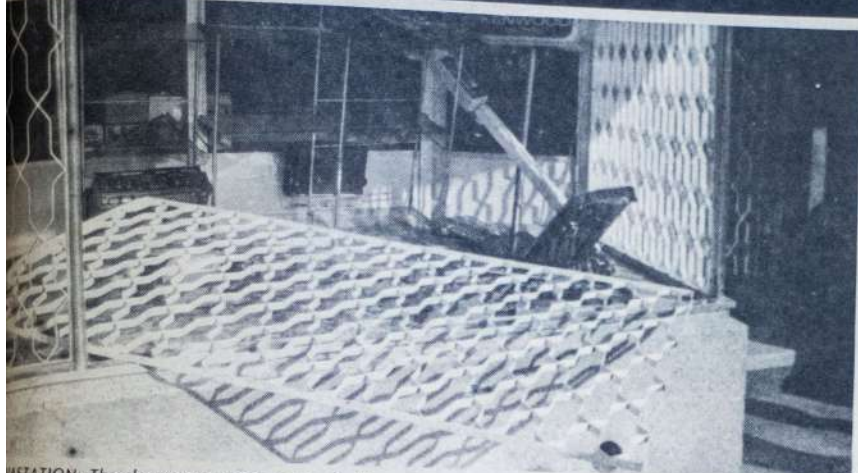

WATCHMAN INJURED

A NEW wave of armed robbery spilled over to the heart of Mombasa when a six-man gang broke into a shop along Nyerere Avenue and made away with property worth Shs. 183,000.

The gang, armed with pangas, runjos, stones and lengths of steel bars and driving in a pick-up without plate numbers, struck in the early hours of Monday.

After a brief battle with the two security men guarding Nyerere Avenue's City House, they broke into the Radiocraft Ltd shop forcing open the steel grill with iron rods.

Among the items stolen were television sets, videos, radios, tape recorders, electronic calculators and loudspeakers.

The director of the company Mr Paresch Malde arrived only minutes after the robbery had taken place.

Still shaken Mr Malde told COASTWEEK of the sudden

attack: "I learned of the robbery from a telephone call by a neighbour who heard the gangsters break into the shop. When I arrived I found the whole place littered with pieces of glass.

"The police were already there. But the shop was virtually empty".

One of the guards who was injured during the fight with the robbers had to be rushed to hospital.

The police, taken by surprise

by the big-time robbery after a long lull, swept into action.

As darkness lifted a crowd of people gathered along Nyerere Avenue as the debris of broken glasses and littered items left behind the gangsters were being cleared from the pavement.

In 1976 a gang of robbers staged a daylight siege at a shop next to Radiocraft but were quickly apprehended after a police chase.

In the past few years there has been a dwindling rate of armed robberies in and around Mombasa.

A recent case involved a gang of robbers who broke into a house in Nyali killing a house servant before making away with property amounting to K.Shs. 70,000.

No recovery of the stolen goods had been made

PILGRIMS OF THE HAJ SET FOR MECCA

A group of Coast Muslims flew out from the Moi International Airport on Wednesday as the holy trek to Mecca gained momentum this week.

The first batch of pilgrims left Mombasa on September 5 for Jeddah.

Hundreds of hopeful travellers are believed to have already applied for tickets and visas for the pilgrimage which falls on October 18.

The pilgrimage of a lifetime for many Muslims is being handled by three local travel agents in Mombasa on scheduled flights by the Kenya Airways and Saudia.

Both airlines are operating two flights weekly from Mombasa and Nairobi bound for Jeddah.

Travel agents have been working round the clock since the beginning of this month

processing travel allowances and visas for Haj travellers and despite stringent immigration formalities and meagre travel allowances they have conceded in private that the rush has never been anything like it before.

It was reliably learnt this week over 500 Kenyan Muslims have arrived in Jeddah ready for the Haj pilgrimage.

AIRPORT FAREWELLS

Since last week the Moi International Airport has been the scene of tearful but joyful farewells as relatives and friends saw off those making the holy trip to Mecca.

The national flag carrier, Kenya Airways is flying the bulk of the travellers between now and October 10 from Mombasa and Nairobi.

In the light of difficulties being encountered by would-be pilgrims the Kenya Government has been requested to increase the travel allowance from K.Shs. 7,000 to 10,000.

Mombasa residents have also requested the Saudi Embassy to open a temporary office in Mombasa in order to

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Residents of Tiwi and Waa in Diani Location, Kwale District have declared war against hooliganism and all sorts of crime and assured Kwale D.C. Mr Isaac Lukalo that in one month they will have wiped out prostitutes, bhong smokers and hooligans.

The resolution was passed at a baraza addressed by the D.C. and attended by Councillors, Chiefs and local leaders including Kwale M.P.s Mr Juma Boy and Mr. Kassim Mwamzandi who is also an Assistant Minister For Energy.

In his address, the D.C. expressed concern over the alarming increase of hooliganism in the well-known tourist area and threatened to bring in security to clear the area of hooliganism.

He warned that his office will leave no stone unturned until he was assured of wananchi's freedom of movement in the area.

The D.C. then appealed to the people in the area to cooperate and report all suspected of hooliganism to appropriate authorities and gave them a one-month ultimatum to clear the area before security forces did the 'job'.

Earlier area Councillor Suleiman Mairi on behalf of the residents thanked the police for carrying out a swoop that eliminated all loiterers along the beach hotels recently.

The Councillor called on the local industries and hotels to employ local labour force.

He also appealed to the Government to consider returning the piece of land for the proposed cashewnut factory at Tiwi to wananchi because the project had been abandoned.

On land adjudication, the councillor said the area had been adjudicated several years back but wondered why cattle dips were being delayed.

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TENANTS TOLD TO IGNORE 'QUIT NOTICE'

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Sixty eight families in Mikindani, Mombasa who were given notices to demolish their houses by October 15 this year, have now been told not to do so until they get compensation and alternative plots given to them.

Mikindani is among three areas within the Mombasa Municipality where the World Bank is undertaking a multi-million housing project for the low-income group.

Under the scheme which will take off soon, residents will be provided with plots and loans in the form of materials to put up houses.

Addressing the affected residents, chairman of Town Planning and Works, Councillor Ramadan Kajembe said the houses will give way for the construction of roads and sewerage as part of the infrastructure for the project.

Other social amenities, he said, will include schools, churches and mosques, whose plots have already been set aside.

Councillor Kajembe told the residents that apart from the compensation, allocation of alternative plots and material assistance the residents will be able to demolish their own houses and take away building material to put up temporary structures pending the completion of their permanent houses.

He said he was aware that 122 residents who qualified to be allocated plots for the scheme did not submit their applications and urged them to do so before December 15.

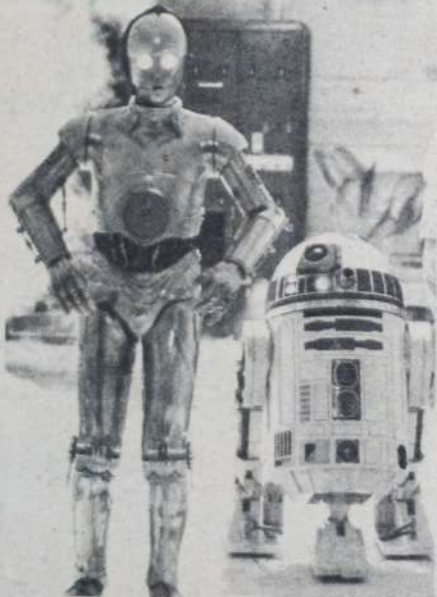

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MOMBASA

Communication Students film Mkomani Clinic

STUDENTS from the Film Production Training Department of the Kenya Institute of Mass Communication were in Mombasa last week filming the Mkomani Harambee Health Clinic for showing on V.O.K.

