NEWS IN BRIEF

TOURISM MINISTER ON TOUR

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Tourism Minister Kalenge M'Wabwabe has noted with satisfaction that all 6,447 hotel beds in the Coast Province have been booked in the current tourist high season. The Minister spoke during a familiarisation tour of tourist resorts in the province.

WUNDANI (K.N.A.) — The newly formed Viti-Tailors' Co-operative Society in Viti-Taveta District will from this year benefit from a Kenya Industrial Estates loan. The society will first get more than Sh. 269,000 to buy machines, raw materials and other equipment for a factory to manufacture quality clothing.

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Assistant Commerce Minister Sharif Nassir has assured the town's residents that hoarders and smugglers of essential commodities will be prosecuted energetically. Mr Nassir said Nyayoism called for honesty and voiced full support for the Attorney-General's statement that hoarders and smugglers would be dealt with.

KILIFI (K.N.A.) — Assistant Local Government Minister Noah Katana Ngala has urged his constituents to take their children to school because illiteracy would hinder development. He said it was the people's duty to build schools to which the Government could supply teachers and equipment.

HOLA (K.N.A.) — Farmers in eight major irrigation schemes on the river belt in Tana River District earned nearly Sh. 200,000 from the sale of various crops in October, according to the crops station report the yield was less than that of the same period last year because of floods.

"We do not even have enough trucks to collect refuse within Mombasa — let alone money to buy equipment which would have made it possible to cover the whole area and at least make it free from scavengers" he said.

And so the unusual hill of garbage, overlooking Kilindini Harbour and the main road from Moi International Airport, continues to grow.

Men, women and children scavenge all day through the garbage and feed on rotten scraps they find there.

When COASTWEEK visited the scene, the place was littered with stinking garbage and swarming with flies.

GARBAGE
 It was 8 a.m. and more than 20 men, women and children with bent backs were meticulously sifting through the accumulated garbage for breakfast.

Three large cooking fat tins steamed on a fire, containing what appeared to be beans, maize and peas retrieved from the dump.

The only sound around was that of a lone tractor fighting a losing battle against the mound. A second tractor broke down several weeks ago.

Nearby, a garbage truck stood stuck in the mud and rubbish in the midst of the dump stands a garage-cum-

ERROL OF FOOD

Traditional Polish Stuffing

One of the best stuffings for the breast end of the turkey I have ever used was given to me many years ago by my mother-in-law. It is Polish in origin and though I have experimented with many variations this is the one I find most complimentary to the bird.

POLISH STUFFING FOR TURKEY:

- 2-3 eggs
- 2 ounces butter
- 2 ounces white breadcrumbs or two small bread rolls
- 2 ounces raisins
- 2 ounces sultanas
- 1 ounce sugar
- a little milk
- 2 ounces peeled almonds
- chopped parsley
- Turkey liver and heart
- nutmeg to taste
- salt and freshly ground black pepper

Soak the bread rolls or crumbs in a little milk to soften. Squeeze out excess milk. Cream the butter with the sugar and add the egg yolks. Add raisins, sultanas, chopped almonds, chopped parsley and nutmeg and seasoning. In the meantime, simmer the heart and liver, then chop very finely or mince them, which I find is easiest. Add to the mixture with the bread. Mix very well. Beat the egg whites until stiff and fold in. Don't be put off by the rather unattractive appearance of the stuffing at this stage. Stuff the crop end and sew up. Stuff the other end of the bird with sausage meat stuffing

combined with chestnuts if available. The tinned chestnuts puree makes a good substitute and takes a lot of the hard work out of the preparation.

TURKEY LEFT OVERS:

Seasonally, one feels obliged to devote a little thought to the mundane but necessary business of dressing up left over turkey. Actually, cold turkey can be exceptionally delicious and this curry sauce, seems appropriate to the atmosphere in Mombasa where the most delicious curry powders can be made up to one's own specification or on the advice of such experts as the Tanga Trading Company at the back of the Market in Ngara Road.

Mask the left over bits of turkey in this and hand extra sauce on the side, serve with salad and baked potatoes and you will have a minor feast on your hands.

CREAM OF CURRY SAUCE:

- 1 tablespoon oil
- 2 ounces onion chopped finely
- 1 dessertspoon curry powder
- 1 good teaspoon tomato puree
- 1 glass of red wine
- 3/4 glass water (use a wine glass for this)
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- salt and freshly ground black pepper
- a good squeeze of lemon juice

- 1-2 tablespoons apricot puree
- 3/4 pint of home-made or Hellman's mayonnaise
- 2-3 tablespoons lightly whipped cream

Heat the oil, add the onion and cook gently for 3-4 minutes. Add curry powder. Simmer for a few more minutes then add puree, wine, water and the bay leaf. Bring to the boil, season and add sugar, lemon juice and both slices of lemon. Simmer for about eight minutes without a lid. Strain and cool.

Now gradually add the mayonnaise and sufficient apricot puree to suit your taste.

Adjust the seasoning, add lemon juice if necessary, a final stir in the whole cream I like to serve this with the centre pieces of turkey covered in the sauce — leave the bits of attractive exposed round the side to those who are not particularly fond of curry need not necessarily eat the sauce.

I then hand the balance of the sauce separately. Garnish with parsley or watercress, black olives, for occasion. Serves 10 — will keep in a screw-top refrigerator for a week with no ill effect so the be made up before if you are busy.

AFRO hair surrounding his broad and pleasant features, Peter Brent is back — and still in search of an identity. Most audiences think he already has it.

Rich in voice, as smooth an entertainer as any who have been here in the last 10 years (and that includes Millie Jackson), wisecracking, ad-libbing, or just singing, Brent seems the self contained man, complete in himself.

Talking to him quietly, off the record, it's clear it's only the self disciplined impression created by a professional in every sense of the word.

Brent is a quester, an intelligent, questioning, self-seeking neurotic. The extrovert poise hides the introvert heart; the shy, the diffident and the insecure — as in every articulate creative personality — are all melded beneath the showbiz exterior.

And of course he has the butterflies which go with it. Doctors have told him he uses as much adrenalin in half an hour on stage as an office as an office clerk in a week.

Judging by the performance he's just finished at the Chateau, the elegant supper club atop the Nairobi Intercontinental, all of 70 minutes long, he should be in the intensive care unit down the road.

But he's fine. He's amazed, too, because with all this adrenalin burning away, and already at 38, there's no clear reason he can see as to why he should feel so fit.

