## More German Tourists For Kenya

ON A FOUR-DAY 'whistle-stop' business visit to Kenya was Adi Kadanka, managing director of MERIDIAN - the largest long haul destination tour operator in Austria.

He was staying at Jadini Beach Hotel - the most popular with his clients. When Erwin jobsil, general manager of Africana Sea Lodge/Jadini Beach Hotel heard that Meridian was sending about 10% more tourists to Kenya during the winter season 1983/4 he immediately asked Shem Abuur, executive pastry chef and Stanley Ngugu, pastry cook, to prepare Mr Kadanka's favourite Austrian cheese cake to celebrate the occasion.

Stanley Ngugi knows a thing or two about this special cake for he received six months further training in Austria sponsored by Alliance hotels.

But it was Mr Kadanka's 18 month old son, Adrian, who showed the greatest enthusiasm for cheese cake, and had the cooks glowing with pride to see their work so much appreciated. The cake went not only into Adrian's mouth, but over his face, and he took time to try and feed his dad (who was then being interviewed by the press) as well.

Meridian deal with about 30,000 tourist taking holidays in fourteen different destinations annually. They began operating to Kenya ten years ago. It is one of the most popular long-haul destinations they sell.

It was Meridian which brought, in two separate groups, 250 hairdressers from Austria here year for a hairdressing workshop/incentive holiday at Jadini/Africana, and a safari to Amboseli/Tsavo game parks. It was arranged by Schwarzkopf, Austria, one of the leading manufacturers of hairdressing products in the world. Accompanying the group was Dr Klaus Schwarzkopf, vice president of the company.

Dr Schwarzkopf was so impressed with Kenya that he said before leaving that he would be speaking to his German division about organising a similar workshop here.

Mr Kadanka confirmed that a large group from Germany will be coming to Kenya next year.

Mr Kadanka was previously working in Kenya for two years, and loves the country. He attributes the 10% increase in bookings during the winter season to the launching in Austria of a television campaign on Kenya in co-operation with the Ministry of Tourism. Austrian Air Transport and the hotels concerned.

In addition, they have also invited more than one hundred travel agents here during the past few months to sample what they sell with a view to increasing bookings. Meridian together with Touropa Austria and Austrian Air Transport, also co-sponsored the visit of some Austrian journalists here.

From Dec. 20 until the end of April 1984 Austrian Air Transport will be operating a second DC9 Super 80 direct flight a week Vienna/Mombasa on which many Meridian clients will be travelling.

A big procession will start from "Uhuru Ni Kazi" on the night of December 11 led by the colourful Bamburi Portland Band to the Mama Ngina Drive off the Likoni channel, where the Provincial Commissioner Mr. Luka Galgalo will be the guest of honour.

Entertainment fare at the stadium will include for the first time a Muslim Taarab Band.

## Shs. 7 Million Boost For Education

VOI (KNA) The Government through the Ministry of Social Services' charitable organisations and harambee meetings have contributed Shs. 7 million towards the construction of several secondary and primary schools in Taita Taveta District since 1981.

Harambee meetings conducted by several dignitaries had raised Shs 6 million, government grants, Shs 69,281/- the co-operation of American relief everywhere (CARE) contributed Shs. 198,971 while European economic community (EEC) gave Shs. 750,000/-.

This was disclosed by the Taita Taveta District education officer Mr. George Mbiijiwe during an official opening of extra-classrooms of Wusi Primary School in Chawia Location by the permanent secretary in the office of the permanent secretary in the office of the President Mr. Joseph Muliro.

Mr. Mbiijiwe appealed to parents to find ways and means of raising enough funds for construction of extra-classrooms in readiness for eight year primary school education in 1985.

He reminded parents that it was their responsibility to put permanent school blocks and the government to provide school blocks and the government to provide school equipment and teachers.

Mr. Mbiijiwe revealed that the district had enrolled 55,237 students in Primary schools and 5,284 in Government and Harambee secondary schools.

