## Film Corporation Chairman Opens New 'Lotus' Cinema

THE LOTUS CINEMA (formerly 'Naar') in Mombasa's Makadara Road opens to the public today (Fri. Dec. 30) with one of the latest films *Best Friends* starring Burt Reynolds and Goldie Hawn, which will be followed by many other good movies.

The cinema, with new seats, stereo and air-conditioning system was officially re-opened by the chairman of the Kenya Film Corporation, Mr J K Mutua, the previous day, with the Mombasa premiere of *Best Friends*.

All proceeds were donated to the Salvation Army School for the Blind, Likoni, this being in keeping with the cinema's declared policy of giving a helping hand in the community.

The *Lotus* spearheads a new concept for cinemas in Kenya, for it will also be used as a

theatre and for day-time seminars being so conveniently situated in the centre of Mombasa Island.

There are also plans to stage Kenya's first film festival there

during 1984, and to attract many international participants.

The cinema will also become the focal point in the town for raising funds for charitable institutions by staging film premiers, concerts and plays, as well as talent and quiz competitions.

### FILM PROJECTS

The *Lotus* is now under the management of Mr Kamwaral Sabharwal, a well known social worker and Coast businessman.

The cinema also contains a recording studio (the first on the Kenya coast) with the latest equipment for the making of video films and for tape recording of the music of local bands and ngoma groups.

There is tremendous talent in Kenya, which remains virtually untapped as insufficient outlets exist for its development.

The aim is not only to produce video films for consumption on the local market, but for export as well which, in turn, will help boost Kenya's foreign exchange earnings.

The films will not only be for entertainment, but for educational purposes as well.

Mr Sabharwal has had considerable experience in movie-making, which has included news films for the BBC, CBS and IPS. He has also made films and taken hundreds of pictures of Kenya's wildlife.

The re-opening of the cinema, and the establishment of this new film industry, is also a very fitting and positive way of marking Kenya's 20th anniversary of independence.

# £30 Million Boost For Kenya Tourism

## U.K. INVESTORS TO BUILD FIVE NEW SAFARI LODGES

SIR LEON Tamman, Chief Executive and Owner of the I.G. group of companies in the U.K., covering construction, hotels and tourism, pharmaceuticals, soap manufacture, television stations and high technology, revealed that his group is proposing to finance a package investment, initially, of some £30 million in Kenya's tourist industry.

I. G. also owns Sonotels International which have a shareholding in Diani Reef Hotel which, very soon, he revealed, was going to be increased to 51 per cent.

This was disclosed by Sir Leon, when addressing guests at a Cocktail Party to celebrate the second Anniversary of

Diani Reef, writes NETA PEAL.

He said that the proposed investment of £30 million in Kenya's tourist industry would cover the establishment of five safari lodges all over the country, each with 86 rooms.

Also a holiday village at Diani complete with entertainment complex including a cinema.

Sir Leon said he was very happy to see that Diani Reef Hotel was so popular. He had visited it for the first time six weeks ago, and already was back again.

He said "this in itself demonstrates how much I like it."

He said he had always been interested in Kenya's tourist industry, and had been exploring ways in which his group could help Kenya's Minister of Tourism achieve his target of one million more tourists in the next five years.

He said that Diani's ten mile strip of beautiful beach offers great opportunities.

Concluded Sir Leon "my group will be quite happy to try and help the Kenya government in its plans to promote tourism here."

### 'Charter Flights'

Sir Leon, who first met President Moi last October, said he was hoping to see the President again to discuss this project.

In an interview, Sir Leon feels that the Minister of Tourism and Wildlife, Mr Maina Wanjigi, will be able to achieve his target of one million more tourists in the next five years.

One way of doing this, he felt, was for Kenya to adopt

## 'Cyclone Season'

A CHAIN of cyclones in the Indian Ocean heading towards Mauritius will soon have their lesser 'side-effects' felt along the Kenya Coast, according to the local weathermen. Cyclone *Bakoly* which hit the Indian Ocean island of Mauritius on Saturday sent a mild storm to the shores of the Kenyan Coast during Christmas, they said.

