BRITISH TOUR TRADE COULD SEND 100,000 TOURISTS A YEAR:

## 'Kenya In Top-Ten World Attractions'

BRITISH TRAVEL agents still consider Kenya as 'one of the world's Top Ten long-haul holiday destinations' and 'if charter air tickets are introduced at reasonable rates ... Britain could send up to 100,000 tourists a year to Kenya.'

And, even more optimistic tour operators in London say: 'If the price is right ... We can double that figure in less than two years!'

However, such an influx of British tourists is not likely in the immediate future: But the initial intake of several thousand could begin as early as August 1984.

Senior British Airways officials in London told Coastweek the subject of Charter Air traffic between Britain and Kenya was for the moment 'in limbo' as it was already being discussed at a Government level.

Phillips emphasised that any negotiations would be held in 'a positive and constructive manner'.

It was important to resume large-scale British tourism to

Kenya whether it was in a joint service with Kenya Airways and British Airways, or with the British Airways charter subsidiary British Airtours.

Subject to a successful fare agreement, Tourism to Kenya could begin being sold to the British market through nationwide advertising campaigns in time for bookings in the early autumn of 1984.

One informed source at the Olympia Market described the situation to Coastweek:

"The British tourist trade is very keen on Kenya, both for its safari and coastal attractions, the market is there, but it would seem that the traffic is being diverted elsewhere for the time being.

"There is no reason why such tourism cannot be re-routed back to Kenya providing sensible air traffic arrangements are agreed to."

Meanwhile the Kenya stand at the Olympia 'World Travel Market' received a considerable boost through the efforts of British Airways — who flew in a top-level delegation of senior tourism officials, Kenya journalists and thousands of copies of a special Coastweek issue featuring the Queen's visit to Kenya.

#### PROMOTION

Commenting on the WTM visit British Airways Nairobi-based regional manager Mr. Tim Kelly said that British Airways had also prepared a large stand at Olympia where they organised a special Kenya promotion.

"Following the Royal Visit to Kenya the opportunity to sell Kenya holidays at this important British Fair has undoubtedly brought valuable dividends to Kenya tourism", he added.

The special issue of Coastweek was printed in full colour showing photographs of Queen Elizabeth on tour in Kenya, and used by courtesy of the Nairobi STANDARD newspaper.

It also carried a further 14 pages describing the attractions of holidays at the coast, Kenya's cultural heritage and the excitement of wildlife safaris.

In a special message for the Coastweek issue Tourism and

Wildlife Minister Mr. Maina Wanjigi described Kenya as 'the best bargain in far-away holidays'.

The Minister went on: "In line with my Government's policy on free enterprise Kenya

continues to encourage and welcome suitable private investment and interest in our tourist industry.

"We recognise and appreciate the role overseas investors and tour firms have played in the rapid growth of the tour industry in the Republic."

## COAST SET TO CELEBRATE 20 YEARS' UHURU

PROUD Kenyans throughout the republic will on Monday mark with pomp and ceremony the finest hour in Kenya's glorious history when the country attained its independence from Britain twenty years ago. President Moi is scheduled to address the nation from Uhuru Park at the height of the 20th Anniversary celebrations which have ranked as the most treasured moment in the history of post-independence Kenya.

After many decades of struggle and set-backs, Kenya finally became fully independent on December 12, 1963. (A Republic a year later), ending 76 years of British rule. The late Mzee Jomo Kenyatta became the first President of the new Republic of Kenya.

A traditionally huge crowd is expected to throng Uhuru Park to listen to the President's speech. He will inspect a guard of honour, watch the military parade by the Kenya Armed Forces and watch traditional ngomas and choirs before addressing the nation.

In Mombasa all roads lead to the Municipal Stadium where the Coast Provincial Commissioner Mr. Luka Galgalo is scheduled to deliver the President's speech to Mombasa residents.

#### FESTIVE FLAGS

The town is already awashed with flags and decorations, signifying a colourful festive mood among its residents.

A fairland of lights and fireworks is set to usher in the 20th Anniversary celebrations in Mombasa on the eve of Jamhuri Day, after a week-long festival that began last week.

To the throbs of traditional ngomas and choirs, the firework display will begin minutes before midnight along Mama Ngina Drive where the Coast provincial Commissioner Mr. Luka Galgalo will be the guest of honour and the event is expected to be witnessed by

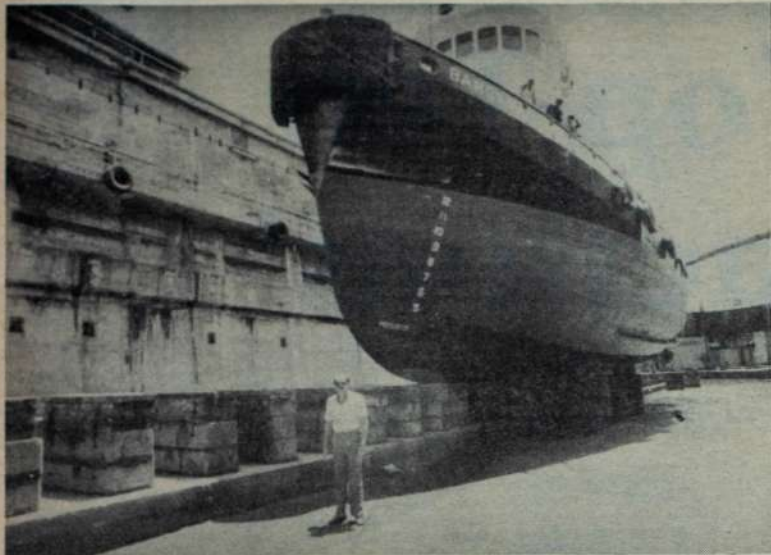
P.C. DAVE

# MOMBASA TROOP LEADER IS CHOSEN 'SCOUT OF THE YEAR'

WASHINGTON Onyango, a Mombasa scout, has won the 1983 Scout of the Year title. The annual award is sponsored by British Airways and the airline will fly the winner to Britain where he will represent Kenya at major scout functions. Washington Onyango's selection was announced recently at Rowallan Camp near Jamburi Park.

