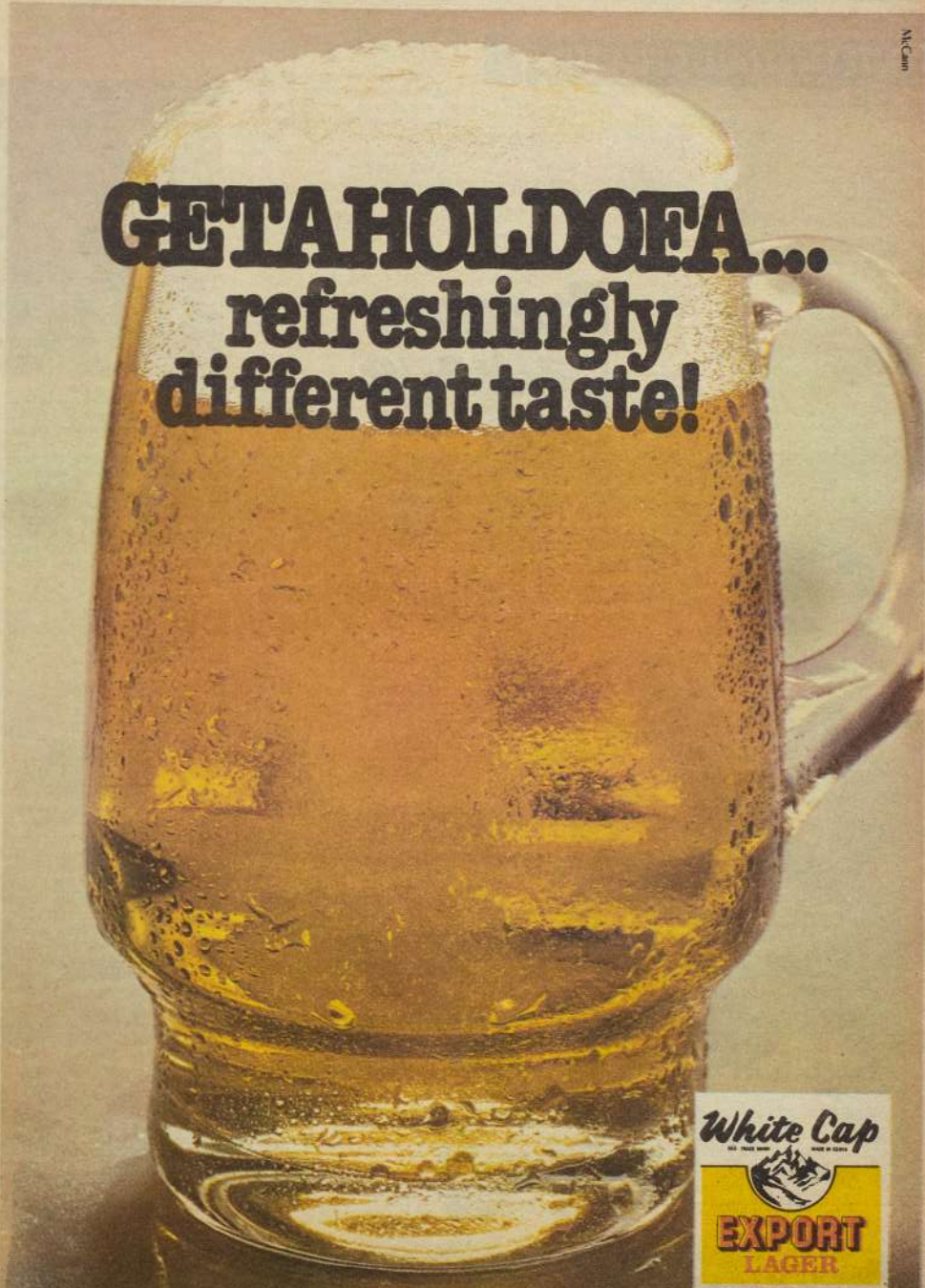

# New Ships At Kilindini And Tug-Towing-Tug Situation

ARRIVING last Saturday afternoon from Dar es Salaam was a tug towing tug situation. One of the latest Tanzanian Harbour Authority's Dutch built tugs, the *Mamba* was having to tow the immobilised T.H.A. tug *Kongoni* for drydocking by African Marine and General Engineering Co (AMGECO) to have a new propeller fitted after an accident last year; she has been out of commission since that time and is expected to be in drydock for a week or two. *Mamba* sailed on Monday on return to Dar es Salaam.

