MALINDI RALLY REPORT from JOHN GARDINER

Looking Into The Recent Past ...

WHEN ANY sporting event has been running for a number of years it seems inevitable that the early records get lost and the special brochure has gaps in the list of winners that need filling over.

This Saturday, Mombasa Motor Club runs its fifth rally at Malindi with sponsorship from Jumbo Hotels. In this case the history of the event is available for the simple reason that Coastweek has been around long enough for its archives to include the write up of each year's rally since 1978.

First called the Mini-Malindi Rally, and sequently changed as entrants were confusing it with MMC's much longer Championship thrash, the rally was originally planned for June 1979, but the Coast had one of its deluges and John Hellier put the event off as there just wasn't enough road to run on.

However, as the sponsors had reserved rooms for the out-of-Malindi crews, Jenny Hellier substituted one of her fiendish treasure hunts.

'HIDDEN CONTROLS'

The rains must have been generous that year, the Coast 600 had to be put back two weeks as well, which put that rally and the re-scheduled Mini-Malindi only a week apart, always bad for entries if the earlier event damages cars.

Organizers Hellier and Balletto put the cars across the Sabaki river for LeG One coming back to a very sneakily hidden control that cost several cars 30 points for wrong direction of approach.

The start of Leg Two had to be delayed to give tail enders a breather, then into the sylvan heights of Sokokejilore where one uphill sandy section had cars buried axle deep. The tail enders arrived three hours after the lead car, which made sure the organisers missed dinner.

Chris Fryer and John Lockhart-Mure were winners in a Datsun 710, well ahead of Ketel and Rahimulla, nine cars out of 13 starters qualified as finishers.

In 1980, the rally was again put together by Hellier and Balletto in early August, the weather went nasty again and Kanti Shah had to be imported to work his own brand of rain

Queen Elizabeth Arrives To Warm Kenya Welcome

QUEEN ELIZABETH II of Britain has arrived in Nairobi at the start of her five-day visit to Kenya, to the throbs of traditional ngomas, pomp and ceremony.

Accompanied by her husband Prince Phillip, the jovial Queen was met at the Jomo Kenyatta International Airport by President Moi, his full cabinet, members of the diplomatic community in Kenya and thousands of cheering Wananchi who packed the airport.

The Queen is making her first State Visit to Kenya since the Republic gained its independence from British rule 20

years' ago.

Representing the Queen at that time was Prince Phillip, who handed over the instruments of Government to the late Mzee Jomo Kenyatta, first President of Kenya, at Uhuru Park, on the night of Kenya's independence on December 12, 1963.

On Sunday the Queen is scheduled to return to Tree-top Lodge, where she began her reign more than 30 years ago, to unveil a plaque built in a giant fig tree to commemorate the occasion.

It was here, on February 6, 1952, while holidaying at the lodge when she heard of the death of her father, King George VI, and her ascendancy to the throne.

Her visit to Kenya, after an overnight stop in Cyprus, is part of her 18-day tour that will include Bangladesh and India.

In India, she will attend the opening of the Commonwealth summit in Delhi on November 23 and confer with heads of state attending the 48 - strong Commonwealth family of nations.

The Queen, 57, is still popular in Kenya and many former British colonies which now form the Commonwealth organization.

Her visit to Kenya is expected to strengthen further the strong and close ties Britain has maintained with Kenya for many years.

Mtongwe Road Work Resumes

S. 8,000,000 UNITED STATES AID PROJECT

WORK on the KShs. eight million United States financed Mtongwe Road project is expected to resume next month. The project, made possible through a U.S. aid package, came to a halt several weeks ago to pave way for a fresh survey of the 4-kilometres route and allow a new planning of the road.

Designed to provide a modern all-weather road connecting the South Beach main road up to the Kenya Navy Barracks, the Mtongwe project complements an ambitious programme of road construction currently being undertaken by the Municipal Council of Mombasa, writes Gray Phombeah.

The project which was expected to be completed next February, according to the original schedule, is part of \$50 million the U.S. Government had earmarked for two major works at the port of Mombasa and the Moi International Airport.

The \$48 million dredging project at the port of Mombasa to enable large ships to enter the sheltered waters of Kilindini was completed in February.

The Mtongwe project is now expected to be completed at the end of next year.

At the same time the Municipal Council is spending Kshs. three million on the repairs and maintenance of roads in Mombasa.

Ten roads on Mombasa island have been under repair in a bid to combat the damage caused to Mombasa roads after the April rains.

Already re-surfaced are the Jomo Kenyatta Avenue and Digo Road. The Moi Avenue is currently being re-surfaced at a cost of Kshs. 1.8 million.

'TREASURY FUNDS'
The whole exercise will include the repair and maintenance of all other roads in Mombasa.