The meteorological department reported that Mombasa received 57.7 mm of rainfall during Christmas for the first time in many years. Wundanyi led with 62.9 mm and Kilifi received 14.4 mm of rainfall. There was no rains recorded in Lamu, Kwale and Hola.

The meteorological Department also contimated that the cyclone *Andry* which swept over the small Indian Ocean Islands of Agalega two weeks ago was part the "chain of cyclones" now sweeping the Indian Ocean and were expected to continue into the first month of 1984. Their effects along the Kenyan Coast are expected to be minimal, with scattered showers, minor storms and cloudy skies.

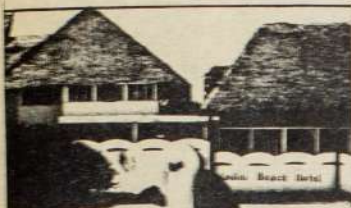

# DATELINE: DAR ES SALAAM

## Zambian Copper Mines Resume Exports Through Dar Es Salaam

THE ZAMBIA consolidated copper mines (ZCCM) this week agreed to increase their use of the Dar es salaam port as an exporting route for their copper. The decision which will see some 80 per cent of anticipated metal exports from Zambia passing through the Dar es salaam port was reached at a one-day meeting of the Zambia-Tanzania transport coordinating committee held at the Bahari Beach Hotel in Dar es salaam.

The decision should be a great relief to the Tanzania-Zambia Railway Authority (TAZARA) who have for a considerable time been pressing the Zambian companies to make more use of the TAZARA railway line rather than the more expensive route through the South African port of East London.

At present the hauling of metals from Zambia to Dar es salaam port by TAZARA has improved tremendously following the acquisition of nine diesel electric locomotive engines from West Germany. The time taken by the trains to load up and ferry cargo to the Dar es salaam port has now been reduced to only eight days unlike the past when it used to take 37 days.

The ZCCM decision this week has apparently been made after taking into consideration the improved performance of TAZARA as well as other organisations in the Tanzanian Export chain such as the Tanzania harbours authority.

Meanwhile in an interview with the monthly magazine Africa Now, president Nyerere reiterated the advantages of a one party governing system which he said had enabled Tanzanians to achieve a degree of unity that would not have been possible under a multi-party system.

He further stressed that the system of having an unrivalled party helped to avoid tribal and religious conflicts and ensured that democracy prevailed, he said through such a system a national policy

could be mapped out and implemented more easily. Nyerere also commented on the disappointing response of some Independent African states towards some important decisions of the organisation of African Unity (OAU). He pointed out that the OAU could only be effective if member countries respected its decisions.

When asked on the most painful decision he had made since taking office over two decades ago, Nyerere said that this was when he had asked the British to come and disarm the Tanzanian Army in 1964. This was in reference to the army mutiny in 1964.

## Railway Probe

He said he had resisted the action for two to three days but eventually he had to make the painful decision to call in the British to disarm the army.

On the local scene, the Tanzania Railways Corporation (TRC) this week appointed a nine-man commission to probe last week's central line accident in which 22 people died and 140 others were injured.

The TRC board also resolved to pay a token Shs. 15,000/- to relatives of each of the dead and between 5000/- and 10,000/- to each of injured depending on the extent of the injury.

The chairman of the TRC who is also the country's deputy Minister for Communications and Transport, Henry Limhagati however stressed that the compensation was only being paid on grounds of the corporation's sympathy and has not a compensation. He said

by giving the money the TRC was not accepting liability over what happened.

According to preliminary reports a 30 kilogramme piece of iron bar which was placed on the rails by unknown people caused the accident in which the entire six coaches of the train were derailed.

At the end of the week, the Zanzibar Chief Minister, Brigadier Ramadhan Haji Faki said that the people's views on the amendment of the constitution of the Union Government and the Zanzibar Revolutionary Government should be taken as the only basis for strengthening the union between Tanganyika and Zanzibar.

According to the Tanzanian news agency Shihata, Faki stressed that any other suggestions which were proposed outside the views of people should not be entertained.

