## MOMBASA YOUTH SAVES STRANDED U.S. SAILORS

THREE AMERICANS and two Swahili fishermen owe their life to an 18-year old Mombasa boy. The hero, Ranjit Sondhi, went to their rescue after their boat capsized off the north coast sea and battled for five hours to bring the sorry cargo on the shore.

Daredevil Ranjit spotted the ill-fated men as he took out some girlfriends on a boat trip from Reef Hotel which is owned by his father, Mr Kuldip Sondhi.

The three Americans from the U.S. Navy had hired the boat from the fishermen for sea goggling and had set out early in the morning. But when they reached the English Point the boat, unable to withstand the rough tide, finally submitted to the cruel sea.

The five men clung on the

side of the boat from 9:00 a.m. until help came at 11 a.m.

Ranjit, strong and well-built, who has just done his 'A' Levels in Britain, told his amazing story at Reef Hotel.

"The sea was a bit rough when we set out that morning. When we came near the English Point we noticed

something floating far off. The waves were coming in too fast and we could not see what it was.

"When we came closer I noticed two fishermen and what to me looked like three tourists hanging on the side of the boat. Seeing us coming they started shouting for help. I managed to get the three Americans on our boat and

motored back to the shore with them."

In a death-defying act, Ranjit returned for the two fishermen who had now resigned to their fate and rescued them to safety.

But for Ranjit, the ordeal was not over. He now set out with the two fishermen in search of their sunken boat.

This time Ranjit went along with his friend, a 19-year-old U.S. college student Kurt Mayer who since 1978 has been spending his summer holidays in Kenya with the Sondhi family.

The sea was still rough and the tide was coming in too fast. In full livery, Ranjit and his crew battled on as the sun sank down towards the west.

And for once luck seemed to be running out of the search party. There was still no trace of the fishermen's boat as the party's boat ran out of petrol, drifting further into the ocean at the mercy of the waves.

### 'Top U.S. swimmer'

It was Kurt's turn to save the crew. A one-time top U.S. swimmer Kurt took the plunge and swam back to the shore to raise the alarm and when help came the search party returned back to the shore.

But Ranjit's courage was still undaunted by the mishap. He now set out on a bigger boat and after tracing the fisherman's boat towed it back to shore.

A proud Mrs Sondhi who only learnt of the rescue mission as the whole drama was coming to an end commented:

"We are all proud of Ranjit. He is a strong and courageous boy. He is also a very good swimmer. This goes to show that children should learn how to swim well."

But Kurt Mayer has not had the time to inform his parents back home about the rescue mission. He said:

### 'Terrific time'

"I hope to tell them about it when I get back home after my holiday. I am having a terrific time right now."

Attempts to interview the two fishermen proved futile. And as we went to press miles of empty space separated Mombasa and the ship carrying the three Americans whose lives had been saved by a young lad.

## THOUSANDS CELEBRATE IDD-UL-FITR

THOUSANDS OF Mombasa Muslims mingled with their fellow members of the local community to celebrate the end of the holy month of Ramadhan. Cries of *Allahu-Akbar, Allahu-Akbar, La-illah-illa Allahu Wa-Allahu-Akbar* filled the air since the moment the moon was sighted on Tuesday evening.

Addressing an Idd Baraza at the Muslim Hall to mark the end of 30 days of fasting and prayers, the Coast Provincial Commissioner Mr Luka Gaigalo conveyed happy greetings from President Moi and the Kenya Government to all Muslims in Kenya and hailed them for self-denial and love for God during the whole month of Ramadhan.

"This is a great day for all of us because Kenya respects all religions in the country as enshrined in our constitution."

His reminded his audience which included the Mayor Coun. Rajab Sumba, Hon. Sharif Nassir, the Assistant Minister for Commerce and Mombasa Kanu branch chairman, the Deputy P.C. Mr Etemesi and Ambassadors from Oman and Saudi Arabia to follow the teachings of Islam and regard themselves as Kenyans.

"It is the goal of the Government to preserve peace, unity and stability in the country and by following the teachings of Koran Kenyan Muslims should help the Government achieve this goal."

### TOLERANCE

Noting that this was his first meeting with the Mombasa Muslims since he became the Coast Provincial Commissioner Mr Gaigalo called upon Muslims to show love to their fellow Kenyans of different religious denominations.

"In the meantime I call upon all of you to help me and the government to rectify the food situation in the country."

The Idd Baraza was attended by the Chief Kadhi who led prayers of thanksgiving and Mombasa D.C. Mr Mugwe.

Later in the evening the Mayor of Mombasa Councillor Rajab Sumba opened the Idd Fun Fair at Jamhuri Park (Makadara).

## THE MAYOR'S NEW SUIT OF SCARLET ...

MOMBASA residents will soon have a new-look Mayor. At the moment only lack of funds stand in the way between the Mayor and his new wardrobe, writes Gray Phombeah.

But subject to the approval of the Minister for Local Government, the City fathers should soon be able to go about their business in sparkling glamour.

Out goes the Mayor's old and tattered robe purchased in 1959 which in twenty years has graced more than three mayors and several civic leaders in Mombasa.

In comes a new sparkling robe of scarlet from M/S Ede and Ravenscroft, London, made of light-weight wool cloth with facings and sleeves trimmed with narrow musquash fur and black velvet.

The hem is trimmed with black velvet, partly lined with white art silk and with shoulder bows.

To match the new attire are two lace jabot with neckband, a cocked hat with a gold loop and two pairs of white cotton gloves.

The deputy Mayor's robe will be in maroon light-weight wool cloth, partly lined with black art silk and shoulder bows and matched with a cocked hat with a silver loop.

The eight chairmen's robes will be similar but without the fur trim while

the Town Clerk will be donned in art silk.

According to reliable sources the new robes will cost the Council Shs. 50,000 including air parcel post and insurance.

The Mayor's attire will cost £423 sterling while the rest of the items amount of £1895 sterling. Freight charges in three cartons from London to Mombasa including insurance will cost the Council a further £100 sterling.

And the councillors have too resolved the Mayor's Parlour also require a face-lift. They have noted that



the Mayor needs a new revolving chair, the present furniture requires upholstery and wall-to-wall carpet fitted in his office.

The whole work is estimated to cost Shs. 31,400.

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# 'Big Stink' over Airport Dump

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Foreseeing the hazards the proposed refuse disposal pit situated to the north of Moi International Airport could cause to the aircraft traffic, the airport authorities have advised the Mombasa Municipal Council to look for an alternative site far from the airport landing lights.

## 'NEW HOPE FOR LOCAL ROADS'

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The Government has taken over the maintenance of all classified roads within the Mombasa Municipality, the Coast Provincial Engineer, Mr G. Okumu has said.

In a letter to the Council Mr Okumu stated that as a result no further funds would be issued to the Council as a grant for the maintenance of the classified roads as the work had been taken over by the Ministry of Transport and Communications.

Immediately after receiving Mr Okumu's letter, the Council Town Planning and Works Committee met under the chairmanship of Councillor Ramadhan Seif Kambe to discuss the issue.

The committee asked the Municipal Engineer, Mr P. C. Patel to compile a comprehensive list of all roads that as a result of the take-over would now fall under the responsibility of the Council and those under the Ministry.

Meanwhile, the Town Clerk, Mr Benjamin Kubo was reported to be looking into the legality of maintenance of flower beds drainage, street lights and traffic lights on classified roads in the town.

They expressed fears that if the Council's proposals were carried out a lot of birds would be attracted to the area in question and pose a threat to aircraft traffic since the site was the approach area for landing aircraft.

In a letter advising the Council on these problems the Aerodrome Department further said that since the Council would be forced by circumstances to burn refuse at the pit, this also would be dangerous to landing aircraft due to the heavy smoke that will come from the refuse fires.

These dangers were first communicated to the Council through its public health committee last May. The matter was discussed by the committee on July 14 during which the medical officer of health, Dr A. W. Mugenyia informed the members that in 1977 the Council engaged the services of M.S. Norconsult to look into the matter and recommend a suitable site for refuse disposal in the Municipality.

They had recommended the area referred to by the airport authorities but the points raised by the latter were valid as such the consultants were requested to carry out another study and recommend an alternative site away from the airport operations, Dr Mugenyia explained.

During the same meeting the Town Clerk, Mr Benjamin Kubo recommended that the Council Chief Valuer be asked to look into the question of locating an alternative site for refuse disposal before further action could be taken on the matter.

## M.P. HITS OUT AT BRIDGE TOLLS

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The Kilifi South M.P. Dr Chibule Wa Tsuma has suggested that the money the Government intends to collect by imposing tolls on the new Nyali Bridge could have easily and conveniently been collected by raising road licences all over the country. In a statement released in Mombasa the M.P. noted that apart from removing the burden of paying the money from the Coast residents the method of raising road licences in the country would have been a sure way of getting the money, as the process of manual collection left many loopholes for misappropriation.

## Middle East Markets 'Wide Open' to Kenya

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The opening of the Middle East market to Kenyan agricultural produce has been hailed as a step forward in the country's export promotion efforts. Speaking on the forthcoming visit by an Arab trade delegation to Kenya to buy coffee and vegetables, the vice-chairman of the Kenya National Chamber of Commerce Export/Import Committee, Mr Abdalla Zubedi said that "as an agricultural country the sale of Kenyan produce to this potentially big market is highly commendable".

He said that the proposed establishment of the Kenya/Arab joint chamber of commerce has shown signs of success by the coming of the Arab delegation later in the month. Mr Zubedi, who is also the managing director of Mwangi Coffee Exporters Company said that his committee and the company has done intensive publicity campaign both in Europe and the Middle East aimed at selling Kenyan produce, particularly coffee. Mwangi Coffee Exporters has hosted two large trade missions to Kenya, said Mr Zubedi.