Meanwhile, the Municipal Council of Mombasa is seeking funds from the Treasury in Nairobi for the repairs on the Mtongwe Jetty, estimated to cost Kshs. 800,000/-.

The Mtongwe Ferry Jetty was the scene of tragedy in February 1978 where 12 people died when the old jetty collapsed into the sea.

'GOVERNMENT APPRECIATES RED CROSS'

THE KENYA Government deeply appreciated the role which the Red Cross Society has continued to play in promoting the welfare of the people, and in Mobilising international resources in the cause of the less unfortunate.'

This was conveyed by the Provincial Commissioner, Coast, Mr. Luka Galgalo, in a speech read on his behalf by his Personal Assistant Mr. Nyasimi, at the official opening of a 3-day seminar of the Kenya Red Cross Society at Jadini Beach Hotel.

The PC continued 'the society has always excelled in complementing the efforts of government in developing the mwananchi and, to the extent, we are truly partners in development.'

He went on 'government is

committed to uplifting the economic welfare of the rural citizenry, which is why the rural development focus was born. Said the PC 'it is expected that your society will too, play a vital role in augmenting the efforts of the District Development teams to enable their strategy to succeed.'

'HEALTH CARE'

Indeed's said the PC 'cooperation at district level by all development agencies is the key word, and your personnel should be prepared to subscribe to that understanding.'

Continuing he said 'I am aware of the invaluable services you have continued to render the people of this Province. I wish to thank you for the prompt action you took during the recent Likoni and Lamu fire disasters. The sterling manner in which you rose to both occasions leave no doubt as to your efficiency in combating emergency situations of that magnitude.'

Attending the seminar were 28 officials from four Red Cross branches - Mombasa, Kwale, Nairobi and Lamu.

It was the third seminar of its kind to be held in Kenya. Its main purpose being to discuss the society's five Year Development Plan which became effective this year, the strengthening of its infrastructure and disaster relief preparedness.

'GOOD SERVICE'

The main objective of the society are 'primary health care, blood donor recruitment and youth programmes, also information and fund raising'. The seminar was conducted by HQ officials in Kenya, with assistance from the League of Red Cross Societies in Geneva.

The League's chief delegate was Christer Aqvist, while the ICRC regional delegate was Leonard Isler, who is based in Nairobi. He lectured on Red Cross history, the Geneva Convention and work of ICRC.

There was also discussion on branch administration and accounting, as well as on the new constitution of the Kenya Red Cross Society which came into force this year, updating the constitution from its original form of 1965.

'MAKING USE OF A PRESSURE-COOKER'

LAMB PILAU

- 3 medium-size onions, skinned
- 700 g (1 1/2 lb) best end of neck of lamb
- 1 clove of garlic, skinned and crushed
- salt and pepper
- 600 ml (1 pint) water
- 30 ml (2 tbsp) oil
- 25 g (1 oz) butter
- 2.5 ml (1/2 level tsp) ground cinnamon
- Few black peppercorns, cummin seed, cardomom pods and generous pinch of cloves.
- 225 g (8 oz) long grain rice
- 50 g (2 oz) raisins

CHOP two onions finely and slice the third one. Trim of excess fat from the meat and cut into cutlets. Put the trivet in the pressure cooker and stand the cutlets on it with the sliced onion, garlic, and seasoning. Pour on the water, put on the lid and bring to high (15 lb) pressure. Cook for 10 minutes. Reduce pressure

quickly. Strain off stock, making it up to 600 ml (1 pint) if necessary with water. Remove the trivet and rise out the cooker. Heat the oil and butter in the uncovered cooker and fry the cutlets until they have just browned, then remove

them and keep hot. Fry the chopped onions, cinnamon, cloves and other spices for a few minutes in the remaining fat until the onions are soft and transparent. Then stir in the rice and cook it until all the water has been absorbed. Remove the cooker from the heat, stir in the stock, raisins and salt and pepper. Put on the lid and bring to high pressure. Cook for 10 minutes. Reduce the pressure quickly. Stir the rice well and pile it on to a hot dish with the cutlets in the centre.

Record For Robbialac Art Entries

A RECORD number of entries has been received in the 1983 Robbialac Children's Poster Painting Competition, which sees the judges meeting this month to consider a total of 659 entries in the two age groups of 'under nine years of age' and 'between the ages of nine and twelve'.

A FOND FAREWELL TO BRIAN O'TOOLE

THE PREMISES of Car & General (Kenya) Ltd. were closed on the morning of Saturday to allow the 200 employees from offices, showrooms, workshops and re-treading factory to say farewell to Mr Brian O'Toole, the retiring chairman.

The Staff of Malindi branch of Car & General were also present when Mr. O'Toole, accompanied by his wife Jenny, was presented with a Lamu carved chest and an Arab coffee pot by the staff.

Mr. and Mrs. O'Toole were formally welcomed, by Arthur Ondu, a senior shop steward, who stressed the staff's gratitude to the out-going chairman, the management staff and the company for their handling of the many problems that face the workers of today.