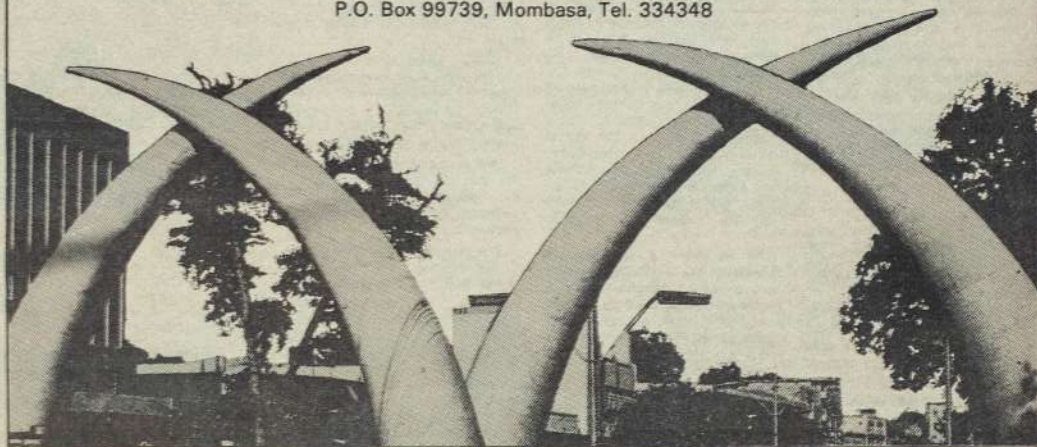

## 'MONEY OF THE RICH IS BLOOD OF THE POOR ...'

I WAS impressed to read Nairobi newspaper columnist William Ochieng's View which suggested that since we are now approaching the twentieth year of our independence we should start taking stock of our successes and failures.

This is known as general introspection and is applicable to individuals, to organizations and to the government at large.

The statement we do not want Kenya of 16 millionaires and 16 million beggars! exuded the socialism and the virile pragmatic philosophy of William Ochieng.

"What is important is that some of us want to build for ourselves and our children a society that is based on social justice, equity and self-reliance."

It is unlikely that anybody in Kenya will find fault with the society we all aspire to develop in Kenya for Kenyans. And yet it is not true that we are far from our cherished goals and our ambitions!

Stock-taking is the time to cast aside all our pettiness and our own selfish interests be these parochial, tribal, racial or unwittingly, a discarded arrogance.

### IMBALANCES

Nobody can survive and enjoy life at the cost of the misery and the backwardness of others.

In fact it is timely to quote the French philosopher and obsessive writer who once said that *The money of the rich is the blood of the poor.*

For is it not true we do have enormous disparities in the incomes of the people of Kenya?

This has been the case before independence and is naturally something we did need not be too nervous about.

The major point is in our asking ourselves how much or how little we have done in the last twenty years of independence to set right such unjust imbalances? It is common to let things remain as before and to hope they will change.

But for this we require our own will power and our own

efforts to effect the changes in our society.

It is good fortune that we have a highly literate class in our society and that our colleges and high schools are yearly turning out educated and qualified students so that the young men and young women can make their own contributions to our society. But in many cases they land up in the valleys of frustration and irreparable misery. Job hunting in a city or town can be a nightmare. Often it is not a question of how capable or qualified a person is.

It is more a question of knowing the right personality or having a godfather or godmother who is able to do the necessary work of introducing their young proteges to prospective employers. Kenya is not unique here.

## DATELINE: DAR ES SALAAM FRUITFUL TALKS AIMED AT ENHANCING GOOD RELATIONS

IN A FOLLOW-UP to the recent re-opening of the Tanzania-Kenya border. Leaders from regions bordering the two countries met in Arusha to sort out as security and immigration formalities. Both countries concurred on a number of points aimed at enhancing good neighbourliness but no official statement was issued after the two-day talks.

However the principal secretary in the President's Office here, Timothy Apiyo is reported to have said that the two countries did agree on the issue listed on the agenda for discussion.

Apiyo was quoted to have said that the agenda covered ten important issues relating to affairs like immigration and

movement across the border cattle rustling, poaching and repatriation of unwanted persons.

Other matters touched upon were those to do with interstate meetings between minister, security organs, smuggling and illegal trade, customs duties and the control of trade and tourism.

During the meeting it was also agreed that liaison offices be opened in the two countries and that no military exercises be carried out along the border.

Finally it was resolved that experts and authorities of the two countries should meet as soon as possible to chart out methods of achieving the solutions for the problems listed on the agenda.

Meanwhile Ministers from Tanzania, Kenya and Uganda are expected to meet soon to discuss on the final implementation of the distribution of assets and liabilities of the defunct

community.

