POLICE HUNT STOLEN CHEQUES

INTERPOL SEARCH SPREADS TO KENYA

CHAIRMAN FOR AFRICAN TOURS

WITH the announcements by the Minister of Tourism, Hon. Mr. B. Mwangale of the appointment of Mr. John Kotut Koitie as chairman of African Tours and Hotels, another highly experienced and tourist orientated individual enters into the management of this government controlled corporation.

With a background over many years in administration, and in particular K.I.D.C., Ministry of Tourism, Hotel Management, having served as a Permanent Secretary for eight years, Mr. Koitie now brings this considerable expertise to head up the board assisting in the formulation and implementation of its policies of making tourism available to the wamanchi of this country.

With his record of achievements behind him, it is expected that his promise to get A.T.&H. on the run, in accordance with the call of His Excellency the President, will soon be put into practical effort.

The former chairman of African Tours and Hotels Mr. R. Chesire in retiring from the board upon handing over to Mr. J. Koitie, has established a good record having found the corporation in a loss situation years ago, he now leaves it as a profit making organisation.

He comments that he will now be able to concentrate on the K.F.A. where he can put his efforts into raising more foodstuffs so badly needed by the nation.

AS THE festive season scramble for Kenya's beaches and the sun gains momentum a big haul of foreign travellers cheques worth K.Shs. 307,930 have been reported stolen in Kenya and abroad and a warning has been sent to all banks, hotels, airlines, travel and tour agents situated along the Kenya Coast.

The 'red alert' has been raised by the Central Bank of Kenya following reports from INTERPOL — The International Police Organisation — and hotel circles in Kenya that some 757 leaves of travellers cheques have been stolen in recent weeks.

As a result there is mounting fear that Kenya being a popular tourist destination may be caught in the web of an international ring dealing with stolen travellers cheques at the time when the country is enjoying a peak tourist season.

According to Interpol, travellers cheques worth U.S. \$18,000 issued by the American Express were stolen in Accra, Ghana in August this year.

The same month travellers

cheques from the Bank of America amounting to U.S. \$19,300 were stolen at Tel Aviv, Israel.

Interpol also reports that in September travellers cheques amounting to U.S. \$12,940 belonging to the Bank of America were stolen at Utrecht, Netherlands.

None of the cheques have been recovered or traced.

Further reports from the Kenya South Coast reveal a loss of foreign travellers cheques in a Diani hotel. They all amounted to E220, U.S. \$190 and DM 100.

The bulk of the cheques belong to the Barclays Bank, Thomas, Cook and Lloyd Bank while the origin of the rest of the cheques has not been ascertained.

Investigations continuing along the Coast have not yet shown indications that any of the stolen cheques have surfaced in or around Mombasa.

Hotels, banks and tour agents have been provided with serial numbers of the stolen cheques — but in a situation where many hotels handle more than Shs. 30,000 in travellers cheques a day there is every possibility of some cheques slipping through.

'\$1,400 LOSS'

In a recent case a North Coast Hotel cashed travellers cheques worth U.S. \$1,400 presented by a Zairean national but were later downed by the Central Bank of Kenya after being realised that they were stolen cheques.

They were however not connected with the reported stolen cheques.

Informed sources told COASTWEEK that the loss or theft of travellers cheques in East African hotels is as old as the tourism trade itself. In many cases it has involved unscrupulous individuals who are out to cash in on careless foreign tourists visiting the country.

'RING-US-UP' HELPS TO RAISE SHS. 260,000/=

THE 1980 "Ring Us Up" television auction organised by Mombasa Round Tables Numbers 3 and 25, in conjunction with the Voice of Kenya Television Mombasa which was aired on Monday evening ended up with a fantastic figure of Shs. 262,520, writes Akram Sheikh.

The figure included sponsorship by two Kenyan companies, Mwangi Coffee Exporters and Musicraft (Kenya) Limited. In addition to the items sold during the auction a record sum of Shs. 18,000 was raised from cash donations.

Musicraft (Kenya) Limited, who in addition to the sponsorship, provided a range of equipment which was sold in a special Musicraft 'Duka' and fetched Shs. 26,735. The other special items which included colour T.V., refrigerators and many other pricy items raised Shs. 116,550.

ABDULLA ZUBEDI TO SPONSOR 1981 AUCTION

The organisers of the show have thanked the Mombasa public for their kind support both for the donations provided for the television auction and for their bidding during the show.

Mwangi Coffee Exporters Limited, whose managing director, Mr. Abdulla Zubedi, appeared on the programme, promised to sponsor the T.V. auction again next year.

TAVETA MAIZE DISPUTE

WUNDANYI (K.N.A.) — The Government will investigate a dispute where an estate owner is alleged to have ordered maize on several acres of land to be uprooted at Taveta of Taita Taveta District.

This assurance was made by the D.O. (I) Mr Samwel Komu when addressing a full Council meeting at the Council chambers in Wundanyi.

