The North Coast's pioneering Palms Hotel at Lamu reports that their season's August is much better compared with previous years, with many more guests from overseas.

All hotels offer a variety of entertainment including live music, discos, traditional dances, film shows, and there is an arrangement whereby guests from one hotel can enjoy entertainment at another in the same group without extra charge.

T.A.H. also report that July and August were particularly busy months for road safaris, attracting an increasing number of overseas tourists.

There has been the demand for August that there was difficulty in obtaining beds in most hotels and lodges unless booked well in advance.

Reports from Europe indicate it has been a "stay at home" summer vacation for many, with a consequent drop in the number of holiday-makers visiting popular resorts in Mediterranean countries.

It seems that Kenya has been luring many of those still on holiday seeking escape from the bad weather in the States while America is attracting many more tourists because of cheap fares and the jump in the price of the pound as compared with the dollar over recent months.

Johnny and his wife Vanessa used to run a professional hunting and safari service, whose clients included Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands, two Barons de Rothschild, Prince Amaury de Broglie — and world-famous filmstar Richard Burton, a longstanding friend of Johnny's and whose wife Susan went to school with Vanessa.

The Burtons were among those invited to the camp before it officially opened, to see what it was like.

They fell in love with it. It gives them the privacy and seclusion they crave, and the very good company of their friends Johnny and Vanessa.

It is extremely comfortable and luxurious, and the service is excellent yet unobtrusive.

Above all it is run by Johnny and Vanessa themselves.

Vanessa deals with the food and domestic arrangements. She is a gifted cook, with a talent for the unusual and a capacity for taking great pains.

She is a sophisticated and widely-travelled woman who knows the importance of good living while on holiday.

She specialises in excellent soups and pasta dishes, and she has the whole of the Indian Ocean at her front door from which to choose her seafood.

Lobsters, prawns, oysters and the finest eating fish of the sea figure on her menu every day.

Johnny himself takes charge of the fishing. His ten-metre twin-engined fishing boat Kittiwawa is well known among Coast people for being a lucky boat, and last season she brought in the biggest fish to be landed at Mombasa — a 492lb. (224kg.) mako shark.

She holds six people in comfort plus skipper Johnny, and is equipped with the best gear for deepsea game fishing.

During the coming 1980-1981 game fishing season she will be joined at Che-Shale by Scorpio, skippered by the well-known Coast angler Peter Nicholas. 9

metres long and also well equipped to pull in fighting fish.

A whole range of other water sports is available at Che-Shale, under the supervision of Joanna Filmer.

You can surf-cast, swim, goggle, scuba dive among the underwater coral gardens of the reef, windsurf, or venture out on one of the well-known Hobie Cat sailcraft that have proved so popular along the North American and Caribbean coastlines.

The beach at Che-Shale stretches miles into the distance, one of the finest in the world, and it is uninhabited. It is well protected from the open sea by the coral reef, and landwards the sand dunes ensure privacy.

Che-Shale camp itself was built by Johnny Aniere and his wife. Accommodation is tented, underneath makuti roofs made from palm fronds to ensure cool.

Tents are large, with comfortable beds, tables and chairs, and each has its own verandah.

A shower, lavatory and basin are housing in a separate tented section immediately behind the sleeping tent.

Altogether there are nine double tents and two singles. Water is brought by donkey cart from the well two kilometres up the road, and stored in tanks outside each tent. Electricity is provided by the camp's two generators.

The focus of life at the camp is the main club building, which houses the dining room at one end and a bar-cum-lounge at the other.

It has been built by local craftsmen to Johnny Aniere's design, using coastal Swahili material of woven fibre.

Women and children from a nearby village weave the thin narrow strips of fibre, which are then sewn together and shaped on the spot by an old craftsman to form walls.

Inside, the rooms are cool

and comfortable and most pleasing to the eye, creating a relaxed atmosphere in which to drink, dine, talk, play backgammon perhaps, and plan the next day's fishing or lazing.

For lovers of good living and the outdoor life, Che-Shale surely has it all.

The ships will be open to the public on Sunday from 2.00 to 5.00p.m

**MR MRABU, what is the progress of the Show so far?**

We are doing very well. 211 stands have been taken and exhibitors are working round the clock to put the finishing touches and renovating their stands. This year we have eight more stands. We hope that all the exhibitors will have completed their preparations by early next week.

**How many people do you expect to attend the show this year?**

We are very optimistic that about 200,000 people will have attended the show by the time we close after the four days. Last year about 151,000 people visited the showground. But this year we hope to attract even more people.

**What extra attractions do you have in store for the arena events?**

Well, the usual events will be there — and new ones too. The armed forces will definitely be on parade, rugby and the usual ladies football. We also hope to stage a motor-bike race and a group of brave men will display their strength by attempting to overturn cars! And, of course, we shall have the usual mass choir where about 1,000 youngsters take part.

**1980 is the Year of the disabled in Kenya. How are you going to highlight this cause during the show?**

We intend to hold a dance at Kenya Beach Hotel and all the proceedings will go towards this cause. The theme of this year's show is "Alleviation of Poverty". But we have thought that in another way we can also help in this worthy cause whose champion is the President himself. We hope others will help us raise enough money during the occasion for the disabled persons in our society.

**Prices of commodities and other products have tended to go up during the show in the previous years. Are there any plans this year to ensure that exhibitors observe controlled prices?**

I would like to give the assurance that we have taken extra care this year to make sure that people are not over-charged for goods or

services during the show. In fact we have this year co-opted an officer from the office of the Price Controller in one of our committee as a measure to cope with unscrupulous traders. We have also warned traders that it is illegal to do so and necessary action will be taken when such cases are discovered. We have, too, made arrangements for a number of officers from the Price Controller's office to go round the show to ensure that every one observe controlled prices. Therefore we don't expect such cases to emerge this year.

**There is also the question of security. What measures have you taken to ensure that there is maximum security at the showgrounds?**

As usual we shall have the police around, in uniform as well as in plain clothes. We have actually been promised by the police that they will have enough men to ensure security during the whole period of the show. We sincerely hope that cases of pick-pockets and theft will not occur this year.

**Mr Mrabu, has it been officially confirmed if the President will open the show this year?**

Well, this is a matter for the P.C. to comment on. But we hope that as he has done in the past the President will be able to open our show next week. That is all I can say right now.

**How many Show committees do you have?**

We have twelve committees supervising all the activities of the show that is the Planning committee, the Arena committee, Farming and Dairy, Young Farmers, Publicity, Adminis-

tration, Gates and Parks, Security, Catering, Veterinary, Livestock and Public Health.

**How is the money collected from the show utilized?**

Most of it goes back to the show in providing building materials, feeding chooks and volunteers and whatever is left goes toward the improvement of the showgrounds. As you have noticed, the show is expanding every year and we have to put more into its improvement. But it should also be remembered that ours is a non-profit organisation.

**How much does it cost to take part in the Show, Mr Mrabu?**

Well, it depends on the size of the plot you want to take. We sell plots at Shs. 1= per square feet. Most of the plots on which the stands have been built are 30 by 40 square feet which their owners pay Shs. 1200. Some take two or three and therefore pay double or thrice this amount. We still think these charges are quite reasonable.

**Do you have any foreign participation at the show this year?**

No, we don't. Ours is a national show and only attracts exhibitors within the country. There are no plans to make it international like the one in Nairobi.

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## 'OPEN AIR CAR REPAIR IS NOT FOR MOMBASA'

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Open air garages and scrap dealers in Mombasa have been given seven days to clear out of the town centre and move to the suitable industrial area in Shimanzi where the Municipality has allocated plots for them.

Announcing the ultimatum the Mayor of Mombasa, Coun. Rajab Sumba said his Council has made available some 24 plots in Shimanzi area which he said was suitable for such businesses.

The Mayor was speaking when he officially opened the 1980 Idd-Fun Fair held at Makadara grounds.

Coun. Sumba told the huge gathering that he was party to a recently jointly launched operation clean-up of the town with the Coast P.C., Mr Luka Daudi Galgalo and the Mombasa Kanu District branch chairman, Mr Sharif Nassir.

The aim of the operation was to make the town clean in readiness for the Idd-ul-Fitr celebrations and the forthcoming Mombasa National A.S.K. Show which starts on August 28.