Announcing the coming of the Arab coffee buyers to Kenya the Saudi Arabian Embassy Counsellor in Nairobi Mr Fawaz Hassan Jaukhdar said this was a sign of increasing trade between the two countries. He added that Arabs were interested in investing in Kenyan's vegetables and cattle industry.

## COAST FARMS 'PLUNDERED BY WILDLIFE'

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Wildlife had adverse effects on ranching development in the Coast Province especially during the dry seasons last year, Mr Peter Ole Sadera, the Provincial Range Officer has said. In his annual report for 1979, just released, Mr Sadera stated that apart from plundering and depleting the available forage, the wildlife were also responsible for the destruction of water dams, reservoirs and consumption of the available water during the dry seasons.

He said that compensation in some cases were delayed after application and thus frustrated the efforts of the local District Wildlife Compensation Committees.

The Provincial Range Officer however said that although the year was a very difficult one due to the dry conditions and the worldwide inflationary trends, operating ranches survived and new ones were established.

He attributed this success to the cooperation between the extension officers in the ranching division, government departments and the farmers.

Mr Sadera stated that during the earlier part of the year, there was plenty of rain throughout the Province as a result the status of grazing improved tremendously.

However, towards the later half of the year, the situation changed as the ensuing dry periods spell fire in several ranches.

Sagalla Ranch in Taita/Taveta District was virtually wiped out by fire while Taru Ranch in Kwale was also heavily affected during the dry seasons when over 20,000 acres in the Kenya triangle ranch was also burnt, Mr Sadera said.

The sources of these fires were attributed to honey hunters, uncontrolled burning of adjacent reserve, and poachers.

WUNDANYI (K.N.A.) — Taita County Council of Taita Taveta has held a special full meeting to consider a memorandum the Minister for Local Government on the elevation of Wundanyi Trading Centre to the status of Urban Council.

KWALE (K.N.A.) — Mwacheni Primary School in Taita Location of Kwale District has received materials worth K.57,470 from the Cooperative of American Relief Everywhere (C.A.R.E.). The Tiwi branch chairman Mr Hamisi Jefe disclosed that the organisation had also donated materials worth over Shs. 27,000 earlier and the organisation has promised to assist many schools in the District including Mwalugulu Primary School, Tiwi Social Hall and Tiwi Football Ground.

LAMU (K.N.A.) — Lamu Grammar Secondary School students have been asked to improve their academic performance because previous examination results from the school were not impressive. The chairman of the school board of governors, Mr G. Miringi who is also Lamu District made this remark when he toured the school.

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — African Independent Pentecostal Church of Africa is to put a Cathedral in Mombasa to serve as the headquarters, their churches in Mpeketoni, Lamu, Lungalunga-Kwaha, Kisumu-Mombasa, Golanzi-Duruma.

WUNDANYI (K.N.A.) — D.C. for Taita Taveta Mr Ar Bore has appealed to farmers to plant food crops during present rains. Mr Bore said that it was important for farmers to make use of rains that have started in the District and added in addition to planting the normal food crops, farmers should plant draught resistant crops.

KWALE (K.N.A.) — A team of educationists from Pan African Literacy Societies has toured Kwale District to start activities carried out in literacy classes in the District. The team made up of participants from all over Africa have been finalising their three-week seminar at Kana Holiday Camp and, during their visit, Shimoni Women group where they inspected handicrafts made by women.

LAMU (K.N.A.) — The Family Planning Association of Kenya (F.P.A.K.) have formed a branch at Mpeketoni, Lamu District, and elected Council Simon Ndung'u Kamanu branch chairman. Association now has branches in Lamu District.

## HORTICULTURAL MARKET PLANNED FOR MOMBASA

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Plans are underway to establish horticultural market in Mombasa. The project to be built in three phases is estimated to cost a total of Shs. 48.7 million when completed.

The market will be owned by the Mombasa Municipal Council. However, an external management body comprising of Ministries of Agriculture, Co-operatives, Local Government and the Municipality may have to be formed to see to the construction, policy formulation and implementation, at least for the first two to five years.

The project would require about 22 acres of land. A suitable site has already been identified in Kisauni near the cemetery. The Municipal Council has initiated loan acquisition process in respect of the affected plots one of which belongs to Government while the others is privately owned. When negotiations go through, the plots should be vested with the Council.

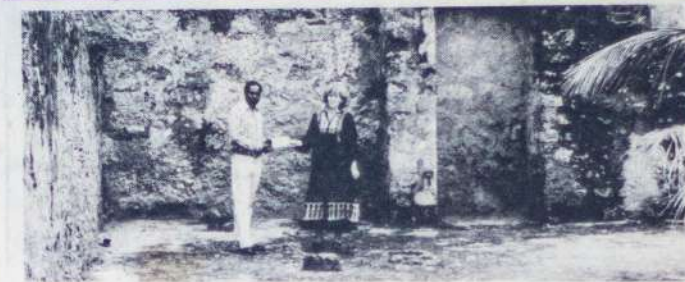
## MISTER MAGIC ...

## Welcome boost for Fort Jesus restoration

FRIENDS OF Fort Jesus announced recently that half the Shs. 30,000 needed for the restoration of the old Arab house in the Fort has already come in. Major donors so far have been Barclay's Bank, and the Arab businessman Mr Abdalla Zubedi, both of whom have given Shs. 4,000.

Smaller sums "but none the less most welcome, and we are enormously grateful for them" says Friends' vice-chairman, Judith Schofield, have come from Crindlays Bank, Pollman's Tours and Safaris, United Touring Company, and Flamingo Tours.

The project towards which this money has gone is to restore and renovate the Arab house as an exhibition centre. Heavy-duty electrical cable, special lights, and display units are to be purchased and installed.

Much of the work has already been carried out free of charge by Williams Africa Limited, the electrical contracting firm, whose chairman Mr Roy Williams has contributed his firm's labour and his own time in supervision.

All money received is being accounted for by F.O.F.J. treasurer Mrs Ann Nicklin.

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## The Emerging Industrial Power

"India is on the move and the old order passes. Too long have we been passive spectators, or even the playthings of people more and we shall make the history of our choice. Let us all join in this mighty task and make India, the pride of our hour, great among nations, the judgement in the arts of peace and progress. The door is open and destiny beckons to all."

Jawaharlal Nehru,  
New Delhi, 7th September, 1948

Before 1947, the only industries of any significance were jute, cotton textiles, tea, coffee, and rubber plantations characteristic of a tropical colonial economy; a few engineering shops; and some coal mining developed in association with the railroads. Most of the requirements for manufactured goods were imported. Since then, most industrial imports have been displaced by local manufacturers. India is now completely self-sufficient in the manufacture of machinery needed by its major industries — cotton textiles, jute, sugar, chemicals, paper and cement. Manufacturers range from aircraft, ships, automobiles, steam, diesel and electric locomotives, through power generation and transmission equipment, heavy electrical machinery, construction equipment, tractors, trucks, turbines and boilers, machine tools and precision ball bearings. Major electrical products for domestic and industrial use are also being made in the country.

India has gone beyond the bicycle and transistor era, and now produces refrigerators, household appliances, TV sets, electronic calculators and stereo equipment, some of which are exported to other countries. Due to the determination of the government to build a modern, self-reliant nation, the infrastructure for rapid industrial growth was firmly laid in the first two decades of economic planning. Many of the basic drugs and chemicals, which used to be imported even in the 1960s, are now produced in the country. Beginnings have been made in the fields of computer systems and sophisticated consumer and professional electronics.

India figures in the top world bracket for a number of industrial products — first in cotton yarn (annual production has risen from 1.17 billion pounds in 1950-51 to 2.2 billion pounds in 1978-79); second in the production of scooters (from nothing in 1950 to about 200,000 in 1978-79); fifth in the production of coal (104.7 million tonnes in 1977-78); sixth in manufacture of sugar; eighth in rayon and acetate filaments; ninth in the output of pig iron; ferrous alloys, manganese, caustic soda, fertilizers (practically nil in 1950-51; 3.0 million tonnes in 1978-79) and cement (19.4 million tonnes currently, against only 2.73 million tonnes in 1950-51); tenth in soda ash; twelfth in power generation; thirteenth in crude steel and aluminium; and fourteenth in sulphuric acid and tires.

Three companies — the Indian Oil Corporation, Bharat Heavy Electricals and the Steel Authority of India — figure in *Fortune's* list of industrial giants outside the United States.

It is noteworthy that this progress has been achieved in the face of numerous difficulties including three wars, six years of drought and, more recently, the oil crisis, which pushed up the import bill for crude oil and petroleum products from about \$255 million in 1971-72 to \$700 million in 1973-74, and \$2.5 billion in 1978-79. (Crude oil and petroleum products account for 40% of the country's total import bill.) In 1980-81, the import of petroleum and petroleum products alone is expected to cost the country a staggering \$6.25 billion, or roughly 70 per cent of its total export earnings.

### Oil Exploration

The country has met with considerable success in tackling the energy crisis — partly by switching to coal and by conservation, and, more importantly, by a sharply intensified oil exploration program, both onshore and off-shore.

Oil was discovered some years ago in deep waters off the Western coast near Bombay. The Indian Oil and Natural Gas Commission conducted the drilling and installed and operated the production facilities. The "Bombay High" field now produces 3 million tonnes (1 metric tonne = 0.98 ton) annually, and is expected to reach 10 million tonnes in a couple of years.

At present, about 60% of the country's oil requirements are imported — 16.8 million tonnes out of an annual consumption of 28.5 million tonnes. With ten oil refineries India is self-sufficient in its oil refining capacity, which is expected to increase to 37 million tonnes by 1980-81.

### Infrastructure

Power: Considerable attention has been

given to the creation of infrastructure facilities. From only 1.9 million kilowatts of installed capacity in 1947, electricity generation was nearly doubled to 3.4 million kilowatts in 1956 with the commissioning of a number of major hydroelectric projects. The installed capacity has now been increased to about 29 million kilowatts, including thermal (17.6 MW hydroelectric (10.8 MW) and nuclear energy (0.6 MW). India is twelfth in world electricity production and exports power generation and transmission equipment to several countries on a turnkey basis.