He wanted to get away from the biography — he thought date of birth, hometown (it's Dagenham actually), first appearance and all that had already appeared in about twenty thousand different versions.

The way he stopped the reporting process was significant. It was imperialistic, autocratic without intention, a man who knew what he wanted as a professional. He even articulated it, precisely, by giving expression to what he was long desired. He wanted somebody to find the real Peter Brent.

In a way, that changes the style of this column. If Mr Brent needs to discover himself he should really call on David Taylor, of Punch, the most intelligent and creative writer of show business personality profiles who has yet arisen.

We found some common ground. Brent knows the rounds of institutional life and in this we touched on a shared experience for long ago I was a municipal authority foster father.

He's back in Kenya for the fourth (or was it the fifth) time after seven months in Hong Kong. A claustrophobic place. He even had a crack about wall-to-wall people just now in his act.

He's not looking for roots. He never knew his father. He broke contact with his adoptive mother when he was 27. But he's English, of that he has no doubts, no matter what his antecedents.

But he's more now, of course, after travelling the world — more than 30 countries in the last 10 years — and like most itinerants he now finds the ordinary Englishman extraordinarily insular and bigotted.

The appeal he finds in Kenya is clear enough — a degree of social intercourse between all races and all classes not found anywhere else.

And something else. Three times he's established house records in the Chateau. And there's the seven months he spent running the Bacchus.

Sal Davis

Yes, he agrees, it feels like home. He first came in 1974 after Sal Davis saw him performing at the Lusaka Intercontinental. He's just kept on coming back — always more popular, the act a little more polished than before each time.

You have to improve, he points out. Performers have pressures within themselves and from outside from which there is no escape. If you want to stay at the top, you have to remember you're only as good as your last show.

He drinks little, he signs his own contracts with a handshake.

He turned down a lucrative cruise engagement because of his handshake to fulfill Christmas and the New Year at the Intercontinental. He pretends to be the cynic. It's a crust to avoid the disappointments of someone who, when it mattered most, met only disappointments.

But underneath the bland, self-assured, successful performer the real Peter Brent is very visible.

Just a very nice guy who really doesn't want much more out of life than to entertain you. And to find that trust can be cherished, reciprocated — and endure.

But don't take him for a ride please. He's in a tough enough business anyway and does he really need you when he's already sold out theatres and supper clubs around the world?

It's not something he voices. But it's there in his manner, his cloak of protection. But if he can trust you, there can't be many better people to have as a friend.

After all, you only have to hear him sing to know he's someone different.

SUMBA AND NASSIR PLEDGE UNITY

Sh. 295,868 raised by Ring Us Up

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The Mayor, Coun. Rajab Sumba, and the District Kanu chairman, Mr Shariff Nassir, have pledged to work jointly to stabilise local politics so that all leaders and wananchi will have the maximum opportunity to participate in the development of the town.

The two leaders made the pledge when Coun. Sumba led

follow councillors to pay a courtesy call on Mr. Nassir at the district Kanu office a few minutes after the mayoral elections.

Welcoming the Mayor, Mr Nassir stressed the importance of having stable politics in Mombasa whose population was made up of people of varying ethnic backgrounds.

He told Coun. Sumba to ensure that co-operation and understanding prevailed between him and his deputy and the councillors. All should get the chance to use their talents to run the affairs of the

town without discrimination.

Differences arising from the elections should be forgotten completely, he stressed.

He warned against idle gossiping and rumour mongering against local leaders and hoped that the co-operation and unity the councillors had pledged and shown would help stamp out such things.

Coun. Sumba's election was greeted by shouts from the public gallery. His only opponent, Coun. Ahmed Bamahriz obtained three votes

to Coun. Sumba's 26.

Elected Deputy Mayor was Coun. Ahmed Shahame Mwidani who polled 26 votes, compared to three for Coun. Luka Mbatia.

Coun. Hussein Namoya was elected chairman of the Education Public Health and Social Services Committee, Coun. Ramadhan Mwatsahu chairman of the Establishment Committee and Coun. Ramadhan Kajembe chairman of the Town Planning Works and housing committee.

Coun. Sumba thanked the

councillors for electing him and vowed to work tirelessly for the development of the town.

He cautioned the councillors not to get involved in petty squabbling which had been the reason for the dissolution of the former council.

Meanwhile, the number of councillors in the municipality has been increased to 31 following the nomination of Miss Shuweikha Rashid to the council.

Her nomination was announced by Town Clerk B. P. Kubo during the meeting.

A total of 295,868/= was raised during the Ring us Up V.O.K. Mombasa television programme, writes Owano Ekesa.

Another sum of 10,000 U.S. dollars was donated during the programme to the S.O.S. Village in Mombasa by the Round Tables of Denmark.

The programme televised live from the Mombasa television studios was sponsored by the Pan Africa Insurance Company and produced jointly by the Mombasa Round Tables and the Voice of Kenya.

There were many articles for sale amounting to Sh. 225,000. They included T.V. sets, radio cassettes, fans, air conditioners, fridges, liquors and office equipment.

The items that attracted most bidders were fridges, radios, T.V. sets and domestic appliances.

Some of the highlights of the event were a fashion show of various dresses and designs and Mombasa's famous Edmund Silveira jazz trio.

Speaking later to the Kenya News Agency after nearly four hours of television auctioning, the programme's coordinator Mr Dieter Guenther, described the show as "very successful" adding that the programme was well presented by the Voice of Kenya.

He thanked the Mombasa Round Tables for their great effort in arranging the items for the show. He also thanked the generous public who donated items for the auction and also bid for other items during the show.

He also paid tribute to the presenters of the programme, Chris Fryer the chairman of Mombasa Round Table No. 25, and Mike Johnson of Nairobi, for their appeals to the public for donations.

HOTEL LOANS FOR LAMU

LAMU (K.N.A.) — The people of Lamu have been promised loan facilities to put up medium-sized tourist hotels.

Addressing a group of Lamu leaders, tourism Minister Kabeere M'Mbijewe said his Ministry was prepared to help those wishing to enter the hotel industry. He said the Ministry would soon put up a tourist office in Lamu Town to promote tourism in the district.

He suggested that the Lamu County Council enter into a joint venture with the Government to build medium-sized hotels as other councils had done.

Introducing Mr M'Mbijewe, area D.C. Peter Kabiru said Lamu island had four tourist hotels with a total of 400 beds.