The Mayor said that the Council's efforts to make the town centre clean were being hindered by the continued presence of the open air garages and scrap dealers.

"We have availed plots for this purpose and they now must move in seven days time" he ordered.

Speaking at the same occasion, Mr Nassir who is also an Assistant Minister for Commerce stressed on unity among Muslims and called on them to co-operate with other communities as they alone could not shoulder the task of development. He asked the local Muslim Association to ensure that the Government's policies on unity and peace are implemented within the Association.

The occasion was witnessed also by the M.P. for Mombasa North, Mr Said Hemed, several Councillors and the Mombasa D.C. Mr Kamau Mugwe.

### ROAD DEATH

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Two people were killed and 12 injured in Holo when a G.K. lorry in which they were travelling failed to negotiate a bridge and overturned. Some of the injured people are still recuperating at the Holo District Hospital while others have been treated and discharged.

## 'MUSLIMS SHOULD UNITE'

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — An Assistant Minister for Commerce Mr Sharif Nassir has told Muslims to demonstrate by action that they were united as their unity was symbolic of the entire country's unity.

Lip service was inadequate Mr Nassir said stressing that actions spoke louder than mere words.

Mr Nassir who was addressing a Muslim delegation from the Coast Province at the Mombasa District Kanu office explained that it was important first and foremost for Muslims to be united among themselves since charity begins at home.

"And let us show that we are patriotic by working closely with our beloved Nyayo Government" he said.

Mr Nassir emphasised that even the teachings of the Koran advocated the same tenets that President Moi has always called on Kenyans to practice namely peace, love and unity.

Sectionalism and tribalism, the Assistant Minister said were enemies of development and therefore called on the Muslims to work and cooperate with people from diverse ethnic groups for the well-being of the community.

The meeting was also addressed by the M.P. for Lamu East, Mr Cheka, a nominated M.P. Mr Bwana and the organising secretary of the Supreme Council of Kenya Muslims, Coast Province, Mr Mohammed Amana who challenged Muslims to imitate what Mr Nassir was doing by being involved in various development activities.

**KILIFI (K.N.A.)** — The Kilifi County Council has elected Mr Ezekiel Karisa as the Council vice-chairman unopposed—replacing former vice-chairman Councillor Marko Hare during the elections held at the Kilifi County Council. All the previous chairmen of Council committees were re-elected unopposed to same posts.

**WUNDANYI (K.N.A.)** — Coun H. Ruma has been re-elected vice-chairman of Taita Taveta County Council for the second term of office. Others elected were Councillor Mangi Mwalage as chairman of establishment and general purposes committee, Councillor Antony Mwanjoo as chairman of town planning, markets and housing committee and Councillor Roberts Mwasingo as chairman of social services.

**MALINDI (K.N.A.)** — The Msabaha Research sub-station near Malindi will hold a field day on Saturday August 23, and farmers, extension staff and wananchi have been invited to attend to see the various demonstrations. In a press release the senior agricultural research officer in charge of the station Mr C. M. Warui said demonstrations will include aspects of cattle and rabbit management, vegetables and arable crops growing and the relevant pest and disease control measures.

**KWALE (K.N.A.)** — The Government has donated over Shs. 136,000 women groups engaged in self help projects in Kwale Districts this year. This was said by a Kwale social worker Mrs Kauchi Chitumba in a speech read on her behalf by an adult education officer Mr B. Sopa during the launching of the Stamiani Women Group in Kikoneni recently.

**LAMU (K.N.A.)** — Mpeketoni women group poultry project has received a financial aid amounting to Shs. 10,000 from the Ministry of Culture and Social Services. The cheque for this amount was handed over to the group by the Coast Provincial Director of Social Services, Mr Wilson Wahome when he toured Lamu District recently.

**MOMBASA (K.N.A.)** — Stone-throwing thugs are reported to have resumed criminal activities in the Changamwe area of Mombasa. Councillor for the area, Councillor Luka Mbatia said the thugs are operating in the early hours of the morning from about 4.00a.m. and the most affected residents were those going to work in the early morning shifts and milk vendors who have to go to purchase milk very early in the morning before breakfast time.

**VOI (K.N.A.)** — The Lions' Club of Nairobi has donated a high pressure cooker for use at the Tsavo Youth Education Centre in the Tsavo National Park. The officer in charge Mr Lati Mulli thanked the donors for their continued assistance and assured them that the equipment would be put to good use.

**HOLA (K.N.A.)** — Farmers at Cherukungu village at the Tana irrigation scheme in Hola Tana River District are threatened with a loss of 35,000kg of cotton worth Shs. 114,250 due to heavy rains. The secretary/manager of the Hola Farmers' Co-operative Society, Mr Ramadhan Jilo Omar has reported that last weekend rain water soaked 2,000kg of cotton at the Cherukungu Village Cotton Buying Centre and resulted in a loss of cotton valued at Shs. 7,000.

**MOMBASA (K.N.A.)** — The Kenya Breweries Company Mombasa branch has presented a darts board and two sets of darts worth over K.Shs. 600 to the Sauti Sports Club of Mombasa as part of its sports promotion in the country.

Presenting the items the sales representative in the company Mr Gideon Kambae told members who gathered at Sauti House that his company was aware of the importance of sports in the country and the need to develop it.

## "I'M LIKE EVERY BODY HERE ... I JUST CAN'T TALK"

**EIGHT** Roman summers have warmed Elizabetha Pezzilli's young blood. The grace of the Latin conquistadors who gave the world basic laws of justice and honour — in addition to colonialism — shapes her face and the blood of Bantu warriors flows her courage.

Her foreparents have known the blossomed slopes of southern Italy and the shoulders of Mount Kenya. All loved the land — the sinews of the farmer and the warrior have made Elizabetha a lithe and lovely creature.

She chafes brightly in rich Italian, the grand daughter of Nyamu of Ngataranya and of Seno Pezzilli of Robeni, down at the toe of Italy where the warm waters of the Mediterranean drawn into cloud fall late to ripen the olive and the fig.

Elizabetha is a Latin Kikuyu, born in Nairobi, who has spent the swift years of childhood happiness in the village of Alpiniano — mountain country, like Nyeri, the gateway to the Italian Alps.

Now she has come home to meet her Kikuyu grandparents, three grandmas: for Nyamu is a traditionalist, and cousins of such number you would need to have more hands than three or four to accurately count them.

### "A FAMILY EPIC"

Her return is something of the beginning of a family epic yet to be narrated. She is the daughter of Mario Pezzilli and Lucia, the former Luc Wachuka who met and fell in love and married in the first two years of the last decade.

Mario's family had moved north to Alpiniano, a land of winter snows, from their southern home and he was

brought up in this region of vineyards and lush peach orchards.

Her mother had kneaded the loamy soil above the River Sagana on the slopes of Kirinyaga and left it crumble between her fingers.

Last Sunday they came home — Mario and Lucy, Elizabetha and 15-month-old Aurelio, a flaxen haired, golden-skinned son of both old Roman emperors and Kikuyu chiefs.

I met them in a cascading valley of Italiano and Kikuyu, of laughter and shyness, of shared family loyalties and alien tongues.

Elizabetha cries protestingly in Italian. "I am like everybody here but I cannot speak."

She can, of course, with eyes that twinkle and hands that clutch affectionately — and with shrieking laughter as she plays a wordless game with her blood cousins Nderito, Mwangi, Wamwoshi and Muthoni.

Mama Wamwoshi and uncle Kabui hoist Aurelio on their knee and bounce him up and down to gurgling mirth that wells up inside him. Amazingly a 20 hour journey from Alpiniano to Nairobi there is no tiredness.

It is like Christmas Day, the first of many this next month. For this is but the first reunion of the kith and kin which sprang from Nyamu's loins.

More, many more, are waiting up the road through Nyeri and Mweiga at Muroko farm near Nyahururu — including the three grandmas and grandpapa Nyamu, a wise old man of many African summers and long droughts.

The next day Elizabetha ran through the streets of the city where she drew first breath, skipping around corners to stop and stare at the office blocks

and the sidewalks teeming with people.

She is excited and breathless but already she and Nyamu's grandson — George Nyamu (six) — have come to communicate as cousins will even when the language is different. And George is quick. Now he can shout *Uno Momento* and three or four more Italian phrases.