A special vote of thanks was proposed by Helika Amido who joined the company in 1955. He recalled his starting salary of Shs. 72.00 per month, and the much smaller members of employees at that time.

John Vespa of the sales department commented on the sadness felt by the gathering at the thought of losing someone of Mr. O'Toole's status, who spent so many years building Car & General to its present position.

Car & General was formed in 1936 in Nakuru, with a capital

of E270. The following year it moved to Nairobi with Mr. Christopher O'Toole as Managing Director, who handed over to his son in 1957.

During the war, Car & General opened Kenya's first re-treading plant which rapidly expanded to be the mainstay of the company's business.

In 1950, the enterprises became a Public Company with the issue of shares to finance the rapid expansion of its activities.

In 1966 the original title of Car & General Equipment Company Limited was shortened to its present form, while the branch offices in Uganda and Tanzania becomes separate companies.

The Mombasa branch was opened in 1948, and was initially concerned with the clearing and forwarding for the head offices and workshops in Nairobi.

Car & General now employs a total of some 900 people at its premises in Nairobi, Mombasa, Kisumu and Malindi.

"LOVE BREWED IN THE AFRICAN POT" which created quite a stir during its premier in Nairobi and Mombasa in 1981, enters its great second week at the Kenya Cinema - one again set to break all previous box-office records. The film, produced and directed by the Ghanaian playwright/film director Kwame Ansah, opened in new print on Monday to a bumper audience.

The story, as told last week, portrays the love affair between Aba, educated in a posh Cape Coast school and trained as a dressmaker, and Joe Quansah, a semi-literate son of a fisherman.

Aba's father, a retired civil servant wants his daughter to marry lawyer Bensah and hell is let lose when he discovers that Aba has already lost her heart to Joe.

Aba returns home after an expensive education and in the eyes of her father, that makes her more eligible for the highest bidder. Joe's only crime or misgiving is the fact that he is the son of a fisherman and - oh God forbid - a semi-literate mechanic!

Thus class consciousness, family and social pressures are brought to play on the lovers, in the process revealing the cultural conflicts existing within the African society.

Haven't we all sinned or erred like Kofi Appiah and the provincial commissioner? Suffered like Aba and Joe?

Gallery Masha'Allah Resumes Business ...

GALLERY Masha'Allah has re-opened its doors, exactly one year since it opened its new premises on Ndia Kuu Road.