Rural electrification has proceeded apace — 239,000 villages, or 43% of the whole, have been electrified. In at least four states over 95% of all villages have electricity.

**Railroads:** The railroad system, the largest in Asia and fourth largest in the world, was consolidated and streamlined after 1947. The route length is about 38,000 miles. The electrified route length has increased eleven times since 1950, and the country manufactures in entire requirement of locomotives — diesel and electric — and all other rolling stock, with over 90% domestic content. It exports rail systems to several countries, including Syria, Yugoslavia, Malaysia, Nigeria and Tanzania.

**Road Transport:** The road network is one of the largest in the world and has been tripled in length since 1950, from 250,000 miles to 760,000 miles. Since 1947, the total number of motor vehicles has increased 11 times; it is now 3.3 million.

Every type of road vehicle — trucks, tractors, cars, motorcycles, scooters, bicycles — is manufactured in the country. The scooter and bicycle industries, which cater to the needs of the common man, have received preferential treatment and found export markets in Asia, Africa and the Middle East. Indian scooters are also being produced in joint ventures based in Indonesia and Taiwan.

**Shipping:** The country is the second largest ship-owner in Asia. Its vessels, totalling 5.3 million tonnes (1 metric tonne = 0.98 ton) GRT, operate from 10 major ports and more than 160 intermediate and minor ports along the 3700 miles of coastline. More important is the fact that India is also a shipbuilding nation. Three shipyards build merchant vessels, ships, barges, dredgers and coasters. The fourth, now nearing completion at Cochin on the southwest coast, will build ships of 85,000 DWT and repair ships of up to 100,000 DWT.

**Aviation:** Going beyond the earth and the blue waters, India's transport industries have also taken to the air. Hindustan Aeronautics, with eleven factories in six locations, manufactures jet fighters, although most of the commercial aircraft used by the national carriers are still imported. There are four international airports and eighty five other airports in the country.

**Telecommunications:** These have grown enormously in scope and sophistication in the last three decades. All telephones and most of the exchange equipment are manufactured locally, mostly by the Indian Telephone Industries at Bangalore. The first computer-controlled telephone exchange began commercial operation in 1979. A factory at Madras makes teleprinters. The external telecommunications services are handled by the Overseas Communications Service (OCS) which provides telegraph services to the outside world, telephone services to 182 destinations, radio services to 164 and radiotelephone services to 54, all through satellite and high frequency radio circuits. Using India's first satellite earth station, commissioned in 1971, the OCS operates through INTELSAT over the Indian Ocean. For the second satellite earth station at Dehra Dun, commissioned in February 1977, the ITI, Bangalore designed, manufactured and delivered the entire microwave equipment, thus becoming one of the few manufacturers in this field in the world.

### KEY INDUSTRIES

**Steel:** In the areas vital for a solid, diversified industrial base, the country has made steady progress. The massive investments made in the first two decades since 1947 in capital-intensive, long-gestation projects such as steel mills, have begun to pay off. There are currently six integrated steel plants which produced 6.2 million tonnes (1 metric tonne = 0.98 ton) of ingot steel (7.2 million tonnes of finished steel) and 9.3 million tonnes of pig iron in 1978-79. Three other plants are to be set up; they will be designed and their equipment manufactured locally. Alloy, tool and special steels are also manufactured locally. Except for a few special categories,

Within a span of three decades, India has emerged as one of the first ten industrialized nations in the world. This is largely as a result of the sustained drive to build industries of strategic importance and basic nature, including steel, shipbuilding, railroads, heavy electricals, petrochemicals and machine-building complexes.

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# Economic Progress

In a tribute to the country's remarkable economic progress, President Jimmy Carter said in New Delhi on January 2, 1978: "What is far less well understood is the degree to which India's social and economic policy has been a success. In the single generation since your independence was gained, extraordinary progress has been made. India is now a major industrial power. Your economy ranks among the few largest in the world. It is virtually self-sufficient in consumer goods, in a wide variety of iron, steel products." President Carter also praised India's success in boosting food production: "After a decade of importing grain, India now stands with a surplus of nearly 20 million tonnes (1 metric tonne = 0.98 ton). This is a tribute to the growing productivity of your agriculture and the competence of your administrative service."

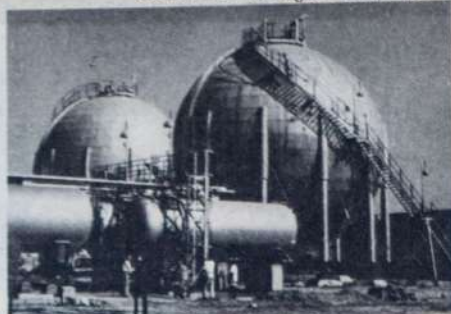
Shortly after 1947, India embarked on an era of planned economic development. The aim of economic planning has been to progressively increase agricultural and industrial production while ensuring that the fruits of economic development are more equitably distributed to benefit as large a cross-section of society as possible.

While the country has welcomed and been grateful for external assistance in its economic development, over 95% of the funds needed for development have been raised internally through domestic savings. In recent years, out of an aggregate net investment of 16.1% of the national income, domestic savings accounted for 15.5% and the net inflow of foreign resources for only 0.6%.

While much still remains to be done in overcoming the problems of unemployment and inadequate purchasing power, the country can draw satisfaction from the impressive strides it has made in the last thirty years in boosting production and giving its people a better quality of life and hope for the future.

In the aftermath of the recent general elections, the government is committed to implementing an action-oriented program for increasing industrial and agricultural production and bringing about rapid socio-economic transformation. The program includes effective steps to bring down prices and improve production, procurement and distribution of essential commodities and increase electrical power generation. Steps are also to be taken to ease investment procedures and increase worker participation in industry.

The government's action-oriented program also includes concrete measures to improve living standards of the poor by provision of low cost housing and housing sites and reviewing the minimum wages of agricultural workers. The rural population is also to benefit by rapidly increasing the country's irrigation potential and tapping more underground sources of water.

The country is self-sufficient in steel and metal products and even a net exporter in a small way.

**Engineering:** In 1947 the output of engineering industry, solely in the light and medium categories, was only \$625 million. The growth since then has been dramatic, currently producing goods worth over \$5 billion. They include steel plants, coal mining, sugar mill, chemical, pharmaceutical and cement machinery, as well as equipment for fertilizer plants, power generation and transmission, earth moving, construction and machine tools.

**Machine Tools:** The growth of machine tools has been truly spectacular. From nothing in 1947, 118 major units now produce \$150 million worth of machine tools annually, which are exported even to the USA and West Europe — a tribute to the degree of sophistication and precision attained by the industry. Exports in this field

have risen by over 300% over the last six years.

**Electronics:** Electronics production began in 1956, when "Bharat Electronics" started manufacturing just two items. Since then the company has diversified its products from tiny transmitters to highly sophisticated radar; it manufactures radio and TV receiving valves, germanium and silicon transistors and diodes, X-ray tubes and TV picture tubes. Another plant is being set up for the manufacture of night-vision electronic equipment. There are also numerous privately owned smaller enterprises which produce a wide variety of electronic equipment and components.

**Exports:** The range and sophistication of engineering is reflected in the substantial growth of exports of engineering goods. The share of manufactured goods has risen steadily and now accounts for more than

half the country's total exports. Much of the dynamism has come from the engineering industry. Exports of plant, machinery and equipment rose from \$17 million in 1961 to \$163 million in 1970-71. By 1974-75, due to the increasing emphasis on export promotion, they had increased to \$693 million and in 1978-79 reached \$856 million. This has encouraged the industry to set an export target of \$2.6 billion for 1984-85. Other new export manufactures include iron and steel, railway wagons, petroleum products, plastics, chemicals and consumer durables such as TV sets, refrigerators, sewing machines, bicycles and electronic calculators.

In open competition with the developed countries, India has achieved significant success in markets in the Middle East, Africa and Asia, selling textile and spinning mill machinery, machine tools, commercial vehicles, steel products and consumer durables. These successes have been complemented by service contracts providing skilled Indian labour for installation and maintenance, and going all the way to turnkey projects and consultancy services. In this last, consultancy firms, whose business is growing at an average of 30% annually, have secured contracts in Latin America, Europe and even in the LIS, thus taking Indian expertise to the very doorstep of the pioneers in this field.

### The Traditional Industries

These include the cotton textile, silk and jute industries which had made India a land of legendary wealth. Notwithstanding the emphasis on modern industry, the traditional manufactures have not been neglected.

Cotton yarn production has doubled to 2.48 million lbs., the highest in the world, since 1947. The output of mill-made cotton cloth reached 4.30 billion yards in 1976-77, besides another 4.4 billion yards in the handloom and powerloom sectors. The handloom industry ranks next in importance only to agriculture in employment potential, and 9 million persons depend on it for their livelihood. Powerlooms are a recent development — over 300,000 are now in operation.

Despite reaching an export level of \$250 million in 1976-77, the jute industry has faced problems in the international market due to the spread of jute substitutes and fluctuations in international jute prices.

**Sugar:** This is the second ranking agro-industry and is notable for the remarkable expansion of sugar manufacturing cooperative societies. In 1976, 103 factories out of 252 were owned by cooperative societies, accounting for 48% of the total output of 42.5 million tonnes (1 metric tonne = 0.98 ton). The next year, this reached 48 million tonnes. The country is not only self-sufficient in sugar but is also an exporter.