He told the Minister that because of the island's unique history, the Government had decided not to interfere with the existing buildings. As a result, the district headquarters would be moved to the mainland.

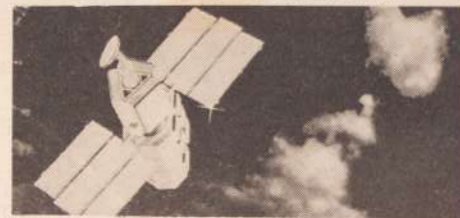

PROJECTS NEGLECTED, M.P. COMPLAINS

WUNDANYI (K.N.A.) — Wananchi of Mbaile Location, Taita-Taveta District have been called on to unite and cooperate with councillors, chiefs and church leaders to quicken the area's development.

The call was made by Wundanyi M.P. M. Mwachofi when he addressed a meeting at Rong'e Juu in the location.

office, packed with garbage.

At least 60 trucks off-load refuse at the dump every day. They include the Municipal Council trucks and private vehicles.

Speaking in his office at Mwembe Kuku, Mombasa, Mr Gitare said:

"We have made recommendation to the council about improving the services of my department. We hope that these requests will be approved. But until that is done, there is very little we can do.

"We have problems with the whole system of refuse collection in Mombasa — lack of personnel, trucks, spare parts for our vehicles which have broken down, and of course, the Kibarani dumping yard."

He said that in order to cover all the rubbish at Kibarani, his department would require three bulldozers, three tippers and at least one excavator — "and that requires

Kisauni-Utange.

"We devoutly hope that these requirements will be catered for in the next budget. In the meantime we are trying to do whatever we can to make the town as clean as possible."

The Kibarani dump was started in 1961. It is believed that about 400 tons of refuse are dumped at site every day. There are 11 workers at the dump, whose main work is to sift out plastic materials and control fire.

The place is said to be a haven for criminals and young delinquents who emerge at night from the nearby caves along the sea bank to attack people in Changamwe, Shimanzer and Magongo.

A spokesman at the Mombasa Kanu branch commented: "As early as last year, the Hon. Shariff Nassir voiced his concern about the disgraceful situation at the dump. He called upon the authorities concerned to cover the rubbish and fence the area. We still hope that his advice will be heeded."

a lot of money".

Covering material could easily be acquired from a nearby hillock, and if all went well the exercise could be completed in six months' time.

As he spoke, six of the 10 garbage trucks were standing outside his office useless because of the lack of spare parts.

"Frankly, we have not been able to cover the whole area of Mombasa. And still we cannot cope with the ever-piling amount of refuse which has to be disposed of. Apart from the island, there are only three other areas reached by our vehicles."

These are Changamwe (twice a week), Nyali/Bamburi (thrice a week) and Likoni (twice a week).

POLICEMAN JAILED FOR 'STOLEN RADIO' TRICK

VOI (K.N.A.) — A packed Voi court has been told how a group of rungu wielding administration policemen and prison warders threatened two police officers investigating the

theft of a radio/cassette player. After hearing the evidence, Voi resident magistrate, Gacaku Gakuhi sentenced John Mwashigandi to six months for theft, Joel Kiprono Langat for acquittal. Both had been charged with

stealing a radio/cassette player from Mr Hanington Juma of Bura Dogo Village in Taveta on March 20 last year. The two were also jointly charged with demanding money with menaces with the intention of stealing it but were acquitted.

The court was told that at around 8p.m., Mwashigandi an administration policeman attached to the Taveta D.O.'s office, and Langat, warder at the Taveta Detention Camp, went to the house of one Joshua Mokaya under the pretext of searching for smuggled.

On reaching the house, they found Mr Juma and Mr Mokaya there and said they were searching for a stolen radio/cassette player and bicycle hidden in the house.

After a fruitless search, they took Mr Juma's radio/cassette player, claiming that it was one of the smuggled items, the court heard.

Mr Juma said he showed a receipt of purchase but was told that if he did not hand over some 'chai' the matter would be taken to superiors.

The matter was reported to Taveta police the following day and two police officers set out to search the two men's houses.

At Mwashigandi's house, the police officers were confronted by administration policemen and prison warders armed with fungus who ordered them to leave the premises.

The police officers retreated but Mwashigandi and Langat were later arrested and charged with the two offences.

Delivering judgement, Mr Gakuhi said he had acquitted both men of demanding money with menaces because the testimony of Mr Juma had not been corroborated by any other prosecution witness.

He also said the case against Langat on the theft count had not been proved beyond reasonable doubt.

BIG DRIVE TO RAISE HARVESTS

KILIFI (K.N.A.) — Agricultural growth will be the focus of Government action in 1980, Kilifi D.C. B. A. Omuse has announced.

"Much emphasis will be put on agriculture to ensure that the local people grow enough food to feed themselves and have a surplus for the nation", he said in a New Year message.

To implement the programme the Government had made available tractor hire services in the district. He appealed to the farmers to make use of the service and plough their farms in time for the rains. He urged them to adapt new farming techniques and follow the instructions of agricultural extension staff.

The D.C. called on parents' associations to redouble their efforts to provide decent classrooms and teachers' houses. He noted with concern that in some pupils were learning under trees.

Mr Omuse warned that the District Education Board would be meeting early next year to probe all the parents' associations and action would be taken against dormant ones.

He called on parents' associations to build modern storage facilities for the free milk supplied to primary schools.

Mr Omuse said all efforts would be made to promote adult literacy education this year. He appealed to illiterate adults to take advantage of the classes.

KADEM PARTY

THE officials of Kadem Welfare Society held a Christmas dinner party for members at which Mr Elisha Okoth, Kanu's Tononoka branch organising secretary, was the guest of honour. Also present were Mombasa Central M.P. Sharif Nassir, Mombasa Mayor Rajab Sumba, Coun. Luisa Ochwiti of Tudor and Coun. M. A. Olang of Ganjoni.

'NO HOARDING IN LAMU'

LAMU (K.N.A.) — The vice-chairman of the National Chamber of Commerce and Industry's Lamu branch, Mr Ahmed Said Bujra, has announced in a Press Statement that the problem of shortages of essential commodities in Lamu has been alleviated and there have been no complaints of hoarding.

He promised to support the Government in ensuring that all commodities are distributed to the wananchi without discrimination.

Mr Bujra, who is a businessman and a farmer, called on the Government to speed up investigations into the mangrove exportation ban and give permission to the wananchi to resume the business.