The K.I.M.C. which has some 200 students training in all forms of media work comes under the Ministry of Information while its Film Production Training Department is being sponsored by Frederick Ebert Foundation of Germany.

Heading the film unit at Mombasa was Hartmut Dieckmann, producer and lecturer, and before departing they gave a donation to the clinic as they were "so impressed".

During the filming the Provincial Commissioner, Coast, Mr Luka Galgalo, dropped in and after a conducted tour told all those concerned with the project "carry on with the good work".

The film of the Mkomani Harambee Health Clinic is also

being taken to Munich, Germany, in November to be shown at the Scientific Congress on the use of the mass media for Health Education programmes. This event is attracting strong participation from developing countries.

The clinic attends to some 1700 patients a month the fee being only Shs. 5 per visit. There is a qualified doctor and nursing staff. Other facilities offered include a baby clinic, immunisation, also a comprehensive clinic for women covering ante and post-natal care, family planning and an 'anaemia' clinic.

In charge is Dr Varinder Singh Sur who has been selected by the John Hopkins Medical Institute of America for an administrative course in maternity and family planning.

Said Mrs Hayati Anjarwalla "for our doctor to have been chosen out of thousands of applicants proves the importance of the services we provide".

Born in Nairobi, Varinder Singh Sur was educated at Mombasa's Alhidina Visram High School doing his medical training at the Punjab University.

Before joining the clinic in March he was working at the Machakos Hospital also at the Aga Khan Hospital, Nairobi.

The clinic was established and is being run on donations from a few philanthropic members of society to help improve the health of the nation as well as easing congested government and municipal clinics.

It is the first clinic of its kind at the Coast. The land on which it stands was donated by the Suleiman family, while construction costs of Shs. 160,000 came mainly from the Gidoomal family, with friends making up the rest.

It is administered by a 12-strong executive committee.

They include representatives from the M.O.H., two local chiefs, D.O. of the area, Mrs Mary Mwamodo area officer of the Family Planning Association, Coast; Mrs Pushpa Gidoomal; Mrs Ause Sondhi; Mrs Jaishree Jaipal and Dr Kishore Pattani, a medical practitioner who has been a "pillar of strength" throughout its development.

Mrs Hayati Anjarwalla, chairman, disclosed that by year's end they hope to launch a crash programme with Family Planning International Assistance of America.

A grant of Shs. 200,000 is being made, and the aim of the Shaani project is to promote family planning, as well as mother and child health.

The programme covers Kisauni, Kongowea, Kileleni, Bamburi, Kikambala and also 15 beach hotels on the north coast.

Development plans for the Mkomani Harambee project include a nursery school and maternity wing.

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — An Assistant Minister for Commerce Mr Sharif Nassir has praised His Excellency President Moi for undertaking his recent visit to China and observed that the huge interest free loan to be given to Kenya and other agreements made between the two countries would be of immense benefit to the wananchi.

Mr Nassir who is also the Mombasa District Kanu branch chairman thanked the President when he chaired the District Kanu governing Council meeting in Mombasa. He said that His Excellency President Moi being a man of the people was increasingly concerned about the welfare of the country's populace saying that his travels far and wide had brought Kenya innumerable good tidings and promoted understanding between the people of the different nations.

ROUGH ROADS OVER TSAVO

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Tour operators in the Coast have complained of the rough roads which lead to the tourist sites at Tsavo West and Amboseli National Parks.

A group of tour operators in Malindi said the roads from Chyulu Gate in Tsavo West down to the junction to Litoikitok and Kimana Gate near Amboseli need urgent repairs with a view to making them all-weather.

They attributed it to potholes, loose murrum, stones and excessive dust which have caused several serious breakdown to motorcars.

Most of the operators are African beginners in the trade and have no big fleets.

"Repairs are costing us too much" lamented one of them from Bush Baby Safaris.

Other tour operators who complained are Ibrahim Photographers, Bunson Travels and the Hire Safaris.

Most of the roads are maintained by the county Councils and they have appealed to them to heed "our urgent request".

MAZRUI PLOTS TO SETTLE LANDLESS

KILIFI (K.N.A.) — Coast P.C. Mr Luka Galgalo has assured Takaungu residents in Kilifi District that the government was doing everything possible to have the land on which they live as squatters, registered in their name to enable them to carry out effective development.

Negotiations are presently being conducted between the government and the Mazrui family, who are the landlord, regarding the acquisition of the over 1,500 acres of land which is currently undeveloped.

Addressing a large public baraza at Takaungu Primary School, Mr Galgalo said it had been necessary to acquire the land so that the wananchi may develop and grow more food on it.

Flanked by Kilifi D.C. Mr B. A. Omuse and an Assistant Minister for Local Government Mr Noah Katana Nigala the P.C. commended the Mazrui family for living in peace with the squatters.

"This is in keeping with President Moi's call that everybody should be mindful of others welfare" he said.

BRIEFS

ROA (K.N.A.) — Two game reserves in Tana River District have benefited from a development grant of Shs. 1.2 million to be used for improving infrastructure so as to attract more tourists to the area. Tana River County Council chairman Ramadhan (Jo) Bere said the fund will be used for constructing roads, staff houses and for paying wages and salaries of the personnel working in the reserves.

KILIFI (K.N.A.) — People working in urban areas have been blamed for not taking an active role in fund raising activities in their rural areas, animated Councillor Robert Nenga told a harambee meeting at Bundacho Primary School, Kilifi District. He said the poor parents in the rural areas spent their meagre savings to educate their children under difficult conditions, with the hope that the educated young men would take a leading role in the development of their communities.

LAMU (K.N.A.) — Three women groups in Lamu have received a financial boost totalling Shs. 2,000 from the Ministry of Culture and Social Services. The groups are Lamu women 'A' which received Shs. 10,000, Lamu women 'B' which received Shs. 10,000 while Faza women group received Shs. 2,000.

KWALE (K.N.A.) — Kwale D.C. Gaack Lukalo has expressed disappointment at the current rate of development in the district and immediately called upon all government departments to gang up and to mobilize the local people into making the importance of agriculture and cooperative work.

Nigerians show 'Keen interest' in Coast stay

MALINDI (K.N.A.) — The chairman of the Coast branch of the Kenya's Association of Hotel Keepers and Caterers Mr Kim Morbey has said the Kenya Coast has recently become very popular among other African countries as a tourist resort. Mr Morbey said people from the oil rich Nigeria and the hitherto "imprisoned" Zimbabweans are now frequent visitors to the coast.

Mr Morbey said that the standards of Kenya Hotels are higher than those in other countries and coupled with the Association's vigorous publicity campaign he added "our hotels are full all the year round for the first time".

Meanwhile, the Jamba Hotels Limited has finalised plans with the Pan American world airline service for a direct link with West Africa to bring in more tourists from there.

According to the managing director of the company Mr Kim Morbey this is as a result of the realisation that more people can come from nearby African countries which do not cost much in air fares.

He said that immediately after independence he paid a visit to Zimbabwe to bait tourists from there. The result has been very successful, he noted. He said formerly it was not easy in the last ten years for people to leave Zimbabwe, hence, the present interest in the Kenya Coast.

Tanzania gets a 'Kiss of Life' worth two billion shillings!

TANZANIA HAS at last received the long awaited "Kiss of Life" from the International Monetary Fund (I.M.F.). The world financial nerve centre has approved a Shs. two billion loan for vital imports and rebuild the economy which is equivalent to Shs. 194.6 million Special Drawing Rights (S.D.R.) in foreign exchange.