Having regard to the amount of ageing tonnage to be seen regularly in Kilindini, it was refreshing to see a vessel arrive last Friday on her maiden voyage she was the Japanese owned tanker *Yukikaze* which discharged a small quantity of 3100 tons refined oil for Mobil Oil at Shimanzi Oil Jetty, she had to wait at 'B' anchorage on arrival as the Jetty was occupied.

Her maiden voyage has taken her from Chiba, Japan to Papua, New Guinea, thence Port Stanvac, Australia to Mombasa. She sailed for Liverpool on Sunday morning to discharge her balance of 12,500 tons.

She was launched on March

18th, and delivered on August 31st this year. Her carrying capacity is 16,650 d.w. tons.

Kilindini has remained very slack over the past week with 7 or 8 empty berths on some days. The Yugoslav flag *Krapanj* finally berthed at No. 3 to load her 5000 tons barley for Aquaba. She is expected to sail this weekend. She was waiting for almost one week at Port Reitz.

Today the DOAL vessel *Tibati*, and S.D.14 class of vessel, is due with 7500 tons to discharge from the N.W. Continent including 1200 tons Milk Powder and 700 tons Caustic Soda.

Another S.D.14 was the Greek flag *Freedom A.S.* which arrived on Monday to the anchorage and subsequently berthed at No. 7 to discharge her cargo of fertiliser. Built in 1976, she is 14800 tons d.w.

A Tuesday morning arrival at No. 2 berth was the 25 year old Saudi vessel *Maqca* to load 1900 tons Cotton Seed Cake

and 200 tons Copra Cake.

The 70,000 d.w. ton 1966 built Greek tanker *Takis E* arrived on Tuesday to discharge 62,700 tons crude oil from Kharg Island in the Arabian Gulf. This is the first crude oil discharger to arrive for the past 10 days and I believe she is a newcomer to the port.

It is interesting to record that the first shipment for the Falkland Islands strategic airport project, with the value of the actual shipping contract at Sterling £13 million, will be made by the 9300 ton Merchant *providence* which was formerly well known on this coast as the 1965 built DOAL vessel *Tabora*, a sister ship to the *Tsavo*.

The *Tabora* was sold some years ago to make way for the new vessel of that name.

On arrival in the Falklands she will be used as a fully self sustaining "floating bridgehead" permanently manned by a British crew. A far cry from her East African career under the West German flag.

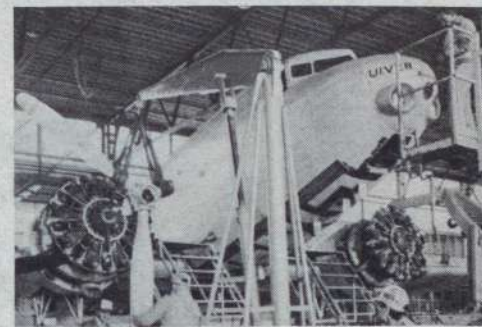

course.

All items posted under this service are signed for and proof of delivery can be obtained when required. It is therefore a guaranteed delivery service.

The Minister said that it is important that "SPEEDPOST" letters packets are addressed to physical addresses, giving private letter box number, name of the road, street, avenue, name of the building, floor number and telephone number of the addressee in order to facilitate easy delivery and to ensure that physical delivery is effective.

So far KP and TC will only accept weights of up to 10kg which will be increased to 20kg depending on the public usage and demand.

He said that in introducing "SPEEDPOST" they had in mind the plight of the public in need of beating the deadline of date and time or anxious to get the mail delivered as a matter of utmost urgency on various business activities.

## 'Satisfied Customers'

Therefore panic has been eliminated in this area as once posted, the mail is immediately dispatched to its destination leaving the customer satisfied and assured of a definite delivery.

The Minister likened SPEEDPOST to security service at low coast whereby mail receives VIP treatment for the benefit of senders and/or recipients.

It has come he said, not as a luxury but a necessity in view of increased business activities as a result of rapid development of this country.

Mr. Kosgey wished the public to know that there has also been a great deal of improvement in the dispatch of ordinary mail in the country.

He emphasized the rule of addressing packets and parcels clearly to ensure faster

handling and delivery. He pointed out that there are many people with beautiful handwriting but they alone can read such script.

It is therefore imperative that addresses are written in legible script or better still in clear capital letters in order to save handling time.

He appealed to those who assume by addressing a letter to someone in Nairobi or elsewhere without a post box it would reach the addressee refrain from doing so, as this entails tedious work of tracing the addresses and added expenditure in setting up a section solely for tracing correct box numbers.