Midway through the week, some 350 West German Tourists aboard Mr Astor made a 12 hour stop at the Dar es Salaam port as part of their cruising tour.

The stop earned Tanzania some 1.2 million shillings in foreign exchange which was collected through services rendered to the tourists during their brief stay in the country which they described as 'very interesting'.

The tourists arrived in the city from Zanzibar and toured various places in the city including the Kariakoo Market, University of Dar es Salaam, the National Museum and the Kibugano Village.

The tourists were also entertained by a local dancing troupe aboard their ship and this kept them on their toes, especially when the dancers took to playing with pythons.

The tourists could however not procure ivory carvings since the West German customs do not permit importation of ivory. This is because elephants are listed among the rare species listed by the World Wildlife Fund (WWF) for conservation.

While the tourists found everything else good, they expressed concern over the state of old buildings in Zanzibar which they said could collapse in the ten years thereby depriving the Island of its old age beauty.

life and the young school and college graduates have to literally find their own ways of job hunting and are "on the tarmac" our towns and in Nairobi for several months and, in some cases, for many years!

### FRUSTRATIONS

After a long period of frustration and not even having adequate nourishment the young men and women are unable to make a favourable impression when they are interviewed for jobs.

And they get thrown back to their unemployment from which it is difficult to instill in them their diminishing self-confidence.

However unemployment is only one sphere where our performance needs looking into. We continue with the problems of malnutrition, of injustice and of the rich oppressing the poor.

It is a good time, now that we are approaching our twentieth year of independence, to be fairly articulate and to appreciate the good things independence has brought us.

We are a Kenya nation and are privileged to have a place of honour in the world community. We are mature and reasonably stable.

We are working towards re-establishing the links and bonds with our neighbours.

In fact at a recent Kenya Press Club Luncheon the Foreign Minister, Mr. Elijah Wasika Mwangale, mentioned that Kenya and four other countries Tanzania, Uganda, Ethiopia and Sudan were hopeful of collaborating in order to have a common union which would economically bind together a population of 85 million which is almost twice the number of people who were together in the now defunct East African Community whose nails were permanently fixed into the EAC coffin in February 1977.

This being the case there is enormous hope for the future goodwill among the people of East Africa.

### OPPORTUNITIES

The dark clouds will continue to hover around. But all of us have to be determined and dedicated and capable of fighting the wrongs perpetuated by selfish and self-motivated individuals who do not have the welfare of the society they live in.

Nobody expects a radical change in our thinking after 12 December 1983. But we can all bear in mind that "Freedom is that state in which every person has the opportunity of doing good."

Let us make this a reality and let us hope and pray that there will be a better spirit of goodwill and harmony among the people of Kenya and the those countries whose friendship we value.

## The Bird And The Bee And A Honey Tree ...

Animals have served as both food and indispensable associated in securing food for people since prehistoric times.

Recent discoveries in the Yukon's Old Crow Region placed one cooperative relationship, the dawn of the domestication of the dog, at approximately 30,000 years ago.

Before this report, the earliest association was documented at about 12,000 years ago, based on archeological findings in Iraq and Israel.

Many instances from early times exemplify human-animal mutual aid: Pliny the Elder recorded incidents of dolphins assisting fishermen, a practice described in more recent times as well.

African people described a bird named the Honey Guide that leads both badgers and people to honey trees and then share in the spoils. Native Americans of the Pacific Northwest used dogs to drive deer over cliff during a hunt.

### HUNTING DOGS

The contemporary training and use of hunting and herding dogs and hunting falcons, hawks, and even eagles indicate the continuing strength of this element of the bond.

Animals have provided clothing, food, medicine, and have themselves been food. Old Crow dogs probably served as the main course when hunting trips were unsuccessful.

As Lewis and Clark described in journals of their trek to the Pacific Ocean, some Native American tribes regarded dogs as emergency food.

The domestication of various species for human consumption has been well described.

Measures of Status and Wealth: The Masai culture of Africa illustrates the animal as man's valued object for the wealth it represent and the status its possession confers.

The Masai people show great respect, affection, and care for their cattle and small ruminant animals which provide food and are a measure of wealth.

The animals are also a source of companionship.

### YOUNG GOATS

Young goats for example are objects of play and a source of much pleasure for children.