He also observed that ranching in Lamu had been confronted by cattle rustling for a long time and urged the Government to provide the area with a stock theft unit.

COUNCILS ASSURED OF RUBIA'S BACKING

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Local authorities will have the full support of the Local Government Ministry, Minister Charles Rubia has assured Mombasa councillors.

"The quality of life of our people can be improved through you since they will expect to be provided with good housing, water supply, markets, nursery schools, good roads and primary health service.

"It is only when they are satisfied with the services that they will feel the Government is doing something to alleviate their misery", Mr Rubia said.

He was addressing Municipal Councillors at the Town Hall after they had elected their Mayor and Deputy Mayor.

He said thorough and efficient management of finances would enable councils to give the services expected of them.

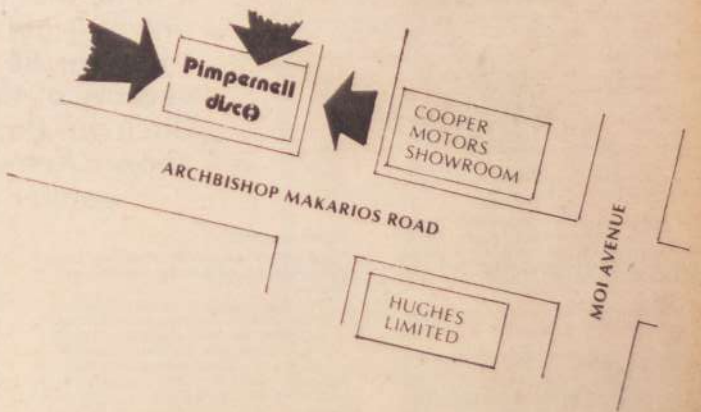
Mr Rubia warned that any mismanagement of council affairs would be dealt with sternly. He directed that all local authorities should furnish details of business, and housing allocations to councillors and officers during their tenure of office.

The Minister also said his Ministry wanted all councils to replace slums with good housing at reasonable cost.

COMMENT

Looking to the future

NEW YEAR is traditionally a time to make resolutions for the coming 12 months.

COASTWEEK's resolution is simple: to produce an even better paper for our increasing readership. As a step in this direction with the fullest co-operation of the Kenya News Agency with this issue we begin to cover the Coast Province more extensively.

We congratulate the Government on its intensified efforts to protect the welfare of wananchi by cracking down on smuggling and hoarding of essential commodities. It is encouraging to note that someone is at last listening to complaints and doing something about them.

We hope that the crackdown will not be a flash in the pan as has happened sometimes in the past. As we have had occasion to stress before, it is very important to ensure that all Kenyans get adequate food, shelter and clothing at the very least.

We congratulate the new Mayor of Mombasa, Coun. Rajab Sumba, on his election to that high office. His overwhelming victory over his only opponent for the post indicates the faith the councillors have in his abilities.

Coun. Sumba and his council have many problems facing them. While the Commission which ran Mombasa following the dissolution of the last council acted well in some areas, in others it was woefully inadequate.

Roads have been allowed to go to pot, regular garbage collection is limited to a few areas because there are no spare parts for broken down vehicles and the department does not have enough employees.

The council's toughest task will obviously be to find a source of revenue. Projects such as the new road to the Shelly Beach area on the South Coast have been stalled because of lack of revenue. Most of council's services have also been affected by this factor.

It would be unrealistic to expect quick changes under the circumstances. However, we hope that the Mayor's considerable experience will help the council to overcome the difficulties facing it.

OPINION ABROAD

West Germany's 1980 Election

Nuclear energy, nuclear weapons, the environment and inflation are the issues in West Germany. The political campaigns there are on the same schedule as in the United States, moving toward national elections next fall. But the choices are clearer for Germans than they are for Americans. German voters already know who the candidates for chancellor will be; the parties have chosen their leaders, and there is nothing like the long U.S. ritual of the primaries. The other great difference is, of course, that geography and history draw the choices much more tightly for the Germans.

Take, for example, nuclear energy. Many Americans wonder whether the country should not stop building power reactors altogether. Helmut Schmidt, Germany's chancellor and a Social Democrat, crisply argued that for Germany there is no alternative to nuclear energy. All of Germany's oil is imported, and it possesses nothing like the huge U.S. reserves of coal. Without nuclear reactors, the chancellor argues, there will be little economic growth of any sort for West Germany. Without growth, there is no way to finance social advances — either for the West Germans or for the poorer countries to the south that depend crucially on expanding markets in the industrial world.

The sharpest opposition to the West German reactors comes from the environmentalists who have now organized themselves into what they call the Green Party. But the Greens are in an awkward position. If they press their campaign, they might conceivably defeat Mr. Schmidt — bringing into power a fiercely conservative government led by the irrepressible Franz Josef Strauss. In his skill

and his appeal to nationalism, Mr. Strauss occupies a place on the political compass that is, for example, roughly similar to John Connally's in the United States.

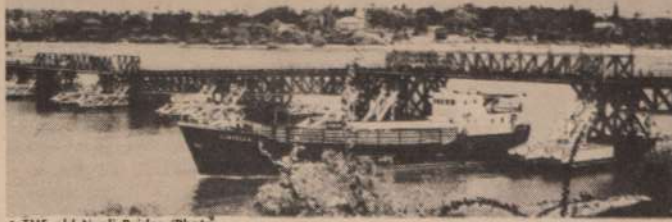
In much the same way, circumstance constrains the debate over the employment of new nuclear rockets in West Germany. Chancellor Schmidt observes that you cannot negotiate arms control with the Russians unless you have arms. Over the past autumn the Russians attempted to intimidate West Germany on the rocket decision, but the tactic failed. There are not many West Germans who would really have wanted it otherwise — certainly not Mr. Strauss and the conservative coalition that he leads.

But there is a good deal of tension within the Social Democratic Party itself, where the left wing feels itself isolated from the main thrust of government policy. The left knows that the government will probably win again next year, under Chancellor Schmidt's leadership. It also knows that any attempt to push him toward a more marked socialism would be fatal to the party itself.

West Germany's wealth and standard of living have increased enormously during these past 10 years under Social Democratic chancellors. That, paradoxically, has left West Germany less inclined than ever to socialist experimentation. Recent experience has apparently confirmed the West German predisposition toward a careful pragmatism that assigns high value to stability. Perhaps it is a general rule of politics that prosperity tends to diminish the appeals of party doctrine and program.

Come on, Kenya Railways, this is not the way to do business in the 1980's — not unless you want us all to travel by bus.