The Minister for Finance, Mr Amir Jamal said that Shs. 161.1 million would be used for compensation on export earnings due to commodity price falls and the remaining Shs. 1.930 million will be under the special standby agreement. This is the first time Tanzania has received Shs. one billion from any agency to be used for one financial year and the loan opens the way for other Western nations to "inject" a lot of aid.

For although Mr Jamal noted that the I.M.F. agreed with Tanzania's targets and plans, by the same token he added that the government had agreed to regulate its borrowing from banks as well as the commercial sector.

It is also understood the government is not "ploughing" any money into uneconomic projects.

A prominent social worker, Dr. R. M. Chhabbar told President Nyerere in Dar es Salaam that more than 54,000 Tanzanians have benefitted from free optical aid ever since he launched his "new eye for the needy" campaign on July 1, 1970.

Dr Chhabbar - Tanzanian of Indian origin is a former primary school teacher and took up a course in optometrics in 1969/70.

Mwalimu Nyerere praised Dr Chhabbar and added that his services had contributed to the success of the campaign.

Hotels were also in the news, and the Musoma Railway Hotel was finally opened but on a trial basis. The hotel owned by the Tanzania Railways Corporation (T.R.C.) has 52 rooms, four V.I.P. suites, a state suite and three bedrooms.

The Dodoma T.R.C.-owned hotel is undergoing a Shs. 22 million expansion and work is scheduled to be completed in early 1982, while neighbouring Singida region which houses the world famous "Rock Paintings" is to build a Shs. 14 million tourist hotel.

The Bwani Hotel in Zanzibar is also to increase the accommodation and restaurant capacity to grapple with increased visitors for international conferences and national celebrations.

The Indian hotel management company Oberoi Hotels Limited who are managing the hotel have prepared a feasibility report and are awaiting approval from the Zanzibar government. The Bwani Hotel has 100 self contained rooms.

In Nzeza District, Tabora, Tanzanian Police have secured their largest ever haul of wildlife trophies - thanks to a tip-off.

Police found 928 elephant tusks weighing 4,423 kgs. and valued at Shs. 3.1 million in a truck which was on its way from Dar es Salaam normally transporting essential commodities to the State-owned regional trading companies.

The vehicle also belongs to a State-owned company.

In Mbeya, southern Tanzania, a man has been charged in court for being in illegal possession of a leopard skin worth Shs. 5,000.

Heads of the postal departments in Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania have met in Arusha to discuss the exchange of mail and the mail traffic structure between the three countries.

Dar es Salaam commuters will be greatly relieved next month when most of the 40 200-capacity articulated "ikarus" buses from Hungary will be on the streets covering the most populous routes in the city.

NEW JERSEY

and construction of the airport. Aeronport have designed the extensions and renovations to the Dar es Salaam International Airport which will cost more than Shs. 400 million when completed in 1984.

The second phase of the trunk services in Dodoma has hit a snag. The project which is being undertaken by an international firm - MS Saarberg Interplan - and which is due for completion in July next year may be delayed due to a shortage of steel and cement.

The Shs. 60 million contract involves the construction of 12kms. of water mains from the outskirts of the town to the national capital centre. The mains include two water pumping stations, and a 35,000 cubic metre reservoir now under construction.

A three-member Tanzanian team has left for Bujumbura, Burundi for a four-day routine meeting of the commission for the organisation of the management and development of the Kagera River Basin.

One of the issues to be discussed at the meeting will be Uganda's membership to the organisation which embraces Tanzania, Burundi and Rwanda.

Meanwhile, a six-man Iraqi trade delegation has arrived from Maputo to hold discussions with local officials.

The visitors will also tour industries in Dar es Salaam and Tanga.

Tanzania's coastline is facing serious pollution following indiscriminate disposal of waste by ships plying the Indian Ocean.

An aerial survey has revealed a black layer forming of water along the coast as a result of the waste disposal.

A new association is in the "offing" to be known as the Tanzania Association of Parastatal Organisations (T.A.P.O.) it will act as a forum for chief executives and managers of parastatals to exchange views on problems confronting them.

HUNGARY

Hungary's President, Pal Losonczi leaves Dar es Salaam this week for home after a six-day state visit to Tanzania.

This is his second state visit to Tanzania and is one of the few Heads of State to make such a visit to Tanzania.

Preliminary studies for the construction of Tanzania's third international airport at Dodoma have been completed. The ultra-modern airport will be built at Msalato, some 20kms. from Dodoma.

Discussions are in full swing in Paris with the world famous French airport consultants - Aeronport de Paris on the financing, planning, designing

With five million illiterate people in Kenya, members of the Sabharwal family on the South Coast decided they would like to make a contribution to mark the 15th anniversary of International Literacy Day honoured in Kenya recently.

They approached Chief Bakari S. Kula of Waa Location for his assistance in deciding in what way they could help.

As a result Gatana Mishi, a Form I student at the Matuga Girls High School - who comes from Waa Location - is the beneficiary of a bursary donated by the Sabharwal family covering the cost of her education and boarding at this school for the next four years.

Gatana's parents were unable to pay the fees and it looked as if her school days might be over. She was an 'above average' student at the primary school she attended.

In thanking the Sabharwal family for their generosity, the Chief appealed to others with the means to follow their example.

The Sabharwals do much to help the community in which they live, and soon will be opening a clinic on their farm to give 'free' medical treatment not only to their staff, but to poor people in the surrounding area.

They have also donated 20 beds for the maternity wing of the Harambee Clinic in the Shimba Hills of which Sister Petronilla of the Catholic Mission is in charge.

In addition, and together with another benefactor, Alibhai Khan - a prominent businessman at Diani - they have donated an ante-natal clinic for the Msambweni Hospital.

ARCHEOLOGISTS CONTINUE WORK ON SWAHILI SITE

NEW evidence indicating the importance of an ancient settlement off the Kenyan coast has been uncovered by archaeologists in the past few days.

A joint programme between the National Museum of Kenya and Operation Drake on the remains of the early port of Shanga has produced an amazing array of relics.

Although only a small area of the site on Pate Island has so far been excavated, innumerable houses, graves and several mosques have been uncovered.

Three tenth century houses, together with vital inscriptions on one of the mosques have been discovered in the last few days alone.

The team of workers, under Cambridge archaeologist Mark Horton are becoming increasingly excited by the significance of the find, which could be one of the most important early Islamic sites south of the Sahara.

Mr Richard Leakey, Director of the National Museums of Kenya, is guarded at this stage about the importance of the Shanga project in comparison with other archaeological sites in the country.

"Some very important work has been done - and it is only just beginning. It is a big site and we have only done a trial excavation in one area, but the signs are good"

But he adds, "It is probably the most important early Islamic coastal site in the region".

"It covers a large area and a long span of time. The relics are well preserved".

Mr Leakey's staff, represented on the site by Athman Lali, plan to continue the work for several years even after the Operation Drake team have left in the next few weeks.

The city of Shanga was a thriving port trading in ivory, spices and slaves before it was abandoned 500 years ago.

The existence of the remains, covered for centuries by soil and undergrowth, have been known for some time by Mr Leakey's staff but it has only been the arrival of Operation Drake, the British organised round-the-world expedition, that has enabled the heavy clearing work to be carried out.

BURA SQUATTERS GIVEN FREE PLOTS

HOLA (K.N.A.) - Some 150 squatters living on the site of the proposed Shs. 1.3 million Bura Irrigation Settlement Scheme in Northern Division of Tana River District are to be given free plots on state land adjacent to the project to set up their village. This was disclosed by the area D.C. Mr Moses Okal when an Assistant Minister for Works Mr Mohamed Omar Sobu made an inspection tour of Bura.

'ONE HOPES THAT THIS IS NOT THE END OF THE STORY'

ALTHOUGH Africans were present in fewer numbers at the recent World Conference in Copenhagen compared to participants from Asia, America and Europe, their impact was unquestionable.