The D.O. was answering a question asked by Councillor Dishon Kizaro of Taveta who told the council how an estate owner had subjected squatters at his estate to frustrations and annoyance by allegedly destroying several acres under maize cultivation with the full support of the D.O. in charge of the division.

Councillor Kizaro produced minutes of a meeting held by the D.O. together with the land owner in which the Councillors were not invited.

He further disclosed that the land owner had also cut off a water canal serving as a source of livelihood to Mrabani residents at Taveta subjecting them to unnecessary hardships.

KIKONENI WATER SCHEME

KWALE (K.N.A.) — Construction work on a giant Kikoneni Water dam in Kwale District, estimated to cost the government Shs 5.5 million on completion, has started.

Laying the pipe to the treatment plant and construction is programmed to be completed in August next year.

During his visit to the site the District Commissioner, Kwale, Mr I Lukalo was informed by the site engineer, Mr Brian Wawth and the resident consultant engineer, Mr M Q Zaman, over 50,000 people and livestock in Kikoneni and the surrounding areas will benefit from the water dam when completed.

Mr Lukalo paid tribute to the Ministry of Water Development which has given the contract to construct the dam to Messrs Kundan Singh Construction Company for its involvement in providing sufficient water to the people in the District.

MALINDI TAX

MALINDI (K.N.A.) — Nearly Shs 775,800 was collected in Malindi as revenue last month, an increase of about Shs 18,900 than the revenue for October this year, area revenue officer Mr W G Waweru has disclosed in his monthly report for November just released.

Assurance for Retail Traders

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Commerce Minister Mr Eliud Mwamunga has reassured traders that their retail and wholesale licences will be speedily processed and quashed fears that they may be delayed owing to the recent government directive to draw a line between the two trades.

He also affirmed the withdrawal of the controversial form which had been introduced by the Ministry and which caused much consternation among the business community saying the document was unconstitutional and was the work of an overzealous officer.

The Minister was addressing members of the Rotary Club of Mombasa at their weekly dinner at a Mombasa hotel where he was loudly applauded at these pronouncements.

Mr Mwamunga explained that the government had decided not to give retail and wholesale licences to an individual trader saying the intention based on the need to spread opportunities to as many Kenyans.

This measure, he continued, would also exclude the possibility of wholesaler reserving goods for himself if he had a retail licence during times of shortages.

The new measures would also not allow manufacturers to be their own distributors or wholesalers but he stressed that the government would not force any wholesaler on any manufacturer.

BRIEFS

LAMU (K.N.A.) — Price reduction of Simsim from 440 to 365 per kilogram announced recently by the National Cereals Board have been described as unfair. Voicing his complaint at the Lamu Information Office, Mr Mohamed Bakari Shelai a Member of the District Agricultural Committee said that such a move was discouraging to the farmers.

KILIFI (K.N.A.) — Chaimba/Chitzoeni Women group of Chonyi location in Kilifi have earned special praise for revolutionising agriculture in the area by introducing modern cattle and poultry farming. Saying that the women have come out as an example in a predominantly coconut tree growing area, the Kilifi D.C. said diversification of agricultural produce was the secret of self-sufficiency.

WUNDANYI (K.N.A.) — Wanjachi of Wundanyi and Mbale locations of Taita Taveta District have once more reaffirmed their stand towards the renewal of the traditional liquor licences in the area. Wanjachi voted overwhelmingly against the renewal during a traditional liquor licences board meeting held at Kikukuni and Wanganga chiefs offices.

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Most local Government authorities in the country are faced with bankruptcy due to inflationary trends inherited from global recession. This was said by the Mayor of Mombasa Councillor Rajah Sumba when he met Nyahururu County Council Councillors in his office.

'RESTRICTED'

On the issue of restricted imports, the Minister said that Kenya was not isolated in the move to restrict imports saying other countries were doing it due to the economic crunch they were facing.

"I don't think it is fair for us to import things we manufacture locally" he pointed.

However he added, the import restriction exempted raw materials for industry saying such imports would continue to come in freely provided they were properly documented.

RECORD CROWD AT MOMBASA SHOW

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Over 200,000 people attended last year's Mombasa Show netting more than one million shillings in gate-taking, the outgoing chairman of Mombasa A.S.K. branch Mr Enoch Mbatia has disclosed.

Addressing members of the branch at the annual general meeting at Jomo Kenyatta Showground, Mr Mbatia said Mombasa Show has attained high standards which need to be preserved. He however pointed out that the current show ground will soon be inadequate and plans should be made in advance for an alternative site.

He said the branch spent around half a million shillings in improving various buildings and facilities at the showground. During the meeting which was also attended by the executive officer of the A.S.K. Mr Wene, elections for office bearers were held.

Mr Kasim Owango was unanimously elected as the chairman of the branch while other committee members were returned unopposed. Mr Wene told the members that the national office of A.S.K. has been very impressed by the high standards of Mombasa Show and called upon the office bearers of the branch to cooperate in order to maintain the same standards this year.

MAGUGU OPENS MOMBASA I.C.U.