Finally Mr. Kosgey wished to inform the public that SPEEDPOST is available at specified post offices and is provided only by Kenya Posts and Telecommunications Corporation, the legal and authorised body to conduct postal services in Kenya.

"We have gone far into the remote areas of the Republic offering services which were not existing before independence

and more so during this Nyayo Era, because we have to attend to the legitimate aspirations of our people", said the Minister.

He gave an example of a sick mother or child at a place in a rural area, unable to summon an ambulance when disease has threatened a life. With the telephone he said, help can be obtained in time to save a life.

Mr. Kosgey said that many more people have seen their loved ones again having been flown by the Flying Doctor Service enabling them to survive hopeless cases of disease, fractures and other abnormal situations simply because there was a telephone or radio call made concerning such cases.

## 'Prompt Service'

Such he said, may be referred to as extreme cases but in modern times, the business community is a very vital link for the country's prosperity.

It is the marketing front for the farm produce, manufactured and semi-manufactured goods. Therefore, the KP and TC services enable it to succeed.

Furthermore he went on,

whereas in the past the business community exporting Kenyan commodities was located in Nairobi and Mombasa, in recent times, depots, offices and factories have been established in the rural areas as well.

The reason being proximity to abundant raw materials, cheaper labour and housing and above all, availability of adequate space and water.

He said that services had to be taken to them for prompt communications with buyers or head offices within the Republic and outside the country.

The Minister said that one pertinent question that may be asked is why so many people are waiting for telephone services in the country.

To this he said, one important reason to remember is that earlier plans before independence did not include the indigenous people as major potential users of the bulk of the KP and TC services.

The plans took into account a negligible number utilising postal services and besides, post offices were established mainly in the farming areas apart from those in urban centres.

The task immediately after independence said the Minister, was to correct such plans to relate to the present needs in telephone and postal services.

He quoted the number of existing telephone instruments at independence as 58,080 while these are now 225,756 throughout the country and more are in demand.

Over 150 new exchanges have been installed and 20 automatic ones modernised. These were otherwise unheard of in the rural areas.

Touching on post offices, sub post offices and postal agents, Mr. Kosgey said that there were only 263 of these at independence whereas there

are 745 now.

On external services, he said that these have seen tremendous improvement from the cable system and the wireless to satellite communications.

Today Kenya boasts of almost instant connection with the rest of the world with increased voice channels, ability to transmit and receive television programmes, telex and teleprinter facilities, leased circuits, switching, data bank; in fact the entire services provided through the satellite system.

A second antenna has been added working to the satellite above the Atlantic Ocean augmenting the services provided via the first antenna working to the satellite above the Indian Ocean.

With the advent of the Panafican Telecommunications Services (PANAFTEL) the entire continent of Africa will be prone to instant facilities for information, education and entertainment.

## 'Priority Post'

The Minister further said that mail services from Europe are now faster than before and mail from the United Kingdom is available for delivery in Nairobi within 48 hours.

Direct exchange of mail with most countries of the world has already been arranged to arrive within shorter periods than before.

Coming to "SPEEDPOST", Mr. Kosgey said that for the first time, this service has been introduced which is otherwise enjoyed elsewhere overseas.

Some countries call it "DATA POST" "PRIORITY PAID" and so on. But, basically what it means is urgent delivery of mail.

Kenya decided to call it "SPEEDPOST" and as the name implies, it is intended to give more urgent postal delivery service to the public, whereby letters and packets of up to 10kg are delivered to the addressees on the same day.

Such mail is transported by air or by the quickest possible means available to the delivery points. It therefore cost more than the ordinary mail.

## CONTRACTORS TO AID WOMENS' WORKSHOP

HELPING equip the nursery school which the Majengo-Kikambala Women's Workshop (MAKIWO) built from the proceeds of the lampshades they make and sell, were a group of six building and civil engineering contractors in Mombasa, writes Neta Peal.

On Saturday, they went along to meet this go-ahead women's group and to present exercise books, pencils, erasers, wall charts, as well as cakes, sweets and soft drinks to the children.

In addition, Mistry Jadva Pardat & co. Ltd. presented the group with doors and windows enabling it to complete the nursery school.

To show their appreciation the MAKIWO women and children danced and sang, and there was a big 'thank you' from everyone.

This group of building and civil engineering contractors came together five years ago after asking themselves 'as we lay the foundations of many buildings, why not extend this by helping give good foundation to the youngsters here'.

They have aided about eighteen nursery schools at the coast so far.

The MAKIWO group is one of the most successful projects of Mombasa's Tototo Home

Industries which gives training and marketing facilities to many wananchi at the coast enabling them to earn some money.