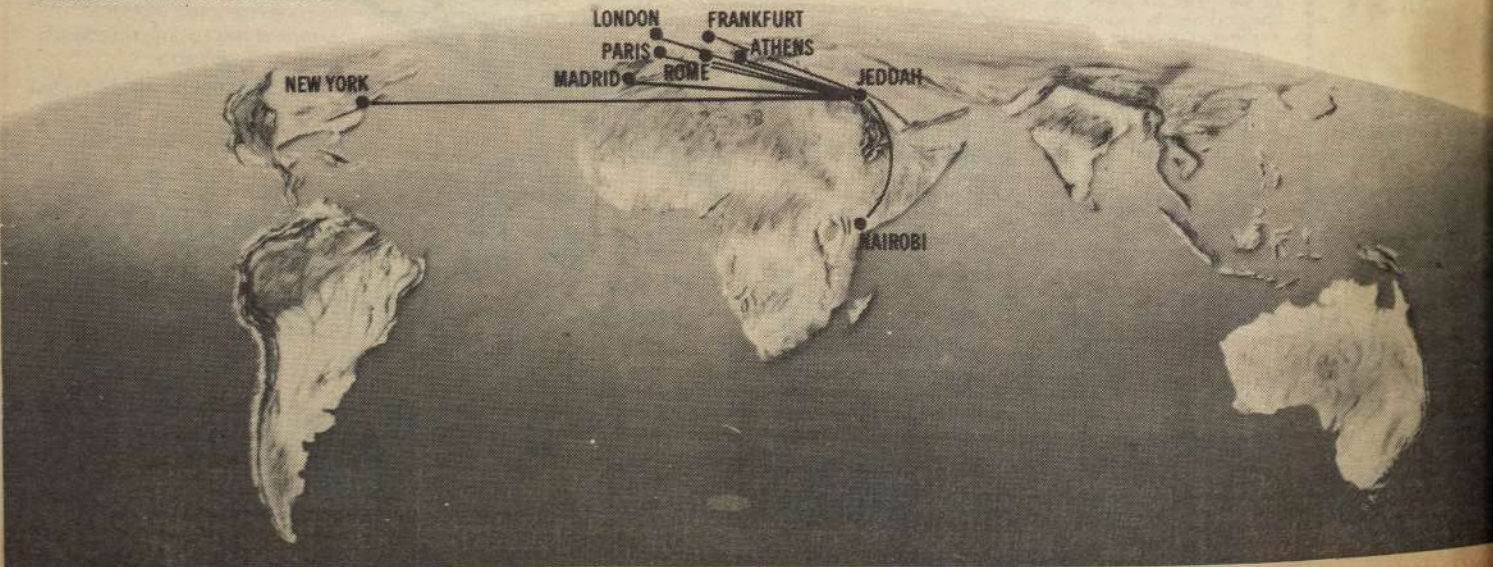

Continuing Mystery Of Missing Diesel Fuel From Railway Trucks

IT HAS been discovered that fuel, mainly diesel, which is destined for some upcountry regions in the country is being pilfered on transit thus hampering economic projects in these regions. The normal procedure for sending fuel upcountry is to consign it through the Tanzania Railways Corporation (TRC) direct to the Regional Development Directors (RDDs) who then distribute it in various institutions in the region.

The Managing Director of the Tanzania Petroleum Development Corporation (TPDC), Sylvester Barongo, expressed surprise how the railways corporation, with its guaranteed system of transporting fuel, could lose the commodity in transit.

The report of the diesel pilferage was also brought to the attention of national leaders during their regional tours this week.

Commenting on the issue, the Tanzanian Vice-President Ahmed Jumba, who toured

Up north in Arusha Region, party secretary Rashidi Kawawa was told of a similar problem experienced by the region. Kawawa made a strong call to the people to cooperate with their leaders in exposing the unscrupulous elements who were ruining agricultural progress the people were striving for.

The Tanzania Petroleum Development Corporation (TPDC) and the Tanzania Railways Corporation (TRC) are presently investigating the incident.

In Dar es Salaam a fresh move has been launched to improve the city's water supply. The government has allocated 15 million shillings in foreign exchange to better the city's water supply system.



Mwanza, Mara and Kagera regions said that this was part of a bigger fuel problem in the country and ordered an immediate probe into the circumstances surrounding the issue.

'Limits To An Animal'

THERE are certain limitations and constraints to what can be learned by animals.

These constraints imposed by the intricate structures of the animal and typically fall within one of four descriptive categories.

Sensory Capabilities: Animal: Tasks that are required of an animal must be within the animal's capabilities.

For example, a dog may never learn to respond to a color cue because of the limited perceptual of its vision.

"Preparedness": The intrinsic organization of an animal's behavior systems predisposes it to certain behaviours and not to others.

In some of his escape training experiments with cats, Thorndike attempted to teach the cat to escape from the apparatus by simply grooming itself.

Although Thorndike cats were able to learn many manipulation procedures for escaping from the apparatus, the association of this phenomenon was that animals are biologically prepared to make certain associations but not other.

Interference: Certain instinctive behaviours can interfere with the modification of an animal's behaviour through behaviour therapy.

For example, when a person seeks to train a cat and intends to use a hand-delivered food reinforcer, the cat's tendency to visually track prey may interfere with learning.

The cat associates the trainer's hand with the delivery of food. The visual attention to the hand may prevent the cat from attending to signal cues or commands from the trainer.

In a sense, the cat may not be deterred from the source of the food even to perform some task which will activate the source of the food.

Medical: Certain maladaptive behaviours cannot be eliminated through behaviour therapy because their cause is a disease state.

For example, if urine is outside the litterbox caused by cystitis, appropriate therapy is medical.

The English-language bulletins are transmitted from ANP in The Hague and have the latest domestic and foreign news and stock exchange figures of important funds at the stock exchanges of New York, London, Frankfurt, Amsterdam and Tokyo.

With this extra service, KLM is responding to the need for information about the latest developments, which is important to more and more people.

NOW SINGAPORE DEFERS PROPOSED TARIFF HIKE

I WAS HEARTENED to read in a recent shipping publication that Singapore Port Authority has decided to defer a proposed 10 per cent tariff increase they were intending to introduce as from January 1 1984. The Authority are instead hoping to achieve extra revenue for their development projects from existing income and pruning of operating expenditure.

The Port of Singapore Authority, certainly one of the leading and most progressive of the world's port authorities, stated that the main reason for their decision to defer the increase was to encourage more business and to assist ship-owners, especially in view of the current depressed state of world shipping.

A most refreshing approach and one that calls for getting your own house in order first before levying increases on to your customers on whom your very survival depends.

MANTA LINE

The port this week has been fairly well occupied both at the general cargo and container berths. There has been an average of only 2 or 3 empty berths.

The Manta Line Cooper Trader continues to remain under arrest at the buoys.

The 5,900 deadweight ton Russian tanker MYS Khrustalnyy entered port at

SHIPPING with JOHN WALTERS

0800 hrs on Tuesday morning in light condition to load 5,000 tons Molasses at Mbaraki Wharf. One of three handy sized tankers of the same class, this particular one was built as recently as 1981. The Canadian Pacific (CP Ships) tanker Fort Edmonton sailed on Tuesday morning from No. 9 berth bound for the United Kingdom having loaded 12,000 tons Molasses so it seems that the Molasses export business is buoyant.

