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Mwidani Is New Mombasa Mayor

MAHAMED MWIDANI 39, has begun his first term as the new Mayor of Mombasa after the island's urban elders elected him their leader in the weekend municipal polls at Town Hall.

Councillor Mwidani, the former deputy mayor, polled 20 votes against former Mombasa mayor Rajab Somba's eight.

Councillor Samuel Ndoro of Mwakirunge ward defeated Mwandani's councillor Laban Mwakonero by 21 votes to win the deputy mayoral post in the same elections.

Six other councils in the province went to the polls on Friday to elect civic leaders.

IN MALINDI the former town clerk Mr. Morris Mwambui Kapala became the new mayor of Malindi, defeating councillor Shadrack Kambi by 13 votes to 1.

Councillor Abdalla Salim Amaleh ousted the former deputy mayor councillor Jimmy Lwali Katana when he polled 7 votes.

Lwali Katana and nominated councillor Godfrey Karume received 5 votes and 3 votes respectively.

IN KILIFI former chairman, councillor Sharifi Alwi retained his post, polling 10 votes. His only rival, councillor David Ngala received 8 votes.

Councillor Gideon Baya won the post of vice-chairman by the same margin, defeating nominated councillor Robert Munga.

Councillor Aldo Nzaphilla replaced Rashid Abdalla Mwakumba as the new chairman of Kwale County Council. Mr.

Disi Kirorezi was elected vice-chairman unopposed.

IN LAMU Coun. Ali M.ahrus was re-elected chairman of the County Council defeating Coun. Abdul Nassir by 9-4 votes.

Mr. Mohammed Farrah was elected vice-chairman.

IN TANA RIVER councillors Shungi Gata and Hassan Dae Mgawa retained their posts as chairman and vice-chairman of the Tana River County Council.

IN WUNDANYI councillor Joseph Mwamburi Nyange was elected the new chairman of Taita/Taveta Country Council beating his only rival councillor Jacob Mwakughu by two votes. Mr. Benson Mwavuganga was elected deputy chairman.

Councillor Edward Mag'anga was voted in as the new chairman of VOI County Council, while councillor D.C. Kayanda was elected the new vice-chairman.

TANZANIA GOVERNMENT CRACK DOWN ON VAGRANTS

SOME 889 people were detained in Dar-es-Salaam this week in a campaign launched to net the jobless in the city. This move is an implementation of the Human Resources Deployment Act which binds every able-bodied person to be gainfully employed.

The campaign conducted by militia men and national service corps did however have some flaws since a number of people holding genuine identity cards were apprehended as were some housewives.

Some certified to be legitimately employed were then released. Albeit after spending a good part of their working day at the assembly centres.

Women putting up a defense of being married were released on condition that their respective marital particulars which they had to leave behind at the centres, would be counter-checked.

He warned that anyone trying to block the deployment process would be committing an offence carrying a 3 month maximum jail sentence with a 1000/- fine option or both.

And for consumers there was more sour news with the Sunday announcement increasing the consumer price for sugar by 75 cents from the present 11/- per kilogramme.

The pricerise has been attributed to increased production and distribution costs and it is the second time for the price of sugar to be raised this year. The previous price was announced some ten months back.

COFFEE CO-OPS

And in Kilimanjaro Region, the Government has decided to hand over 52 nationalised coffee farms in the region to the people so that they may run it on a cooperative basis.

The decision, which marked the official launching of a two week regional campaign to raise the output of coffee in the region, follows declining coffee production of the farms since nationalisation in 1973.

We Do Love To Be Beside The Seaside!

FOR many families going on holiday is an exciting annual event. And for many more this annual holiday simply does not exist. Holiday-time may be a yearly break but the actual reality of a holiday takes place only when there is something special to celebrate.

Such was the sense of well-being and the sense of get-togetherness which I was able to feel when last Sunday a family of six member left for Mombasa to enjoy six carefree and relaxing days at the Coast.

The father, Michael, and his wife, Flemina, were treating their four children to a literal time of their lives with this holiday taken out of Nairobi after nearly three years.