**Handicrafts:** The production of handicrafts — backed by centuries of matchless skill and craftsmanship — is now thriving after having been rescued from steady decline in the pre-independence period. The current production is around \$625 million annually. The range is incredible from gold and silver filigree and exquisite gem-set jewelry to elaborate lacquer work and wood carvings with ivory inlay, from the splendid bronzes and ivory statuettes of the South to the silk carpets of Kashmir, unrivalled for their beauty. Handicraft exports shot up from \$28 million in 1967-68 to around \$325 million in 1977-78. Handicrafts have the additional virtue of providing extensive employment opportunities — 1.8 million workers are now so employed. The further development of village handicrafts, by providing part or full-time, non-agricultural employment, helps check the exodus to the cities that seems to be one of the unfortunate side effects of industrial progress.

## The late Mzee Daudi Mbogori

MZEE Daudi Mbogori, a well-known Mombasa businessman who died on Friday, July 25, at the age of 71 was buried on his farm at Gikumene, Ntakira Location, Meru, on Saturday August 2, following a morning service in Nairobi at Charles New Church.

A large gathering of family and friends from both Meru and Mombasa, numbering close to 2000 persons, attended the Methodist Service held at the tomb-site just below his country mansion-homestead.

Nearly 100 vehicles were parked at the scene.

In addition to his wives (he married four times), his 19 children and 16 grandchildren, various prominent personalities attended the ceremony from Meru, Nairobi, Mombasa and elsewhere.

Among those who offered eulogies were the former Minister of Lands and Settlement, Mr Jackson Angane (and father-in-law of the late Mr Mbogori's son, Peter), the present M.P. of Meru northwest Mr Nteere Mborori (not a relative), and Mr Mwai Karani, a former business partner of the late Mzee Daudi and himself a prominent Mombasa merchant.

Speakers pointed out to the hushed gathering that the late Mr. Mbogori was the first notable African businessman in Meru, and the first prominent Meru businessman in Mombasa, where he originally worked as a Police Officer in the 1930's and '40's.

He later spent three years in detention during the Emergency but upon his release continued to develop his various businesses, primarily in bar ownership and spirits' distribution.

Mvita Beer Distributors (Mombasa) and Kaura and Rwitio (Meru) are two companies he was associated with.

Though based at the Coast where he generously assisted in affairs of his church, he was nonetheless an active harambee donor to projects in the Meru area, and encouraged many younger African businessmen to follow his path of commercial enterprise.

As his friends said at his graveside, his time on earth may be over, but his children, generous deeds, and business successes will live on.

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# ERROL ON FOOD

## BETTY LESLIE MELVILLE'S BEST AVOCADO DRESSING

The classic dressing to serve with Avocado prawns is of course, a Vinaigrette. Everyone has his favourite variation. Quite one of the best dressings I have ever come across was in Betty Leslie Melville's home at Kure, many years ago when she and her husband Jack had just started out on their highly successful crusade of saving the Rothschild Giraffe.

### AVOCADO BETTY LESLIE MELVILLE:

Allow half an avocado per serving. The dressing can be made up and will keep indefinitely in the refrigerator, and may also be used for grapefruit with equal success.

- 2 tablespoons poppy seed
  - 1 onion finely chopped
  - 2 tablespoons wine vinegar
  - 4 tablespoons olive oil
  - 3-4 tablespoons sugar
  - freshly ground black pepper
  - 2 teaspoons dry mustard
  - salt
  - 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- Place all the ingredients, except the poppy seed, in a blender and puree for a few minutes. Check seasoning. Add poppy seed and blend again; the poppy seed should cloud the sauce.

Keep covered in a jar in the refrigerator until required. Spoon over chilled grapefruit or ripe avocados. If the sauce should separate just beat well before serving.

### AVOCADO MOUSSE:

This will serve as a dip for parties as well.

- 2 ripe avocados
- 3/4 carton of sour cream
- Juice of half a lemon

3 tablespoons of sweet sherry or wine

Cut the avocados in half lengthwise in the usual manner. Scoop out the flesh with a spoon. Mash until quite smooth. Add the cream, lemon and sherry. Mix to a smooth stiff consistency.

Cover and keep in the fridge to prevent discolouring until required.

### AVOCADO RING WITH SHRIMPS AND MUSHROOMS:

- 3 large avocados (1 ripe and 2 firm)
- 1/4 pint of mayonnaise
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1/2 ounce gelatine
- 1 pound mushrooms
- French dressing
- 1/2 pint stock
- 3 tablespoons whipped cream
- 1 small grated onion
- 1/3 pint water
- 1 pound shrimps or prawns
- garlic and seasoning

Soften the gelatine in a bowl in lemon juice, dissolve in hot water. Place in a large bowl. Mash ripe avocado and grate the two firmer ones, with stainless steel grater and add to gelatine in bowl.

Add onion, mayonnaise, cream, salt and pepper. Wet a ring mould and pour the mixture in. (Some cooks like to add a dash of green colouring before putting in the mould but I think the pallid green is pretty enough not to warrant this) Chill.

Simmer mushrooms in a little stock, drain and chill. Add one crushed clove of garlic to a French dressing.

Pour this over the prawns and mushrooms which you have combined but take care not to damage the ingredients in doing so.

Invert avocado ring onto appropriate serving dish. Fill the centre with the mushroom and prawn salad. Serves 8.

### AVOCADO AND STRAWBERRY DESSERT:

This looks pretty and takes no time at all to make apart from the time required for the sherry to seep into the avocado. Also it makes a nice surprise for one's guests who are generally used to eating avocado pears strictly as first courses!

Allow half an avocado pear per serving. Have sufficient strawberries to fill their cavities. Score the flesh of each half when you have removed the stone. Sprinkle with a little lemon juice, then sugar and then add sherry.

Fill with strawberries and more sugar. Stand until ready to serve. Extra sherry can be added just before bringing to the table. Cream looks pretty piped round the edge of each pear but is not strictly necessary.

# ROUND TABLE TO ESTABLISH SPECIAL SCHOOLS

In commemoration of the national year of the disabled persons in Kenya the Mombasa Round Table No 3 is at present studying the possibility of establishing the first ever secondary school in Eastern and Central Africa for the physically disabled students which is estimated to cost about Shs five million.

Making the announcement during a televised press conference at Sauti House the chairman of the Round Table Mr Dieter Klaus Guenther explained that the school will offer business education and

technical skills in order the disabled participate contribute to various of the economic and social in their society.

He was launching stickers which have been designed to arouse awareness of the plight disabled persons in the and promote efforts rehabilitation of unfortunate members society.

### STICKERS

The stickers are available in two sizes, four inches diameter, and selling at Shs 2/= a set.

Mr Guenther stated a first phase the school will have an intake capacity of 50 students.

Noting that the problem of disability is far more widespread than generally recognized, Mr Guenther stated that the Round Table will spare no efforts to help the disabled persons in their daily life in the country.

"I have in mind for the improvement of access to public buildings, transportation, information and education public of the physically disabled and other effective measures for prevention of disability.

### EXPANSION

In the past the Round No. 3 has been involved in the establishment of the Clinic at Port Reitz, the Workshop for the disabled which has already been handed over to the A.P.D.K. at S.O.S. Children's Village.

Mr Guenther explained his organisation was looking into ways to raise more a major expansion of the Reitz Polio Clinic.

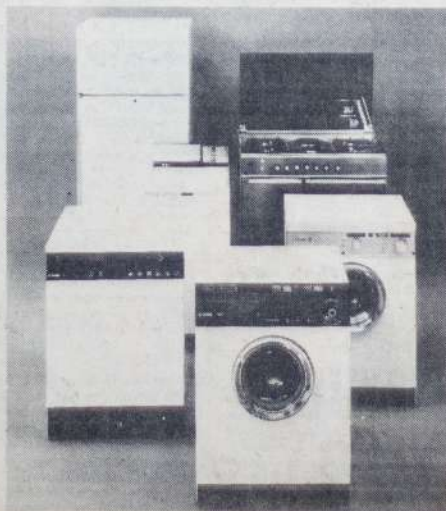

## 75 Million Bottles of Beer ...

THE Kisumu brewery is the largest single development project ever undertaken by Kenya Breweries Limited.

The brewery is being developed on a 40 acre site in the Kisumu municipal area.

The first construction phase will consist of a fully integrated facility consisting of a brewhouse, two bottling lines, malt and sugar storage, steam raising and refrigeration plant and other services, full and empty case stores, garage and workshops, administrative and welfare buildings.

Completion of the first phase of the project will cost about K£13 million.

Production will be 250,000 cases a month or 75 million bottles of beer a year. In subsequent phases output will be raised to one million cases a month.

Start up is planned for early in 1982.

First phase of the project will give direct regular employment to more than 500

local people and a similar number during construction.

The brewery will incorporate the latest technology and state of art. Conception, design, planning, procurement and project management is being undertaken by the technical services division of East African Breweries Limited and its subsidiary company, Masterplan Limited.

Site preparation and preliminary works have been undertaken by Mowlem Construction Company Limited.

The new Kisumu brewery will cost about K£14 million. Production is expected to begin in June 1982 at 250,000 cases a month rising to one million cases at full production.

Total direct and indirect employment attributable to Kenya Breweries Limited activities is 55,141 persons (equivalent full time).

Kenya Breweries Limited employs directly 5,450 persons. They receive salaries, wages

and benefits amounting to K£5.36 million a year.

Indirectly Kenya Breweries Limited creates jobs for the equivalent of a further 10,591 people employed full time in sectors supplying input to Kenya Breweries Limited.

There are 9825 licences (shops, bars, clubs, etc.) which handle Kenya Breweries Limited products. The equivalent full time work force in this sector on Kenya Breweries Limited account is estimated at 59,300.

Average earnings of Kenya Breweries Limited employees is K£1553 a year compared with an average in the private sector of K£656 and K£602 in the public sector.

Some 8.6 per cent of all people employed in the agriculture, manufacturing and wholesale/retail trade owe their jobs directly or indirectly to Kenya Breweries Limited.

The Company's tax contribution on its own account in 1978/79 was K£44.69 million of which excise was K£14.93 million and sales tax K£26.98 million.

Excise and sales tax together represent more than 73 per cent of G.V.A. created directly by Kenya Breweries Limited.