Two other Russian dry cargo vessels on the Besta Line Service have also been in port this week; the 9,300 ton Aleksandr Ulyanov at No. 3 discharging 1,500 tons from the U.K. and N.W. Continent whilst loading at No. 13 has been the Nedhikolov Krupskaya of the same class loading some 2,400 tons for the N.W. Con-

continent, Scandinavia and Russia.

She will have been in port almost a fortnight including a wait to suit her own convenience. Both these vessels were expected to sail Wednesday/Thursday this week.

Due today is the German flag motor vessel Flora of 1,400 gross tons, built in 1966, which is discharging 160 tons Red Cross relief cargo, presumably destined for Uganda. I believe the vessel is virtually on charter to the Red Cross carrying cargoes to the countries whose need is greatest. She is bound for the Lebanon after sailing from Mombasa.

Due on Wednesday this week was the 20,000 d.w. ton Emma Methennis, a 14 year old Greek bulk carrier with 11,150 tons bagged Rice from Japan all destined for Kenya. This is a lot of rice by any standards and the vessel is expected in port for at least 14 days at No. 10 berth.

The cattle carrier Lembu loaded her 540 head and was expected to sail last Tuesday.

The Liberian flat Al Razak of 15,000 tons has been at No. 1 berth this week, discharging 1,400 tons Japanese cargo including numerous motor vehicles. She is on charter to NYK Line.

CRUDE CARRIER

A large tonnage of crude oil was due at Kipevu yesterday on the 96,600 tons Onassis owned tanker Olympic Rainbow which was bringing in 65,000 tons.

Arriving on November 18 on a 36 hr. call is the two year old fine looking German cruise vessel Astor of 18,000 tons owned by HAPAG LLOYD of Hamburg but which I understand has recently been sold and her new owners will be using her for Indian Ocean cruises, so her forthcoming call may well be her last cruise under the German flag.

On Sunday another bulk wheat discharger is due, the 33,000 d.w. ton bulk carrier Fuhwo Venture with 9,400 tons from the U.S. Gulf for the Kenya market.

The eagerly awaited brand new German pure container carrier, the 1200 TEU capacity Uberta owned by DOAL is expected in Mombasa on her maiden voyage about mid-January when she joins the BEACON fleet of container vessels when it is expected she will replace the Victoria Bay.

'ETHIOPIAN' ANNOUNCE NEW SERVICE

EFFECTIVE November 1, 1983 Ethiopian Airlines have introduced a new once weekly service between Addis Ababa and Brazzaville, capital of the Peoples Republic of the Congo.

An Ethiopian Airlines spokesman told Coastweek: The country is noted for its art and music, both traditional and modern, and modern. It also offers attractions like the Rapids of the Congo River and game fishing.

"To the lover of wildlife, the Republic of the Congo affords the elephant, buffalo, hippo in the savanna land while the rare bongo, chimpanzee and gorillas are found in the forests."

The Spokesman added: "The commencement of this flight will be the first service that connects Brazzaville with East Africa and as such is another testimonial of Ethiopian Airlines' commitment to expand its routes in Africa in the large interest of the continent."

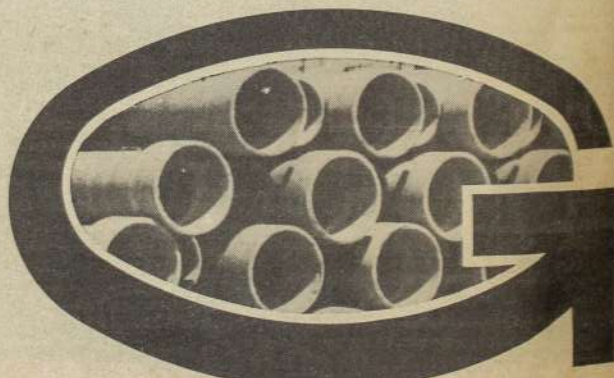

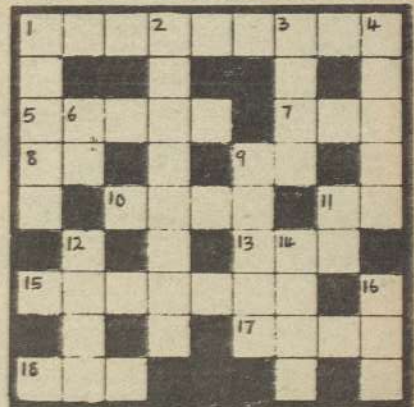

WER SICH die Mühe nimmt, etwas abseits von den berühmten und vielbefahrenen Touristenpfaden durch den südlichen Zipfel des Tsavo-West-Parkes auf Safari zu gehen, kommt durch eine abwechslungsreiche, wilde und unberührte Landschaft, reich an Geschichte und Geschichten.