One need not do much except shout "Mwizi, mwizi!" and point — and the public will be only too pleased to take command. The suspect is deluged with flying kicks, and given heavy punches or even hit with stones.

It's all the action one would expect to see in a James Bond movie — except that it's 'live'. In some instances, the victims die after being beaten.

Kenyans are law-abiding citizens, but have a deep hatred for all sorts of criminals amidst our society. The law allows members of the public to lend a helping hand to the police force in tracking down culprits, so that the latter may be delivered the right justice.

However taking the law into our own hands and delivering instant justice is uncalled for.

'GATHER YE TAXES, WHILE YE MAY'

THE following is the first of a series of articles on income tax, aimed at explaining to readers their obligations as taxpayers.

AS we move into another year, the tax gathering season is with us again, and during the next few days many readers will receive income tax return forms through the post.

The accompanying notice requires each taxpayer to complete this form, showing the income received from all sources during 1979, and to return the form to the Income Tax Department within 30 days.

Lateness in returning this form is permissible, if the taxpayer can show good reason for it, for example being out of Kenya on a business trip at the time the form was issued.

Otherwise, there are heavy penalties for those who fail to return their forms within the specified time limit, including fines and imprisonment.

Before a major panic breaks out, as Mombasa residents rush to return their completed forms, it is worth noting that the Income Tax Department rarely invokes its powers in this respect, at least not until it is absolutely necessary to do so.

Normally a reasonable period of grace is allowed, and certain

less organised acquaintances of mine have not got round to returning their forms three months after the due date.

No action was taken, and so long as the return forms are submitted within a reasonable time, the Income Tax Department is not unduly worried.

In fact, if all the return forms of Kenyan taxpayers were submitted by the end of January, it is unlikely that the department would have sufficient manpower to handle them all immediately.

If you don't receive a tax return form, don't think that you're going to get away without paying any tax this year, since the Income Tax Act requires anyone not receiving a return form by the end of April to notify the Commissioner within 14 days.

Failure to do so can result in similar penalties to not submitting the return form at all.

As a result of last year's Finance Act there is a great incentive to complete one's tax affairs as quickly as possible, since any tax not paid by the due date is subject to an interest penalty of 15 per cent.

Bank overdraft rates are still only around 10 per cent, so it is worthwhile settling with the Commissioner of Income Tax as soon as possible and settling with the Bank later.

REPORTS from three capitals have given widely differing perspectives on the world economy and went some way to explain why it is in its current parlous state.

In London, the Brandt Commission, appointed to inject a greater sense of urgency into the struggle to close the gap between rich and poor nations outlined a strategy to avert what is called an impending world catastrophe.

But at about the same time in the Venezuelan capital, Caracas, OPEC, the 13-nation cartel of major oil exporters, were inflicting yet another blow on the global economy. Arguing that the minimum price should be raised to \$34 a barrel, the Libyan delegate declared: "The industrialised world can pay what we ask".

This assessment seemed to ignore the fact that proportionately, the worst hit victims of the soaring cost of oil since 1974 have been the vast majority of developing countries.

President Nyerere of Tanzania underlined this fact

in a speech in Dar es Salaam. He said that his country, which had to import every drop of oil, expected to use 700,000 tonnes next year. This was 100,000 tonnes less than in 1972, but the cost would be ten times greater.

He added that as Tanzanians would be using up more than half their foreign exchange on buying oil, they would have to go without some non-essential commodities.

The Brandt Commission, formally known as the Independent Commission on International Development Issues, was appointed two years ago with the former West German Chancellor, Herr Willy Brandt as its chairman. Its members include two former Prime Ministers, Edward Heath of Britain, and Sweden's Olof Palme, together with leading political and economic figures from the Third World of the developing countries.

Among these is the Commonwealth Secretary-General, Shridath Ramphal. The Soviet Union and its East European allies were invited but did not take part in the deliberations.

The Commission is the brainchild of the President of the World Bank, Mr Robert McNamara, and its report will be published when it is presented to the United Nations' Secretary-General, Dr Kurt Waldheim, in February.

However, judging from the outline presented by Herr Brandt, it is clear that the document will have a considerable impact on the international stage, and its major proposals will stimulate widespread discussion.

The commission warns that because of problems such as food shortages, the arms race and the instability of the world financial system, "urgent and drastic steps must be taken to avert impending catastrophe".

Its suggested remedy is a four-pronged strategy which would include a large-scale transfer of funds to the Third World; an agreement on the

security of energy supplies and their conservation; an efficient world food programme, and reforms of the international financial system.

The commission calls for the creation of a World Development Fund and stresses that the economic development of the Third World would greatly benefit the industrialised nations. Its most radical recommendation is probably that regarding the financing of this fund.

New methods of raising funds

Apart from contributions from the richer countries based on their relative wealth — and the participation of the Soviet bloc is assumed — new methods of raising funds should be tried.

One way, says the commission, would be to impose a modest levy on international trade, on the exploitation of minerals from the seabed, and on arms purchases — "the most wasteful of all forms of spending".

Bisailon, at the signing of an agreement with Kenyan developers, Plantor Limited, to implement the project. The American Ambassador to Kenya, Dr Wilbert J. LeMelle and Assistant Minister in the Office of the President, Mr I. K. Sallat, also attended the signing ceremony.

The building which will eventually be called "American Life Plaza" will cost an estimated Sh. 45 million and will take two years to construct.

BANKING SURVEY LOOKS AT TOURISM

NIGEL M. Ealand from *The Economist*, one of the world's leading financial magazines, is presently on a special assignment in Kenya connected with an "International Banking Survey" to be published in *The Economist* in March next year.

A 20-page survey on Kenya and Tanzania was published by this magazine in 1977.

Mr Ealand is spending four weeks in Kenya during which time he is visiting banks and financial institutions, also major insurance companies, Ministry of Tourism, Kenya Airways and others who play a vital role in the development of the country's economy.

The International Banking Survey is the most important one to be carried out by *The Economist* during the year, and Mr Ealand is also hoping for the opportunity of meeting chairmen recently appointed to various financial institutions here.

He said *The Economist* was a magazine particularly appreciated by those who "think internationally" as well as by those who need to be "internationally known, and by those companies which might have recourse to Eurobond markets".

Mr Ealand has been paying annual visits to Kenya since 1970. While at the Coast he is staying at Nyali Beach Hotel which he says has "improved enormously, and is doing a first

He noted, however, that beach hotels had now become practically unavailable during the high tourist season "because most were being completely booked by tour companies as much as a year in advance".