# FOUR WIN GOLD

## Carol Thatcher (Of That ilk) Enjoys One-Week Kenya Holiday

NINE journalists from the UK have spent a week in Kenya sponsored by KUONI Travel, Kenya Airways and Block Hotels - all to generate more interest in Kenya and to attract more holidaymakers here.

They spent a night at Treetops (the day before Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II was expected), Baringo Club, Naivasha/Keekorok, Norfolk and two nights at Nyali Beach Hotel - sampling what Kenya has to offer.

Accompanying them was John R Sim, Planning Manager, Kuoni Travel Ltd, UK, responsible for the whole of Africa and Indian Ocean Islands. This was his fourteenth visit to Kenya in three years.

Kuoni is the largest long-haul tour operator in the UK sending some 40,000 tourists a year to seventy different destinations in the world.

About 5,000 come to Kenya, which is one of Kuoni's most popular long-haul destinations. Declared Mr Sim 'we are the best supporters of Block Hotels'. In support of this he revealed that their clients had so far spent 12,000 bed nights at Nyali Beach Hotel this year.

Carol Thatcher, Daily Telegraph (daughter of the British Prime Minister, Margaret Thatcher) said it was her first visit to Kenya, a country which she described as 'just made for holidays with so much variety'. She said she had been most impressed with Treetops, which is 'quite unique'.

Said Kenya Wood, Assistant Editor, Manchester Evening News 'it is also my first visit to Kenya. I have been so impressed that I am bringing my whole family here to do the same trip again. It is marvellous country'.

Steve Crozier, a travel correspondent for radio station, London Broadcasting Company, is doing a programme on Kenya to be seen on 'Travel 83' which will go out to 44 commercial radio stations in Britain. He said he was looking at the Kuoni Block hotels operation, also the wildlife.

Said Steve 'I am suffering from visual indigestion - it is all too much - the scale of everything is immense, as well as the colours'. Adding 'for the minority who have done the Greek Islands and Spain - Kenya is obviously their next choice'.

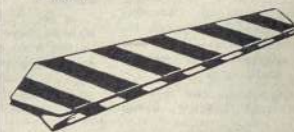

PHASE ONE of the Shs. 5 million Guru Nanak Ramgarhia Sikh Hospital at park Road, Nairobi, has been officially inaugurated.

The Hospital will provide medical services to residents of areas as Ngara, Buru, Buru Eastlight, the City Park and other parts of the Eastlands.

The inauguration was performed by a member of the East African Ramgarhia Board, Mr. Mohan Singh Roopra, who also offered, together with friends to buy an X-ray unit for the hospital at the cost of over Shs. 1 million.

Speaking at the ceremony, the Chairman of the Sikh Temple, Mr. T. S. Nandhra, pointed out that phase one of the hospital includes 16 independent maternity beds, an out-patients wing, a laboratory, six examination rooms, six common rooms, an operating theatre and a mortuary.

Already nine doctors were available at the hospital.

He said that the second and third phases were in steady progress. He thanked the Sikh Community for their continued efforts and contributions to make the "dream become a reality".

Mr Nandhra pointed out that the second phase estimated at the cost of Shs. 2.5 million is expected to be completed before January 1984.

It will have 26 beds for babies, nine independent and self-contained maternity rooms, another theatre and two common rooms.

He revealed that the Sikh Community had decided to inaugurate the hospital on November to commemorate the birthday anniversary of Guru Nanak, founder of the Sikh religion which he said was an appreciation of Nanak's service to the Community.

Mr Nandhra thanked President Moi for having donated the land on which the hospital has been built. Similar medical schemes are likely to be introduced in the town of Mombasa.

## ST. FRANCIS IN MALINDI

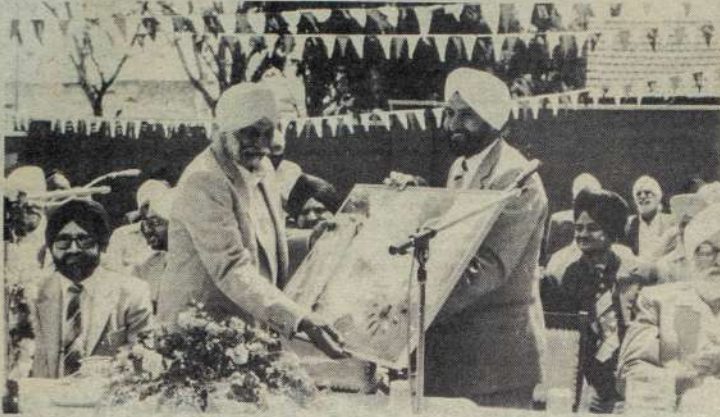
LITTLE is known that the great Spanish missionary St. Francis Xavier spent some days in the fifteenth century when his ship was at anchor in Malindi on our Coast.

A woman had been granted full freedom in the choice of her husband. Nobody has got the right to give her away in marriage without her wish and consent. And if she marries a man by her free choice, nobody can stop her from doing so; however, she selects a man who is not her equal in status, the elders reserve their right to object.

She has also been given legal rights to obtain separation from her husband who is cruel, impotent or who she abhors.

Her husband has been instructed to use the authority granted over the wife with discretion in a large-hearted and generous manner. The Holy Qur'an says: "Treat your wife kindly" (4:19) and "Forget not magnanimity in your dealings." (2:237).

The Holy Prophet (s.a.w.) said: "The best among you are those who are good to their wives and kind to their people". Islam does not give only moral instructions. If the husband abuses his authority, the wife reserves every right to have recourse to the law.

Divorced and divorced women and all such women whose marriages have been annulled by law, or who have been legally freed from their husbands, have been granted an unfettered right to remarry. Their previous husbands or any relatives, do not retain any right whatever over them.

Substantive equality has been established between the man and the woman as far as civil and personal laws are concerned. The Islamic Law does not recognise any distinction between them in the protection of life and property, honour and reputation.

In East Africa, one of the ASG's main operations area has been Uganda and Southern Sudan.