Both at the official U.N. Conference and the non-governmental organisations' meeting, African women appeared united in defence of their culture and dignity against what they described as western women's cultural and political domination.

They openly told the western feminists that they were committed to retaining their traditional and cherished family values and warned them not to interfere in their businesses as they have different values and lifestyles.

Many African speakers said that initiatives of the Decade for women should avoid the breakdown of the family unit

as this could create a situation like in most Western countries where domestic violence, wife battering, child sexual abuse and incest are becoming the order of the day.

Obviously this kind of militancy was a shock to many western women who, for a long time thought of themselves as leaders of women of the world.

When western women accused some African traditional customs as being oppressive to women, they were told to lay off issues that they understand little about.

As one delegate put it, "At once, we are letting the world know that we object to the way Africa has been exploited and presented and we are telling the western women that they have been a quiet collaborators in this exploitation".

Copenhagen revealed the lack of trust that exists between the west and Africa. This issue of trust brought much despair among the women who hoped to strengthen international sisterhood and warned that unless some efforts are directed to establishing relations that are based on trust, 1985 will come and go and women will still be divided.

But the struggle to establish trust is hard given the fact that one of the major obstacles to development of women and their countries is the exploitation of the developing countries by the developed countries.

Although African military in Copenhagen may have misinterpreted by those who believe that women of the world have nothing to lose by uniting except their inequalities, African can build bridges to women in other parts of the world when they can define their own realities.

And to get particularly the western women to accept that there cannot be equality of men and women in the world so long as the developed countries continue to plunder the developing countries' resources.

One cannot claim to promote equality if one condones activities that create inequalities.

STUDY GROUP
A case in point. An international study group at the Conference which said its aim was to inform the developed countries about the needs of the third world women had no one from Africa in the panel until a complaint was launched.

It was out of concern for the prevailing colonial attitude of the developed countries towards Africa and other third world countries that African women sought to encourage new links that are

developmentally wise with the western women.

These links would be devoted to understanding the problems of women in all fields of development, research, education, health and education - particularly in remote and needy areas.

The need for research on women was emphasised by the Association of African Women for Research and Development (A.A.W.O.R.D.), whose representatives reminded the world that much of the research done in Africa by the developed countries has often been for no other reasons than to satisfy academic curiosity and to confirm some pre-conceived theories.

Copenhagen showed that you cannot have a world conference and ignore African views.

Like in the Mexico Conference, the Mexico group's African emphasis was a more action-oriented plan to promote the welfare of our women and children.

This projection of dealing with the basic needs lies up with the proposals

of a New International Economic Order.

In other words, African women were telling the world that you cannot talk about equality when millions of people in the developing countries live in poverty and when their natural resources are being exploited by the developed world.

In that sense, African women linked inequality of sexes to the unequal distribution of the world's resources and people who lack basic needs do not have the luxury, time and energy to talk about the more trivial aspects of life that some western women wanted the Conference to devote itself to.

So what was the African women asking the world to do in order to help the continent to develop?

As one of the least developed regions in the world, it has limited financial resources for carrying out development plans.

OPPORTUNITY

Copenhagen provided a special opportunity for Africa to draw the attention of the international community to its particular development needs.

But as a Kenyan delegate said, "developing countries need a lot of financial aid but they do not want donors to put a rope round our necks".

Apartheid, underdevelopment and the poor conditions under which many millions of women and children live were the major concerns of most Africans in Copenhagen.

While expressing solidarity with all the oppressed people in the world they drew attention of the world to the way apartheid oppresses black people in Southern Africa and the complicity of the western countries in this oppression.

All said, perhaps Copenhagen enabled African women to acquire strength from the knowledge that if they felt discriminated against where they come from, many women from different parts of the world have felt the same and maybe something can be done to change this situation.

And while African women's strength and influence shown in Copenhagen were unquestionable, one hopes that this is not the end of the story.

This strength has to be transformed into a reality for the majority of women who were not and could not be in Copenhagen.

'TAKE THEM TO COURT'

SOME landlords have adopted a very wrong way of forcibly evicting tenants from their houses.

In some cases, tenants are known to have been subjected not only to annoyance and chilly nights but also to actual bodily harm by casually hired men.

Such hired men usually storm into defenceless families pulling down doors and windows in a bid to lock tenants out.

These landlords should make use of our courts of law instead of taking the law into their hands.

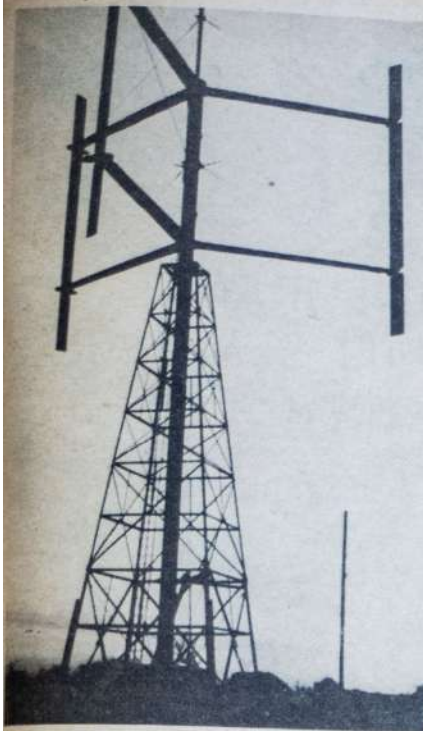
The traditional dances,

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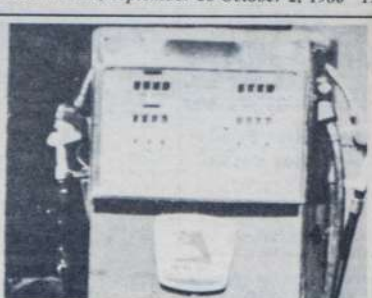

FOR ENERGY**



GAS: The recent find of natural gas in huge amount and concentration of space should lead France out of its energy crisis. Underneath the village Lacq, in the south-western French province of Aquitania, a field of natural gas of more than 200,000 million cubic metres has been discovered quite by accident. However, geologists believe that further boring down

to the depth of 4,000 metres might produce many times as much as this amount. In short time, the first plants were built for producing petrol, butane, propane and sulphur, and also mineral oil has been detected by borings. It is planned that the entire industry of West and South France will be supplied by the "gas of Lacq". PHOTO: KEYSTONE

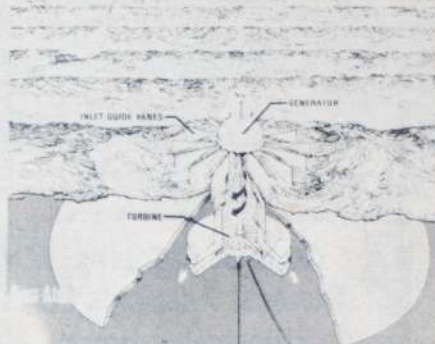
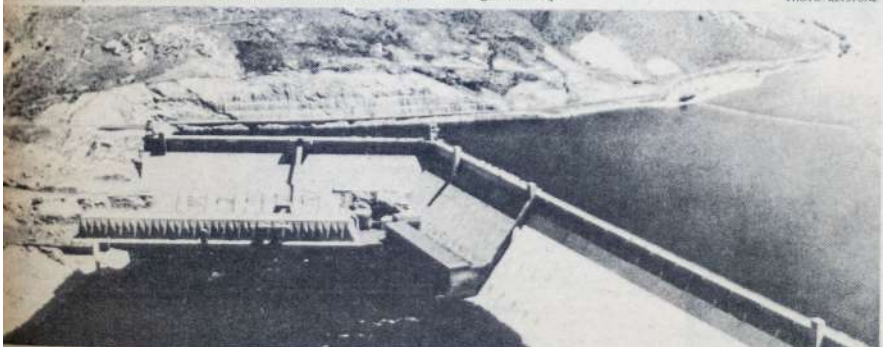


