### COAST GENERAL GETS A 'FACE LIFT'

BEARDED doctors are already an endangered species at the Mombasa's Coast General Hospital. And the Provincial Medical Officer, Dr A. E. Fernandes says that the situation has improved at the hospital, writes Gray Phombeah.

Following a routine visit last week by the Minister for Health Mr Magugu which caused heart-burn among doctors and staff into whispering hinders, the hospital staff has been working round the clock to rectify the situation and raise professional standards.

Talking in his office at the fifth floor in the prestigious Uhuru ni Kazi government building, Dr Fernandes said that all the issues which had been raised by the Minister during his visit are being looked into and immediate action taken.

A SHS. 65 million hotel development in Kenya has been proposed by Neckermann — one of the largest tour operators in Europe which is sending about 18,000 tourists here annually.

It is planning to build, subject to approval from the Ministry of Tourism, a 400 bed Club Aldiana Hotel on the former Tropicana Beach site at Vipingo, Kilifi District, situated about 35kms. out of Mombasa.

Neckermann's architect, Mr R. de Bruijn, is presently visiting Kenya to get ideas on coastal architecture to combine with the Neckermann concept of a Club Aldiana Hotel for this country.

'Aldiana' is from the Senegalese word meaning "where the happy people live" and it was in Senegal that Neckermann's first club hotel was built. Others are going up at Fuerte Venture in the Canary Islands, Sri Lanka — as well, it is hoped, in Kenya.

They are run on similar lines to Club Mediterranean and Robinson Club Hotels with animators, also instructors in a variety of activities such as tennis, sailing, windsurfing and horseriding.

Projected plans also include a nine-hole golf course and an aviation club with a 1000 metre landing strip for small aircraft enabling guests to fly direct to their safari destination.

As project manager has already arrived and set up office at U.T.C.'s Coast headquarters in Moi Avenue. He is Mr Jurgen Gydatt, assisted by Margot Bunzel, project secretary.

## WORLD BANK 'UNHAPPY' WITH NEW COUNCIL DEVELOPMENTS

THE MUNICIPAL Council of Mombasa is treading on a tightrope over the Second Urban Project sponsored by the World Bank.

A catalogue of woes has surfaced in the findings of the World Bank supervision mission after holding discussions with the Municipality Council of Mombasa recently.

The World Bank supervision

mission did not take kindly to the significant costs overruns and the Council's proposal for the reduction of project scope, and has requested the Council to seek clarification from the consultants on the nature and origin of the project increases.

The total project was originally estimated to cost K Shs. 143,640,000. But the Council now says that due to the current rate of inflation and the fact that the project was started off one year late, the scope of the project must be cut down to around 40 or 60 per cent.

In another development the World Bank expressed in no uncertain words its reluctance to approve reimbursements to the Council unless an assurance was given by the Council that re-valuation of real property in the Municipality would be completed on or before

December 31. In the event that the three project sites would imply major costs, the Municipal Council has been given the option to seek supplementary financing from the Government of Kenya or postpone one of the sites with the intention of exploring other possibilities, and only reduce the project scope after all other options have been exhausted.

And other problems lie behind this unfortunate state of affairs. The Danish International Development Agency has already told the Kenya Government of cutbacks in its technical assistance programme, and has stated that contracts for the three Danish staff which expire in October this year will not be renewed. It is feared that their departure at the critical tendering period will have far-reaching technical repercussions on the project.

The World Bank supervision mission made no bones about the lacklustre public response due to the fact that the public was not adequately informed about the project and noted with concern that despite repeated assurances from the Council letters of reservations permitting finalization of the structure plan have not been issued by the Commissioner of Lands.

## 'RESERVE'

Some differences in views emerged between the World Bank and the Council over the proposed provision of clustered wetcores in the Chaani Project Area.

The Mayor and the Director of the Housing Development department showed strong reserve about the acceptability of this solution but the differences were partially balanced by an agreement that the Council carry out a survey

to determine user preference in the project areas and report back to the World Bank.

The World Bank has also insisted that the staff in the Housing Development department should be brought up to an adequate level in order to ensure that the projects are carried out as scheduled.

According to reliable sources the Council, in an attempt to save the project, has instituted a number of measures.

A request to the government to second valuers to the Council for the purpose of assisting in the re-valuation exercise has already been made and the Council has been promised the secondment of four government valuers in the current financial year.

Meanwhile the Town Clerk has written to the World Bank assuring them that the re-valuation exercise of Mombasa Municipality will be completed before December 31 in the hope that the Bank would approve reimbursements to the Council.

The Council has further agreed to provide transport and accommodation for the valuers to be provided by the government.

In another bid the Council has extended the deadline on the applications of plot sites and is reviewing applications of those disqualified applicants. It is reported that out of 3,760 application forms sold for the 1,717 plots in Chaani and Mikindani only 1,163 applicants qualified.

In last month's meeting the City fathers also accepted the proposed construction specifications for roads in the Second World Bank projects and resolved to seek qualified staff for the department of Housing Development.

But faced with escalating costs and suspicious foreign donors, this ambitious project still remains the wildest of dreams in the Town-hall's boardroom.

## NEW BRIDGE TOUR

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Coast P.C. Mr Luka Daudi Galgalo has made an extensive tour of the multi-million shilling new Nyali Bridge which is soon to be opened after the completion of the approach roads from both the island and north mainland areas.

Accompanied by his Deputy, Mr John Etemesi and the Provincial Engineer, Mr G. Okumu, the P.C. said that the bridge and the modern approach roads would greatly inspire development in the north mainland.

The Shs. 170 million bridge will have three lanes

on each side but the approach roads will have two lanes each.

The P.C. was also able to see the construction of the toll station currently in progress. He was also shown the provisions made for services like water pipes, telephone and electricity lines.

Currently pipes for the giant Sabaki Water project are being conducted to the provisions underneath the sleek bridge.

It is hoped that if all goes well the bridge would be officially opened any time during the last half of August, this year.

# 'All Leaders to co-operate for progress'

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The Assistant Minister for Commerce Mr Shariff Nassir has urged Kenyans to be completely loyal to President Moi and the Government, and condemned those with dual loyalty to the nation as traitors.

Addressing teachers and pupils at Mvita Primary School yesterday, the Assistant Minister who is also the M.P. for Mombasa Central said it was now upon leaders and wananchi to cooperate and remove such people of dual loyalty and evils which might impair peace and stability of the country.

Mr Nassir hailed the recent leaders conference for its efforts in rededicating leaders to their responsibilities adding that the conference had God's blessings.

He added that among the resolutions reached at the conference would help to enhance love, unity and peace among Kenyans in conformity with President Moi's philosophy of Nyayo.

"The Kabete declaration also deplored leaders who preach jealousy, laziness and tribal sentiments as working against the firm foundation of the Nyayo philosophy" added the Assistant Minister.

Mr Nassir praised the resolutions passed, adding that they will go a long way in enforcing discipline among leaders and enhance unity for rapid developments.

He called upon the schools parents' association to work hard and draw out plans for its expansion in order to meet expansion needs of the school.

## 'Tribalism'

He deplored tribalism adding that he has always worked for total unity and love among all tribes in Mombasa.

"I don't hate any tribe but condemn those with divisive motives towards the unity of the nation" added the Assistant Minister.

Earlier the Assistant Minister was presented with copies of Koran verses by the headmaster of the school Mr A. Mwangiri as a mark of condolences on the death of his father which occurred two months ago.