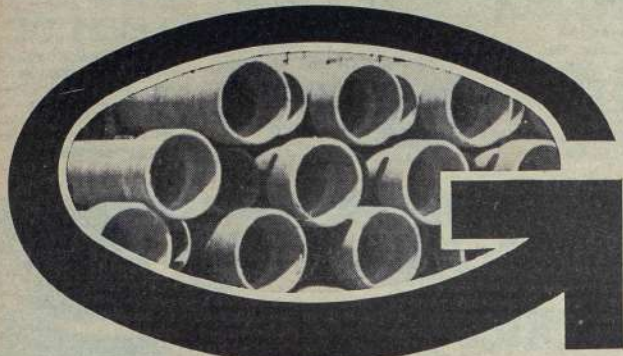
ASG operates another branch in Dar-es-Salaam which caters for Southern African trade.

## Amazing Maize Movements Mystify Mombasa Shippers

MAIZE EXPORTS are moving again. On Tuesday morning the Greek flag *Yannis Halcoussis*, a 15,200 d.w. ton Japanese built "Freedom" Class vessel, arrived in port to load 10900 tons in bags for Tema, Ghana whilst tomorrow the *Dijey* (whose name I cannot trace) is due to load 5000 tons for Mozambique. In this context I cannot understand having read in a very recent shipping journal that a vessel has been fixed to lift 19000 tons Maize from Bangkok to Dar es Salaam with a loading period in the first 10 days of December.

Whether or not the maize is destined for Tanzania or Zambia is really immaterial but in view of Kenya's present surplus it seems strange and inexplicable to the uninitiated in international trade for a full cargo of maize to come from the other side of the world when this country has so much surplus.

At least keep the trade when possible within the African Continent. Could an expert please explain?

A third vessel found herself under arrest in the port last week. This time it is the turn of the Panamanian flag 12,000 ton 17 year old *Balder Chuanchow* which completed discharge of a full cargo of bagged sugar for Uganda at No. 4 berth.

She moved to the buoys on Tuesday and is now sandwiched at M.3 in between the *Copper Trader* at M.2 and the *Franky* at M.4 - therefore three vessels under arrest in line astern.

The first U.S. Navy unit to visit Kilindini for some months arrived on Tuesday for a short stay and berthed at Mbaraki. She is the *USS Fife*, a new Spruance Class destroyer visiting Mombasa for the first time.

The well known Greek shipping line Hellenic Lines, which, although privately owned, is virtually the Greek National Line with a fleet of 30 ships is having serious cash flow problems and having to sell five of its fleet.

Mortgage repayments are apparently in arrears and several vessels are reportedly arrested. Hellenic vessels are frequently seen in Mombasa and have a regular liner service to and from the United States.

Activity in Kilindini has increased considerably this week with the deepwater berths

kept fairly well occupied most of the time. With sugar, fertilizer and salt coming in, and maize, soda ash, wheat bran being exported some berths are occupied by the same vessel for 10 days or more.

Lykes Lines, whose vessels are frequently to be seen in Mombasa, are in negotiations with the U.S. Government to buy four West German flag container ships built in 1969 presently owned by Hapag Lloyd one of the three largest and leading West German Shippers who are presently riding out a financial storm.

### PACIFIC TRADE

The ships in question have a capacity of 1096 TEUs (slightly smaller than the BEACON vessels) and are the *Elbe Express Wser Express, Alster Express* and *Mosel Express*, all vessels operating in their Owners' Pacific trade.

Lykes have had a master plan for some time now to replace their ageing conventional fleet with container vessels.

As from 1st January the Suez Canal Authority are increasing their tolls by an average of

5.8 per cent. This is yet another burden to add to a ship's operating costs at a time when trading conditions continue at a depressed level. Shipowners' organisations are pressing for a freeze of at least two years.

The *Vatsy 2* was refloated off Madagascar on November 25th after being aground for several months. The local Mombasa based COMARCO Organisation have been responsible for the salvage operations during which the tragic loss occurred of their tug *Bateleur*.

## Doing Business At The World Travel Market

TRAVEL leaders from around the world gathered in London for the 1983 World Travel Market, held at Olympia, London, from Wednesday, November 30 to Sunday, December 4, 1983.

This year's World Travel Market was opened by the Right Honourable Norman Tebbit, M.P., Secretary of State for Trade and Industry.

The first three days of the event were for "trade" and "press" only.

These were the days when the world's travel trade exchanged ideas with colleagues from other parts of the world, established new contacts, launched new products, and negotiated and contracted new business. But on Saturday and Sunday, December 3 and 4, once the serious business had been completed, Olympia became the venue for the World Holiday Show - a lively, colourful exhibition where the whole family could "tour the world in a day" and enjoy all the excitement of being introduced to different countries, talking to some of the people who live there, and seeing a little of their cultures and the way they live.

Throughout the whole five days of the event, Olympia's Halls and Galleries were filled with exhibitors - large and small - from some 100 countries in all six continents.

National and regional tourist boards were out in force, as were the world's leading airlines, hotel chains, shipping and cruise lines, tour operators, car hire firms, coaching operators and tourist attractions.

On Saturday and Sunday, the two days that the 'World Holiday Show' was open to the public, there were simple, free-to-enter competitions galore with a different holiday to be won on the hour, every hour.

Prizes ranged from a weekend break in Wales, to a week's holiday for two in Florida and a two week Greek island holiday for two.

### TRAVEL PRIZES

Prizes were given by many major travel and holiday companies, including Pan Am, Olympic Holidays, the English Tourist Board and the Welsh Tourist Board.

One of the most exciting features of the World Holiday Show was the presentation of traditional dance, song and national music which took place on the Central Stages in both the Grand and National Halls of Olympia every half hour.

Artists included the 'NatWest Jazz Band', the 'British Caledonian Pipers', a group of

singing gondoliers from Italy, a West Indian Steel Band, folk dancers from North Cyprus, a group from India who demonstrate the Garba and Bhangra dances and a team from Korea demonstrating the martial art of Taekwondo.

And the cabaret was not confined to the Central Stages. Visitors to the Moroccan stand were entertained by a belly dancer and a small orchestra, the 'Lone Star Cowboy Band' played on the State of Texas stand and the Hawaiians performed on the Welsh Tourist Board's castle.