Not for this family the luxury of staying at the Golden Beach or the Serena Beach hotels, this family would be

spending the first night in one of the hostels in the town centre and hopefully going the next morning to take possession of a rented suite of rooms at Bamburi where the catering and the

Michael and their family are not adequately catered for due to a succession of known and unknown reasons which in time one hopes will cease to be plausible.

service is all to be attended by the guests who pay a fixed amount per person for each night they stay at the Bamburi cottage suites.

The majority of people in Kenya cannot afford to be away from the city or the towns for their holidays and the need naturally arises for inexpensive accommodation and for retail outlets which can provide inexpensive wholesome meals.

Of the family just referred to, there are four children Sally, Wendy, Clare and Laura - all with ravenous appetites and with a thirst for coconut water and the fresh fruit juices which are served chilled by the street vendors.

While Kenya does receive over 400,000 visitors annually from other countries there is an untapped resource of over one million Kenyans who can be prevailed upon to take holidays in other areas of the country provided the time is right and, most important, the price structure enables the bread-winners to pay for the holiday in one go without having to borrow salaries in advance to take advantage of a holiday which is basically sort of a reward for the previous year's work.

GUEST HOUSES

In time there is little doubt that there will be establishments and guest houses throughout Kenya which will provide such facilities and amenities.

However in any planning for the future it is rather unfortunate that the likes of Flemina and

It is almost a basic right to be able to enjoy holidays and it is very appropriate that Kenya is one of the prime holiday destinations in the world.

At a rough guess I have reckoned for the family of six the minimum expenditure per day is roughly 50/- a person. This is 350/- for seven days, or in all 2100/- for the whole family for one week.

COAST BUS SERVICE

Taking another 200/- a head for return bus fares (by Gold Line or Coast Bus or Akiba) this is another 1200/-

So a minimum of about 3500/- is required by such a family to enjoy their holiday at the coast.

There are families that can afford ten times this amount and in such cases hotels like Nyali Beach, the Reef, Mombasa Beach and several others are there to meet their needs.

All the same it is time that the lower income groups are considered since even during the traditional 'low' season in Kenya which is from after Easter to the end of July it is still considered luxury for most families in Kenya to go as a family unit to the coastal regions or to any other holiday resorts in the country.

The national airline Air Tanzania Corporation has confirmed that it had sold two Fokker Friendship F27-200 aircraft to British Midland Airways of Great Britain at a cost of about 15.5 million shillings (1 million US dollars and 180,000 sterling pounds).

Two the Aircraft had been grounded since 1980 and were beyond economic repair, according to the airline's acting Manager, Tom Chacha they were procured in 1962 and 1964 by the defunct East African Airways.

Chacha said that the sale of the 44 passenger Aircraft would not affect the Airline's passenger services since the Airline has been operating normally for some years without the two

planes. Chacha, who is also the Airline's Director of Finance and Planning, said that the two Aircraft were useful before the airline acquired the better and modernised Fokker Friendship but due to the difficulty of obtaining bidders for second-hand Aircraft, the two old planes were not sold until August this year.

NINE AIRCRAFT

Air Tanzania remains with a fleet of nine Aircraft of different sizes. These are the two Boeing 737 with a capacity to carry 106 passengers each, three Fokker Friendships with a capacity of 44 passenger each and four twin otters with a maximum capacity of 18 passengers each.

At present one Fokker Friendship has been grounded due to lack of an engine.

American Film Crew On Location At Lake Magadi And Malindi

MOMBASA Island took a leap 100 years back in time when a British crew with a cast of American and British actors began shooting parts of the American television series *Masters Of The Game* this week writes Gray Phombeah.

The series adapted from Sidney Sheldon's latest best seller is scheduled to hit the American small screen in February next year.

Horses and coaches rode into town, and colonial *Askaris* marched through the streets as a cheering crowd tagged behind.

The shooting of the film took place around Mombasa's old port and the treasury square.

In Malindi, a big 'outside catering' exercise for Jambo Hotels was to look after the film unit on location 6 kms South of Mamburi in a remote sand-duned area.

It could only be reached in four-wheel drive vehicles after an exciting ride along the beach which ended snaking into the sand-dunes to the sheltered makuti restaurant nestling at their base, writes Neta Peal.