## Stephen's Courage On Film

TANZANIA'S former athlete John Stephen who was the country's leading track star in International Athletics left Dar es Salaam this week for Los Angeles, United States, to take part in the promotion of a special Olympic movie - The Forgotten Athletes.

The movie which will bring together former leading athletes from all over the world will be screened during the Olympic games in Los Angeles next year.

Stephen now 44, touched the feelings of many during the 1968 Mexico games when he finished the Marathon by limping 21 kilometres to finish the race.

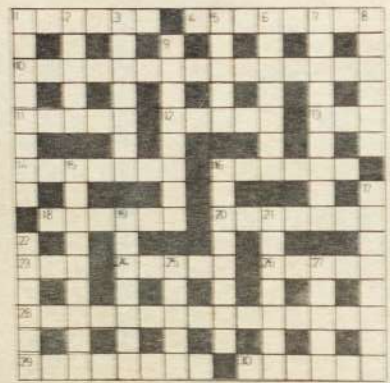
Stephen's participation in the movie which follows an invitation by the George Schlatter productions shows that though he is taking part in a movie for forgotten athletes he is not forgotten after all.

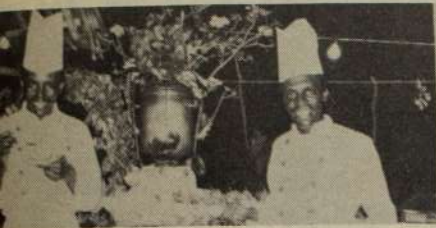

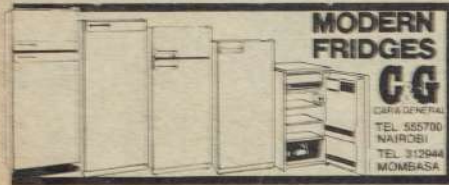

# Mit dem Nachtzug zum Vogelparadies

Es gibt nur noch wenige Erinnerungsstücke an die britische Kolonialzeit in Kenia, aber eine erwähnenswerte Ausnahme ist der Nachtzug von Nairobi nach Mombasa, der sich noch immer Nacht für Nacht seinen Weg nach Süden sucht, durch Kanza, Simba, Kiboko und Tsavo, dampfend und prustend, aber langsam und stetig bis zum Indischen Ozean.

Der moderne Reisende mag ab und zu ungeduldig werden über das gemächliche Tempo des alten Zuges, er wird sich aber einem gewissen Zauber kaum entziehen können, hervorgerufen durch einen Hauch von Eleganz aus der Kolonialzeit, durch all die Jahre etwas verblaßt, aber immer noch gegenwärtig. Die auf den Abstellgleisen in Nairobi stehenden ausrangierten und vor sich hin rostenden Lokomotiven bezeugen, daß die alten Zeiten endgültig vorbei sind, aber die alten Schlafwagen kämpfen sich verblühen durch die Nacht bis an die Küste.

Ich bestieg den Zug in Nairobi eines abends im November. Mein Ziel war nicht Mombasa, sondern Voi, etwa 350 km von Nairobi entfernt und 150 km vor Mombasa. Um vier Uhr früh in einer warmen Tropennacht stieg ich als einziger Passagier an dieser Station aus und führte meinen Weg auf der Straße fort bis zur Taïta Hills Lodge, meinem endgültigen Reiseziel.

Die Taïta Hills Lodge befindet sich in ihrem eigenen Tierriservat, das sich am Fuße der Taïta Hills über 40 Quadratmeilen erstreckt und direkt an den Tsavopark, einen der größten Tierparks der Welt, grenzt.

Meine Erwartungen wurden noch gesteigert durch einen gelegentlichen Blick auf die eine oder andere Nachtschwalbe, die kurz vom Scheinwerferlicht erfaßt wurde, sowie durch hell reflektierende Punkte: die Augen jüngerer Genetkatzen.

Die afrikanische Morgendämmerung im Busch ist ein einmaliges Erlebnis. Im Osten wird der Himmel von den ersten Strahlen der aufgehenden Sonne erleuchtet, und nach wenigen Minuten beginnt der Busch zu leben; die Luft vibriert durch den Ruf der Tauben, das Gezitscher der Weibervogel und das Zirpen der Insekten. Es ist, als hätte jemand nach 12 Stunden verordneter Nachtruhe das Sturzzeichen gegeben, so daß der Busch auf einen Schlag zu neuem Leben erwacht.