Prayers were also said by Rev. J. M. Kamau Maalim Abdulrahman Ali Arua.

# SUGAR UNIT FOR KWALE

KWALE (K.N.A.) — A high powered delegation touring Kwale District has made a unanimous recommendation to the Government to construct a new sugar factory in Kwale District to alleviate the current problems of over-production of sugar cane in the area.

The team observed that the single factory in the area at Ramisi, was outdated and could not cope up with the current rate of cane production in the area even if it was expanded with modern equipment.

The senior officers who have been attending a five week long seminar on management at the Kenya Institute of Administration Kabete felt that it was more reasonable to build a new and more efficient factory in a more productive area than repairing and expanding the out-dated factory at Ramisi which is also lying in a less productive area.

They also pointed out to the local D.C. Mr I. Lukalo, that the government was doing everything possible to alleviate the problem of wildlife from Shimba Hills National Park by constructing a high tension electric wire fence around the park.

The team was led by a senior lecturer at K.I.A. Mr John Orora and is mainly engaged in a thorough study of problems affecting Kwale District.

curio shops, offices for travel agents and tour operators, and try and meet the needs of the community staying there.

Of the 400 beds, thirty will be within a small hotel building, 366 in cottages and four in two-bedroomed suites in bungalows.

All bedrooms will be air-conditioned — but not the public areas — as their construction is so planned that they will get the maximum ventilation from the sea air.

There will be a speciality restaurant, sailing school, horse stables, four tennis courts and a swimming pool.

They also envisage developing a separate farm operation covering 50-60 hectares of land to grow fresh fruit and vegetables for the hotel.

In addition, an area is being set aside for housing managerial staff and establishing an African Village for employees.

Neckermann not only bring tourists to Kenya by air, but also by sea.

They have seven ships on charter taking holidaymakers cruising all over the world. Two called at Mombasa earlier this year — the Maxim Gorky and Italia — carrying over 1,000 passengers between them. Most were taken on safari by United Touring Company.

Some flew into Kenya taking

a holiday here before embarking on their sea safari, while others disembarking at Mombasa took a holiday before returning to Europe by air.

Neckermann also has in operation a 'Club 28' catering for the younger set. At Malindi they stay at Club Tropicana — which is a very swinging place.

# 'TELL ME ABOUT ANY SHORTAGES' — P.C.

A very warm welcome was given to the new Provincial Commissioner, Coast, Mr. Luka Galgalo, by members of the Kenya Association of Hotel-keepers and Caterers' Coast, who hosted a luncheon party in his honour in the flower bedecked Maaka Grill of Africana Sea Lodge, Diani Beach.

The centre piece was a traditional Arab bed on which some of the sumptuous buffet was laid.

At the meeting which followed in Jadini Beach Hotel's conference centre, Mr. Kim Morbey, chairman, officially welcomed the P.C. and, on behalf of members, assured him of their closest co-operation and support, adding "you will always be most welcome at our hotels".

Giving details of the association, Mr. Morbey said it had 44 members — all from hotels and hotel groups at the Coast. Between them they managed approximately 7-8,000 beds with a staff of between 5-6,000. Indirectly, he added "we must be employing, or supporting some 30,000 people at the Coast".

At meetings, members discussed problems common to them all, and usually a government officer was present.

Referring to power and food shortages at the Coast earlier this year, Mr. Morbey pointed out that there are 20 per cent more tourist hotel beds at the Coast than in Nairobi, and that tourism was Kenya's second largest earner of foreign exchange.

## 'FAIR SHARE'

After comparing the situation in Nairobi with that at the Coast at that time, members had felt they were not getting their fair share of what was available in the country.

He asked the P.C. to try and impress on Nairobi that the Coast is a very important area.

While not seeking preferen-

tial treatment, they would like to be treated equally.

Saying that he welcomed the opportunity of meeting Coast hoteliers, the Provincial Commissioner said that the growth of tourism at the Coast had been largely due to continued peace and stability in the country under the leadership of President Moi. For which hoteliers had a lot to be thankful for.

The P.C. was happy to note that Kenya was becoming increasingly popular as a holiday destination. No longer was there a serious low season, for the high season was now continuing through much of the year.

Hoteliers, he said, should strive to maintain this popularity and to further develop our tourist industry.

The P.C. also noted that there was "nearly one employee for every hotel bed". He thought this was very good bearing in mind there were so many jobless people around.

On the question of shortages, the P.C. asked to be kept informed of any further problems, or irregularities, that may occur.

As far as the new bridge at Nyali was concerned he said he had little to say for a "decision was expected very soon".

It was hoped that President Moi would be able to officially open the bridge — but a date for this had yet to be decided upon.

While many wanted the bridge to be 'free', the P.C. told members that from information available it looked as if a charge would be made, and warned that they "should brace themselves for this".

Although this would not be popular, he disclosed that the rates would not be much different to those now being levied on the old Nyali Bridge.

During question time the P.C. was asked about the shortage of flour, and why the more expensive fancy bread and rolls were being baked instead of the cheaper loaves.

In reply, the P.C. said "we had a meeting with bakers recently and they are getting reasonable quantities of flour. It appears" he said "that some would rather bake fancy bread, rolls and cakes — presumably to make more money".

He went on "we have tried to put our foot down, and the bakers have promised to be good boys but" said the P.C. "we shall continue chasing them and the government may have to take sterner measures if the situation does not improve".

Another member spoke of the problem of getting adequate supplies of crustacea at the Coast.

He claimed that supplies from Lamu were going into waiting lorries to be taken to dealers in Mombasa who send them to Nairobi and Europe. He asked if there was any way in which an adequate supply could be kept at the Coast.

## 'EXPLOITED'

It was pointed out that holidaymakers coming to Kenya look forward to enjoying a lobster, only to find they were having to pay nearly the same price for it here as in Europe.

Mr. Morbey explained that crustacea fishermen are paid a controlled price of Shs. 22/50 a kilo, while hoteliers were having to pay between Shs. 65 to 80 a kilo from the dealers.

While big international hotels in Nairobi could afford to pay more than twice the laid down price — Coast hoteliers could not.

A considerable amount was being exported, and fishermen were being badly exploited.

Mr. Morbey pointed out that Kenya needs more foreign currency. Not many local people ate lobster — but the tourists did.

It was one way of getting foreign currency, and tourists would eat more if prices were cheaper.

He mentioned that hoteliers were constantly being warned against overpricing, but were being forced into doing so with the result that Kenya was becoming as nearly as expensive as Europe.

Said Mr. Morbey "hoteliers are having to pay more, otherwise they do not get the lobsters".

The P.C. suggested that the association should write to the Fisheries Department, with a copy to him.

Before leaving the P.C. said that as 1980 is the 'Year of the Handicapped' he would like to appeal to hotels to make a donation to help those who are disabled.

He said that donations should either be sent to his office, or direct to the institutions of their choice.

# DATELINE: DARES SALAAM

## Oil Men chase Search Rights

MAJOR WORLD oil conglomerates have shown an interest in seeking oil exploration rights in Tanzania after seismicographic surveys had shown reasonable prospects.

Tabling the Petroleum (Exploration and Production) Act 1980 in Parliament, the Minister for Water, Energy and Minerals, Mr. Al-noor Kassam said that seismicographic surveys had been completed onshore in the Ruvu, Bigwa and Kimbiji and offshore in certain areas of Zanzibar and Mafia Channels.

The Government he pointed out should be in a position to begin negotiations with oil companies and attract foreign capital for examining this potential.