They were catering for upto 300 people a day. This entailed the staff leaving Malindi at five in the morning with the last departing Mamburi about seven at night.

Rosemont Production, UK, were filming for CBS Television, America, Sidney Sheldon's latest best seller 'Master of the Game'.

It is a story about Kate Blackwell, one of the richest

and most powerful women in the world.

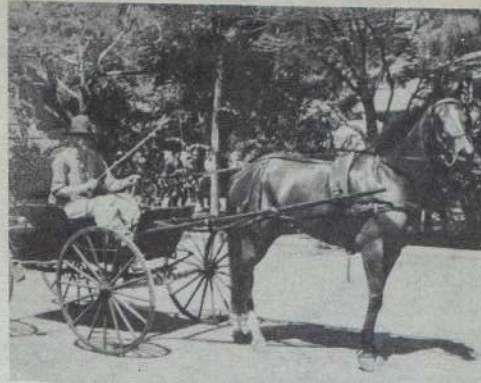
Her father, Jamie McGregor, a young Scotsman, goes to Africa as a diamond prospector and after many trials and tribulations strikes it rich beyond his dreams, then diversifying into a railroad business and shipping.

Ian Charleson, a well known film star who came to prominence in *Gandhi* and *Chariots of Fire* plays the part of Jamie McGregor.

Ian's daughter, Dyan Cannon, has the leading role as kate Blackwell covering a period until her 90th birthday.

Dyan has featured in such films as 'Bob, Carol, Ted and Alice' a marital comedy, also 'Revenge of the Pink Panther' with the late Peter Sellers.

Others in the cast are David Birney, a film and TV actor from America, playing the part of David Blackwell (Kate's

There are also Donald Pleasance, an international actor and Johnny Sekka, a well-known Senegalese actor who lived in the UK for many years and now resides in California.

Not all were on location at Mamburi.

'Master of the Game' is by an American author, Sidney Sheldon, who has in a short time become one of the great international best sellers.

It is the first time for Rosemont Productions to make a film in Kenya. It has a British film crew, and American/English cast, and will be primarily for American TV.

It is being produced by Norman Rosemont who has had a very successful run in producing classic stories which have included *A Tale of Two Cities*, *Ivanhoe* and *Hunchback of Notre Dame*.

It will be a nine hour 'mini' series broken down to three 3 hour shows to be screened on consecutive nights.

The TV team are in Kenya to shoot a small part of the film from the beginning of the story circa 1883.

It is being shot over three locations - Mamburi (because of its desert-like area south of the town); Mombasa's Old Port/Government Square and outside Nairobi towards Magadi. The latter being the main location in Kenya.

Other sequences have already been filmed in New York, Paris, Nice, London and Pinewood Studios.

They were filming at Mamburi for five days, with many of the cast and film crew staying at Jambo Hotels - Sindbad, Blue Marlin and Lawfords leaving at six in the morning and not returning until seven in the evening. They found conditions 'very hot and humid' among the sand dunes.

The unit was full of praise for the tremendous co-operation they had received from the local people there. They said that at Mamburi they had helped enormously both in set building and working as 'extras'.

CODE FOR YOUR PETS

THE keeping of animals as pets is a world-wide practice, although the emphasis on the types and suitability of different animals will vary in different parts of the world.

If you have ever thought about how pet-keeping began, you may have worked out for yourselves that there were several reasons.

- These include:
- The animal started off the relationship with humans as a working partner — example: dogs, mongoses, horses.
 - The animal had normal behaviour patterns which man found amusing: mice, hamsters, birds.
 - The animal had abilities to imitate or learn simple tricks, which again were amusing: birds, dogs.
 - The animal's behaviour was of sufficient interest for man to want to study it and in some cases this involved catching and keeping them in captivity.
 - The animals were pretty, and were pleasant to have around: fish, birds.

However, along with the keeping of pets for pleasure or work, you have a responsibility, not only to your pet but to other people and properly your pet comes into contact with. In this Country we have laws, Acts and Orders of which you must be aware.