Eine ungläubliche Vielfalt von Vögeln erwartet mich an meinem ersten Morgen in Taïta und ich brauchte einige Zeit, um sie zu identifizieren. Am leichtesten waren die maskierten Weibervogel zu erkennen, die Männchen in leuchtendem Gelb mit tief-schwarzer Maske; die Weibchen und Jungen etwas blasser und eher spatzähnlich. Zuerst sahen die Weibervogel aus wie Goldamseln, doch nach einer Weile sah ich eine richtige Goldamsel, einen tiefgelben

Vogel mit kontrastierendem schwarzem Kopf, der die Aufmerksamkeit durch sein brillant vorgetragenes Lied auf sich zog. Wer die Gewohnheiten der scheuen europäischen Goldamsel kennt, wird ihre afrikanischen Verwandten

besonders schätzen, die sich viel ungezwungener und kühner bewegen.

Auf dem Rasen rund um die Lodge hüpfte eine ganze Anzahl Glanzstare in ihrem strahlenden Federkleid. Sie waren wirklich die Stare und wurden ihrem Namen voll gerecht, mit metallisch blau leuchtendem Rücken

und rotgoldener Brust mit weißem Streifen. Dazwischen tummelten sich auch Hildebrandt Stare, die den Glanzstaren ähnlich sehen, aber mehr in Violett-Blau und ohne weißes Brustband. Später entdeckte ich goldbrüstige Stare, die schönsten von allen, in phantastischen Kontrastfarben, oben von Blau, Grün bis Violett schillernd, unten Goldgelb, mit langem grünem Schwanz.

## MAUERSEGLER

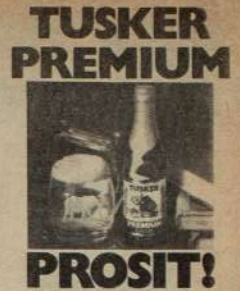
Unter den einheimischen Schwalben und Mauerseglern befanden sich zu meinem Entzücken einige ihrer verwandten Zugvögel aus Europa. Kreschende Schwärme europäischer Mauersegler steuerten im Sturzflug auf die Lodge zu, umflatterten die Gebäude und lärmten mit einer Hingabe, so wie wir es aus Europa kennen, wenn sie zu ihren Nistplätzen auf Kirchtür-

men und in den Dorfstraßen zurückkehren.

Bis um die Mittagszeit am ersten Tag hatte ich bereits über 60 verschiedene Vogelarten in der Umgebung der Lodge gesehen.

Die meisten Besucher der Lodge kommen jedoch nicht, um die Vögel zu beobachten, sondern wegen der wilden Tiere. Im privaten Reservat trifft man dasselbe Wild wie im Tsavopark: Löwen und Geparden, Elefanten, Büffel, Giraffen, Antilopen, Impalas und Grants Gazellen, Wasserböcke, Kongonis, Elenantilopen und die eleganten Beisa Oryx (Spießböcke). Zebras sind zahlreich vorhanden wie auch Warzenschweine, die immer eine lustige Vorstellung geben, wenn sie mit ihrem Schwänzchen in der Höhe davonlaufen.

Auf Pirschfahrten durch das Reservat traf ich die interessan-



bachtete ich Nachtigallen. Sie waren am nächsten Morgen verschwunden, dafür traf ich mehrere Drosseln an ihrer Stelle.

Wasser ist in einer trockenen Landschaft immer ein Anziehungspunkt. Der sich durch das Reservat schlängelnde Burafuß wurde nahe bei der Taïta Hills Lodge gestaut und bildet einen attraktiven kleinen Stausee. Dort ist das Reich des Fischadlers, dessen durchdringender Schrei als Urlass des afrikanischen Busches gilt. Dort wohnen auch Malachit-Kingfischer und viele andere Wasservögel. Kleine Enten mit weißem Rücken schwimmen auf dem See und ziehen immer engere Kreise im stillen Wasser.