Elizabetha is delighted at everything.

She is still, she is quick to remark, an Italian. But this is only the second day and anyway this is her home, too.

### "TWO WORLDS"

It is the awakening of consciousness. Elizabetha's grace bridges two worlds — the third and the first. Perhaps it is four, for there is also the old and the new world, too.

She is far from home, far from the ancient winding walls of the old village of Alpiniano with its Latin charms and courtesies, yet she is close to home; close to the ancient winding paths around the Kirinyaga forests and the spirit of her African ancestors.

The story of her forebears has perhaps run its distance over a thousand years or more and has nothing new to tell us.

But hers has barely begun: the fusion of two cultures in an even tenor of love that began one unremarkable day in Nairobi in 1970.

But perhaps her story, drawn out of four worlds so far apart yet so close together, may have something remarkable and new to tell us — and in its telling perhaps a better world may emerge for all of us.

## Sweet News for Kilombero Valley

THREE COUNTRIES and the Tanzania government are financing a Shs. 160 million sugar cane plantation project in the Kilombero Valley, Central Tanzania. On completion, 7,000 acres (2,800 hectares) of the estate will be under irrigation.

The Kilombero Sugar Company — the owners of two sugar factories in the area — Msoiwa and Rumbi — are the project implementers and Denmark and Austria have provided loans for the project.

The Dutch Government has contributed towards the construction of a dam which will feed the two factories with regular flow of water. The balance will be met by the Government.

A World Bank special study has pointed out that the expansion of the Kilombero sugar industry has pointed out that land available in the area could produce up to 137,000 tons of sugar at more than Shs. 611 million.

Tanzania is still importing sugar although she should be alleviating the six billion tonnes deficit in the world sugar production through surplus production.

But sugar consumers were taken by surprise last week when the Government in a surprise announcement raised the price of sugar from 7/= to 8/50 a Kg. to offset sugar production and distribution costs.

Tanzania and Finland also signed an agreement on Phase II of the rural water supply project in southern Tanzania.

This project is financed collectively by the Government of Tanzania, Finland, Britain and United.

Finland's contribution will be Shs. 52.2 million and all expenses exceeding the Finnish contribution will be met by Tanzania.

Under the pact, Finnish consultants will be responsible for investigating and making engineering designs necessary for the construction of 600 shallow wells and two water works.

They would also be responsible for training of skilled workers and laying the groundwork for the take-off of Phase III of the project.

Unicef will supply materials for the Makondeko Water Supply project in Newala District. Some 210 people living in 100 villages will get clean water on completion.

British aid will be used to supply the main part of the materials, and on completion some 500,000 people will be supplied with water.

The Finnish Government contributed Shs. 30.6 million towards the Shs. 34 million Phase I project. The balance was met by Tanzania.

The World Bank has loaned Tanzania Shs. 56 million to help offset increased costs for the multi-million shilling giant Kidatu II hydro-electric power project in Central Tanzania. The money will be used for the

construction of a concrete dam at Mtera, two 50-megawatt generators and one 90 Mva transformer.

While Belgium will loan Tanzania Shs. 36 million to finance industrial material from Belgium for the proposed glass sheet factory to be built in Dar es Salaam.

Tanzania will send 660 pilgrims to attend the Muslim pilgrimage in Mecca and Medina in Saudi Arabia. The pilgrims will be airlifted by Air Tanzania charter flights in six trips.

The Bank of Tanzania has approved a maximum allowance of Shs. 9,000 per pilgrim and according to authorities, the allowance had to be raised to pave the way for increased costs of food, lodging and transportation.

An eight-member delegation of the National Council of Swedish Youth (S.U.L.) left Dar es Salaam to study the liberation struggle and how it affects the countries involved — notably the frontline states. S.U.L. in conjunction with other organisations in Sweden is working on a total consumer boycott of South African goods.

S.U.L. embraces 41 major Swedish youth organisations and two other groups are visiting Zambia and Zimbabwe, and Angola and Botswana on similar missions. The Dar es Salaam group had earlier been to Mozambique.

The contest for Parliamentary seats is also hotting up. So far, the Prime Minister, Mr Edward Sokoine and the Minister of State in his office, Mr Jackson Makweta are the only unopposed in their constituencies.

But the former Prime Minister, Mr Rashidi Kawawa and three other M.P.s who were unopposed in the 1975 elections are facing challenges this year. Mr Kawawa is the Minister for Defence and National Service.

An adult education delegation of ten women has left Dar es Salaam for the United Kingdom on a six week tour. The visit, the first of its kind, has been organised by the University of London, goldsmith's College under the Tanzania/London women programme.

The University of Dar es Salaam will celebrate its 10th anniversary next week and over 500 guests have been invited to attend the four-day of celebrations.

Representatives from the Nairobi University and Makerere in Uganda and other universities from East and Central Africa are expected to attend the fiesta.

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MEANING OF ZAKAT

ISLAM is based upon five pillars, which are obligatory to every Muslim. Zakat (aiming) is one of them.

However this pillar is reserved for those who are well off financially.

It can be given in the form of money, agricultural goods and also in the form of livestock. Unfortunately its distribution leaves a lot to be desired.

When giving Zakat one should know who deserves to be given, and should give it not openly — for everyone to see — but one does openly it will be nothing but a show off.

It is said that when one gives the Zakat by the right hand, the left hand should not know what the right hand is doing. This means that secrecy should be practised when giving Zakat.

Another thing which Islam teaches us about Zakat is that, there should be an organisation which will collect the Zakat and henceforth distribute it to the needy.

I therefore ask my fellow Muslims not to do things like begging or making queues for Zakat. Surely this is shameful to our religion.

I also ask the Chief Kadhi to come forward and enlighten the Muslims on such matters. This will make the Muslims and the religion move along the right path.

'Action needed on matatu menace'

IT was way back in 1973 when the late President Mzee Jomo Kenyatta finally gave the "green light" in a decree legalising matatus — and ever since the matatu network has spread far and wide and matatu proprietors have flourished considerably.

Matatus (meaning 30 cents in a traditional sense) not only serve urban areas, but have also paved their way into the more remote regions throughout the Republic — to the satisfaction of many wananchi for the speedy service they offer.

Wananchi have also, time and again, praised matatus for dropping them exactly at their required destinations — right at the door of the office or at home, whatever the case may be.

tons cargo — a good tonnage for her first voyage

The level of inward tonnages reminds me that the 19,000 ton deadweight Mitsui OSK vessel Gallant Pioneer has been discharging what must surely amount to a record general cargo from the Far East, namely, 9,200 tons for Mombasa.

She is also loading some 700 tons of Pyrethrum powder, cotton etc. for Japan.

With the familiar blue hull, red funnel and stone coloured upperworks of her owners this is the first time this four-year old vessel has visited East Africa.

She is another example of the Japanese not adhering rigidly to the Maru suffix.

Whilst the sugar loader Finix continues to wait hungrily for her cargo at Port Reitz, her identical sister ship Feax has recently been in port discharging motor cars and steel from Japan at No. 13 berth.

Both vessels were built respectively in 1969 and 1970 by Sunderland Shipbuilders in N.E. England for Fafalos Brothers one of the better known Greek shipowners.

After a week's delay for fumigation purposes the green hulled Saudi vessel Alhijazi finally reberthed at No. 9 last Saturday morning.

An unusual occupant of the Port Authority's slipway in Kilindini last week was the familiar cattle carrier Bonsella presumably undergoing her annual docking.

The African Marine Drydock has been occupied for over a week by the French frigate Victor Schoelcher for routine examination and repairs.

This is not a name one would associate with a French vessel whilst conversely the American destroyer Conte de Grasse at Mbaraki has a distinct French flavour, being named after the famous French Admiral.

## SPECIALISED FLOOR SANDING SERVICE

ECONO, a Nairobi-based company can now offer specialised service in flooring and floor-sanding from Mombasa.

According to the branch manager Mr Gulam, the company can supply and lay various types of parquet woodblocks, carry out floor-sanding and apply three coats of polyurethane seal to suit individual taste.

The total cost of parquet woodblock is only Shs. 12/95 per square feet for cedar and Shs. 16/45 per square feet for hardwood. To achieve that all-important professional finish the firm charges an additional —/30 per square feet for extra fine sanding and —/60 per square feet for the application of permanent clear lacquer polyurethane.