Many Native American tribes, such as the Nez Perce, measured wealth by numbers of horses a man possessed.

The status of a chief was evident in death when his finest horse was killed at the grave to accompany him in the journey after death, as recorded by the Yakima Nation of Washington State.

In our contemporary culture, we often regard persons with fine Thoroughbred horses or purebred dogs or cats as people of wealth and status.

# Final Voyage For Tagama

A NEWS item of regret is the retirement from the East African trade of the popular DOAL (German East Africa Line) vessel Tagama which sailed on Monday Northbound for the N.W. Continent after loading 1500 tons mainly Coffee. In consort with her sister-ship the Tabora (since also redeployed) these two multi purpose vessels have been on this Coast for the past 5 years. Containerisation and the recruitment of DOAL to the Beacon Container Consortium means no further use in this trade and they will both operate in the Capricorn consortium between U.K./Continent and the Indian Ocean Islands.

Whilst this is a sad parting we can look forward in January to the arrival of the new DOAL 1300 TEU capacity container ship Ubena.

Slack times continue at Kilindini with an average of half the deepwater berths being occupied. Unhappily a further unit of the Greek owned Manta Shipping line found herself under arrest on her arrival last week.

She is the 20 year old 7000 d.w.ton Franky at No. 9 berth to discharge and load. She is British built in 1963 for Booker Bros and McConnell of Liverpool and named the Booker Vanguard, one of a number of ships owned by this well known trading company which are now out of shipowning altogether.

So the Franky now joins the arrested Copper Trader reclining at the buoys since 22nd October.

Despite the fewer ships calling at Kilindini there are invariably one or two of more than passing interest. An arrival at No. 2 berth last weekend was a vessel resembling a modern Rhine barge or a River Thames flat iron.

She was in fact a 4 year old German owned short sea trader the 1000 tons gross single hatch Pirat which had carried a consignment of military lorries from Rotterdam. On completion she was loading a consignment of beans for Maputo.

In spite of her small size she has an unusually large deadweight of 3000 tons. The only superstructure is a wheel house positioned on top of a short hydraulic tower. All accommodation for the small complement is aft below the weather deck. She was without a funnel or lifeboats - only rubber dinghies.

I understand she had taken some 2 months on the voyage. Her general appearance and grey paintwork was in near perfect condition so her crew were evidently justly proud of their ship.

Another vessel which has called at Mombasa on many occasions is the Mediterranean

Shipping Company's (MSC) Jody now 23 year old; she has been disposed of to Indian Ship-breakers. Of 6027 gross tons she has been looking her age over the past few years on her voyages mainly between the Mediterranean and East Africa.

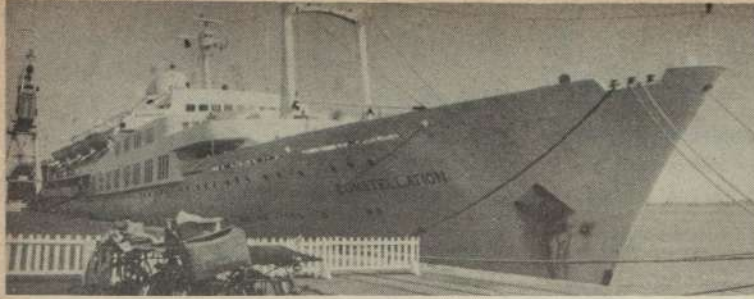
The well known international towage and salvage company Smit International have reported reduced profits by approximately 50% during their last financial year. Nedlloyd, the leading Dutch shipowner, have a 40% shareholding in this shipping group's poor financial position.

Another Nedlloyd vessel familiar in East African waters over the past few years, engaged in trading to and from the Far East, has been sold. She is the 7350 gross registered ton Nedlloyd Hobart built in Japan in 1968 together with her two sisters Nedlloyd Honshu and Nedlloyd Hongkong.

These latter two vessels continue to operate the Nedlloyd East Africa/Far East Trade. The Nedlloyd Hobart has been sold to Taiwan for scrap at \$105 per ton.

Yet another bunkering operation involving a VLCC (very large crude carrier) took place off Mombasa on Tuesday morning when the eight year old Spanish tanker Santa Maria of 363,000 deadweight tons dropped anchor on a voyage in light condition from the Caribbean to the Arabian Gulf.