TOTOTO has also helped in the establishment of many viable income generating activities, as well as running a very successful dressmaking school and shop.

### 'COOL SEATS

The MAKIWO women are famous for the unique lampshades of all sizes and shapes they make from Miyaa (palm frond) which today adorn many of the Coast's top hotels.

Also a big selling line in the TOTOTO shop are 'Cool' seats for the car made by this group of women.

From the lampshades they sell, they have been able to build a nursery school which opened in May despite being minus windows and doors. The ninety children attending also receive porridge and milk each day.

However, the school is still in urgent need of more chalk and charts.

Recently, this group was presented with two singer

treadle sewing machines by the Family Planning Association of Kenya. The FPA, together with the National Christian Council of Kenya, are also sponsoring an instructor, Harriet Kadege, to teach the women more about dressmaking.

As soon as the two rooms attached to the nursery school are completed, they will be used for health and family planning education. In fact, the FPA has already decided to send a mobile unit there to offer a free service to the MAKIWO women and others living in the area.

Also at the presentation were Harrison Chipa, Chief of the Bahari Division, Mtwapa Location, the Asst. Chief, Roger Tungu and Mrs. Elvina Mutua, director of Tototo Home Industries. She said that such Women's groups act as a training centre.

Such is the good name the TOTOTO has earned for helping women's groups to advance the Coast Province, that rural development groups in other parts of Kenya are asking for their assistance in giving training for project planning and income generating activities.

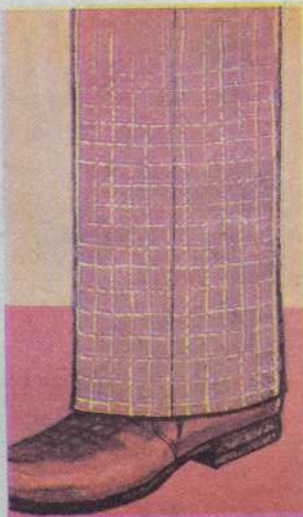

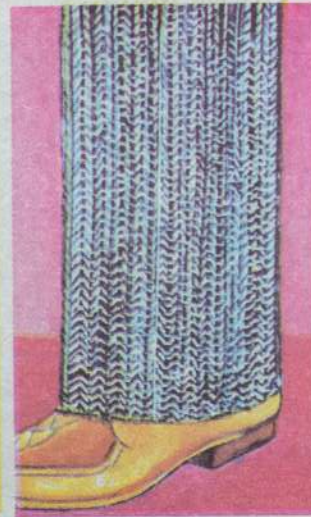

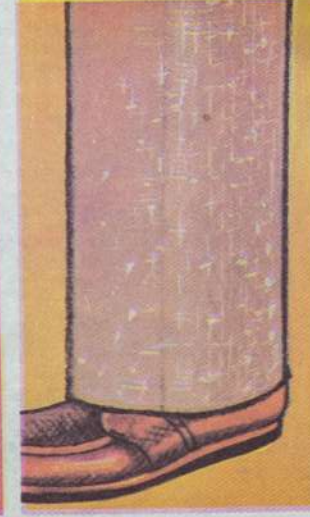

## Jede Menge Elefanten, Löwen und Büffel in den Taita Hügeln

EINES der bemerkenswertesten Wildreservate, die ich je gesehen habe, ist das Taita Hills Reservat, das leicht von Mombasa aus in 1 1/2 Stunden mit dem Auto zu erreichen ist und 40 km westlich von Voi links an der Straße nach Taveta, der Grenzstation nach Tansania, liegt.

Dieser Privatpark, der sich über 28.000 Acres erstreckt und dem Hilton-Konzern gehört, ist wirklich eine Reise wert.

Das 'Hauptquartier', die Taita Hills Lodge, auf felsigem Hügel sieht schon von weitem sehr eindrucksvoll aus, verkleidet mit Kaskaden von Bougainvilleas in allen Rotschattierungen und umgeben von sattgrünem Rasen.

Der allgemein hohe Standard, der freundliche Service und die ausgezeichnete Küche werden den höchsten Ansprüchen gerecht, und die Lodge bietet alle Annehmlichkeiten, die man sich nur wünschen kann.

Die freundlichen Angestellten an der Rezeption geben Ihnen die allerneuesten Informationen über den Aufenthalt der Tiere sowie eine detaillierte Landkarte des Reservats, so daß Sie alle Punkte leicht finden, wo man die "Großen Fünf" mit größter Wahrscheinlichkeit sehen kann.