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The Minister for Health Mr Arthur Magugu has announced that the Government intends to put up intensive care units (I.C.U.) in all the provincial general hospitals in the country as part of its commitment to increase medical facilities to wananchi. They will have a minimum of six beds each.

He was speaking during the official opening of the four bed K. Shs. 1.5 million I.C.U. at the Aga Khan Hospital in Mombasa today, which was built with help from the Lions' Club of Mombasa Central. Already he said, the I.C.U. at the Coast General Hospital has been completed and would be put to use early next year. Other I.C.U.s are in the process of being constructed, the Minister added.

Commending the Aga Khan hospital for its achievement which he observed would be of great help to needy patients, he pointed out the need for proper manning of the units saving they needed specialised nursing services. Mr Magugu however observed that such specialised nursing services were not adequate in the country and had to be recruited from outside. Currently, he went on, regulations for those working in the units have had to be relaxed to allow available personnel to man the units. The Minister expressed the Government's willingness to undertake joint training programmes with other medical institutions in the country to provide qualified nursing personnel to work in the units which was loudly applauded.

West Germany offers a generous helping hand

TANZANIA IS to receive a grant of Shs. 392.6 million from West Germany to finance various projects in the country. The projects include the rehabilitation of railway bridges on the Central Railway line, the purchase of diesel and electric engines for the Tanzania Zambia Railway Authority (Tazara), Telecommunications facilities and the proposed expansion of the Arusha Water Supply.

The private overseas social service institution Community Development Trust Fund (C.D.T.F.) is to provide Tanzania with Shs. 6.7 million to finance 202 village projects in the first half next year. The fund founded by a Tanzanian Member of Parliament of American origin — Lady Marion Chesham — receives all its donations from overseas contributors. It finances projects in the rural areas and the disabled.

The National Development Corporation (N.D.C.) has signed an agreement with machino Export of Bulgaria for the supply and erection of machinery for the proposed Mwanza farm implements and irrigation system plant estimated at Shs. 328.7 million.

The plant which will go into production in 1984 with a rated capacity of manufacturing 6,846 tonnes tonnes of different farm implements per year, will produce 649 tonnes of hand tools, 1,210 tonnes of animal drawn implements and 311 tonnes of irrigation equipment.

Egypt and Tanzania have signed a five year economic and technical co-operation agreement. The agreement entails co-operation in irrigation engineering, technical training, small-scale industries and mining.

A joint committee consisting of officials from both countries will be established to oversee the implementation and development of the co-operation and to consider methods for further expansion of co-operation.

Despite an acute shortage of cement in the country, it is very surprising to note that the Tanzania Sanji Corporation is contemplating an exporting cement following the establishment of the Tanga Cement Company.

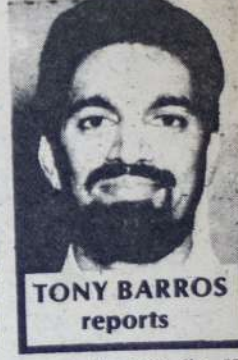
The Prime Minister Mr Cleopa Msuya who is continuing with his tour of industries in the country was told by the corporation's general manager, Mr B. Kimambo that it had received enquiries from potential importers some whom he said wanted to purchase as much as 250,000 tons a year.

The company is expected to produce 200,000 tons between January and June next year.

But with the constant interruption in production at the country's only other plant in Dar es Salaam, one wonders whether the country's demand will be met by that time.

The Tanzania Cigarette Company (formerly B.A.T.)

will meet the balance.
 Tanzania will host the Third General Assembly of the African Agriculture Credit Association (A.F.R.A.C.A.) in November 1982. This was decided at the Second Assembly which was held recently in Conakry, Guinea where Tanzania was re-elected to the organisation's executive committee for another two years.
 Kenya and Guinea continue as vice-chairman and chairman respectively and Ghana provides the secretary-general to the Nairobi-based secretariat.
 It seems low income earners in Dar es Salaam and other areas not easily accessible to cattle will be forced to diversify their palates given astronomical increases in the price of meat.
 Butchers say that their hands are tied as they are forced to purchase from several 'middlemen' who make large profit margins after purchasing it from cattle owners.
 The price of steak here increased from 20/= in some areas to about 30/= and fillet which was selling at about 28/= to 30/= now sells at around 35/= a kilogram.
 The "Rise and Fall of Idi Amin" — a film shot in Kenya — is to be screened in Tanzanian theatres. It is currently being screened in Zanzibar.
 The film produced by Sharad Patel portrays the eight years of Uganda's brutal dictator.
 India has agreed to help train hotel accountants and managers for hotels owned by the Tanzania Tourist Corporation (T.T.C.).
 Through the Indian Tourism Development Corporation (I.T.D.C.) India would help train cooks and decorators of oriental dishes and styles. I.T.D.C. will also assist in building a hotel to be managed by T.T.C. in which they would have minority shares.