Total tax contribution attributable to the whole of the Company's manufacturing activities amounted K£47.90 million.

This tax yield was enough to meet all of the governments recurrent and development expenditure on Health (K£43.2 million) or nearly sufficient for the country's annual Defence Bill (K£56.3 million).

Kenya Breweries Limited's direct foreign exchange earnings are very small (K£142,548) and direct expenditure is considerable at K£58.8 million.

But the foreign exchange picture is not as bleak as it looks because Kenya Breweries Limited products are bought by visitors to the tune of K£1.1 million and there is an import substitution value estimated at K£29.8 million.

The net foreign exchange effect is in fact favourable and amounts to about K£22.2 million a year.

Direct and indirect foreign exchange used in production is K£6.13 million. This is equivalent to rather less than 30 cents a bottle.

There are many references to 'Gross Value Added' (G.V.A.). G.V.A. is significant measure of the performance of an enterprise in relation to the whole economy of a country. 'Gross Domestic Product' is the total of G.V.A. of all enterprises including farming and self employed people.

## How Kenya Breweries hope to enter the International markets

KENYA BREWERIES Limited is a wholly owned subsidiary of East African Breweries Limited engaged in the production and marketing of lager beers and Guinness Stout.

The Company operates four brewery units, three of them in the Nairobi area and one in Mombasa. Tusker Ruaraka brewery is among the largest and most efficient in Africa. The Company is currently expanding by investing in a new brewery at Kisumu.

Kenya Breweries runs its own barley growing scheme recognised as among the most successful of its kind. As a consequence, Kenya is self sufficient in malting barley production.

Malting grade barley is converted into malt at the Company's own maltings established in Nairobi's industrial area. A highly innovative barley syrup plant at Tusker Ruaraka makes use of lower grade barley.

The products brewed by the Company and marketed in Kenya are: Tusker Lager, White Cap, Pilsner, City Lager, Tusker Export, Tusker Premium, Guinness Stout. Total beer and stout brewed and bottled in 1978/79 exceeded two million hectolitres.

The Company takes exceptional measures to ensure consistent high quality and hygienic handling of its beers. All batch lots are subject to careful scrutiny in the Company's own quality control laboratories.

Kenya Breweries operates 19 depots throughout the country from which distributors draw their supplies. The Company itself is not engaged in any way in wholesale or retail marketing of their products.

Kenya Breweries operates the largest fleet of commercially owned heavy road vehicles in the country moving crated beers from individual breweries to depots.

An equated price structure is applied so that the price to the consumer is the same throughout the country. This is done by subsidising distribution costs in rural and remote areas.

White Cap is today Kenya's most popular beer. First introduced in 1948 the brand was not fully accepted by the public until some 30 years later when its popularity increased dramatically to displace Tusker as the lead brand.

Kenya's top quality Tusker Premium was introduced late in 1979 and took everyone (including Kenya Breweries) by surprise. Demand could not be fully met until production capacity was substantially increased in mid-1980.

Tusker Premium, a gold medal winner in international competition, is planned to lead Kenya Breweries thrust into the export market.

## 'PUBLIC COMPANY'

EAST AFRICAN Breweries Limited is a public company that traces its origins back to 1922 when the first brewery was established at Ruaraka on the outskirts of Nairobi.

The headquarters building of the Company which it shares with its wholly owned subsidiary, Kenya Breweries Limited, is located close to the site of the first brewery.

The present Tusker House, as it is known, was formally opened in 1973 by H.E. President Daniel arap Moi, at that time Vice-President of Kenya.

East African Breweries is unique among public companies in Kenya. It has nearly 25,000 shareholders by far the majority of which are individual small African investors. There are no preference shares or shares with

special rights and no single investor controls more than 10 per cent of the equity capital.

This issued share capital (all in ordinary shares of Shs. 10 each) exceeds K£14.8 million of which less than 13 per cent is held by foreign investors. The shares are quoted on the Nairobi Stock Exchange.

Fixed assets stand on the balance sheet (June 30, 1979) at K£25.8 million. Shareholders funds approach K£20 million and loan funds amount to K£8.5 million.

In addition to a 100 per cent shareholding in Kenya Breweries, the Company holds an equity stake in each of Tanzania Breweries Limited, Guinness East African Limited and Seychelles Breweries Limited.

The Technical Services Division provides a wide range of brewery project management and development services for Kenya Breweries and other companies in the East African Breweries Group.

Principal officers and executive directors of the Company are: K. S. N. Matiba, chairman of the Board; B. H. Hobson, deputy chairman and managing director; N. G. Ajana, financial director; C. Goodall, technical director; G. W. Teta, managing director, Kenya Breweries Limited, and G. F. Taylor, technical director, production.

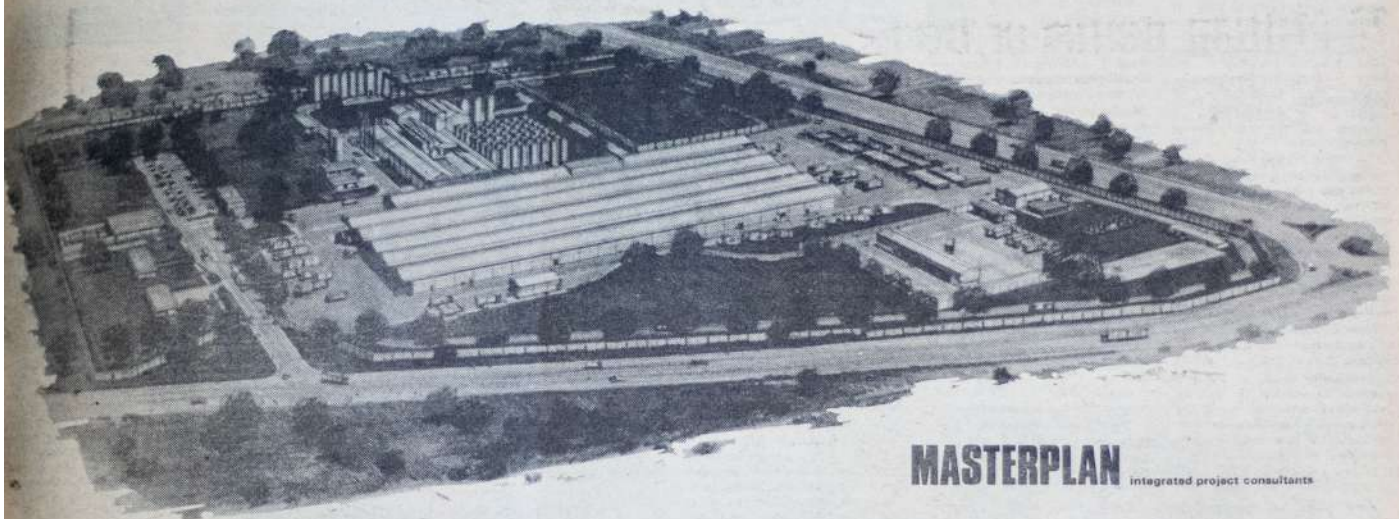

## BUSY PERIOD AS KILINDINI FACES RAINS

WITH A heavy list of arrivals aggravated by rainy conditions, Kilindini is presently experiencing a busy period with some interesting vessels in port. Last Sunday morning the Dutch flag 1580 ton heavy lift vessel *Daniella* arrived from India with 22 railway wagons for the Uganda Railways and berthed at 4/5.

Built in 1968 for the carriage of heavy lifts and bulky cargoes, she is very much a specialised vessel having 2 x 70 ton derricks, owned by appropriately, Jumbo Lines registered in Willemstad in the Dutch West Indies. She has the words 'Jumbo Line' written boldly across her blue hull with a house flag depicting an elephant.

Her funnel placed aft incorporated an additional navigating bridge built into the front of the funnel, an arrangement I have not seen before on a cargo vessel.

The railway wagons are being cleared by Maritime Forwarders (K) Ltd and the vessel is under the agency of Mitchell Cotts Kenya Ltd.

The Ellerman vessel *City of London* at No. 16 berth loading some 2,500 tons cargo, mainly tea for Avonmouth, is also loading a valuable Kenya export for Specialised Mouldings Ltd, Nairobi; this is an ocean going yacht of their *Samantha* 39 design weighing seven tons which arrived in the port this week having been transported on a low loader from Nairobi.

This is a fine example of quality workmanship which this country can produce.

### Saudi Vessel

The 14,000 ton deadweight green hullled Saudi Arabian vessel *Alhijazi* arrived last Monday from the U.S. Gulf to discharge 11,800 tons of bagged rice (all to be fumigated) at No. 13 berth.

Built 23 years ago, she

typifies a product from a German shipyard with the nineteen fifties appearance.

A first time caller at Kilindini is the 27,000 ton deadweight Norwegian flag *Bajka* discharging some 22,000 tons of Gypsum from Spain for the Bamburi Cement Company at Mbaraki Wharf.

She is one of the two bulk cargo sister ships built in 1972 equipped with their own deck gantry cranes with a discharge rate approaching 2,000 tons per day which is certainly one of the highest cargo movements for any vessel alongside Mbaraki Wharf.

At No. 11 berth the 13,700 deadweight ton *Pioneer* Contractor one of the four identical sister ships owned by the well known American shipping company, United States Lines, is discharging 12,100 tons of bulk maize and bulk wheat from Australia.

I think this is the first occasion when a United States Line cargo vessel has been seen in Mombasa.

This company, at one time, were in the forefront of the Transatlantic passenger trade when they owned the crack passenger liners *United States* and *America* both now sold and operated by Greeks.

The company now also operate a fleet of container vessels and are still one of the leading U.S. shipowners.

The Greek flag *St John* due this weekend has called at Mombasa on several occasions in a different guise as the Ellerman City Line vessel *City of Hull*.

She has recently been sold for a reported \$4,000,000 and has now been taken on time charter by Ellermans on their world wide liner service.