Mr Gulam explains that the advantage of clear lacquer that when applied on the parquet woodblock floor its beautiful grains show through and has a much longer life.

No regular waxing is needed and once treated the floor can be washed with water or simple dusted.

Clear lacquer treatment with hardener is also ideal for high traffic areas such as hotel dining rooms, passages and living rooms.

Mr Gulam said that the laying of woodblock takes about four to five days for an area of about 1000 square feet and is left to set for at least a week.

The sanding work takes two days and the application of polyurethane takes three days allowing at least 12 hours drying time between coatings.

For the time being the parquet woodblocks supplied by the head office Nairobi to customers requirements and can be stored by customers until the time of use.

All sanding materials and equipment are obtained from West Germany.

## BANDARI COLLEGE



### IMAGINATIVE USE MADE OF KENYA— MADE MATERIALS

BANDARI COLLEGE, the new training school for the Kenya Ports Authority and Kenya Cargo Handling Services is on a dramatic site overlooking Kilindini Harbour. The K.P.A. and K.C.H.S. felt that it was essential for their training school to be closely related visually to the busy port to keep the association of training and practice always in the minds of the trainees.

The Architects for the project Hughes and Polkinghorne were commissioned to design and implement the project early in 1975 and it is credible to all concerned that this fine complex has been completed ready for the opening ceremony by H.E. Daniel T. Arap Moi, President of Kenya on August 26, 1980. A great deal of credit must go to the chief engineer K.P.A. and his staff for the excellent co-ordination they achieved through their contribution to the design team responsible for the construction of the buildings.

The virgin site has a fall of twenty feet across the length which was used to advantage in the architect's conceptual design resulting in exciting split level planning of the main building, resulting in considerable saving in cost.

The main building consists of administration unit, twenty classrooms, multi-purpose hall/theatre, seminar rooms, staff rooms, dining room, library and other ancillary units.

The main hall is a fine feature in the plan group, and can accommodate three hundred people in conference style comfort, the design is flexible and can be used for conferences, lectures, cinema, proscenium and theatre-in-the-round, sporting events like boxing. The hall is decorated by magnificent wood murals based on traditional design patterns.

Great care has been taken in the design to maximize the use of shade to keep the building cool and to introduce ventilation by the skillful use of breaks in the design. Where the building faces the west sun over the fine view of the harbour near Mtongwe ferry point the classrooms are protected effectively by the use of horizontal concrete sun breakers which successfully prevent penetration of the hot afternoon sun.

A great feature has been made of the internal court which is surrounded by the classroom blocks and main hall, the landscaping includes a fountain and water garden which is not only pleasing but has a practical application of keeping air cool on the atrium principle to the buildings. The planting consists of the exotic flowering shrubs which make the Court such a distinctive area of Kenya.

The facilities for practical training are provided on the site including fully equipped workshop facilities, loading and off-loading of cargo including typical cargo sheds and ship mock hatch.

The design is based on simple construction and the imaginative use of local materials requiring a minimum of maintenance. All the materials and equipment used in the construction with the exception of glass, aluminium sections, light fittings and air conditioning equipment are of Kenya origin and manufacture.

In order to contrast with the natural concrete small areas of bright primary colours have been used to give a sense of excitement to the building.

All those concerned with the project are justifiably proud of their efforts and it crowns their achievement that H.E. President Daniel T. Arap Moi has graciously consented to open the building.

FOR the past two decades the port industry in many parts of the world has been experiencing an increase in international trade and sophisticated technological developments in the methods of handling cargo.

Today these two developments are having a major impact on the management of Seaports.

The workers require constant training to be able to keep pace with these developments.

More critical, however, is the challenge to the ports of the Third World to maintain their

share of the maritime trade by competing successfully with those in the developed world.

The advent of rapid technological change, particularly in the containerised unitized and dry bulk trades, has witnessed major developments in

the provision of port facilities and services.

In response to these developments, Mombasa port, is now in the process of adapting existing facilities and constructing new ones to accommodate the new developments.

The foregoing underline the need for continuous training and retraining.

These include conversion training schemes to equip the workers for change from conventional to modern methods of handling cargo.

It is along these lines that the Authority has formulated a conscious training policy, creating training programmes with policy commitment. The policy calls for improvement of management personnel, operational and maintenance staff.

The objective is to enable them to introduce and sustain more effective working practices.

A secondary objective is to ensure that there are no manpower constraints to continued port operations and development.

It has been observed that training given at one echelon of the hierarchy does not contribute wholly to the improvement of port performances.

Training is, accordingly strategically geared to cover not only the novice port worker but also the technical, operational and managerial staff.

There is an important need to train those handling cargo to acquire the basic requirements of safe working methods.

In response to the changing externalities already highlighted, the Authority took the bold step to establish a Port training school, Bandari College.

When it becomes operational,

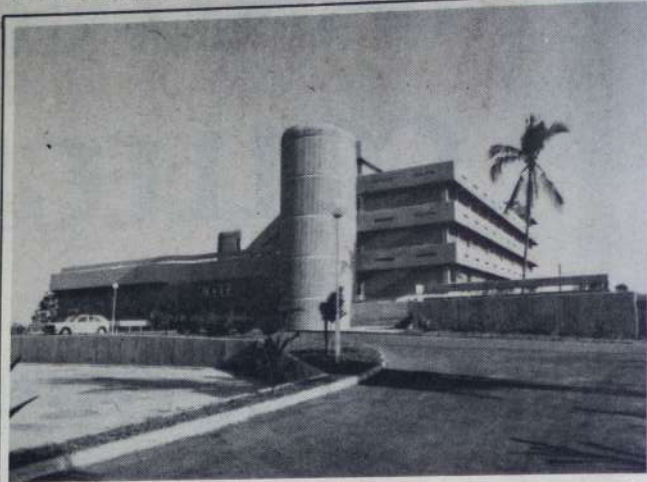

# MOVING WITH THE TIMES

Kenya Ports Authority and Kenya Cargo Handling Services, like many other commercial and industrial organisations, operate in a dynamic environment.

Changes in marketing and operational technology often have far reaching effects on such organisations and it becomes necessary for them to be prepared to move with the

times. Whilst a port should provide efficient and economic services, it must also contend with rapidly changing technology in the world of shipping. Hence the establishment of Bandari College.

"Bandari" is a Kiswahili word meaning "Sea Port". Courses which will be offered at the College will have a strong

bias towards port operations shipping and the transport industry in general.

The College will serve as a training and staff development institution for the Kenya Ports Authority and its subsidiary, the Kenya Cargo Handling Services Limited.

The two organisations together employ 13,000 people of whom about two per cent fall in the senior and middle management cadres; 22 per cent in the supervisory grade, 20 per cent clerical staff and 56 per cent manual grades including dockworkers.

Prior to the establishment of Bandari College, Kenya Cargo Handling Services and the Kenya Ports Authority operated separate training units whose main training emphasis were port operations and technical preventive maintenance.

In the case of senior and middle management staff, training was offered to selected employees who were sponsored for courses in other institutions.

This training procedure gradually proved uneconomical and the training needs of most employees could not be met satisfactorily.

The first training centre at the Port of Mombasa was established in 1960 by the defunct East African Landing and Shipping Company in 1960 predecessor of the Kenya Cargo Handling Services, where courses in various fields of port operations were conducted.

Over the 20 years of its physical existence, the Cargo Handling Training centre trained over 6,000 port workers of grades ranging from assistant superintendents to drivers of various prime movers such as fork lift trucks.

During the days of the defunct East African community, the school trained port workers for Tanzania ports as well. Theoretical classes were conducted in shed number 11, which formed the base of the centre.

### INSTRUCTORS

The environment was least conducive for instructional purposes due to the prevalences of numerous visual and auditory distractors.

Today, the functions of the school have been given a fresh lease of life as part and parcel of Bandari College.

Most of the school's instructors have been seconded

to Bandari College where will continue to run similar courses.

As for the Kenya Ports Authority, successor to the defunct East African Harbours Corporation, technical apprentices employes at all the ports were prior to 1970, trained at the Railway Training School or other suitable institutions.

Soon after the creation of the East African Harbours Corporation in 1969 as a separate entity from the E.A. Railways and Harbours, a port technical training wing was established.