Among the attending celebrities were "Miss Cayman Islands", Antigua's "Carnival Queen" and "Calypso King", Miss Texas, "Miss Jersey - Battle of Flowers", Chief Jose Sierra of the Tigua Indian Tribe at El Paso, and "Miss Blackpool-Queen of the Lights" and her friends who were dressed in Victorian costumes.

All this and more happened at the 1983 'World Holiday Show', but equally important, visitors were able to discuss their holiday plans with experts from all round the world.

Smaller kidneys are here, very delicious, and meat on the bone is a fast-seller. The phone No. is 23535, and don't forget there is an adjoining fish-shop.

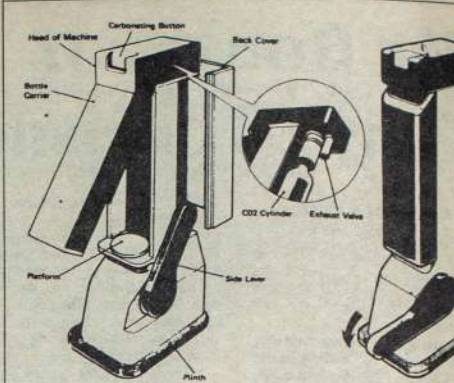

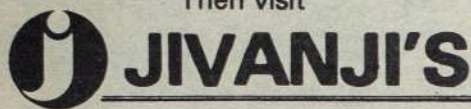

# Fort Supermarket Christmas Recipe

HOUSEWIVES in Mombasa have been overheard to say that they can't make a proper Christmas Cake because of lack of ingredients! Well, they are obviously not regular customers of Fort Supermarket. Let's take a simple recipe and then analyse the purchase of its contents:

## Christmas Cake:

- 250 g. (1/2 lb.) flour,
- 250 g. (1/2 lb.) butter,
- 250 g. (1/2 lb.) brown sugar,
- 250 g. (1/2 lb.) raisins, (stoned and cut up),
- 250 g. (1/2 lb.) sultanas and currants,
- 1/2 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda,
- a pinch of salt,
- 125 g. (4 oz.) mixed peel,
- 125 g. (4 oz.) almonds (blanched and chopped),
- 6 eggs,
- 1 tablespoon brandy,
- 1 teaspoon caramel,
- A little fresh milk, and
- A dash of mixed spices

The Fort certainly has ample flour and butter, and near the flour is packeted brown sugar. There is a whole tray of mixed fruit, i.e. raisins, sultanas and currants, as well as mixed peel, and in addition they have Glace Cherries which can be added to the above recipe.

Take your choice of bicarb. for they stock Pearce & Duff as well as T.I. which is imported and packeted in Nairobi, T.I. meaning Tinus Industries.

Salt is obviously there, as are eggs and milk, and there are ample almonds too. Some like to substitute a few of the expensive almonds for cashew-nuts. Go ahead, the Fort has those.

Mixed Spice is available too, and is on the shelf with the nutmeg, cinnamon and ginger.

Don't leave out the brandy - Leroux is quite reasonable, and

if you feel you don't want to buy a whole quantity of caramel, then don't forget last week's mention of Gravy Browning for darkening insipid cakes!

You have yet to complete the cake. At Fort there is ready-made marzipan, and you can get icing sugar and decorate with whatever you wish. At the cash counter are 100's and 1000's, Chocolate Vermicelli, Tiny gold or multicoloured balls. Angelica is available too for a very pretty finish.

## BAKING POWDER

Other households prefer lighter cakes, cheaper cakes, those of a wider variety. That being the case, they might like to use Zesta's Baking Powder (Zesta do a double action too), or that by Alsa or Royal. Very cheap were large packets of the Fort's own Baking powder, just suitable for the Children's Christmas party.

Then come the colourants and flavourings: Coconut: use dessicated because the "real" stuff done on the mbuzi is much too moist. Essences by Rayners, Cremex, Zesta, Marigold and Red Club. Cremex do a giant sized bottle of Vanilla.

There are yeasts for buns, "mahame" and doughnuts, and there are all kinds of sugars for the lighter cakes like sponges, i.e. Caster, regular white and double refined.

A good money saver is crepe paper which can be used for cake frills, wrapping presents, home-made crackers, home-made decorations or fancy dress 'material'.

As you wind your way amongst the counters at Fort you will be struck by the Christmas atmosphere.

There are all the usual glittering decorations, wrapping paper and so on, but it is felt you had better get that cake in the oven first!

DURING COASTWEEK's tour of the Market area one could not help but be attracted to Abulqaid Limited.

Abulqaid is the furniture shop in the building completed recently behind the meat-section of "Makiti" as the Mackinnon Market is known.

And we walked straight into their "christmas offer" Abulqaid has spread onto the pavement with its very good assortment of clay pots and wrought iron stands. Inside is one of the most beautiful bridal suites ever to be seen.

In white formica with gold knobs, handles and trimmings this is a four piece: the bed, dressing table with triple mirror and dressing table stool; very large double wardrobe with yet another mirror inset between the two sections.

It bears the label SOLD, because the bride herself who ordered it is soon to collect it!

But others are in the making and Abulqaid is becoming popular for these suites. Comparatively they are very reasonable indeed.

Luxurious is a five-piece sofa set - has four chairs - and is of camphor wood upholstered in maroon velvet set with deep button pattern on the chair-backs.

Alongside is real Lamu furniture, unique but not antique, actually made and carved in Lamu.

Comfortable indeed is the lounging chair - the local equivalent of a chaise longue, a patio twin-seat, a "safari chair" - quite a misnomer since this is a wooden folding, admittedly portable, carved chair.

There were several side tables. Since it would be disastrous to soil these they could always be covered by glass if wished.

Picture framing is a prominent line of Abulqaid and they have imported mouldings, but local ones are also nice, some in Meru Oak. One seen had a gilt frame surrounding a life-sized portrait.

There were rather "futuristic" mirrors and these sell very quickly to small houses as they give the impression that a room is twice the size, if placed correctly.