Under the Bill, a wide range of supervisory and controlling powers would be vested with the Minister responsible for petroleum and a commissioner to be appointed by the President.

Addressing the outgoing members of Parliament, President Nyerere has said that while Tanzania was still interested in trade relations with Kenya, agreement had to be reached on the distribution of the defunct East African Community assets and liabilities. The Swiss mediator appointed by the World Bank was still to be provided with figures with regard to properties of the railways and airline corporation which were based in Kenya.

Neighbouring states who provide military bases to the super-powers reduce rather increase their own respect, even in the eyes of those who have the bases.

On the home front, Mwalmu made a scathing attack on prophets of doom and constant complainers and warned those Tanzanians who do not practise frugality and self-reliance, that they will end up as drunkards — selling or pawning the little they have.

President Nyerere also officially opened the Shs. 587 million Musoma Textile Factory (Mutex) on the outskirts of Mwanza. The mill originally estimated to cost Shs. 468 million was built through loan from France, Belgium and West Germany.

The mill will employ 2,500 workers at full capacity and would be able to produce 26 million metres of textiles (khangas, vitenge, bedsheets, khaki material and export shipping materials) a year.

Phase II of the plant begins this financial year and when completed, Mutex will be the largest textile mill in the country.

## MTERA DAM

Some 50,000 peasants from the banks of the buaha river in Iringa region will be resettled elsewhere this October to pave the way for construction work at the Mtera Dam Project.

The Shs. 964 million dam which constitutes Phase II of the Kidatu hydro-power station

is due for completion next November, and the dam which will control the flow of water downstream to the Kidatu power generators will start filling up in December this year.

The Government intends establishing a national water authority to cater for the urban water supply network following recommendations by a foreign-based firm in the country — Coopers and Lybrand.

A Bill is to be tabled in Parliament and it is hoped that the authority will take off early next year.

Members of Parliament inspecting certain projects under their jurisdiction as members of respective sub-committees have also suggested the formation of a National Airport Authority to handle the increase and expansion of airports in the country.

Meanwhile Air Tanzania Corporation (A.T.C.) has been ranked third in the first 50 members of the International Air Transport Association (I.A.T.A.) in terms of scheduled tonne kms. growth rate for international and domestic services. Laddco Airline of Chile and Bwia International of West Indies were first and second respectively.

The United Nations Development Programme (U.N.D.P.) will double its aid to Tanzania to Shs. 560 million for the third five year cycle effective January 1, 1982.

Under the current five year cycle which ends in December 1981, Tanzania received Shs. 280 million from the U.N.O.

This was revealed by the new U.N.D.P. resident representative to Tanzania, Mr. Kwafu Apeadu of Ghana.

Mr. Apeadu who replaces Mr. A. Kabbah of Sierra Leone previously served in Tanzania in 1969 for two years as deputy resident representative.

The Zanzibar Government is to receive aid from three international agencies for various health programmes.

The W.H.O. in conjunction

with the Government will launch a three year Shs. 400,000 biphazaria control programme in Zanzibar and Pemba and with the United States (A.I.D.), the United Nations Agency will launch a five year control programme on malaria.

A.I.D. will finance the malaria programme and W.H.O. will provide the experts.

The Danish agency, Danida, will also assist the Isles in carrying an extended immunisation programme. Under the programme, children are given vaccines against various diseases such as tetanus and tuberculosis.

Japan has donated to Tanzania equipment worth Shs. 330,000 for the proposed Mahale National Park in Kigoma region. The equipment includes a prefabricated model house and a jeep.

And a Japanese firm — Nippon Koei has been awarded a Shs. five million contract to supervise the implementation of the Salander Bridge Expansion Project in Dar es Salaam.

The expansion which includes the construction of a four-lane paved bridge and approach roads with a view to easing congestion during the morning and evening peak hours is being financed by the Japanese Government through a Shs. 60 million grant.

## JAPANESE

Tender invitations have been sent to ten Japanese pre-qualified contractors and the Ministry of Works will send a team to Japan in early September to study the tenders and award the contracts.

Representatives of the Bank of Brazil are due in the country early next month to sign an agreement with the Government on the financing of the Shs. 745 million Wazo Hill Cement Factory on the outskirts of the city.

The Tanzania Sanji Corporation which oversees all cement operations in the country is studying possibilities of exploiting gypsum deposits at Itigi in Singida region as the major ingredient for the proposed Mbeya cement plant.

The Shs. 620 million Mbeya Plant which is expected to go into production towards the end of the year will initially get its gypsum from the Makanya and Mkomazi deposits in Kilimanjaro region.

The Institute of Development Management (I.D.M.) in Morogoro and the Institute of Local Government Studies at the University of Birmingham, Britain are to jointly undertake short courses for town council staff under a British aided programme.

Urban councils — Mwanoo, Town and District — were abolished in July 1972 following the government's decentralisation programme, but Municipal and Town Councils were resurrected last year and there are plans of reviving the District Councils.

A Dar es Salaam bank executive — Cecil Mtoi has been fined Shs. 500 by a Mwanza Magistrate after pleading guilty to a charge of impeding the safety of an Air Tanzania aircraft on June 5, 1980 while on a flight from Dar es Salaam to Mwanza. This is the first incident of its kind in Tanzania.

## 'MISSING LINK'

The Police have finally traced the missing link to eight robberies on seven Dar es Salaam houses in one area. Thabit Ubwa, a 19 year old youth appeared before a Resident Magistrate to answer eight separate charges of burglary and stealing goods worth Shs. 77,330. One of the houses was twice broken into.

## MWANGALE VISIT

THE NEWLY appointed Minister of Tourism, Hon. E. W. Mwangale, accompanied by his Assistant Ministers Mr F. Gumo and Halake Fayo and officials of the Ministry has been on a three day familiarization tour of the Coast Province.

During his tour, the Minister visited most of the hotels along the north coast up to Malindi, and also visited places of touristic interest such as Gedi ruins and Jumba la Mtwana ruins. He also saw the new developments of the Plaza Beach Hotel, being built next to the Severin Sea Lodge under the management of Mr T. Rose.

The Minister was also guest at a dinner party hosted by his Ministry at the Mombasa Beach Hotel in honour of a group of travel agents from Pakistan on an educational tour of Kenya and to look into the possibility of sending tourists. Pakistan has a large tourist potential with over ten per cent of its population of 65 million inhabitants, going on holiday abroad.

He added that Kenya's tourism was in the increase, and that the Ministry will expand the bed capacity by 8000 beds during the current five year development plan, of which half will be allocated to the Coast Province.

Mr Jaffer Ali, managing director of Princely Travels Ltd, Karachi, who led the travel agents, promised to promote tourism in Kenya, adding that his group was most impressed by the facilities available to the tourists here, the numerous high class hotels and most of all the hospitality of the Kenyan people.

Mr Mwangale, also visited the hotels at the South Coast and saw the new construction going on at the Diani Reef Hotel and the Golden Beach Hotel due to open in the second half of next year.

During his Coast visit the Minister also paid a courtesy call on the Coast Provincial Commissioner, Mr L. Galgalo and the Kilifi D.C. Mr B. A. Omuse. On Monday a cocktail party was hosted for the Minister and the visiting travel agents by Kenya Airways at the Whitesands Hotel. Also present were the Assistant Ministers, senior Ministry officials, hoteliers, Kenya Airways executives, headed by the Kenya manager Mr Justine Okitoyi.