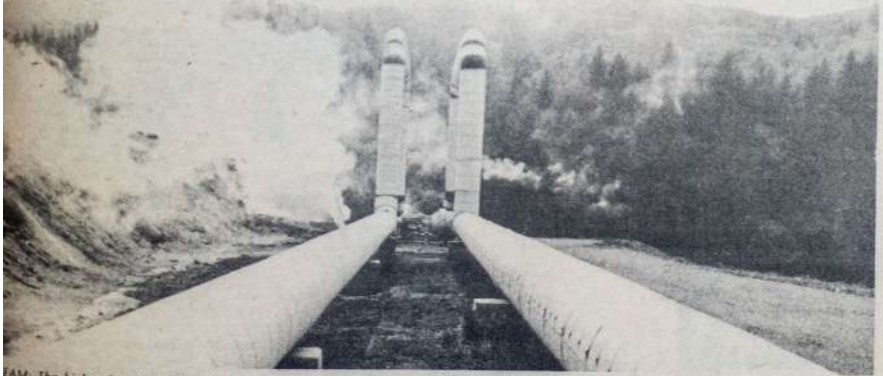

OCEAN WAVES: A test system to explore the feasibility of producing electricity from the energy stored in ocean waves will be developed by Lockheed Missiles and Space Co. under a two-year \$593,000 contract awarded by the U.S. Department of Energy's Solar Energy Research Institute (S.E.R.I.). Called Dam-Atoll, the system to be built will be a 1/50th scale model (one and a half metres in diameter) of a full size system that Lockheed estimates would be capable of producing from one to two megawatts. Looking at a Dam-Atoll unit from the side, it resembles an open umbrella with a short straight handle. The unit operates almost totally submerged. As waves approach, they wrap around the Dam-Atoll unit and enter a central core from all points. The waves actually change direction at the trailing edge of the unit and enter the rear of Dam-Atoll moving in the opposite direction to that in which they were originally travelling. Vanes on the top of Dam-Atoll channel waves into the 15 metre-deep central core, creating a vortex of whirlpool in the core to turn turbine blades and produce electricity.

Another Ship goes 'Missing'

THE LOSS without any apparent trace of yet another vessel laden with Ore could create another unsolved mystery of the sea.

A tragedy of considerable magnitude is the disappearance of the 170,000 d.w. ton Bibby Line vessel *Derbyshire* when just four days short of her destination, Kawasaki, Japan, after a voyage across the Pacific from Seven Islands, Eastern Canada with 158,000 tons of iron ore.

The vessel encountered Typhoon Orchid at which time it is feared she met her end, however, in the same way as similar losses, no S.O.S. or any radio message was transmitted by the vessel.

The only clue could be an oil slick in the area where the vessel was last heard of, and samples are being taken for analysis to try and establish if from the missing ship.

She had 44 persons on board, all British including two wives. Built in 1976 she was insured

for \$24 million and if officially denied by Lloyds to be a total loss, it could be the biggest British flag loss in maritime history.

The Bibby Line of Liverpool, whose vessels have occasionally called at Mombasa whilst on charter, is one of the leading and oldest established of British Shipping Companies, and the loss of the vessel is indeed a tragedy of the first order and again highlights the frightening capability of the sea, irrespective of the size of the vessel involved.

The handling over of the *Mayotte* or *Southern Dawn* to her new Greek owners took longer than originally expected, however, sale formalities were

finally completed and she sailed out of Kilindini at 1645 hours last Saturday evening as jet 3 bound for Mediterranean waters.

Her funnel has now been painted white. She was commanded on her delivery voyage by Captain Ron Hamblen, a well known personality in Mombasa shipping circles having served as Master with Southern Line and E.A.N.S.L. vessels.

Having remarked last week of the presence in the port of the ex Union Castle vessel *Winchester Universal* I have since heard that this is her last voyage and she is to be sold with possible handover in Mombasa.

I wonder if her three ex Union Castle sister ships are also destined for the sale and purchase market.

Union Castle

The mention of Union Castle in the container era reminds me that a new chartered vessel is to be introduced on the P & O/Union Castle monthly cellular container service from the U.K./Continent and Northbound to Felixstowe.

She will be the 13,300 d.w. ton German flag *Slovan Mira* built this year. Due to arrive at Mombasa on her first voyage towards the end of October.

Her container capacity is 555 which is over 100 more than her predecessor m.v. *Tristan* whom she replaces.

This well illustrates how the container fever is now gathering momentum.

Another car carrier discharging over 300 vehicles from Japan was on No. 1 berth earlier this week, she was the three year old *Neptune Iris* on charter to Mitsui O.S.K. Line and owned by the leading Singapore liner shipping company Neptune Orient Line (N.O.L.).

I was surprised to see that the W.E.C. container vessel *Ana Del Mar* thought it worth her while to make a second call at Mombasa this week to load 10 containers only, the economics of which I do not pretend to understand.

An unusual employment for the *Clan Line* is the Scandinavian trade. The *Clan Macgregor* discharging at No. 12 berth on charter to the Scandinavian East Africa Line has already been dubbed the *Macgregorford*.

She is discharging some 3,000 tons and will be handed back to her Owners on completion down coast.

Greek Ship

The second vessel of the crack P & O Strath 'E' class arrived this week to load some 1,600 tons for the U.S.A. She is the two year old 12,600 ton *Strathewe* which will sail direct to the States in 25 days on completion of loading, thus giving exporters the fastest service to the American continent out of the port of Mombasa.

And so the maize dischargers continue to arrive, the Greek vessel *Vasilis* on a return call is due today with 14,600 tons of yellow maize.

In view of the short time ago the vessel was here discharging her previous cargo, I assume the latest consignment has been loaded from a Mozambique port.

Four days later on the 30th the *Kapitan Michalis* is due with another shipload of 14,500 tons of yellow maize.

The theme of the seminar at the Oceanic was Analytical selling with particular emphasis on various approaches, presentations and an analysis of both the customers' and the agents' response to marketing communication.

I.S.C.O.S. REPORT 'SUCCESS IN TALKS WITH SOVIETS'

THE I.S.C.O.S. delegation has just returned from a week long visit to the U.S.S.R. During the visit, the delegation held discussions with the Baltic Shipping Company (B.S.C.) under which Besta Line operates.

This was the first meeting which I.S.C.O.S. had with the B.S.C. following the visit to I.S.C.O.S. in Mombasa in March, 1979 by representatives of the U.S.S.R. Ministry of Merchant Marine.

ISCOS secretary general Z. N. Banda said the two delegations discussed matters relating to the operations of Besta Line to and from Eastern African ports.

They also explored areas of further co-operation in shipping between the U.S.S.R. and the ISCOS member countries of Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda and Zambia. "ISCOS' visit to the U.S.S.R. was another step towards the fulfilment of ISCOS' desire to continue improving her contacts and relationships with shipowners in all the trades and ensure that the rates applied are equitable and, where necessary, alternative carries be initiated" said Mr Banda.

CHEAP AIRFARES TO SEYCHELLES

CHEAPER AIR fares between Seychelles and Britain will come into effect in November. An agreement between the Ministry of Transport and Tourism and British Airways means that travel in either direction will be 33 per cent cheaper than at present, the only condition being that tickets must be booked and bought at least one month before the flying date.

Children will pay 25 per cent of adult fare, and accompanied infants not occupying a seat will pay 10 per cent of adult fare. No stopover is allowed. Similarly a special group fare has been agreed between British Airways and the Austrian Government for flights between Austria and Seychelles, which will provide an incentive for more Austrians to come to the country.