### PIRSCHFAHRT

Mit diesen zusätzlichen Informationen bestens ausgerüstet, unternahmen wir früh am Morgen eine Pirschfahrt.

10 Minuten, nachdem wir die Lodge verlassen hatten, begegneten wir in Richtung Stausee unserer ersten Elefantenherde. Es waren deren 15 mit vielen kleinen Jungen, die von den Müttern und Tanten zärtlich herumgeschubst wurden. Dies war nur eine von drei Herden, die wir an diesem Morgen sahen, mit insgesamt etwa 45 Elefanten.

Auf der Rundfahrt am Fluß entlang entdeckten wir Impalas, Wasserböcke, Riedböcke und eine Warzenschweinfamilie. Die Impalas und die Wasserböcke nahmen von uns überhaupt keine Notiz.

Die Vogelstimmen waren auf dieser frühen Fahrt ebenfalls sehr eindrucksvoll. Das Taita Hills Reservat gilt als eine der besten Gegenden Kenias zur Vogelbeobachtung, aber wir konzentrierten uns an diesem Morgen hauptsächlich auf das Wild.

Nachdem wir den ausgetrockneten Fluß überquert hatten, fanden wir etwas weiter flußabwärts eine Gruppe von sieben Löwen, die noch an einer Giraffe fraßen, welche sie in

der Nacht gejagt hatten.

Während wir die Löwen beobachteten, dachten wir an die berühmt-berüchtigten Menschenfresser von Tsavo und Oberstleutnant J. H. Patterson, der um die Jahrhundertwende den Bau der Eisenbahn von Mombasa nach Uganda leitete, und an all die Angste und den Schrecken, den die Vorväter dieser Löwen damals verbreiteten.

Als Silhouette hob sich in der aufgehenden Morgensonne eine Herde Elefantilopen mit einigen großen Männchen ab, und weiter hinten zogen Herden von Zebras und Kongonis vorbei auf der Suche nach Grünfutur.

Eine Gruppe von Oryx (Spießböcke mit Fransenhörnern) sah langsam hinunter zum Sumpfgelbiet hinter der Salt Lick Lodge, Hiltons andere Luxusherberge mit Wasserstelle und Zablücke mitten im Reservat.

Auf der Fahrt zur Westgrenze des Parks sahen wir flüchtig zwei Geparde, die sich jedoch so rasch entfernten, daß wir ihnen nicht zu folgen vermochten. Im Reservat gibt es insgesamt etwa 12 Geparde, die in verschiedenen Familiengruppen ziemlich oft zu sehen sind.

Eine ganze Familie von Fledermausohren-Füchsen verschwand in ihrem Erdbau unweit der Straße, während ein Vogel Strauß mit seinem Harem elegant davonrauschte.

Eine Safari durch das Taita Hills Reservat ist ein Vergnügen über 150 Kilometer gute Wege führen bis in abgelegenen Winkel des Parks und können von allen Wagentypen befahren werden, auch von kleinen Autos.

Das Management bemüht sich sehr, die Markierungen und Wege bestens zu erhalten und legt sogar kontrollierte Buschbrände an, um die neue Vegetation zu fördern, was den Tieren und somit auch den Besuchern zugute kommt.

Auf dem Rückweg zur Lodge sahen wir Giraffen, ein Kleine Kudu - das zu einer Herde von 10 dieser seltenen, im Park lebenden Tiere gehört - und zum Abschluß eine Herde von mindestens 500 Büffeln. In Hintergrund ragte gleichzeitig die schneebedeckte Spitze des Kilimandscharos aus den Wolken.

Wir haben auf dieser kleinen Rundfahrt so viele Tiere gesehen, daß wir gerade Lust bekommen weitere Safaris durch diese wunderschöne Reservat zu unternehmen.

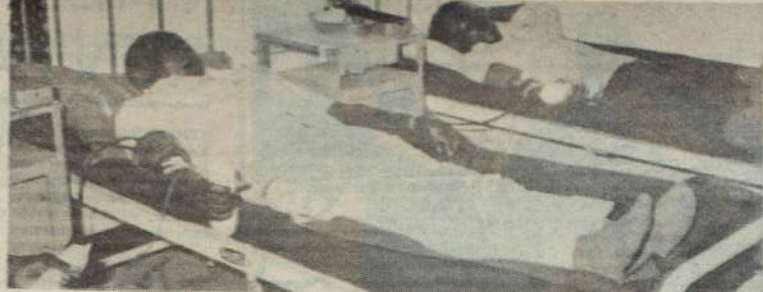