AIR LINE HAS HUGE LOSS FROM WET-LEASE

AIR Tanzania Corporation (A.T.C.) sustained an estimated loss of one million shillings a month since she wet-leased the two Boeing Aircraft from the Beirut-based Caledonian Airways. Both aircraft are not air-worthy and are grounded.

A study revealed by finalists of the nine-month course at the C.C.M. Kivukoni Ideological College in Dar es Salaam noted that the Corporation could have not committed with the airline and its Palestinian managing director - Mr George Hallak - had they sought expert advice.

Although the finalists who normally conduct investigations on certain national institutions said that A.T.C.'s aircraft engineers were not involved in the deal, the A.T.C. management confirmed that airline's acting director of engineering and the director of operations had checked the aircraft at Athens before they were flown down to Tanzania.

But the Directorate of Civil Aviation noted that had their technical staff been involved in the negotiations, the first plane would have never flown into the country.

They state that they were only involved in the checking of the first Boeing 720B after it landed in the country on December 21, 1979, but the D.C.A. was further surprised when on the day their surveyors and A.T.C. engineers were supposed to inspect the aircraft, the A.T.C. management decided to fly the aircraft to London on January 6 on its inaugural flight.

A.T.C.'s general manager is claimed to have confirmed that the aircraft was flown out illegally because it had no Federal Aviation Administration (F.A.A.) certificates and was contravening the air services agreements between Tanzania and the countries in which the flights were to operate to.

According to the D.C.A., the aircraft was grounded at Gatwick Airport in London as it did not meet the International Civil Aviation Organisation (I.C.A.O.) standards and not because there was no agreement signed between Caledonian Airways and Dann-Air who were to maintain the aircraft as claimed earlier by A.T.C.

Four months later, the aircraft was flown to Athens where it was painted and flown to Dar es Salaam in August. It was then transferred to Kilimanjaro International Airport where it has been grounded to date.

The D.C.A. was involved from the start in the negotiations for the Boeing 707 which has been grounded at Dar es Salaam Airport for nearly two months, but they have not stated why the aircraft was grounded although they add that they managed to get the minimum equipment list from F.A.A.

They were also involved in the negotiations for the delivery of the third aircraft from Caledonian Airways, but the Boeing 720 could not be delivered on "technical grounds".

The Kivukoni students have challenged the airline to give the public a detailed account on the two aircraft. They also demanded a clarification from the airline on why it was continuing to accommodate 78 expatriate staff in hotels paying a total of Shs. 4.6 million annually.

The expatriates are mainly Indians seconded from Air India.

THE SHAMEFUL HANDLING OF CATTLE EXPORT SHOCKS PORT

THE SALE of the m.v. City of London is not now imminent and in fact she has had an extension of life under the Red Ensign. The vessel undocked from African Marine Drydock last Friday and has resumed her position at M.2 Buoy looking smart and shipshape after drydocking.

SHIPPING with JOHN WALTERS

She will remain at the buoys until end December when she then sails for Mauritius to load a full cargo of bulk sugar for London; it is expected she will then change hands on completion of her sugar charter.

Her sister ship the m.v. City of Liverpool is due to be handed over to new owners in Piraeus very shortly.

A spectacle I hope I will never have to witness again involved the loading and 'housing' of cattle on board the Saudi vessel *Taihab* which I mentioned in my notes last week.

One evening at Number 1 berth I was watching the emaciated cattle being loaded and at the time I was there two wretched creatures were stuck on the gangway - one trying to board and evidently the other one having turned round and tried to disembark - both frightened out of their wits and each being prodded.

How the impasse was resolved I just do not know as I left the scene in disgust.

On a second occasion I was in the port early last Saturday morning and was astonished to see the 27 year old vessel, evidently having completed loading her 1000 head (approx.) of cattle, with the cattle just wandering at will all over the weather deck and the boat deck of the vessel.

Whether or not they were ever tethered to prevent movement at sea prior to sailing I just do not know but I would express some doubts on this aspect.

I saw the vessel finally sail late on Saturday night and I wonder just how many of those hapless cattle will ever reach Jeddah alive.

In this modern day and age it is almost inconceivable that animals could be subjected to what would seem quite inhuman treatment.

If cattle are to be exported, at least ensure that the ship concerned and conditions are up to the highest standards, such as the *Orient Clipper* also in port loading cattle.

'BIG FIVE'

One of the most significant developments yet affecting the operations of the British flag liner services between East Africa and the United Kingdom has recently been announced by the 'big five' namely Clan, Ellerman, Harison, P.O., Union Castle.

It all concerns Containerisation. A new consortium has thus been created named Beacon, short for British East African Container Service.

It also has a nautical flavour and the theme of lighting the way.

Operations will start on January 1 next. Initially operating one sailing a month but fortnightly as from February 1981 the service will operate between U.K. East Coast ports for Mombasa, Dar es Salaam, Nacala and Mauritius.

Up to now the majority of the lines concerned have only provided container space on their existing conventional

services but now we see the introduction of a fully integrated British liner cellular service which will also have a conventional back up service for a year at least until importers and exporters are fully container orientated.