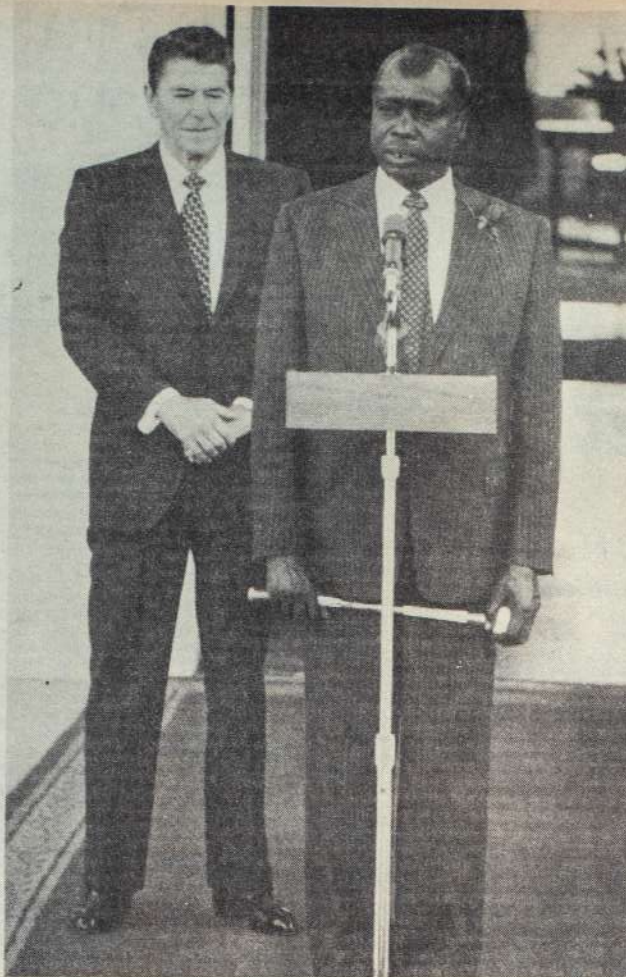

# The Great Moment In History ...'

MIDNIGHT on December 12, 1963, the Union Jack was lowered and Kenya's new flag unfurled before a crowd at Uhuru Stadium. It was the greatest moment in Kenya's history. Twenty years today, many Kenyans remember the night: Mzee Jomo Kenyatta and the then Governor Malcolm MacDonald walking in unison to the Duke of Edinburgh represented Queen at what Kenyatta described "The greatest day in Kenya's history the happiest day of my life." Kenya became a Republic within the Commonwealth in December 1964 with Kenyatta as President. Malcolm MacDonald, the former Governor, returned to Kenya as Britain's first High Commissioner. climaxed by President Moi's assumption of the Chairmanship of the Organisation for African Unity in June 1981 during the OAU summit meeting held in Nairobi.

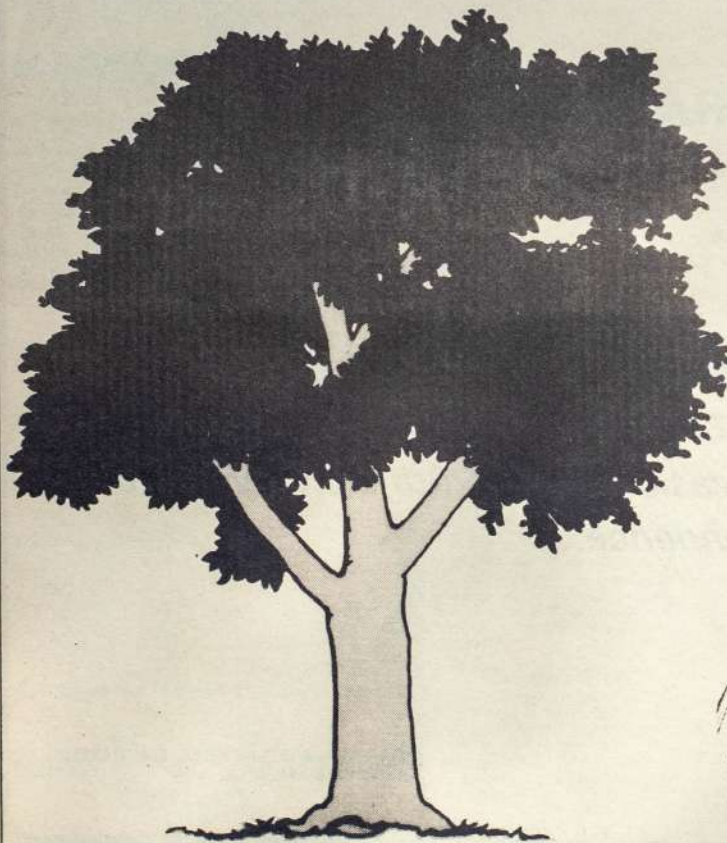

ON THE auspicious occasion like the 20th Independence Anniversary it is only pertinent for one to review the development landmarks which this Province has posted since the attainment of Uhuru.

In doing so I would like to pay special tribute to the Government of Kenya for its role as the prime mover behind most of the development work in this Province.

Needless to say we look back with honest pride to the achievements so far realised as a result of the co-operative endeavour of both the Government and the wananchi.

As you are aware the Colonial Administration had relegated the Coastal Region to a state of near inertia development-wise.

In trying to correct this imbalance the Government has embarked on a programme of economic modernisation since Independence through the provision of appropriate infrastructures to facilitate development activity.

Indeed since then a lot of water has passed under the bridge in terms of progress that we now have more than enough to cheer about, thanks to the dynamic leadership and positive policies of our good Government.

In a bid to promote the standards of living of the people the Government has resorted to implementation of various projects all aimed at the alleviation of poverty, the equitable distribution of income and the provision of better social amenities in the fields of education, health, agriculture, water supplies, etc.

In the realm of health Government investments in this Province include Shs. 65,730,142 in District Hospitals expansions, Shs. 50,612,503 in the building of Mkwowe District Hospital which is under construction, Shs. 5,920,362 in the construction of the new school

of Community Nursing in Mombasa and Shs. 85,671,755 in Coast General Hospital extensions.

There have also been dramatic developments in the area of education. For example, the number of Primary Schools in Coast has multiplied since Independence from 259 with a total enrolment of 26,428 pupils in 1963 to 750 with an enrolment of 263,473 pupils in 1983.