## EXCELLENT CELERY SOUP

In Europe celery is primarily a winter vegetable. It was much prized by the Romans as a plant growing wild in damp places and did not come under cultivation until the sixteenth century. The Greeks began cultivating for the medicinal properties of the seed.

Because of its individual flavour, it plays an important part in flavouring soups, stews and casseroles but is chiefly eaten raw as an ingredient of a mixed salad. When being used uncooked it should not be left in water longer than necessary as this makes it limp while it should be crisp.

The undamaged leaves may be left on the stems of celery to accompany a cheese board. Pieces of celery prepared for dips and handed round at cocktail parties are simple and effective. Cut cleaned stems into two-inch chunks.

Then cut down the chunk almost to the base at five intervals. Plunge into iced water. The strips will curl back into attractive tassels.

To prepare celery for cooking, trim off the lower end and the leaves completely. Cut each head in half lengthwise. Rinse the stems under cold water or scrub them if you prefer, removing any tough stringy bits. Chop into 2-4 inch lengths and braise them.

The cooked celery may be served with a parsley or cheese sauce, doused in melted butter or scattered with toasted almonds and nutmeg.

### BRAISED CELERY:

Clean the vegetable and chop into required lengths. Place in a saucepan or flame-proof casserole with 1-2 ounces butter. Heat gently and you will see that once cooking begins juices will collect. Add one tablespoonful of meat stock for extra moisture. Season.

Cover and allow to cook slowly for about half an hour. The Italians braise their celery in a different way.

For Sedano Alla Mugnaia take four young celery hearts and parboil in salted water for five minutes. Drain well. Arrange in an ovenproof dish with a cup of chicken stock and dot lavishly with butter.

Season with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Either cover and simmer or braise in the oven until tender. Sprinkle with lemon juice and chopped parsley before serving.

You can vary the above recipe by adding Parmesan cheese when the celery is almost cooked. At this stage remove the cover, let the liquor evaporate and as the celery begins to colour sprinkle with two tablespoons of the grated cheese. Check the seasoning, serve piping hot.

Celery fritters are said to be delicious and are a more unusual way of dealing with this vegetable. Remove any outer stalks and wash four tender celery hearts. Slice them in half lengthwise. Cook in boiling salted water. Drain well

and pat dry. Chop roughly.

Place in a bowl, one whole beaten egg to which you have added an extra yolk. One tablespoon of Parmesan cheese, one tablespoon of flour, salt and freshly ground black pepper. Beat well. Add the chopped celery. Fry fritters by the spoonful in hot oil until golden and cooked inside. Drain well. Serve piping hot.

### CELERY SOUP:

This excellent soup really does taste of the basic vegetable. Water and bouillon cubes may be used for the stock.

1 head of celery  
1 large potato, peeled and chopped

2 pints of light stock or one pint stock and one pint milk  
salt, freshly ground black pepper and nutmeg to taste

Wash and prepare the celery chopping both stalk and leaves roughly. The heart may be put aside for salad if you wish. Melt a lump of butter in a large pan and gently stew/fry them until they glisten with butter and are limp. Add the stock and bring to the boil.

Cover and cook for about 45 minutes. The celery must be soft as it has to be sieved. After sieving return to pan and add milk at this stage if using it. Stir well and heat through. Season to taste. Add a little top of the milk just before serving.

Finally here is a gala dish for celery. Pheasant is the classic game bird but guinea fowl

would do just as well. Pigeon is also excellent with celery. Wait till you get the bird and then try Elizabeth David's recipe for Pheasant With Celery

- 1 pheasant
- 2 ounces of streaky salt pork or mild bacon
- 2 ounces butter
- a glass of white wine
- a large head of celery plus a little butter and olive oil in which to cook it

Melt half the butter in a heavy deepish pot which will take the bird. Add the diced pork or bacon. Put the other half of butter into the bird. As the pork fat melts fry the pheasant turning gently so that it is light golden on both sides.

Add the wine, when it bubbles, lower the heat, cover the pot and cook gently for 45 minutes.

Prepare the celery and cut into half inch chunks. Melt the butter and olive oil in a heavy pan. Add the celery, stir and add salt and simmer for 10 minutes. Take a spoonful of the juices from the bird and add to the celery.

After five more minutes transfer the celery to a serving dish, place the pheasant on top and put the little bits of pork all round. Keep warm and covered while you reduce the juices in the pan over a high flame.

Now you may if desired add a dash of Calvados or Armagnac to the sauce. Let it cook a few minutes longer before serving it separately in a sauce boat with the pheasant and celery.

## COPING WITH THE MENTALLY HANDICAPPED

A concerned Mombasa teacher writes on this sensitive subject

MENTAL handicap as many people call it, is one of the biggest social problems around today.

In fact the mentally handicapped are by far the largest group of handicapped people in Kenya and yet more misconceptions, fallacies, old wives' tales and downright nonsense surround the subject of mental handicap than any other disability.

Probably, it is a natural reaction. We can all imagine what it is like to be crippled after a car crash, but very few of us know anything about mental handicap.

A mentally handicapped person has a brain which does not develop as fast or as fully as a normal person's.

In a way it is rather similar to someone who is born without an arm or a leg.

A mentally handicapped person's brain is in some way incomplete. It reaches a certain stage often equivalent to the mental development of a normal seven or eight year old, and then stops.

That person will then have

the brain of an eight-year-old all his or her life.

Some mentally handicapped people have mental development equivalent to the average 12-year-old, and go through being thought of as a simple, rather immature adult.

They are the border cases, the relatively lucky ones.

The unlucky ones are the severely handicapped children whose mental development stops at babyhood.

They grow up many of them to adulthood unable to dress themselves, speak, or even stand. Disturbing, isn't it?

What is even more disturbing is that mental handicap afflicts so many children and adults.

There is no official register of the mentally handicapped, no accurate statistics, going right across the spectrum from the very severely handicapped to the borderline cases. It is reckoned that one in a hundred babies born today are mentally handicapped.

We know that there are many different causes of mental handicap, but few of them are fully understood.

We know that an extra chromosome causes "Down Syndrome" (or "Mongolism" as it is sometimes called), injury during or after birth can lead to a brain damage, that hormone deficiency malnutrition or "Gen Measles" during pregnancy, result in a mother giving birth to a mentally handicapped baby.

But even when we know the mental handicap is caused, it is often impossible to say why and in many cases we cannot pinpoint the exact cause.

Is there any cure? Sadly, Mental handicap is permanent disability, no temporary illness which can be cured by medicine or treatment.

Mentally handicapped people are not ill — there is a social and educational problem, and not a medical one.

Every family reacts differently to the birth of a mentally handicapped child.

Some parents never come to terms with the fact that their child will not be like other children, and the mother in particular may feel guilty because she has given birth to a child which is less perfect.

Problems often arise in the family because a handicapped child demands the lion's share of love and attention while brothers and sisters may come to resent.

This is often so when the child is very severely handicapped.

Mentally handicapped children cannot cope with kind of education provided for normal children, so they go to special schools.

### NEW SKILLS

Teachers in special schools aim to equip their children with the skills they will need as they grow up — being able to name the parts of the body and other everyday things, telling the difference between colours, counting, talking well as possible and doing much for themselves as can.

A teacher will often be delighted if one of her able pupils does learn to read and write a little, but she will be just as pleased if a severely handicapped child manages to take a few steps on his own.