Cargo to traditional West Coast U.K. ports such as Avonmouth is also expected to be fully catered for and in this regard the five British Shipping Companies concerned will be arranging for the necessary inland haulage of the containers.

CONTAINERS

We are now living in the container age and Beacon is confident that the new service will benefit users by faster transit times and much increased security of cargo which will be especially appreciated in East Africa.

Undoubtedly containerisation of cargo results in considerable improvement in both claims and insurance rates with, for example, cargoes being accepted for shipment and staffed in containers in the middle of England and remaining in the containers until it reaches its inland destination hundreds of miles in the interior be it Nairobi, Kampala or the Sudan.

I would emphasise in conclusion that it is not a new shipping service being introduced but a complete revamping and updating of the British lines long established services with East Africa with the five British lines saying let us all get together and work as a team in one unit.



FURNITURE CENTRE IN MOMBASA

AS a result of increased demand for quality furniture and office equipment in the Coast Province, Furniture Centre are opening a full fledged office and showroom on Haile Selassie Road, Mombasa from January 1981.

With this move the Furniture Centre have announced the appointment of Suleman Sanghar as manager for the Coast Province.

Mr Sanghar has been closely associated with sales of office equipment and allied lines for over fifteen years.

In his new capacity he will co-ordinate sales of furniture, office equipment and Nashua plain paper copiers.

A full service back up with trained engineers and a sales team will support the launch of Nashua's compact new range of plain paper copiers.

TREE CROP COMMISSION

KILIFI (K.N.A.) - The Government commission, appointed to look into the higher productivity of coconut and cashewnut trees in the Coast has been called upon to hasten its work so as to give the local wananchi an alternative source of income once the sale of traditional liquor stops by the end of the year.

Making the call Coun. Daniel Runya of Chonyi Location in Kilifi South Division told the D.C. Mr Andrew Omuse that the people of the location were fully behind all government programmes in the area.

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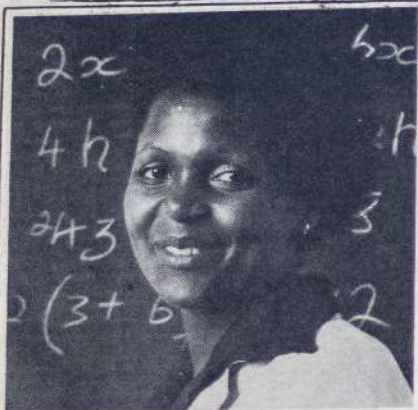

HOT WEATHER MEALS

AFTER the surfeit of arrangement and cooking which takes place at this time of the year, most housewives begin to flag when it comes to ideas for meals especially in the hot weather, when even the vegetables in the market seem to droop before they are purchased, let alone on the wearisome drive home.

For this reason I have chosen dishes which can be made in advance of the day required this week, which means that entertaining or being with the family can be as relaxed as possible for the hostess.

All she will have to do on the day of the meal is get it from the kitchen to the table at the time required. The dishes are cold and all of them simple to make.

CHILLED AVOCADO SOUP:

- 2 ripe avocado pears
- Juice of one lemon
- 2 pints of lukewarm chicken stock
- 1/2 onion grated finely
- freshly grated nutmeg
- 3-4 tablespoons of cream (thin cream)
- cayenne pepper or paprika

Mash the flesh of the avocado pear, this should be done with the lemon juice which will prevent discoloration. Place the pulp in a blender with the lukewarm chicken stock, grated onion and nutmeg and a little salt. Blend. Then chill until ready to serve.

This soup thickens slightly in chilling so depending on the size of your avocado pears you may prefer to dilute a little more with extra chicken stock. Check seasoning.

Add the cream just before serving and a fine sprinkling of paprika or cayenne. Many people prefer to use the tinned consomme which Campbells produce for this soup, but I find that not only does it make it an expensive exercise but the delicacy of the avocado pear flavour is swamped rather by the unmistakable flavour of



tinned soup; but, if you are on holiday and do not have chicken stock to hand then this is an alternative method of making this soup. Serves 6-8.

Carrots with olives make a very attractive appetiser and are all the better for being made two days in advance. The flavours will then mature. You can actually make this three days ahead but the dish should be covered with silver foil or Gladwrap in the refrigerator.

CARROTS AND OLIVES:

- 2 pounds carrots (avoid coarse, large ones if possible)
- 10 ounces shallots or tiny pickling onions
- 6 ounces black olives
- the best olive oil you can get
- white wine vinegar or tarragon vinegar
- salt and freshly ground black pepper

Trim and peel the carrots and cut into neat match-like strips with a very sharp knife. They should be approximately 1 1/2 inches long and 1/4 inch thick. Heat six tablespoons olive oil in a frying pan or heavy casserole. Toss in the whole peeled onions and brown them all over lightly.

Next add the carrots and 1 1/2 tablespoons vinegar and season well. Stir the vegetables with a wooden spoon so that the oil is evenly distributed and coats the carrots and onions so that they gleam.