As with Adult Literacy Programme we have so far

of cattle as opposed to 12 in 1973 with only 49,000 head of cattle. Besides, 27 cattle dips have been constructed as compared to 13 in 1972 while the number of clinical centres for the control of livestock diseases has increased from zero in 1973 to six in 1983. Dairy animals have increased from 9,000 head of cattle in 1973 to 20,707 in 1983, thanks to the efforts of the A.I. Service.

To complement the Government's effort in improving the standards of living the Wananchi have raised millions of shillings towards the building of schools, health centres, etc. through the spirit of Harambee.

The total Harambee contributions in labour, cash and material in the Province in 1982 was Shs. 17,451,936, this figure being 60 per cent higher than the figure for the previous year and the highest recorded since independence and thereby confirming that the spirit of Harambee in Coast Province is growing from strength to strength.

In the area of transport and communications the construction of Moi International Airport with a capacity to handle 1,100 passengers in an hour, the construction of the Nyalii and Mtwapa bridges at a cost of about Shs. 160 million and Shs. 35 million respectively, the commissioning of the Kilifi Ferries in 1979 are all projects worth noting.

Also worthy of note is the multi-million Kilindini Port expansion and modernisation programmes. The Kenya Ports Authority and Cargo Handling Services together employ over

the first of our ultimate target of 5,000, are already settled.

Further development of 10 minor irrigation schemes are either in progress or in planning phase in the lower Tana, Sabaki in Kilifi, Vanga in Kwale and Taita. These cover a total of 2,500 hectares supporting an estimated 4,000 families.

The Proposed Coast Institute of Agriculture is in an advanced stage. Construction is expected to start in the near future at an estimated cost of Shs. 107 million. As regards the national food policy, practical actions are being made to implement the policy.

## FOOD RESEARCH

Already the Ministry of Agriculture is undertaking intensive measures in integrating research and extension to promote diversification of food production at farm level by expanding or reviving some abandoned traditional food crops such as sorghum, millet, groundnuts, sweet potatoes, rice and pulse and reducing post-harvest losses through improved storage.

Research is being intensified to determine better cultural methods for growing these crops as well as developing new improved and better yielding varieties of maize, cassava, cowpeas and sorghum.

These measures are designed to broaden the overall food base and help promote the diversification of the feeding habits of the Coast people.

From the above developments it is clear that the Government is determined to improve the conditions of living of the people of Coast Province and in acknowledgement of this gesture the wananchi, fired by the Nyayo Philosophy of Love, Peace and Unity, are more than enthusiastic to co-operate with and complement the Government development effort in the true spirit of Harambee.

10,000 workers.

Tourism is the second most important source of foreign exchange after agriculture and the Coast beach tourism commands the lion's share of the total tourist receipts in the country.

In recognition of this factor the Government has encouraged tourist investments and stepped up tourist attractions at the Coast. Many hotels have been put up and consequently the number of hotel beds in the Province has shot up from 930 in 1965 to over 10,000 in 1982.

## SABAKI SCHEME

A total sum of Shs. 640 million would have been spent after the completion of phase two of the Sabaki Water Project which is being developed to improve water supplies in Mombasa, Kilifi and phase two in

Malindi.

Great strides are too being made towards modernising the agricultural sector which is the backbone of the country's economy. In Coast Province the main cash crops are cashewnuts, cotton, sisal, coconut palms and sugar cane.

To enable farmers market their products we have processing factories established at Kilifi for cashewnuts, Ramisi for sugar-cane, Kilifi for copra and Hola, Lamu and Malindi for cotton. Feasibility studies in respect of the processing of pinapple have been completed.

To exploit irrigation potential in Coast the Government is undertaking irrigation schemes in Tana River and Athi River Basins. The Bura irrigation scheme is already in operation and to-date over 900 families,

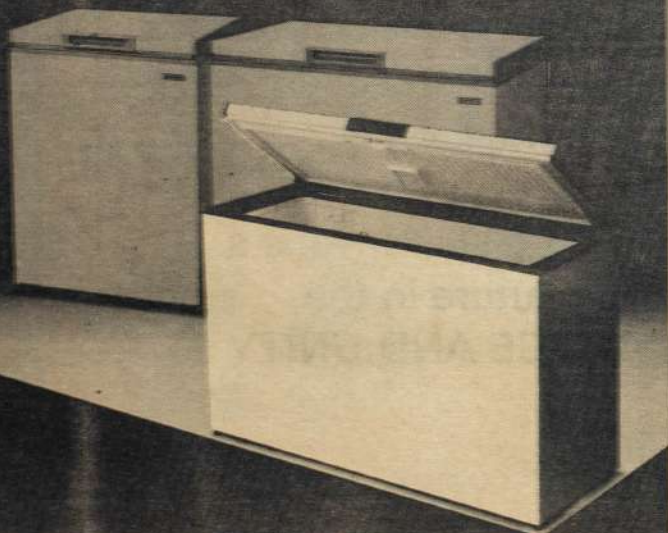

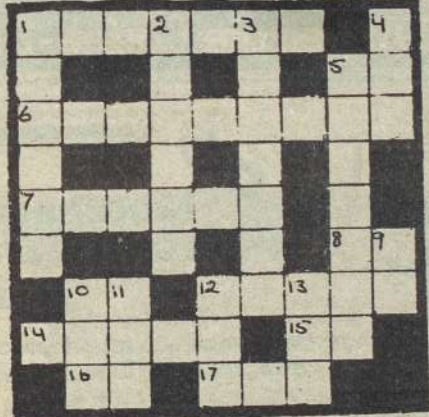

# Kenia feiert 20 Jahre Unabhängigkeit

VOR 20 Jahren erhielt Kenia, nach fast 70 Jahren unter britischer Kolonialregierung, am 12. Dezember 1963 seine Unabhängigkeit. Als Prinz Philip als Abgeordneter von Königin Elizabeth II. von England im Uhurupark in Nairobi die neue Verfassungsurkunde aushändigte, wurde Kenia zur selbständigen Republik erklärt und war somit der 34. unabhängige Staat auf dem afrikanischen Kontinent.