Manta Line vessels have been much in evidence in the port with three of their vessels loading and discharging, the *Palm Trader* at No. 1, the *Sisal Trader* at No. 13 and one of their latest acquisitions the *Box Trader* at No. 3 — an appropriate name as she was built in Spain for Manchester Liners Mediterranean container trade in 1972.

At time of writing four vessels remain idle, namely, at the buoys the oldest resident *Chrysovaloudou Dyo* which grounded whilst entering Kilindini on April 24 and whose owners have yet to decide her fate, the Greek tankers *Kristel* still undergoing generator repairs, whilst at Port Reitz, the Greek vessel *Finix* apparently still waiting for her sugar cargo and the 5,600 ton *Comara* also Greek, a victim of a grounding off Zanzibar last April and now awaiting disposal.

Expected yesterday or today off port limits is the 266,000 d.w.t U.S. flag tanker *American Spirit* to land a sick man.

Hopefully the services of a helicopter will be called upon.

## PORT NEARS NEW CARGO RECORD

THE Port of Mombasa handled a total dry general cargo of approximately 278,462 deadweight tons during the month of July, 1980.

So far this year, this performance is the second highest, rivalled only by the month of January when a total of 278,477 tons were handled.

The July throughput comprised of 216,281 tons of imports and 68,121 tons of exports. Compared to the preceding month of June the performance went up by 26,599 tons.

In June the port handled approximately 251,803 tons, made up of 186,960 tons of imports and 62,843 tons of exports.

In July 1979 the port performance was 165,040 tons — 86,527 tons of imports and 84,513 tons of exports; compared against the month of July this year, there is an improvement of 113,362 tons.

By the end of June this year the port had handled approximately 205,869 tons of maize, 111,466 tons of fertilizer and 49,980 tons of wheat.

More than 71 general cargo ships were worked at the port over the month of July.

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## BRIEFS

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Manpower training and development have been described as inevitable ingredients of rapid social and economic development of the country. The observation has been made by the general manager of the Coast Water branch Mr Onesmus Chige when he closed the eighth supervisory development course held at the Government Training Institute of Mombasa, which was attended by 17 executive officers from different Government departments.

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Following the recent successful re-planning of trade stands at the Mombasa Jomo Kenyatta Showground extra 47 stands have been created, the chairman of the trade stands sub-committee, Mr Kassim Owango has disclosed. Giving his report to the Mombasa Show committee meeting under the chairmanship of Mr Enoch M'rabu, Mr Owango said that as a result of the re-planning, the ground now had a total of 211 stands as opposed to 164 in the past.

HOLA (K.N.A.) — Tana River District Commissioner, Mr Moses Okal, has called upon the Cotton Lint and Seed Marketing Board to live up to its standards and ensuring that farmers do not lose their crop unnecessarily due to lack of ginning facilities. Mr Okal made the call in Hola when he addressed hundreds of farmers.

KILIFI (K.N.A.) — Small scale traders in Kilifi District owe the government Shs. 525,000 in the form of loans borrowed from the District Trade Development Board Joint Loan Board. This was revealed by the North Coast Trade Development Officer Mr Kenneth Mukinyago who warned that unless this money was repaid the board may be forced to take the selfish traders to court to recover the loans.

WUNDANYI (K.N.A.) — About one hundred vacancies were available at Mwatate Sisal Estate, according to the estate general manager Mr A. Loucaides. He said the jobs were created after several workers from up-country had run away to the sugar cane plantations in their home areas. The most affected area was the cutters division where most of the workers had left their jobs for the first few weeks without notice.

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Members of the Mombasa based Port Cooperative and Saving Credit Society will be paid dividends Shs. 2,600,000 from profits made by the society during 1978 and 1979. This was disclosed by the chairman of the Society Mr Festus Okumu when he addressed members of the Society at Patel Samaj Hall.

**TAVETA  
BILHARZIA  
REPORTS  
DISCLAIMER**

VOI (K.N.A.) — The alarming report recently published in a Sunday newspaper that 95 per cent of school age children in Taita Taveta District suffer from bilharzia has been refuted and termed as a gross exaggeration of the situation.

The area D.C. Mr Amos Bore has said that there were only a few isolated cases of the disease and the percentage was below one.

The report had quoted an Assistant Minister for Higher Education Mr Mwacharo Kubo as saying that 95 per cent of school age children in the District suffered from the disease.

Expressing concern at the amplification of the issue Mr Bore said all the reported cases of bilharzia had been dealt with and that the Ministry of Health was taking the necessary precautions to contain any disease outbreak.

After consultations with the District Education Officer Mr Alhandry and the Medical Officer of Health in the District Dr Okuogo, the D.C. termed the newspaper report as a false representation of facts.

"95 per cent means there are practically no children in school and this does not reflect a true picture of the situation" he said.

Mr Bore pointed out the few areas where bilharzia was prevalent because of the presence of stagnant water as those around Lake Jipe and Challa in Taveta Division, Mwatate Sisal Estate and Mwakinyungu in Wundanyi Division.

Further investigations revealed that 167 people patients had been treated for bilharzia between January and May this year but there had been no deaths.

**Elephants enjoy  
Bura Valley crops**

WUNDANYI (K.N.A.) — Elephants which were reported destroying food crops at Bura Valley in Taita Taveta District have been driven away by the Game Ranger. The animals were reported at various places in Bura location for the last two weeks where they caused damage to cassava, bananas, sugar cane and beans at Numan-Sechu and Bura Valleys.

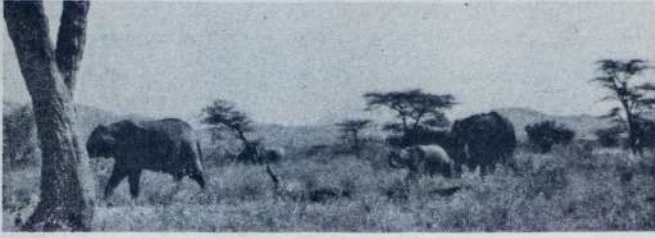

He urged people who were given plots at Tarasaa Trading Centre by Tana River County Council to start developing them and warned that those who fail to do so within six months of allocation would forfeit their plots to the Council.

Councillor Godana urged the people of Ngao Location to contribute towards the Harambee Fund for putting up permanent buildings in primary schools in the area and also appealed to C.P.E. graduates who failed to get form one places to join the Tarasaa Village Polytechnic so as to acquire skills which could help them to be self-employed.

## African Educators Seminar

**MOMBASA (K.N.A.)** — Plans are underway to teach and promote Kiswahili in literacy classes and a post literacy curriculum to be implemented in the language has already been designed by the department of adult education.

This observation was made by the Coast P.C. Mr Luka Daodi Galgalo when he crossed a three week seminar attended by adult education officers from eight countries of Africa South of the Sahara at the Kanamai Centre in Kilifi.

The seminar was organised and sponsored by the Afrolit Society based in Nairobi in conjunction with the department of Adult Education of the Ministry of Culture and Social Services to find ways and means of teaching English as a second language to newly literate adults.

Currently, Kenya is also involved in teaching English as a second language in the evening continuation classes in Mombasa and other Municipalities owing to the demand for English for effective communication in day to day affairs the P.C. told the participants.

Expressing the seriousness of Kenya's crusade to eradicate illiteracy by the year 1983 led by President Moi who announced the ambitious goal he said the Department of Adult Education is now in full swing to beat the target.

"Serious activity is going on in the department to eradicate this social ill" Mr Galgalo told the participants.

He said the programme would allow more wananchi to participate in different aspects of nation building.

Saying the element of communication in development was paramount, Mr Galgalo pointed out that "you cannot talk of meaningful participation of people in development efforts without addressing yourself to the question of language and communication".

The chairman of the seminar who was also representing Afrolit Mr John Burks told the P.C. and guests that the seminar was out to explore means of providing the newly literate adults with means to utilise their newly acquired skills.

He said the Afrolit Society was also trying to develop materials and find ways and means to teach teachers for the purpose of teaching English.

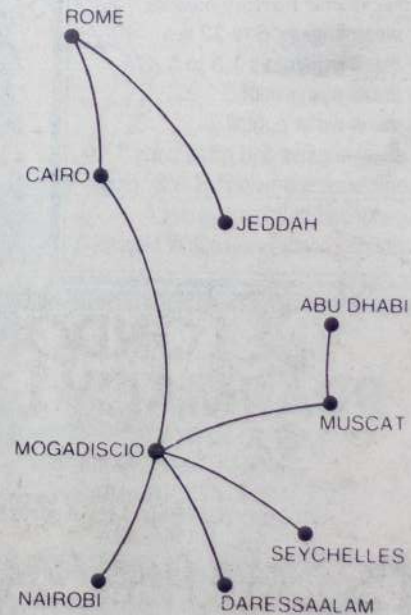

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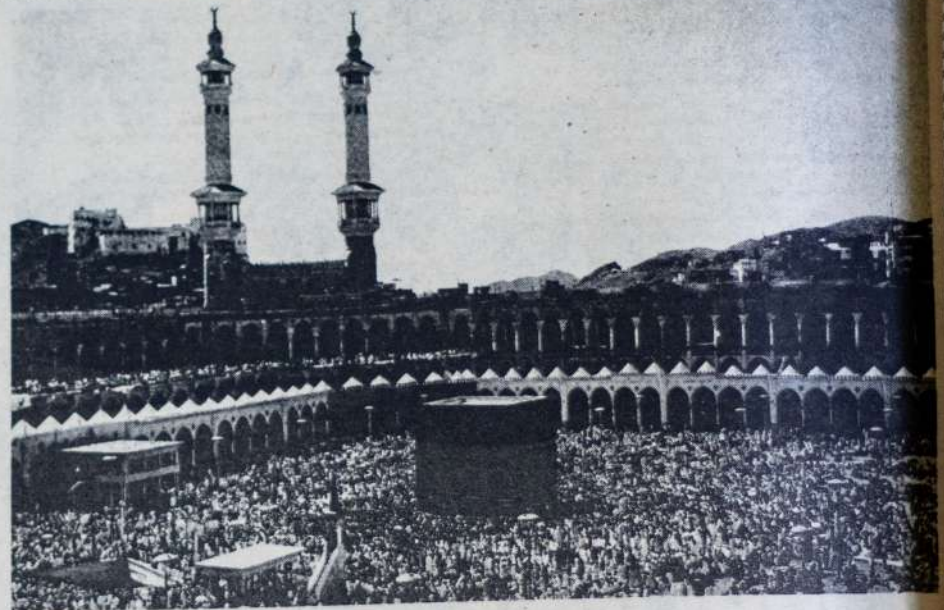

FASTING is one of the five fundamental articles of Islam.