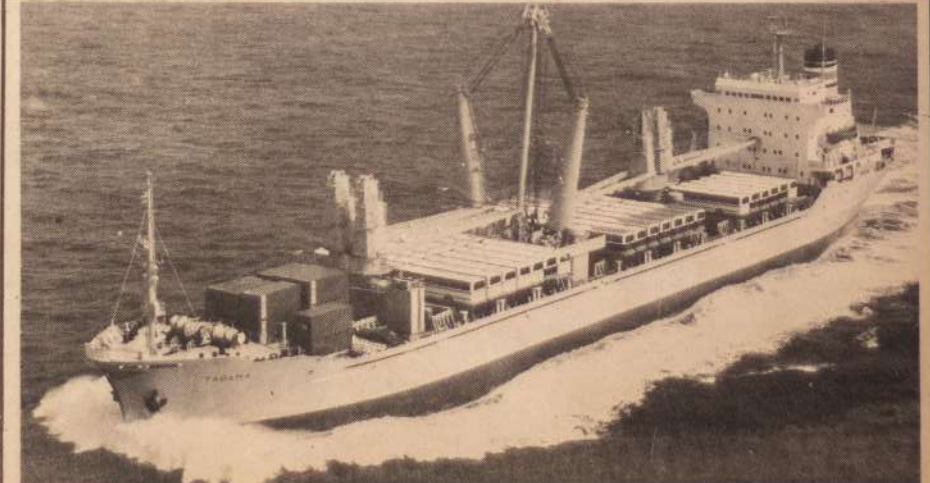

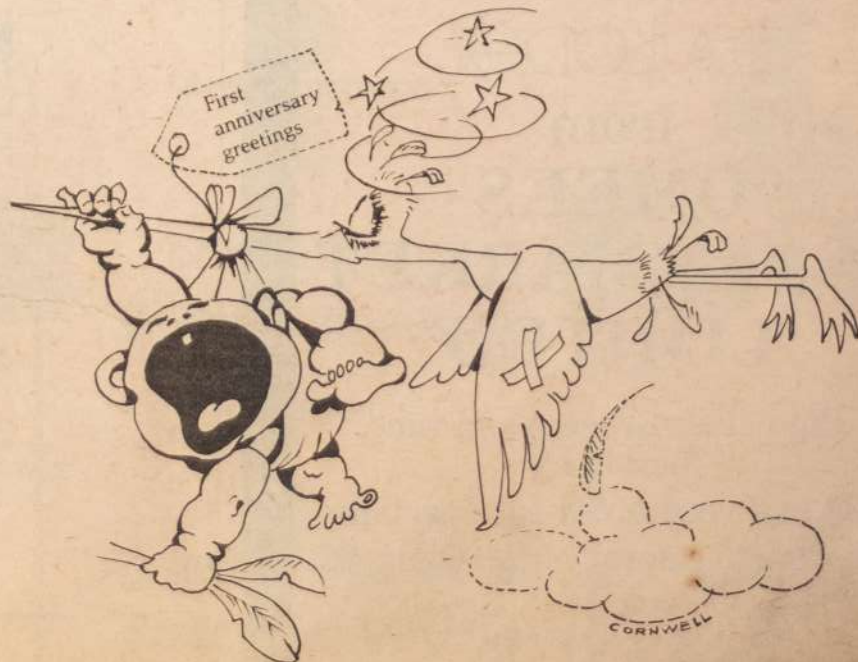

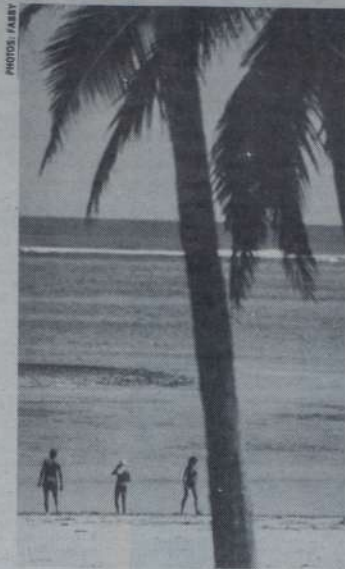

ALLIANCE HOTELS SETTING A NEW PACE IN TOURISM

WHOLLY Kenyan owned, the Alliance Group of Companies have developed their interests into hotels, property development and schools.

The group was founded in 1971 by Kenneth Matiba and Stephen Smith creating what has become a significant business enterprise.

The original investment was

made in *Jadini Beach Hotel* which was at that time a small beach hotel catering primarily for local residents.

Subsequently the group branched into property development in the field of middle income housing and has to date built some 750 houses in Nairobi.

In 1974 the group developed

its activities into the educational field and has interests in three schools. Underlying these investments is the long established traditions of the two owning families in the educational field.

Ken Matiba's parents were teachers. His father, Stanley Njindo Matiba, taught for 44 years and he himself is a teacher by profession. He was the first African Permanent Secretary in the Ministry of Education.

After further senior government service, Ken Matiba joined Kenya Breweries Limited as Managing Director and in 1979 he became chairman of East African Breweries Limited.

In the November 1979 General Elections Ken Matiba was elected to Kenya's Parliament as the member for Mbirri, a Muranga constituency. Ken Matiba is also a prominent horticulturalist specialising in flowers particularly orchids.

Stephen Smith is the son of the well known James Stephen Smith familiarly known as "Muturi" who was deputy headmaster of Alliance High School Kikuyu between 1927 and 1969.

FRIENDSHIP

Father and son Matiba were both taught by J. S. Smith at Kikuyu. Both the owners first met as young boys at Alliance High School and their long standing friendship is expressed in the name given to their group of companies.

Stephen Smith is the senior partner of Murdoch, McCrae and Smith, Chartered Accountants, which is one of the leading firms of accountants and auditors in Kenya.

The firm was founded in the early 1950s and Stephen Smith became a partner in 1957 and assumed the leadership in 1961 while the firm was still in its infancy.

The cornerstone of the Alliance Group is its hotel interests. From humble beginnings with *Jadini Beach Hotel*, the owners foresaw the likely expansion of the tourist industry and decided to give emphasis to this by investing in that field.

Thus in 1973 they acquired Brunners Hotel, Nairobi and in 1974 the Castle Hotel, Mombasa and Naro Moru River Lodge on the foothills of Mt. Kenya.