Erster Staatspräsident dieser neuen Republik wurde Mzee Jomo Kenyatta, der auch maßgeblich an den vorangegangenen Freiheitskämpfen beteiligt war, aus welchem Grunde er mehrere Jahre in ein Internierungslager verbannt wurde.

Am 20. Oktober 1963 wurde er freigelassen und am 12. Dezember offiziell in Amt und Würde als Staatsoberhaupt eingesetzt. Seither ist der 20. Oktober ein nationaler Feiertag zu Ehren von Kenyatta, der als Gründer und Vater der Nation gefeiert wird.

In den 15 Jahren seiner Regierungszeit gelang es ihm, dem Land eine international anerkannte wirtschaftliche und politische Stabilität zu verleihen. Auch der Tourismus nahm einen sprunghaften Aufschwung und ist heute nach dem Export landwirtschaftlicher Produkte die bedeutendste Deviseneinnahmequelle Kenias.

## EINIGKEIT

Nach dem Tode Kenyattas im Jahre 1978 wurde der damalige Vizepräsident Daniel arap Moi sein Nachfolger und regiert seither sein Land als Ministerpräsident erfolgreich unter dem Motto: Friede, Liebe und Einigkeit.

Nur einmal, am verhängnisvollen 1. August 1982, versuchten einige subversive Elemente, die Regierung zu stürzen und die Macht zu ergreifen. Es gelang den staatsstreuen Truppen, den Putschversuch zu vereiteln und innert kürzester Zeit Ruhe und Ordnung wieder herzustellen. Auch dieses Ereignis, welches wie ein Blitz aus heiterem Himmel die ganze Nation für einen Moment erschütterte, konnte das Staatsgefüge nicht ins Wanken bringen und die Regierung von ihrem festen Kurs abbringen.

Zum Glück wurde nicht allzuviel Schaden angerichtet, so daß das Vertrauen von Investoren und Touristen in die Stabilität des Landes bald wieder zurückkehrte.

Kenia hat sich in den 20 Jahren seiner Unabhängigkeit in jeder Beziehung verändert und entwickelt und zählt zu den führenden modernen Staaten Afrikas. Trotz seiner raschen Entfaltung nach westlichem Vorbild ist es Kenia gelungen, seine lange und faszinierende ethnische und kulturelle Geschichte und Tradition aufrecht zu erhalten. Viele Sitten und Gebräuche der über 70 Stämme Kenias, aus denen sich die Bevölkerung von etwa 17 Millionen zusammensetzt, haben den Wandel der Zeit unbeschadet überstanden.

In allen Regionen, auch in den ländlichen Gebieten, wurden Schulen und Ausbildungsstätten errichtet. Nachdem die Regierung 1974 in den ersten 4 Jahren der Primarschule freie Ausbildung gewährte, sind die Anmeldungen sprunghaft um 50 Prozent gestiegen. Seit 1980 sind die gesamten 7 Jahre Primarschule frei.

## KAFFEE UND TEE

In Selbsthilfe (Harambee) Projekten entstehen überall auch Sekundarschulen und technische Institute. Auf der Universität in Nairobi wird die zukünftige Elite des Landes ausgebildet.

Kenia ist, wie die meisten Entwicklungsländer, ein Agrarland. Seine landwirtschaftlichen Erzeugnisse, allen voran Kaffee

und Tee, sind auf dem Weltmarkt gesucht. Auch Südfrüchte, Gemüse und Blumen sind begehrte Exportartikel.

Auf dem Industriesektor hat ebenfalls eine großartige Entwicklung stattgefunden. Eine ganze Reihe der verschiedensten Produkte werden in großen und kleineren Fabrikbetrieben hergestellt, die dringend benötigte Arbeitsplätze schaffen und dem Land kostspielige Devisenausgaben ersparen.

Eine ständig verbesserte und ausgebauten Infrastruktur erschließt immer weitere Landes-

lungreiche Landschaft, die vom tropischen, heiß-feuchten Küstenstreifen - der von den Monsunwinden stets auf angenehme Temperaturen abgekühlt wird - über unwirtliche, aber in ihrer Art faszinierende Wüsten und Halbwüsten reichen, bis zum regenreichen Hochland, wo Ackerbau und Viehzucht besonders gedeihen.

Nur selten findet man in einem Land eine solche Harmonie von Klima, Landschaft, Flora und Fauna und dazu noch das lebenswürdige Wesen und die Gastfreundschaft seiner Einwohner.

teile und ermöglicht auch den Transport in die abgelegensten Gebiete.

1965 nahm der Tourismus in Kenia einen sagenhaften Aufschwung. Die ersten Chartermaschinen brachten mit Gruppenreisen die Touristen nach Mombasa, die in den wenigen Hotels in Malindi, Watamu und Mombasa wohnten. Von jeher waren die Nationalparks und Reservate ein besonderer Anziehungspunkt. Es gibt wohl kaum ein anderes Land auf der ganzen Welt, welches das ganze Jahr hindurch Badeferien an unberührten und einsamen Sandstränden offerieren kann, kombiniert mit Safaris durch die Wildparks, auf denen man sovielen Tiere auf freier Wildbahn beobachten kann.

Dazu kommt die abwech-

selnde Bedeutung. Inzwischen sind die Hotels an der ganzen Küste entlang wie die Pilze aus der Erde gesprossen, die sich an Luxus und vorzüglichen Dienstleistungen überbieten. Es ist ein stritten ein unvergessliches Erlebnis, die Serengeti und den Ngongoro Krater zu besuchen oder den über 6000 m hohen Kilimandscharo zu besteigen.

Ganz allgegenwärtig darf Kenia mit Zuversicht der Zukunft entgegensehen und hat den Touristen immer noch einmalige Attraktionen zu bieten.

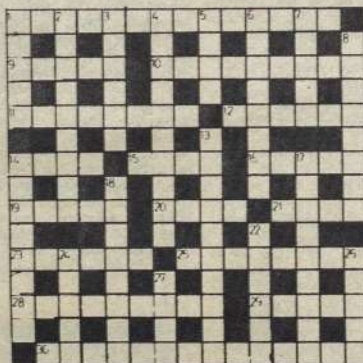

Mombasa Motor Club has a problem with motor cycle events. Last Sunday a motor cycle rally was staged mainly to fill the slot that should have been a Championship Motocross.