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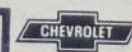
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HUNDE UND LÖWEN IN MOMBASA

Die Sicht war aber durch dicke Büsche stark behindert und es wurde bereits dunkel, so daß die Schützen ihr Ziel verfehlten.

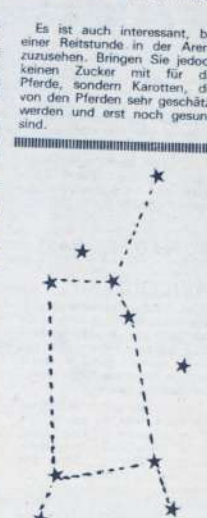
Unter diesen Umständen konnte sich die Löwin in Freiheit Mombasa, resp. Nyali bei Nacht ansehen.

Europa hat sich der Malindi in den letzten Jahren mehr verschrieben und ist nicht nur für Leute, bei denen Geld keine Rolle spielt, sondern auch für Durchschnittsbürger interessant geworden.

Es wird bestimmt mancher in Gelegenheitsbegeisterung, seine Reitkenntnisse aus Kenia anzuwenden oder überhaupt erst hier mit diesem Reitsport zu beginnen.

Der Reitstall Baharini Stables befindet sich direkt an der Hauptstraße von Malindi, wo ein Strandhotel aus andere Richtung ist von dort bequem zu erreichen.

Der Besitzer, ein Österreicher, hat sich ein Pferdewerkstatt eingerichtet, um die Möglichkeit zu bieten, an Wien an der Spanischen Reitschule zu arbeiten, nahm das Angebot mit

Willingen an und lernte demnach sieben Jahren soviel über Pferde: Ausbildung, Pflege, Fütterung, Springen und Reitsport.

Maschellend studierte er zwei Jahre Veterinärmedizin und ist nun in der Lage, seine Pferde, falls nötig, selbst zu behandeln und festzustellen, was ihnen fehlt.

Der junge Held, Rangji Sondhi, vollführte während vielen Stunden eine weghelbe Rettungsaktion, um fünf Schiffbrüchige sicher an Land zu bringen und ihr gesunkenes Boot wieder aufzufinden und zu bergen.

Drei amerikanische Seemänner von der U.S. Navy hatten letzten Monat an der Nordküste ein Fischerboot gemietet und fuhren frühmorgens mit zwei Fischern übers Indische Meer nach Schorweck.

Am English Point, bei der Einfahrt zum Altan Hafen, wurden sie von einer Strömung seawards erfährt und von hohen Wellengang überrollt.

Das Boot kenterte, und die Fischer kassierten hatten sich nun außen daran fest zu sorgen. Es lief bis um 11 Uhr, als endlich Rettung nahte.

Rangji Sondhi bog sich an jenem Morgen auf einen Bootsausflug von

Reef Hotel aus, das seinen Vater Herrn Kalipj Sondhi gehört, und befand sich in Begleitung einiger holländischer, junger Mädchen.

Als sie sich Mombasa näherten, sahen sie außerhalb vom English Point etwas auf dem Wasser treiben, konnten aber aufgrund der unruhigen See nicht erkennen, was es war.

Sie fuhren direkt darauf zu und sahen schließlich 2 Fischer und 3 Touristen, wie sie dachten, die sich an einem umgekippten Boot festhielten.

Die Schiffbrüchigen riefen aus um Hilfe, und die drei Amerikaner konnten in das andere Boot gezogen und an Land gebracht werden.

Rangji katzte zur Unfallstelle zurück, diesmal mit seinem Freund, dem 18-jährigen amerikanischen Studenten Kurt Meyer, der seit 1978 seinen Sommerurlaub jeweils bei den Sondhis in Kenia verbringt.

Die beiden Fischer wurden in Sicherheit gebracht; ihr Boot war in der Zwischenzeit untergegangen.

Das Meer war immer noch sehr unruhig, die Flut kam herein, aber Rangji war entschlossen, nach dem gesunkenen Boot zu suchen.

Sie hatten kein Glück, von dem Boot war keine Spur zu sehen, die Sonne ging bereits unter und plötzlich war der Benzintank leer, so daß nun auch das Rettungsboot kraftlos in den Wellen schaukelte.

MEISTERSCHWIMMER

Nun war die Reihe an Kurt, die Mannschaft zu retten. Als ehemaliger U.S. Meisterschwimmer sprang er kurz entschlossen ins Wasser und schwamm mit kräftigen Zügen ans Ufer, um ein weiteres Boot zu Hilfe zu schicken.

Der tollkühne Rangji gab immer noch nicht auf, und es gelang ihm schließlich doch noch, das Fischerboot zu heben und an Land zu ziehen.

So wurde seine unermeßliche Ausdauer belohnt, und auch der mühsamen, stundenlangen Rettungsaktion wurde er gebührend als Held des Tages gelobt.



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FENNEL ON FOOD

FENNEL: Sadly seldom seen

FENNEL: This anise flavoured vegetable is much appreciated by the Italians who seem to make more than most nationalities of its bulbous stem, the texture of which resembles celery.

Fennel seeds are used to flavour pickles, pastries and liqueurs and come from a wilder, more starchy variety than the type used for salads or with fish. It is particularly suited to the preparation of fish. It should never be boiled and is better for slow stewing in meat stocks for example.

To prepare it, trim away the leafy top stems as well as close to the root. Do not discard the feathery leaves which can be added to stocks to impart a stronger flavour if desired or chopped and used as a garnish. Use these with discretion however as they are quite pungent.

Wash in cold water. For salads the fennel roots may be halved lengthwise then sliced into thin slices. I have seldom seen it on sale at the coast but good vegetable stockists offer it in Nairobi — the

Mbindu Mbingu Street market included.

BRAISED FENNEL:

Fennel braised with kipper filets makes an excellent and unusual hors d'oeuvre. Try it also with one of the locally smoked fish.

Slice half a pound of fennel into thin strips and fry gently in olive oil. When almost soft which will take about half an hour, add four kipper filets, cover and cook for four minutes.

Serve hot with parsley scattered over. Serves 4.

INSALATA DI FINOCCHI:

Take two medium sized raw fennel. Prepare by removing the top and cutting across the base. Remove tough outside layers. Wash well in cold water. Cut them into fairly thin slices.

Dress simply with three parts of olive oil, one part wine vinegar, salt and freshly ground black pepper. Chill.

As a variation try ordinary

watercress combined with sliced fennel using the same dressing as above. The contrast of fennel and cress is attractive and their flavours when mixed together, delicious.

FENNEL SAUTEED IN BUTTER:

Prepare four fennels by trimming in the usual manner. Cut them lengthwise into eight segments. Plunge into boiling salted water until half cooked. Drain.

Finish cooking in a frying pan, in two tablespoons of softened butter. When tender, season with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Place the vegetable on a serving dish. Bring some fresh butter to foaming point.

When it is golden brown, squeeze lemon juice into the pan, toss in a tablespoon of chopped parsley and pour over the fennel. Serve at once.

Fennel may be prepared in the above manner and varied by adding Parmesan cheese. When the fennel is tender, sprinkle it with one tablespoon of grated Parmesan cheese.

Toss until the cheese has melted and the fennel well coated in it. Sprinkle with chopped parsley. Serve piping hot.

STUFFED SEA BASS A LA FARIGOLETTE:

Cut, scale and wash a sea bass. Pat it dry. Season as usual with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Now paint the inside with some French tarragon mustard and some fresh tomato sauce.

Insert a few slices of tomato and onion into the cavity and fill up the rest of it with fennel stalks. Then make two deep incisions, slanting along the sides of the fish — one on either side — from head to tail, reaching as far as its backbone. Anoint these also with tarragon mustard and salt and pepper.