Der größte und am nächsten bei Taïta liegende See ist Lake Jipe, der die Grenze zwischen Kenia und Tansania bildet. Dorthin gelangt man durch den Tsavo Nationalpark, über weiter Ebenen, durch die sich als einziges Zeichen der Zivilisation ein endloser Pfad aus roter Erde windet bis zum fernen Horizont. Unterwegs beleben Herden von Zebras, Oryx, Kongonis und Giraffen die Landschaft sowie einige Strauße, Sekretärvögel, Kori und Bussarde. Von den Vögeln beeindruckte mich der goldene Pieper am meisten, der zerlich und wie ein kleiner Goldball vorbefflog.

## WATVOEGEL

Im sumptigen Uferstreifen des Jipesees hausen viele Zugvögel und Watvögel. Ich sah unglaublich viele verschiedene Reiher, denen offenbar der See einen beachtlichen Fischreichtum bietet.

Aus demselben Schilfgürtel ertönten die Grunzlaute von Flußpferden, die als Warnung die Vogelbeobachter zur Vorsicht mahnten, da im afrikanischen Busch auch Gefahren lauern können.

Dem Jipesee hätte ich viel mehr Zeit widmen sollen und ich brach nur vorsatz, bald zurückzukehren. In kürzester Zeit hatte ich auf meiner Fahrt durch den Tsavo und am See über 100 Vogelarten identifizieren können.

In den vier Tagen, mit nur einem längeren Ausflug durch den Tsavo Nationalpark bis zum Lake Jipe zählte ich 170 Vogelarten und ich bin überzeugt, ich wäre in nur wenigen zusätzlichen Tagen auf über 200 gekommen. Obwohl ich auch unzähligen wilden Tieren begegnet bin, hat mich doch die sagenhafte Vielfalt der Vogelwelt weit mehr beeindruckt.

# SCHWEIZER FUBBALL-NATIONALTEAM SPIELT IN MOMBASA

ZUM ersten Mal in der Geschichte des Schweizer Fußballs ist die Nationalmannschaft in Afrika gegen afrikanische Vereine angetreten, schreibt Neta Peal. Die Schweizer haben vorher schon in Südamerika und in den meisten europäischen Ländern gespielt.

Sie erlebten jedoch auf ihrer Afrika-Tournee eine große Überraschung, denn sie waren keinesfalls darauf gefaßt, so gut trainierte Gegner anzutreffen. Sie hatten damit gerechnet, daß der schwierigste Match für sie in Alger stattfinden würde. Nachdem sie dort gewonnen hatten, glaubten sie, die restlichen Spiele problemlos bewältigen zu können.

Zu ihrer Bestürzung verloren sie an der Efenbeinküste und auch

in Zimbabwe, und das Freundschaftsspiel gegen die "Harambee Stars" im Stadion von Mombasa endete unentschieden mit 0 : 0. Der Schweizer Trainer, Herr Wolfisberg, kommentierte: "Fußball in Afrika hat unglaubliche Fortschritte erzielt und ich bin in der Tat schwer davon beeindruckt". Captain der Schweizer Mannschaft war der Arzt Roger Berbig, der bereits zum 40. Mal für die Nationalmannschaft ausgewählt worden ist.

Die Afrika-Tour wurde gemeinsam von KUONI und SWISSAIR organisiert und von verschiedenen Schweizer Firmen finanziell unterstützt. Herr Mario Santi, Vizepräsident und Direktor vom KUONI Hauptsitz in der Schweiz, begleitete

das Fußball-Team auf der ganzen Reise.

Auf einem voll ausgebuchten Extraflug von SWISSAIR begaben sich die 242 Passagiere am 30. November auf Afrikatur. Darunter befanden sich 20 Spieler, 20 offizielle Betreuer und Begleiter, 20 Journalisten, 15 Leute von der Crew; die restlichen Passagiere waren Freunde und Fans der Nationalmannschaft.

Von der ganzen Tour wurde ein Videofilm aufgenommen, der im Schweizer Fernsehen später gezeigt wird.