Events of that ilk were abandoned a year ago when a large number of upcountry riders came to the Coast and not one Mombasa rider entered the event.

On Sunday morning 26 minutes before the start there were only three people on the entry list so cancellation seemed the obvious answer.

By delaying the start the field went up to four machines and as all the work and most of expensive for any event is committed before the start it was decided to let it happen.

When it was all over all four pleaded for more piki events in the future but how can MMC attract more bike owners?

Posters newsletters word of mouth even write-ups in Coastweek right beside the Speedpost Delivery advert with its macho despatch rider; none of these seem to work.

Perhaps a form of chain letter where each entrant has to bring two new riders to the next event or he (plus machine) is struck by lightning?

Perhaps we could persuade motor cyclists to come up to Kilifi on Sunday January 8 to take part in the Motor Gymkhana organised by Ken Oulton. Never let it be said that MMC ignores minority groups.

Sunday's event covered 42 kilometres with the start and finish at Bahari Club divided into 6 sections which meant that officials must have outnumbered entrants by at least 3-1.

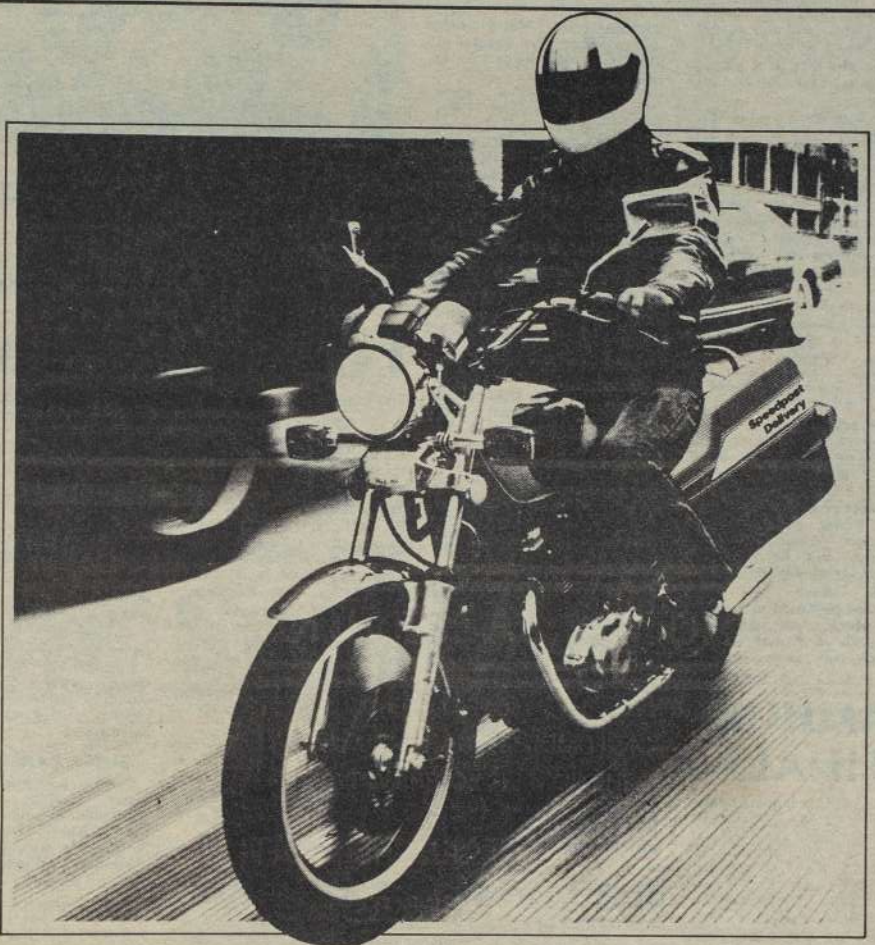

## SWISS NATIONAL SOCCER X1 ARRIVE FOR COAST GAMES

IT WAS the first time in the history of Switzerland for a Swiss National Soccer team to come to Africa and play against African teams, writes Neta Peal.

Previously, they have played in South America and all over Europe.

Little did they realise the surprise that was in store for them, for they had not expected to meet such good and well trained teams.

The feeling of the national team on leaving Switzerland was that the match in Algiers would be the most difficult. Having won that, the rest would be 'easy', and problem free!

Much to their dismay they lost both games in the Ivory Coast and Zimbabwe, and the match against Kenya's Harambee Stars at the Mombasa Stadium on Tuesday ended in a draw 0-0.

Commented the Swiss national coach Mr. Wolfisberg 'football in Africa has made tremendous progress, and I have been most impressed.'

Captain of the Swiss team is Roger Berbig, who is also a Doctor of Medicine. It is the 40th time that he has been selected for the national team.

Their Africa tour was organized by Kuoni of Switzerland (which sends many holidaymakers to Kenya) in conjunction with Swiss Air, and

was partly sponsored by several Swiss companies.

Accompanying them throughout was Mario Santi, vice president, and director of KUONI headquarters in Switzerland.

A special Swiss Air flight carried them on their Africa Tour, which left Switzerland on November 30. The DC10 was full to capacity with 242 passengers and crew. They included twenty players, twenty officials, twenty journalists and fifteen crew, the rest being 'fans' of this Swiss national soccer team.

A video film was being made of the complete tour for showing on Swiss television.

The Swiss Air flight from Harare, Zimbabwe, landed at Moi International Airport late on Monday night where the zesty Mabumbubu Kayamba Giriama dancers from Porini Village, Kikambala, gave them a traditional welcome to the Kenya coast.

A fleet of sixteen UTC vehicles, including 3 air-conditioned coaches, were at the airport to meet and quickly whisk everyone away to Nyali Beach Hotel where all were staying.

It is UTC which is looking after their ground arrangements, which has included taking players and 'fans' on game park and dhow safaris. Some also took the opportunity of going deep sea fishing.

They leave Mombasa today (Friday) for the Swiss Air flight home at the end of a most memorable Africa Tour which has been full of surprises.

It is understood that the main purpose of the tour was to prepare the team for the World Championships taking place in Mexico in 1986.