Insert into them alternate slices of onion and tomato. (The reason the incisions are slanting is to ensure that these are firmly lodged.)

Place the whole fish on a platter and sprinkle it liberally with olive oil and a tiny dash of vinegar. Grill the fish on charcoal if possible for only four minutes on each side. It will then be half cooked.

At this point transfer it to an oven dish, pour in the remains of the olive oil and vinegar from the platter on which the fish rested earlier. Finish cooking the fish in the oven basting frequently.

When it is ready, transfer it to a heated metal platter, pour its juices over and place on some fennel stalks (previously warmed and dried in the oven) set these alight with flaming brandy and serve.

The fennel, as it burns, gives off a strong aroma imparting it to the dish. Serves 4.

The Italian variation on the same theme is worthy of inclusion as it is different enough from the above recipe to be interesting though the basic fish remains the same as well as the principle of it.

This recipe is a speciality of the New York restaurant Le Mistral.

SPIGOLA ALLA FIAMMA:

Slash three deep, diagonal cuts into the sides of two sea bass each weighing about a kilo. Fill each incision with a short piece of dried fennel stalk and place some into the cavity as well.

Douse liberally with garlic flavoured olive oil. Season with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Cook under a hot grill close to begin with then lower away from the heat. Cook for eight minutes on each side.

Prepare a bed of dried fennel stalks on a large serving dish, place the fish on a raised griddle on top. Sprinkle both fish and fennel with brandy and a few drops of pernod. Ignite. Let the aroma permeate the fish. Fillet to serve.

Hand a light vinaigrette or hot melted butter or a simple olive oil and lemon dressing separately.

TASTY 'hot' dishes have been introduced to the traditional cold buffet lunch at Two Fishes Hotel, Diani, by executive chef, Mike Ouma, who not only offers popular international cuisine to guests, but also popular Kenyan food.

Mike trained at Hilton Hotels in Nairobi and Dusseldorf, Germany, and has been executive chef at Two Fishes Hotel for seven years maintaining a continuity of first class cuisine which has resulted in many guests returning again and again.

A big attraction on their cold buffet table is a specially

prepared octopus, while the hot dishes include baked jack fish which has first been marinated in spices before being baked in foil to retain its full flavour and juices.

There is also Shashlik, which is very tender loin of beef spiced with black pepper and cooked together with fresh tomatoes, green pepper and cream.

The more traditional Kenyan dishes like sukuma wiki, mps and kima are served sometimes on Saturdays.

'MODERN SUPER — MARKET' IS WELL WORTH A VISIT

A new supermarket. Well, better than a supermarket which brings to mind walking aimlessly round shelves looking where and how to serve yourself, for there are neatly displayed products as well as kind shop assistants.

This is Mombasa's new Modern Supermarket. It is on Jomo Kenyatta Avenue, just before the M-Kay's roundabout and if you go by bus from town you ask for the Majengo bus-stop. You can't miss it for it is newly painted in the Yolanda spots.

Yolanda is by Oasis and this little supermarket (which has plans for future expansion) is an Oasis in itself up that end of

town. About the owners: It's the Glory Car Hire people really, who, before they had their service station and car hire business, ran a grocery for ten years in Changamwe.

The main personnel are Mohamed Shabbir and Haroon Sidik but as you walk round there are many more, including a very attractive girl in the corner near the cosmetics, patent medicines and baby products by both Johnson's and Boo's.

A little about the shop now. Open each day from 8am. to 8p.m. (no closing in lunch-hour) plus business on Sunday mornings, Modern Supermarket is very likely to serve the Tudor area too.

They are on the island side of the new bridge and would be a useful last point of call if you live on the mainland north.

They have a telephone — No. 313083 — and in the next couple of weeks offer to you either a cup or comb for every purchase exceeding 50/=.

The groceries sold are normal 'rations', including a good selection of pulses, the talked-of late commodities such as butter, cheese, flour and rice, as well as household linen at a very good price. You'll find too kitchenware, glassware electrical accessories such as plugs, adaptors and bulbs.

Not only residents are served by Modern Supermarket, as was said, related to Glory Car Hire, this is of special interest to Nairobi and up-country travellers. On arrival on our island say by bus, they can stop at Modern Supermarket, buy their holiday requisites and, in addition, take a car.

GLORY CARS

Within twenty minutes of request they can have one of those popular Glory cars at their disposal, be it a Mini Moke, saloon or station wagon for the family or 'piki-piki' for the more handy.

A few car accessories are also present, at Modern Supermarket, inventions which take the heat out of driving like cool cushions, allowing free airflow below your seat, and anti-glare strips above your eyes.

There are religious stickers for cars (or home if you wish) and for a picnic a car-bag which is a glorified cool bag.

NO ONE can afford to be without a watch — it costs you more in missed appointments than the price of a watch from Abdallah and Sons, opposite the Splendid Hotel. Their prices suit every pocket, their watches every wrist.

Well known brands are stocked by Abdallah and Sons, such as Oris, some of which give up to 12 months' guarantee and are both shock and water resistant.

Abdallah and Sons are the largest stockist in the centre of town. The owner is Mr Mohamed Saleh, helped by Mr Suleman and an experienced shop assistant who proudly shows you each variety.

Watch of the moment appears to be the Mortima Diving Watch. Even the professionals, like personnel from Mombasa's Divecon, use these. There is also one in the window, submerged in perpetual water, and this appears to be a great attraction. Obviously in this case seeing is believing. Other good customers for these are the navy, the visiting ones too. The dial is luminous permitting the diver to read it even when fathoms deep.

Another window attraction is the Noris from K.Shs. 94/90. It is the suggestion of the owner that for school children you might buy a Timex, water resistant and costing anything between 200/= and 300/=

Omax, a well-known make have automatic "chronograph" watches. As the name implies these show the day, date, month and can be used as stop watches. These too water resistant; these too under 300/=

There is a department for repairs, a good point to remember.

Clocks are available too at Abdallah and Sons, travelling table and those with an alarm for bedside use (from 70/=). But something unfortunately not often associated with Abdallah by many are wall clocks. These come in two forms: the battery operated and the winding type, majestic looking with pendulum. This latter are the cheaper sort in the 300/= to 400/= range, whereas in the battery operated range nothing costs more than 600/=

The owners added that the battery wall clocks are ideal presents, which is true for they come in many forms — almost flush with the wall, decorative, oval and square, in frames of metal and wood.

WOMAN'S WORLD

ALL YOU NEED TO KNOWN ABOUT SWAHILI COOKING

RECIPES FROM THE KENYA COAST by SAMIRA HYDER (Published by Longman. 83 pages. Price 9/75)

THERE is a special reason for my wanting to review this handy and most informative book by Samira Hyder. I have personally bought about two score of copies over the years and have found them ideal presents for visitors who will be leaving Kenya.

The book itself is attractively laid out and the recipes are in simple and easy to follow language.

A very commendable article appeared in COASTWEEK which was an interview with the author by Neta Peal.

Unfortunately the impression some readers may have got is that Recipes from the Kenya Coast is available from one bookshop in Nairobi only. I doubt whether this would be true of bookshops in Mombasa.

Here I like to recommend bookshops and even tourists kiosks and boutiques to stock the book as it is one of the handiest presents and souvenirs which a tourist can carry away.

It is most intriguing to see that a book with recipes begins with "How to Prepare Coconut Milk" followed by the "Introduction".

But this is valuable information for the novice who will not easily associate milk

with a palm tree's produce.

The recipes — almost 80 — cover almost every dish or speciality of the Coast and include such simple fare as Kachumbari (onion salad), the intricate Wali wa Biriani (Biriani Rice), the ever popular Vitumbua ("Sannaa" to the sophisticates) and Matoke ya Nazi (Matoke in Coconut).