Der Swissairflug von Hsare, Zimbabwe, wurde auf dem internationalen Flughafen von Mombasa würdig und nach alter Tradition von den Mabumbubu Kayamba Giriama-

tänzern vom Porini Village in Kikambala empfangen.

Eine Flotte von 15 UTC Fahrzeugen, einschließlich 3 klimatisierte Busse, wartete am Flughafen und brachte die Gäste ins Nyal Beach Hotel, wo alle wohnten.

United Touring Company (UTC) war für den Landtransport verantwortlich und arrangierte für die Fußballspieler und Fans eine Safari in die Nationalparks, einen Bootsausflug mit einer Dhau sowie Hochseesegeln.

Von Mombasa aus flog die Gruppe, am Ende ihrer eindrucksvollen Afrikatur angelangt, direkt in die Schweiz zurück. Die Spiele wurden organisiert, die Schweizer Team auf die kommenden Weltmeisterschaften 1986 in Mexiko vorzubereiten.

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# SAFARI RALLY REMAINS ON EASTER WEEKEND

The Marlboro Safari Rally will keep to its traditional Easter weekend. This was confirmed by Mr. Bill Parkinson as soon as he got back from his meeting in Paris with FISA officials.

Some two months ago, Safari Rally Limited was asked to consider a change of date for 1984 as the Kenyan event was too close to the Corsican Rally.

Since then a considerable volume of paperwork, both letters and telex messages, has been generated, and now to the great relief of organizers, the Safari dates have been confirmed as 19-23 April, covering Thursday morning until early afternoon of the long Easter weekend.

Even the most casual of observers of this five-day, five-thousand kilometres event will understand the problems involved in holding the Safari at a date other than Easter.

There are our 100 time controls which need a minimum of 4 people each, plus 50 passage controls.

There are eight rest controls, including Nairobi which handles cars and crews six times, and the Rally Headquarters staff at the Kenyatta International Conference Centre, functioning non-stop throughout the rally.

Now add radio operators, auditors, scrutineers, and route openers; on top of those involved with keeping the Rally moving there are the local entrants and their service crews.

This adds up to a lot of people asking for time off from work.

With luck, common sense will prevail and the Safari will stay with Easter, whether cel-

ebrated in March or April, dry or wet.

COASTDRIVE with JOHN GARDINER

Once again, Coast Province gets to see the Safari cars first, as the first leg will bring the rally to Mombasa and back.

There are several alterations from the 1983 route: the long tarmac haul past Mito Andei has been dropped, with the cars directed through Loitokitok and Taveta to a rest control at Taita Hills Lodge.

The Taita Hills are tackled on mid-Thursday afternoon then the ranches around Kasigau with the leading car into Mombasa as night falls.

Three hours later the rally uses Likoni Ferry to get to the South Coast and Shimba Hills.

A second run through the ranches and the Taitas takes the rally back to Taita Hills Lodge for a second rest this time of four hours, and at dawn on Friday morning they head for Taveta and Loitokitok on their way back to Nairobi.

Mombasa Motor Club are keeping to the 1984 Safari route for their Firestone sponsored Coast 500 Rally over the weekend January 28/29.

Bamburi Beach Hotel will be the headquarters event with the first car leaving the car park at 1700 on Saturday January 28.

A transport section takes the cars through the centre of Mombasa, then across Likoni Ferry to the South Coast, before the competitive sections through the Shimba Hills, the ranches and the Taita Hills.

The leading car is due at Taita Hills Lodge shortly before 2200 hours, where the crews have a 1/2 hour rest period.

At 0130 leg two commences, with the Standard Production car event entrants lagged on behind the first leg survivors.

The first car is due back at Bamburi Beach Hotel soon after first light on Sunday morning.

The chance to preview the Coast sections of the 1984 Safari should ensure an interesting entry for the Firestone Coast 500, and crews will be able to work with a single service car deployed on the main Mombasa-Voi-Taveta roads.

But before the rally, interest is centred on the Gymkhana being staged by MMC's newest branch office, Kilifi.

On Sunday January 8, Ken