Während des Ersten Weltkrieges wehrte sich in einem Gebiet zwischen Taveta, an der Grenze nach Tansania, und den Taitahügeln General von Lettow-Vorbeck mit seinen deutschen Truppen erbittert gegen die Alliierten. Noch heute findet man in den vulkanischen Hügeln Unterstände und Abwehrstellungen aus jener Zeit.

Als idealer Ausgangspunkt für Ausflüge in diese interessante Gegend bieten sich die dem Hilton-Konzern gehörenden Luxusherbergen — die Taita Hills Lodge und die Salt Lick Lodge — an. Sie liegen in einem kleinen, privaten Wildreservat mit beachtlichem Tierreichtum.

Auf der Fahrt vom Maktau-Parkingang bis zum Jipesee kann man vielen Tieren begnügen. Dann begegnete er Gertrude Watt (verwandt mit James Watt, dem Erfinder der Dampfmaschine), die ihn so beeindruckte, daß er sie gleich heiraten wollte. Die Verwandtschaft war gegen diese Verbindung und auch Gertrude zögerte, sich mit einem unerfahrenen jungen Mann einzulassen.

Aus diesem Grunde beschloß Grogan, zu Fuß von Kapstadt nach Kairo zu reisen mit der Absicht, durch Tapferkeit und Wagemut die Gunst seiner Angebeteten zu gewinnen und ihre Familie zu beeindrucken.

In Begleitung seines Freundes A.H. Sharp begann er die Reise in Beira. Sie fuhren zwischendurch mehrmals mit dem Schiff, legten aber tatsächlich lange Wegstrecken zu Fuß zurück, die sich im Landesinneren und besonders bis zum Tanganyikasee als besonders mühsam erwiesen. Obwohl er die Reise nicht ganz genau nach Plan ausführte, dauerte dieses abenteuerliche, oft gefährliche Unternehmen zwei Jahre.

Im Jahre 1900 erreichte er Kairo und heiratete daraufhin Gertrude Watt, die mit ihm 1905 nach Kenia zog. Leider ging die Ehe nicht allzu lange gut. Grogan war ein jähzorniger Mann mit eher schwierigem Charakter. Oft nahm er seine Flinte und seinen Hund und verschwand tagelang im Busch.

Gertrude Grogan starb 1943. Grogan stellte einen wertvollen Besitz im Nobelviertel Muthaiga in Nairobi der Wohlfahrt zur Verfügung, der als GERTRUDE'S GARDEN Kinderspital nach Gertrude Grogan benannt worden ist.

Ewart Grogan entwickelte die Holzindustrie in Kenia und ließ in Mombasa in Mbaraki einen Ankerplatz bauen, um das Holz für den Export zu verladen. Er legte verschiedene Farmen im Landesinneren an und entwickelte auf einem Gelände von 120.000 Acres zwischen Taveta und dem Jipesee riesige Sisalplantagen.

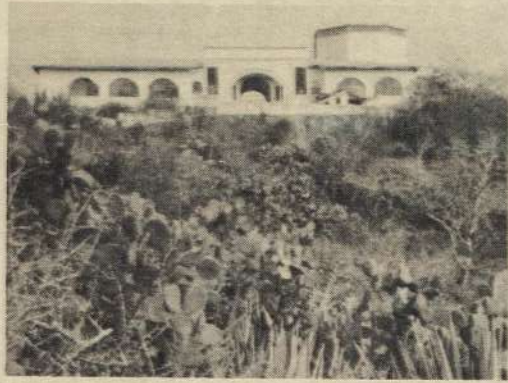
KLOSTER

1942 errichtete er eine imposante Anlage — eine Kombination aus maurischer Festung, spartanischem Kloster, mittelalterlicher Ritterburg und fürstlichem Schloß — auf dem Hügel Kishoto Ng'onji, der früher als heilige Grabstätte diente. Es ist deshalb nicht verwunderlich, daß man allerhand Spukgeschichten über das Schloß erzählt.

In den Gebäuden wollte Grogan eine Landwirtschaftsschule für Afrikaner unterbringen. Als er jedoch die damals zuständige Regierungsstelle über seinen Plan informierte, erhielt er nicht einmal eine Antwort. Er baute die Burg deshalb

um in ein Wohnhaus mit riesigen Sälen, Klostergarten mit Atrium, Freitreppe, Vorratskammern, massiven Pfeilern, dicken Mauern und einem Turm, so daß man sich in einer Ritterburg in Europa wähnt.

Beim Bau wurden Sisalstangen, Kalkstein und Mörtel verwendet sowie als Armierung verschiedene

ausrangierte Lastwagenteile, alte Flugzeugverstrebrungen und anderer vorhandener Schrott, da das Baumaterial rar war.