Reduce heat to low or place

casserole or pan on an asbestos mat, cover and simmer gently for half an hour. Stir occasionally.

Next, if the olives are bought in brine, blanch these for a few minutes in boiling water. This will remove any bitter brine from them. Add the olives to the carrots and continue to simmer very gently for yet another half hour.

This is ready to remove from the stove when the onions are tender and the carrots still slightly crunchy. Turn ingredients into a glass bowl, cover and chill for a couple of days (one day minimum).

Just before you are intending to serve this dish, allow it to come to room temperature, or just below, in the case of Mombasa, stir in some extra olive oil, check seasoning and stir well.

Scatter a little very finely chopped parsley over before bringing to the table. Serves 8.

TURKISH FISH:

Rather than listing the ingredients I shall explain the treatment of the whole fish because quantities depend entirely on the size of the fish you are serving and that depends on the number of people one intends to serve it for.

Take one whole rock cod, bream or parrot fish and remove the scales. Clean and hold under the running tap of

cold water. Pat dry. Now lightly fry this on both sides in boiling olive oil. Set aside. This is not cooked at this stage merely seared on the outside.

Now chop some garlic and four or five onions in coarse pieces (I prefer to leave them in rings) and fry this until they are limp in the oil. Do not allow to brown. Add two large tins of peeled tomatoes and their liquor, break the flesh of the tomatoes down. Add a bay leaf or two, season to taste.

When bubbling place the fish in this sauce, coat the top of the fish with it and simmer for 10 minutes on one side then turn and cook slowly until tender but do not allow to overcook. If simpler, use the oven tin first on the top of the stove then place in the oven for 30 minutes, cover the fish with tinfoil so that it does not dry. A little water may be added if desired.

The fish should be partially immersed in its tomato sauce and must not dry out. During the last five minutes of cooking add a dozen black olives to the sauce. When the fish is ready — cooking should certainly take no longer than 35 minutes in all.

Remove fish from heat, spoon juices over the top of the fish. Cool and place in the fridge overnight. To serve. With great care transfer to serving dish.

Scatter chopped parsley over and serve with salads. I usually place a slice of lemon over the eye or in the mouth of a fish and add a few extra shiny black olives as a garnish.

FRAISES

CARDINALE:

- 1 pound hulled strawberries
- 8 ounces tinned raspberries
- sugar
- 2 ounces blanched almonds

Drench the strawberries in sugar and puree the raspberries over these. A sieve should be used and if you have no blender, a wooden spoon will press the flesh and juices through onto the strawberries which should be in the dish in which you intend to serve them. Chill for two hours.

Before bringing them to the table, scatter chopped almonds over and serve.

It is more subtle not to serve cream with this dish but there are no rules. Serves 4-6.

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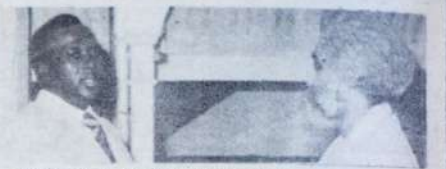

Dies ist der treffende Kommentar zu einem Buch, das 1976 unter dem Originaltitel *Mombasa the friendly town* erschien und nun von Karin Hasselall ins Deutsche übersetzt worden ist. Die deutsche Ausgabe dürfte vor allem für Touristen aus deutschsprachigen Ländern interessant sein, die sich im Urlaub oder auch später zu Hause etwas näher mit dieser Stadt, ihrer Geschichte und Bevölkerung befassen möchten.

Dr. Jewell, der seit vielen Jahren in Mombasa lebt, weist darauf hin, daß Mombasa auf viele Besucher und Ansässige eine eigenartige Faszination ausübt. Besonders diejenigen, die in Mombasa gewohnt haben und fortgezogen sind, zieht es magnetisch zurück, was immer sich Gelegenheit dazu bietet.

Der Autor beschreibt Mombasa, wie er es mit seinen Augen sieht. Die Ereignisse und Szenen sind sehr lebhaft geschildert, und in allen Geschichten kommt immer wieder Dr. Jewells tiefe Verbundenheit mit Mombasa zum Ausdruck.

Zahlreiche Bilder und ausgezeichnete Farbphotografien tragen dazu bei, den Text zu veranschaulichen. Der Inhalt ist aufgeteilt in verschiedene Kapitel:

- Geschichtlicher Überblick: von der prähistorischen Epoche bis zur Unabhängigkeit.
- Volksgruppen Mombasas: Suahelis, Araber, Afrikaner, Asiaten
- Stätten der Anbetung: Kirchen, Kathedralen, Moscheen, Tempel
- Stätten von allgemeinem Interesse: Fort Jesus, Kilindi, Gericht, Zof, Wege zur Insel, Schulen, Klubs, Beoab Wald, Elfenbeinraum, etc.