The reasons for their constant stock are multiple. Firstly, they have their own farm and ranch as suppliers. Then, as far as the highlands prime beef is concerned they do not transport it in refrigerated trucks from Nairobi, but they bring the actual live animals down from Nanuyuki, Molo or Nakuru by train and slaughter them here in Mombasa. This method ensures Afro Meat Co. is self sufficient throughout, the only exception being actual rearing.

Once the meat is "dead" it enters one of the three freezers. On the Afro Meat Co. premises can be seen the deep freezer, the blast freezer (i.e. for rapid cooling) and the chiller. There is a fourth freezer and that handles all the pork products. Lamb too is available from Afro Meat.

#### "MILK FED WHITE VEAL"

Supplied by a coastal man, previously farming on the European continent is milk fed white veal. No wonder all of this draws customers from as far away as Bura (in Taitaland) and Garsen up north.

As you enter the shop you will see the smiles under the butcher's hats and you will note that all that is handled by these men is meat and more meat. There is no contamination from money — you pay separately to the pretty cashier.

Also for sale is a selection of prepared meat like German Sausage, Cheese Meat Loaf, Salami and Bacon. In addition the chiller counter holds yogurt, butter (yeast, butter displayed and buyable whenever available), cheese and fresh double cream. This latter product has been introduced during the last two weeks only. The chiller counter is regulated to the correct temperature, for the owners, the well-known Hassanali couple, know, for example, the disastrous effect freezing has on cream.

Afro Meat, situated on Nkrumah Road, Telephone 24971 and 313130, is open on Sunday mornings too from 9.00 to 11.00a.m. This enables the person who has worked for his daily bread or weekly roast to join the happy throng of housewives and satisfied hoteliers by buying from their very well stocked butchers.

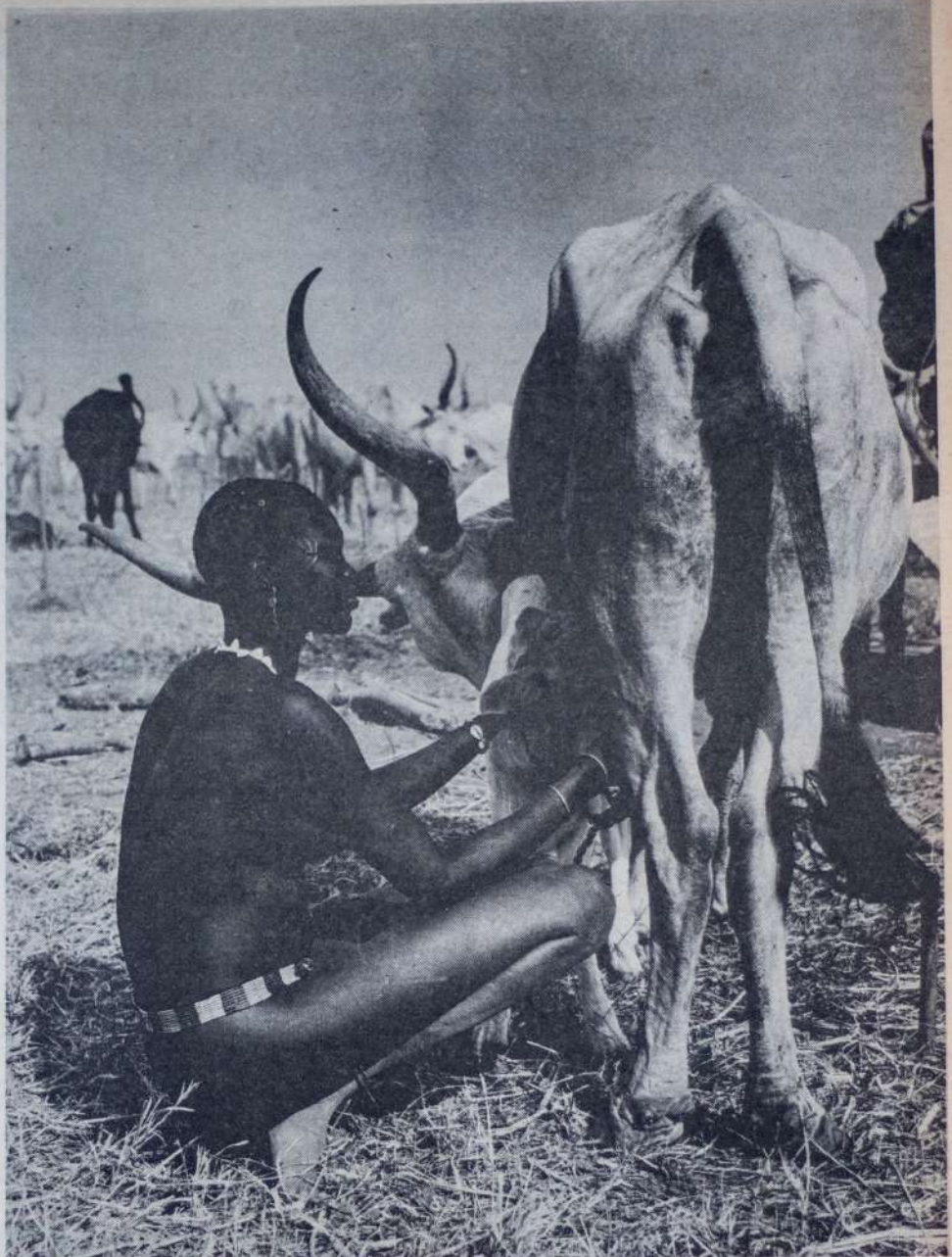
She also does screen printing on towels and plunks a large colourful butterfly on the back of a baby's first vest.

**More Problems for South Africa from Suez Canal**

WHILE THE completion of the first phase of the re-development of the Suez Canal later this year will be a matter for rejoicing in Egypt, it will be bad news for South Africa.

This is because the widening and deepening of the waterway will divert more ships from the Cape route and thus deprive South African ports and their associated service industries of some of the estimated \$50 million a year they now earn from bunkering, repairing and victualling.

The canal remained closed for eight years after the 1967 Arab-Israeli conflict, but since its re-opening in 1975, the number of vessels rounding the Cape of Good Hope has fallen from 23,000 a year to well under 20,000. In 1970, nearly 27,000 ships used the route.

As from October - if the development work is completed on schedule - fully laden oil tankers of up to 150,000 tonnes will be able to transit the waterway as will vessels of up to 37,000 tonnes in ballast. Currently the limit for a full tanker is 60,000 tonnes.

According to the authoritative Financial Mail of Johannesburg, this enlarged canal would undoubtedly bring about profound changes in trade route economics, especially as international confidence had more or less been restored in the Suez artery. In the past five years it had been used by 95,000 ships without accidents or delays.

In addition to oil, it was expected that more of the bulk and dry cargo trades between Europe and the Far East would opt for the shorter Suez route, the Mail added. And while it would be difficult to quantify the effect of this drastic change in routing, for South Africa it was "clearly going to be bad for business".

Moreover, there could be worse to come for the South Africans. The current improvements are only part of a \$1,200 million project to develop the canal. When the work is completed there will be separate channels for north-bound and southbound traffic, and the waterway will be able to accommodate even bigger vessels.

Canal dues represent the third largest foreign currency earner - after oil and the remittances of migrant workers - for Egypt's hard-pressed economy.

This year income from the waterway is expected to top \$700 million, but by next year it will reach more than \$1,000 million according to the Suez Canal Authority's chairman. The authority has intimated that transit charges are to be increased at the end of the year.