A ship to ship operation was arranged by the employment of the Southern Oil Coastal tanker Aghyros S. Commander Cribb the R.N.L.O. has now confirmed the visit of a Royal Navy Squadron from 16th December until 3rd January. The ships concerned are HMS GLAMORGAN a county class guided missile destroyer which saw distinguished service in the Falklands campaign, HMS BRAZEN, one of the latest Type 22 Frigates, and the Royal Fleet Auxiliary BLUE ROVER.



PASSENGER liner, s.s. "CONSTELLATION" called at Kilindini Harbour with 103 passengers on board. For a two-day stop over from Djibouti, the passengers stayed in Mombasa and went on sight-seeing to Tsavo National Parks. She sails for Durban and Mauritius, before returning to Greece for the summer cruise. Local agents were M/s Dodwell Shipping Agencies Limited.

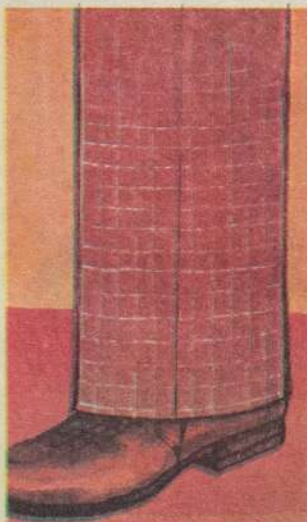

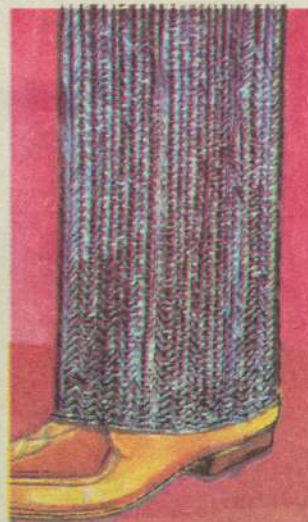

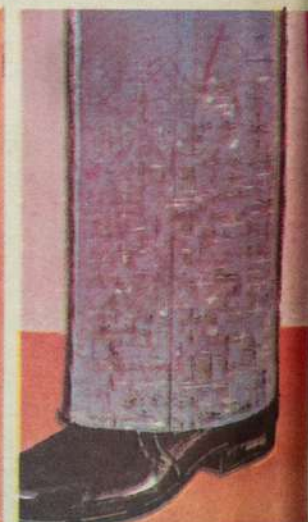

## Fun And Sun At The Whispering Palms ...

UNDER THE swaying palm trees at sunset a cocktail party was hosted by Whispering Palms Hotel, Kikambala, to greet seventeen travel agents from France brought her by Ram Travels, Mombasa, and Air France, to boost tourism to Kenya.

Raphael revealed that he is expecting a big increase in the number of tourists this winter season compared to last year, with groups also arriving during April and May 1984. This year, he said 'there were none at all in May'. They hardly reached a figure of 2,000 tourists during the 1982/3 winter season but, said Raphael 'it looks as if we may reach 4,000 during the present winter season as a result of all the

promotion now taking place.' In fact, from November 26 to December 10 they are expecting some 600 clients.

Consequently, Ram Travels has had to increase its bed capacity at the coast, and has now started sending clients to Whispering Palms Hotel.

Clients are also accommodated at Severin Sea Lodge, Bamburi.

The travel agents from France spent a week in Kenya going to Mountain, Amboseli Serena and Kilaguni lodges, during which time they saw lots of wildlife.

It was their first visit here, and they were most impressed.

### Promotion

Raphael is a great believer in 'promotion' and every three months travels to France and Belgium to keep in touch with tour operators and travel agents there.

Before starting his own business, he had worked for two years as a tour guide with Jet Tours of France.

Raphael said he is very confident about the future of tourism in Kenya, but feels there is great need for more publicity material from the Ministry of Tourism. He asserted there was an insufficient supply in tourist offices in Europe, as well as films about Kenya.

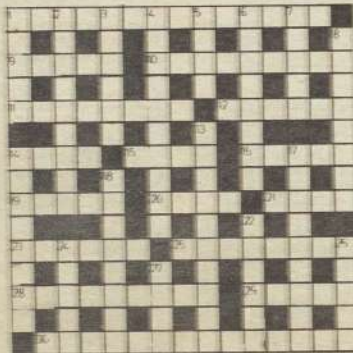