CHALASEE

Grogan legte große Fischteiche an, um für die vielen Arbeiter auf der Sisalplantage eisweißreiche Nahrung zu beschaffen. Er stellte bei der Regierung auch einen Antrag, den nahegelegenen Chalasee für Bewässerungszwecke anzuzapfen, was ihm auch bewilligt wurde, jedoch nur unter der Bedingung, daß der Seespiegel nicht gesenkt wird!

Der Chalasee ist durchaus sehenswert. Wie ein Smaragd liegt er in den Krater eingebettet, nur etwa 10 km von der Straße nach Taveta entfernt. Leider ist nirgends ein Schild

angebracht und man kann die Zufahrt leicht verpassen. Man fährt auf der neuen Schotterstraße nach Loitokitok, links abbiegend, den Hang hoch und steht direkt über dem See. Gleich rechts weist ein Grenzstein darauf hin, daß hier Tansania beginnt.

Das Ufer ist überall steil, aber mit einem Fußweg zum Wasser versehen und die Leute von der Sisalfarm bestätigen, daß sie hier manches erfrischende Bad nehmen in dem kristallinen, fischreichen Wasser, das vom ewigen Firm des Klimandscharo kommt. Ein Abfluß des Sees ist nicht erkennbar und die Meinungen darüber gehen auseinander.

Vor einiger Zeit, so wird erzählt, haben Wissenschaftler einen Farbstoff ins Wasser gegeben, um seinen Verlauf zu verfolgen. Lange suchte man vergebens, bis man eines Tages Spuren dieses gefärbten Wassers auf der Insel Sansibar gefunden haben soll. Wäre es möglich, daß das Wasser tief unter der Erde und unterm Meer bis nach Sansibar fließt?

Colonel Grogan verkaufte 1961 die Sisalplantage. Die neuen Besitzer sollen um 10 Uhr morgens ins Haus eingezogen sein, haben es jedoch fluchtartig nachts um zwei Uhr verlassen, nachdem das Schloßgespenst umging und sie buchstäblich

werden neue Setzlinge gezogen.

Es dauert drei bis vier Jahre, bis man die unterste Runde der Blätter zum erstenmal schneiden kann. Eine Pflanze hat 210 Blätter, die alle 9 Monate soweit nachwachsen, daß wieder eine Reihe geschnitten werden kann.

Diese Arbeit erfolgt von Hand, und die Blätter werden auf Hand- oder Lastwagen in die nahegelegene Fabrik gebracht. In einer Maschine mit scharfen, rotierenden Messern werden die Blätter im ersten Durchgang auf der einen Hälfte und im zweiten Durchgang auf der anderen Hälfte abgeschält. Die grüne Rinde wird mit viel Wasser entfernt und findet zum Teil als Viehfutter Verwendung.

Die gewaschenen Fasern werden 24 Stunden auf besonderen Gestellen im Freien ausgebreitet und von der Sonne getrocknet. In einer Maschine werden die nun schneeweiß gebleichten Fasern gebürstet und gekämmt, von Hand aussortiert nach Qualität und Länge und schließlich in Ballen von 250 kg gepreßt.

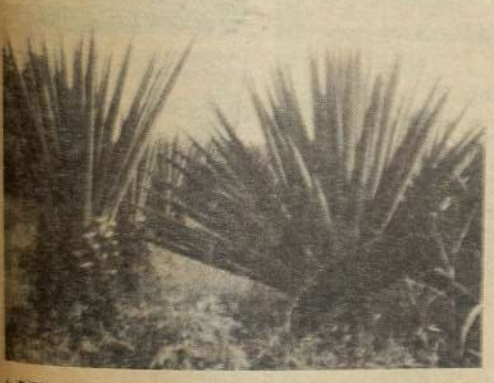

Die ausgeschiedenen kurzen Fasern werden in der Fabrik zum Eigengebrauch direkt zu Schnüren und Seilen gesponnen oder als Füllmaterial für Matratzen und Polstermöbel verarbeitet. Die Stangen der alten Pflanzen werden wie Holz als Zäune und als dekoratives Baumaterial verwendet.

Zwani Estate erstreckt sich von Taveta entlang dem Tsavo-West-Park nach Norden bis zum Zwani-Tor. Der Fluß, der die Parkgrenze bildet, wurde in einer Biegung zu einem Teich gestaut, in dem sich Flußpferde und Krokodile tummeln. Im Schilf halten sich unzählige Vögel auf. An diesem romantischen Platz befinden sich drei Rundhäuser, die den Angestellten und Gästen der Farm zur Verfügung stehen.