### TECHNICIANS

The unit offered craft and technician courses in the fields of civil, mechanical, automotive marine and electrical engineering to port employes.

The first major role played by the unit was to train apprentices in mechanical and electrical engineering upto a level where they could pass either the ordinary Diploma or the Technical Diploma, Part III.

During the Unit's early stages, theoretical work was done at other institutions but on-the-job training was carried out mainly at the port workshops.

In addition, the Technical Training Unit trained Artisans upto a level where they could pass Class I Trade Test and new intakes upto a level of passing phases I, to III of classes III, to I of the Kenya Ports Authority Trade Tests.

Skill improvement courses for many employes were also conducted. The contribution made by these artisans and technicians in the maintenance of technical appliances at the port is of immeasurable significance.

The technical training classrooms were situated at the Old Telegraph Point but they were later demolished to give room for the construction of Bandari College.

While awaiting the completion of the College, technical classes were conducted in disused sheds at the port.

With the availability of technical training facilities at Bandari College, the Kenya Ports Authority technical training wing becomes an integral part of the new College.

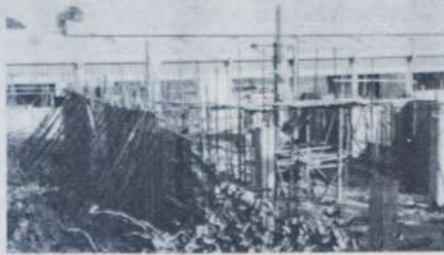

CAPITAL CONSTRUCTION Co. was incorporated in 1967. The company is registered as 'Class A' with Ministry of Works and 'Class B' with Ministry of Water Development.

The company is also registered with Kenya Tea Development Authority and Housing Corporation. It is experienced in building and civil engineering works and have built throughout the country schools, colleges, hospitals, tea factories, sight and service schemes, major housing schemes and multi storey buildings.

Examples of some major schemes are: I.D.A. Schools for M.O.W.; Mangu High School, Thika; Tea factories for K.T.D.A.; Government Secretarial College for Nairobi, M.O.W.; Kibera Housing Scheme for National Housing Corp.; Olafa Flats Nairobi for K.P.O.; Garissa Hospital, M.O.W.; Provincial Headquarters, M.O.W.; Likoni House Scheme for Municipal Council; Karbaduta Secondary School, and Marsabit District Hospital, House Scheme.

The directors of the company are experienced in this trade for the last 25 years. The directors are Herban Singh Panesar and Pritam Singh Panesar. The company is managed by Herban Singh Panesar.

Capital Construction Company's work on the Bandari College was commenced in August 1977 and completed in February 1980. It consisted of the main block (class rooms, library, admini-

tration block, theatre, kitchen, dining hall and conference room); the workshop consisting of marine, civil engineering, carpentry and electrical workshops; the cargo shed, the mock-hatch, and the cargo stacking area, car parks and roadways.

The total value of this project is K.Shs. 25,000,000. This building complex is situated on the eastern side of the Kilindini harbour on a hillock overlooking the harbour.

From the west wing and south wing you get a panoramic view of the entire Kilindini Harbour, movement of ships from the sea and also the ferry boats of Likoni, this makes the college ideally situated for a college of this nature. The instructors will not have much difficulties in explaining, what they will need is a few telescopes!

This building is unique in many respects, all credit should go to the architects, M/S Hughes and Polkinghorne who designed this college they did very little change to the ground levels so the originality remains, so much so the main complex has six different ground level and every bit of the land is purposefully used.

There were six engineers and technicians working in the project at the height of construction. All skilled and unskilled labour were Kenyans. Most of the building materials were obtained locally.

## 'A MILESTONE IN DEVELOPMENT OF PORTS AUTHORITY'

COMPLETION and establishment of Bandari College is yet another milestone in the total commitment of the Kenya Ports Authority to develop and modernise port facilities in order to meet Kenya's future needs in the expansion of her external trade.

Development projects completed in recent years and in progress include: construction of berths 16, 17 and 18; renovation of back of port area, modernisation of berths 1-5.

Construction of central workshops and a cold store, expansion of office accommodation and provision of modern living quarters for employees.

Among planned projects are: widening of the entrance channel to allow passage of bigger and longer ships, provision of additional berthing accommodation and construction of a container depot outside the port area.

It is expected that during the current development programme, synchronised with the national five-year development plan, 1978/83, the Kenya Ports Authority will spend over Shs. 700 million on expansion and modernisation efforts.

During the past five years,

the Kenya Ports Authority and Kenya Cargo Handling Services (partly), have acquired various types of new and modern equipment all of which, together with the equipment already in use, required improved skill in usage and maintenance.

Such new equipment include: 210 forklift trucks of various capacities ranging from two to ten tons; three 35-ton multi-purpose front loaders and one 35-ton Kone crane for handling containers.

Half a dozen vac-u-vators for discharging bulk grain and eight six-ton mobile cranes. A number of floating craft have also been lately added to the old fleet.

Within the next few years the Kenya Ports Authority expects to acquire additional modern equipment including: 36 bigger mobile cranes of 15-35 capacity, container handling forklift trucks, two pilot boats, 44 tractors, 120 trailer vehicles and a new harbour tug.

It is hoped that Bandari College will turn out well trained staff with improved skills to use, service and maintain such modern equipment that is geared to provide more effective and efficient port services.

## TRAINING COURSES COVER ALL PORT AFFAIRS

COURSES planned and conducted by Bandari College will have a strong maritime bias. Being a staff development institution, admission to attend courses will be restricted to people who are in employment.

Initially, courses will be conducted for junior and middle level personnel working at the port.

The initial programme for long and short term courses covers the following areas —

- Port Operation: dock-worker refresher course, checker training course, groups 'C', 'B' and 'A' operational clerical training, driving skill and competence course, crane operator's appreciation course, safety and accident prevention, first aid, health and hygiene, and supervisory course.

- Technical training: Most of the technical training courses are aimed at training beginners and at skill improvement for others, covering: electrical engineering, mechanical engineering, civil engineering, automotive and plant engineering, welding and metal fabrication, and engine room assistants' course.

- Administrative courses: clerical training — accounts, clerical training — supplies and stores, clerical training — staff (K.C.H.S.), and clerical training — staff (K.P.A.).

- Other courses: basic statistical methods, basic marine technology, port finance management, and nursery school teachers refresher course.

- Seminars and workshops: purpose of training, industrial relations, communications, effective performance appraisal, secretarial duties, management in port, Trainmar (Unctad), and planning (Unctad).

- Special courses: Provision is made for courses to be organised depending on departmental needs. An analysis is being made of the training needs of people working in the shipping and forwarding industries. Relevant courses to cater for their needs will eventually be offered.

**ADMINISTRATION:** The college will be administered through a Board of Governors consisting of: deputy managing director, K.P.A. — chairman; deputy managing director, K.C.H.S. — vice-chairman; finance manager, K.P.A. — member; personnel manager, K.P.A. — member; chief engineer, K.P.A. — member; finance manager, K.C.H.S. — member; chief engineer, K.C.H.S. — member; principal Mombasa Polytechnic — member; representative from shipping industry — member; secretary and legal officer, K.P.A. — member, and principal Bandari College — secretary.

the school will provide varied training facilities for staff of Kenya Ports Authority and Kenya Cargo Handling Services Co. Ltd. from the middle managers to the dockworkers.

The curriculum will cover in all the disciplines of operations at all levels, technical vocations and clerical services.

It is expected that apart from Kenya Ports Authority and Kenya Cargo Handling Services, the College will offer training opportunities to shipping, clearing and forwarding companies and any other groups that are involved in port activities such as transport and distributive trades.

This, it is believed, will help to bring all the sub-faces of port operations to a common perspective from where meaningful emphasis can be placed on performance and productivity improvements.

Other staff will continue to be trained at local institutions such as Kenya Institute of Management, Kenya Institute of Administration and East African Management Institute, Arusha, and where necessary at selected institutions overseas.

The Authority is aware of problems which do impair training efforts. At the operation and tradesman level there is still the problem of literacy.

Many of the port workers in these vocations are those who have learned the job by "sitting

next-to-Netty" but lack the educational background either to improve to higher skill level or to change to the demands of the industry.