Whether it is fish or meat or poultry or vegetables or even the making of special bread there are recipes clearly printed and some even feature delicately drawn line illustrations evocative of the Coastal produce. The cover photograph by A. Mzee has the colour and the lively vigour of the sunny coast.

Finally, the price, I have noticed that bookshops and kiosks in Nairobi tend to price the book at anything from 9/75 to 35/= a copy.

At many the price is 15/=, some have a 20/= price.

But for me the regular centre of purchase is the Catholic Bookshop near the G.P.O. where I can obtain the copies I want at 9/75 which is, what the sales assistant mentioned to me, the price of Longman's.

At this outlay I cannot have a better souvenir which I'd like to give away to a friend or acquaintance interested in Kenya coastal cooking.

TOTOTO GIRLS GRADUATE WITH 'FLYING COLOURS'

SIXTEEN young women have just graduated from a two-year tailoring course run by Tototo Home Industries, a project of the National Christian Council of Kenya.

The profit from the Tototo shop in Msanifu Kombu Street which sells handicrafts and Afro fashionwear made by women, helps in running this training scheme which has now been running for about five years. It is heavily subsidized and the girls pay only Sh. 30 a month.

Most are Standard 7 school-leavers, with some below, and this career training helps immeasurably in making their future a much brighter one when there are so many unemployed around.

Here is what some of the graduates are doing.

Fanice Kibaba has started a dressmaking business at her home in Kisumu. At times she finds the demand is such that she cannot cope.

Juliet Peter from Taita is now employed by the Tototo boutique, while Erna S. Nzuki from Machakos has a job during the day and runs a dressmaking business from her home in the evening to earn some extra cash.

Mr Wilson Wahome, director of Culture and Social Services, Coast, who presented the

diplomats thanked Tototo for doing such a wonderful job in training these young girls for a career.

He noted that their workshop in the Old Town was becoming far too cramped and suggested they should now think of extending by building their own premises to accommodate the home industries section and training school rather than remain in rented premises.

Saying that government was always willing to help those who try and help themselves, Mr Wahome mentioned that government would continue to assist Tototo wherever possible in the running of such training courses. He mentioned that government had given Sh. 31,000 towards teachers salaries in the last financial year, and he hoped this would continue.

TAILORING COURSES

Said Mr Elvina Mutua, Tototo's director "many of the trainees on the tailoring course have no place to stay in Mombasa.

They cannot even afford to go to the Y.M.C.A. Hostel. Should we ever find ourselves

in a position to have our own building, it will definitely incorporate accommodate for them as well".

Mr Wahome spoke of the olden days when the kitchen was regarded as the place for a woman. This was no longer the case, and he appealed for more women to come forward and help in nation building activities in this modern age.

He considered that women of all races and creeds should feel honoured by government's gesture in establishing a women's bureau in the Ministry of Culture and Social Services to help in whatever way it can.

Pointing out that there are many more women than men

in the country, particularly in rural areas, he stressed the need for women to involve themselves in various income generating activities.

Mr Wahome also mentioned that this being the 'year of the disabled' his Ministry, together with other organisations, had just started a survey to determine the number of disabled people in Kenya.

He mentioned that some parents still felt too ashamed to admit that one of their children was disabled. Mr Wahome pointed out that only by coming out in the open about this would government and other organisations be able to assist.

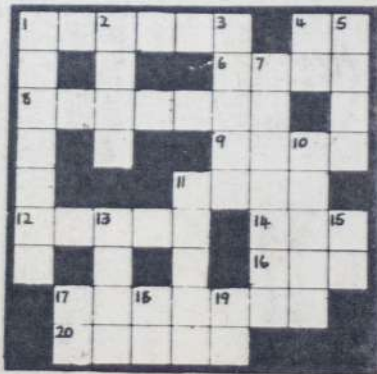

FOND FAREWELL TO TO THE OLD BRIDGE

FOR all the appeals to authorities to delay the closing of the pontoon bridge, the lack of any answer indicates that the bridge will be closed to traffic at midnight on Tuesday, September 30.

The arguments put forward have varied from preserving the structure as a part of Mombasa's history, to a fuel saving for the hundreds of motorists who have to use the bridge each day to travel between Nyali and the island.

There is no doubt that the New Bridge adds a considerable distance to a commuter's daily travel, particularly for those who have to walk to work.

Several people have put forward the argument that Mombasa needs two bridges to avoid the traffic congestion that was a regular occurrence before the new bridge was put into use. The numbers of cars on the road will continue to increase and it does seem that the removal of a serviceable bridge has to be a backward step.

The only argument against keeping the bridge is a financial one. Will the bridge be able to pay its way with the reduction in income caused by the diversion of a lot of its traffic?

The real solution would be to examine how much money the bridge is losing, rather than how much it is making. It has been obvious for years that a considerable proportion of the bridge tolls were being diverted.

Some twenty years ago a Mombasa security organisation submitted a report to that effect and under their supervision over one month takings for the bridge shot up by a very impressive percentage.

The New Bridge toll collection system has some peculiarities that are hard to explain.

On the first day of operation, drivers were baffled by the complicated system of middlemen who assisted in the collection of the tolls. "A" flags down the car some two metres before the toll window, passes the money to "B", who gives it to "C" at the till.

After a suitable delay, the ticket is passed to "B" who with due ceremony presents it to the driver, if he hasn't already gone about his business.

Are all these people on the payroll if so it looks like a case of overstaffing. Are the just unpaid volunteers who like to share in the excitement of getting cars across the creek?

Or is there some financial advantage in helping out? As bridge users are unlikely to tip for such a meagre and pointless service, the conclusion must be that the Government is losing income.

If a foolproof system for ensuring that the toll charges on both bridges get to the bank can be devised, the combined income would be

sufficient to repay the capital investment on the new structure and provide funds for upkeep of the pontoon bridge.

A.T.&H. TROPHY TO RAINSFORD

I had a most enjoyable few days in Nairobi, playing several different courses, with mixed fortunes. Whilst I have had the good fortune to play on many different kinds of courses in many parts of the world, not all golfers are this lucky and consequently do not realise the completely different conditions that can be encountered and are, therefore, unable to cope with the unknown.

One thing which is almost unknown in Mombasa is "nap". Several of the Mombasa players at Limuru had not even heard of nap, and were quite unable, therefore, to combat it.

To those uninitiated, nap is when grass grows in a certain direction, instead of straight up. It generally leans towards hills or lakes, and has the effect of deviating the ball quite considerably off line.

When putting across nap, the ball gets pushed off line. When putting with the nap the ball travels faster and against the nap considerably slower.

I have putted on a green at Nakuru where you literally had to putt downhill to get the ball in the hole, and the nap pushed the ball off course uphill! I once played this hole with a partner who had not seen this phenomenon before, and as he had a chance of a "two club" I thought I had better warn him to aim low.

In spite of all my protestations he wouldn't believe me but as a sop to cerberus he aimed straight. He couldn't believe it when he saw the ball climbing uphill, to miss by several inches.

It is always advisable when on a strange course to ask advice from a local caddy, but I would stress that once having asked, it is advisable to follow the advice. You will be surprised at how often your own initial assessment was completely wrong.

Back to Mombasa and familiar grounds last weekend saw a large entry at Nyalii Golf and Country Club for the annual African Tours and Hotels sponsored competition over two days and once again Kenya Airways joined in on the sponsorship.

Play was over 36 holes, on Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning, and was followed by a cocktail party and dinner at Mombasa Beach Hotel in the evening by courtesy of both sponsors.

As usual the course was in immaculate condition, but very few players ever seem to be able to murder the course.