It is an universal institution in as much as all the religions of the world and all the great religious personalities adopted fasting as the principal method of controlling and killing passions.

The Romans, the Babylonians, and the Assyrians practised fasting. So also do the followers of Hinduism, Jainism, Zoroastrianism and other religions.

The Jews observed an annual fast on the Day of Atonement in commemoration of the descent of Moses from Sinai.

The Prophet Moses qualified himself to receive revelation from a Secretariat office.

In fact, all the good activities of the Muslims relating to individual and national welfare can be done within the mosques.

If this is followed, it saves us from enormous expenses of erecting schools and colleges, council-chambers, warehouses and Secretariat offices.

This also goes successfully to meet the compulsory nature of primary education.

To a corner of the Prophet's mosque, a band of missionaries was attached called Ahli-Suffa who exclusively devoted themselves to divine service.

Thus there is a provision for missionary training in mosques together with a library.

In short, the mosque is the centre of all-round activities in Islam.

Activities, however, in the mosques shall be done in an atmosphere of purity, sincerity and absence of any noise, as mosques should be regarded as a house of Allah, and everything shall be done in the name of Allah.

House of Allah does not mean that Allah actually resides in it, but that Allah is much remembered therein.

It is allowable also to admit women in mosques. At the time of the Holy Prophet and the four-rightly-guided Caliphs, there was no bar of women entering the mosques for prayer in a different row or in a separate reserved place.

## FAZZUL KARIM explains FASTING

This practice is still found in the precincts of the Holy Ka'ba and the mosque of Medina.

The excellence of prayer is great as it is the foremost duty of a Muslim and the chief of the pillars upon which the grand superstructure God after forty days of fasting.

Jesus Christ fasted for 40 days in the desert and commanded his followers to fast (Mathew 4:6).

Therefore the institution of fasting is universal and existed in some form or other, till it fell into disuse owing to want of method, regularity and time.

The injunction of fasting was revealed in 9A.H. in Islam in the following verse:

O believers, fasting is prescribed for you as it was prescribed for those who were before you, that you may be righteous — a fixed number of days. But whoever of you falls sick or be upon a journey, there are other days of the same number — 2:183.

Islam gave the institution of fasting a finishing touch and introduced therein method, regularity and meaning which go together to make it perfect and ever-living.

Fasting will not die a natural death in Islam.

Like the institution of prayer, fasting is kept alive as it is observed every year in the world of Islam and forms

a regulating principle in their lives. Fasting was previously resorted to as a sign of grief or for commemoration of a great event.

The underlying idea was to propitiate an angry God. Islam abolished this pantheistic idea and introduced a highly developed significance — "that

you may guard against evil".

In other words, the chief object of fasting is to generate power of soul which can control unruly passions, just as a beast is brought under control by keeping it occasionally hungry and occasionally giving it food.

The same object of fasting has been expressed in the following traditions:

The cessation of my people is fasting — 34:473 W.

Who is not able to marry, let him keep fast, verily it is as if were castration for him — 27:3.

Thus fasting has been introduced as it kills the animal propensities in a man. Secondly, there is nothing to be eaten or taken or drink from the early dawn till the setting of the sun.

If anything, say a drop of water, is taken in, it produces no appreciable effect on mind as a result of hunger. It is thus a misnomer of fasting. Sexual intercourse is strictly prohibited during the time of fasting.

In other religions, this was not prohibited and therefore fasting has no effective check on passions.

Fourthly, fasting is methodical in Islam as in every month of Ramadhan, the young and the old, the rich and the poor, the literate and the illiterate — all have to fast with the same spirit of common brotherhood of God and universal brotherhood of man, while in other religions, it is not so.

Islam has not forgotten to reserve provisions for optional fasting at the choice of every Muslim. It has therefore kept the door of voluntary fasting open to all. Because of the want

of necessary compulsory provision, fasting in other religions is practically dead.

Islam saved this institution from death by making it obligatory.

This seasonal fasting is natural as the material world also undergoes such a fasting in a particular season of the year.

For some months, the earth is dried up by God, but He gives it good rain after the period. Thus the drying up of the body is also required in some particular time of the year.

For all these reasons, fasting has gained perfection in Islam.

As already stated, fasting brings passions under control. Passion is the root of all evils, and this can be regulated by the method of fasting.

In case of excessive food and drink, it rises its head and commits tremendous havoc in the spiritual world. It is a natural law that the more is the physical weakness of the body, the more is the weakness of passion.

A man having a strong urge of sexual passion is ordered to fast — 27:3. Daily practice of such fast with a little quantity of food taken at regular intervals will completely annihilate the sexual urge. Similar is the case with other evil tendencies.

The Almighty Allah created man and his passions. He knows the best medicines for passions and therefore He has prescribed fasting.

Our fasting does not profit God, nor does our eating; but when in His wisdom, He decreed fast, He did it that we may be given health of body and soul.

Fasting invigorates the soul and enlivens it from its lethargic state, while excessive eating makes it blind and dart just as excessive water destroys crops.

Excessive eating makes a man dull and stupid and deprives a man from the power of thinking. A hungry belly is, however, a fountain of wisdom. This has been the experience of many pious divines.

Fasting gives taste in



prayer. By the practice of fasting, taste in prayer is enjoyed. A full belly can never taste the sweetness of prayers and invocations. His prayer ends only in tongue and does not enter heart which is full with food.

Fasting, removes false sense of prestige. It removes pride, because a hungry man finds himself weak and naturally turns towards One who is strong. Hunger thus makes a man modest and turns the mind towards the Almighty for help.

It saves time and trouble. Fasting reduces the period of sleep and thus a great deal of time is saved for work. Excessive eating keeps a man engaged very often in taking food and responding to the frequent calls to nature, while this time can be saved by fasting.

Fasting saves money. Fasting saves expenditure and thus helps economy. This is no less useful to a worldly man having small means.

It greatly contributes to the preservation of health. Health improves a great deal by fasting. The great American physician Dr Dewey said: Take the food away from a sick man's stomach, and then you have begun to starve not the sick man but the disease.

The digestive organs are given some rest to work with redoubled energy and vigour just as a land which was left without cultivation for one year brings abundant crops in the year following, or just as a man can work with redoubled vigour after some rest. Spiritual progress depends on healthy mind which again depends on healthy body. Therefore the value of fasting for preservation of health is very great.

Fasting teaches democracy. It teaches democracy which is not even witnessed in prayer.

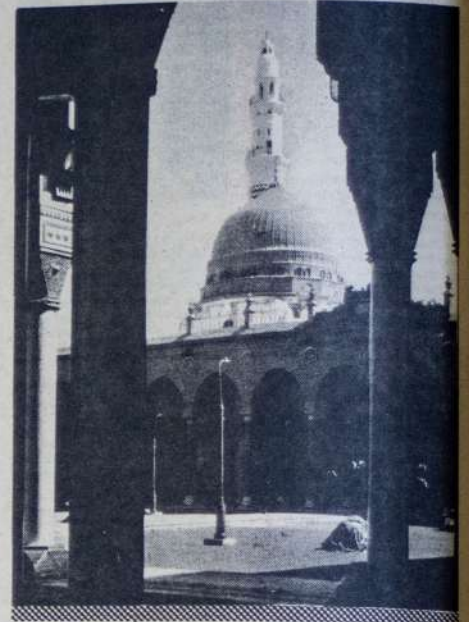
A king may pray with a beggar in the mosque, but at home he may lead quite a different life by taking foods at pleasure and by having sexual relations with women. Fasting, however, places all men, rich and poor, on the same pitiful plight of hunger and does not allow anybody to take food and drink or to have sexual relation in daytime.

Fasting teaches sympathy

for the hungry. Fasting is the only thing which gives a sense of pangs of hungry men in the mind of the rich. Thus this sense enkindles a spirit of kindness to the poor and the distressed. It also gives rise to the thought how the people will fare on the Resurrection Day when they will feel the greatest urge of hunger and thirst.

Fasting teaches moral discipline. Fasting is a training ground for the lesson that man, whatever his rank and position, is prepared to suffer the greatest privation and the hardest trial. This lesson is learnt from day to day. This practice really

contributes to the moral development of man. Fasting awakens a man to face the hardships of life and increases his power of resistance.

Fasting keeps faith in God a living force. A fasting man can easily satisfy himself by taking food or drink in the inner recesses of his house. There is ease to see him if he pours down some drops of water to his thirsty throat, but he feels that Allah is near him and so he restrains himself. Thus the entrance of Allah is felt closer and closer. This is not for once or twice but regularly for a whole month. In this way, faith in God is kept alive and a new consciousness of a higher life is awakened. For this, the Quran says:

Only the patient will be paid back their rewards in full without measure — 39:100.

**Compulsory Fast.** In all the principal ordinances of Islam, there are two sides, compulsory and optional. Here we are discussing about the compulsory fast. Fart or compulsory fast comes in pan only in the month of Ramadhan.