In the same year Alliance Hotels took over the management of Jacaranda Hotel at Westlands which is proving, with its many facilities, to be one of the most popular hotels in Nairobi.

EXPANSION

In 1978 the hotel interests were further expanded by the development of an entirely new project now well known as *Africana Sea Lodge* on Diani Beach which was opened by President Daniel arap Moi on January 4, 1979.

The policy of the group is to expand its hotel interests to meet the needs of the industry in the future and in keeping with the Government policy of encouraging an ever increasing number of tourists to visit Kenya.

By the middle of 1980 when additional beds have been added to *Africana Sea Lodge*, the group will have under its control over 1,000 beds and a staff of some 500.

An important project upon which the group plans to embark during 1980 is the re-development of the old Brunners Hotel site in Nairobi on which a modern office block is to be constructed.

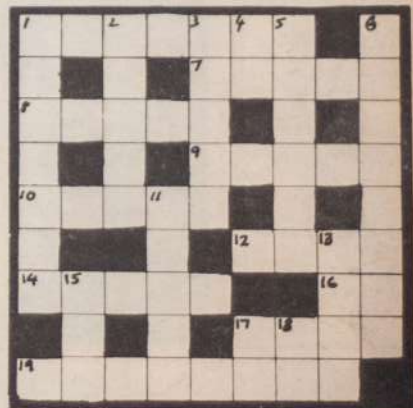

BETTER C.P.E. RESULTS

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Municipal Education Officer Isaac Kavuu has declared that last year's C.P.E. results showed a marked improvement over the previous year's.

He said the improvement was due to hard work by teachers and pupils. He noted that there had been outstanding passes in the English paper.

"Although we have not yet fully analysed the results, we are satisfied by the general performance of the primary schools in Mombasa".

The top ten schools with a outstanding performances were Loreto Convent, Mombasa

School, Mombasa Primary School, H. H. Aga Khan, St. Augustine's, Alibhai Panju, M. M. Shah, Port Reitz, Sacred Heart and Burhanina.

Others with good performances were Star of the Sea, Mirritini, Mwakirunge and Shimo la Tewa Borstal School.

Mr Kavuu explained that proper analysis of the results would be announced later and parents whose children had sat for the examination should report to their respective schools for the results.

A total of 4,512 children sat for the examination in Mombasa.

Meanwhile, anxious parents and candidates thronged head-

masters' offices and various primary schools in efforts to get the results.

In many cases, headmasters had gone to the Municipal Education Office to get the results.

It was expected that by Wednesday all schools would have got the results.

In Tana River District, primary school teachers and students have been raised for their hard work and understanding which enabled the district to rank among the top in last year's C.P.E. entrants.

The praise was voiced in Hala by the councillors for Ngao location, Coun. Yusuf Hussein Godana. He urged teachers to maintain their high performance and do even better in future.

RUSH FOR PLACES

THE rush back to school and the scramble for Form I places following the release of C.P.E. results last week is on again in Mombasa, reports Gray Phombasa.

All of the 18 private schools in Mombasa have confirmed that they have been receiving several applications every day — even before the results were out!

The Form I selection was expected to take place at the Provincial Education Office, Mombasa, by the end of this week or early next week.

It may be upto another week before the selected pupils are notified when and where to report for school. Over 3,000 candidates sat for C.P.E. in Mombasa last year.

Meanwhile, an unknown fate awaits thousands of school-age children who have to join Std. I this year.

Heads of primary schools informed COASTWEEK that they have received numerous applications for Std. I which are beyond their intake capacity!

As early as last week Mombasa D.C. Francis K. Cheregony warned that due to the acute shortage of classrooms

thousands of children would not be able to get places in Std. I this year.

There are 58 primary schools in Mombasa, with 997 classes from Std. I-VII. But since 6,590 school-age children have been listed to enter Std. I, 57 more classrooms will be required, he said during an end-of-the-year party hosted by Mr Jivraj V. Shah at Oshwal Hall.

The councillor called upon parents' associations to put up permanent buildings in primary schools as this would give teachers a proper working environment and encourage them to raise their standards.

Mr Godana appealed to primary school leavers who do not get places in secondary schools to enrol in village polytechnics.

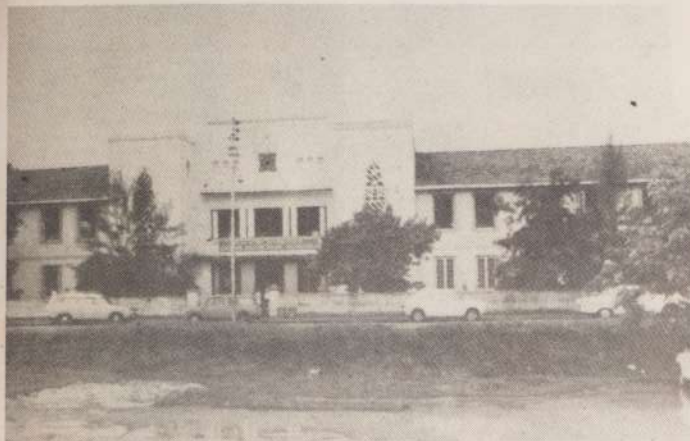

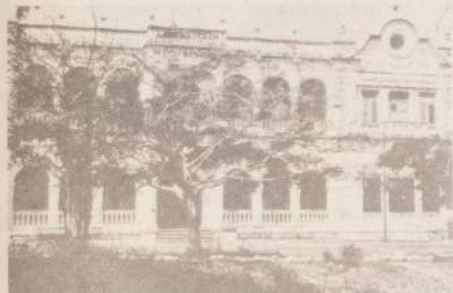

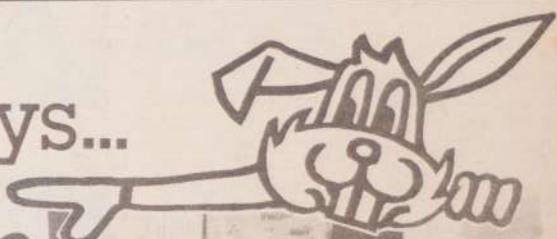

MANCHESTER UNITED BATTLE IN U.K. WITH LIVERPOOL

NOW that the English soccer season is at the half way stage, with all clubs having played twenty two of their forty two fixtures, the time is opportune to review my pre-season analysis, writes Garry Bradley.

The fight for the league championship in Division One has developed into a two horse race, with Liverpool and Manchester United having opened up a six point lead over the third club, Arsenal.