This, of course, is a problem which can only be overcome gradually and through carefully planned recruitment policies.

For the future, Management sees a need for closer association between ports. This will give opportunities for sharing experience and training opportunities.

In this respect, healthy relationships have been established with the Port of Singapore where a number of employees of the port are being sent on a phased programme for training and practical attachments.

Continued association with the international agencies such as UNCTAD, I.L.O., CIEA, UNDP, British Council, will be pursued to assist in the development of manpower.

Already Mombasa port has been mentioned as one of the three regional centres for course development in the field of maritime transport.

It is hoped that with the opening of Bandari College the years ahead will witness more concerted effort to further the training activities and improve the quality of skills at the port.

As a consequence, the port labour force will continue to play its key role in the economic development of the country.

# FEATURES OF THE BANDARI COLLEGE

BANDARI COLLEGE is compactly built on 2.0 hectares of land on South Western corner of Mombasa Island at the Old Telegraph Point, overlooking Kilindini Harbour. The site commands a picturesque view of the entrance channel to Kilindini, Kenya's main sea port which also serves a broad hinterland covering parts of Eastern and Central Africa.

The main features of the College were designed in two phases. Phase I comprises Administrative offices, 20 classrooms, a library, a multi-purpose theatre, a kitchen and dining hall. A visual aids demonstration room, a board room and a committee room. Five workshops and a model sea terminal. The second phase now under construction comprises primarily hostel facilities which include 60 units for students and 10 units for visiting lecturers, all self contained.

All rooms are air-conditioned either centrally or with separate room units, except the workshops, the mock hatch and the shed designed by Hughes and Polkinghorne the College was constructed by Capital Construction Co. Ltd. with Carl Bro (K.) Ltd as consulting engineers. When fully completed the college is expected to cost nearly K.Shs. 40 million.

**LIBRARY:** Situated on the third floor of the main building, the library has an area of 230 square metres capable of holding up to 20,000 books.

Most of the books will fall in the categories covering port operations, technical work, management and administration, shipping, forwarding and transport in general. Periodicals which cover a wide range of disciplines will also be available. When fully developed the library will definitely be one of the best stocked in the country.

Plans are underway to have reciprocal borrowing arrangements with other libraries in the country particularly libraries with a bias towards transport industry. Initially book borrowing would be restricted to employees of Kenya Ports Authority and Kenya Cargo Handling Services but, with special arrangements, the library might be utilised by others.

Next to the library is a reading room (area 140 square metres) which has a sitting capacity of 40 students. For one who likes reading in the open air, an exit from the library leads to a roof garden where tables, chairs and parasols would be arranged to provide an ideal outdoor reading environment.

**THEATRE:** The multi-purpose theatre is probably one of the best of its kind in the

country, with a floor area of 680 square metres including the stage. It is capable of accommodating 120 people in general circumstances and has provisions to sit up to 1000 with added seating rearrangements. The stage can be utilised for drama and other functions, and this is complemented by the availability of a modern lighting system.

The projection room which is equipped with a cinema-scope projector can screen pictures onto a permanently built screen. The wooden floor space between the fixed seats and the stage is suitable for such functions as parties, receptions, indoor games etc. The acoustics of the theatre have been done by Shankar Electronics of Mombasa to a very well finish and it is strongly recommended as an ideal venue for local or international conferences and seminars held in Mombasa.

**CONFERENCE HALL AND COMMITTEE ROOM:** Situated on the fourth floor of the main building, the conference hall has a floor area of 230 square metres. Next to it is a committee room whose floor area is 140 square metres. Both are beautifully carpeted commanding a panoramic view of the harbour. They were purposely designed and provided with facilities to cater for even high level national or international meetings.

**CLASSROOMS:** There are 20 classrooms altogether each of which has an area of 49 square metres and is capable of sitting maximum of 20 students. Sixteen of them are designed to facilitate temporary partitioning or pairing if the need arises. This is a useful provision for accommodating larger groups or students at any given time.

**WORKSHOP:** A closed workshop space of approximately 1600 square metres is available and is divided into five separate units to cater for: electrical engineering, marine engineering, mechanical engineering, vehicle and plant engineering, and civil engineering.

The workshops are equipped with all basic facilities for training skilled workers in such areas as: motor vehicles and plant maintenance, marine fitting, electrical fitting and installation, welding (gas and electric arc), maintenance fitting, plating and metal fabrication, woodwork and boat building, masonry and plastering, and painting and decorating. Each workshop unit is capable of accommodating up to 20 trainees. Two locker rooms (total area 70 square metres) have been constructed adjacent to the workshop building.

**MODEL SEA TERMINAL:** The Bandari College complex has a simulated sea-terminal system comprising the following sub-systems:

- A land-ship built of concrete and consisting of a single mock-hatch with a lower hold, twin-deck and a weather-deck. The lower hold has a free volume grain capacity of 2000 square metres, a twin-deck capacity 390 square metres and a raised weather-deck of 290 square metres. The ground floor area of the mock-hatch is 755 square metres. Two derricks of 8T, S.W.L. have been provided on the weather deck and these can be operated by a set of electric winches either singly — swinging or rigged to form a union — purchase.

- Quay apron: The land-ship is alongside a quay apron whose width from the quay to the transit shed is 12.35 metres. An actual quay — crane of 5T, S.W.L. has been provided capable of travelling, hoisting, slewing and luffing movements.

- Transit shed: Within the model sea terminal system, transit shed is 12 of 420 square metres are also provided, and designed in such a way as to maximise the net usable storage area. It has two end doors and four side doors. Allowing space deductions for office accommodation, the main longitudinal aisleway plus safety spaces of one metre wide around the shed perimeter, the shed has a net usable storage area of about 230 square metres which is just over 50 per cent of the total shed floor area.

- Open storage area: Behind the transit shed there is a vast open storage area of 2000 square metres. This area can be used for the storage of yard cargo and the training of fork-lift drivers.

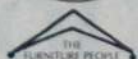
**KITCHEN AND DINING HALL:** The dining hall, with a floor area of 640 square metres can accommodate upto 400 people in one sitting. Meals will be served in a cafeteria system with a broad variety of menu organised to cater for local and international tastes.

The kitchen, including stores, office, a cold chamber etc. has an area of 280 square metres. The dining hall and kitchen facilities in their totality are as good as those of any top class hotel.

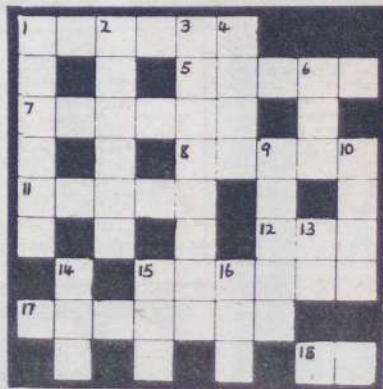

# ERROL ON FOOD

## DELICIOUS BABY MARROWS

**COURGETTES.** These delicious baby marrows are also known as Zucchini by the Italians and the Americans call them Italian Squash. In Kenya they grow beautifully and we export them to Covent Gardens where they sell for a great deal more than we pay for them in the local market.

They are excellent combined with tomatoes and onion, olive oil and garlic in the classic dish known as Ratatouille. This versatile recipe works as an appetiser, hot or cold and is excellent with lamb or fish and is not difficult to make. But courgettes make excellent stuffers, soups and omelette fillings too.

Always select the small firm ones, slice off the knobby ridge and use them unpeeled. Tiny ones are best cooked whole, the larger ones sliced lengthwise. Like aubergines they can be salted and left to drain for an hour or so before cooking but this is by no means essential.

Stuffed courgettes are a perfect solution to left-overs. Any stuffing suitable for aubergine will be ideal. But courgettes need no longer than 20 minutes cooking time. Don't fill them too full.

### COURGETTE SOUFFLE:

- 1 pound courgettes, boiled whole
- 4 egg yolks
- 1 tablespoon plain flour

- 3 ounces butter salt and freshly ground black pepper
  - pinch of nutmeg
  - 5 egg whites
- Cook courgettes in lightly salted water. When tender liquidize in the blender. Drain by standing in a fine sieve. Mix the beaten egg yolks, flour, puree, butter and seasoning in the usual manner for a soufflé.