**HEAVY CARGO CRANES FOR DAR**

from TONY BARROS in Dar es Salaam

EXISTING cranes at the Dar es Salaam port cannot cater for the heavier bulk cargo containers carried by ships and other cargo as handling equipment has not kept abreast with the increased cargo traffic.

The Tanzania Harbours Authority (T.H.A.) has accordingly been directed by the government to take stock of the existing equipment with a view to recommending modern equipment conforming to international standards.

The Authority plans to spend some Shs. 1.8 billion on modernising its operations during the five years from 1978 to 1982.

These include the improvement on the entrance channel to facilitate the handling of container ships, and easing the handling of cargo traffic to and from Zaire, Zambia, Rwanda and Burundi.

Since 1974, when the port handled 1.7 million tonnes of cargo, traffic has been on the increase and last year the port handled 2.081 million tonnes.

Dar es Salaam port workers have informed the management that 19 of the 57 winch cranes have been written off, and the supervisors were ignorant of the operations of the machines.

They also urged the management to undertake maintenance of all cranes, trailers, tractors and forklifts that were not in working condition.



**POLLMAN'S TOP TOUR DRIVER AWARD**

POLLMAN'S Tours and Safaris have presented their 1st driver Ndungu Marine Mugo with a cheque for Shs. 2,000.

It is all part of a new introduced incentive scheme to interest drivers to tourists on safari in safaris.

Ndungu, who has been driver with the company nine years, achieved greatest saving and so won prize.

With skyrocketing prices the need to reduce consumption to save country's precious foreign exchange, Pollman's embarked on a survey to determine most "economical speed which to drive".

Results confirmed that driving carefully and keep within speeds of 65-80km saving of five litres of petrol over a 100km journey could make.

Eight vehicles participated covering about 280kms. Kilaguni Lodge to Mombasa. All were carrying an identical number of passengers, driving at different speeds.

It was found that a saving of 15 litres of petrol had made while travelling at speed of between 65-80kms.

The incentive scheme drivers is aimed at reducing consumption and saving country badly needed to exchange.

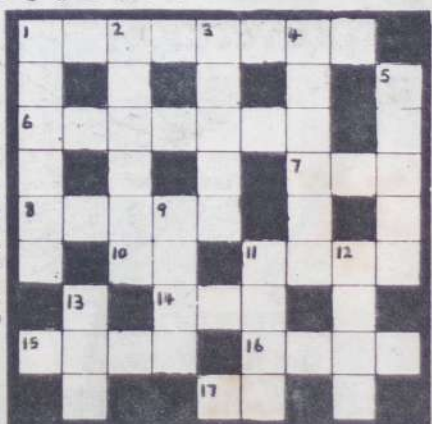

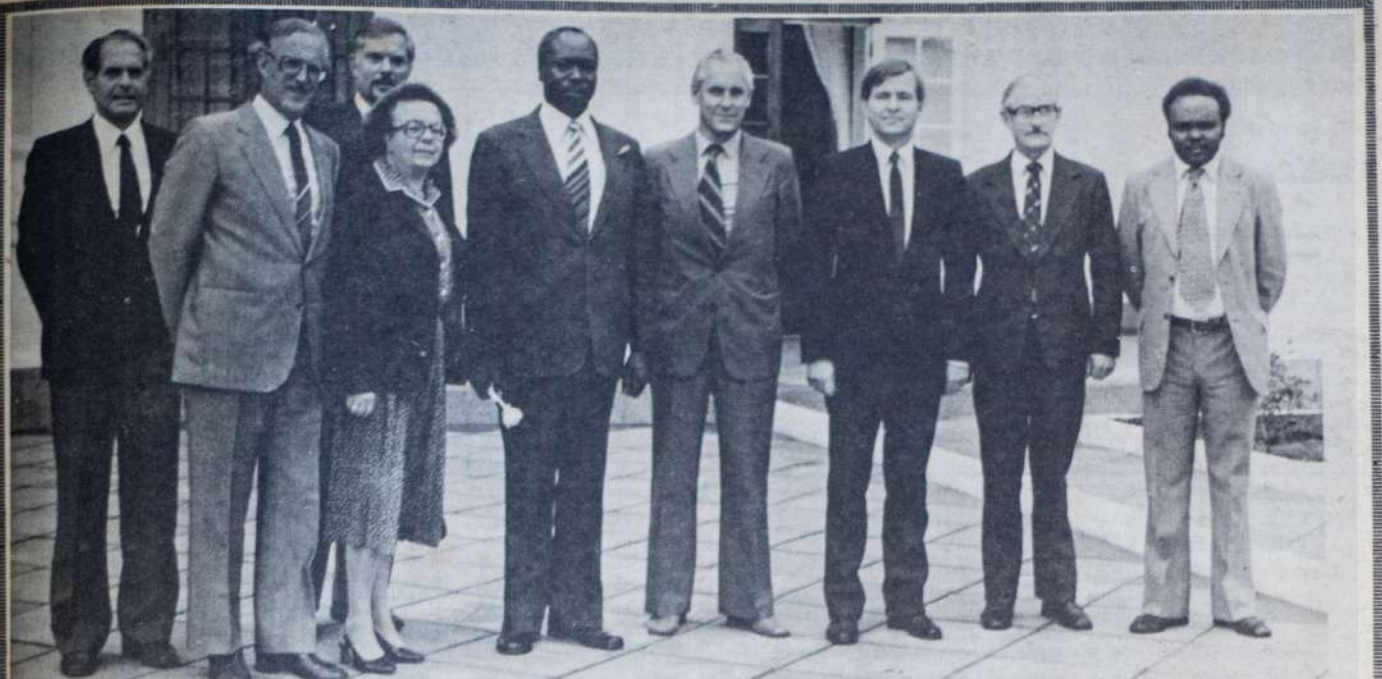

## MOMBASA die gastliche Stadt

DER SCHIEFE Turm von Mbaraki mit Blick auf die Mbaraki Bucht ist ein bekanntes Wahrzeichen. Er ist 15 m hoch und noch recht gut erhalten.

Es gibt viele Theorien über seine Entstehung und Funktion, und selbst heute finden dort noch unheimliche Rituale in regelmäßigen Abständen statt. Die Beteiligten sind Frauen, besonders kinderlose. Sie kommen zum Turm und opfern Hühner, in Glauben, dadurch Fruchtbarkeit zu erlangen.

In der Tat hat der Turm eine starke Ähnlichkeit mit einem Phallussymbol. Manche behaupten, er werde von Geistern heimgesucht, aber dies mag auch eine List sein, um allzu Neugierige von den Ritualen fernzuhalten.

Der Turm ist bereits auf einer Karte von 1728 eingezeichnet, nicht jedoch auf der Ruzeinde-Karte von 1836; das bedeutet, daß der Turm zwischen den beiden Zeitpunkten gebaut sein muß. Man sagt, das Mbaraki-Viertel wurde seit ältester Zeit von Arabern und Persern bewohnt.

Der Turm muß, so nimmt man an, eine Art Leuchtturm für die in die Mbaraki-Bucht einlaufenden Schiffe gewesen sein, denn auf der Karte von 1836 ist ein Dorf an dieser Stelle eingezeichnet. Die Wachangamwe behaupten, er gehöre zu einer Reihe von Türmen zur Markierung der Stammesgrenzen.

James Kirkman vertrat die Theorie, es handle sich möglicherweise um den Grabstein des ersten Scheichs der Wa-Kitone, einer Sippe des Wachangamwe-Stammes. Die Wachangamwe gehören zur Theletha Tarfa Gruppe der Wasuahili, die im 16. Jahrhundert auf der Insel landeten.