GEMÄLDE

Mombasa hatte viele Bewunderer im Laufe der Jahrhunderte trotz immerwährender Unruhen, die keinen Frieden aufkommen ließen. Verschiedene Schriftsteller haben ihre Gedanken zu Papier gebracht. Allister Macmillan schrieb 1930 über Ostafrika und Rhodesien: "Mombasa ist ein Aufbruch an Farben. Die Natur hat im verschwenderischen Gebrauch von Farben ein Gemälde der See und des Landes hervorgebracht, das in seiner berückendsten Schönheit einen unauslöschlichen

Jambo lililokuwa likimvutia katika hafla hizo ni tarab. Wakati huo vyama vya tarab vya Johar na Morning Star vilikuwa vimetia fora katika mvita na pia Mwambao wa Afrika zama mashariki. Ustadh Ali alikuwa kwamba yeye binafsi alivutiwa na utimbaji wa waimbaji kama vile Nassor Wachaka na Athman Muhaballa ambao wote walikuwa waimbaji wa Johar.

Mwanzo wa kuimba kwake, alianza na chama cha Star, kisha akajiunga na chama cha Johar. Baada ya chama cha Johar, alijiunga na Lulu, na baada ya hapo aliunda okestra yake mwenyewe aliyoiita Mvita Okestra.

Na ni katika chama hichi chake ndipo alipo koma kama muimbaji. Katika nyimbo zake za asili ambazo zilipendwa sana na pia zilifitia fora katika Sauti ya Mvita ni kama hizi: Bembeya mtoto, Wachwa waseme, Mtungi umevunjika, Howa howa mtoto, Shilingi yang'ara yaua, Alby, Ukilea mwana mwema, Malundi pamba na kadhalika.

Na jambo la ajabu kuhusiana na uimbaji wa Ustadh Ali, ni kwamba mashairi ya nyimbo zake hayatunga yeye mwenyewe. Na yeye apendelea zaidi utunzi wa maisha ya kibinadamu au wasia.

Ustadh Ali aliwacha kuimba nyaka mingi sasa. Sababu ya yeye kuacha kuimba, anasema ni kufungwa kwa Sauti ya Mvita. Na iwapo leo tu idhaa hiyo yafunguliwa tena basi yeye ztanza kuimba upya na pia wale waimbaji mashuhuri kama Miraji Juma aliyimba "Muhogo" wanaweza wakajitokeza tena na kusikika hewani.

Yeye fikra zake ni kwamba utamaduni na lugha ya Kimvita hupatikana katika nyimbo zake. Waimbaji wengine wa Kimvita huigiza mahadhii ama sauti ya Kihindi na hivyo nyimbo zao japokuwa ni nzuri masikioni lakini kutamaduni hazina umuhimu.

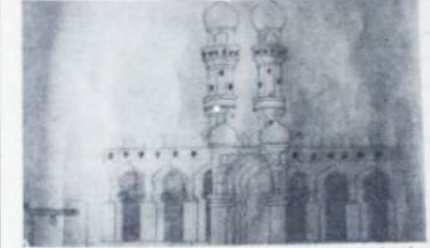

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TANZANIA FALL OUT OF WORLD CUP SOCCER

TANZANIA are out of the World Cup Africa Soccer qualifying rounds after having lost 2-0 against Nigeria's Green Eagles in the second round in Dar es Salaam. The two teams had two weeks earlier tied 1-1 in Lagos.

The home team had all the chance of going through to the next round for they only required a goalless draw or a single goal victory.

Africa's champions took advantage of both the opportunities they had to score goals, while Tanzania's striker Thuwein Ali could not manage to score any goals in his four encounters with Nigeria's goalkeeper Ogedebe Best.

Tanzania has never been and will never be prepared for the World Cup qualifying matches unless she prepares her team at least six years before the tournament or if we go professional.

For even Zaire, the only team from black Africa to qualify for the World Cup finals have proved that most teams south of the Sahara cannot fare well unless they are well prepared.

Tanzania's controversial former national goal-keeper

Athumani Mambosasa may not be featured in the 1981 National League Tournament.

He says that he has signed up with Dar Young Africans, but according to the Football Association of

Tanzania (F.A.T.), he is registered with Dar Simba his former club.

Mambosasa has sworn that he has not registered with Simba and adds that any application with his signature is a forged document, but Dar Young Africans have had to withdraw his application after learning that he had registered with Simba.

Mambosasa and Young Africans will have to wait for the decision of F.A.T.'s scrutinising committee.

Meanwhile, the Dar Simba squad of 17 players have gone into intensive training in preparation for the East and Central African Club Championships to be held in Kenya. Two players have yet to report at the camp.

Simba recently returned from Zimbabwe where their performance left much to

be desired. Simba were the first winners of the championship in 1974 and have never won it ever since.

Simba Sports Club of Dar es Salaam, who are currently visiting Zimbabwe, played its first match at the Sakubwa Stadium in Salisbury on Friday and drew 1-1 with Umtali XI of Salisbury.

Simba Sports Club was expected to play last Sunday against Dynamos and will wind up their tour against a team to be named.

Dar es Salaam Khalsa Sports Club clinched the Independence Day Hockey Cup last week, after they dethroned defending champions Arusha Twiga by 1-0 in the finals.