Dogs must not be permitted:

- To attack livestock (cattle, sheep, horses, pigs and poultry).
- To chase livestock in a way that might be expected to cause injury.
- Police can seize, detain, sell, or destroy stray dogs.
- An owner must keep under proper control a dog that is, or appear to be, dangerous.
- Dogs must be on a lead when they are walked along any road designated by a local authority.
- No one may perform painful experiments on animals.
- No one may carry out such experiments as part of a public performance.
- No one may advertise such a public performance.

A Person:

- Must not cruelly beat, kick, ill-treat, over-ride, load, torture, infuriate or terrify any animal or allow it to be done.
- Must not cause or assist in causing the fighting or baiting of animals.
- Shall not give or allow to be given any poisonous or other substance which would cause injury.
- Must not underfeed, or otherwise ill-treat an animal by neglecting it. In addition all persons have the responsibility, under this Act, for preventing such things from happening.
- Animals must not be abandoned whether permanently or temporarily.
- Dogs over six months old must have a licence, except for sheep-dogs and guide dogs.

ANOTHER U.L.C.C. CALLS FOR MOMBASA BUNKERS

THE record held by the 333,000 d.w. ton tanker *MEDUSA* as being the largest vessel yet seen off the port of Mombasa was short lived for last Friday yet another giant ULCC (ultra large crude oil carrier) arrived off the port this time in light condition. She was the 1975 built Norwegian flag *HILDA KNUDSEN* whose deadweight tons is 424,000. She is owned by the well known Norwegian ship-owners Knut Knutsen O.A.S. of Haugesund.

The vessel was bound for the Gulf and I believe she had come out of "lay up".

Tanker operators are evidently finding Mombasa offshore bunkering a considerable saving over taking bunkers in the Gulf for some unaccountable reason.

The Southern Oil tanker *LILIAN S* which operates mainly within Kilindini supplying vessels inside the port and occasionally at the outer anchorage, with bunkers has recently been chartered by Shell and will be setting sail for the Seychelles with 4500 tons fuel Oil for Port Victoria. A useful export for Kenya.

The Seychelles used to obtain her oil supplies from Aden.

SHIPPING with JOHN WALTERS

I understand Southern Oil are adding to their fleet having bought the *SPIRIT OF MAHE* and are renaming her *ABDUL K* - a change from the "S" suffix which have up to now identified Southern Oil fleet of vessels, now five in number.

SPIRIT OF MAHE

The *Spirit Of Mahe* was laid up at Port Reitz for nearly one year until she recently moved to Divecon yard; her reintroduction to trading is a welcome move!

The 20 year old Manta Line vessel *COPPER TRADER* remains under arrest fully laden for Port Sudan, Suez and Constanza. She completed loading at No. 4 berth and moved to the buoys last Saturday where she still lies at time of writing.

Kilindini has remained well filled this week with an average of two or three berths only remaining vacant.

I commented some weeks ago on the smart appearance of the vessels owned by the Government of Madagascar.

We then had the 1980 built

ONILAHY on two successive voyages loading Maize.

Her sister ship the *ONIBE* arrived last week and has been berthed at No. 4 loading 2500 tons bagged Beans for Madagascar. Both vessels are 3500 tons gross and the *ONIBE* is equally well kept as her sister.

The Lykes Lines vessel *MARJORIE LYKES*, quite a stranger to the port, arrived on Monday and berthed at No. 8 to discharge some 1200 tons bagged Rice, some full containers, and 120 empties from the U.S. Gulf. She is expected to load some 800 tons Coffee and general.

Two vessels operated by CGM, THE French Line, have been in port this week, the 23648 d.w ton *VILLE DE BREST* loading 3400 tons cargo, consisting of 200 containers plus 1000 tons Coffee, whilst discharging 1414 tons has been the *VILLE DE MARSEILLE*.

Regrettably these fine looking conventional French greyhounds will gradually be fading out with CGM having joined the BEACON container consortium.

A vessel, very familiar in Kilindini over the past year or two has been the Panamanian flag livestock carrier *ORIENT CLIPPER* of 8000 tons built in 1955 for the French Line, Messageries Maritimes, the forerunners of CGM; we shall not however be seeing her again as she has been sold to Chinese shipbreakers at U.S. \$94.00 per ton.