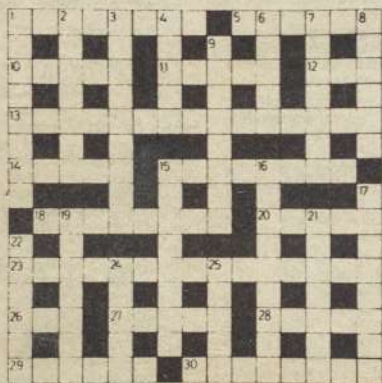

ready been made to landlords to repaint their buildings. He added that refuse collection efforts would be intensified with the provision of more refuse containers at hotels subject to the availability of funds.

dispursing magic.

Only nine cars started the rally in very muddy conditions with leg one through Msabaha, Soko Forest and a very fast pipe line road. After the brief rest halt the second leg went north of the river, where darkness made navigation more complicated.

David Horsey and David Mallitte won the rally, just three minutes ahead of teammates Horace and Adrian Bell, with eight cars qualifying as finishers.

The third event of the series moved back to October, and the event now boasted a new title, "The Sabaki 300", a new format with the rally split into two on Saturday and Sunday.

Thirteen cars were entered, and the combination of thick dust, and driving into a setting sun caused a few twitchy moments in the opening sections north of the Sabaki River.

'ELCTRICAL GHOST'

A triple caution ditch after Marafa put an end to two cars, while an elderly Escort gave up its electrical ghost in a suitably dismal thicket.

By 7.30, all seven runners were back at the Blue Marlin with David Horsey a minute up on Horace. Sunday morning was wet and some five kilometres of just graded grey porridge near Gedi had cars travelling at thirty, speedometers at eighty, while the Halda showed the rally had already ended.

The Soko Forest track was more water and earth, some of the veteran vehicles proved less than waterproof. At the Seafarers finish line, Horace had gained a one minute lead to take the lead over brother David with Kalsi and Bhamra making the most of the handicapped system to beat Dhutia and Khan for third place.

In 1982, the rally was run at the end of September, and was now labeled the "Jambo Hotels 300", for the sponsors of this very popular event in the MMC Calendar.

A record entry of 17 cars indicated the keenness of members to get away from the rather well-worn sections around Kisauni, Ribe and Kaloleni.

The "Saturday afternoon/Sunday morning" format was kept to again, much applauded by the more socially minded crews; if the system needs justification, MMC goes to extraordinary lengths to avoid two way rally traffic at the half way control.

The rally went above the river first, no gentle easing in with a transport section, competitive from the Blue Marlin start.

The last competitive section started at Gedi but a missed instruction at the first cross road had cars hunting the entire Mida Creek area for anything that could be classified as a route.

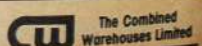
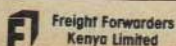

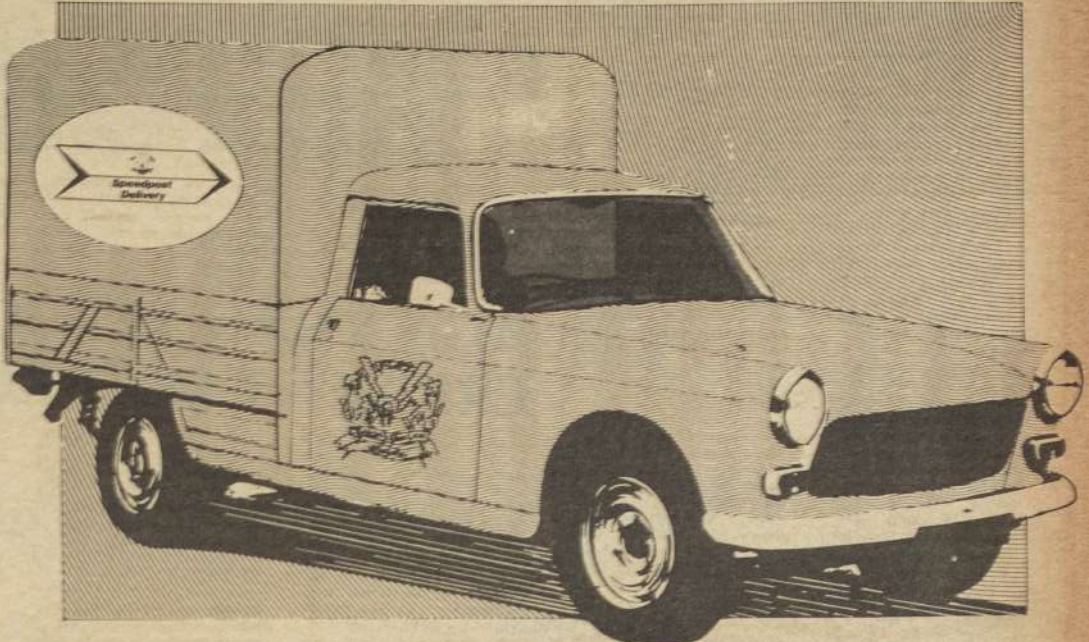