### DER BAOBABWALD

Baobab-Bäume sind überall auf der Insel und dem Festland zu finden, obwohl sie nicht unbedingt an das Küstenklima gebunden sind. Sie sind jedoch besonders zahlreich auf beiden Seiten der Likoni-Fähre und am Mama Njira Drive. Diese Stelle wird als Baobab-Wald bezeichnet und gehört zu den ältesten bewohnten Gegenden der Insel. Bis zum 2. Weltkrieg wurden hier "Ngomas" (Suahelwörter für Tänze) und andere Zeremonien abgehalten.

Die Sage geht, daß bei der Erschaffung der Welt der Baobab-Baum irrtümlich verkehrtermaßen eingepflanzt wurde, und daß die Zweige tatsächlich Wurzeln sind. Wenn man die Bäume ansieht, könnte man der Mär tatsächlich Glauben schenken.

Es wird erzählt, daß während der portugiesischen Epoche jedem portugiesischen Soldaten eine Baobabfrucht ins Grab gelegt wurde. Wenn dem so ist, könnten einige der Bäume einzigartige Markierungen von Grabstätten vergangener Zeiten sein. Es wird ebenfalls von den Bäumen gesagt, sie beherrschten die Geister der Toten; diese Tatsache wurde oft von eingeborenen "Mganga" (Suahelwörter für Medizinmännern) benutzt, um seine Kunden zu beeindrucken.

### FÜHRER DURCH MOMBASA 1890

In einer Beschreibung Mombasas von Charles Hobley 1890, dem "Führer durch Mombasa und Umgebung" entnommen und für die "Mombasa Times" zusammenggetragen, heißt es:

"Mombasa war ein eigenartiger Platz in jenen Tagen. Seine Ausdehnung war begrenzt. Es gab eine Stadtmauer. Die Festung war von etwa hundert wilden Hadramuths besetzt, die von ehrwürdigen alten Arabern kommandiert wurden. Sobald man die engen Gassen der eigentlichen Stadt verließ, fand man nur noch schmale Fußwege vor, selbst die Straße nach Kilindini war nur etwa vier Fuß breit und führte durch unwegsames Dschungelgebiet.

"Es ist erstaunlich, wie durch das Lichten und Kultivieren des Landes in den letzten Jahren nahezu alle Schlangen auf der Insel ausgerottet wurden. Die sogenannten Puffottern waren eine echte Plage; man konnte etlichen von ihnen auf einem einzigen Abendspaziergang begegnen.

"Leoparden strichen bei Nacht durch die Stadt, hier und da eine vorwitzige Ziege stahlend; und eines Morgens ging die Kunde um, daß einer in dem großen Feigenbaum am Süden der Hauptstraße eingeschlafen war; er verschwand jedoch, bevor wir unsere Gewehre holen konnten".

Hobley fügt zum Schluß hinzu, daß er zwei Jahre nach seiner Ankunft an einer Löwenjagd auf der Insel teilnahm!

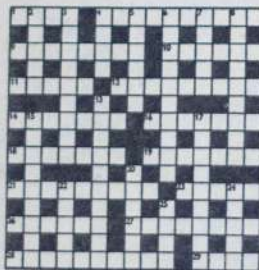

For entrants, officials and M.M.C. fellow travellers a strenuous but enjoyable weekend lies ahead.

Looking ahead to coming motor sport events for M.M.C. and up-country clubs, there is something for everyone with the possible exception of drag-racing, and being a family type club that's not the sort of thing we encourage.

## CHRISTINE OTIENO — SOURCE OF PRIDE

CHRISTINE Otiemo should have three proud children in Kericho this week, as her diminutive mother powered her way to three sprint victories and two relay legs in the Kenya Colleges Inter-Zonal Meeting, helping Western Zone to take home the much coveted trophy.

In two days she ran heats and finals in the 100, 200 and 400m, and anchored both relays cutting out a time of 55 seconds for her 400 relay leg, against a very strong headwind.

Had Ruth Waitheba been here today she would have found Christine hard to beat. Slick, smart and supreme sump up this athletic meeting held at the weekend in Shanzu.

Slick was the organisation, always running within time and setting an example to the teachers of the future. Smart were the athletes in their dress and the orderly way in which they conducted things.

Supreme was the standard of competition that bodes well for Kenya as a continuing athletic nation. Elijah Rob and Joseph Bor of Kericho and Siriba respectively, set the high standard in motion when they ran to a 1, 2 victory in the 10,000m, setting a Zonal record of 30:21.9 in the way.

In the 5000m, I thought for a moment it was the same two runners again as they flashed through the first lap in a devastating 56 seconds.

But no, it was Joseph Reriamoi and Charles Kirui from the same colleges as their 1000 metre counterparts.

### 'INSIDE RECORD'

The first kilometre was passed in 2 mins. 37 secs. which is of good international standard, and still it did not break the field completely.

A second kilometre took over three minutes, allowing the followers to gain their breath.

Then Joseph put in the pressure, running the third and fourth kilometres in 2:52 and 2:40 respectively. The final time, a shade outside the record at 14:39.2.

The race that was inside the National College record however was the women's

1500m, in which Esther Wanjiru a first year Primary trainee from Mosoriot ran an incredible dual with Prisca Tanui of Eastern zone to finally run eleven seconds clear, leaving the record at 4 min. 40.7 secs.

Wanjiru was not satisfied with one record, and tackled the 800m, with furvor and style passing through the first lap in 65 seconds with Jeremiah Nyangoka of Western Province in front of her.

At the bottom of the back straight where the wind was the strongest, Esther Wanjiru made her attack with determination and drive. But Nyangoka was not letting her go and chased her all the way to the end and a new inter-zonal record of 2 mins. 16.3 secs.

The men's 800 was equally impressive, but with equal laps of 57 seconds, giving the winner, David Kipkoeh a time of 1:53.7.

### 'STEEPLECHASE'

All eyes are on the water jump in the steeplechase, and on the third time around Johan Koskie of North West lost his shoe in the water.

Stopping them to remove them completely he dropped from third to almost last. Two laps later and he was back in third place which he held to the end, only to find he was disqualified for going around a hurdle inside of over it.

The last track record of the day was the inter-zonal one for the mens 4 x 100m, which North West claimed with a time of 44 seconds.

The field events had their share of excitement with good performances being set by Cherambo (Western) in mens javelin, throwing an excellent 57.49m.

Chepkwony from Central Zone won both the long jump and triple jump with new record distances.

The pole vault attracted a lot of attention as Nandiwa went up to 3.5 metres before ending the competition.

The overall standard was high and I think that just for once the primary and secondary schools are going to meet their match in the triangular meeting this weekend at Mombasa Stadium.

# BREAKING THE EAST EUROPEAN STRANGLEHOLD

## ATHLETICS from TONY LETT

GOLD for Alan Wells, gold for Daley Thompson, gold for Steve Ovett. Britain's participation in Moscow is giving the excitement that an Olympic Games deserves, and breaking the stranglehold of the Eastern Bloc countries.

Even with the boycotting nations present, I doubt if there would have been a great change in the medal honours gained by the U.K. team.

It was Alan Wells that set the ball rolling with a fastest heat in the 100m, and a photo finish to decide the outcome of the final, as he and the Cuban Silvio Leonard crossed the line together in 10.25 seconds.