Warm Welcome For New 'Reps'

THE Mombasa shipping community welcomes Kuno Knapper as the newly appointed Resident Representative for Nedlloyd Line in succession to Jack Schouten who is leaving for the United Kingdom on retirement to join his wife and family.

Also a new arrival this week is Captain Ernst E. Zieler who takes over as the new Deutsche Ost-Afrika Line Representative in succession to the late Wolfgang Koehler.

It's Peregrine Worsthorne

DESCRIBING the swinging seaside resort of Malindi as a 'dreamy spot' was Peregrine Worsthorne, Associate Editor, *Sunday Telegraph*, England, who was staying four days at the Sindbad Hotel - the relaxing end of a very enjoyable 16 day Abercrombie and Kent luxury tented safari.

Mr Worsthorne has been with the *Sunday Telegraph* since it started publishing in 1961. Prior to that he was with the *Daily Telegraph* and earlier with *The Times*.

Interviewed at the Sindbad, Mr Worsthorne said he had been a frequent visitor to Kenya before independence and was last here in 1961.

He said 'impressions on coming back were how little it has changed, except that Nairobi is much bigger - and taller.'

He came to Kenya as a journalist before, but this time had come out for a safari with Abercrombie and Kent.

Said Mr Worsthorne 'it was a most memorable experience, for I have never been on safari before.' He had seen 'just about everything in the way of East African wildlife including lion leopard and lots of wildebeast.'

He added with a laugh 'after a time you begin to feel like a caged beast. You cannot leave camp on foot because it is dangerous, and after ten days you become conscious of a curtailment of freedom, while the beasts roam around completely free.'

Summing up he said 'it was my idea of an Ernest Hemingway-type safari.'

It covered The Ark and Shaba tented camp in the Shaba Reserve. They were game viewing there for three days which also included the Samburu. Said Mr Worsthorne 'Shaba camp was small, very comfortable and completely charming.'

Four nights were spent in the Maasai Mara at Kichwa Tembo Camp which Mr Worsthorne described as 'very well run.'

The safari continued to Thompson Falls and Lake Nakuru where they stayed in Lion Hill Camp overlooking Lake Nakuru. In the morning they saw the birdie around the lake before going to Lake Naivasha for lunch.

'Big Export To Tehran'

FISH PILAU Serves 6

1 1/2 lb/700 g hake fillet, 12 oz/350 g long-grain rice, 1 large onion, 2 oz/50 g ghee, 1 teaspoon turmeric, 1/2 teaspoon ground coriander, pinch chilli powder, 1 teaspoon garam-masala, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1 1/2 pints/9 dl hot water, 8 oz/225 g fresh or frozen cooked prawns, peeled and deveined.

Rinse the fish under cold running water and pat dry with kitchen paper. Cut into pieces about 2 inches by 1 inch (5 by 2.5 cm). Rinse the rice in a sieve, then cover with cold

water in a bowl and set aside until required. Peel and chop the onion.

Heat half the ghee in a saucepan. Add the turmeric,

the excess liquid has evaporated. Add the fish and cook on both sides for 3 minutes, taking care not to break the pieces. Remove the fish from the pan and reserve. Drain the rice.

Heat the remaining ghee in the saucepan. Add the onion and saute until soft. Add the rice and saute for 2 minutes. Add the hot water and bring to boil. Reduce the heat, cover and simmer for 20 minutes. Stir lightly and place the fish on top of the rice. Garnish with the prawns, cover and leave over very low heat for 2-3 minutes. Serve immediately.