It commences with the new moon of Ramadhan and ends with the appearance of the new moon of Shawwal. The Quran was revealed in the month of Ramadhan and therefore it is

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In default of charity or sacrifice of an animal, a Muhrim is required to fast for three days for breach of certain duties (2:196Q)

If one breaks the Ihram before Haj, though he observed Ihram by combining Umrah and Haj together, he is required to fast for three days during the pilgrimage and seven days after the pilgrimage (2:196Q).

In case of breach of a vow, there is fast.

The above fasts assume a binding character on the occurrence of certain circumstances and in default of certain expiations.

Prophet's sayings about fasting: God says: Fasting is for Me and I shall certainly compensate it — 35:3. The fragrance of the mouth of a fasting man is more pleasant to Allah than the smell of musk — 35:3. When Ramadhan comes, the doors of heaven are opened and the doors of Hell are shut up and the devils are put under chains — 35:1. Whoso fasts Ramadhan out of faith and hopeful of reward, all his past sins will be forgiven — 35:3. Fasting is a shield. So when the fasting of any of you comes up, he shall not utter foul words, nor shall he cry hoarse. If then anybody rebukes him or fights with him, let him say: I am a man observing fast — 35:4. There is a night therein which is better than one thousand nights. Whoever is deprived of its good is deprived of all good — 35:9. Whoever does not give up false talk and action according to it, there is no need of Allah that he should give up his food and drink — 35:37.

fitting that this month should be observed for spiritual training.

In case of inability to fast, there is no compulsion. Those who are ill, or in journey, or those women who are in the course of menstrual discharge or pregnant or have suckling children at breast, have been exempted from fasting the Ramadhan but they are required to keep fast for the equal number of other days.

The following fasts have been enjoined as an expiation of breach of divine commandments.

- Two months' successive fast in case a Muslim killed a Muslim by mistake and the killer has not the means to free a slave (4:92Q).

- Two months' successive fast when the husband puts away the wife by saying: Thou art to me as the back of my mother (58:34Q).

- Three days' fast as an expiation for breach of an oath (5:89Q).

- Fasting if a Muhrim kills a game (5:95Q)

- Two months' fasting for breach of one fast of Ramadhan without lawful excuse.

- Fasting has also been recommended for breach of certain minor duties as compensation.

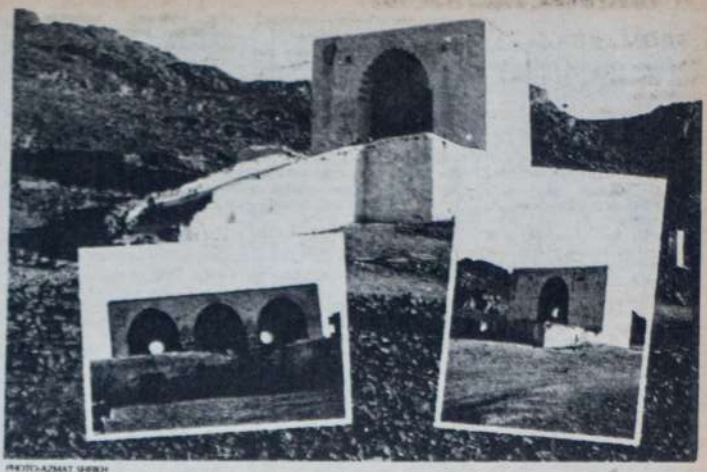

# THE POLICE MAY HAVE YOUR NUMBER

**COASTDRIVE** by JOHN GARDINER

In the last few weeks several Mombasa motorists have been stopped by Police and fined a hundred shillings for not having authorised registration number plates on their cars.

Apart from the usual feeling of "why me!", some victims were not aware that their vehicles fell short of the law's requirements.

A casual check on cars on the road showed which registration letters were being issued when the switch became necessary.

Volumes of the Kenya Gazette and Supplementary Legal Notices were borrowed from a friendly and reliable source and after an hours thumbing, all was revealed.

Legal Notice No. 9 issued on January 17, 1975 included the Traffic (Amendment) Rules 1975. Paraphrased, the notice had the following to say:

"Every motor vehicle registered after May 31, 1974 must be fitted with reflective plates.

The owner of a vehicle not carrying reflective plates on June 1, 1974 was required to apply for the new plates at the time when he next applied to re-licence his vehicle.

The only legal plates are those issued by the Registrar and carry the mark of authorisation. The charge for a set of plates was Shs. 55, and

the fine for non-compliance was "not more than Shs. 1,000

If your car has a registration earlier than KJT, and that includes all the KA series from KAA1 to KAZ999, it is likely to have the old style plates now frowned upon.

The ultimate test is, do your plates carry an adhesive rectangular tag, white in colour, carrying the words "Kenya Government Traffic Act" in green; a serial number in black and a black block?



If not, you can avoid a fine by paying Shs. 100 and your receipt will cover you until the plates are ready. Without the receipt you could run up quite a string of fines.

Incidentally, about a quarter of the pre KJT registration appear to have the non-

authorised plates, which gives the Traffic Police plenty of scope.

Who pays the fine when the vehicle in question belongs to a Government department, and finally does the Traffic Act apply to police patrol cars? Looks as though the Prison Industries, makers of the reflective plates, are going to have a busy time.

For those who are interested in sequences of car numbers, the current system commenced in January 1950, when Mombasa issued KAA1, Nairobi launched KBB, Kisumu KCC and so on. (Remember those pre-James Bond days when a car didn't require a double-0 in front of a single digit?)

Mombasa's KA series lasted until mid 1965, then KJ which ran until the beginning of 1978. The next set allocated to Mombasa was KT which ran as far as KTE before a puzzling switch to KSH numbers.

With KZZ999 coming up in the not so distant future, it is interesting to speculate on the Registrar of Vehicles plans. Will we follow the United Kingdom's example of reversing the sequence and using three digits followed by three letters, or tag a letter on the end, thus indicating the year of initial registration?

Britain has a few years of that system to run, and the Government has invited the public to offer suggestions on the new system.

Perhaps we could try the American system where the owners can choose his own sequence of letters and numbers which then can be transferred to a new car.

Personalised number plates have been all the rage for years in Britain, but there are combinations of letters that are not permitted on grounds of decorum. Any suggestions for an award of the plates that read "Twit 1"?

Over the last two weekends, Rauno Aaltonen, known to his fans as the "Flying Finn" has been running his car command courses in Nairobi.

Among those who felt that the Shs.3,000 fee was a wise investment was Mike Kirkland, Kenya's reigning Rally Champion. Each course lasted two days, and started with blackboard lectures on the dynamics of moving vehicles, including the effects of acceleration and braking while cornering.

The group then moved to the Embakasi track for demonstrations of driving on both dry and wet tarmac. Each driver went through the same manoeuvres and Rauno would then point out errors to the individual. The driver would then have a second chance with Rauno in the second seat.

The next step was a murrum autocross circuit of some 2 1/2 kilometres. Each driver was timed individually after which Rauno demonstrated his method of approaching corner, setting up the car and the fastest way of taking the carr through.

On the second day, the group drove down to Kajjado where a typical rally section had been set up. Individual instruction was used to trim seconds off, the driver being urged to concentrate on fast but safe driving.

Finally the group were taken back to the Autocross circuit and individual timing showed improvements that averaged five per cent faster than their first attempt the day before.

Mike Kirkland stated that the two day course was equal to the amount of experience gained by a new driver in the first four years of rallying, saving both time and a lot of expense, mainly in repairing car damage caused by inexperience.

He then took first place in the East African Building Society rally putting his championship points up to 120, a healthy lead over his rivals whose scores read Doughty 90, Drews 85, Collinge 69, Mehta

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# BAYI ON THREE WEEK TRACK TOUR

**THREE** Moscow Olympic athletes including silver medalist Filbert Bayi have arrived in Europe for a three week competition tour. The other athletes are 800 metres runner Mussa Laliga and 5,000 metre runner Zacharie Barie.

During their trip the athletes will take part in meetings in Hungary, Switzerland, Sweden, Belgium, Italy and Britain, while there is a possibility that Bayi might meet his arch-rival in 3,000 metres steeple-chase, *Broslav Malinowski* in Poland.

The invitations to the three athletes and to the 5,000 metres silver medalist Suleiman Nyambui were extended during the Moscow Olympics, but Nyambui who is on vacation from the United States where he is studying at El Paso University declined the offer as he is expected to visit his family.

Nyambui has castigated the Tanzania Olympic Committee (T.O.C.) for having delayed in informing him that he was to be included in the Olympic squad.

He was informed early this month in Sweden while competing with Bayi in an international meet and after the T.O.C. failed to reply his telex enquiring whether he was on the list.

He said his coach at the university had intended to draw a comprehensive training programme for him, but the plan had to be shelved because the athlete was not sure if he was to travel to Moscow.

Residential training camp for the national table-tennis team which was scheduled to begin two weeks ago to prepare for the Asia, Africa and Latin America Friendship Invitational Tournament in Tokyo, Japan later this month is having problems.

Officials of the National Association have failed to secure accommodation for the players some of whom have been in Dar es Salaam for the past two weeks.

Most of the players are from Dar es Salaam with a few from Zanzibar and Tanga.

Tanzania may not take part in the forthcoming East and Central Boxing Championships in Nairobi, as both tournaments are mainly intended for teams which boycotted the Olympic Games in Moscow.

Local officials state that the two meets were organised with a label of the East and Central African Boxing and Athletics Championships.

Those expected to participate in the games include Kenya, Egypt and Sudan who all boycotted the Games.

The draw for the Gura Nanak Hockey Tournament — the country's premier and most popular hockey tournament is also out and this year it has attracted some 16 entries.

Tanga Bullets — the holders — have been given a bye and it is difficult to predict which team will take the laurels given varied performances of the teams.

A grand reception awaits the Olympic squad from Moscow. A special welcome will be set for Filbert Bayi and Suleiman Nyambui who secured Tanzania's first ever medal in the Olympic Games. Bayi got a silver medal in the 3,000 metres steeple-chase and Nyambui snatched a silver in the 5,000 metres.