All eyes were on the track for the confrontation of Ovett and Coe in the 800m, on Saturday night.

Both had won their heats, Ovett had won his semi-final and Coe had finished an easy third in his.

In the entrance tunnel the air was electric with tension, and as the runners emerged, you could see Coe was suffering from the tension of being No. 1 favourite.

He was pale and taut from the mental pressure of T.V., newspapers and radio interviews.

They lined up on the track as follows: Lane 1 Kirov (U.S.S.R.), Lane 2 Ovett (U.K.), Lane 3 Guimaraes (Brazil), Lane 4 Busse (G.D.R.), Lane 5 Warren (U.K.), Lane 6 Milhaus (France), Lane 7 Wagenknecht (G.D.R.), Lane 8 Coe (U.K.).

For the first time in history, one nation had three finalists in this event. As the runners broke away from their lanes after the first 100m, it was the East German and the Russian leading the pack around to a very slow lap with Coe and Ovett boxed in the middle.

Dave Warren injected some pace by taking the lead after a first lap of 54.6 seconds, and Ovett made his move at the bell by barging his way out of the box and chasing Warren down the back straight.

The race was really on now, and Coe, realising his mistake, broke out from the back of the pack in last place with only 250 metres to go.

Try as he might, he passed everybody except his rival, and whilst Ovett did his lap of honour, Coe disappeared, disgusted with himself.

Behind them came the Brazilian and Russian, with Warren coming in second to last.

The time was not startlingly fast at one minute 45.4 seconds but then it's the winning that counts, and the track is 'slow'.

As Maina might say "he runs to win, the time does not

matter". Before this race, every other runner on the track had run faster than Ovett this year, yet he had the will and the way to win, when the moment came.

Surely this must prelude a fantastic 1500m, on Saturday afternoon, as these two joint world record holders came together again.

Coe with nothing to lose and Ovett with the guts and psychological advantage to win.

Daley Thompson who held his decathlon world record set earlier this year for only a few weeks, before losing it to a West German, came to Moscow for gold, and got it.

A world record was also in sight as he led the competition after nine events, with 7970 points.

It needed a 1500m. run in 4 min. 17.4 secs. to regain the record. Faster than Thompson had ever run the distance in his life. Alternatively, he only had to finish within 45 seconds of Kutsenko of the Soviet Union to secure the gold.

Kutsenko was leading the race, but on the last lap dropped back behind the Austrian. The crowd lifted Kutsenko with their cheers, and he responded to regain the lead, but not the medal he wanted. Thompson stuck doggedly at it without attempting a world record and so won Britain's third track gold medal of the Games.

Elsewhere around the stadium, Ruth Fuchs, world record holder and favourite for the javelin was out of the medals, failing to produce a good throw.

Also out was Britain's Tessa Sanderson (and Ruth's chief opponent) with 'javelin elbow' leaving Maria Colon of Cuba to win with 60.4 metres.

Surprise (for some) of the Games came in the 20km. walk when gold and silver medalists Daniel Bautista of Mexico and world record holder of the U.S.S.R. were disqualified for lifting and third place man Dumiduro of Italy was suddenly elevated to No. 1 position.

The hurdles of course sadly missed the Americans, but with all 16 semi-finalists running between 50 and 51 seconds the race was guaranteed to be a good one. And so it was.

I confess not to have paid too much attention to the winner as I was mesmerised by Garry Oakes of Britain, who had failed to meet the U.K. qualifying standard but was allowed to go as a gesture.

He came through to take the bronze medal with a magnificent run reminiscent of Rodger Jenkins in Mexico twelve years ago.

Kenya is perhaps missed the most in the mens 400m, 5000 and 10000m and the steeplechase.

Ethiopia and Tanzania are taking up the challenge for Africa with Yifter winning the gold and Kadir the bronze in the longest event.

Filbert Bayi set a world record breaking pace in his heat of the steeplechase, then eased off in the final two laps, allowing Tura of Ethiopia to almost catch him.

For all the world it looked like Bayi trying it on, then realising he had enough left for a record, and a final, he relaxed and eased his way into the final.

For Italy, it was only the second time in Olympic history that they have won the 200 metres, and this was achieved through their world record holder Pietro Mennea who came from behind to catch Alan Wells (U.K.) with Don Quarrie of Jamaica coming in third.

Looking at the medal table, only Britain and Ethiopia are making any impression on the Eastern Bloc countries, which indicates the damaging effect of the boycott.

I should make it clear that this is a purely factual sports report, and does not reflect my opinions on the Afghanistan affair.

# SPORTSVIEW

## 'SPORTING KNOW HOW IN KENYA IS DATED 20 YEARS'

"ALL SCHOOLS should have sport included in their curriculum", was the object of a speech given by the Minister of Higher Education, Mr Kamotho, recently.

The sports will obviously be taught by teachers and what better way than through the example set by their instructors. This example was set at the weekend when teaching colleges from all over Kenya, met in Shanzu for the annual inter-colleges athletic championship. The field was well planned, clean cut and clearly marked. The programme well laid out and running ahead of schedule. The judging and time-keeping was of the highest order. All setting an example to tomorrow's teachers. All that is, except at the start line.

The sports that are taught in our school have been learnt to a large extent by teachers who were taught by colonials, who themselves were probably taught the rudiments of games some thirty years ago. It is therefore fair to say that our sports in schools is some 20 years out of date, and every opportunity should be taken to update it.

Saturday was that opportunity. We had three starters present, including Mr Mathews, of the K.A.A.A. who was also the more senior official.

The rules are quite simple i.e. "The starter should stand at an equal distance from each competitor". The athletes of course would totally agree with the sense of this rule. But no, our starters have to stick to the outdated method of standing behind the runners during a staggered start, instead of at the side, and at the side of them when they should be behind, as in the 100 metres.

The result is that the furthest athlete can be 30 metres away from him, and the nearest five metres. Add to this a 15 knot head wind and it is obvious that the man furthest away is at a distinct disadvantage due to the time it takes the sound to travel.

The problem is, if the man at the top cannot read the rules, how can we expect those that follow, to do any better. I wonder how many other sports are still operating on old colonial outdated rules.

A perfect example springs to mind. In 1954 a sports meeting in Mombasa was organised by a Col. Bailey of M.T.I. and such was his lack of knowledge that the 10,000 metres was to be run in lanes. After nine laps the athletes were still running in lanes and the poor fellow on the outside was flagging behind.

"Absolutely stupid" said Eddie Soares of Sacred Heart High School. His remark was overheard by the said colonel who ordered Mr Soares to be locked up as a troublemaker. Fortunately, the D.C. who witnessed the conversation, rushed out after the policemen and ordered the unlocking of the handcuffs.

The fortunate outcome of this incident was that Mr Soares set about making sure athletics in his school was run properly. Anybody fancy locking up Mr Stanley?

The set scrums were disastrous to the M.S.C. forwards as they were literally being shoved off the balls and backwards, thereby winning no ball from them.

The visitors never capitalised on the ball but they scored tries through L. Adamson, D. Barham, A. Powling and S. Miles.

Out of these goals only one was converted making it one goal, three tries, and two penalties to tally the score at 24-3 at half time.

It was the same dynamic rucking, mauling and moves emanating from the set scrums which allowed the 'Met' players to score two goals and one try through R. Locke, I. Burrell and S. Tansley to seal the score by 40 points to 3.

On Tuesday in a pre-match 'warm-up' against the American Navy and Marines, M.S.C. XV beat the servicemen by 34 points to 3.