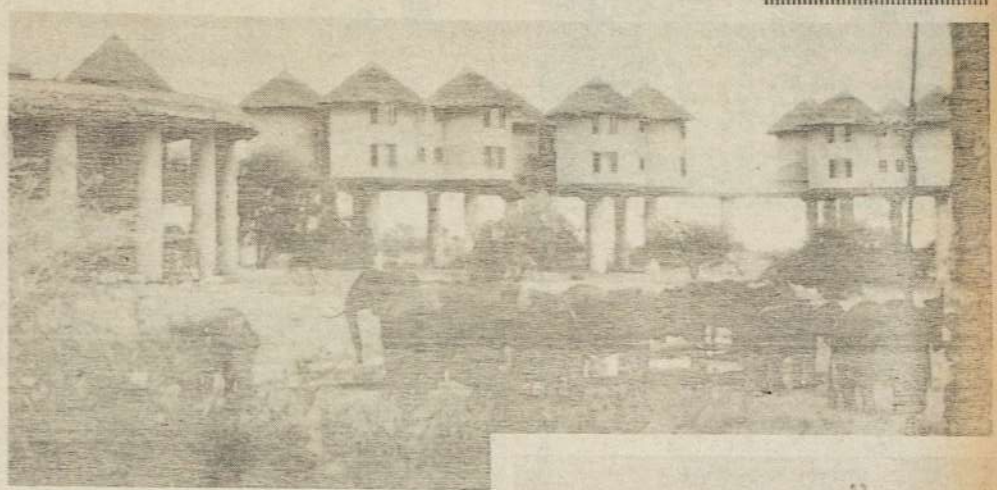

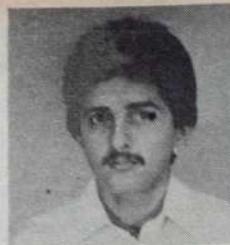

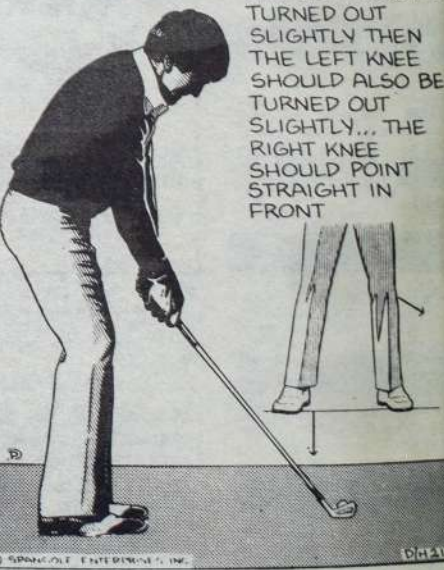
Conditions were extremely hot and dry but the ladies had an enjoyable round due to the courtesy of the myriad refugee men players out in full force for the day.

The manufacturers of other locally assembled vehicles including Datsun and Toyota are working on their applications, and extensions to homologation for the Datsun PA 10 and the Ford Escort are foreseen.

F.I.S.A. RULING

Just when the problem of achieving the minimum entry of 50 cars is easing, FISA has produced a fresh crisis for the Safari organizers.

The request from Paris is to consider bringing the event forward by one or two weeks to allow a bigger gap between the Safari and the next event on the calendar.

The safari has been run at Easter for most of its 30 years, for simple reason that the long holiday weekend is the only time that its thousands of volunteers are available.

FISA's response to the Safari's request to stay with the Easter, no matter how early or later is awaited with interest.



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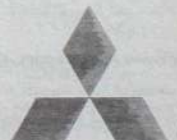

An official at the CSA camp remarked: "It is very embarrassing to see that the boys are not being given morale support from FUFA."

The team's Deadly striker Isaaah Sekatawa looks a doubtful starter for the challenge cup series, said the report adding that the Express FC top scorer is down with a fever about of malaria.

The team doctor, Dr. James Sekajugo said the rest of the footballers were in good health with the exception of a couple of them nursing minor injuries. "but they will be fit soon" concluded Dr. Sekajugo.

Meanwhile, Ethiopia have been included in this year's Challenge Cup competition after Zambia decided to withdraw for the second year running.

The Football Association of Zambia gave "prior and more pressing commitments" as their excuse for withdrawal. Ethiopia will now join Kenya who are the hosts, Uganda and Tanzania mainland in Group A.

Group A will play their matches in Nairobi's city stadium while Group B which consists of Zanzibar, Zimbabwe, Malawi and Somalia are programmed to play at Mombasa Municipal Stadium.