Tanzania's veteran hockey player Tarochan Singh Sandhu gave the winning goal in the 27th minute of the first half, after a goalmouth scramble.

Arusha region won the 4th National Volleyball Championship in Dar es Salaam after they defeated in the finals host Dar es Salaam by 3-2, to clinch the prestigious cup for the first time.

Meanwhile, volleyball associations in East and Central Africa are expected to meet early next year in Zanzibar to discuss the revival of the East and Central Africa Volleyball Confederation and the promotion of the game in the region.

The secretary of the confederation, G. Hikal of Tanzania told COASTWEEK that he would convene a meeting for all members if they respond positively in Zanzibar next month.

WITH the end of the 1980 football season at the Coast, fans might be summing up the epilogue with emotions that may be a mixture of relief, sorrow and criticism.

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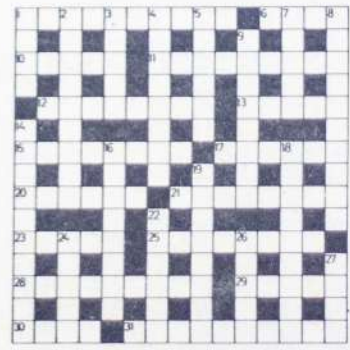

The well attended event was sponsored by Car and General and attracted a very impressive array of up-country riders, unfortunately offset by a miserably low response from Mombasa members. It must be something to do with small fishes and big ponds, but what a waste of valuable experience and points towards Mombasa Motor Club Championship.

Chris Sharpe was Clerk of the Course and had to do a considerable amount of work to re-activate the motor-cycle only portions of the track.

The off-and-on rain storms made conditions very changeable, but by the end of

An early battle developed between Steve Anthony, Jaswinder Virdee and Simon Rowe.

Several riders went down in the slippery conditions, among the retirements were Mark Jennings and Rob Carr-Hartley. After seven laps, Steve Antony (Honda 250) took the flag 1.5 seconds ahead of Simon Rowe, followed in by Charles Muthama and Jaswinder.

The much delayed race for 80 cc. machines was won by Sandro Fabrello (Suzuki), ten seconds in front of Ivan Vesely with Tony Kibaki a determined but overdue third.

These results were used to determine start order for a second event, but the handicap committee overestimated the change in conditions and Fabrello won the two lap event by a far too wide margin.

The 125 cc. event gave Simon Rowe (Suzuki) another clear win over Jet Antony and Charles Muthama; in the following race for 250 machines, Rob Carr-Hartley won by a very narrow margin from Steve Antony and Simon Rowe, the first three machines being separated by less than a second.

The novices race produced the most spectacular tumble of the day, when Jaswinder lost control soon after the jump and "over-wheeled" until the machine and rider changed places. Adam Vesely (Kawasaki) was the clear winner, well ahead of David Kibaki and Chipper Adams.

The second heat of the Championship had a smaller entry, and the drier conditions added an extra lap.

At the end of the first lap, Steve Antony had a narrow lead over Carr-Hartley and Simon Rowe, but a fall put him to the back of the field.

He then fought his way back through the rest of the pack to finish in third position, some seconds behind the winner Carr-Hartley (Yamaha).

The intermediate event gave Jet Antony (Honda) a first place, by now machines and riders were showing wear and tear, resulting in smaller entries and some events had to be cancelled.

The visitors race was won by Rob Carr-Hartley by a narrow edge over Simon Rowe and Steve Antony; the all-comers event gave Steve Antony the biggest gap of the day, some forty seconds over Jaswinder Virdee, still affected by his earlier fall.

The last event of the day, the pit stop race produced surprisingly large field of six teams of two riders each. After two laps, the first rider is require a warm (ice can't last forever!) soft drink, before his team mate is allowed to start his two laps.

Winners were Simon Rowe and Rob Carr-Hartley, with the Antony family in second place.

When the times of the two heats of the Championship event were combined Simon Rowe came out ahead of Steve

Saturday's practice the track was dry, dusty and fast.

On Sunday morning, bright sunshine greeted early arrivals, not particularly welcomed by those officials who list show business among their interests!

Just as the track was declared open, down came the rain and machines soon chewed up their own mud walls.

It soon became apparent that some riders had little experience in mud, lucky for them the rain moved on and the track began to dry out; by the end of the meeting the mud had reverted to the track's usual dust clouds.

The rain reduced the size of the crowd, but some of the more hardy fans abandoned their cars and paddled the rest of the way to the track.

The first race drew the modest entry of four machines, ehaps some non-shows had implied enough mud in factice. The four lap race was on convincingly by Martin Vesely (Kawasaki) twenty seconds ahead of Ian Duncan, with Chipper Adams trailing in the four minutes later.

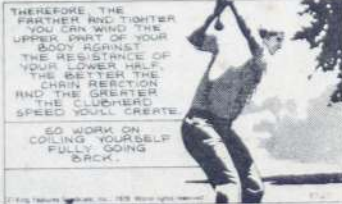