But who can stop Liverpool? After a disastrous start, when it seemed that their glory days were over, they have fought back with an amazing run and now lead the field by two points, a game in hand and a vastly superior goal difference.

What is more, they are playing with confidence and flair, which no other team can match and they seem destined to take their second consecutive title.

The biggest surprise of the season so far has been the decline of the current European champions, Nottingham Forest, who are now living in mid-table, after losing five games in succession.

The Brian Clough magic appears to be having no effect at the moment, and rumour has it that he is about to import a witch doctor from the African football scene to remedy the situation.

There have, of course, been surprises, and two of my outside tips in the pre-season review, Aston Villa and Middlesbrough, are at present lying fifth and sixth.

But the biggest bouquet for performances so far must go to Southampton; the third club behind Liverpool and Manchester. It is unlikely that they will mount a serious challenge for the top spot, but they should gain a deserved place in European competition next season.

As for relegation to Division Two, the only certainty at the moment is Bolton, who are floundering at the foot of the table, five points adrift of the next club.

At the beginning of December, Brighton were in a similar position, but since then they have won six games out of eight and have pulled themselves into a relatively safe position.

The two teams most likely to join Bolton in the drop are Derby and Bristol City, whose recent form has not been encouraging, and they have quickly fallen into the relegation zone.

In Division Two, a dogfight has developed between seven clubs for the three promotion places. Current leaders and favourites are Newcastle United, closely followed by Luton, Leicester and Chelsea.

Birmingham and Queens Park Rangers have always been involved in the tussle, but watch out for Sunderland, who are beginning to hit peak form and joined the leaders this week.

Their determination to regain a Division One place can be seen by the fact that recently they spent £650,000 on two class players, including Marangoni, the Argentinian international.

THAT BRIDGE

THE MAIN approach road for the Kisauni end of the new Nyali Bridge is now visible in its final shape, with Armer barriers in position, lighting poles along the central dividing strip, and smooth black asphalt, offering fresh hope for motorists as they bounce along the old alignment.

When the new bridge is opened to traffic (original completion date was given as February 1980) it will carry two streams of vehicles in each direction with extra lanes for pedestrians, cyclists and hand-carts.

About 600 meters after leaving the bridge, North coast bound traffic will separate into four lanes before reaching the main junction, near Emmanuel Church. The two left hand lanes will be for main road Bamburi traffic, the others for vehicles wishing to turn right towards Bahari Club.

The main junction will be controlled by traffic lights. A new road is planned for traffic heading for Nyali Beach Hotel and the residential area, avoiding the present congested crossroads near Nyali stores, and will include two re-aligned junctions with the existing Malindi and Nyali roads.

The Kisauni road junction has already been changed and forms one end of the access road to serve houses along either side of the

Ras Kisauni "peninsula", links with Mwenberni Road that leads to properties along the east shore of Tudor Creek, and will also allow access to houses along the beach near Bahari Club.

With the three new junctions at the island end of the bridge, this will mean four new sets of traffic lights controlling the flow of traffic across this new link between the North Coast and Mombasa Island, Chagamwe industrial area, Moi International Airport and the Nairobi road.

The lights will, no doubt, be synchronised to allow traffic to flow along the main Bamburi-Kenyatta Avenue axis with a minimum of delay, and the lights and the complicated switching relays will be regularly inspected and serviced. Several people have commented on this point, as Mombasa's only traffic lights at the moment have had a disastrous track record over the past few years.

For weeks at a stretch motorists are confronted with a set of three blanks and have been left to negotiate a gentlemen's agreement with the other streams of cars, or grit their teeth and plunge in, hoping for the best.

TOTAL MYSTERY

With the opening of the new bridge a few months away, the fate of the puntion bridge remains a total mystery. While rumours proliferate, those who know have no intention of letting on. Theories and suggestions so far:

- Leave it for pedestrians, cyclists and hand-carts. This has its advantages as thousands of residents of Kongwea, Kisauni and Freereton walk to their places of work on the island every day; the new bridge will mean a much longer walk. But to keep the puntion bridge maintained to a safe standard will mean an economic toll on every pedestrian and cyclist or a large sum of money from Government funds.

- Dismantle the bridge and tow it in sections to Kilifi where it could, with additional spars, bridge the creek, thus allowing an unbroken road to Malindi. Although the bridge sections



and their pontoons were floated into position in 1930, the long trip by sea could be hazardous. Kibifi Creek is much wider than Nyali, but appears to have less violent tides. For depths, approach anyone with a set of Admiralty Charts.

- Close the bridge to traffic and convert it to a combination of shops and restaurants in the style of medieval London. Access could be limited to delivery vehicles for a couple of hours a day. Income to offset maintenance to the structure, pontoons, chains and anchorage points could come from a turnstyle at each end and the rent from the premises. A few holiday pent house flats, surely the coolest in town, could offer "out the window" fishing rights.

- Sell a couple of spans to Ambalal House as a short cut between offices in the top floors of the two towers. The puntion could be left open and would be ideal for catching rainwater; only temporary of course, until Mombasa has more water than it knows what to do with.

- For the sections into a hollow square, add a suitable tower and tow the assembly out to the turning buoy. After anchoring and adding a suitable sign "KENOFFSHOILCO", it would cause a panic in the Middle East and result in a healthy drop in world petroleum prices.

- Coastdrive will be glad to act as a clearing house for any other proposals.

Were you lucky enough to be involved in the Christmas Eve gathering at either end of Nyali Bridge? I'm sure it isn't a record but the trip from the Coast General Hospital gate to the bridge toll gate took one hour 45 minutes.

Breakdowns will always happen, and on a bridge must cause delays, but what is the solution to the clowns who insist that they can get through on the pavement, cross country, you name it!

By 10p.m., there were five streams of cars leaving the hospital road, attempting to filter into the three streams on the main road leading for the bridge.

Result? A Kissinger eyeball-to-eyeball deadlock, and no space for traffic to get off the bridge. To add to the excitement, matatus dumped customers and tried to turn back to collect their next load.

To top it off, the occasional air conditioned Mbenzi on the right hand pavement attempting to get on his top level appointment.

This mass lunacy needs a cure, be it free handouts of tranquillisers, a T.M. Guru with a loud speaker, or lines on the spot for all drivers on the wrong side of the mythical white line.

Mombasa's drivers will need a positive improvement to the driving styles before the new junctions are allowed to work with any efficiency.