Finally beat the 5 egg whites until stiff. Fold lightly into the courgette mixture and pour into a prepared soufflé dish.

Cook in a hot oven for approximately 35 minutes until well risen and golden. Eat at once.

Here is a soup for courgettes used with fennel seed which is very complementary in flavour.

### FENNEL AND COURGETTE SOUP:

- 1 pound courgettes
  - 2 ounces butter
  - 1 small onion chopped roughly
  - 1 pint mild chicken stock
  - 1 crushed clove of garlic
  - 1/4 pint single cream
  - 1 egg yolk
  - good pinch of castor sugar
  - 1/2 teaspoon fennel seed or green fennel tops of fresh fennel
  - pinch of potato flour
  - chopped fennel or diced courgettes to garnish
- Heat the butter, and cook the

onion in this gently until limp. Do not let it brown.

Add the chopped courgettes to the pan, add the garlic, and the chicken stock. Stir. Bring to the boil. The fennel seeds should be placed in a muslin bag and simmered for 10 minutes only with the chicken stock, then removed.

When the courgettes are tender season lightly. When cool liquidize the soup. Return to the pan, add sugar, more seasoning and bring back to the boil gently.

Beat the potato flour, egg yolk and cream and stir briskly into the soup after removing from heat. It must not be allowed to boil after this has been added or it will curdle.

Serve with chopped fennel herb or minute dices of courgette which have been cooked briefly in melted butter.

### SWEET AND SOUR COURGETTES:

- 8 medium sized courgettes sliced thinly
- olive oil
- 1 clove garlic sliced thinly
- a few torn mint leaves
- freshly ground black pepper
- 1 little castor sugar
- mild malt vinegar

Pat the sliced courgettes dry and fry them, a few at a time in really hot olive oil. Take care that they do not burn. Drain on absorbent paper. Lay them in a shallow dish, sprinkle with garlic slices, a few bits of mint, pepper, sugar and vinegar.

The secret of the dish is to maintain a perfect balance between sugar and vinegar — neither should dominate. It is a Neapolitan dish and much loved by them. It is a wonderful variation of mint sauce to eat with roast lamb.

It was discovered during COASTWEEK's visit that much of their vast stock — spare parts so neatly laid out according to the type of vehicle for which they would be required contained the slow moving stuff too. In this way you can be sure that you will get the part you want.

Now this is really service given by Nyati who are not a business concern which keep only the fast moving stuff, thereby being of benefit to the shop-keeper as opposed to the customer!

### JAPANESE

Much of their stock is from the Japanese manufacturer and in this way the commodity is cheaper to the customer than were it bought from the export houses.

And whilst talking about Japanese spare parts or anything from Japan for that matter some information was gleaned which is well worth passing on to those who don't yet know.

Japan has a body equivalent to the British Standard Specification people and its rules are just as stringent.

A point is made that one of the members of management of Nyati Mombasa (who have been connected with the motor trade for 30 years) visits up-country distributors in Nairobi, Nakuru, Kisumu and Eldoret every so often assuring that the dispersion of Datsun, Isuzu and other Japanese auto parts is Kenya-wide.

# WOMAN'S WORLD

## The Sweet Smell of Swahili Cookery ...

ALTHOUGH THERE are many Muslim women experienced in the haute cuisine of the Coast, Samira Hyder is believed to be the first from Mombasa's Old Town to put her favourite Swahili recipes into book form.

But not without some prodding from her husband, Mohamed, a Professor in Zoology at the University of Nairobi, who realised that her excellent cooking, praised by many V.I.P.s would make a very popular cookery book, particularly for those who admire such ethnic fare but have no idea as to how it is prepared.

Samira, who now lives on a farm at Mtongwe with 200 chickens and eight cows, has eight children — three of whom are adopted.

She leads a very busy life. Up at 5.30 in the morning for prayers. She then sees that the cows are milked and fed, afterwards weighing the milk and cleaning the house herself.

She makes her own clothes,

and those for the children, and during Ramadhan was extra busy making new clothes for the Idd-ul-Fitr celebration.

With two children working, Samira finds she now has more time to concentrate on dairy and poultry farming. She has planted many paw-paw, banana and citrus trees, and is presently experimenting with grapes.

Her eldest son, Na'im, works for British American Insurance at Mombasa, while daughter Najla, has just joined Pollman's Tours and Safaris.

### ZANZIBAR-BORN

Samira was born in Zanzibar "quite by accident". Explaining this, she said that her mother, on hearing rumours that the Italians were planning to bomb Mombasa during World War 2,

decided with others who were expecting to flee to Zanzibar for safety and stay with relatives there.

Said Samira "soon after I was born and the bomb scare was over, we returned to Mombasa".

Samira is the daughter of Mr and Mrs Din Mohammed of Mombasa, but was brought up largely by Mr and Mrs Twahir Mohamed Hatimy and educated at the then Arab Girls and Bondeni Primary Schools.

She left school to help nurse her sick aunt, and at the age of 14 married Mohamed.

Said Samira "we were neighbours in Mombasa's Old Town and grew up together". She recalled the days when Sheikh Hyder El-Kindy, a prominent politician and former councillor, now a court broker, was a frequent visitor with his family.

As she grew up so he used to tease her about marrying his son. Samira recalled with a laugh "when he said this I used to burst into tears".

Mohamed was still a student when they married. His father had wanted him to study law, but instead he had shown a preference for science.

Said Samira "after Mohamed left Makerere University after obtaining a diploma in education, he taught for a while at Khamisi Secondary School and then, on a scholarship, went to university in Britain."

She went on "he returned from Britain to marry me, and on the second day flew to Scotland to start a course in Zoology at St. Andrews University".

Samira joined him in Scotland in 1957 while he was still at university and lived there for four years, afterwards spending a short time in Leeds.

Two of their children were born in the U.K.

Asked how she had become so proficient in Swahili cuisine, Samira said simply "I learned it from my people". She said "right from the time when I was very small I was always interested in cooking and used to drive people to despair by asking many questions"

When her husband was chairman of the Board of Trustees of Kenya National Parks they used to do a lot of entertaining with Samira doing all the cooking helped by one other in the kitchen.

Guests, who included many V.I.P.s, were full of praise for the tasty food she served.

Said Samira with a laugh "whenever I go to Nairobi I always meet someone who inquires when I might be returning for they still miss those Swahili dinners".

### COOKERY BOOK

Her particular favourites are kukupaka, barbecued chicken, mishkaki, sheshkebabs, samosa, mahamri — which is like a triangular doughnut and kaimati served with lots of syrup.

Said Samira "when my husband first suggested that I should write a cookery book, I refused. But as more support for his suggestion came from our many friends I succumbed and 'Recipes from the Kenya Coast' was published by Longman's and is selling well".

Unfortunately, it is only obtainable in Nairobi at the Text Book Centre behind V.O.K.

It is in English and contains over 50 recipes.

Said Samira "the first publisher to show interest kept my manuscript for a very long time and then turned it down. I was very disappointed for it had entailed so much work.

Ingredients had been checked and counter-checked, and each item cooked to ensure the recipe was correct. This had been done in her spare time when the children were at school, and took over a year to complete.

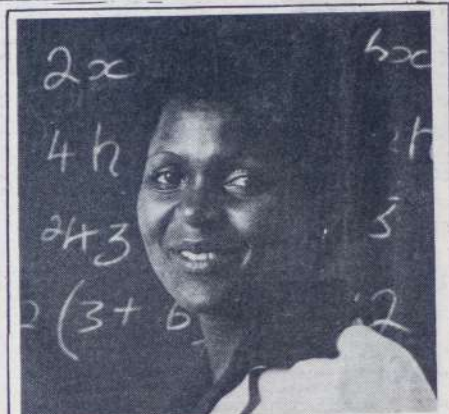
Said Samira "it was eventually published by Longman's and when I saw the first copy in print I was fantastically happy".

Swahili food, much of which is cooked in coconut milk, is some of the tastiest in the world, and it is a great pity that Mombasa with its booming tourist industry does not have a Swahili restaurant where visitors can sample this very delicious local food.

### ARABIAN NIGHTS

Samira feels that most people who come from abroad look forward to eating something different, and that something should be done to cater for this need.

Some hotels feature special Swahili/Arabian Nights — but Mombasa does need a good restaurant just specialising in this ethnic fare.

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# MOMBASA SHOW

## 1980:

### Selbstdarstellung mit viel Spaß und Informationen

UM Land und Leute kennenlernen, muß man sich unter's Volk mischen und an lokalen Veranstaltungen teilnehmen, wann immer sich die Gelegenheit ergibt.

Eine erstklassige Chance, mehr über das Leben in Kenia zu erfahren, bietet sich vom 28. bis 31. August, wenn in Nyali die diesjährige "Mombasa Show 1980" stattfindet.

Die Schau, obwohl sie den Namen "Landwirtschaftliche Schau" trägt und von der gleichnamigen kenianischen Gesellschaft ausgetragen wird, ist gleichwohl viel mehr: eine Art Selbstdarstellung kenianischen Alltagslebens mit Anschauungsbeispielen aus allen Bereichen der Wirtschaft, einer guten Portion Unterhaltung und den verschiedensten Darbietungen von traditionellen Tänzen bis zu Militärparaden.

Kenias Präsident Daniel Arap Moi wird die Messe am 29. August eröffnen. Sie findet zum 16. Male statt; die Schau des letzten Jahres lockte rund 150.000 Besucher an, in diesem Jahr werden rund 200.000 Schaulustige erwartet.

Es wird 211 Stände geben; der Eintritt für Erwachsene kostet pro Tag nur zehn, für Kinder fünf Schilling.

Das Thema der diesjährigen Schau ist, frei übersetzt, "Weniger Armut" und alle Aussteller werden zeigen, was sie in ihrem speziellen Bereich leisten, um den Lebensstandard im Entwicklungsland Kenia anzuheben und die Selbstversorgung der Bürger zu verbessern.

Die Ausfuhr landwirtschaftlicher Erzeugnisse ist Kenias Hauptdevisenbringer, gefolgt vom Tourismus.

So betont der Bürgermeister von Mombasa, Rajab S. Samba, denn auch in seinem Grußwort für die Mombasa-Schau, daß jeder einzelne Kenianer mehr danach streben sollte, das Bestmögliche aus dem fruchtbaren Land zu machen als Schreibtisch-Jobs "mit weißen Kragen" zu besetzen.

#### GEBURTENRATEN

Die unabhängige Selbstversorgung mit Lebensmitteln ist gerade in Afrika mit seinen noch viel zu hohen Geburtenraten eine schwierige, aber lebenswichtige Aufgabe.

Gerade die Engpässe der

vergangenen, trockenen Monate haben wieder deutlich gemacht, daß mehr Vorkehrungen im Bereich Anbau, Lagerung und Transport von lebenswichtigen Gütern getroffen werden müssen, um saisonell schlechte Jahreszeiten überbrücken zu können.

Die Bevölkerung der Küstenprovinz Kenias ist in den vergangenen zehn Jahren um über 40 Prozent auf 1,3 Millionen Menschen angewachsen.

Die jährliche Zuwachsrate ist mit 3,6 Prozent enorm hoch, Programme zur Geburtenplanung werden zwar allerorts gefördert, haben sich aber noch kaum ausgewirkt.

Im Bereich der Küste werden Mais, Reis, Cassava, Hülsenfrüchte und Baumwolle angebaut. Aus Baum-Plantagen kommen Kokosnüsse, Cashewnüsse, Mangos, Zitrusfrüchte und Bananen.

Anbaumethoden, dazu gehört vor allem die Bewässerung, müssen verbessert werden, um das Ziel der "Selbstversorgung im Nahrungsmittelbereich", wie es von Präsident Moi gesteckt wurde, zu erreichen.

Moi selbst ging so weit, "eine landwirtschaftliche Revolution für Kenia" zu fordern, und der Zusammenschluß von Farmen und Händlern in Kooperativen ist ein Schritt dorthin.

Auf der Mombasa-Schau wird Jedermann Gelegenheit haben, sich mit diesen Problemkreisen vertraut zu machen.

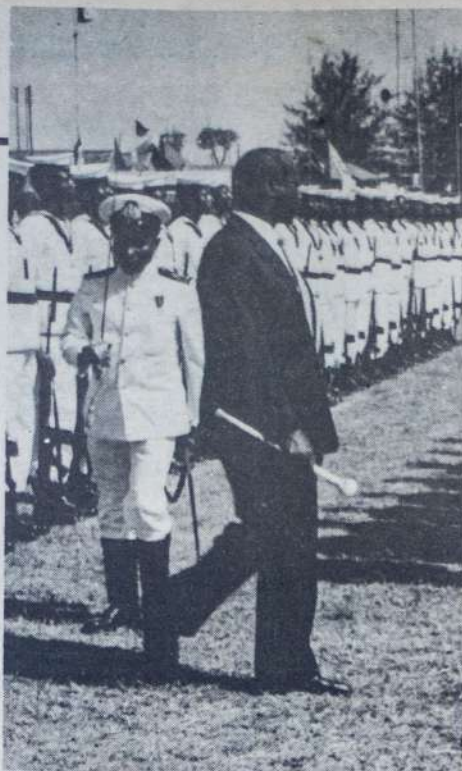
Auch im Bereich der Viehzucht sind Afrikas Sorgen völlig andere als etwa in Deutschland, wo die Weiden mehr oder weniger immergrün und die ganze Palette tropischer Vieh-Krankheiten unbekannt sind.

In Kenia plagt man sich mit der Eindämmung von Ungeziefer-Seuchen in den Rinderherden, die die Viehbestände immer wieder drastisch reduzieren.

An der Küste spielt natürlich auch die Fischwirtschaft und der Fischfang eine große Rolle: 15 moderne Fischkutter und zwei große Tiefsee-Schiffe sind im Besitz privater Gesellschaften an Kenias Küste.

Während der Schau werden tägliche Fisch-Wettstreife ausgetragen. Jeder kann mitmachen und jeden Tag gibt es neue Preise.

Hauptattraktion für die Besucher wird, weil es dort am spannendsten zugeht, jedoch die



Arena inmitten der Schau sein.

Auf dem Veranstaltungsort werden Künstler aller Art ihr Können zum besten geben: Akrobaten und Tänzer, zu Pferd und zu Fuß, auf Motorrädern und in Autos.

Die kenianische Armee bestreitet große Teile des Programms, sie läßt eine Big Band aufspielen und demonstriert Angriffs- und Verteidigungstricks. Schießvorführungen und Feuerwerk sorgen für weiteren Wirbel.

#### GALA-VORSTELLUNGEN

Am Samstag, den 30. August und am Sonntag, den 31. August sind zwei abendliche Gala-Vorstellungen geplant.

Überall auf dem Show-Gelände, das man von der Stadt aus über die Nyali-Brücke erreicht, sind Bars und Restaurants eingerichtet, in denen einheimische Menüs und Getränke aller Art angeboten werden.

Für Kinder gibt es einen Kindergarten, in dem sie unter Aufsicht toben können, bis die Eltern — ungestört — ihren Messe-Bummel beendet haben.

Eine ähnliche Einrichtung gibt es auch für Behinderte, um die man sich hier in Kenia im "Jahr der Behinderten" mit besonderer Aufmerksamkeit kümmert.

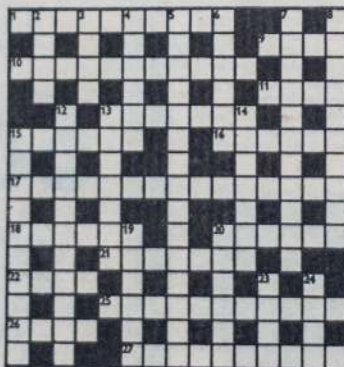

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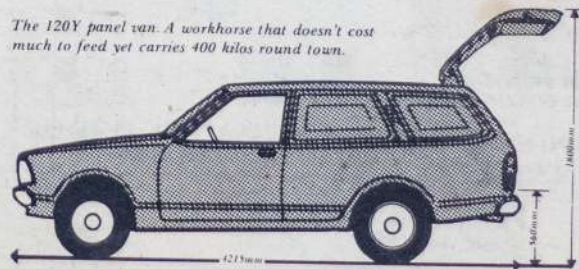
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LAST Sunday, Mombasa Motor Club ran one of its more gentle events, a Treasure Hunt put together by the Karim brothers.
